Winter Takes Parting Blow At Lubbock And Plains

Rains In Northern Part of Panhandle Are Aid to Wheat

Blizzard Sweeps Down On Lubbock; Prospect of 20 Degrees This Morning. Relief By Saturday.

RAINS IN NORTH PART OF PLAINS MISS CITY

Cold Snap Puts Premium On Heavy Clothing and Calls for More Radiator Alcohol In Autos.

After two weeks of ideal weather during which on two occasions the mercury soared to the summer height of 80 degrees, winter took a parting blow at Lubbock. Sweeping down on the city early yesterday, a blizzard sent the thermometer tumbling. A minimum of around 20 was the prospect at midnight last night for this morning.

Relief may not be expected until Saturday. The forecast for today is for cloudy and unchanged weather.

Locally, the north was almost devoid of moisture, the sole precipitation coming in the form of occasional mists during the day. In the northern part of the Panhandle, however, generous precipitation was recorded. What the effect on crops here, and on the small amount of fruit trees which were in bloom was, was not known.

Radiator alcohol and heavy clothing again were in demand.

Farmers Jubilant In Section Near Amarillo

Rain and snow in the Panhandle as well as fairly general rains over central and east Texas induced in a lively crop map Thursday night. Wheat, which mostly benefited by snow and rain in northwest Texas, Amarillo had 38 of an inch of rain and points north had varying amounts of snow. The temperature at 7 a. m. at the Panhandle metropolis was 25 degrees.

A heavy downpour was reported in the Plainsville-Lockney section. Crops had more than half an inch.

One Killed, Train Wrecked, In Storm

Heavy Rainfall and Winds Sweep Northwest Texas And Northwest Louisiana Yesterday.

SHREVEPORT, La., March 15. (AP)—One person was killed, a train was wrecked because of a softened roadbed, and more than \$50,000 in property damage was estimated caused by a heavy rainfall and winds which swept northwest Louisiana and northwest Texas today and slipped into Mississippi later.

Extensive property damage around Vicksburg and Meridian. E. Chambers, aged resident of Kellville, a small town north of Marshall, Texas, died late today from injuries suffered when the roof of his barn was blown off by the high wind. The edge of the roof struck Chambers in the forehead, fractured three ribs and caused internal injuries.

An accommodation train on the Texas and Pacific railway was wrecked early today near Dime when a flat car loaded with pipe jumped the track. The passenger cars remained intact and no one was reported hurt. A wrecker sent from Texarkana cleared the wreckage after a 15-hour stop.

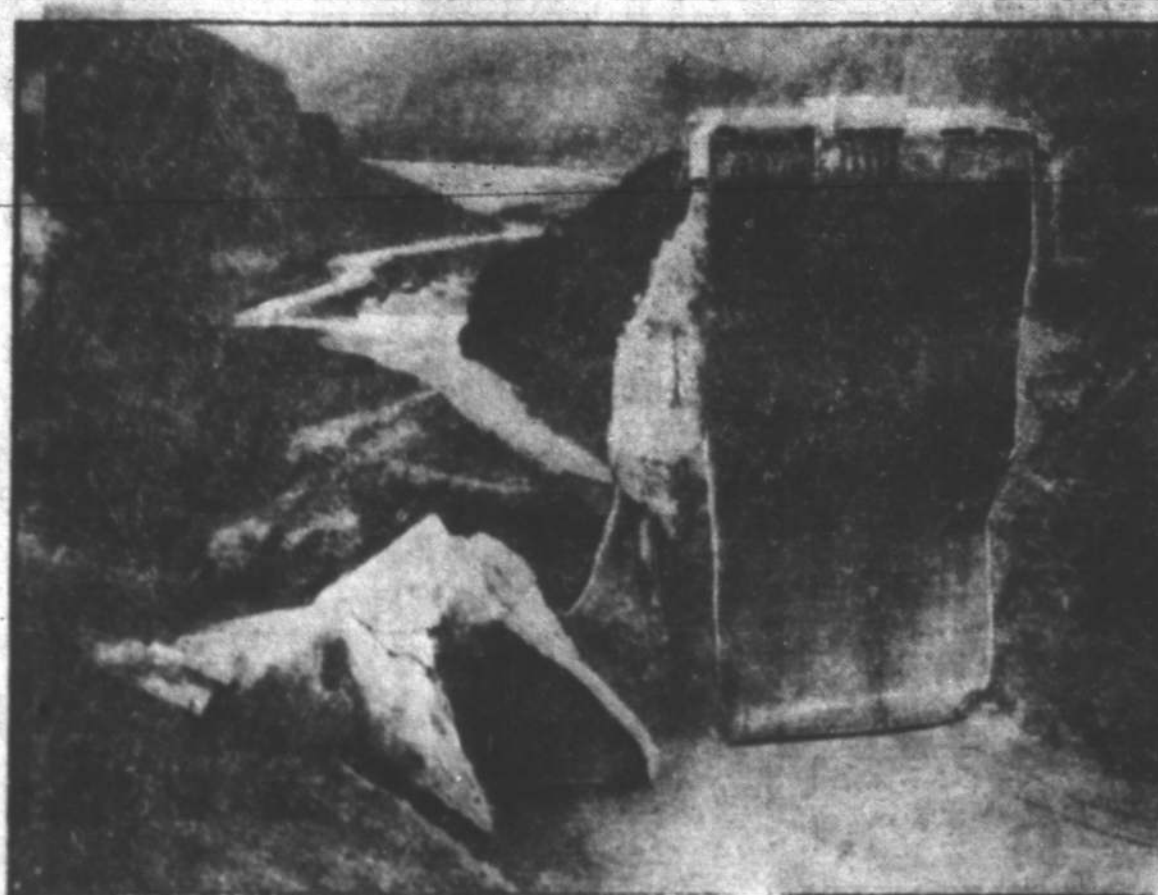
Shreveport received minor damage, while the storm, striking in northwest Louisiana, demolished at least six derricks in the Caddo oil area, near here, the damage being estimated at more than \$2,000.

