

Twelve More Names Of Missing Shareowners From Area Listed

It isn't very often that a man takes a dog and it's even less often for money to look for people. But there are eight million Americans holding obsolete stocks and bonds that appear on no stock, curb, or over-the-counter listings. The owners think the old certificates are worthless. Often the owners are wrong. When the dusty papers are checked, they have been found to have values ranging from \$50.00 to \$53,000.

Today we are carrying the second list of missing stockholders. In this list you will see the names Kirk L. Smallwood, Sam Webley, and Victor C. Finney. Collectively these three men can split up a \$6,500 pie. They apparently forgot some old investments or perhaps are deceased—and their next of kin have no knowledge of their inheritance rights. Others on today's list have sizable sums waiting for them for investments in an oil company, rubber firm, utility outfit management corporation. There are also a few on today's list who invested in copper, steel, and other commodities.

Acting as agents for various corporations, the Tracers Company of America is seeking the location of missing stockholders in this area so that dividend checks and other cash interests can be paid to them. The names listed were submitted by Tracers, which specializes in hunting missing husbands, heirs, witnesses to wills, relatives, sons and daughters as well as missing stockholders.

South Carolina Write-In Vote Picks Thurmond

COLUMBIA, S. C. (AP)—South Carolina voters at a nationwide precedent yesterday in electing write-in candidate J. Strom Thurmond as their new junior U. S. senator. It is the first time a candidate has been elected to Congress on a write-in vote.

Thurmond, running on the Democratic ticket, defeated his nearest opponent, State Sen. Edgar Brown, by a decisive margin.

With only scattered precincts unreported, from a total of 1,589, Thurmond had 139,106 write-in votes, to \$9,356 for Brown. Another write-in candidate, Marcus A. Stone, had 245 votes.

Brown was the official nominee of the South Carolina Democratic Executive Committee.

Thurmond, presidential candidate on the States' Rights Democratic ticket in 1948, entered the senatorial race vigorously protesting the committee's failure to stage a primary.

Tar Heels Pick Lone GOP Solon

RALEIGH, N. C. (AP)—Democrats elected two senators and re-elected 11 representatives and Republicans re-elected their lone representative in North Carolina yesterday.

Democratic Rep. Hugh Q. Alexander of Kannapolis defeated Republican William E. Stevens of Lenoir in the hotly contested 9th District.

With 132 of the district's 188 precincts reported, the unofficial count stood: Alexander 38,580, Stevens 32,759. At that point Stevens conceded.

Republican Rep. Charles R. Jonas of Lincolnton was re-elected in the 10th District over Judge J. C. Sedberry of Charlotte. Jonas accomplished what no Republican in history had been able to do—win re-election in North Carolina to the House of Representatives.

Former Gov. W. Kerr Scott capped a long career of public service with a resounding defeat of Paul C. West for the U. S. Senate.

Sen. Sam J. Ervin Jr., who was appointed to the Senate when Sen. Clyde R. Hoey died, was elected to two years remaining in the Hoey term.

Republican Bruce Alger Is Surprised Winner In Dallas

DALLAS (AP)—Bruce Alger, upset winner in a precedent-breaking Republican victory in Dallas County, buried his face in his arms a few minutes early today and finally admitted he had won election to Congress.

Alger, holding a lead since the second returns came in from the unofficial Texas Election Bureau, was hard to convince. Newsmen and supporters, most of the night, had been telling him he was the winner over Wallace Savage, former Dallas mayor and former chairman of the State Democratic Executive Committee.

"Let's not count 'em before they're in," the six-foot, two-inch former B29 pilot said. "Let's not be presumptuous."

It was 1 a.m. before he finally issued a statement on his apparent victory. And it was worded cautiously.

"The latest returns show 27,406 votes for me as against 24,251 for my opponent," he said, "and only 10 boxes are out in these figures."

"Those 10 boxes have a total of about 3,500 votes, I am told, so it

does not seem presumptuous at this time to accept the victory as sure."

Looking every bit the suave Princeton man in a two-button, wide-lapelled coat with flap pockets, Alger was nevertheless obviously weary as he posed for photographers and forced a wan smile.

He worked for RCA-Victor in television and record sales work in the Southeastern states for a while after his graduation in 1940, was a bomber pilot in the Pacific Theater in World War II, and flew 23 combat missions.

His campaign for Congress really got started about 10 days ago and was a whirlwind affair that left the favored Savage a beaten, bewildered candidate last night.

Savage went to bed shortly after midnight today, not certain he had

lost, he said, but wishing Alger well if the latter won. "I hope he can give the county a successful representation if he's the winner," Savage said. "And I wish him well."

Savage, who with Governor Allan Shivers and former Democratic National Committee Chairman Wright Morrow of Houston led Texas into the GOP fold in 1952, was a heavy favorite to win.

New Dealer Harriman Elected To Governorship Of New York

NEW YORK (U)—New Dealer Averell Harriman was elected governor of New York in a thriller-diller finish early today by only 10,000 votes of more than five million cast.

This was a plurality of about one fifth of 1 per cent for the former ambassador to Moscow and secretary of commerce over Sen. Irving M. Ives, his Republican opponent.

