As was stated in last weeks issue each producer should be present or have some one present acting for him at the time the measuring is done so that the Compliance papers can be signed and the correct plot of ground which has been set aside as rented acres can be measured.

Notice to Producers
When the Compliance Supervisors visit your farm to measure contracted acres and rented acres be ready to point out a certain block of land as rented acres—don't say "just go measure my rented acres any where". The Supervisors time is valuable and if you do not have your rented acres designated the Supervisor can turn in a report that you have not complied with your contract because you do not know where your rented acres are.

Corn and Hog
All Corn and Hog Contract signers that are getting a hog payment must produce 25 per cent of their hog base or give sufficient reasons why they did not. Such reasons as lack of finances, drouth, or high priced feed are not sufficient reasons to justify the approval of compliance by Allotment committee.

A special news item from Edgewood, Texas, says that a Van Zandt county farmer planted Irish potatoes and tomatoes in close proximity and at harvest time found clusters of potatoes at one end of the vine and some tomatoes at the other. Not a new discovery, but verification of the work of Luther Burbank, the plant wizard, who years ago announced the production of the Pomato by fertilizing the bloom of the Irish potato plant with the pollen from the tomato plant.

From the July Southern Agriculturist we clip the following relative to the growing of Irish potatoes, which is interesting, and local farmers can add much to their winter food supply by planting a patch of spuds for home use. The clipping is as follows: "In the south it is impossible to keep potatoes in desirable condition for table use over winter without cold storage. This is impracticable in many instances and is expensive. We can have, however, high quality home grown potatoes all winter by growing a fall crop which may be either early varieties such as Triumph, Irish Cobbler, or late varieties such as Burbank or Green Mountain. If an early variety is used planting must be done late in summer so that the crop will mature during the late, cool fall. The later the crop matures the better the potatoes will keep and the higher quality they will be. This means planting in the middle or last of July in the northern tier of the States, to the first of September in the South."

What may well be termed the colossus of human achievement, the Grand Coulee power and reclamation project on the Columbia river in the state of Washington, now under construction, which, when completed, will have cost around \$390,000,000 and will furnish more than 2,500,000 horse power of available energy and supply sufficient water to irrigate 1,250,000 acres of land. This immense structure will be 500 feet high, 4,000 feet long, 452 feet wide at its base and 30 feet wide on top, and will form a reservoir more than 150 miles long and over 1400 yards wide. It is estimated that the annual upkeep will cost something like \$4,000,000. It is estimated that it will require eight years to complete this most gigantic of all human undertakings, which by some has been called the Eighth Wonder of the World.

Editor Gr of the Lubbock Morning Avalanche aptly says: "It would be nice if all men were good, and all lawyers were scrupulously honest and had nothing to do but draw up wills and plead cases in courts of equity. But we have to face facts, and when crime gets out of hand, fight it even to death if necessary."

There is a well known proverb, at once naive and striking, which illustrates the necessity of participating by one's own effort in bringing about fortunate circumstances and in giving them permanence: "Who comes at the sound of the flute departs at the noise of the drum."

As Gen. Coxey's army marched on Washington during the last Cleveland administration in an effort to get some relief, when it approached the White House everywhere it was greeted by this sign: "Keep Off the Grass." Just the other day when two

hundred ex-soldiers led by Roy Robertson of California came to Washington to present a petition urging that the soldier's bonus be paid out of the four billion dollar work fund, they were ordered off the capitol steps. Did your listening ear hear the clank of a chain hurrying back from the not too distant future?

Harry P. Drought, State administrator of the Works Progress Administration, told a conference of the twenty district directors and their staffs, that the desire of President Roosevelt, that construction projects, for which \$50,000,000 were appropriated to Texas, be kept entirely out of politics, would be strictly carried out. So far, so good.

The following clipping may not be much of an editorial, but it contains some information which is not generally known. "Centuries ago the tomato was thought to be a poison; one hundred years ago it was considered a curiosity. Today, babies even but three weeks old are being fed on its juices. Dollar for dollar tomatoes contain as much vitamin as oranges. Every diet, no matter how much or how little money there is to spend, calls for the tomato, for it is so rich in vitamins."

