STRIKES IN NATION ARE SERIOUS NOW

Strike threats against telephone and trucking industries developed out of bargaining deadlocks today, but the captive coal mine dispute remained as the most critical controversy imperiling defense production in the nation today.

The Federation of Long Lines Telephone Workers announced at 15,000 members will strike 42 states at 12:01 a. m. Saturday, unless wage demands are met.

The union promised, however, to maintain sufficient lines for essential defense purposes in case their demands were not met and a strike was called.

CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—Fourteen operating unions, embracing 100,000 railway workers, today rejected wage recommendations of President Roosevelt's emergency fact finding board, but did not order a strike.

HOUSTON, Nov. 13.—First election in Texas under the so-called "Daniel anti-violence strike law" was handed down in district court today against John Adams, president of the American Federation of Labor Teamsters' Union local.

Title Certificate Will Be Needed To Register An Auto

According to instructions given by S. Karkalis, tax assessor-collector, by the Texas Highway Department, Austin, Sec. 63, paragraph of the Certificate of Title Act requires that the Department of Motor Vehicles shall not register or re-register any motor vehicle unless the owner has in his possession an official certificate of Title.

If you owned your motor vehicle prior to October 1, 1939 and have not secured your Certificate of Title you may do so by applying through the Tax Assessor-collector's office furnishing evidence of ownership such as a license receipt or bill of sale prior to October 1, 1939.

University Oil Leases Will Go Under Hammer

AUSTIN.—The University of Texas' 11th public auction of oil and gas leases on the university's wide-flung West Texas lands will be held in Austin Nov. 14 with two changes.

The sale this time will be conducted in a hotel ballroom and its auctioneer will not be picturesque Colonel E. Walters of Skedee, Okla.

New auctioneer will be M. M. Mullins of Houston. Mullins has been in Austin recently going over the data on the tracts to be offered at the auction.

Under Colonel Walters' hammer the University of Texas has disposed of leases for which cash bonuses totaling millions of dollars have been paid.

Beside the cash bonus the purchaser pays over to the University of Texas, he is required to pay the university a royalty of one-eighth of the oil or gas produced in the tract. After the first year, the purchaser pays an annual acreage rental on the tract until oil or gas is produced in commercial quantities. Then royalties supplant the rental. The purchaser pays, too, an auction fee of one per cent of the amount of his successful bid.

Previous University oil and gas lease auctions were held in the Law Office building or in the hearing room of the State Highway Department. Lack of room in these buildings has necessitated a transfer of the auction to the Stephen F. Austin hotel.

Colonel Walters seldom sees his name written or printed correctly. Colonel is his first name, not a military title. Now over 75 years of age, he has been auctioning land for the University of Texas for almost 10 years and for the U. S. Department of Interior for more than 30 years.

Over six feet tall, straight as an Indian's arrow, Colonel Walters is an imposing personage. His dress accentuates his personality. With a celluloid collar he wears jewelry worth thousands of dollars—gifts from Indian tribes whose land he has sold to their advantage.

Soldier Finds Way To Beat The Cold

CAMP BOWIE, Brownwood.—The shortest distance between two points may be a straight line but even that is too far for Private Gerald Sorrells these nippy Texas mornings.

Private Sorrells, a member of the 36th Division Headquarters company, has devised a means of lighting a stove in the cold early hours of the morning without leaving the protective warmth of his bed.

He attached a strong cord to the jet of the tent stove and ran it across the floor, with the other end under the covers of his bed. Then the soldier practiced awakening thirty minutes before reveille until it became a habit.

Now, long before the first bugle blast that stirs the camp, Private Sorrells wakes, gives the cord a yank while still in bed. The cord pulls open the jet, turns on the gas and the pilot light. By the time the stove does the rest. By the time he and his tent mates arise, the structure is cozy warm while the sound of scampering feet in nearby tents is testimony to the temporary discomfort of those gathered around the stoves lighted only after the bugle call.

Theatre Has Five Stages To Prevent Waiting on Scenes

WACO.—Imagine a theatre with five stages!

Imagine one where the audience doesn't have to wait until a stage hand changes sets. Long intermissions for set changes are old-fashioned now.

In a multiple-stage theatre at Baylor University the audience just swings around in swivel chairs to watch the play after a split-second delay between acts.