But Rep. Franklin D. Roosevelt Jr., the Democratic-Liberal candidate for attorney general, went down to defeat before Rep. Jacob K. Javits, the GOP nominee. Republican Gov. Thomas E. Dewey, who did not seek re-election, ordered a police guard placed over all voting machines pending the official public canvass of the votes.

The election appeared to be over midway through the counting last night with Harriman and his running mates leading by around 200,000 votes. Harriman claimed victory and Ives conceded defeat.

Then the gap began to shrink. It was reduced to 100,000, to 35,000, to 26,000, to 16,000, and for a time it looked as though it might disappear altogether.

Ives and Dewey hastily went

into a conference at 1 a.m. in Dewey's hotel suite for a "re-assessment" of the dramatic returns.

But by 3 a.m. it became apparent that Harriman had indeed won the highest office of the politically powerful state controlled by Dewey for the past 12 years.

It was the closest election ever for the governorship in the modern history of the nation's most populous state.

Harriman's victory was certain to project him into the national political picture with the 1956 presidential campaign approaching.

But when an interviewer asked him about his plans two years hence, he replied: "Oh, I'm for Adlai Stevenson."

Harriman had been a candidate against Stevenson for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1952.

The closeness of the outcome indicated plainly that New York, with 35 electoral votes, the most of any state, will be a furious battleground in the next national election.

Harriman triumphed despite personal intervention in the New York campaign by President Eisenhower.

Eisenhower made a 40-mile automobile tour through city streets

with Ives and Dewey shortly before the election.

Harriman has pledged a program in line with the New Deal and "Fair Deal" administrations in which he held eight major posts under Presidents Roosevelt and Truman.

Like Roosevelt in 1932, Harriman campaigned hardest on the unemployment issue. He accused the Republicans of a "do-nothing, care-nothing" attitude.

He also called for public development and distribution of Niagara power on the pattern of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Above all, he promised to restore "government with a heart."

Crippled by colds that reduced their number but not the quality of their performance, members of the Howard County Junior College chorus received the cheers of the Rotary Club Tuesday following an appearance at the club's luncheon.

The chorus, directed by Orland Johnson, sang five numbers—three a cappella and two accompanied by Jack Hendrix, director of HCJC's instrumental music department.

The group opened with a Scottish arrangement of the "Twenty-Third Psalm," and followed with William Dawson's arrangement of "There Is A Balm In Gilead." Soloist for the latter was Dennis Phillips.

Reba Taylor, Nancy Milford and Dell Phillips were soloists for "Going Home," an anthem from the second movement of Dvorak's New World Symphony. The chorus concluded the program with a Fred Waring arrangement of "Coming Through the Rye" and the Negro spiritual, "Dry Bones," accompanied by Hendrix at the piano during both numbers.

The program was introduced by Johnson and was arranged by Champ Rainwater.

The McKinley Grain Company of Big Spring has been designated by General Mills as their purchasing agent for guar beans in this West Texas area.

General Mills had first considered locating the purchasing point at Lamesa and then determined on Big Spring, both because of Howard County acreage and for other reasons, as a more suitable buying point.

The purchase price on the beans is \$4 per 100 pounds at Kenedy, where the guar bean processing plant is located. This means the price being paid in Big Spring will be approximately \$3.35 so as to cover the freight between Big Spring and Kenedy. The price is dry-weight and clean.

Production here is estimated (almost a pure guess) at about 275 pounds to the acre. However, some early harvests indicate it may run higher than this.

Weaver of Big Spring, 30 acres; Jess Franklin of Big Spring, seven acres; Hudson Landers of Elbow, eight acres; R. C. Reed of Elbow, 30 acres.

Guar is a summer legume that has been widely accepted in this area in the last two years, neither of which years has it had a fair chance to prove its full value because of the drought.

It is a tap-rooted plant that penetrates the plow pan. With no better chance than it has had the past two years, it has been demonstrated, particularly in Dawson County, and in the Stamford area, that cotton following guar produces much more abundantly than cotton following cotton.

It is a row crop adapted to a wide variety of soils, growing best on sandy loams and the lighter soils. The seed should be inoculated when planted. As to fertilization an application of 200 pounds of 20 per cent superphosphate, or the equivalent to the acre, is recommended as a phosphate need.

Guar puts abundant residue and nitrogen into the soil; greatly increases the water intake and water holding capacity of the soil; gives increased yields on following crops; reduces the effect of root rot and insect damage to cotton; it requires no special equipment for planting or cultivation; is strongly drought-resistant and thrives in hot weather.

And—as has been mentioned, there is a market for the guar beans.

Management plays a big role in the success of small grains and annual clovers for winter grazing, according to E. M. Trew, pasture specialist for the Texas A&M College Extension Service.

Don't turn livestock in until the plants are at least six inches high,

he advises, explaining that this allows the development of enough root system to prevent the plants from being easily pulled from the ground by the stock.

He says that rotation grazing offers the most efficient use of forage produced by fast growing small grains and legumes. With a rotation system fields are divided into smaller blocks by portable fences. When the animals are turned in the plants are grazed down rapidly and evenly. The stock is then moved to another part of the field, and the grazed plants make a new growth.