FIRE LOSSES LOW

Station Record Brings 21 Percent Reduction

SLATON, March 15.—Slaton fire losses in January and February this year were under \$1,000, according to L. E. Hagerman, city fire marshal. He declares the interest being shown by citizens in fire prevention matters is largely responsible. Besides a cut of fifteen per cent credited to fire insurance premiums by the State Fire Insurance Commission, effective March 1, a six per cent penalty was removed, making in reality a twenty-one per cent reduction. Hagerman said this will save Slaton people \$4,500 during the year ahead, he stated.

Collision of Two Marine Airplanes Is Fatal For Four

De Havillands Were Flying In Formation When Crash Came, About 300 Feet In Air; Planes At Tampico.

(By The Associated Press) SAN DIEGO, Calif., March 15.—Four United States marine aviators were killed this afternoon over the Mexican air field. Two planes of the Marine Corps collided and crashed to the ground, the four occupants being instantly killed.

Officers of the Marine Air Corps rushed to the scene as soon as the news of the crash was received, and soon after arrival, announced that the dead aviators were Lieut. Lawrence C. Devine, pilot; Lieut. J. D. Stewart, pilot; H. C. Dailey, observer, and H. C. Chappell, pilot. The planes were of the De Havilland type, and were being flown in formation when they collided about 300 feet in the air. Both planes were demolished in the crash.

Borah Wants GOP To Pay Out Bonds

Starts Lone Campaign To Raise \$100,000 For Repudiating Money Given By Harry Sinclair.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 15.—Calling upon the Republicans over the country to repudiate the \$100,000 contribution of Harry P. Sinclair, oil operator and boss of Teapot Dome, to the Republican campaign fund of 1920, Senator Borah of Idaho set out tonight in a lone hand endeavor to raise the funds to pay off Sinclair.

The Idahoan announced his course after submitting a request several days ago to the Republican National Committee to collect the money and return it to Sinclair. He said tonight he was going ahead independently because the committee has not acted.

In lieu of his earlier appeal to the party leaders, including Chairman William M. Butler of the National Committee, to wipe out the Sinclair contribution, the independent action of Borah was not regarded tonight as without political significance. However, he did not

Hope Transformed Into Despair For Plane, Passengers

Wild Rumors Fly Thick During Day But Investigation Proves Them Groundless.

ENGLAND CLINGING TO SLENDER BIT OF HOPE

General Belief Is That Hinchliffe and Girl Have Joined Predecessors In Vale of Missing Aviators.

(By The Associated Press) NEW YORK, March 15.—The monoplane Endeavour, which left England for America two days and a half ago, was still missing tonight and it generally was feared that it had joined the perilous western passage last summer and never been heard of again.

Hope flared fitfully during the day, fanned by recurrent rumors and rose high in midafternoon when persons at Old Orchard Beach, in Maine, reported seeing a yellow object and two waving figures on an island two miles off shore. Investigation by the coast guard established, however, that no plane had landed on the island.

Charles Nungesser and Francois Coli, Frenchmen, were the first to try the western passage of the North Atlantic, which never yet had been crossed in that direction by an airplane. They left France in their White Bird and never have been found.

Over Two Million In Property Deals For City to Date

Record Set In Real Estate Transactions for 75 Days Since January 1, Deals In Clerk's Office Show.

Property valued at more than \$2,000,000 has changed hands in Lubbock county since January 1, according to the records in the office of County Clerk Ames Howard, which show that real estate transfers totaling \$2,009,516.54 in considerations have been filed since that date.

The total for the year established a record for transfers for any 75-day period in Lubbock's history. Seventeen transfers filed yesterday for \$55,248 brought the consideration total for the month to \$385,561.50.

City Lots Leading. According to the records approximately 20 per cent of the transfers made are for city lots in Lubbock. Only a few outside deals have

STEWART DEFIANT

Pleads Not Guilty When Arraigned

WASHINGTON, March 15. (AP)—Less communicative than at any time since he defied the Senate Teapot Dome committee in its efforts to trace through him the Liberty bond oil profits of the Continental Trading company, Robert W. Stewart, chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, pleaded not guilty today to an indictment resulting from his defiance.

Shortly after he had been granted 30 days in which to decide upon his course in attacking the indictment, his resignation as chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company, a subsidiary of the Standard Oil company of Indiana, was announced in Shreveport, La.

He proposed that the United States negotiate immediately with Mexico to secure cooperation in controlling the pest. This would be the only method of eradicating the boll worm from the southwestern states, he said.

Menace of Boll Worm Described

Tremendous Devastation To Be Made Unless Pest Is Curbed, Buchanan Says In Plea For Funds.

(By The Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 15. (AP)—Unless the pink boll worm now infesting cotton areas in Texas is eradicated within a few years, it will spread to the remainder of the cotton belt and cause tremendous devastation, Representative Buchanan declared today on the house floor.

Buchanan was joined by two Texas colleagues, Hudspeth and Summers, both democrats, in the proposal that negotiations be launched to obtain Mexico's aid.

If the boll worm continues its invasion of eastern Texas, Hudspeth declared, "a west wind will blow it into the Mississippi delta where untold destruction to that section's crop will occur." Summers claimed the only effective eradication could come "through an international campaign waged on both sides of the Rio Grande."

His bill to authorize \$5,000,000 to compensate the cotton planters in Texas for the boll worm damages was urged by Buchanan, who said that while it was favored by Secretary of Agriculture

WASHINGTON, March 15. (AP)—Credit for having made the first successful flight with a power-propelled heavier-than-air machine carrying a man, was accorded to the Wright brothers today by the board of regents of the Smithsonian institution.

Urges Local Movements

February Warmer Than Average And Had More Rainfall

Figures Show Great Variation In Temperature And Moisture Through Texas For Past Month.

(By the Associated Press)
HOUSTON, March 15.—February weather in Texas was seven-tenths of a degree warmer than usual and averaged 79 of an inch more rainfall than preceding Februaries, according to the monthly summary issued here by L. H. Dufferin, government meteorologist.

