

LEGISLATURE CONVENES; ARCHIE PARR IS SEATED PENDING CONTEST FILED

By Associated Press. AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 14.—By a vote of fourteen to twelve Senator J. J. Strickland of Anderson county, was elected president pro tem of the Senate over Senator J. M. Alderdice of Llano county. Senator Strickland was placed in nomination by Senator Sutter and Senator Alderdice was nominated by Senator Clark. Senator Strickland in accepting the honor reiterated his former statement that the legislature should complete its labors within sixty days, including the passage of the general appropriation bill.

The senate proceeded swiftly with its preliminary business and announced ready for business within a little over an hour after convening. The chair appointed Senators Johnston, McNealus and Caldwell to notify the governor that the Senate was ready for business and a similar committee composed of Senators Alderdice, Dorrough and Witt was named to notify the House. The Senate then adjourned until 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Contest Comes Up. The Glasscock-Parr contest for the seat in the twenty-third senatorial district came to the surface shortly after the Senate convened when the question of swearing in the members was called. Senator W. L. Dean challenged the right of Senator Archie Parr of that district to be sworn in, calling attention to the fact that a contest was pending. Senator McNealus of Dallas said that the certificates of the elections of the different senators should be sent up from the secretary of state. The chair called attention to a certificate which had already been filed showing the senators elected.

Parr Resigns. Lieutenant Governor R. M. Johnston presiding, ruled that the contest was not an yet officially before the senate, and following precedent he would hold that Senator Parr be sworn in. This was done and Senator Parr took his seat and the contest will be referred to the committee on elections and privileges.

There were twenty-eight senators present when the roll was called, the absentees being Senators Westbrook, Woodward and Thomas. Thomas is Speaker. R. E. Thompson of El Paso was elected speaker of the House without opposition. Mr. Thompson was nominated by Bledsoe of Lubbock. The nomination was seconded by J. C. Murrell of Cook, Adrian Pool of El Paso, George B. Tenarill, Harry Miller of Dallas, Mr. Miller's resolution that a vote on speaker be taken was adopted before further nominations were made.

The roll call in the House showed nine members absent. They were: W. T. Bagby, W. H. Barnes, W. E. Riggs, S. A. Bryant, Sid Crumpton, W. F. Jones, M. O'Banion, E. R. Pedigo, Henry Sackett.

TIGHTEN EMBARGO ON BURKBURNETT IS REPORT TODAY

FORT WORTH, Tex., Jan. 14.—Due to the increasing oil business the freight embargo to Burkburnett has been tightened and as a result, 500 loaded cars held in Fort Worth, Whitesboro and Denison, today waiting to get passage to the northwest Texas oil field. Only perishable, drug supplies and coffins are given right of way.

No reports had been received by any of the local railroad offices today at noon regarding the tightening of the embargo on freight shipments to Burkburnett, as was reported from Fort Worth today. On the other hand, local officials said today that supplies totaling several train loads were being sent to Burkburnett daily, and with the building of more tracks and facilities there it is believed that the embargo will be raised to a certain extent in the near future instead of tightened.

Officials said that the railroads are shipping all the tonnage to Burkburnett that can be unloaded and if consignees were in position to unload cars quicker than they are doing at present, more freight could be shipped there.

Work is being rushed on the building of additional tracks in the freight yards at Burkburnett and within a short time a new freight depot will be constructed, in fact work will begin on the depot as soon as materials can be gotten there. Because they had received no instructions affecting a change in the existing embargoes, local officials were of the opinion that the report from Fort Worth was unfounded.

REPORT DR. LIEBKNECHT HAS FLED FROM BERLIN. By Associated Press. COPENHAGEN, Jan. 14.—Dr. Karl Liebknecht, the socialist leader, is reported to have fled from Berlin to Leipzig, according to a dispatch received here. Chief of Police Eichhorn, according to Vorwaerts of Berlin, has fled to Denmark, using a passport obtained from the Danish legation some days ago. A large mass of documents have been seized at Eichhorn's residence. The government at Berlin has issued warrants for the arrest of Dr. Liebknecht, Rosa Luxemburg, and Eichhorn. The war minister is quoted as saying that loyal troops have begun a search for him with a view of disarming the people of Berlin.

