Look To The East

"I'm sure glad I'm in Munday, instead of Washington!"

This is a remark we made when entering the Courier building on Tuesday morning, January 20.

After a night of pre-inaugural activities, people began forming huge assemblies that morning in preparation for the inaugural parade and other tiring activities preceding the swearing in of a new President of the United States.

Texans had assembled in Washington, too. This, too, was something for people a lot better "healed" financially than this run-of-the-mill columnist. Texans had prepared to put on the dog in Washington, most of them in typical Texas showmanship regalia with fancy boots, hats and other western apparel.

Late in the evening Monday, we'd heard that even Texans who had not made prior arrangements had better remain at home. It seemed there was no more space available in Washington, not even for Texans.

It was worse than trying to get a 50-yard-line ticket for the Super Bowl!

We've always been a country boy -- one who usually gets frustrated and scared at being thrust into the "bigness" of a big city. When in a city of greater size than Wichita Falls, Abilene or Lubbock, we kinda have a hankering for the wide open spaces of home.

So, on the 20th of January we were pleased to be in a place where we were known -- and loved -- by at least a few people.

We didn't realize it at the time, but we were a lot more fortunate all during the day than those who were bucking the crowds elsewhere!

We had a ring-side seat to happenings on two fronts -- a historic double-header feature -- that won't be surpassed in many days and months of the future. When not situated near a television set, we had access to the radio here in the office or in our moving El Camino.

Amid all the pomp and ceremonies of the inauguration, historic events were being unfolded at other points in the world: in Washington, New York and many points in the U. S., in Algiers, London and Tehran.

While all the pomp, the parade, pageantry, music, cannon salutes, etc., were in the making, a forlorn man who about to become ex-president, sat in the Oval Office of the White House as long as he could, hoping he would be the one to announce the hostages had been freed.

As time began to run out, President Carter joined his soon-to-be successor in a limousine that bore them to the inauguration. To President Reagan went the honor of announcing the hostages had been liberated.

Television photos did not come out of Iran that evening, but were shown next day with hostages and Iranian people assembled at the airport. As soon as one listening to a radio began hearing President Reagan's inaugural address, the signal was given for the Algerian planes to take off with our American people.

It was touching on the night of January 20 to sit in the comforts of our den and see, by satellite from Algeria, our 52 freed people coming slowly down the ramp of that huge Algerian plane, setting foot once more on friendly soil.

We watched for quite some time as the group relaxed in a waiting room at the airport, much like we'd be waiting in a bus station, for transfer to their American planes.

As our eyes became heavy, the announcement came that it would be another 45 minutes before the "freedom planes" would take off for the U. S. Army hospital in Germany. We breathed a silent prayer of thanksgiving, then retired.

Next morning, we put out our flag in honor of the 52 who spent 444 days in captivity, but who were now free souls. Our flag was flown daily until the former hostages reached American soil on Sunday.

At which time we thought "God Bless America" would be a most appropriate song!

Bank's Deposits Still Climbing

Despite a year of disaster, especially in regard to farm production, deposits in the First National Bank in Munday remained at an even keel throughout.

Farmers of the area suffered disaster in several respects, especially in the "money crops" of a farming community. First off, there was a destructive hail in late May that did severe damage to the potato crops, causing less than 50 percent of the estimated harvest. Wheat also suffered severe damage.

Then followed a severe heat wave, with day after day of 100-plus temperature that severely hampered the growth of cotton and other crops. An early frost and snow didn't help things, either.

Despite it all, the local bank maintained a favorable balance in deposits.

A condensed statement of the local bank at the close of 1980 showed an increase in deposits of \$825,189.70 over those of 1979.

Deposits on December 31, 1980, totaled \$19,092,334.68 as compared with \$18,267,144.98 for the same period in 1979.

Deadline Nearing For Emergency Loss Loans

County Supervisor Joe T. Boone of the Knox County Farmers Home Administration announced today that applications for crop losses occurring August 1, 1979 through May 5, 1980 from drought and May 25, 1980 from

hail, high winds and flooding will not be accepted for Emergency Loans after February 18, 1981.

Boone stated that this disaster designation covered primarily wheat and pasture in this county and that many of the affected farmers have already made application for their loans.

Applications for Emergency Loans on cotton, corn and milo losses will continue to be accepted through April 30, 1981. Farmers who have suffered crop loss due to drought or inclement weather conditions during a period from June 1 1980 through July 22, 1980 and continuing are advised to contact Boone or his Assistant County Supervisor, Robert B. Bodkin, at the FmHA office, 1101 East Main in Knox City. Office day is held each Wednesday from 9:00 a.m. to 12 noon and from 1:00 p.m. to 3:30 p.m.