The monthly mean temperature was 51.2 degrees, at 127 recording stations. The highest average mean temperature was 64.4 degrees at Merced and the lowest 34.2 at Dalhart. The warmest single day was on February 29, at Presidio where the mercury rose to 90 and the coldest days were on the seventeenth and twenty-fourth at Mulahoe and Miami, respectively, where three degrees above zero were recorded. The monthly range within the state was 87 degrees and the greatest daily range was 55 degrees at Blanco on the twenty-ninth. Rainfall averaged 2.65 inches at 225 recording stations. The greatest monthly amount was 6.66 inches at San Marcos and the greatest daily rainfall was at Orange on the twenty-first and twenty-second with 4.12 inches of precipitation. Only 12 days of the month were dry, according to the report, which added that the wind reached its highest velocity during the month at Dallas where it blew 46 miles an hour on the twenty-first.

NEA Fashion Expert

PARIS, March 15.—Jean Patou has the reputation among smart French women as being essentially Parisian in his conception and creation of clothes, besides possessing that great gift of imparting to them an air of great youthfulness, which, as we all know, is the all-important point with modern women. His collection therefore are always awaited with the keenest interest, as they never fail to be replete with new and original ideas.

The Patou spring collection came up to everyone's expectations and the general opinion was that it would be a difficult matter to find anything more dainty and feminine than the creations shown, at any rate as far as afternoon and evening gowns are concerned.

Four Hundred Models

To try and enumerate all the new ideas which Jean Patou has put in to execution would be too lengthy a matter, seeing that he has something like four hundred models and that each one of them is different. That he has delved into the fashions of flounces and the placing of fullness at the back of the skirt; these points together with a nearly normal waistline are sufficient in themselves to cause much comment. His three new colors are unexpected and brilliant at least in the case of his English red and Japanese green, and call for a great discrimination in their wearing. His third color, which he calls "eggshell white," cannot be described, but is meant to suit white. This color has a very small part in his new collection.

Black and navy blue, on the other hand, are very prominent, usually combined with another color or with a printed material. White, pink or red seems to be the favored shades used in conjunction with the above and the color scheme is followed in all the details of the ensembles.

While he uses a great number of moiré, taffetas and faille, Patou has not neglected the ever popular crepe satin, georgette, tulle, mousseline de soie, crepe de chine and crepe roman.

His sports dresses are very similar

to those of last season. Having attained the ideal line, both from aesthetic as well as practical points of view, Jean Patou deems rightly that it would be foolish to try and change it. Tweeds in soft colors—beige, blue and gray—and woolen cashmeres are used to a great extent and the sweaters are made of silk, wool or a mixture of both. He features the divided skirt in his sports department to quite a large extent and the fuller skirt has been adopted for wear at all times.

Corded Silks for Afternoon

Another interesting feature of this collection is the afternoon suit in corded silk with which is worn what used to be known as a dressy blouse. Some of these suits have a beige jacket, short and loosely belted, worn with a black skirt and beige blouse; another combination is a black and white skirt worn with a black jacket and vice versa. The long coat is seen in a number of variations—in a printed material over a dress of plain silk or the contrary—but in nearly every case it is perfectly straight, with a small tailored collar. Buttonholes of figured materials are worn with these ensembles, and in the case of a two-color ensemble the flower will follow suit.

Over at Madame Lanvin's

Madame Lanvin's collection, although coming at the end of a strenuous three weeks' attendance at openings, proved all that was expected of this great artist. Although she is known the world over as the originator of the modern "robe de style," Madame Lanvin's creative genius expresses itself in countless charming and sprightly ensembles which are synonymous of perfect taste. The novel feature of her collection lies in the use of a heavy "cotton" which our grandmothers used to wear, and white shantung, alone or combined with some other color, for summer frocks.

Still another novelty is the creation of the "robe pincense" which is as different from the robe de style as it is possible to imagine but preserving, nevertheless, the slender silhouette and thin line.

BREAKFAST — Oranges, cereal cooked with dates, cream, codfish balls, crisp toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Fish chowder, grape fruit and cabbage salad, fig cookies, cocoa.

DINNER — Braised veal roll, boiled rice with tomato sauce, assorted relishes, prune whip with boiled custard, milk, coffee.

Braised Veal Roll.
One slice veal steak cut 1 inch thick, 4 tablespoons minced parsley, 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind, 1 teaspoon mixed dried herbs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 4 slices bacon, 1 cup diced carrots, 1-2 cup diced turnips, 1-2 cup diced onion, 1-2 cup diced celery, 2 cups boiling water.

Remove the little round bone and trim skin from steak. Mix parsley, lemon rind, powdered herbs, salt and pepper and sprinkle evenly over meat. Roll the meat from the long side keeping the seasoned side in and fasten with skewers or strong wooden toothpicks, over the top of the roll with bacon, using wooden toothpicks to hold slices in place. Place vegetables in a greased casserole and put meat on top. Cover and put in a very hot oven for fifteen minutes. Then add boiling water and reduce heat. Cook about an hour, or until tender, in a moderate oven. Remove cover to brown on top. Serve from casserole. Cut roll in slices crosswise to serve. (Copyright, 1928, NEA Service, Inc.)

Forecast Plenty Funds for G. O. P.

DENVER, March 15.—Prediction that individual contributions to the Republican campaign fund this year would exceed by far those of 1924 and that all the money necessary to conduct "a proper campaign" would be forthcoming was made here today by William V. Hodges, treasurer of the Republican National Committee.

Mr. Hodges announced he would not be a candidate for re-election at the Kansas City convention but denied published reports that his decision was reached because campaign fund disclosures in the senate teapot dome inquiry had made it difficult to obtain contributions to the party war chest.

At the same time he charged that "inspection of the record of contributions of the Democratic party, including those recently made public, shows larger contributions by individuals, both in the 1924 campaign and since, than were made by any individuals to our fund."

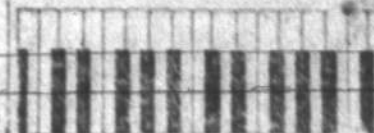

Texas Girl Leading Claimants From State for Duke Millions Hears Tale Branded As False In New Hearing

Testimony Accuses Her Of Attempting Fraud To Prove Claim to Part of Fortune of Tobacco King.