Baylor's five-staged studio theatre, sponsored by the Rockefeller Foundation, had as its first presentation Shakespeare's Macbeth. Macbeth was chosen because it best illustrates the advantages of the many stages for one production. The play requires many changes in scene and costume, handled in stride by the group in charge of the production of the new play-house.

How is the sound and lighting handled? Simple.

A central control booth, hanging from the center of the theatre, is operated by an expert. The location of the booth gives view to all stages, causing comparatively no delay in the performance.

The five stages are equipped with trap doors to the semi-basement beneath the 28-foot stage. The orchestra pit is almost concealed. The audience is seated at different levels for adequate view of all stages.

Paul Baker, Baylor drama professor, has executed this "dream theatre" and he claims that there is "nothing like it in the nation or the world." He was assisted by Elwell, New York stage designer, and playwright Lynn Riggs, script-writer who has turned out Broadway and screen hits.

The theatre contains 150 swivel seats and executives in charge believe a capacity crowd will witness all the season's plays. The groups will present ten performances of each play, Baker said.

"Drama students like the intimate rehearsal sessions best," Baker said. "It's just like home to them."

While he directs a mob scene on one stage, actors may be practicing a love scene on another, and a villain may be chasing a heroine across another; it sometimes happens that a singer is giving vent to a strong—and loud—voice.

Baker said that this would seem enough, but Riggs is continually changing scripts and Elwell constantly moving scenery all over the place.

Rev. Elrod Is To Preach a Farewell Sermon Sunday

Rev. Clarence C. Elrod, pastor of the Presbyterian church in Ranger, will preach his farewell sermon at the local church this coming Sunday morning. The service will start at 11 o'clock.

Rev. Elrod has resigned the pastorate of the Ranger church to accept the pastorate of the Community Church at Kermit. The church at Kermit has a unique plan of having members of different denominations to worship together and work together under the leadership of one pastor.

BRITISH NOW CLAMOR FOR A NEW FRONT

An all-out offensive toward the Caucasus oil fields appeared to be developing today as the first blow of the winter warfare along the great Middle-Eastern Front.

The shift of German pressure toward the southern end of the Eastern Front brought new Labor demands in the British parliament for a clear declaration of British intentions regarding the opening of a second front to relieve the Red Army. It also brought out a statement that the failure to take the initiative was "indefensible" if the Allies now hold the superiority over the Luftwaffe as was reported recently in the House of Commons by Prime Minister Winston Churchill.

The British controversy was over a long chain of developments involving the German drive against Rostov and Kerch, and a threat of a Japanese explosion in the Far East. It also involved the question of whether the United States would enact the neutrality revision measure and solve her labor problems, which the speaker of the House of Commons described as "painfully crippling" the American war air for the Allies.

Scout Noble Robertson of Troop 12, Ranger, received the Life Scout Badge at a District Court of Honor held in Cisco Thursday night. Scout Robertson with others successfully passed the Board of review composed of H. C. Scruggs, Frank M. Hicklin and D. W. Phillips, on Nov. 6.

Tech Co-Eds Have Borrowing Habit If They Need Clothes

LUBBOCK.—If the skirt, sweater, or ankle fits you, wear it, is the modern co-ed's version of an ancient adage, judging by a recent survey of clothes-borrowing habits at Texas Tech. Estimates on habitual borrowing from friends and roommates ranged from 30 to 95 per cent of the women students enrolled, with an average of 72 per cent, yet only 54 per cent of the young women polled admitted borrowing themselves.

Sweaters were most frequently loaned, with jewelry, anklets and skirts tying for second position. Ribbons, evening dresses, blouses and jackets were least likely to be passed around.

Borrowing etiquette, it was agreed, stipulated early return of borrowed finery, repair of damage or soil, and a willingness to lend one's own wearing apparel.

One young woman recounted her most tragic experience as lending a \$10 hat when she was a freshman and having it returned "looking as if it had been sat on or run over by a car." Another recalled tearing her roommate's skirt on a car bumper, and a third had strong, cheap perfume poured on a borrowed sweater from which the odor never disappeared. Holes from cigarette ashes, acid from chemistry labs, and red paint spilled on other garments brought about embarrassing situations.