GERMAN HELMETS FOR LIBERTY LOAN DRIVE

OTTO WAHRMUND HAS RESIGNED AS MEMBER OF HOUSE

Colonel Wahrmund, in his letter tendering his resignation, gave as his reason, continued ill health. Colonel Wahrmund had been requested to resign by the democratic convention of Bexar county after he had been nominated by the Democratic primaries in July.

TROOPS ARRIVE AT NEW YORK HARBOR ON U. S. CRUISER

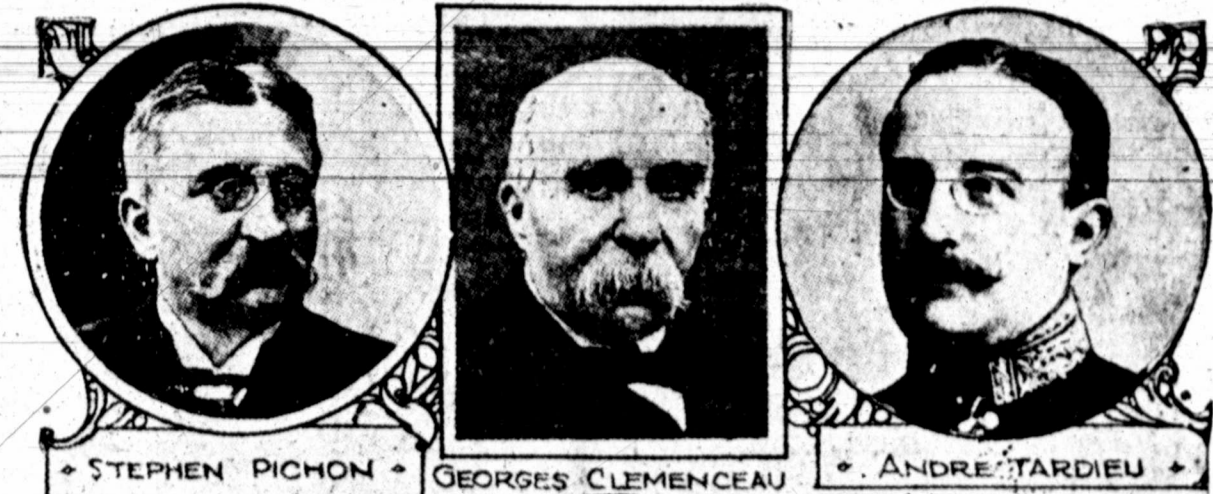
BOLSHEVIKI ARE CONVERGING FROM THREE DIRECTIONS

PREMIER HEADS STRONG FRENCH PEACE ENVOYS



According to official announcement from Paris the Council of Ministers has approved the nominations as the French representatives in the Peace Congress of the following:— Georges Clemenceau, the Premier, Stephen Pichon, Foreign Minister, Louis Lucien Klotz, Finance Minister, Andre Tardieu, French High Commissioner to the United States, Jules Cambon, formerly Ambassador at Berlin. The technical representatives will include Marshal Foch, for military matters, and Leon Bourgeois, for the subject of the Society of Nations.

FRANCE'S DELEGATES TO THE PEACE CONFERENCE

LONDON, Jan. 14.—Before his departure for Paris, Premier Lloyd George was given a memorandum issued by the Associated Chamber of Commerce, embodying the views of chambers in all parts of the country regarding terms of peace. The following points were urged in the document:— The payment by the enemy of all war expenses. Compensation for loss of property and damage to property arising out of the war. Compensation for all personal injuries including a sum representing the cost of all pensions paid to disabled men, women and children. Compensation for the loss in national power caused by the death or disability of potential producers and by the disorganization of means of production and transport. The payment of all enemy debts and interest on all charges from the date they are incurred until final payment.

URGES LEAGUE OF NATIONS IN SPEECH BEFORE SENATORS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Renewing debate in the Senate today on the proposal for a league of nations, Senator Shafroth of Colorado, democrat, urged immediate formation of such a league and criticized those who have advocated postponement of consideration of this question by the peace conference. Senator Shafroth particularly attacked the resolution of Senator Knox of Pennsylvania, republican, now before the foreign relations committee, which proposed that action by the peace congress be deferred.