Rep. Bill Heatly Is Named To Committees

State Rep. W. S. (Bill) Heatly of Paducah has been named chairman of the Judicial Affairs Committee and to a continued position on the Appropriations Committee by Speaker Bill Clayton.

Clayton said Rep. Heatly would serve in these capacities during the next two years of the 67th Legislature.

Rep. Heatly, an attorney/rancher by profession, is serving his 14th term in the House. Last session, he served as Vice-chairman for Appropriations for the Judicial Affairs and on the Appropriations Committee.

The eleven-member Judicial Affairs Committee has jurisdiction over all matters relating to changes affecting courts of judicial districts of the state, civil procedure in the courts of Texas, civil law, and the administrative law and the adjudication of rights by administrative agencies. In addition, the committee has the responsibility of working with those matters pertaining to the State Bar of Texas, the Texas Judicial Council, cases involving permission to sue the state and the State Commission on Judicial Conduct.

The Appropriations Committee, made up of 21 members, has jurisdiction over all bills and resolutions appropriating money from the state treasury, all bills and resolutions containing provisions resulting in automatic allocation of funds from the state treasury and all bills and resolutions diverting funds from the state treasury of preventing funds from going in which otherwise would be placed in the state treasury. In addition, the committee may comment on any bill or resolution containing a provision resulting in an automatic allocation of funds.

Program On Conservation Plants Given

How the Plants Materials Center near Knox City is constantly striving to introduce new and better conservation plants was told at Tuesday's meeting of the Munday Lions Club by Lion Davis Lorenz of Knox City. He is one of the Center's employees.

Lorenz gave a tape recorded slide presentation on grasses and plants grown at the Knox City center, which serves both Texas and Oklahoma. These were called "conservation plants."

Working on the theory that "plants are one of the miracles of nature," the film was of local activity at the center, where range and other conservation measures are practiced. Many grasses,

sunflowers, shrubs and other conservation plants were shown as they contributed toward lessening wind and water erosion and renewing plants that are about to become extinct.

Lorenz answered a number of questions at the close of his program. He stated that five people from the Munday area are presently employed at the plant.

PRUNE TREES, SHRUBS PROPERLY

As the dormant season for many plants approaches, home gardeners should review proper pruning techniques before manning pruning shears and saws. Improper pruning can result in poor growth, unnatural plant forms, poor flower and fruit production, and occasionally even death of the plant. Following basic guidelines for pruning can transform a tree or shrub into a beautiful plant specimen. To begin, have a reason for pruning. Consider technique, season of the year and the need for pruning before taking that first snip. Many times there is no reason at all for pruning if the tree is hale and hearty. The winter season when plants are dormant may not necessarily be the best time to prune every plant on your landscape. Deciduous trees and shrubs, vines, ground covers, and evergreens probably can be pruned at this time of year. However, exceptions include spring-flowering shrubs such as azaleas, forsythia, bridal wreath and gardenias, which should be pruned after they flower. Do

not prune roses until mid-February. Using proper tools is important for safety and adequate cutting. Use hand shears for small twigs under one-half inch in diameter. Long-handled lopping shears are best for branches one-half to one inch in size. Larger branches require a pruning saw. A long handled pole pruner or saw is necessary for cutting higher branches. Make cuts flush with the trunk since stubs do not heal properly. As years pass stubs decay and the deterioration spreads down the trunk until the tree falls over. Seal cuts more than two inches in diameter with a pruning paint sealer. The sealer will dry hard and protect the wound from insect and disease invasion and moisture loss. As important as seasonal pruning is, it's even more important to prune when needed. Prune and repair damaged plants as soon as possible. And always prune after transplanting, particularly with balled and bare rooted plants. Pruning will compensate for roots the plant lost in digging. Pruning is perhaps the least understood and most

abused of all the many chores a gardener may tackle. When pruning, have a purpose in mind and do the job right.

But, diabetes is more than a disease of the pancreas. Since it affects the blood vessels, it a major contributor to kidney trouble, gangrene, and severe visual loss. It also increases the chances of heart attack, stroke, and problems of the nervous system. From onset, diabetes reduces life expectancy about 30 percent. Diabetes is the third leading cause of death by disease, behind only heart disease and cancer. During pregnancy, diabetes increases the chances of premature delivery and fetal mortality.