Young men polled for opinions on feminine borrowing approved, "if the clothes are returned in good condition and the practice not carried to extremes." One man student expressed the wish that they would at least borrow clothes to suit their type and size. Another confessed that "if girls became to communistic with their clothes, it could be disillusioning."

"Believe it or not," said a third, "a few boys notice the clothes a girl wears and it is embarrassing to date the same dress no matter whom you call for at the dorm."

Admitting the subject was out of his field of knowledge, one sophomore journalist stated "if this problem is anything like that of the male sex, more power to the girls who get to select first."

Mrs. Morgenthau Is Urging Civilians To Aid In Defense

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Mrs. Henry Morgenthau, Jr., wife of the Secretary of the Treasury, today asked the civilian population to organize into a "people's army" to serve as air raid wardens, first aid workers and to fill other capacities in defense of the United States.

Better Times Are Seen For Texas Farmers, Ranchers

"Better times on Texas farms and ranches are reflected in the most consistent farm mortgage debt retirement in years," said W. R. Usery, upon returning from a meeting of national farm loan association heads from this section in Brownwood, Nov. 11.

Records of the Federal Land Bank reveal foreclosure sales and acquisition of farms for the year ending Sept. 30, to be the lowest since 1931 and 20 per cent below that of the previous year.

WTCC Directors Being Polled For Their Opinions

ABILENE.—The West Texas chamber of commerce is on the move asking affiliates for action on declarations adopted by its house of delegates at the Midland convention last week.

To directors, local chamber of commerce managers and to chairmen and secretaries of Public Affairs committees went a news letter from J. Thomas Davis, the re-elected president of the WTCC, enclosing copies of two declarations. One asked for congressional correction of labor abuses in this time of stress, the other for drastic curtailment of non-defense federal spending while the emergency lasts. Davis asked the WTCC affiliates to convene their Public Affairs committees, take affirmative position on the declarations, and notify their senators and congressmen of their action. Copies of the declarations have been sent direct to the Texas delegation in Washington by D. A. Bandoen, WTCC manager.

The declaration on labor abuses vigorously protests activities of "agitators and racketeers in calling strikes in national defense industries at a time when human, material and property resources are being conscripted for defense purposes in order to save democracy." Congress is urged to enact legislation to "correct the abuses of labor as it has corrected the abuses of capital."

On curtailing non-defense federal expenditures the WTCC declaration points to the great and growing burden of defense requirements; with inevitably pyramiding taxes; asks the federal government to "vigorously economize, sacrifice and curtail to the minimum all non-defense expenditures;" and calls on congressmen to give President Roosevelt and the budget bureau encouragement and cooperation in the economy program.

Davis' news letter served as an official curtain raiser on the WTCC's inter-community Defense and Preservation contest in which, to date, 56 towns have entered in competition for \$500 in cash prizes. The activity on the two declarations has been designated as contest items (Project 1, Group 3) and action taken by competing towns will be recorded in their contest files for grading.

Registered Sows Are Purchased By Ranger FFA Boys

Two Ranger Future Farmers of America have purchased registered hogs, which they will use as a nucleus around which they expect to build.

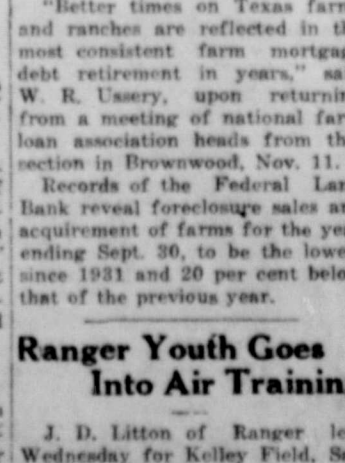

East Texas Iron Deposits May Be Developed Soon

LONGVIEW.—Three corporations pressed forward today to develop East Texas' great, dormant iron beds that stretch across 23 counties.

One of the corporations already was in production, turning out 30 tons of pig iron daily. The corporation, capitalized by local financiers, also has erected a steel refining plant nearby.

Two others—the Sheffield steel company of Houston and a group of Dallas capitalists—were making plans to utilize the ore in the immediate future.

The great iron beds that challenge in size the large Minnesota deposits have been common southwestern knowledge since the Civil War when charcoal furnaces produced iron for manufacture of Confederate war material.

