PAMPA TO MEET THE TORNADOES FRIDAY

New Exhibit Building Is To Be Ready For County Fair Opening October 13

Plans are being pushed forward for the opening of the Second Annual Dawson County Fair in Lamesa on October 13th.

Arrangement committees are very busy as final preparations get under way. Prize lists and premiums have been set and the catalogue has been printed. Large posters and window cards advertising the fair were being distributed this week.

There will be a new exhibit building to house livestock exhibits. These will be additional exhibits over the fair of last year, as due to crowded conditions the livestock exhibits were necessarily curtailed. This promises to be one of the outstanding attractions of the entire exposition, as Dawson County is noted for its fine livestock. This is more especially true in dairy and beef cattle. There is probably no county in West Texas which boasts of as fine herds of dairy cows as this county. The same is true with beef cattle and hogs.

The poultry exhibits promise to be among the best for this section as bird fanciers from over the county have signified their intention of entering chickens in the contest.

The amateur contest is one that is also drawing its share of pre-opening interest, as amateurs from over the entire county have shown a marked interest in this year's contest. This has been one of the most popular forms of entertainment in Dawson county for the past number of years and from present indications this year promises to be no exception. To those who contemplate entering, they are advised to see fair officials well before the opening date of the fair and have their act booked.

New Grocery Will Open On Saturday

Hunters Warned To Secure License To Hunt This County

Violators Warned That Prosecution To Follow

A warning is issued this week by T. A. Harris, game warden for this district to transients that they must have a hunter's license to hunt any kind of game.

Surveys made during the past few years show that transients, mostly cotton pickers, have trapped and killed more of Dawson county's quail than all the local sportsmen, farmers and ranchers of the county combined. There has been much complaint, according to Mr. Harris, from owners of land, as well as local sportsmen, to the effect that it is unfair to have the quail killed off by these transients people unless they have a hunter's license.

The warden stated that anyone caught hunting, regardless of whether they are hunting quail, rabbits or any other game, either must have been a resident of the county for at least six months or have a license, or be subject to prosecution. He stated that the law will absolutely be enforced and warns farmers to advise their pickers to this effect. Although the quail season does not open until in December, this warning is being issued in time so that all may know that this year will be enforced, he said.

Regardless of whose land the hunting is done on, it still remains that unless you have lived in the county at least six months, or have a hunter's license, you are subject to fine.

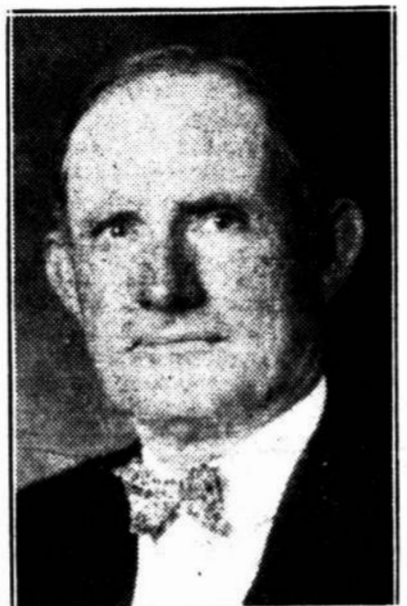
These New Mexico Poloists bear the reputation of being one of the fastest aggregations in the entire southwest and the Whites are to be congratulated upon their win.

This week the Courier presents Mr. R. E. Simpson, pioneer citizen of Dawson county in the parade of Lamesa Neighbors.

Born in Coryell, Texas, with his family moved at an early age to McColluch county, where he lived with his parents until 1893, when he followed the westward march, coming to Borden county, where he lived until 1900. He accepted a position on the Slaughter Cattle Ranch, and worked for this outfit until January of 1906, when he moved into Lamesa.

He bought the post office fixtures from Mr. J. J. Lindsey and became Lamesa's second postmaster, which position he held for eight years. During his tenure as postmaster, he was assisted by his father, who took care of the office during the day while Mr. Simpson filled the position of cashier of the First State Bank, which he had helped to organize and acted as its first cashier. In 1914 he gave up the post office and devoted his entire time to the operation of the bank. In 1916 he disposed of most of his bank stock, but continued to serve in the capacity of vice-president of the bank until April of 1917, at which time he resigned. In August of that year he again went to work for Slaughter and on March 1, 1918, he (Continued on Back Page)

Launching Of A Huge Paving Program Is Announced Ready As Initial Project Is Disclosed

According to Blaine Wiggins, City Secretary, the City of Lamesa has a plan with the Works Progress Administration, whereby any block within the city limits may be paved with government aid, provided, of course, that the property owners on each side agree to pay their proportionate share of the expense.