The 80 steers to be used will be brought in from New Mexico and are said to average from 750 to 800 pounds. They are Florida cross-breeds. The arena has been enlarged in readiness for the third steer roping contest to have been held on the Conchos in the last 50 years.

Toots Mansfield of Big Spring is one of the 10 ropers who have signed up for the show. Arrangements call for each roper to put up a \$500 entry fee, with the money to be divided among the ropers.

Other contestants will include Ike Rude, the old-timer who now lives at Brawley, Calif.; Don McLaughlin of Smithfield; Steve Stephenson of Big Lake; John D. Holliman of Rankin; Everett Shaw of Stonewall, Okla.; Shost Webster to Lenapah, Okla.; Clarke McIntyre of Kiowa, Okla.; Cotton Lee of Fort Sumner, and Troy Fort of Lovington.

Officials will include Jay Lane of Rankin, timekeeper; Louis Powers of San Angelo, arena man; Harry Howard of Rankin, the chute

gate; Walton Poole of Rankin, the barrier; Howard Westfall of Sonora, the flag.

Buck Jackson of Pecos, former sheriff, cattleman, rodeo contestant and radio announcer, will be at the public address system.

This will be the first opportunity many residents of West Texas have ever had to see and old-fashioned steer roping.

E. T. O'Daniel of Coahoma recently sold 124 clip ewes averaging 98 pounds on the Clovis market at \$5.10, and 335 clip ewes averaging 83 at \$4.10.

On the same market, a few days later, Jim Meador of Coahoma, sold 71 clip lambs, averaging 80 pounds at \$15.50 and 82 old ewes,

averaging 90 pounds at \$3.25.

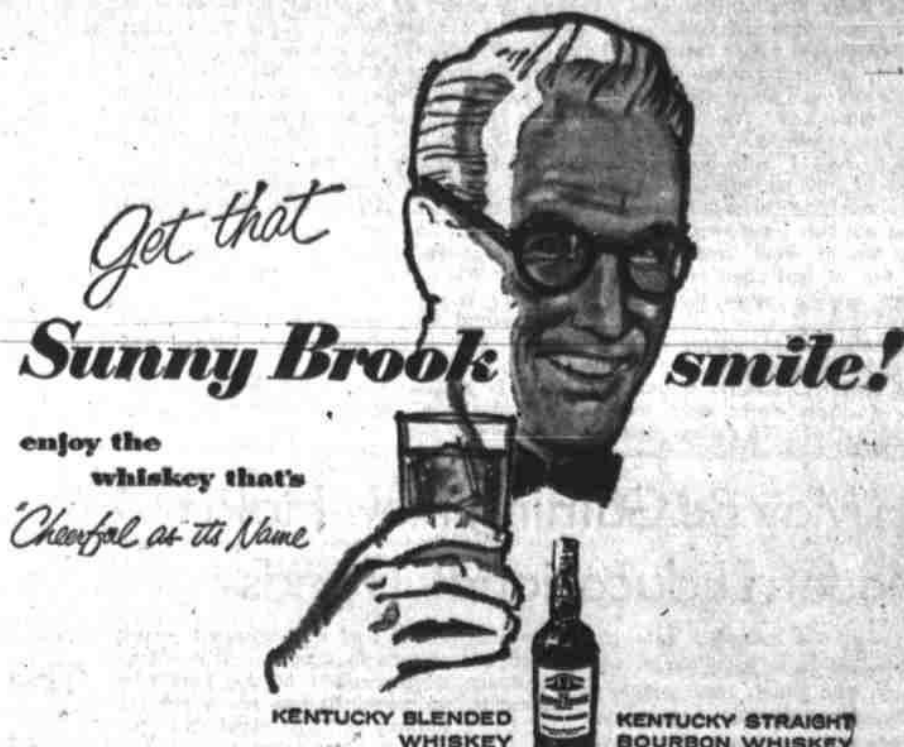
Both sales were through the Clovis Cattle Commission Co.

At this market last week medium and choice fat lambs sold from \$16 to \$18.60, and clip lambs from \$15.50 to \$16.50. Canner and cutter ewes from \$5 to \$4.50, and better butcher ewes \$12.75 to \$7. Yearling wethers \$8 to \$12, and packer bucks \$3 to \$3.50.

Feeder lambs were \$1 lower than the week before, and breeding ewes were fully steady. Good and choice feeder lambs were \$13 to \$15.50; medium lambs \$11 to \$12.75; buck lambs \$10 to \$13; light lambs \$4.25 to \$7.50 a head. Solid mouth ewes \$8.50 to \$10.50, and younger ewes \$11 to \$14.

