Texas Oil Men Called Industrial Era Peacemakers

HOUSTON, Oct. 13. — A prediction that Texas oil men will become "the industrial pacemakers of our time" was made at the Texas Mid-Continent Oil & Gas Association's 30th annual meeting here Thursday.

R. B. Anderson, Vernon, Association president, declared that "in Texas the field is wide open for every man to get into the oil business, and sooner or later most of us try it." No permission is needed from either a bureau or a commission, he said.

"You need not ask any company or individual who may be your competitor," he said. "You have only to furnish your capital or to establish your credit at the bank and dedicate yourself to hard work and hope for success."

"In this atmosphere of free capitalism, there were drilled in Texas last year 12,251 wells, of which 4,090 were dry and 8,161 produced oil and gas," he said.

Texas Oil Progress Week Proclaimed By Governor

Governor Allan Shivers recently proclaimed the week beginning October 16 as Texas Oil Progress Week and issued the following statement:

"The progress of Texas has been in direct proportion to the development of the petroleum resources of this state.

"Texas produces nearly one-half of the petroleum of the nation.

"The petroleum industry is now the largest contributor to the economy of Texas, and to the support of its public institutions and its government.

"The Texas petroleum industry is an outgrowth of the search for oil which began 90 years ago.

"This past 90 years of progress in development of petroleum for the everyday use of all our citizens in also the 90 years of the greatest progress for this nation.

"October 16 to 22, inclusive, has been designated as 'Oil Progress Week' when members of the oil industry will cooperate in informing the public about the ways in which their industry has contributed to our high standards of living, and to the preservation of our democratic American way of life.

"Therefore, as Governor of the State of Texas, I hereby designate the week of October 16 to Progress Week and direct the 22, inclusive, to be Texas Oil Week.

"I call upon the citizens to a study of the contributions and service the oil men who live among us make to our public, social and business and private life."

The Hillsboro coaches will start Cole and Mosely at ends, Anthony and Johnson at tackles, Ecke and Wren at guards, and Campbell at center. The backfield will be composed of Franks, McClinton, McCauley and Wilkinson.

The Indians will enjoy a weight advantage of about four pounds per man. They will field a fast hard-hitting club. They are coached by A. Lee Smith and Dick Henderson.

They run their plays from the T-formation and vary their attack with wide spreads. They boast a good passing attack and a speedy backfield.

The Wrangler Band and the Buckaroo Band from Breckenridge High School will furnish the colorful between-half activities.

PUBLIC WARNED AGAINST DANGERS OF LOCKJAW; IMMUNIZATION ADVISED

AUSTIN, Oct. 13 — Lockjaw, or tetanus, is a very serious disease caused by a tiny germ that looks like a stick with a ball on one end — something like a microscopic lollipop, says Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer. This ball is called a spore and it is the seed of the germ. Lockjaw germs are found in the soil, especially in manured soil of the barnyard or garden; in blank cartridges; ect. — in fact, just about everywhere. These germs grow best in wounds where there is considerable tissue destruction and in which chips of glass, wood splinters, or grains of dirt have been embedded.

Every accident seen by the physician must be "considered from the lockjaw angle; and whenever there is any question, tetanus antitoxin should be given, for it is antitoxin that has helped to keep the incidence of lockjaw at its low level. Your physician will advise you as to its use. Its disadvantages are

that it gives only temporary protection; it does not rid of the lockjaw germs for a few days, particularly if the subject has had previous injections. Should lockjaw develop, it requires much antitoxin and entails great expense; and even then, not all cases can be saved.

It is not possible to free the environment of lockjaw germs, but now there is a method of active immunization. The subject becomes his own manufacturing establishment for antitoxin to combat lockjaw poison.

One nice feature about the treatment is that it can be combined with diphtheria and whooping cough prophylaxis. The concurrent immunization is, preferable, carried out in infancy. Should a child already have had his diphtheria toxoid and whooping cough vaccine injections, he can take the lockjaw injection alone; and these can be given at any time with very little discomfort.

R. J. Young a prominent farmer age 84 died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. A. J. Hurst here late Friday afternoon, after being in failing health for many months.

Mr. Young was born December 28, 1864 in Alabama. He came to Callahan County 58 years ago and lived in the Admiral community one year and then moving to Cottonwood where he lived on a farm and farmed until a few years ago when he was to retire from his vocation on account of health. He had lived at the same place for 57 years.

Funeral services were conducted from the Cottonwood Baptist church at 2 p. m. Sunday. Burial was beside that of his wife in the Cottonwood cemetery.

He said that he believed such a visit by Senators and Congressmen chosen from the Foreign Relations, Foreign Affairs, the Appropriations, and the Armed Services Committees, would be of great value to both the United Nations and to the Congress.

STRAWBERRY JAM

3 boxes quick-frozen sliced strawberries
6 cups sugar
½ bottle fruit pectin

Thaw strawberries as directed on package. Measure 4½ cups into a very large saucepan. Add sugar to strawberries and mix well. Place over high heat, bring to a full rolling boil, and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat and at once stir in bottled fruit pectin. Then stir and skim by turns for 5 minutes to cool slightly, to prevent floating fruit. Ladle quickly into glasses. Paraffin at once. Make about 10 six-ounce glasses.