According to Mr. Wiggins, the cost of this paving is much lower than at any time in the history of Lamesa. The price per running foot is now about \$1.50. Or if you own a fifty foot frontage on a proposed street, your cost will run about \$75.00 for your share of the cost.

Several projects are under consideration and the city is anxious to cooperate with any property owners who desire this paving laid. Plans are already complete for the paving of one block south of South Main to connect with the paving end at South Second, and the paving of South Second from Main to Dallas street.

It is hoped that this program will enable many blocks of city paving to be laid, and many property holders have signified their intention of trying to get their neighbors to sign up with them and carry the program along.

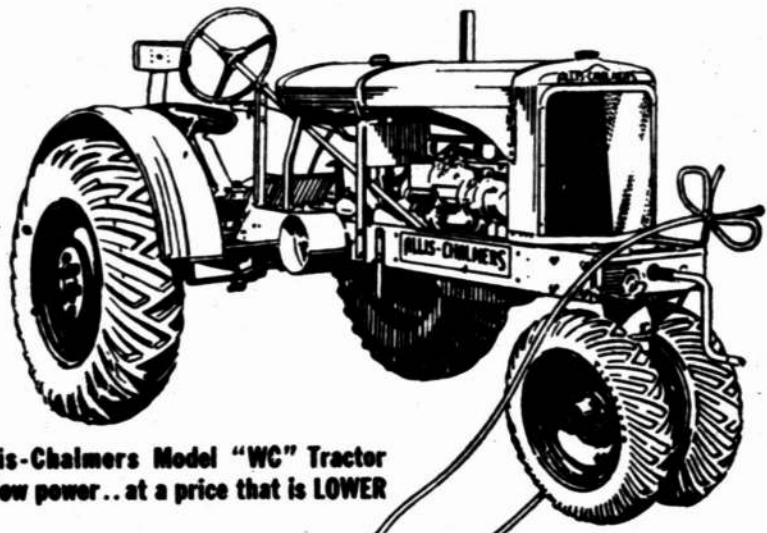
"A person does not have to be able

Do not use too many flowers and remember that uneven numbers and uneven height are always more interesting. The container should be of simple, subdued color and preferably a dull finish. Place low growing flowers in low containers and tall ones in tall containers.