It was not, however, until Julius Madras developed a radical method of smelting two years ago that the East Texas iron beds became of commercial value. The Detroit engineer perfected a process for reduction of iron ore that used cracked natural gas, abundant throughout the state. His method featured a refining process by chemical reaction.

Previous to this iron ore had been smelted by coal and limestone. Lack of these two minerals in the Southwest and high freight rates which prohibited their shipment made it too expensive to mine the East Texas ore.

Much of the East Texas ore, mineralogists report, is of high grade, containing up to 50 per cent iron. This compares favorably with the Mesabi range ore.

Industrialists believe that completion of the proposed Trinity River barge canal in addition to the development of the East Texas ore would constitute a strong boost to the national defense program and could logically help bring about the long-awaited industrialization of the state.

HOUSTON, Nov. 13.—The mystery surrounding the fiery death of J. C. Franklin, 57, investment broker and attorney, whose charred body was found in his burning automobile, deepened today.

Because of the nature of the clues found in the case police suspected that the aged man was the victim of murder.

NEUTRALITY VOTE IS DUE LATE TODAY

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—Administration leaders from the president on down fought with all the resources at their command today to muster enough house votes on the crucial foreign policy test on the question of American ships being allowed to go to belligerent ports.

It still looked like a "photo finish" when the house roll call was to be made late this afternoon.

The house presented the most dramatic and active scene in years. Before the jammed galleries, speaker after speaker went to the house microphones to try to sway their colleagues with speeches.

Adoption of the measure would mean one step nearer to war, and would eventually bring America into the conflict, some of the opposition speakers declared in the floor debate, which has been limited to eight hours.

If it did mean war, then it was worth it, some of the administration leaders argued in rebuttal, in answering the charge that revision of the bill would mean war.

Others of the speakers said this new step was to help Britain defeat Hitler and would help to avoid the necessity of an American Expeditionary Force to aid in winning the war for the democracies.

J. E. Bush Gets 10 Years In The Pen

Entering a plea of guilty to "Repetition of Offense," J. E. (Edwin) Bush of Ranger was sentenced to serve ten years in the State penitentiary Thursday by Judge B. W. Patterson of the 88th district court.

Bush was under indictment by an Eastland county grand jury for theft of cattle. He had twice previously been convicted on similar charges, which made the charge of "Habitual Criminal" applicable in his case.

When Bush decided to plead guilty to the charge of cattle theft, the State eliminated the habitual criminal charge. Both sides waived a jury and evidence in the case was heard before Judge Patterson, who under state laws could only find Bush guilty and fix punishment at ten years confinement in the State penitentiary.

Bush was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of having stolen a milk cow from Coy Kimbrough of Eastland. Evidence showed he took the cow to Fort Worth and sold her. The offense was committed just a few weeks ago.

General May Get Post In The Vichy Government Soon

VICHY, France, Nov. 13.—Gen. Henri Fernand Dentz, whose defense of Syria against the British attacks won him high regard of Berlin officials, was expected today to enter the government of Marshal Henri Philippe Petain as war minister.

Should Gen. Dentz be made a member of the cabinet he would succeed the late Gen. Charles Huntziger, who was killed in an airplane accident yesterday en route to report to Marshal Petain after an inspection trip to North Africa.

Ability and Futility

The grave and reverend senators of the United States
were in session. One of the biggest questions of this critical
period in American history was to be voted on; shall
the neutrality laws be abrogated so the President can
order the arming of merchant ships and allow those ves-
sels to sail to any port of the seven seas, Hitler or no Hit-
ler?

One speaker against modification of the law was
Senator Robert A. Taft of Ohio, one of the chief contend-
ers for the Republican nomination for President last year.
The occasion was a grave one, the subject an enormously
important one, the speaker a man of ability. Yet all af-
ternoon there had been difficulty in securing a quorum. At
one time during his discourse only 15 out of 96 members
were in their seats. Of these, some read newspapers and
rattled them, some wrote letters, some whispered to their
neighbors. Very few actually listened.