"There are two ways of defeating the plan for a league," he said. "The first is by opposing and voting against it; second, by postponing its consideration to a time when other subjects are pressing the attention of the world and when there may exist divisions and disputes among nations which might destroy any chance of effecting an agreement. In my judgment to vote for the Knox resolution proposing postponement is virtually to vote against the formation of any league of nations of the part of avoiding wars."

"Fight for Permanent Peace." "President Wilson is now in Europe endeavoring to negotiate a peace treaty that will not only settle the disputes of the nations in this war but that will at least have a tendency to prevent wars in the future. As we have said so many times that we are fighting for a permanent peace among the nations of the world, that this is a war to end all wars, it seems to me to be consistent with our own declarations when we advise that he make no treaty with respect to the world peace. He knows the situation of the nation and as to whether we can get a treaty that will insure the peace to the world better than we who have no communication with the representatives of other nations. It may be that he will not accomplish the thing which we all desire, namely making the world safe from wars, but we impair his influence if we pass resolutions that he should not endeavor to accomplish the aim, for which we entered the war, the peace of the world."

"Now is the psychological moment to produce such an agreement and if there is any one in the United States who could produce such a happy result it is the president, who as the demonstrators in Europe show is held not only in the highest regard but in the greatest affection by the peoples of the Entente powers. To impose our will on him when we are not familiar with the situation, it seems to me, a proceeding which would greatly weaken his influence in the negotiations in the treaty."

DISCUSSION OF COTTON ACREAGE AT NEW ORLEANS

The question of cotton acreage was to have been presented to the board last night but the committee in charge of the framing of resolutions did not reach a conclusion.

CONSUMPTION OF COTTON SHOWS A MARKED DECREASE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Cotton consumed during December amounted to 472,941 bales, and 10,284 bales of lint, the census bureau today announced. In December, 1917, cotton consumed amounted to 516,498 running bales and 72,419 bales of lint. Cotton on hand December 31 in consuming establishments was 1,751,522 bales of lint and 259,195 bales of lint, compared with 1,576,626 bales of lint and 111,147 of lint a year ago, and in public storages and at compresses 466,897 bales of lint and 139,526 of lint compared with 324,879 bales of lint and 142,488 of lint a year ago. Cotton spindles active during December number 33,626,442 compared with 32,648,879 a year ago. Imports in December were 13,748 bales compared with 41,579 in 1917, and exports 58,487 bales, compared with 47,934 in 1917. Exports in December 1,996 bales compared with 6,226 bales in December, 1917.

PRESIDENT PLANS A SPEAKING TOUR OF UNITED STATES

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Monday, Jan. 13.—President Wilson is considering a speaking tour of the United States when he returns home. It is said that this trip will take him into many of the principal states and it is possible that he may touch the Pacific coast. His plans are not as yet matured but it is believed that he has discussed the plan with his advisers.

With congress out of the war early in March, Mr. Wilson would have an opportunity for such a tour before returning to Europe should he follow his original plan and if his return should be necessary. He would also have time to make his proposed trip before the convening of an extraordinary session of congress should he decide to call one. So far as known Mr. Wilson has no plans for an extra session but he still holds to his plan of returning to the peace congress, if it is felt his presence is necessary to the success of the league of nations.

AMERICAN ARMY ON RUSSIAN SOIL IS FARING WELL

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Colonel George F. Stewart, commanding the American troops in the Archangel sector of Russia, in a message received at the war department today under date of January 11, reported that he had made a personal tour of the wide front over which the Americans are scattered. He found the general staff, discipline and morale of the men excellent, and their clothing and equipment ample.

Arrest of British Officer for Murder Causes Sensation

LONDON, Jan. 14.—A sensation was caused in military circles today when it was learned that Lieutenant Colonel Norman Cecil Rutherford had been arrested charged with the willful murder of Major Miles Charles Seton of Melbourn. The murder occurred at the residence of Major Seton's cousin, Malcolm Cotter Seton, secretary of the judicial and public department of the Indian office last night.

NO OPEN DISORDER FROM BOLSHEVIK AGITATION IN U. S.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Bolshevik agitation in the United States shows no promise of reaching a stage of open disorder, according to department of justice officials who have been observing the movement. So far the movement evidently mainly in New York is economic rather than political in nature, they declare, and the organizers have kept well within the law. Department of justice officials have adopted the attitude that the bolshevik movement is not a subject for government action unless federal laws are broken and there is no disposition on the part of the department to combat the movement.