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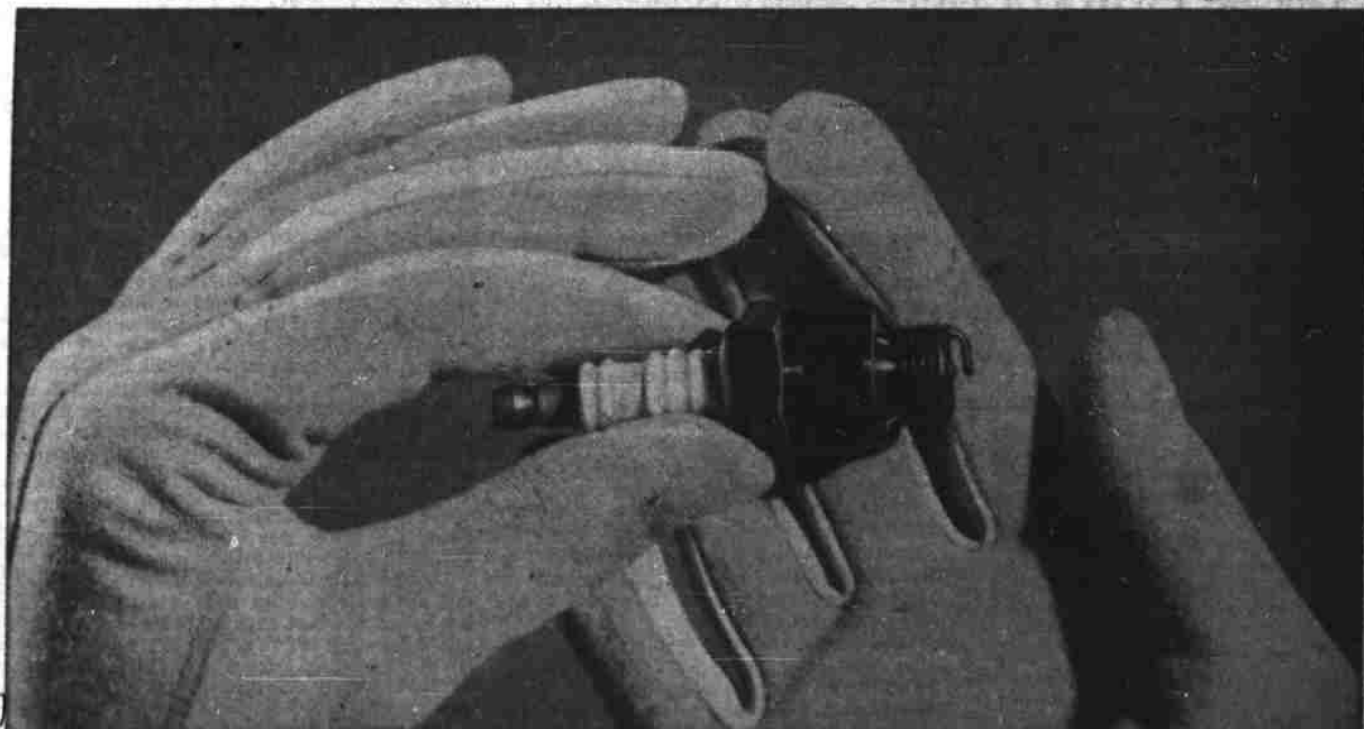


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Ditch-digger, machine at work.

The main dike of the Zuider Zee project is 300 feet wide and 20 miles long. On the top, 21 feet above sea level, is a fine, modern highway. Space for a two-way railroad line also was left on the top. In addition to that dike, several other dikes have been built. These proved less difficult, because the tides were blocked off by the main dike, which shut the mouth of the sea.

More than half of the one-time Zuider Zee has been marked for draining. Already two huge polders are in use for farming, and a third is being made ready.

Outside of the new polders, the sea has been turned into a fresh water lake. This is known as Lake Yssel (also spelled IJssel, and pronounced EYE-sel in either case). Mose kinds of plants will fail to

grow in soil which has been soaked with salt water. The Dutch learned this fact hundreds of years ago. They have found various ways to take the salt out of the soil.

After the water is pumped away from an area, several canals are completed so that boats can move in the midst of the soft, spongy soil. Then ditches are dug in such a way as to form a network.

It is easy to say that "ditches are dug," but the general story is remarkable. Machines known as ditch-plows are built for this special purpose. In one polder, the plows provided 25,000 miles of ditches. When rain water sped through the soil, it kept taking salt away to the ditches. The salt water was moved through the ditches and canals, and at length went into the North Sea. Now that polder has excellent soil for crops.

Maryland Renames Its GOP Governor

BALTIMORE (U)—Gov. Theodore Roosevelt McKeldin smashed a precedent and survived a Democratic trend last night by becoming the first Republican governor ever re-elected in Maryland.

The 53-year-old Baltimorean defeated Democrat H. C. Byrd, former University of Maryland president in an election which saw the Democrats:

1. Regain a 4-3 majority of the seven-man House of Representatives delegation, where the Republicans had won the same edge in the 1952 Eisenhower landslide.

2. Elect Democrat C. Ferdinand Sybert, former speaker of the House of Delegates, attorney general over the Republican incumbent, Edward D. E. Rollins.

3. Strengthen their control of the State Legislature.

With 1,095 of the state's 1,345 polling places reporting, McKeldin had 331,724 votes to 278,739 for Byrd.

Arkansas Nixes GOP Bid For Governorship

LITTLE ROCK, Ark. (U)—Democrat Orval E. Faubus yesterday turned back a determined campaign by Republican Pratt C. Rummel to win election as governor of Arkansas.

