FARM PRIZE PROGRAM STARTS SATURDAY

County Auction Sales Seem Assured

Committee Reports Interest Shown In Important Matter

Stockmen and Farmers To Benefit By Sales

The committee recently appointed by W. K. Crawley, to go into the matter of whether Lamesa and Dawson county should have regular auction sales of livestock, have been at work for some time and a definite report from them is daily expected.

The committee is composed of Eric Barron, chairman, Lee Billingsley, Leonard Breeding, Sol Cleveland, and Gene McAllister.

A great deal of interest is being and has been manifest among the farmers, stockmen and business men of Lamesa in this proposition and it seems an assured fact that Lamesa will have these regular auction sales beginning at an early date. The only question seems to be whether they will be held and conducted by local men or from operators in other cities.

As has been pointed out, these sales are being held regularly in Lubbock, Big Spring and Sweetwater, and many citizens from this county take stock to them to sell. It is hoped by those who are sponsoring the movement, that with the inauguration of the local sales, it will not only be much more convenient for breeders to sell their stock here, but the expense of selling will be much less if they do not have to carry them so far to market.

As quickly as the committee has a definite report to make, it will be given to Courier readers.

Possibly Two Boys To Be Sent To Fair At San Francisco

Awards To Be Made To Outstanding Club Boys

According to Joe C. Williams, Dawson County Agent, it is certain that one 4-H Club boy will be awarded a trip to the San Francisco World's Fair and possibly two will get the trip.

As announced last week the outstanding club boy in Dawson County will be selected about April 1st, and his reward will be an expense-paid trip to the Treasure Island Exhibit.

This trip should be one that will be appreciated by the recipient, as reports from San Francisco where the fair has just opened, indicate that there will be many interesting and worthwhile things to see.

Besides the trip to the Fair, it is planned for the tour to include many interesting points in and around Los Angeles, and intermediate points. If at all possible, according to Williams, two boys will be awarded this coveted trip from this county.

Thirty-two boys from the district are to receive the trip and plans call for them making the trip in a caravan together.

Brought Here After Their Arrest At Gilmer

Three men were lodged in the Dawson County jail this week by Sheriff Buck Bennett, charged with theft of maize in this county.

Charley Horton, 38, Eunice Lloyd, 24, and Loyce Cannon, 20, all of whom gave their home as Gilmer, were arrested in that city last Wednesday on advice of Sheriff Bennett and were returned by Mr. Bennett, Sunday. Two loads of maize were reported recovered by the sheriff's department.

The men face felony charges in two cases in Dawson County and one case in Martin county.

The men are being held here in jail to await the action of the Dawson County grand jury which will convene in April.

The men allegedly backed their trucks up to ricks of maize in this county, taking the heads to another city where they were threshed, and taking the threshed grain to East Texas, where it was to be sold.

One of the campaign promises of Sheriff Bennett was that he would break up the maize stealing in Dawson county, and this action would indicate that he intends to carry those promises to completion.

"We will not be satisfied until it is possible for a farmer who raises his maize, to pick it up, and not have to worry for fear that it will be stolen," Sheriff Bennett said today.

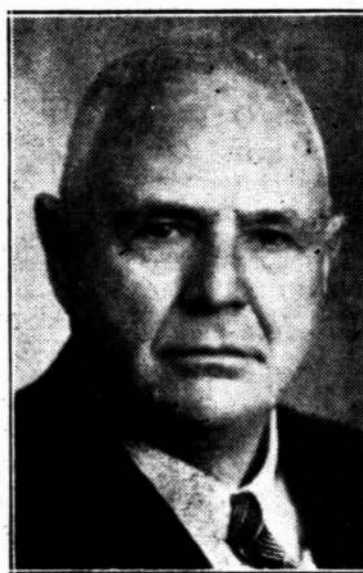

Farm and ranch people of Borden County are going "to put the big pot in the little pot" with a basket lunch at noontime that is expected to set a record for a "dinner on the grounds."

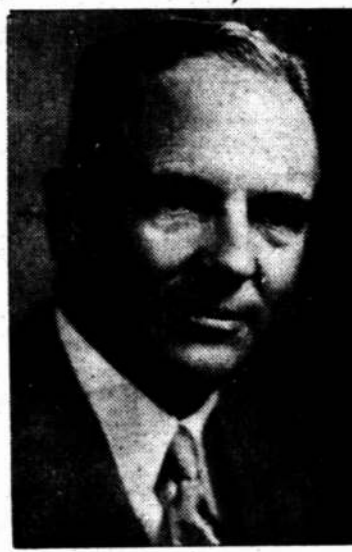

It has been very reliably reported to the Courier that Mrs. J. E. Watson, of Teague, Texas, has purchased ninety acres of land from E. A. Tweed, on Highways Nine and Fifteen, adjoining the polo field on the southeast. It is further reported that she intends to construct a large and modern Tourist Hotel and that a local architect has been engaged to draw up the plans.