A prominent weekly publication, in its issue of July 19th, contains the following: "The semi-annual report of J. P. Morgan & Co., of New York, shows ownership of over three hundred millions in stocks and bonds and only forty-two millions in loans and discounts. The above institution has more than seven times as much invested in stocks and bonds as it has in loans and discounts. The country would be better off if big financial institutions would deal less with soulless corporations and more with flesh and blood." The writer of the foregoing is president of the First National Bank of his city of around four thousand population, and knows whereof he writes. On another page of this same paper is a condensed statement of the financial condition of the bank of which this writer is president, which statement shows among the resources of his bank there are U. S. Bonds and other stocks and securities amounting to \$451,296.50, while the loans and discounts are only \$99,750.67, this showing that this country banker deals "with soulless corporations" in but little smaller proportion than does the house of Morgan. "Flesh and blood" cuts but little figure where dollars and cents are concerned.

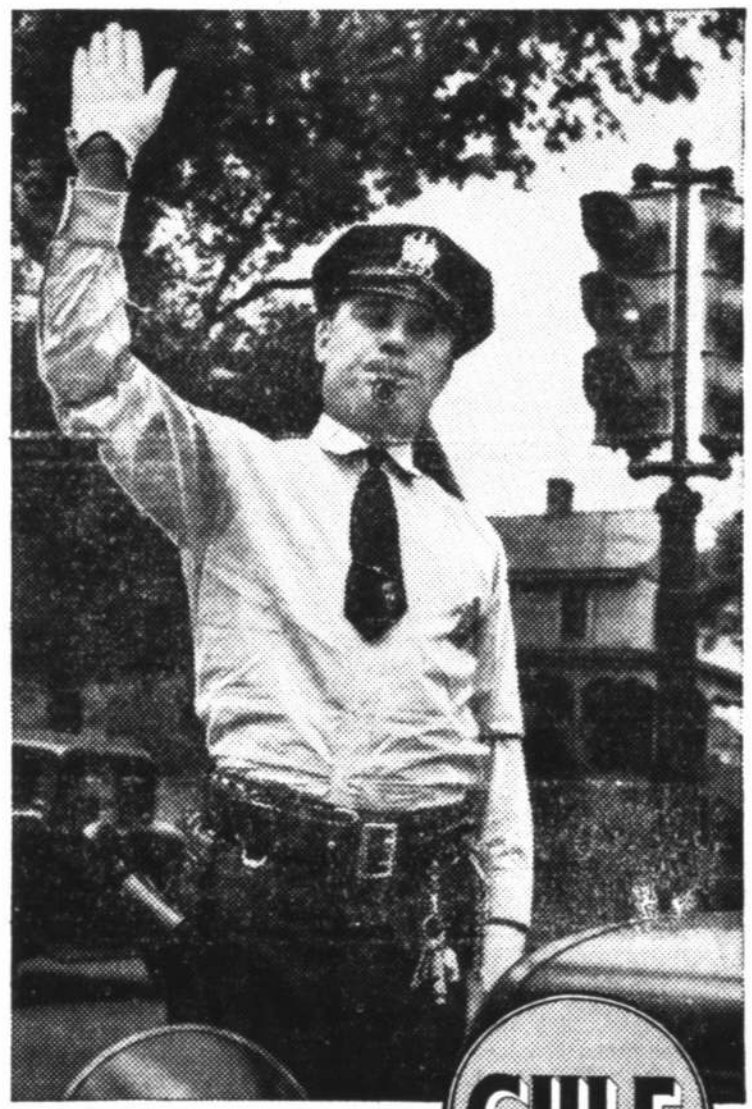

CHIEF INTEREST IN AUGUST

ELECTION TO BE REPEAL
Probably chief interest in the August 24th election on the seven proposed Constitutional Amendments will center on Proposition No. 3 on the ballot—the repeal of Prohibition according to Secretary of State Gerald C. Mann.

The Constitution at present, prohibits the sale, manufacture, and transportation of alcoholic liquors (except 3.2 beer). This prohibition would be stricken out by adoption of the Repeal Amendment.

The proposed amendment specifically prohibits the return of the open saloon—and it would be up to the Legislature to define the term "open saloon."

No machinery is set up for the sale of liquor. The Legislature would have the authority to determine just who and just how liquor is to be sold. This could be done by State monopoly or through private channels. The Legislature would have the authority to pass laws regulating local option

elections.