(By the Associated Press)

SOMERVILLE, N. J., March 15.—Miss Elizabeth Duke, a Wichita Falls, Texas, telephone operator who bonded together 108 claimants to seek shares in a \$20,000,000 fund set aside in the will of the late James B. Duke, for the lineal descendants of his parents, heard the basis of her claim branded a fraud at the reopening of the litigation today.

Three witnesses for the executors of the estate, testified that a page in Cobb's "Carroll County and Her Early Settlers," which Miss Duke introduced into the proceedings last January to prove that the Rev. Thomas Duke, a Washington Duke, father of the late tobacco magnate, was the only son of the late Taylor Duke and Dacey Jones Duke, was not in the original copy of the volume.

Miss Ruth Blair, the quite and positive state historian of Georgia, related how Miss Duke and she had searched through the history for some data the former sought, and were unable to find it. On questioning by defense attorney, Miss Blair said that about three weeks before Miss Duke borrowed the book she had occasion to look through it, and did not remember seeing any reference to the birth of Thomas Duke.

Book Shown

Hugh B. Cobb, son of the late author of the book, was then called to the stand and produced two copies, the pages of which had not been cut.

On pages thirty-five and thirty-six on which Miss Duke's borrowed copy contained the sketch of Thomas Duke, there was no mention of him.

J. J. Thomason, editor of the Carrollton, Ga., "Carrollton Times," in whose printing shop the history was published, testified that the portion of the page on which the Duke sketch appeared in the disputed copy, was blank in the original copy, and Paul B. Brown, a printer, employed in Thomason's shop, declared that the book was hand set, but that the Duke history appeared to have been set by a Linotype machine.

The large number of witnesses brought here, mostly from Texas, are being housed in 20 rooms in the Somerset hotel. Most of them are from the state of Texas, and they are waiting for their turn to be called to the stand.

make any attack on the present party funds in a formal statement which he is expected to make this afternoon.

Must "Repudiate" Business.

"It does not seem to me that it is a matter about which we can delay action. To hesitate is almost as bad as to not act at all. Not over a dozen men perhaps knew of this transaction until recently, but it is now known and it is up to the party to repudiate the whole business and do so without delay.

"I shall appeal therefore, to Republicans over the country to come forward and lift this obligation of shame. The money will be deposited in the Riggs National Bank at Washington, D. C., as fast as received."

Borah first acted after Will Hays, former chairman of the Republican National Committee, had testified to senate committee investigating the illegal Teapot Dome naval oil reserve lease to Sinclair that he had accepted a total of \$200,000 to help meet a deficit in the 1920 campaign of the party and that only \$100,000 of this had been returned to Sinclair.

In his unique role of collector of campaign funds the Idaho senator considered as a possible Republican presidential candidate this despite his assertions to the contrary will depend entirely on volunteer contributions.

He revealed today that in response to his proposal to the national committee to pay off the Sinclair contribution, promises and contributions of more than \$5,000 had been sent to him. He did not reveal any names of contributors, nor was he decided whether the list of contributors will be made public.

Mrs. A. C. Zahner of Dallas expressed sorrow that the old prohibition fight had to be fought all over again, "but by the strength of the men and women who won before, we will fight it out to the last ditch," she said.

J. B. Cranfill of Dallas made a stirring prohibition speech in which he reviewed the history of former battles in Texas against whiskey. Democrats should be willing to follow the dictates of the constitution, he said.

people in transactions tainted with fraud and attended with bribery."

A continuation of the Republican rule "would reduce the millions of citizens engaged in agriculture and live stock pursuits to a state of economic penance to serve the interests of the favored classes," the speaker declared.

LONDON, March 15.—(AP)—England's slender hope that the monoplane Endeavour may yet survive its transatlantic flight, ventured tonight on the chance that Captain Walter Hinchcliffe and the Honorable Elsie MacKay were rescued by some ocean vessel without wireless apparatus.

Memories of the rescue of Harry Hawker on his transatlantic attempt many years ago are revived in an effort to stave off despair. Veteran pilots find it hard to believe that their old comrade, a hero of a hundred aerial exploits in war and peace, has been conquered by death.

Among the few who refused to

abandon hope is Mrs. Hinchcliffe, who is enduring the terrible strain with marvelous courage. Although pale and looking ill tonight, the young mother of two little girls attempted to carry on the routine of her home. In three days and two nights she has scarcely slept at all.

The most bitter opponents of Captain Hinchcliffe's proposal in, recent months to fly the Atlantic were his father, Richard, an artist, and his mother, who spent weeks at Cranwell last fall during the preparations being made when Captain Hinchcliffe was serving as pilot for Charles A. Levine.

Family Opposed Flight

"We hope that no one for a moment thinks that because we are here we countenanced the flight," the captain's mother said at that time. "We are always against adventurous undertakings of this kind and argued against it or any others from the start, but without result."

One big reason for the veil of secrecy about the start of the flight today purported to be revealed by a friend of Miss MacKay. This friend said that Miss MacKay knew her father, Lord Incheape, would forbid her journey and feared that to enforce his stand he would stop the payments he was making on the expenses incident to the flight, including the purchase of the airplane in the United States. "To avoid detection," said this friend, Miss MacKay drew the money for the nation of funds in the name of another.