This proved what most observers in Washington know
— Senate debates are pretty much futile. The talks are
mostly for the record, so the speaker's words may be read
by the folks back home. Speeches are aimed at the con-
stituents. Senators do not expect or hope to convert any
of their fellow senators. It is very seldom, if ever, that any
conversations have been recorded regarding really big
questions. It would be surprising if some senator arose and
said:

"I was dead against this bill, but the eloquence of
the able senator, the cogency of his argument, the skill of
his reasoning, the marshalling of his facts have convinced
me that he is right and that I have been wrong. I shall
change my vote from nay to yea."

Debates do not change votes, no matter how well some
of them read in cold print. They are just parts of the
show the senators put on.

On matters dealing with the government's foreign
policy, senators on both sides have been repeating them-
selves every time a bill came up. They bored each other
with the same old arguments. They pointed with pride or
they eyed with alarm—according to the way the question
looked. They killed precious time when time was of the
essence in many matters.

If the senators only realized it, the sentiment of most
people could be expressed in one sentence:

"Cut the cackle and get on with the vote!"

County's Farmers Have Been Asked To Raise More Pork and Way To Accomplish This Is Outlined

Eastland County farmers have been asked to increase their production of pounds of pork at least one tenth over the 1941 production in order to do their part in the National Defense Program. If every farmer in the county increases his hog production as possible and still do sound farming, the increase will be much more than the one tenth asked for.

A high percentage of the pigs that are farrowed can be saved if sows are placed in a clean, dry, warm farrowing pen before they farrow pigs and some clean straw

or hay made available to the sow. To prevent the sow from laying on the pigs, guard rails should be put around the wells of the farrowing pen, about 8 inches from the floor and running around the walls about 8 inches from the wall. Guard rails can be made of 2 by 4 lumber, straight poles or any kind of lumber.

If possible to attend the sow while she is farrowing, as each pig is born it should be wiped dry and placed in a warm, dry tub or basket. After the sow is through farrowing take a small pair of wire cutters and cut the tusks

(eye teeth) of each pig close to their gums, then place each pig on a teat of the sow. If the sow is in good health and the weather is not too cold, she can then take care of the pigs. Sitting up with a sow that is farrowing pays well for every extra pig saved means a pretty good day's pay.

Fast feed the 1941 fall farrowed pigs on a good balanced ration for cheap gains and get them off to market before spring farrowing starts. This will also produce hogs ready for home butchering before the weather gets too warm. If hogs are properly fed, 4 pounds of feed should make a pound of gain.

One of the most economical ways to feed hogs is from a self-feeder. Partition the feeder so that grain can be fed in one part and protein in another smaller part of the feeder. A good protein

can be made by mixing 40 pounds of peanut meal or cottonseed meal and 40 pounds of tankage with 20 pounds of finely ground peanut hay. If hogs are running on good green pasture the peanut hay can be left out of the mixture.

If hogs are hand fed instead of using a self feeder, they should have all the grain they will clean up twice per day and a pound of the protein mixture for each eight pounds of grain they are eating. The protein mixture should be mixed with water or slop for feeding unless fed in a self-feeder. Feed pregnant brood sows a pound per day of the protein to produce large litters but feed them only enough grain to keep them in good flesh. Do not let brood sows get too fat. Sows should not have the protein for the last two weeks before farrowing.

Green pasture will cut the cost of feeding hogs about one third. Sow some small grain for pasture now and plan to sow some sudan for hog pasture in April. Native grass such as Bermuda or buffalo are not as good as small grain or sudan pasture for hogs and they supply no green grazing in the winter months.

If pigs have access to a self-feeder when they are three weeks

old they will start eating and will naturally wean themselves when they are eight weeks old. This takes a load off the sow and helps make the next litter larger. For best markets, breed sows so that they will farrow in March and September. This places the hogs on the market in September and

March when hog prices are usually highest.

Keep clean water before hogs all the time. In the winter the water should be warmed and the summer it should be as cool as possible. Hogs can do without

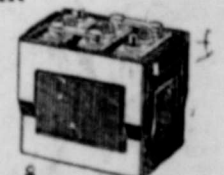

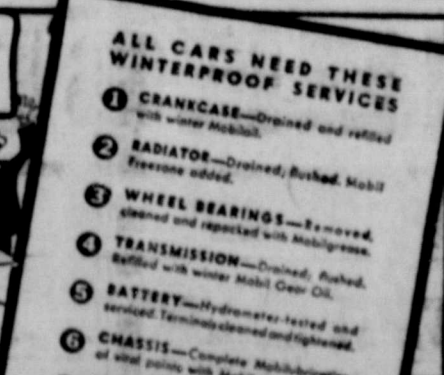

If shade is not plentiful for hot weather it can be provided by building a brush arbor. The shade should be built high so that air will circulate under it well. Hogs should have a wallow for hot weather but this wallow should not be in the shade. The water should be at least 8 or 10 inches deep. A cheap wallow can be made from flat rocks and a little concrete.