Unofficial returns from 1,409 of the state's 2,354 precincts gave Rummel 59,619, Faubus 106,526.

Democratic Gov. Francis Cherry was defeated by Faubus in last August's party primary.

Sen. John L. McClellan and Arkansas' six House members, all Democrats, were re-elected without opposition.

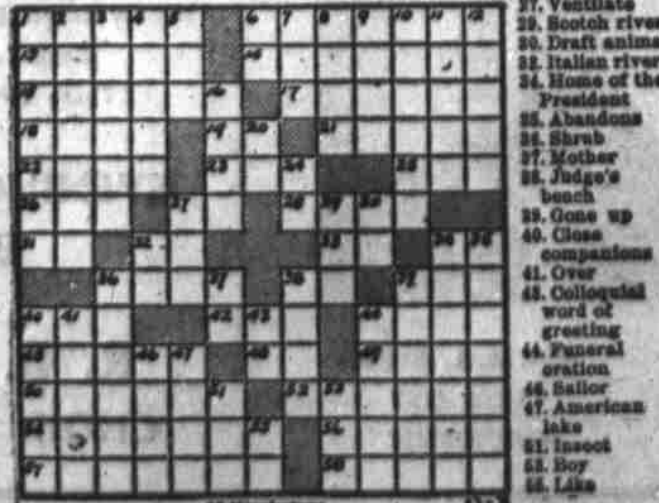

Coaches Carl Coleman and Wayne Bonner did not want to take the chances of hurting any of their boys. They want a hale and hearty crew to face the Bucs.

LOOKING 'EM OVER

Don't rely on statistics to compare the Big Spring and Breckenridge football clubs, which meet in Breckenridge this weekend. Records are not very dependable, either.

Breckenridge has played the tougher opposition but the Big Spring club that took the field against such teams as Andrews, Yaleta and Lamesa is not the same club that exploded against Plainview and routed Levelland.

Actually, there's little to distinguish the two teams in the statistical debate. Breck has rolled up 1,949 yards rushing in six games. The Steers have carved out ground gains of 1,914 in seven.

Through the air, the Buckies have been able to move the ball 396 paces, compared to 467 yards for Big Spring.

The overall gains favor Big Spring, 2,381 to 2,345, but, of course, Big Spring has played one more game.

Big Spring clouted Levelland, 20-0, whereas Breck was tied by the Lobos, but the Steers' total yardage in the game wasn't much more than that compiled by the Bucs against the same foe.

It's going to be a real party, this one coming up, and I wouldn't miss it for the world.

Ray (Shorty) Snyder, the retired merchant who now makes all sports his business, picked Big Spring to topple Levelland, 26-6, in that game last week. Big Spring won by 20 points.

This week, Snyder sees a 15-7 win for the Steers over Breckenridge.

The inevitable is occurring. Big Spring's Frosty Robinson is being compared to Hollis Gaine, the Colorado City whirlwind dervish who is leading the Wolves to an undefeated season.

How are you to measure one's ability against that of the other? Robinson is big and bruising, a terror on straight power plays and faster than you think. Gaine is lightning-fast, nearly unstoppable if he gets in an open field.

Robinson will be the more sought-after by colleges, because he is bigger and can take more punishment. Gaine, as a matter of fact, may not even play college ball, because he is a tremendous athlete in track and his ability in that sport may earn him a full scholarship at any of the major schools.

Why not think what a terrific combination the two might make were they placed in the same backfield. Robinson, for straight power down the middle, Gaine for outside speed, laterals, etc.

Such a twosome would compare with Army's great Doc Blanchard and Glenn Davis.

Robinson and Gaine may very well get to play together in next summer's all-star game, too. They have inside tracks for berths on the North squad.

When Vernon upset Sweetwater in that 1-AAA thriller at Vernon last weekend (and opened the door for Big Spring to grab first place in the standings), the Lions made only 12 yards passing, Sweetwater only 15.

The chilly temperatures probably had a lot to do with the teams' decision to stick to the ground.

Little League Boundaries Drawn For Next Season

Officers for the 1955 Little League season will be elected at a Thursday evening meeting in the Justice of Peace office at the county courthouse.

The conclave gets under way at 7:30 and all managers, sponsors and other interested persons have an open invitation to attend.

A committee composed of League Presy Buster Bradford, D. R. Garton and Tom Farquhar have combined to draw up boundary lines for future leagues, in compliance with directives sent out by the National Little League headquarters.

In the future, the T Shirt League will be identified as the Texas League. Its boundaries will extend north of Highway 80, east to the county line and west to the city limits. It will also extend along an imaginary line running north and south along the east side of the rodeo grounds, follow the state park road and continuing along the Garden City road to the county line.

The National League territory will include all area west of Runnels and south of Third streets, fanning out to the city limits and extending to the county line.

As for the performance of the boys themselves, Coleman said it was praiseworthy "although the blocking was not as good as it was against Plainview the previous week."

Coleman contended that the team's blocking would have to improve against Breckenridge, if the team stands a chance to win. "Even then," Coleman added, "we cannot afford any mental lapses, or any letdown. We've got to put four quarters of good football together."