The financial clauses concern the gold reserve of the reichsbank and the issue of money by Germany. Marshal Foch, when he meets the German armistice delegations, will make suggestions regarding the security of government monetary deposits and the means of issuing bank notes. Guarantees will be required regarding any removal of the reichsbank's gold from Berlin in view of bolshevik activities. The naval conditions demand strict compliance with the requirements of the original armistice concerning the handing over of submarines which have not yet been complied with. No question was raised regarding the occupation of German ports by the Allies as had been reported. Examination into the question of Allied intervention in Poland against the bolshevik was postponed by the council.

The armistice question thus being settled, Marshal Foch left tonight for Trier, where the German delegates will be received.

NAVAL DEMOBILIZATION PLANS IN ABEYANCE

By Associated Press. WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—Naval demobilization plans in the navy are being pressed now so that the navy may be prepared to man big German warships in the subject way. The navy is considering allotting to aid in the task of bringing the American army home from France. Secretary Daniels today, in subject way, in communications on the subject, said that necessary personnel could be supplied for the enemy craft.

GENERAL STRIKE VALPARAISO AND SANTIAGO, CHILE

By Associated Press. LIMA, PERU, Jan. 13.—Valparaiso and Santiago, Chile, are in the grip of a general strike. The situation in the two cities is reported to be very serious. At a late hour tonight mobs were reported looting and burning Chinese food shops in the Valparaiso district of the city. Strong cavalry detachments were sent to clear the streets. The troops appear to be dominating the situation.

BOLSHEVIST LEADERS ARE UNDER ARREST

By Associated Press. BUENOS AIRES, Monday, Jan. 13.—Disturbances continued all day today notwithstanding the fact that 800 of the bolshevik ringleaders were under arrest. Shots were fired from roofs and windows, policemen, soldiers and street cars were fired upon. Street car service was abandoned at nightfall. The situation on the railways seem to be getting worse, the strike spreading from government owned routes to private lines.

NEW REPUBLIC OF LUXEMBOURG HAS SHORT EXISTENCE

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 14.—The Republic of Luxembourg which proclaimed on Thursday by the committee on public health lasted only six hours, according to a report to the Express from Brussels which adds that French military authorities restored order in the Grand Duchy.

Washington Clerks Have Five Year Job Compiling Records

WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—The estimate of the War Department is that it will take five years for the women clerks and employees in the different Washington offices to complete the task of compiling war records. There are miles of records, and tons of data to be tabulated, before the girls close their desks and go back to their homes in Michigan and Texas and Iowa, from whence they came in response to the government's request for help. We are beginning to learn that it takes time to unmake war, just as it does to make it. But, though the glamor of the "war job" has departed from these clerical positions, the girls will need the recreational program that has been planned for them as much, if not more than ever. And the Young Women's Christian Association is going to go right on looking out for them. The vacation houses will remain open, and the large hotel for women clerks opposite the union station will continue to operate. So the families back at home don't need to worry about daughter in Washington. When the Young Women's Christian Association is on the job, daughter has a real friend working for her.

Representation To Peace Conference Undergoes Change

PARIS, Monday, Jan. 13.—Concerning the representation of each country at the peace congress the Temps says that the first idea was to make the number of plenipotentiaries proportional to the importance of the role played by each of the great powers. It now appears that this method has been abandoned and that the conference is inclined to adopt as a criterion the importance of the interest held by each Allied or associated power in the negotiation of peace. It is not yet certain that the British dominions will have delegates other than those from England. It was first announced that the dominions considering themselves nations, desired to have representatives distinct from those of Great Britain.

29 STATES HAVE RATIFIED THE REED PRO AMENDMENT

The states which took this action today were: Indiana, Arkansas, California, Illinois, Kansas and North Carolina. Ratification by seven more states, making 36 is required to make the whole country bone dry unless the ratifiers are successful in proving in court that fifteen of these states require a vote of the people for ratification.