If it is known that hogs on the farm have had intestinal worms, it is best to worm the pigs at weaning time with oil of chenopodium or phenothiazine. The county agent or any other agricultural worker can tell you how to worm pigs.

Loose salt should be kept in a dry place available to hogs all the time. No animal can do without salt and no animal known will take too much salt if allowed access to it all the time.

Shopping Bags
May Again Take
Place of Paper

DALLAS, Texas. — Blame it on the war in Europe: Texas housewives may soon start carrying shopping bags again, to hold the articles which they buy in stores. Wrapping paper is getting scarce. Retail merchants, cooperating with the government in a campaign to prevent the waste of paper so that needed supplies will be available for the army and navy and defense industries, today began a campaign to eliminate all unnecessary use of paper bags and wrapping paper. Today was chosen to start the campaign because it is "War Against Waste Day," established in President Roosevelt's proclamation of Civilian Defense Week.

The reason for the campaign is simple. The United States is producing only twenty-one million tons of paper a year, but it is using twenty-six million. That situation cannot go on forever. The government and the merchants want to bring the figures together while there is still time.

The war is directly responsible for this shortage. Huge quantities of paper, especially the kind used for wrapping sacks, are needed in defense industries. In addition, much of the wood pulp which this country uses for making its paper comes in normal times from Finland and Norway, and those supplies, of course, have stopped.

To help solve the problem presented by this paper shortage, organizations representing retail stores of all types have joined a conservation movement and have asked the cooperation of consumers. A resolution approved by eleven retail organizations explained:

"Urgent advice from governmental departments indicate that at the present time the consumption of paper in the United States is exceeding the sources of supply. In the interest of national defense it becomes necessary to immediately curtail all waste and to reduce some of the ordinary civilian uses of paper."

"Therefore, the retail merchants of Texas have pledged themselves

to reduce, as far as possible, their use of paper, and to advise their customers, the consumers of the state, that this program will be carried out at once.

"Consumers will be able to cooperate greatly by reducing as far as possible the demand for paper wrappings, paper bags, and paper in any form not necessary to the processes of distribution or to the comfort or convenience of the household."

This statement was approved by members of the Council of Texas Retailers' Association, including the Retail Association of Texas, Texas Shoe Retailers Association, Texas Hardware Implement Association, Texas Retail Cloth-

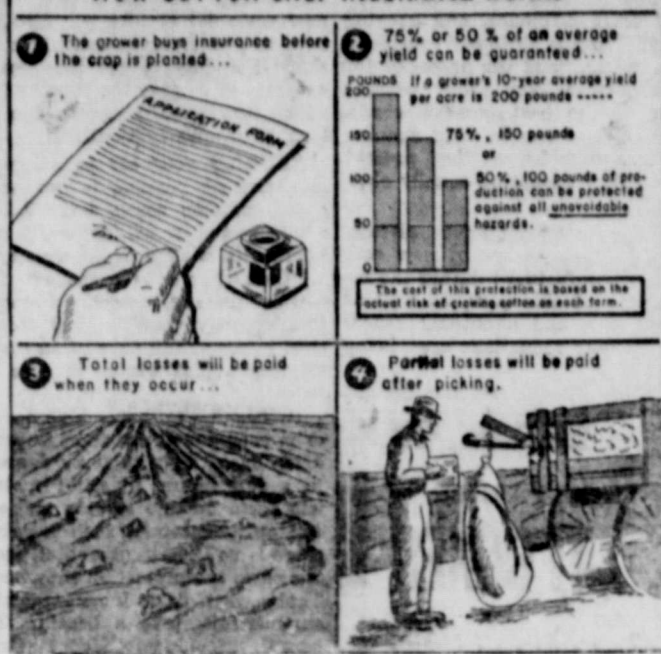
