A committee appointed by President Roosevelt is making plans to bring relief to 100,000 farm families who suffer from the prolonged drought in the States of North and South Dakota, Minnesota, Wyoming, and Montana. Meanwhile Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace is making arrangements for the slaughtering, canning and distribution of meat to destitute families.

In Washington another Democrat, James A. Farley, disclosed that the Democratic party would need two million dollars to bring about the reelection of Roosevelt and Garner, which is slightly less than the amount that elected Roosevelt in 1932. The Republicans have a budget of \$3,000,000.

A grandmother in Arizona would have gained a million if she could have made her jail sentence shorter. A 54-year old grandmother was given thirty days in the Phoenix jail for driving while intoxicated and the little old lady was not pleased with her free boarding house.

It makes no difference in which political cradle we were rocked, but what we are glad to learn that statistics show American business is at the highest in four years. Farmers of this section may be interested to know that almost seven million bales of cotton have been exported this season.

A delegation of 1,000 visitors from New York are expected at the Centennial celebrations in Fort Worth and Dallas on July 31. The delegation will be headed by Mayor La Guardia of New York and will come by special trains.

Pope Pius has ordered a permanent organized flight of the Roman Catholic Church to save the world from the debasing influence of the films. He told his bishops throughout the world to establish boards to advise the faithful of the films they must avoid those which are "offensive to truth and Christian morality."

Farmers in northwest Texas are building trench silos and preserving the whole corn plant, ears, leaves, stalks, and storing them in silos to assure a feed crop for their livestock. The silage is dumped into the trench and water poured on top to preserve the natural qualities of the feed. This operation has proved successful in every part of the state. One farmer reported silage kept as long as four years in a perfect feed state.

Senators in the Louisiana legislature would pass their lobbying bill at any price. The bill provided that people desiring to lobby in the capitol building must wear green skull caps and gaudy plaid trousers and that lobbyist make a deposit of \$1,000 with applications payable to the secretary of the legislature who could withdraw up to \$100 daily.

There are 28 states in the Republic of Mexico, each with a large measure of home rule, a Governor, and a judiciary elected by the people.

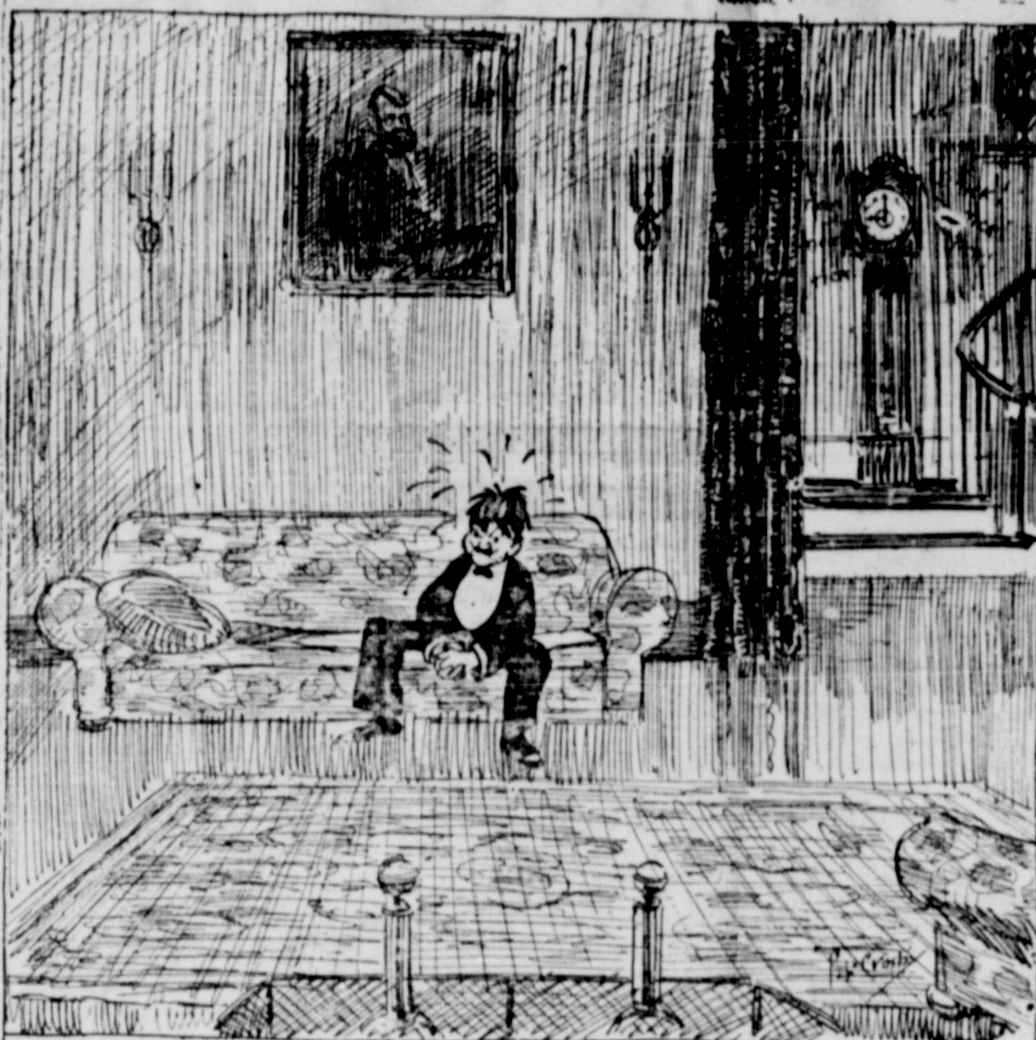
On Subjects, "The Transformed Life" and "God's Power to Save" will be discussed at the morning and evening services respectively Sunday, July 12.

