WHS seniors awarded \$103,600 in scholarships

Approximately \$103,600.00 in scholarships were awarded to deserving senior students during the annual Awards Day last Friday.

WHS Valedictorian Lori Jobe received the Warren Michaelwicz Memorial Scholarship for \$500, the Presidential Honors Scholarship to Texas A&M in Kingsville worth approximately \$25,000, the Minnie Steven Piper Foundation Scholarship for \$10,000, Small Schools Award for \$150, Tarleton State University Bright Scholarship for \$1,000 per year for four years, and the National FFA Award for \$1,000.

Carr Scholarships to Angelo State University were awarded to Gayla Clough, Kevin Conner, Mark Deike, Jason Jordan, and Marcie Pritchard.

Jason Jordan, Highest Ranking Boy, was also awarded a \$7,500 scholarship from Abilene Christian University.

Aladdin Beauty College presented Juanita Reyes with a \$500 scholarship.

Mark Deike was awarded \$900 per semester from the Texas A&M University at Kingsville Housing Scholarship, \$5,540 Academic Award from Texas Christian University, \$200 general scholarship from West Texas A&M at Can-

Council reviews ideas for facilities at city lake, wants public's opinion

During the regular meeting of the Winters City Council on May 12, a lengthy discussion was held with suggestions for improvements and changes at the Elm Creek Reservoir.

Lakekeeper Bill Lafair was present and asked the council for some specific directives regarding lake policies and improvements.

Some of the suggestions discussed by the council included erecting eastbound and westbound signs on Highway 153 to announce camping, boat ramp and recreation area at the lake; placing signs northbound and southbound on Highway 83 with directions to the lake facilities; lower the exempt age to under 15; triple the user fee

for people caught using the lake without a permit; place warning signs on buoys or near the spillway; and lock the gate to the west side from 2647.

The council directed Mr. Lafair to do some comparison studies with other cities and lake facilities. Council members also stated that public input is requested.

At this time, Lafair reports that the RV hookups, the pavilion, and the dump station for RVs are ready. The council voted to establish policies concerning the new facilities and are again asking for the public's opinions.

The Oath of Office was given to Alderman Garry Goff by Mayor Dawson McGuffin.

Alderwoman Shirley Hall was appointed Mayor Pro-Tem.

There was no comment from the public during the open public hearing concerning the fire department budget amendment. The council voted to amend the budget to show the increase in the price of the new fire truck as approved in a previous council meeting.

City Manager Aref Hassan was instructed by the council to proceed with application to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Indoor Recreation Pilot Program grant and to apply for funds to add a meeting room to the community center.

The City of Winters has received 110 composting bins which arrived in boxes with assembly instructions in each box. Citizens are welcome to come by City Hall and pick up a bin.

City pool to open

Winters City Swimming Pool will open to the public Sunday, May 26, at 2 p.m.

Regular pool hours are 1-6 p.m. Monday-Saturday and 2-5 p.m. Sunday. Tickets for age 5 and over are \$1.50, under 5 is 50¢. A season pass can be purchased at the pool for \$20 for 20 swims.

Special bookings can be arranged for parties of 25 persons at \$25 per hour in the swimming pool. Over 25 people is \$5 per hour additional charge. Reservations must be made well in advance. For information, call 754-4645.

Lifeguards are on duty for the regular swimming hours as well as for the booked parties. Lifeguards are Cristi Burton, Jace Wade, Kyle Loudermilk, Trevor Richards, and Marcie Pritchard.

All lifeguards have taken a 52-hour extensive training course involving CPR, first aid, and life-saving.

For the safety of all swimmers, all rules must be observed. No children under the age of 5 are permitted to swim without adult supervision.

OIL BUSINESS . . .

You may recall that we discussed the tool pusher on our last foray into the "Basics of the Oil Patch." As promised, we are going to move to the other side of the service transaction to discuss the "Company Man."

The company man is the generic title attached to the man or woman who happens to be the producer's (oil company's) representative on a job. The job may be a drilling well (most common), workover, or any other operation.

In order to bring a little order to the piece, let's break our subject into: (a) the various titles and associated roles that company men fill; (b) the usual duties of a company man; and, (c) the type of person who typifies the quintessential company man.

Whether it is a drilling well, a workover, a new facility installation, or a large equipment implementation, the company man is the rep. of the company on duty. The company man is usually the liaison between the contractor working on the job and the operating company. He or she is the person representing the company's point of view, and is there to protect the company's own best interest.

The company man may be called a construction foreman, the field superintendent, the company hick, or even the company person, but he or she is really just a company man in my book.