TAKE GLOOMY VIEW OF IRISH SITUATION

LONDON, Jan. 14.—The intention to forcibly suppress the Sinn Fein organization is attributed to the British government in certain quarters in Ireland, according to a Dublin dispatch to the Mail. Moderates there, the correspondent says, are speculating anxiously as to what developments may be expected from a meeting of the council which the government called Monday night at Dublin castle. The correspondent adds: "Sober minded, responsible men take a very gloomy view of the situation. It is feared that the government is about to embark on a new campaign of repression which may include the forcible suppression of the Sinn Fein with such results as to be expected when the government takes up armed conflict with 75 per cent of the population."

CHAPIN PLEADS GUILTY TO MURDER OF WIFE

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—Charles F. Chapin, former city editor of the New York Evening World, who on September 16 last shot and killed his wife while she was asleep, today pleaded guilty to murder in the second degree and was sentenced to state's prison for a term of from twenty years to life imprisonment. A lunacy commission, after the murder, adjudged Chapin sane. Chapin himself maintained that he was sane and had expressed a wish to pay the penalty for his crime without trial.

delegate each. Consideration of the Russian representation was postponed.

The British dominions, it was decided, will be represented apart from Great Britain. Canada, Australia, South Africa and India will have two representatives each, and New Zealand will have one delegate.

A proposal by President Wilson concerning the sending of problems to technical committees for examination was adopted. President Poincare will open the plenary session of the peace congress on Saturday with an address after which officers will be elected.

The size of the representation of each nation was decided upon, not as proposed by the French plan, in accordance with the part played by the American and British plan, in proportion to the extent of the interest of each nation in the peace settlement.

Brazil owes her special treatment to her historic position as a former empire and her population of more than twenty million which worked against placing her secondary to nations much less peopled.

The representation to be given Jugo-Slavia was decided upon but it is considered probable that the Croats and Slovenes will be represented similarly to the Serbians. Nothing was done about Montenegro in view of the political situation created by the refusal of King Nicholas to recognize the desire of his people to unite with Jugo-Slavia.

CAMPAIGN TO PREVENT FIRE WASTE IN COUNTRY

AUSTIN, TEX., Jan. 14.—A campaign for the prevention of fire waste in rural districts of the state has been inaugurated by I. Wallace English, State Fire Marshal. Of a total fire loss of \$16,000,000 annually in Texas, it is estimated by Mr. English that \$4,000,000 is sustained on farms and in rural communities, and he says 75 per cent of this can be prevented.

MERCHANTS HAVE DUTY AND AN OPPORTUNITY.

In the expectation that wages will decline and production costs decrease, merchants are reported to be delaying their orders for goods with the result that factories and mills that have been engaged in the production of munitions are slow in reopening for the manufacture of their regular products thereby causing unemployment and dissatisfaction.

The merchants of the country ought to have vision and patriotism enough to end this situation. Nobody wants wages to go down except a small proportion of employers who hold the dollar so close to their vision that they are unable to see over its rim; nobody wants to see living conditions lowered for anybody. Wages will not go down and living conditions will not be lowered if orders pour into the mills and industry is resumed on its normal basis.

The merchants of the country have an opportunity and a duty as well. They have generally reduced their stocks to a low level. Now is the time to stock up. The merchant who fails to do so because he expects lower wages and therefore lower prices is endangering the prosperity of the country and is showing mighty poor patriotism.

GRASPING AT LAST STRAW.

State after state is ratifying the constitutional amendment providing for nationwide prohibition. Beaten in their fight to prevent the passage of the amendment in congress and its ratification by the states the distillers and the brewers will make a fight in the courts. They are apparently preparing to question the validity of the amendment on the ground that it was not adopted by a two-thirds vote of the elected membership of congress.

That some of the more influential of the brewers have small faith in a contest in the courts is evidenced by the fact that they are converting their plants to other uses and are entering into industries that will be profitable only if engaged in permanently. Those who are taking this course, the Times believes, can see further than those who are allowing their plants to remain idle holding them for their old uses in the hope that the courts will declare the act submitting the constitutional amendment invalid. These men can see that if the will of the people is thwarted now it is only a question of time until it must attain its purpose. The sentiment of the country for nationwide prohibition is growing stronger day by day. The brewer or the distiller who is preparing to convert his plant to other uses is acting wisely.