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SWC Clubs Should Be In Top Shape

Southwest Conference football teams should be in their best condition of the season Saturday when they play three important games. Even Baylor, which has gone into every contest thus far with at least one keyman on the injury list, expects to be at full strength as the Golden Bears make their bid to stay in the championship race against Texas.

Word today was that the starting tackles, James Ray Smith and Bill Green, who have been handicapped by various hurts, will be able to give their all against the Longhorns. And with L. G. Dupre, heart of the ground attack, his robust self again the Bears will be at their height.

Texas will have several of the players put out of action because of disciplinary measures back to bolster its resurgence that was evidenced in a terrific second half against Southern Methodist last week. Tackle Gray, who was demoted from the starting lineup, will be one of the chastened players due to return to action.

"The boys have paid their penalty," said Coach Ed Price. "They have been working hard and deserve an opportunity to play Saturday."

Only Charley Brewer, the starting Texas quarterback, missed practice. He had a sore neck. But Price expects him to return to work today and be ready to play Saturday.

Moegle Deserves Lofly Rating

HOUSTON (U)—Dicky Moegle made a giant stride toward All-America with what he did in the Cotton Bowl last Jan. 1.

The great Rice halfback scored three touchdowns and raced to 263 yards against Alabama in the New Year's Day game.

The critics said all he needed to do was report for practice this season and he would be "in."

Moegle, however, hasn't ridden on his past reputation. He's been playing All-America football in Rice's six games thus far. And Saturday he can strike his greatest blow for the honor as he rolls against undefeated, untied Arkansas.

Moegle is ahead of last year. He has gained 508 yards running with the ball, an average of 84.3 yards per game. Last year he averaged 83.3.

He has returned eight punts for 118 yards and by maintaining his average can better 1953's mark of 194 yards.

He has caught 14 passes for 138 yards and he has scored 54 points. That's only seven points behind 1953 when he made 61.

Defensively, Moegle has been a jewel of consistency. He is probably the finest defensive back in the nation.

Moegle's record has been built against strong teams, too. He has played against Big Ten, Southeastern Conference, Southwest Conference and Ivy League outfits. He made 105 yards against Texas, 61 against Wisconsin although carrying only 10 times and had his worst night against Southern Methodist when held to 41 yards by SMU's defense designed primarily for him.

Moegle is ahead of last year.

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Meanwhile, Rice Coach Jess Neely came mighty close to predicting his team would give Arkansas the fight of its young life in the conference headliner at Little Rock. "I think our boys are thoroughly conscious that the blue chips will be down Saturday and will give it an all-out effort," said Neely as he drove his Owls hard for the game with unbeaten, untied Arkansas on a day when Rice must win to stay in the race.

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Robison Retains Lead In Rushing

Big Spring's Frosty Robison has lengthened his lead in individual rushing in District I-AAA football play with an aggregate of 537 yards in 39 carries.

The figures, compiled by Dale Walton of the Snyder Daily News, is for conference games only. Robison's average gain is 8.1 yards.

In second place is Jake Sander, Breckenridge, who has gained 321 yards in 29 tries for an 11-yard average.

Brick Johnson, Big Spring, dropped to third place after last week's game at Levelland, having picked up 214 yards in 44 tries for a 7.1-yard average.

In passing, Jerry Pearson of Vernon remains the leader, although he was hobbled by Sweetwater last week.

Pearson has 24 completions in 54 tries for total yards of 384 yards. Mack Freeman of Levelland has gone over the 1000-yard mark with 1001 yards and has one more completion but Pearson's average gain is greater, 15.9 yards to 15.3.

Tommy McAdams, Big Spring, who enjoyed a fine night against Levelland, is third with 183 yards gained in ten completions. McAdams has only thrown the ball 24 times.

Gary Lawton, Levelland, is the leading pass receiver, with nine successful efforts, good for 160 yards.

Gene Miller, Vernon, is second with ten completions in 137 yards while Robison, Big Spring, is third, with 111 yards in five completions.

Ken Bartlett, Lamesa, is the leading punter, having averaged 38.8 yards in 13 tries.

Key Man
Primo Villanueva, a soft-spoken minister's son from Calexico, Calif., is the key man in the attack of UCLA. No. 1 team in this week's Associated Press football poll. The speedy 160-pounder is filling the shoes of Paul Cameron, UCLA's All-American left half-back in 1953. Villanueva, a senior, averaged 8 yards as he ran the ball 14 times against California last Saturday. He completed 7 of 10 passes. (AP Wirephoto).

Leon Hart Wins His \$25 Rebate

DETROIT, (AP)—Lanky Leon Hart, a player who for four years has resisted playing defense for the Detroit Lions, made himself a quick \$25 Sunday because he was forced to play that position.

Those who know say Hart's aversion to the defensive end position isn't because he's a prima donna—it's just smart business. Those who play for money must maintain a reputation and oft-talked about defensive stars are rare.

But Sunday, when defensive end Sonny Gandee was injured against the Los Angeles Rams, Hart was sent in to replace him.