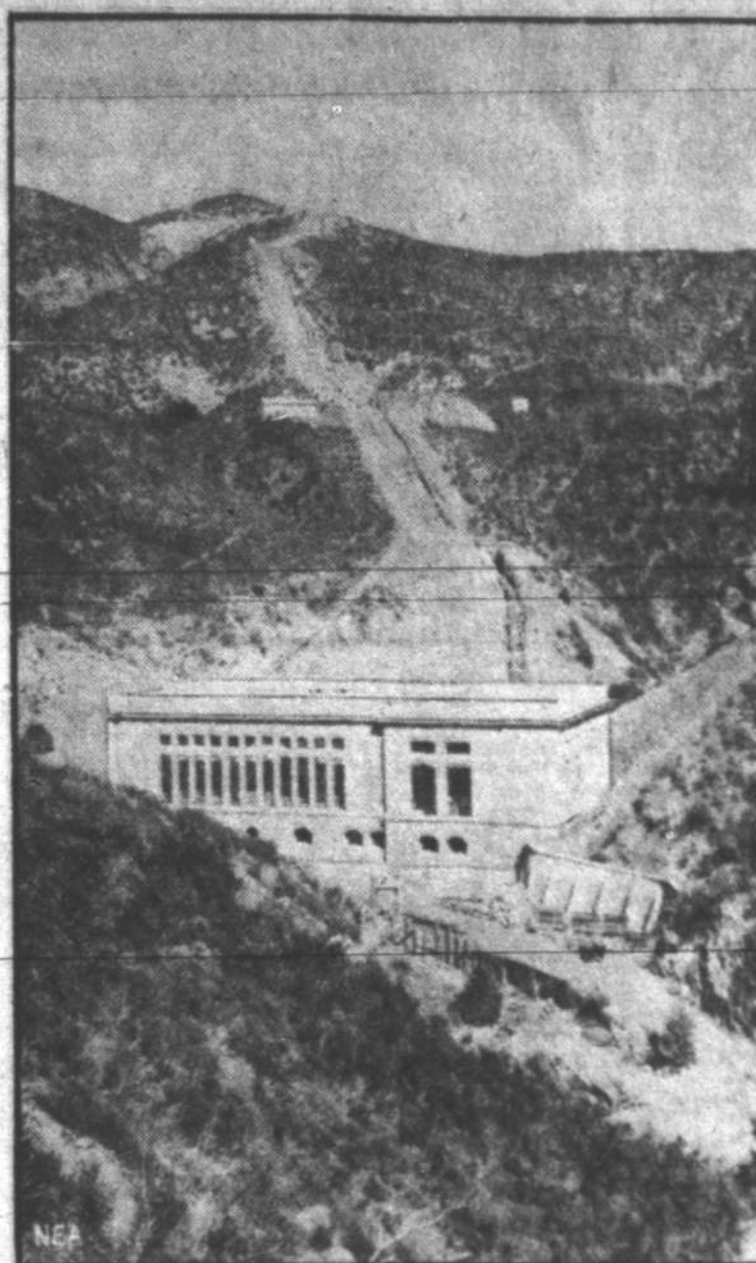

Porto Ricans' Clamor For Complete Internal Independence Based Solely On Misunderstanding, Coolidge Says

President Answers Note Sent To Senate Asking Freedom To Remedy Grave Economic Crisis.

(By the Associated Press) WASHINGTON, March 15.—Action in Porto Rico for complete internal independence is based "on a complete misunderstanding of concrete facts," in the opinion of President Coolidge, who holds that the ill now besetting the island have resulted from misadventure by Porto Ricans of their freedom, for which they were "barely prepared."

Writing to Governor Horace M. Towner in reply to a resolution adopted by the Porto Rican legislature, and to a cablegram signed by the president of the senate and speaker of the house, appealing for freedom to devise means of recovering from what is termed, the "grave economic situation" existing there, President Coolidge said:

"The Porto Rican government at present exercises a greater degree of sovereignty over its own internal affairs than does the government of any state or territory of the United States. Without admitting the existence of a grave economic situation in the finances of the government of Porto Rico, the present difficulty, which it is hoped is but temporary, is exclusively the result of the exercise by the elected representatives of the people of Porto Rico of an authority granted by the present very liberal organic law."

"The responsibility of the United States, as distinguished from that of Porto Rico, is, at most, that officers appointed by the president in Porto Rico may not have exercised power legally placed in their hands to veto or make ineffective acts of the Porto Rican legislature."

"The cablegram to Mr. Coolidge requested that the little country be constituted a 'free state' and not a 'mere subjected colony,' and to that the president replied that 'giving Porto Rico greater liberty than it has ever enjoyed and powers of government for the exercise of which its people are barely prepared cannot, with propriety, be said to be establishing therein 'a mere subjected colony.'"

The people of Porto Rico, Mr. Coolidge said, "are citizens of the United States with all the rights and privileges of other citizens of the United States."

Advance \$7 a Share to New High Point of \$164; Day's Sales Soar Over 3,500,000 Shares.

(By the Associated Press) NEW YORK, March 15.—Speculation for the advance took on a new lease of life on the New York stock exchange today when General Motors again was brought forward as a market leader and bid up \$7 a share to a new high record of \$164. American Liquefied and Radio corporation, which led the wild advance earlier in the week, broke \$8 and \$7 a share, respectively, but their weakness failed to check the upswing in the main body of stocks. The day's sales of 3,697,500 shares were well above those of yesterday but more than 300,000 shares below Tuesday's record-breaking total.

The New York curb market experienced the second million-share day since it moved indoors six years ago and with more than half the day's transactions taking place in the stock of the Canadian Marconi company. The huge turnover in this stock, which established a new high level at \$727 1/2 a share, or more than double the year's low, followed violent speculation in that issue and Marconi of London in the London market.

Milk Production Test to Feature Plainview Exhibit

Display of Grade Cows Also To Be Unique Angle Of Panhandle-Plains Dairying Assn. Show.

Two events heretofore not included in any dairy show on the South Plains will be on the program of the show to be held at Plainview April 3 to 6 inclusive, under the auspices of the Texas Panhandle Plains Dairy Show Association.

One of these events will be a milk production test, and the other will be the exhibition of grade cows.

Darnell, state superintendent of official testing, or by some representative of Mr. Darnell. Entry closing date for the test is at noon April 3.

The milking hours have been named as follows: 10 p. m. April 3 for preliminary, and then from 8 a. m. to 2 p. m., 2 p. m. to 5 p. m. and 10 p. m. to 11 p. m. the following day.

Grade cows will be divided into four classes: five years old and over, under five years and over three, under four years and over three, under three years and over two.

A prize will also be given for the best herd of five cows. The program of the show is as follows: April 3, exhibits open for public inspection, preliminary production test; April 4, official milking tests, Jersey cattle judging; April 5, Guernsey judging at 9 a. m., Holstein-Friesian judging at 1 p. m., exhibition of grade cows at 2 p. m., annual meeting of association at 8 p. m.; April 6, final day, grade stock judging.

Favorable Rates Lower Price Level

This Is Assertion of St. Louis Grain Exporter In Hearing On Rates of Wheat Sent to Ports.