It is understood that a part of the building will be finished as quickly as possible, while the balance will be completed when Highway Fifteen is paved over the gaps east of Lamesa in Borden, Scurry and Fisher counties. It is understood that in the neighborhood of forty thousand dollars will be spent on the building and beautification of the grounds.

SALES ARE UP ON CHEVROLETS FOR LAST MONTH

Continuing the advance that has been apparent ever since introduction of its new 1939 models, Chevrolet sold 51,966 new cars and trucks at retail in January. W. E. Holler, general sales manager, announced at Detroit this week. This compares with 39,469 units in January 1938, and is an increase of 12,566 units or 31.7 per cent.

In the same month, Chevrolet dealers sold 114,375 used cars, or 8,925 more than in January 1938. Combined new and used car sales for the month were 166,341 units, as compared with 144,919 a year ago.

For the past three months, Mr. Holler pointed out, there has been a steady rise in the monthly percentage of increase over sales for corresponding periods in the 1938 model year. In November, the advance was slightly more than 6 per cent; in December it was 25.4 per cent, and in January, 31.7 per cent. Generally improved business conditions, plus the public's enthusiasm over the 1939 Chevrolet, featuring new type knee action and the exclusive vacuum gearshift with steering column control, is credited with the sharp upturn. Mr. Holler said, "The heavy volume of used cars," he added, "is especially gratifying. It shows that in spite of the increased new car business this end of the dealer's operations* is under complete control, so that dealers are in splendid position to move new cars and trucks.

The Bureau of Home Economics has just completed an extensive study of the diets of families of city workers, in which Dr. Hazel K. Stiebeling and her coworkers analyzed 4,000 weekly food records, gathered in 43 cities in 8 regions of the country during 1934-37.

This diet study is a vital part of the great national movement to conserve the country's resources—this time its human resources. It is a movement to prevent "human erosion," to use Dr. Stiebeling's words.

Measured against present day standards of good nutrition, the diets of fully half of these families—40 to 60 per cent—were found to be in need of improvement.

Many of these not so good diets were satisfactory except in one or two respects. But, of course, most of the really poor diets failed to meet the needs of the body in several ways. Sometimes there was not enough food of any kind.

Among the diet faults, there was a striking need for more calcium and more vitamin A. Often a family's food selections did not give them a liberal allowance of the other vitamins and minerals.

Fewer than half of all these families chose foods that would give them what nutritionists call "a safe allowance" of calcium, necessary for the building of bones and teeth and some of the body processes.

A surprisingly large number of all the families, nearly four out of five, did not receive the generous allowances of vitamin A now recommended. Only about one third of the families got enough vitamin A to fully protect them against what is known as nutritional "night blindness"—the failure of the eyes to adjust quickly from bright to dim light, or vice versa.

Although there are many inexpensive sources of vitamin B1 (thiamin), only about half of these families selected foods that would give them a liberal allowance of this vitamin.

And as for vitamin C (ascorbic acid), probably half of the families went without the daily allowance that nutritionists recommend. Ascorbic acid is the vitamin that is so often destroyed in cooking, and must be supplied daily because it cannot be stored in the body.

Only about half the families could be sure of plenty of iron from the foods they selected. The diets of 1 out of every 4 families were plainly short in this mineral which is essential to the work of the red blood cells.

Families with only very small sums to spend bought largely of foods that satisfy hunger at low cost. Their diets were one-sided and rated as "poor" in the studies. Those that spent more money for food had a better chance for well-balanced fare, for most of them bought more milk, eggs, vegetables and fruits, than the very poor families.

But plenty of money for food did not always mean good diets, and small expenditures did not always mean poor diets. Some homemakers managed to serve their families excellent meals, from the standpoint of nutrition, at very low cost. Others spent more, but made poor selections. Out of every 10 families spending enough to get completely satisfactory diets, only 2 to 4 made really wise selections.

Two easy-to-follow rules for securing a diet adequate in all respects are advocated by nutrition specialists.

The first, proposed by Dr. H. C. Sherman of Columbia University, tells how to apportion the food dollar: "Spend as much for milk and cheese, and as much for fruits and vegetables, as you do for eggs, lean meat, poultry and fish."