As I already mentioned, the company man is there to protect the company's best interest. In a nutshell, that is what all of the jobs of the company man can be boiled down into.

For those of you still reading, we'll try to be a little more specific.

The company man is the decision-maker in crucial, time-critical situations where the contractor does not want to take responsibility for the decision that might have effects beyond the current job. This might be a situation where an expensive piece of equipment is not working, or a risk to safety is involved, or a major expenditure might hang in the balance. Those types of decisions (especially when unplanned events occur) belong with the operator.

The company man should be accessible at all times, but not necessarily on the job site at all times. Some guys consider any local golf course as being "accessible," but the prudent and diligent company man makes at least an occasional visit to the site. It is especially important that the company man be there during crucial operations or procedures to make any required decisions.

Sometimes, it is hard to draw a line between where the company man is doing his/her own job and when he/she is trying to do everyone else's. A successful company man knows when to let the contractor and his hands do their job—without interference.

A company man should possess some beneficial qualities before actually becoming a company man. This might include: able to stay a long time away from home; diplomatic (I know some who aren't) to be able to get things done the right way without alienating either the contractor or management; and, be able to communicate properly (written and spoken)—he'll have to speak to management one minute and field hands the next.

Now, if you are driving down the road and see two guys fighting near a water tower, you'll know they are probably the company man and the operator.

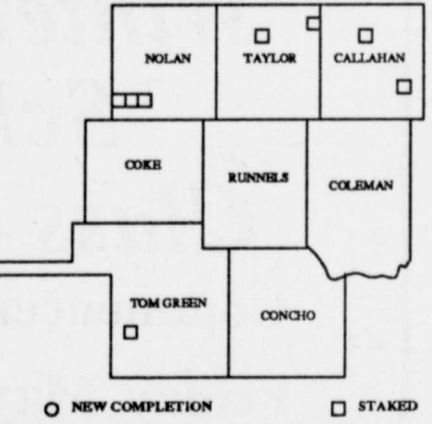

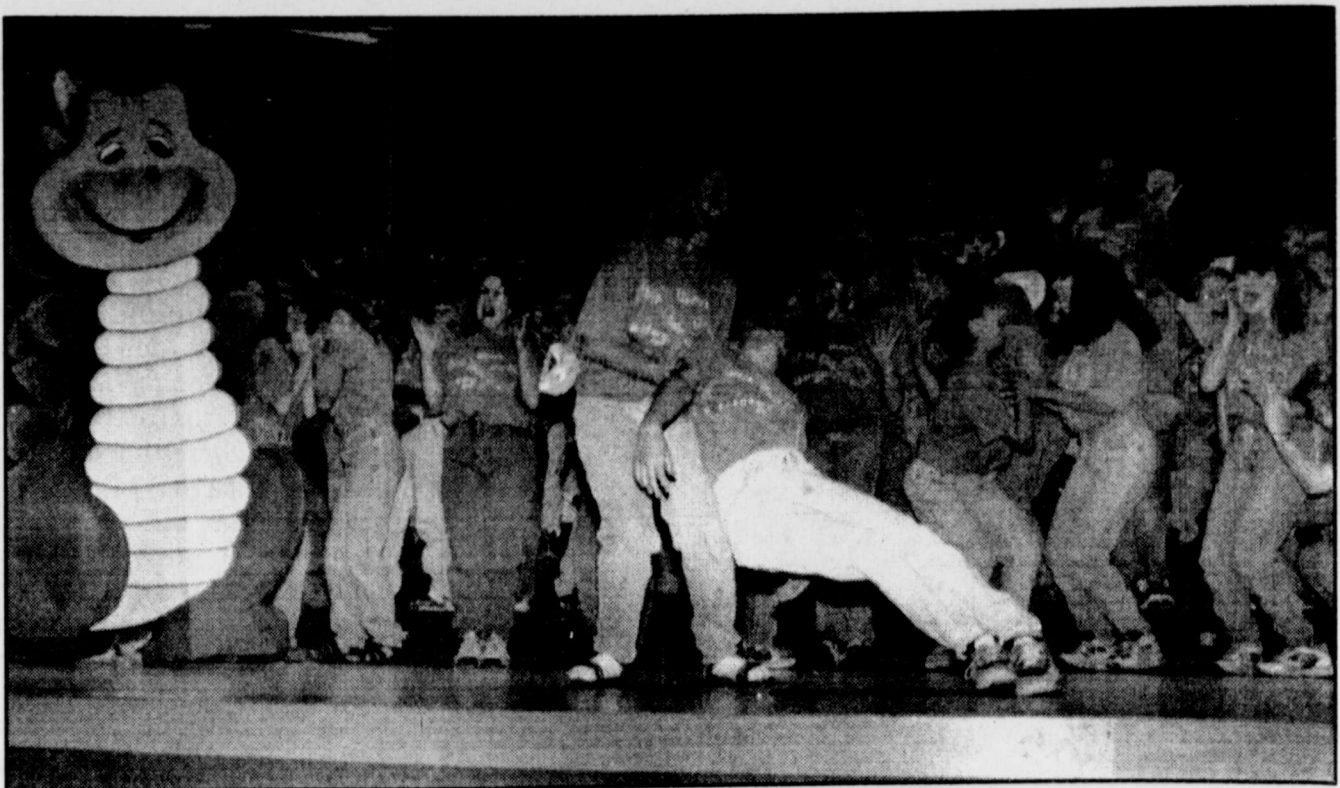
Winters Area Baseball Camp will be conducted May 27, 28 and 29, from 8 a.m. to 12 noon at the City Park for fifth through eighth grade students.