It was early in the second period when big Leon, who stands 6-feet-5 and weighs 255, committed a bit of larceny that Coach Buddy Parker went for \$25 worth.

Hart was rushing in the backfield. Norm Van Brocklin had the ball when Leon, all arms at the time, swiped it from him, turned and ran 22 yards for the touchdown that put Detroit ahead, 17-14, for the first time in the game. The Lions finally won, 27-24.

A few days ago Parker had fined Hart \$25 for missing dinner at the Lions' pregame camp in Pasadena. Following the game he yelled at Hart:

"Hey, Leon, you can forget about that dough. We are rescinding that fine after the great game."

Parker, who is used to "great games, knows what it takes to keep his ball club on top of the National Football League standings—as they are now in a tie with the San Francisco 49ers.

Since Parker has coached the Lions beginning with the 1951 season, he has never lost more than one game at a time. They have held the NFL championship since 1952 and Parker appears ready to help himself again this season.

Parker, who usually has little to say, is a master at picking talent—and utilizing it. Some say his success is team psychology, some say it's sheer coaching talent.

Nobody's sure, but whatever it is, the Lions have it.

Don Aiken Is Lost To Mustang Team

SWEETWATER (SC)—Sweetwater's Mustangs lost the services of their quarterback, Don Aiken, for the remainder of the season Tuesday.

Aiken underwent an emergency appendectomy. The hard-luck junior had a hand injury earlier this year.

Harold Hobbs, star halfback of the Ponies, probably will miss this week's game with Plainview due to a knee injury.

The James brothers prevailed in last night's first indoor wrestling show here but they had a big assist from Referee Billy Weidner.

Jesse and Johnny James had their hands raised in victory over Doc Gallagher of Bayonne, N. J., and Frankie Hill Murdock, Waco, Texas, in a tag match.

Gallagher and Murdock, who was a last-minute substitute for Bob Geigel, tried Weidner's patience with excessive fouling.

Carnegie Tech Enjoying Life As Small Team

PITTSBURGH, (AP)—Remember the "good old days" when Carnegie Tech had one of the powerhouse football teams which came through with victories over such teams as Notre Dame?

Today, Tech has a 6-0 record among the small colleges. It's playing a de-emphasized schedule, has been since the early 40s and has no intention of trying to become "big time" again.

The administration and the football coaching staff are of one mind on that.

Dr. J. C. Warner, Tech president, has repeatedly said his school is more interested in providing a good education than in big time football teams.

Dr. Eddie Baker, the 45-year-old dentist who has been coach at Tech for several years, says the Tech program suits him just fine.

"Everyone is happy at Tech as far as football is concerned," grinned Baker who has a full-fledged dental practice. "This is a wonderful place to be a coach. Don't think I'm wrong."

Baker, who played a lot of quarterback for Pitt under the late Dr. John B. (Jack) Sutherland, has seen plenty of so-called high pressure football.

Through the years, whenever a vacancy arose at Pitt, the name of Baker has been mentioned. Eddie goes on tutoring at Tech with a coaching staff made up of part-time assistants.

"I guess our combined salaries wouldn't touch the salary of a head coach in one of the 'big time' schools," said Baker.

Tech, now in its 46th season on the gridiron, started to gain national attention in the last game of the 1950 season by beating Washington & Jefferson, then a powerhouse, 6-0.

Three years later Tech upset a strong Pitt team, 7-2. And in 1952 came a game which gained national attention. A strong Notre Dame team scheduled its first game in history with Tech here and the Tartans promptly upset the Irish, 19-0, the only blemish on their season record.

In 1938 Tech was still on the high road with a team which won the Lambert Trophy, emblematic of the Eastern Intercollegiate football championship.

But in a few years the high cost of fielding a top notch team began to tell. Tech didn't have a big stadium. So, the administration announced a de-emphasis program and made it stick.

Baker came on the scene near the end of the "good old days" as an assistant coach. Prior to that he had been an assistant at Pitt. In 1940-42 Baker was head coach at Tech, winning seven of 22 games. Then came a tour of Navy duty and after that two years as head football coach at Shadyside Academy. In 1949 it was back to Tech on a part-time basis. Since then and up to the start of this season Baker's teams had a 26-12-1 mark.

The only hurdle to an unbeaten season—something that hasn't happened before at Tech—is Washington & Jefferson, to be played next Saturday, and Lehigh the week after. W&J has a 1-5 mark and Lehigh a 2-4 record.

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ABILENE (SC)—The Hardin-Simmons University freshman basketball team will play 22 games this season, E. W. (Bill) Ledbetter, HSU Athletic Director, has announced.

Nine of the games will be played in Abilene. Harold Barrett serves as coach for the Buttons.

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Filchick Signed As Coach Again
REGINA, Sask. (AP)—Frank Filchick, onetime New York Giants quarterback, has signed another one-year contract to coach the Saskatchewan Roughriders of the Union. Filchick, first signed as coach of the Canadian pro team in 1953, guided the Riders to the playoff semifinals for the past two years. They were eliminated in this year's playoff Monday by Winnipeg.