The second, proposed by the Bureau of Home Economics in "Diets to Fit the

Family Income," gives details for the use of the different types of foods in moderate cost diets:

Milk: Allow one quart daily for each child, 1 pint for each adult. (This includes fluid, dried, or evaporated milk used in cooking. Milk may also be in the form of cheese or ice cream.)

Vegetables and fruits: At least four or five servings per person daily. Every day, at least one serving of each of the following, potatoes or sweet potatoes, tomatoes or citrus fruits, leafy green or yellow vegetables, and fruit.

Eggs: At least 2 or 3 a week for adults, at least 4 or 5 for young children, some in cooking.

Meat, fish or poultry: five times a week. Daily if desired.

Serve a cereal dish daily, and bread and butter at every meal.

In this plan, the most common diet faults are carefully guarded against. First calcium. Calcium is provided in milk—milk of all kinds—and cheese. Skim milk is as rich in calcium as whole milk, and milk does not lose its calcium when it is dried, evaporated, condensed, or made into cheese. Leafy green vegetables may meet much of the body's need for calcium if they are served frequently and eaten in generous quantities.

The plan keeps the need for vitamin A in mind from beginning to end. A daily serving of leafy green, or yellow vegetables provides this vitamin in its least expensive form. Such vegetables as carrots and sweet potatoes, and leafy greens as kale, spinach and turnip tops, are excellent choices. Milk—that is whole milk—butter, egg yolks, and tomatoes also furnish vitamin A.

Ascorbic acid (vitamin C) is provided in the daily serving of tomatoes or citrus fruits. These foods are especially good, partly because their acid helps protect the vitamin, but nearly all the fresh fruits and vegetables we eat furnish ascorbic acid. "Eat some raw fruits or vegetables every day" is a good slogan, for vitamin C may be destroyed in cooking, and the body cannot store a supply.

To be sure of a generous supply of vitamin B1 (thiamin) choose whole grain cereals and other foods that are not highly refined, and serve dried beans and peas often. Pork muscle and chicken and certain vital organs are rich sources of thiamin, and most of the "natural foods" such as milk, fruits and vegetables furnish some.

Leafy and green vegetables and whole grain cereals are inexpensive sources of iron. Egg yolks are rich in this mineral, and some of the other good food sources are liver and dried fruits.

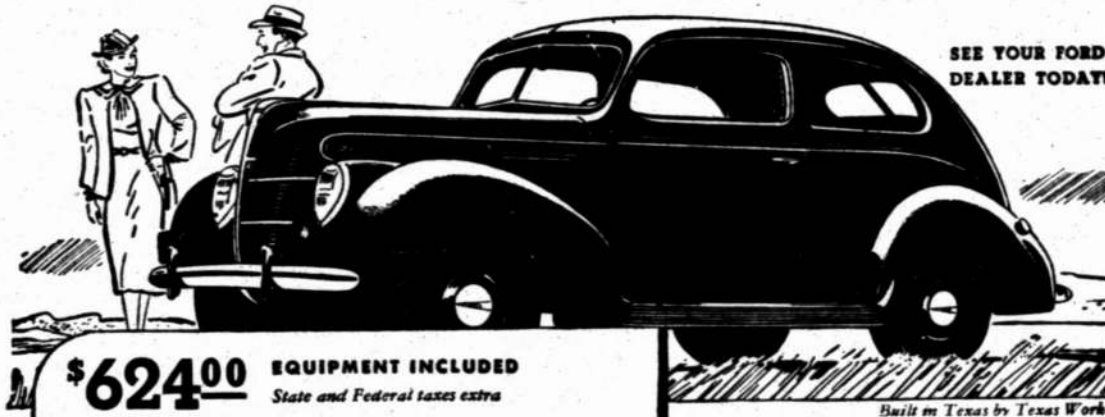

KLONDIKE H. D. CLUB STUDIES TREES

"To protect the farms of the great Central Plains, millions of trees are being planted," said Mrs. Ollie Smith to the Klondike Home Demonstration Club in the home of Mrs. Clyde Edmonson on Tuesday, February 14, at 2:30. These will form a shelter belt

which will reach from North Dakota to Texas.

Since 1935, 2,602 miles of trees have been planted. Many of these trees are now 25 feet tall with trunks as big around as fence posts. For many years trees were cut down with no thought of the future. Then something had to be done. Many farmers began to plant trees. In one year alone, trees cut from farms sold for nearly two hundred million dollars. Mr. J. Sterling Morton, Secretary of Agriculture from 1893 to 1897 started the celebrating of Arbor Day.

There are two giant pecan trees still standing at Mount Vernon that were planted by George Washington from nuts given him by Thomas Jefferson. Many trees on the White House lawn were planted by presidents long passed on.
