Austin—Action of appropriation bills thus far carry out the announced intention of the legislature to trim government expenses by from 25 to 30 per cent. Several of the major items have been finally acted upon by both houses and are in the Governor's hands. There is a difference of some \$600,000 between the House and Senate on the eleventh appropriation. The Senate amended the House bill to provide for construction of building, said to be needed to take care of the increasing number of inmates in various institutions.

This is the only serious difference between the branches of the Legislature with regard to important appropriation bills. For the most part the House schedules have been lower than the Senate, but thus far differences have been compromised without serious difficulty.

The one big question yet to be determined is the amount of support to be provided for public schools. This situation is more difficult than other major items of expense, because schools throughout the State are suffering from the double embarrassment of reduced State support as well as reductions in the payments of local taxes.

During the past few years State support of the public schools has steadily increased. State apportionment in 1923 was \$12,965,960. In 1931 this had been increased to \$27,362,012. Special rural aid appropriations in 1923 were \$1,000,000. In 1931 they were \$2,500,000. Local tax support in the period increased, though by a smaller ratio.

Increases in support from both local and State sources have far outrun increases in enrollment, earning power of the people and the wealth of the State. Likewise public school costs have mounted more rapidly than have the cost of other functions of State government. Illustrating this point, total property assessments in 1923 were approximately three and a half billion dollars. In 1932 they had increased to slightly less than four billions, a gain of about 14 per cent in taxable wealth, compared with increases in expenditures for public schools of considerably more than 100 per cent from the State and somewhat less than 100 per cent from local sources.

It seems fair to point out that while school enrollment was increasing about 10 per cent and taxable wealth about 14 per cent, public school costs were more than doubled. These percentages are average for the State. The factors vary in different localities.

That it will be a difficult problem to adjust these differences goes without saying. It is clear, however, that if the existing standards of support of the public schools is maintained new sources of revenue must be found.

An income tax bill received a favorable report from a House committee. The rates for individuals scale from one per cent on the first \$1,000 of net to seven per cent on amounts in excess of \$11,000. For corporations the rates scale from two per cent on the first \$1,000 to six per cent on incomes in excess of \$6,000.

The sales tax has been killed again in a House committee, but there is talk of it being brought out on a minority report. Its prospects of passage seem slim, but search for needed revenue may win sufficient support to bring about enactment of a modified sales tax on certain specified articles.

The driver of the truck, which was traveling in the direction opposite the bus, did not see the parked car in time to stop and the collision resulted.

Akron Wrecked 73 Men Killed

The Akron, the world's largest airship, fell into the Atlantic off the coast of New Jersey early Tuesday morning, hurling into the water her officers and crew of 77 men, of whom 74 are either dead or missing.

A few hours after the Akron crashed a fleet of warships and powerful airplanes circled the dense fog in search of the survivors.

The mighty aircraft, apparently a victim of lightning and a swift thunderstorm, caught fire and plunged into the water. Four men, who lived through the collapse of the mighty craft, were rescued. One of them was picked up by the first vessel to flash word of the disaster.

Airships can be replaced but the nation can ill afford to lose such men as Rear Admiral William A. Moffett and his shipmates who died with him to end one of the finest traditions of the United States Navy.

Vinson of the House Naval Committee flatly stated: "There won't be any more big ships built. We have built three and lost two of them."

At the time of the disaster the silver Akron was on a trip from Lakehurst to Boston. She was to have cruised along the coast for four days to adjust errors in her radio equipment.

The ship was built in the Ohio city for which it was named in the year of 1931. A "Jinx" dogged her throughout her career.

President Roosevelt joined the nation in its mourning for the loss of the Akron and its crew. He said: "The loss of the Akron with its crew of gallant officers and men is a nation's disaster. I grieve with the nation and especially with the wives and families of the men who were lost."

Loraine people got a good view of the mighty monster of the air last June 12, when it passed over here on a return journey to its home port after making a trip to the west coast. The big ship was caught in a violent thunder storm near San Angelo on her way west a month earlier.

OUTBERT MAN SAYS TERRACING ESSENTIAL

"I would just about as soon have a farm without a fence as to have one without a terrace—they are both essential to good farming," says R. L. Solomon of Cuthbert in a report to the county farm agent. "The 50 acres terraced four years ago has increased in yield every year," he says.

"I made two tons of maize per acre on 25 acres of it using the two-row-skip-one method; 12 acres of cane made 600 bundles per acre," the report continues. "I had one ditch I could not cross on a horse and now I plow across it with ease. Twenty-one of the 70 acres terraced last year made 10,600 pounds of lint cotton. The last fall rains broke my terraces in a number of places but am putting them back in shape this spring. My land cracks open in dry weather and when it rains they are pretty easy to break."