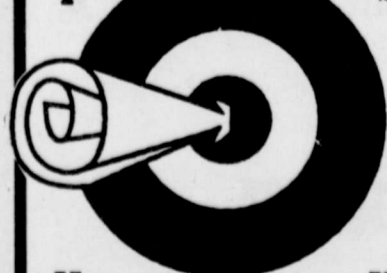

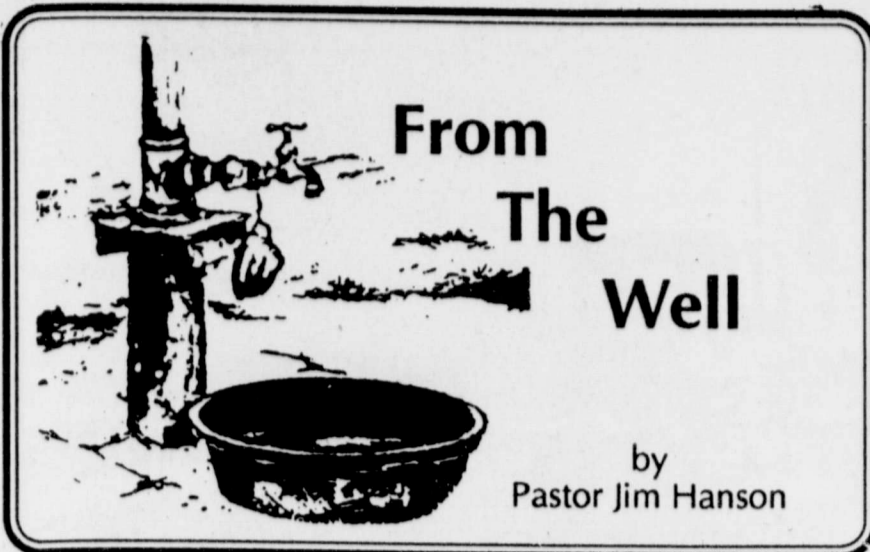

From The Well

Today I would write about baseball. The game, not the American and National League, the owners and the stockholders. I write about the game. Playing the game. Watching the game...from the stands, not from a recliner.

I don't know how old I was when my dad first taught me how to catch and how to throw a ball. I do know I was quite young, probably 4 or 5. He taught me. He loved me. He loved the game. So, he passed it on. By teaching me "catch." Ever so often in my youth he would say to me, "Jim, let's go play some catch." It was fun. Something we did together.

As a family, we were not into movies. I do not think we ever went to a movie together as a family. My father and mother were very suspicious of Hollywood. But baseball was different. It wasn't too much later in my life that dad took me to the ball game. The town team. And, the American Legion team. We didn't have Little League in those days. But if we would have, he would have been involved.

Years later, after I was married and a father too, when I came home for a visit, we would spend at least one night going to a baseball game. Baseball, the game, was part of my growing up. Part of my life. Part of our family life.

Baseball still is a game. And the game hasn't changed. I asked Bobby Bragan when he was here at the Mayfest telling us all about Rogers Hornsby, "What about baseball? Has it changed?" He was quick to reply, "The game hasn't changed. The players have." Of course when the salaries are over a million dollars a year for many of them, it's hard to imagine any of them playing the game "for fun" anymore. It has to be play for pay. And somehow that does something to the sport.

Bobby Bragan, who works with the Rangers, knew Rogers Hornsby personally. That's why he came to Winters, the place where Rogers was born, to help us celebrate the day. What he had to say about Rogers was "he is the greatest right-handed hitter of all time." And, he was a character. On one occasion the Fort Worth community was honoring Rogers by having a big dinner in his honor. They were going to give him a plaque with his name inscribed on it. When he picked it up and saw the name inscribed was Roger, not Rogers, he simply announced, "You must have the wrong man. My name is Rogers." And he walked out!