(By The Associated Press) CHICAGO, March 15.—What the Southwestern Wheat Grower considers a favorable freight rate condition in his territory has lowered the level of prices on all surplus of that crop, a St. Louis exporter told the Interstate Commerce Commission today.

Because of a rate barrier in Southern Kansas, forcing the exportation of all Texas and Oklahoma wheat through Galveston, the exporters at the Texas city have been able to undersell traders at all other American ports, asserted W. T. Brookings, president of the Marshall Hall grain corporation of St. Louis.

To meet the Galveston competition elsewhere have lowered their bids and the European grain buyer realizing the condition in the United States, has guessed his offers according to the Galveston level, the trader added.

Brookings described himself as a "piker in the business," although his answers showed his company does more than a third of the St. Louis export business. The reduced cost of transporting wheat from Texas, Oklahoma and Southern Kansas to Europe due to lower freight tariffs, in the United States, has not added much to the grower's incomes, the St. Louisian asserted.

His transportation remedy specified an equalization of rates to the ports.

\$350,000 Deal For Midland Herefords

Transfer of 7000 Yearlings, Completed Yesterday at Fort Worth, Is One Of Biggest Deals of Season.

PORT WORTH, March 15.—Sale of 7,000 Hereford yearlings to the John M. Shelton estate, Amarillo, for delivery May 10, was announced today by O. P. Jones, Amarillo, and associates, including W. W. Brunson, Midland, junior partner. Consideration was approximately \$350,000. The deal is one of the largest cattle transactions announced in the past year.

The cattle are on adjoining ranches in Midland, Ector and Upton counties owned by Brunson, Jones and their associates. The purchase was made for the Shelton estate by Hugh Egan, manager, who returned to Amarillo Tuesday night. The purchaser will have a 15 per cent cut of the 7,000, taking the best 85 per cent, Brunson announced. The cattle will be put on grass on the Shelton estate ranch, 30 miles west of Dalhart. They will take the place of approximately 10,000 head of two and three year old Herefords which the Shelton estate has sold to northern parties for delivery May 1.

Brunson announced their cattle have been bred along lines that make them particularly attractive to coin belt buyers and he explained it is the intention of the Shelton estate management to dispose of him to northern buyers this fall who will finish them for the choice beef trade.

The cattle have been wintered in Midland county. Most of them were raised by the selling party but many of them were collected from neighboring ranches in the Midland country.

'Wedded Bliss' At End for Victoria

Romance of Former Kaiser's Sister's Marriage to Russian Curtailed Through Expulsion Order.

(By The Associated Press) COLOGNE, Germany, March 15.—Four months of "wedded bliss" of the former German emperor's sister, Princess Victoria of Schaumburg-Lippe with the youthful Russian Emigre, Alexander Subkoff, has come to a melancholy end. Subkoff has been ordered expelled from Germany by the Cologne authorities. This action is based on the technical ground that he had not renewed his residence permit after it had expired.

The official expulsion order describes the 27 year old Emigre as "a man without a nationality or occupation." One report today was that he already had left for the Congo.

No surprise was caused by the announcement of Subkoff's expulsion because of his recent escapades in addition to the irregular passport which he carried. Monarchist quarters show no sympathy for the first time they regarded Princess Victoria's marriage as a deplorable misalliance and a serious blow to the Monarchist cause. The hope is expressed that his expulsion will save Victoria's private fortune from being touched further by her errant husband.

Princess Victoria, who is not included in the expulsion order, refused to believe that Subkoff had been ordered expelled. When informed that an expulsion order had been issued she declared that it was "an infamous lie," and indignantly repudiated the allegation that her husband, anticipating expulsion, had fled secretly to the Congo.

When asked whether a divorce was contemplated, the former Kaiser's sister laughed and said it was utterly untrue and absurd. "We are perfectly happy together," she added fervently. "Our only desire is to be left alone."

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leaders of democratic thought in the south—he is representative of the highest ideals of southern democracy. As a business man, as a political leader, he has proved his worth, and Texas should honor him by presenting his name to the convention.

While the entrance of a Texan into the field of presidential candidates may be considered merely a political gesture, the honoring of a "favorite son," no one can forecast the results of that national convention. Failure of Smith to secure the nomination on an early ballot will probably precipitate a condition whereby the selection of a southern leader of the type of Jesse Jones would not be impossible. That the south would be virtually a unit in supporting him is apparent, and the western wing of the party would welcome a southern leader in the even Smith cannot secure the necessary two-thirds.

Instruction of the Texas delegation to support Jones would come not only as a compliment to Mr. Jones, but likewise as an appropriate recognition of his personal service to his state in bringing the great convention to Texas. Mr. McQuaid pointed out that "there would be no semblance of the grotesque in instructing for Mr. Jones because he is presidential timber, a national figure since the war when he directed the military relief of the American Red Cross."

Commenting on political conditions in the state the Times writer says: "A campaign to instruct against Reed, Smith or Ritchie would be bitterly resisted. The opposition, comprising in the beginning that element of the party which on principle is predisposed to these candidates, would be recruited to considerable extent from the ranks of independent thinkers who consider other causes on a parity with or superior in importance to the question of prohibition. An attitude of opposition is never productive of anything constructive. Political progress and, indeed, progress of any kind, is made through the espousal of causes and rarely by resistance to men and measures alone. A contest of such character, inflamed by the zeal of ardent supporters of prohibition who perceive nothing else in the political program worthy of striving for, could accomplish nothing more for Texas than the re-opening of old wounds and the infliction of new. Such a condition is to be averted in the interest of amity so that after the presidential campaign is over Texas may continue to address herself, with the cooperation and kindly feeling of all her people to the great questions of industrial expansion and agricultural improvement that now confront her."

BORED YOUTH AND ITS INSTRUCTORS

Presidents of old and popular universities have been expressing their opinion on the troubles of the youth of today. It is generally agreed by them that boys and girls in college are not wicked or startlingly radical. Too many of these students, however, are indifferent to study and avoid hard work and intellectual strain. Are they entirely to blame for this? Naturally the answers to the question vary.