Navy's Ron Beagle Gains AP Laurel

Navy's Ron Beagle, a 6-foot, 185-pound end who rocked Notre Dame on defense and ran the Irish ragged with his pass catches in the Middles 6-0 defeat last Saturday, was named Associated Press Lineman of the Week today.

It was Beagle, a 20-year-old junior from Covington, Ky., who teamed with quarterback George Welsh in a passing attack that worked up the Navy offense and almost paid off in a tying touchdown in the third period.

Beagle snared a Welsh toss on the Notre Dame six and had an open path to the touchdown, but the slippery field spilled him as he tried to cut after making the catch. Four plays later the Middles fumbled just a foot from the goal and Notre Dame recovered in the end zone.

Beagle's defensive play matched his offensive work and prompted Edward (Moose) Krause, Notre Dame athletic director, to praise him as "one of the best defensive players I've seen this year. Truly an All-American."

An outstanding sophomore last year and the only letterman flanker on the 1954 Navy team, Beagle is the second end to be named in the Lineman of the Week series this season. He joins Tennessee's Tom Tracy, named Back of the Week, as the outstanding players in collegiate football last Saturday.

It was Beagle's all-around excellence that gave him the edge over Notre Dame's Sam Palumbo, who made the bruising tackle that ripped the ball loose in the all-important fumble on the Irish goal line.

Hofheinz Renamed Houston's Mayor After Bitter Fight

HOUSTON (U-P)—Roy Hofheinz, 40-year-old radio executive, has won a bitter campaign for a second term as Houston's \$25,000-a-year mayor.

The former county judge and state legislator jumped into an early lead and never trailed last night in unofficial returns from the hot, three-way race that had at stake the job as "strong mayor" of the South's largest city.

Failing to gain a majority of first choice votes under the city's preferential ballot system, Hofheinz won with an unofficial plurality of 8,863 after second-choice votes were added into the tabulations.

Hofheinz had 34,250 first choice votes and picked up 3,007 as second choice.

Louis Welch, former city councilman who ran second behind Hofheinz two years ago, narrowly edged out the third candidate, Attorney Alvin Moody, for the run-off spot.

William B. Butler, Republican candidate for Congress, made a strong bid but was defeated by Democratic Rep. Albert Thomas, who won a 10th term. Incomplete and unofficial returns gave Thomas 59,878 votes to Butler's 35,197.

A bitter struggle between Liberal and Conservative factions saw the Liberals take two out of three seats on the school board and reverse the current 4-3 majority held by the Conservatives.

Case, Friend Of Ike, Leads In New Jersey

NEWARK, N.J. (U-P)—Republican Clifford P. Case led by 664 votes in New Jersey's race for the U.S. Senate on the basis of unofficial returns from all voting districts today, but some absentee ballots remained to be counted.

His Democratic opponent was Rep. Charles A. Howell. Last night Howell announced that he had become the first Democrat to be elected to the Senate from New Jersey in 13 years. But within a few hours, the state chairman of both parties said the vote was so close they would demand a recount.

In the state's 14 congressional races, the Republicans preserved their 8-6 edge. They have held a majority of the state delegation to Congress for the last 40 years.

Harrison A. Williams Jr., Democratic incumbent who scored a surprise victory in a special election last year, was re-elected to Congress in the usually Republican 6th District. He defeated Fred E. Shepard, Republican, by more than 21,000 votes.

The Republican candidate, although specifically endorsed five times by President Eisenhower, had to overcome the enmity of GOP elements which called him "too liberal." He was also opposed by Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy (R-Wis.).

DES MOINES (U-P)—A GOP sweep in normally Republican Iowa was assured today, accompanied by the defeat of Democratic Sen. Guy M. Gillette in a reversal of the general trend nationally.

Rep. Thomas E. Martin, after eight consecutive sessions in the House, will move up to replace Gillette, who has been a member of Congress 18 years. This was the race on which the GOP concentrated in yesterday's general election.

Iowans sent back to Washington the solid GOP delegation of eight to House.

The only real threat to a complete Republican victory came in the race for the governorship, but this too faded. Atty. Gen. Leo A. Hoegh, who sought to succeed his retiring fellow Republican, Gov. William S. Beardsley, started out with a growing advantage. Then he lost the lead temporarily to Democrat Clyde E. Herring. But he recovered and moved further and further ahead.

With 2,065 of 2,483 precincts tallied, the standing in the senatorial contest was: Martin, 571,096; Gillette, 540,508. For governor it was: Hoegh, 385,994; Herring, 345,955.

SIoux FALLS, S.D. (U-P)—Sen. Karl Mundt led a full ticket of two Republican congressmen and state officials into office in yesterday's election although by margins incomplete returns showed were about 30 per cent under those the GOP rolled up in 1952.

The GOP leads remained so much narrower than two years ago that Ward Clark, state Democratic

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chairman, refused to concede for his ticket until the polls had been closed for seven hours.

With 1,583 of the state's 1,965 precincts reported, Mundt, who won national fame by presiding over a Senate committee hearing the McCarthy-Army hassle, had 95,587 against 74,743 for Kenneth Holm, his Democratic rival.

Joe Foss, Marine ace of World War II, went into the governor's chair with nearly a 20,000-vote margin over Democrat Ed C. Martin.