I'm so glad Bobby came to our town. He loves the game of baseball. He played it. Coached and managed it. Spent most of his life in it. He's a walking encyclopedia on baseball. He can remember names and games and stories going fifty years back. He is a good speaker — he gets the crowd into his speech. He is a Christian — a member of a Methodist Church in Fort Worth. He loves the game. He loves people. He loves kids, and they love him. As part of his speech, he read this poem. It captures the heart of the game. I leave it with you:

A Ball Player's Prayer, by Don Gates:
 "Lord, give me the strength to hit the ball,
 And if I should, don't let me fall.
 Help me to pick the one that's right
 Then let me sock it out of sight.
 Then help me run with deer-like grace,
 Don't let me slip, but tag first base.
 Then on second, stay with me Lord,
 Cause this one out we can't afford.
 Then let me zoom like a flying bird
 Right down the line and on past third.
 Then let me slide with foot out-thrust
 Across home plate through swirling dust.
 But first of all, Dear Lord, I pray,
 Just tell the Coach to let me play."
 Amen!

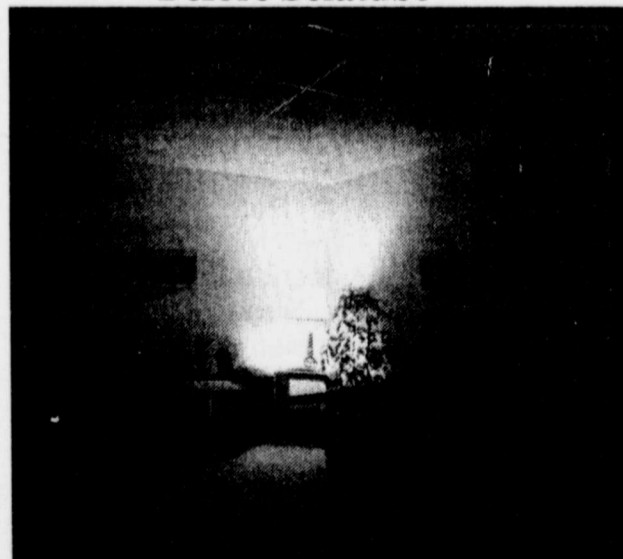

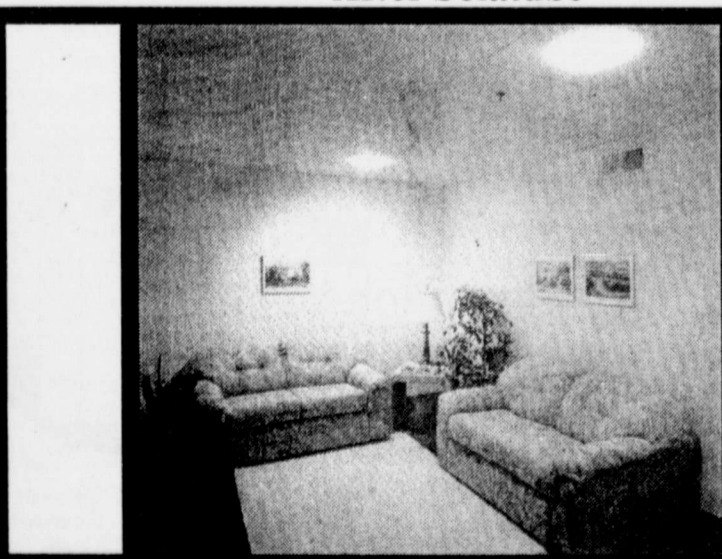

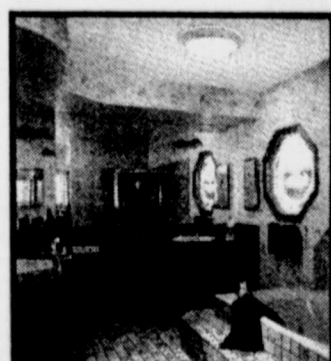

Beautiful Buffalo Gap

Affords visitors an experience in Western hospitality

Nestled in a natural setting between the green, flattop hills of the Callahan Divide...the village of Buffalo Gap recalls history at every turn.

Before the white men came to this part of the country, the Buffalo Gap area was the winter resting place for Comanche Indians. The vast groves of live-oak trees provided welcome relief from the elements.

During the great migrations of buffalo in the early 1870's, hunters settled in lean-to's and dug-outs to await the passing herds, as the hunters took their toll, visitors recall seeing stacks of buffalo hides piled twenty feet high in the streets.