President Lowell of Harvard thinks that high schools are inefficient and wasteful, and that colleges therefore are obliged to do much work that should have been done by the so-called preparatory schools. Students who are not ready for higher education naturally find the college or university dull and hard. Dr. Lowell demands drastic recognition of elementary and high school curricula and methods of teaching. The blame laid at the door of the colleges, he insists, should be put upon the institutions that come before them.

President Hibben of Princeton is not quite as severe a critic of the common and high schools as is Dr. Lowell. The malady lies deeper, in his opinion. "The youth of today," he says, "is not enthusiastic about anything; it is bored." Teachers and professors, he holds, can not make study interesting and attractive to modern youth. For where there is no curiosity, no desire or passion for knowledge, no natural interest in higher problems, the school or college is impotent.

But why is modern youth bored, if the fact be conceded? Why have the sciences, the arts, all the unsolved problems of life and nature, lost their appeal? The world is full of tasks to be performed and evils to be remedied. In no direction has the ultimate goal been attained. Surely it is the business of youth to attack the tasks and problems awaiting it. The alleged boredom requires diagnosis and expansion.

Perhaps too much is done for youth. Too many luxuries are spread before it, too many obstacles removed from its path. Indeed, not a few psychologists and editors advocate the simpler life for children, with duties to perform, responsibilities to assume, difficulties to face and wrestle with. Boredom is a terrible disease for an individual; boredom of a whole generation is doubly terrible.

It must be clear that not youth, but the generation that has had the training of youth, is to blame primarily for youth's derelictions. Reform must begin with those who apply the wrong principles in their relations with the naturally keenly alert and highly impressionable coming generation.—Chicago Daily News.

EXTRAORDINARY EFFORTS TO PUT DOWN THE YEGGS

Safe-crackers, burglars and holdup men—always more or less active in every large city—lately had a lucrative week-end here. Four safes in as many shops yielded the thieves more than three thousand dollars in loot. Each "yegg" apparently was performed without a hitch.

The present-day yegg scorns the mess and noise of high explosive; he has devised more efficient methods. In one robbery the safe was lowered bodily; in other instances knobs were taken off or a key used to get at the money-container. This epidemic of crimes of which the Saturday night and Sunday raids were the culmination has moved the San Antonio Retail Merchants association officials to call a directors' meeting for Thursday night.

It has been suggested that—as the Texas bankers' organization has done—a reward would be offered, though here it would be for arrest and conviction. At the same time the police have been ordered to put forth extra effort to catch the safe-breakers. At this writing suspects a plenty have been taken into custody, but connecting them with the crimes is not easy. Finger prints offer the only sure means of identification.

And of course, the astute criminal is careful not to leave such a clue behind him. The week-end is the robber's harvest time, as the heaver receipts of Saturday afternoon and Sunday ordinarily must be kept in the safe, until the banks open Monday.

This fact calls for extraordinary protective measures. Perhaps more watchmen and patrolmen could be put on duty in the business section. It hardly seems credible that a conspicuously-situated shop could be looted in broad daylight, but apparently that was

done in at least one instance. The devices of using the safe merely as a blind while hiding the receipts elsewhere, or carrying the cash home are open to various objections even though they may foil the would-be robber. Wholesale evictions of suspicious characters of similar cleanup efforts by the police afford some relief, but at best they are merely palliative. The cure, if ever accomplished, must be through more drastic means.—San Antonio Express.

YOUR HEALTH

BY DR. MORRIS FIBBEN

The wife, daughter and two sons of the Greek poet Euripides, died many centuries ago after eating poisonous mushrooms.

A French investigator found more than 100 deaths in the neighborhood of Paris in a period of 40 years toward the end of the eighteenth century.

Indeed, the medical literature of France, Germany and Austria shows records of thousands of cases with hundreds of deaths each year all over the world from this cause.

Dr. S. R. Damon points out that there are no simple tests by which the layman can distinguish poisonous from harmless mushrooms. The superstition that peeling the top shows something or that cooking with a silver spoon will indicate the poisonous variety is without the slightest scientific foundation.

The only safe rule for those who want to eat mushrooms is to study the matter scientifically or to depend on those who have made a serious study of the question.

There are more than 80 species growing in America that are known to be poisonous. Almost everyone is familiar with the first symptoms of mushroom poisoning. These include acute pain in the abdomen and the attempt of the stomach and intestines to get rid of the poisonous material.

In a few days the person becomes fatigued, turns blue and if the case is going to be fatal, gradually lapses into unconsciousness.

To a certain extent, the methods of treatment used depend on the exact type of poisonous mushroom that has been eaten. In every case, the first thing to do is to get out of the stomach and intestines any of the material that can be recovered. This is the general rule in every type of poisoning. A physician should be called to inject atropine, a drug which seems to have special virtue in overcoming the dangerous symptoms. The intense pain is relieved by the giving of sedative drugs and other methods are used to protect the kidneys against the damage that may come to them from the poisonous substances. Texas Harbors and National Exports

TEXAS HARBORS AND NATIONAL

Thirty or forty years ago when the rivers and harbors bill was commonly referred to as the "port bill," New England congressmen were vehement exponents of federal appropriations for harbor and river improvements. At that time, the application applied to the bill was not wholly undeserved. Harbor improvements were more or less a joke, and such work as was done was largely confined to the Eastern Atlantic seaboard with a few millions occasionally donated to the Pacific and Gulf Coast sections.

The millions spent on New England harbors failed to provide the outlet desired for national products. In the course of time the rivers and harbor committees of the House and Senate began to take notice of the fact that the nation was not receiving value for the millions expended. Politics were laid aside and the eyes of the nation were directed toward the Texas Gulf coast.

This was not satisfactory to the New Englanders. They are now saying very much over the fact that congress has shown more liberality in improving Southern harbors than the New Englanders thought necessary, and as a result the New Englanders, which a generation ago was very favorable toward harbor improvement, has raised bitter protest against federal expenditures on the Gulf coast.

In this connection it might be interesting to note that through the generosity of the Gulf harbor, Texas has not received a cent as an exporting state, being surpassed only by New York. During the months of July, August and September, 1927, the value of exports from Texas totaled \$194,496,192, and for the same quarter New York showed a record of \$193,373,017.