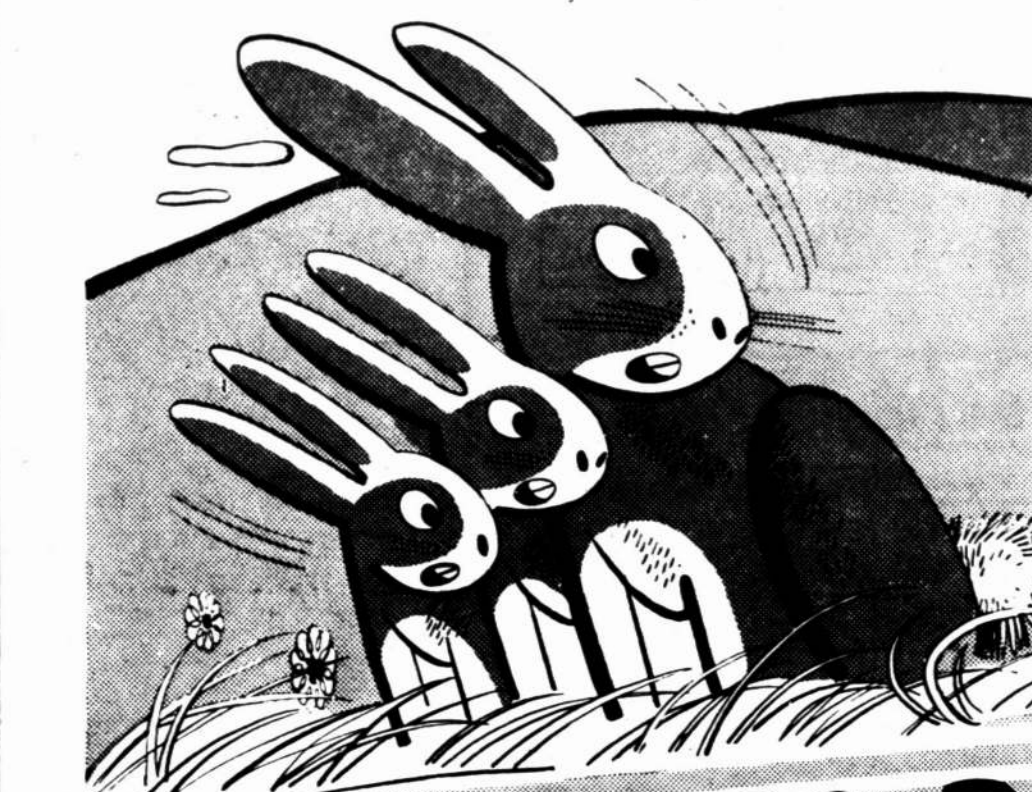

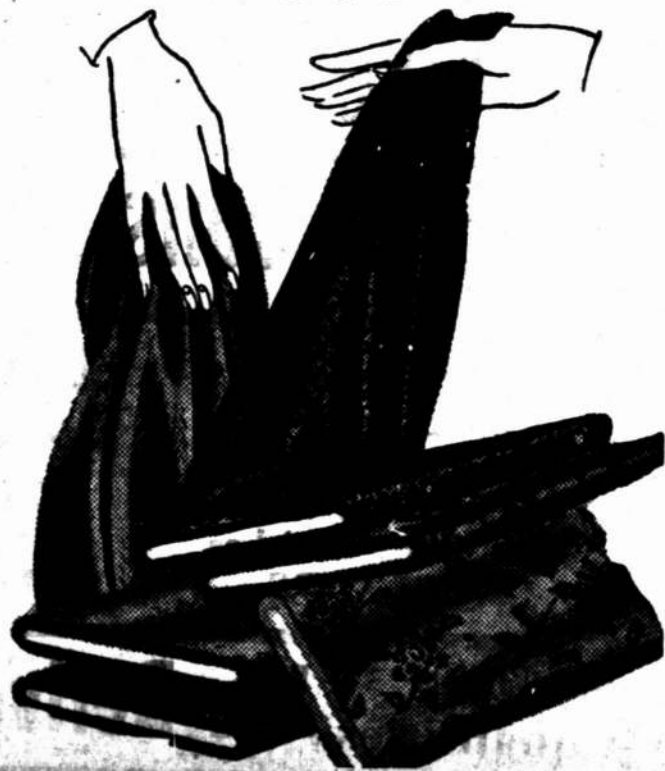

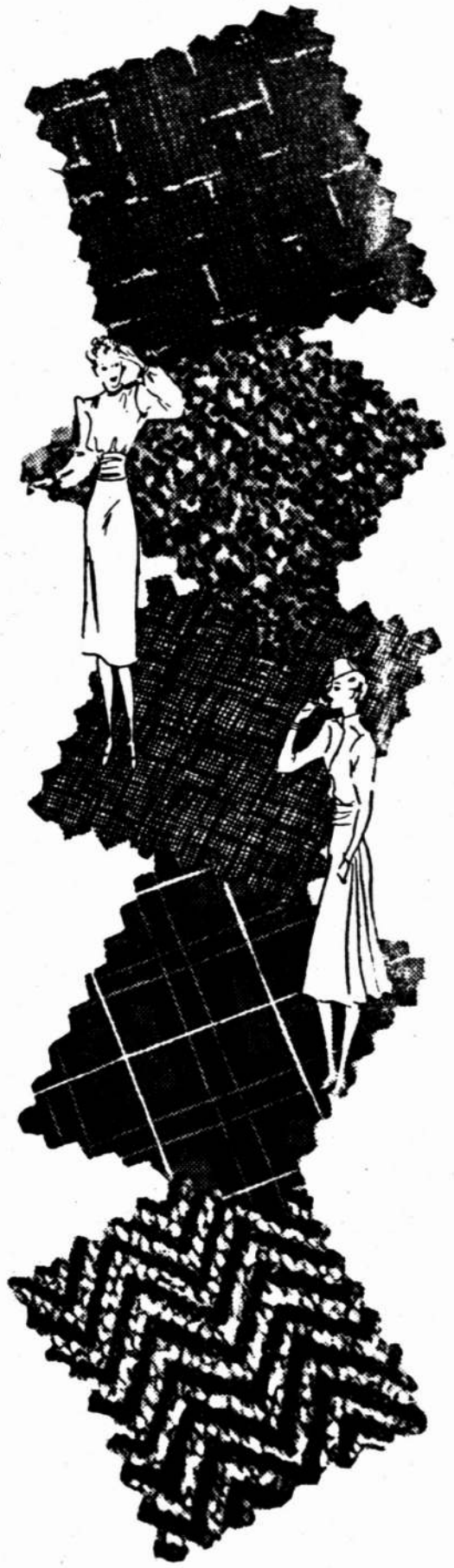

Reports to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research from 106 Texas department stores indicated gains in sales during August of 22.2 per cent over July and 1.1 per cent over August last year. Aggregate dollar sales in these establishments during the first eight months of the year were practically identical to those of the corresponding period in 1937. Credit sales constituted a larger proportion of the total than in August last year, while the percentage of collections to outstanding accounts was slightly less than a year ago.