Market Report

Cotton Market

NEW YORK, Jan. 14.—The covering movement which had developed in the cotton market yesterday afternoon was resumed at the opening today and first prices were at an advance of 15 to 24 points. Reactionary sentiment after the recent sharp break was encouraged by a firmer tone in Liverpool and report that foreign trade in forests had been buying on a scale down but the advance met southern selling and the market turned easier shortly after the call. January contracts which had sold at 27.80 on the call, declined to 26.65 while March sold off from 29.10 to 25.35 with active months generally working back to a shade under last night's closing. The census report on supply and distribution was not a factor of importance.

The market remained very nervous and unsettled later in the morning with prices showing increased weakness and continued liquidation, local and southern selling. Stop orders were uncovered on the break, which extended to 25.62 for March and 24.18 for May around mid-day, or about 39 to 45 points, but lower on the active months. There were reports of a very poor spot demand which was supposed to affect the unsettled condition in the goods trade but local spot brokers claimed that holders in the south were showing no weakness.

After the break at 25.50 for March and 24.15 for May, or about 50 to 65 points from last night's closing, the market steadied on covering and there were rallies of 28 to 39 points from the lowest during the middle of the afternoon. January was relatively easy under scattered liquidations. Cotton closed easy.

New Orleans Cotton.
 NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 14.—Cotton opened steady today and advanced 11 to 15 points in the first half hour of trading on a fairly good demand from yesterday's sellers. The hearish showing of December American consumption compared with the same month last year, 472,341 bales against 516,438 did not create any selling pressure in the early trading.

At the session progressed unfavorable comment regarding consumption increased and offerings became heavier. The market quickly gave way under selling and toward noon stood at a net loss of 51 to 60 points. Early sellers turned buyers in order to realize their gains. The market steadied. At one o'clock the trading months showed net declines of 21 to 34 points.

"In justice to investors and to myself as well I desire to make the following statement for publication. No company has any authority to use my name in any way in connection with any stock promotion scheme, in any section of Wichita county, and I wish this understood. The Kemp-Munier Allen Oil Company, in which I am a director, is not a stock selling scheme, there is no stock for sale, in fact all of the stock was subscribed the first day, without any solicitation on the part of any of the organizers of the company.

"Furthermore, in organizing this company we put into the company 500 acres of land, making the lease value \$50 an acre. This land could now be leased for double this amount. All oil development is of course a gamble to a certain extent, but we have put every possible safeguard about our company, have not overcapitalized, and have sufficient acreage to make small developments paying. Frederick, Okla., Is Hopeful for Extra Northwestern Train

FREDERICK, OKLA., Jan. 14.—Although a Wichita Falls & Northwestern traffic expert is said to have been here for several days on a "gum-shoe" inspection of passenger traffic conditions between Burk Burnett and Frederick and intermediate points, nothing official had been given out by the railroad up to Monday afternoon.

However, it was pointed out by men who are conversant with the situation, that nobody could make an inspection of the conditions without recommending that the railroad administration grant the city's plea, joined in by Burk Burnett, Devoil, Grandfield and other towns and order the Katy to establish passenger service between Frederick and Wichita Falls early in the morning and late at night.

The man sent here by the railroad is said to have ridden the trains between Frederick and Burk Burnett at frequent intervals and to have made a close study of the conditions, learning even how many families would move here from Burk Burnett because of the cheaper and more satisfactory living conditions if the service was inaugurated so that they can get to and from their work. The fact that he has been conscientious in his investigation leads to the belief, it was said, that he can do no otherwise than recommend that the service be inaugurated.

There still remains considerable red tape to be unwound before the trains will be put on, however. Whether the traffic expert will appear before the Chamber of Commerce to learn any additional facts pertaining to the need of the train, could not be learned Monday. No meeting had been called.

POWER OIL AND REFINING COMPANY READY TO OPERATE

RANGER WELLS AT A GREATER DEPTH INCREASING FLOW

A number of wells at Ranger are reported to have increased their flow considerably within the past few days through drilling deeper. The Gulf Production's Taylor No. 1 which came in last week at around 5,000 barrels and settled down to about 300 barrels, has been drilled deeper, according to the report and is now making around 6,000 barrels.