Later, the great cattle barons like Charles Loving and Oliver Goodnight drove their herds from south Texas to Dodge City through the Gap. Often the dust trails of three different herds could be seen from the nearly flat tops of the Callahan Divide.

Long known only to hunters, cattlemen, and cavalry troops, the settlement began to grow in the late 1870's. The first newspaper, the Buffalo Gap News, began publication in 1878 and was the first newspaper to serve the residents of Taylor County.

By 1880, Buffalo Gap had 1200 citizens and had become the county seat of Taylor County. The

only county building was a two-story jail constructed of native stone blocks mortised together with cannonballs brought from the Civil War battlefields.

The jail still stands and now houses an historic museum. Besides the jail, a dozen stores, and nearly as many saloons. Buffalo Gap Presbyterian College was established offering a curriculum which included Latin and Greek.

In 1881, Abilene sprang up to the north along the Texas and Pacific Railroad. By 1883, Abilene had enough people and spirit to petition for an election to move the county seat from Buffalo Gap. Both sides waged a month long campaign to win the election. By current standards, the voting laws and campaign tactics left much to be desired.

Tales of election day shenanigans spread far and wide. People from the Gap charged that passengers on the T and P were encouraged to leave the train, vote and then partake of a barrel of whiskey set up in a near by lumber yard.

Abilene won by a landslide. However, on the day of canvassing the votes, two groups armed with six-shooters and Winchester almost took things into their own hands. Fortunately, cool heads prevailed and the confrontation was averted, with each side

deciding to leave the decision to the County Judge and Commissioners.

When they chose Abilene, the judge was quickly rushed home only to find that all of his chickens had been killed and eaten by an angry group of Buffalo Gap men. The county records were finally relinquished after threats of calling in the Texas Rangers.

There was a brief revival in Buffalo Gap's growth in 1909, when the Santa Fe Railroad came but the town never regained its former glory. The town remained a sleepy village until another sensational election in 1965, when the citizens voted 76 to 75 to allow the sale of alcoholic beverages in Buffalo Gap. So much of the history of this little town has been influenced by these two elections nearly 80 years apart.

An attraction five miles southwest of Buffalo Gap is Abilene State Park. Covering 500 scenic acres along Cedar Creek, the park area was once a resting place for Comanche Indians. Visitors now find modern camping and recreation facilities intermingled among 4000 native pecan trees.

Meat goat performance test slated

The Second Annual Meat Goat Performance Test will begin June 1 at Angelo State University's Management, Instruction, and Research Center (MIR) in San Angelo. A special field day will be held in conjunction with the test's start.

The test is a cooperative effort between the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, and Angelo State University.

Prospective test animals must be buck kids born between January 1 and March 31, 1996. Producers are limited to ten goats each. All test animals will be sorted by size. They will be fed in group pens for a 1 day warm-up period followed by the 84-day-test. The test ends September 3.

All goats must arrive at the MIR Center on June 1. Test officials must be notified if animals are to arrive earlier so arrangements can be made. Test officials must

also know the number of animals being entered by May 24 so feed and pens may be secured.

Cost for the test is \$75 per head, in advance. The fee covers feed, veterinary costs, facilities, and management.

The June 1 field day at the MIR Center will deal with meat goat performance and carcass traits. Scheduled speakers include: Dr. Gil Engdahl, Dr. Brian May, and Sara Lewis from ASU; Dr. Dan Waldron, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, San Angelo; Dr. Frank Craddock, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, San Angelo; and Dr. Rick Machen, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Uvalde.

Herbicide regulation soon in effect for northwest Runnels County

The northwest part of Runnels County will be a herbicide regulated area again this year, according to Mike Mauldin, Runnels County Extension Agent. The dates that this regulation are in effect are May 26 to October 1, 1996. All persons within the designated area are asked to abide with these regulations.

The regulations for Runnels County are as follows:

That portion of Runnels County beginning on the west county line at the point of intersection with the Colorado River, east-southeasterly along the Colorado River to its intersection with U.S. Highway 83, thence north along U.S. Highway 83 to its intersection with the north county line, thence

westerly along the north Runnels county line to the northwest corner of the county, thence southerly along the west county line to the Colorado River, the point of beginning, is regulated by the Texas Herbicide Law.

In regulated areas, no permit is required from October 1st through May 25th of the following year.

The application of Ester formulations of regulated herbicides is prohibited from May 26th through September 30th of each year. The application of other regulated herbicides will be allowed beginning May 26th through September 30th of each year provided that a spray permit is obtained prior to each application.