If the Amendment is adopted, all counties, cities and precincts that were dry in 1919 when statewide prohibition was adopted would be dry now—at least until local option elections were held to determine otherwise.

It is well to remember, Secretary Mann points out, that there will be an election next year in November to determine whether the state shall sell liquor through a State monopoly system. If the repeal amendment is adopted in August the State MAY establish a state control and monopoly system. If the repeal amendment is defeated in August, it will be in effect be submitted again in November, 1936, in the State Monopoly Amendment which says the State SHALL have a liquor monopoly. To retain the present dry status both the August 24th Amendment and the November 1936 Amendment must be defeated. Passage of either will repeal the present prohibition section of the Constitution.

FEE SYSTEM TO BE VOTED ON AUGUST 24TH ELECTION

Two years ago a Senate investigating committee discovered a number of flagrant abuses of the fee system as practiced in Texas for recompensing certain public officials. The fee system was established and written into the Texas Constitution at a time when it was impossible to pay salaries and the theory was that an official was entitled to "all he could make." Since the Senate committee discovered and revealed the malpractices existing under the system there has been a demand for a Constitutional change on this score, according to Secretary of State Gerald C. Mann.

Proposed Amendment No. 6 on the ballot provides that the fee system as a method of paying certain precinct, county and district officials shall be abolished in counties having 20,000 or more population according to the last Federal Census. The Legislature will, if the amendment is adopted, set the salaries for officials now receiving fees in such counties. In counties of under 20,000 population the Commissioners Court may put their county and precinct officials on a salary basis if they so desire. The amendment does not specifically state who shall set the salaries of such officials in this case.

If this amendment is adopted all district officers must be compensated on a salary basis. The amendment provides that fees shall continue to be collected as at present but they will go to the county instead of the officer. The evident purpose of this amendment is to place as many officials as possible on straight salaries and thus abolish, in so far as possible the payment of officials through the present fee system.

ON TEXAS FARMS—
Farmers' Short Course at A and M College all next week is the attraction which will cause about 5000 bags to be packed this week end.

"The Changing Country Life" is the theme around which all the Short Course programs and demonstrations have been built. Ox-cart ideas do not keep up with the procession in an automobile age whether in town or country. So it is well to recognize that country life is changing.

Science has made available a great range of information valuable to rural citizens in making more profitable use of the raw materials grown by them.

Wood or wool, cotton or corn, hides and what not have possibilities for home use to add to the comforts and conveniences of life in these days of small electrically equipped shops and reviving interest in skills.

Science has also revealed the fact that homemakers aren't just "lucky with the canning" so much as they follow sound methods of preservation.

The Farmer's Short Course undertakes by demonstrations to make the riches of science available to all who come.

16,000 TEXANS TO BE ENROLLED IN CCC IN AUG.

Austin, July 30.—Young men throughout Texas eligible for Civilian Conservation Corps enlistment have been advised by State Enrollment Supervisor Neal E. Guy to make themselves known to their county administrators if they are interested in being among the 16,000 to be enrolled by August 31.

Guy advised county administrators of their quotas and asked that they examine their relief rolls for probable enrollees, with the possibility that quotas will be increased when administrators show enough CCC candidates to warrant.

An eligible candidate is any single man between 18 and 28 whose family is on the relief rolls.

While administrators were asked to search their rolls for probable enrollees, Guy suggested that the young men themselves notify their administrator if they are eager to enroll in the CCC.

Approximately 16,000 Texans are to be enrolled by August 31, with about 10,000 expected to be sent to out-of-state camps, Guy said. Out-of-state assignments are made because Texas camps already have their quotas; while camps in some of the other states have not, he explained. Enrollment will be made at intervals during the next month, and enrollment instructions have already been issued to the first allotment of 3224.

Forty-three new camps are being built in Texas, bringing the total in this state to 96. Approximately 30,000 Texans will be in the CCC by August 31.

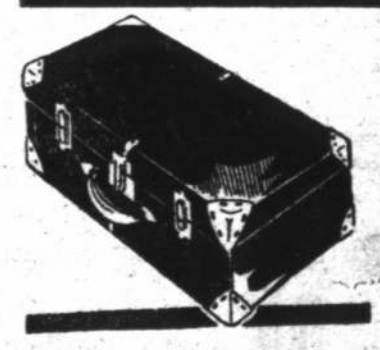