The Stubbfield No. 1 of the Prairie Oil and Gas Company which was making 300 barrels last week, is reported flowing at the rate of 1,000 barrels as the result of deeper drilling. The same company's Slayden No. 4 is reported to have increased its flow 200 barrels, being now making around 1,200 barrels, and the Magnolia Petroleum Company's Block No. 2, which flowed last week at the rate of 800 barrels is now reported making 1000 barrels.

THROWS OIL OVER DERRICK AT 1200; WILL GO DEEPER

The Woodrow Lee Oil Company's well struck an oil and gas sand at 1200 feet, instead of 1500 feet as was reported yesterday, and the gas was so strong as to send the oil high into the derrick. W. S. Curlee, who is interested in the company states that the drilling is being continued to the deeper sand. The 1200 foot sand will not even be given a test.

PIPE LINE COMPANY GRANTED RIGHT OF WAY

The Texas Gulf Refining and Pipe Line Co. was granted the right to lay its pipe on certain public highways by the county commissioners at their meeting this week.

The company plans to build a pipeline to Burk Burnett and Iowa Park to connect with its refinery to be built here.

"The DeMoss No. 1 well remains shut down, and is now regarded as a sort of 'mystery' well in that they are making no explanation regarding the failure to produce, or just what their trouble is.

"However, their under-reamer yet remains in the bottom of the hole, and we have heard it stated, not authentically, however, that this hole is to be abandoned, and a new well started with a rotary rig on the grounds that they can save time in drilling down to the 1150 foot depth of the abandoned hole, and then switch back to the standard rig and tools.

"Another feature of the case that is doubtless causing a delay is that the company allowed the lease to expire on about 800 acres of land near the well, and have not yet succeeded in releasing it. It was declared by a representative of the company that this was a clerical error made in the office, where the lease was shown to expire January 5th when in fact it expired December 5th.

"The drillers and tool dressers of the well remain here enjoying a life of ease on full pay.

"The big casing was this week hauled out to the Scott well and is now being set.

"A representative of The Texas Co. was here today perfecting some leases preparatory to that company entering this section in the very near future with, he said, possibly five rigs."

BIG TIRE FACTORY WANTS TO LOCATE IN WICHITA FALLS

PROPOSITION IS SUBMITTED TO DIRECTORS OF CHAMBER OF COMMERCE.

MEETING THIS MORNING

Action is Postponed Pending Selection of New Board of Directors Tonight.

Directors of the Chamber of Commerce for the fiscal year, ending tonight, held their last meeting this morning and after hearing from several individuals with propositions for locating in Wichita Falls, asked them to return on Wednesday morning, when the new board, which will be elected tonight, will hold its first meeting.

A proposition for locating a tire factory in Wichita Falls was made by Mr. McLain, representing the Hudson Tire Manufacturing, which has several factories now in operation in the north, and which is planning to open a Texas factory, to be located in Wichita Falls if satisfactory arrangements could be made.

Mr. McLain explained in a concise statement the arrangements which the factory desired, which will amount to Wichita Falls making them a loan of from \$75,000 to \$100,000 for five years time, for the erection of the building. The plant with machinery and other equipment would represent an investment of half a million dollars.

Mr. McLain stated, and from 150 to 200 men would be employed. The factory makes casings, inner tubes, and a number of tire accessories.

Interested in Proposal. On motion of Mr. Kemp, who stated that the proposition sounded very interesting and worth further investigation, Mr. McLain and other representatives of the company were invited to appear before the new board of directors tomorrow, and to take their proposition up with the industrial committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

Arrangements for the meeting of the organization convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce to be held in Wichita Falls on February 8, were left to the convention committee, and action on an appropriation for J. W. Campbell, the county farm demonstrator, was deferred until a later meeting.