FAVOR SAYS COUNTY MONUMENT WILL BE ERECTED NEXT WEEK

Mr. W. F. Favor exhibited in Knox City today, Thursday, the large bronze plaque that is being erected in Knox County in honor of General Henry Knox. Mr. Favor states that the plaque will be completely erected some time next week.

The plaque, a bronze slab 17 by 7 1/2 inches, has the following inscription:

KNOX COUNTY
Formed from Young and Baxter territories.
Created February 1, 1858
Recreated August 21, 1876
Organized March 20, 1886
Named in honor of
GENERAL HENRY KNOX
1759-1806
Major General of the
Continental army 1781
Secretary of war 1785-1794
Benjamin, the County Seat

In addition to this slab is a star within a circle, bearing the inscription "Texas Highway Department," 1936.

The bronze plaque will be erected on a granite slab 3 1/2 feet high, 2 1/2 feet wide and 3 feet across. The granite slab weighs 6,000 pounds. The monument will be located five miles east of Benjamin at the Narrows. It is the highest point in the county.

GEORGE H. SHEPPARD HAS FINE RECORD AS STATE OFFICIAL

An entire lifetime of honorable public service is the record upon which George H. Sheppard is basing his campaign for reelection as Comptroller of the State of Texas.

The son of a Confederate soldier born in McClennan County 61 years ago Sheppard moved to West Texas where he was reared on a ranch. He was educated in the public schools of that section, then attended State Normal Schools, and later became a teacher in that part of the State.

Sheppard's first public office was Tax Assessor of Nolan County and it was here that he acquired the interest of tax problems that lead ultimately to his election as president of the State Tax Assessors Association.

Subsequently, Sheppard was mayor of the City of Sweetwater for five years and became an active member of the Board of Directors of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce.

Based on his experience, Sheppard was a successful candidate for the office of State Comptroller. His knowledge and experience have enabled him to materially improve the economy and efficiency of this office where the administrative duties have increased materially during the past few years. Sheppard's work was to eliminate the inefficiency that had developed over a long period of years and to organize the department in a manner that would improve the method of collection and enable the state to obtain all the revenue due.

The effect of this work is apparent in the fact that the Motor Fuel Tax income was \$37,152,760 in 1935 an increase of \$3,273,052 over the previous year and a gain of \$7,457,256 over the collections for 1932 despite this increase in collections the cost of enforcement has been only one per cent of the revenue of the state.

Another increase that demonstrated the efficiency of the personnel under Sheppard's administration is the rise in Cigarette Tax receipts to \$4,301,277 in 1935. This is \$293,432 above 1934 and receipts so far this year indicate the total income will exceed \$5,500,000. In 1934 Gross Receipts Taxes totaled \$5,843,706. They increased to \$11,136,164 in 1935, a net gain of \$2,292,458. During the same period the Gross Production Tax collected on Crude Oil increased \$1,934,215 to \$8,016,042.

The Available School Fund has also benefited largely from the increased collections. In 1932 the income to this fund totaled \$9,591,567. By 1935 this income had increased to \$17,963,882 for that year a net gain of \$8,372,315.

During this period the school levy has been cut 15 cents to 20 cents, a reduction of approximately 40 per

cent. The duties of the Comptroller require that he perform other services for the state than those attendant to the administration of the particular office to which he has been elected. While he receives no income for additional services Comptroller George H. Sheppard is now a member and Secretary of the Board of County and District Road Indebtedness, Automatic Tax Board, Board to Select Prison Auditor, State Tax Board and Texas Bond Commission.

COATS CHIEF LIQUOR AGENT FOR DISTRICT

Knox City Man Successor To Murphy, Transferred To West Border

Appointment of John W. Coates of Knox City to the position of liquor supervisor for the Abilene district was announced by A. C. Paxton chief supervisor of the state liquor control board, visiting the local headquarters office Thursday.

Coates will assume duties this week replacing P. H. Murphy, who has been here since April. Murphy is being transferred to the West Texas border.

Paxton, in charge of the fourth office, is on his first tour of the state's 16 field offices. He is accompanied by J. H. Ramsey, personal director of the board. They will return to Austin and later in the week will go to the lower Rio Grande valley district to supervise establishment of other border tax-collecting agencies.

Investigators working in Abilene's 13-county district have filed 128 charges, 75 per cent of which have been disposed of, Murphy said. More than 100 violators charged have pleaded guilty.

The state men, Paxton said, are for the purpose of supplementing activities of local county officers. Evidence is gathered by the investigators and turned over to them. Coates, the new deputy has served as one of the five investigators for the Abilene district.—Abilene Reporter