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Current Comment
From Washington

Mr. Roosevelt's fifteen percent cut in federal salaries did not come as a marked surprise to those whom it affected. Although it applies for three months only the President has power to extend it beyond that period, and the indications are that it will be continued for some time. The measure strikes impartially, from members of Congress all the way down the line. When one hears a government job mentioned, the first thought, and often the definite conclusion, is that it is something in Washington. As a matter of fact, about six percent of federal place-holders are located in the capitol city. The pay cut will be felt not only in Washington, where the plums are supposed to grow largest and in greatest numbers, but in the remotest hamlet as well.

The sum of five hundred million dollars seems to be a popular figure. It stands out in large type in two different connections. That much gold is said to have been turned into the Treasury by people who had it salted away, and it is proposed in Congress to appropriate that amount to help the states out of their various woes. It is a good thing, however, that each person in the United States does not need a lift. He would get \$4.07.

There has been a good deal to talk and worry about lately. Bank troubles, lack of work, economy, farm relief, old jobs to be vacated, new ones to be created and filled, and so on. It seems as though that were enough, and

that those were the important things. Yet, judging from the space accorded to it in the papers, the matter of major importance is not included in the list mentioned. It is comprehended under the short title "beer." No discussion of the temperance question is involved or intended, but it is interesting to hold the beer situation at arms length and give it purely objective consideration. With the country solely in need of the aid of the common people in dealing with really serious matters, a very good sized group is represented as being chiefly interested in getting their hands on a beverage that they like and another respectable party is described as putting its energies into an effort to see to it that they shall not. It looks as though both sides would be disappointed. Beer probably will return to circulation, which will be sad for the dries. When it arrives, the wets will find the country wrestling with pretty much the same problems it had before. And in the meantime, statesmen with plans that are really germane to the present trouble are deprived of a great deal of much needed attention and support from a citizenry whose activities for and against beer show that they could accomplish much if their efforts were directed into another channel.

ON TEXAS FARMS

For every dollar spent last year by farmers in fighting insects and diseases attacking field crops Texas, \$12.50 was returned in increased income. A total of 166,452 acres was protected by 6669 farmers with the aid of county agents.

Plenty of home grown feed saves cash, helps the living-at-home program, and makes possible larger livestock profits. Last year 12,674 men and boys cooperated with county agents in growing 189,858 acres of feed crops by demonstration methods from which they received for labor and investment an average of \$70 apiece.

An average of \$250 for labor and investment was made by the 4397 Texas farmers and 4-H club boys who conducted demonstrations in cotton growing last year. The demonstrations averaged 28 acres.

Childress county pantries are displaying airtight boxes of cookies, peanut butter, and crackers in addition to all the other kinds of food as a result of work by the home demon-

stration agent. Women and girls have learned to make peanut butter, cheese straws, vanilla wafers, and butter and whole wheat crackers.

Six self-feeders for hogs were built recently by Harrison county farmers for feeding hogs by county agent methods. Hogs are allowed half tankage and half cottonseed meal, and corn, free choice.

Raising 80 bushels of corn on one acre, making another acre produce 1020 pounds of cotton, raising a flock of 120 pullets which are now producing a monthly income, and on top of all this making his hogs pay him a net profit of \$56, this is the accomplishment of Alvin Weidner, 4-H club boy of Long Point Community in Washington county.

TEXAS GOOD ROAD ASS'N.

Austin, Texas, April 3. During the past two years a total of \$375,000 has been spent on construction of Mitchell county's state highways, of which the county supplied but \$90,000, with state and federal funds making up the balance, amount \$285,000.

This the Texas Good Roads Association reported today from an analysis of the biennial report of the state highway department at the same time warning motorists that only about one-third of the mileage in new roads will be built this year that was built in 1932.

Mitchell county, the analysis continued, received \$12,000 in highway maintenance from the state in 1931, and \$7,000 in 1932.

In addition, the county received the bulk of its auto registration fees for local purposes, only \$1,000 going to the state during the two years, while more than \$54,000 remained in the county treasury.

"The Texas highway system today is a job half finished," the Association's warning said. "Yet motorists in gasoline tax- are being steadily weakened. Only 2 cents of the tax goes to road work this year where three cents went in 1932. There are 200,000 less motor cars on the highway than there were two years ago, and the gas tax revenue fell off \$1,800,000 last year. It will fall more."

"Even if present funds are not disturbed, road construction in Texas this year will be only one third of that last year. Yet there are two bills now before the legislature, one of which proposes mileage in half, and the other to stop all new road building. If motorists will join in concerted action to advise legislature of their will, a catastrophe to Texas can be averted."

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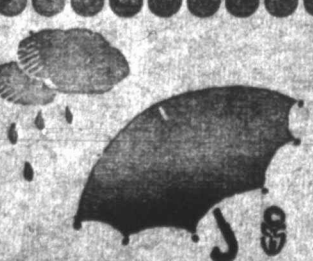
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LONE STAR NEWS