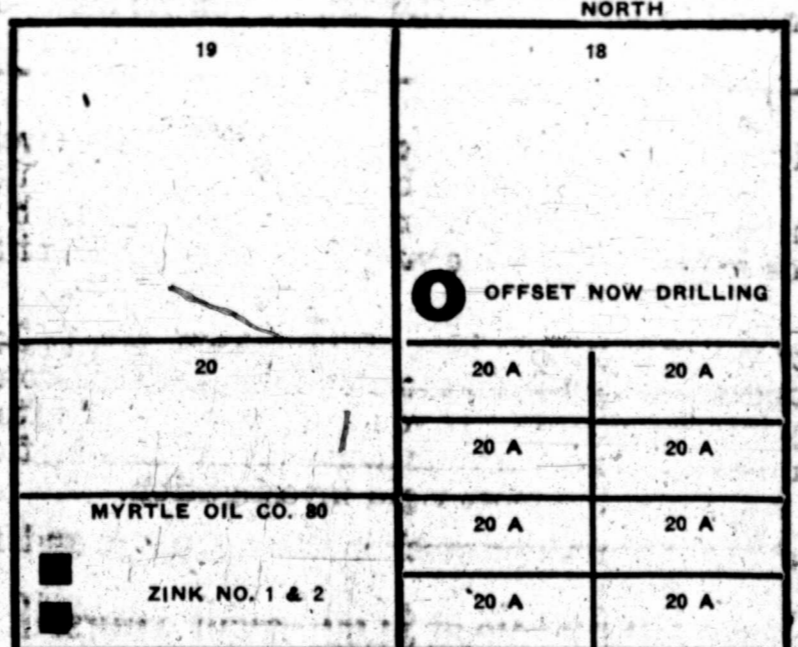

RUSSIA MAY BE REPRESENTED AT PEACE CONGRESS

DECISION WILL BE REACHED AT PRELIMINARY MEETING ON WEDNESDAY.

DISCUSS LEAGUE FIRST

Conferees Will Devote Twelve Hours Daily to This Question Until Settlement is Reached.

By Associated Press. PARIS, Jan. 14.—Russia may be represented, together with all the other nations that were engaged in the war against Germany, at the first formal meeting of the peace conference. Whether Russia will have a delegation probably will be decided at the next meeting preliminary to the congress. This will be held tomorrow. The first question to come before the actual peace conference will be that of the proposed league of nations, and it was made known today that it had been planned for the conferees to devote twelve hours daily to this work if necessary until it is on the way to completion. There is some reason for believing that the first plans for the structure of a league of nations to be laid before the conference probably will be somewhat composite representative of a consensus of opinion of the American, British and French statesmen who have been discussing the subject. It will not purport to be a finished product, but it is intended to serve as a starting point for development.

Extension of Armistice.

Marshal Foch, the Allied commander in chief, is today on the way to his headquarters at Trier to meet the German delegates and lay down terms for the extension of the armistice.

There was some disposition during yesterday's armistice to make the terms of the extension more drastic than had at first been proposed but this was soon ironed out.

A start has been made on the machinery through which the American public will learn of the doings of the peace conference. Hitherto the French and the British press had access to much more information than the press representatives from the United States. The British and French had also been issuing their own official communications regarding the meetings. It now has been decided to issue a joint communication, prepared by a committee representing all the nations, this to be the sole official outgoing. President Wilson has also decided to communicate with the representatives of the American newspapers of which there are more than 100 in Paris, through the medium of a publicity agent, Ray Stannard Baker, a famous magazine writer, has been selected as the agent.

News Through Publicity Agent.

The plan as announced today is for President Wilson or some member of the American mission to communicate to Mr. Baker such details of the proceedings as were not embraced in the communications and which the President desires to make public. Mr. Baker conveying the information to the correspondents. The correspondent will not have original contact with the source of information.

An interesting feature of yesterday's meeting was also of Sunday was that more than two hours of discussion was carried on in French of which neither President Wilson nor Secretary Lansing has a conversational knowledge, and of which David Lloyd George, the British premier knows very little.

WELCH HAS REFUSED TO ACCEPT APPOINTMENT

By Associated Press. LONDON, Jan. 14.—Stephen Welch, laborite, has refused to accept his appointment as a parliamentary secretary of the present board of trade which was announced Friday. His retirement leaves only four labor representatives by the government, compared to eight in the previous administration.

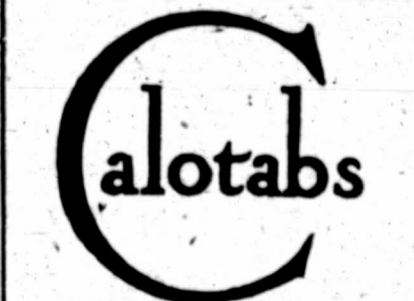