During the same period the New England states of Massachusetts, Maine, New Hampshire, Connecticut, and Vermont, reported exports to the value of \$44,000,000, or approximately 25 per cent of the value of Texas exports.

The value of the United States exports for that period was \$1,500,000,000, and of this amount, nearly one-fifth was exported by Texas.

Texas ports have become one of the nation's greatest assets. Through Houston, Galveston and other Gulf ports flows a constant stream of agricultural products, minerals and

manufactures, adding to the wealth of the nation, creating markets for regions which otherwise would have no outlet, and bringing prosperity to millions. The New England ports serve the industrial areas. That they benefit the nation cannot be disputed and the millions expended on construction and maintenance is doubtless a wise investment, but it is no exaggeration to state that every dollar expended on Texas ports has paid the nation service dividends

Investigation Of Election In Point Isabel Is Ordered

Was First Municipal Voting In Texas' 100-Year-Old Town; Irregularities Are Alleged.

(By Associated Press)
BROWNSVILLE, March 15. — A thorough investigation of the first municipal election ever held in the 100-year-old town of Point Isabel held Tuesday, was ordered here today by Acting District Judge H. B. Galbraith. After calling the grand jury into special session, Judge Galbraith ordered that the ballot box be sealed, a complete list of the voters compiled and that all poll tax receipts be investigated.

The vote in favor of incorporation at the election, on unofficial returns, was 143 to 42. The ballots and returns of the election were filed with the county judge and county clerk yesterday afternoon. The returns to be canvassed at the next meeting of commissioners' court.

It was understood that residents of Point Isabel have charged irregularities in connection with procuring poll taxes, and also that the election was held illegally.

TARIFF CONTROVERSY

Climax Comes As Commissioner Resigns

WASHINGTON, March 15. (AP)—The controversy that for more than two years has surrounded the activities of the tariff commission moved to a sharp and sudden climax today with the resignation of Commissioner Edward F. Costigan, last of the original Wilson appointees.

In a letter filled with frank personalities, Costigan simultaneously assailed President Coolidge and Commissioners Marvin, Lowell and Broadard. At the White House, it was announced that the resignation had been accepted.

Costigan charged Mr. Coolidge with a refusal to act on decisive evidence that certain tariff rates should be lowered.

MRS. HICKMAN LEAVES

Expresses Relief Son To Get New Trial

LOS ANGELES, March 15. (AP)—After bidding farewell to her son, William Edward Hickman in the county jail here today, Mrs. Eva Hickman, the slayer's mother, and her son, Alfred, left for their Kansas City home, expressing hope that the slayer of Marian Parker would be granted a new trial by the appellate or supreme court.

Both Hickman and his mother were composed during their brief few minutes together, but the mother weakened as she said goodbye and left the jail. Her eyes filled with tears.

FIND COUNTERFEITING

Booze Raid Nets Evidence of Bogus Money

ABILENE, March 15. (AP)—Sheriff H. T. O'Bar and deputy M. Merk raided a home here with a search warrant, ostensibly in quest of liquor and in addition to 18 gallons of whiskey seized what they declared was counterfeiting apparatus. They described it as photographic material and a score of negatives for making \$20 Federal Reserve notes.

The secret service was notified. One man was named in a complaint charging illegal possession of liquor.

The confusion itself was uncertain whether its grant of life under the law creating it expired at midnight tonight or will cease at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning, but at one hour or the other the commission loses its executive authority because of a committee of Congress failed to compose differences between the House and Senate over a bill passed by both to extend the commission's life for one year from tomorrow.

Indian Lease Case Drawing to Close

Cancellation of Title To Lead and Zinc Lands Is Wanted by Indians; Litigation Brought.

(By Associated Press)

TULSA, March 15. —With arguments drawing to a close late today, Judge Franklin E. Kennamer of the United States district court here, was expected to take under advisement tonight the case in which a group of Quapaw Indians seek to cancel leases to lead and zinc property held by the Eagle Picher Lead company. Judge Kennamer was not expected to hand down a decision before the expiration of two or three weeks.

Counsel for the lead company denied charges of C. B. Ames, attorney for the Indians, that the leases were sold without competition by Albert B. Fall, then secretary of the interior, under the influence of Harry F. Sinclair, oil magnate.

C. D. Wallace and Vern Thompson of counsel for the company, declared that the names of Fall and Sinclair, who were prosecuted in the famous Teapot Dome case, were brought into the hearing to taint the lead company's reputation. Contrary to Ames' statement, they said, the leases were sold under competition and in conformity with Indian treaties.

POISONING ALLEGED

Corner's Jury Fixes Cause Mrs. Dickinson Death

CHICAGO, March 15. (AP)—After less than half an hour's deliberation, a coroner's jury today decided that Mrs. Mary Alice Dickinson, who died recently leaving a \$100,000 estate, came to her death from a poison which paralyzed her respiratory system. The jury said it was unable to determine who administered it.

Mrs. Dickinson, the divorced wife of a former Wall Street broker, died last January 4 after a protracted illness.

FIELD IN CROCKETT

Big Pool Is Extended To the East

SAN ANGELO, March 15. (AP)—The south end of the Powell oil field in Crockett county Thursday had been extended one-half mile east from Gulf No. 1-D by Powell Oil and Refining company's No. 2 Paul J. Somers estate. In 12 hours it swabbed 145 barrels of oil with water from 2,607 feet, 16 feet in the pay, which lowered the fluid 800 feet.

STOLTZ HAS RELATIVES

Man Found In Reservoir Came from Houston

HOUSTON, March 15. (AP)—Rudolph J. Stoltz, whose body was found in a reservoir in Elysian park at Los Angeles Wednesday, is survived by several Texas relatives.

Two brothers, Dr. F. W. Stoltz and Sam Stoltz, live in Houston. Other brothers are Dr. Ed C. Stoltz of Temple, Otto Stoltz of Galveston, and Bill Stoltz of Temple.

The Californian, the brothers said, several years ago changed the spelling of the family name to Stoltz.

The family here said Stoltz had been living in California about 15 years and that he was wealthy.
