Faculty Completed At Patton Springs For Coming Term

Destroying Excess Cotton Acreage

Cotton Compliance work in Dickens County is of more importance and should be given more serious consideration by our cotton producers in 1935 than was given to this work last year. Both planted and rented acres must be measured and designated on the Compliance Form by the Local Cotton Committeemen or his Supervisor.

In the event the Supervisor finds an excess cotton acreage to the permitted cotton acres listed on the Producer's Contract, the County Cotton Committee and County Agent hereby notifies all Cotton Producers not to destroy a stalk of cotton until he has received an official notice from the County Agent's Office.

The Official notice to destroy excess cotton acreage will be sent out at the earliest date possible after the Local Supervisor has submitted his report to the County Office. The County Cotton Committee will check all compliance work for discrepancies before the producer receives his notice.

Co-operation in this matter will be highly appreciated by the County Office.

All Transfers Must Be Made By Aug. 1st

All parents expecting to transfer their children to Spur Independent School District for the term 1935-36 must have such transfers made by August 1. This does not include high school students in Dickens County whose districts have been sending to Spur for high school purposes. Those students are automatically transferred each year.

To make transfers parents may do this either in the County Superintendent's office or see me any time before August 1. I will be at the Red Front Drug Store Saturday afternoon to take such transfers.

Texas Millers Grind Wheat For Offal To Supply Relief Flour

Austin, July 24—Approximately half a million bushels of wheat from the Pacific Northwest will be converted into flour by Texas millers, according to an agreement between the millers and C. Z. Crain, head of the commodities distribution department of the Texas Relief Commission, acting as agent for the Federal Surplus Relief Corporation.

Some 30 milling houses in Texas will grind the wheat on a toll basis, receiving all the offal, irrespective of present or future prices, as payment for the work. Milled flour will be delivered to the Texas Relief Commission in 12-pound paper bags and 24-pound cotton sacks for distribution to relief families in the state.

Crain said some wheat already has been bought and that first shipments were expected to be received in Texas soon.

Enrollment cards must be signed and in the county farm and home demonstration agents' office before September 1.

The contestants will be judged in May 1936 and will be judged by the following score card.

Points to be considered in judging Entries in the Centennial Farm and Home Demonstration Contest:

The Building and Equipment
Family dwelling and service buildings to be judged on location; state of repairs, including paint; adequacy for occupants; permanent equipment and furnishings. Water supply judged on source; quantity; and availability where needed. Fencing and gates on sufficiency for type of farm; quality; state of repair, including paint. Farm machinery to be judged on relation to farming needs and state of repair.—2,500.

The Grounds
Judged on arrangement of entire layout; arrangement of plantings; choice of plant material; and maintenance.—1,000.

The Soil
Judged on erosion prevention; drainage; water conservation; crop rotation, including legumes and winter cover crops; utilization of available manures; use of commercial fertilizer; and condition of fields.—1,500.

The Livestock
Dairy and beef cattle, hogs, sheep and goats, poultry and work stock judged on quantity in proportion to other farm operations; quality; care and management.—2,000.

The Food Supply and Other Resources
Judged on sufficient amount and variety of fresh, canned, dried, cured and stored products from garden, orchard, fields, and livestock to meet the nutrition needs of the family; and the processing of surpluses and by-products such as vegetables, fruits, meats, hides, wool, cotton, wood and scrap material for home use and for sale.—1,500

Plans Made To Light Charles A. Jones Stadium

At a meeting of a group of business men Tuesday evening at the Palace Theatre it was decided to sponsor a season ticket sale of football tickets so that the Charles A. Jones Stadium would be lighted for the first football game here with Roby, Regional Champions, September 13. By unanimous agreement it was decided that each business firm would sponsor the sale of these tickets to their employees and immediate families so that an entire canvass of the whole town would not have to be made. One day a week committeemen will call at each place of business with tickets ready to be distributed. Those who do not have the money now will be allowed to postdate their checks or make arrangements for future payments. The price of these tickets will be three dollars for adults. School student's tickets will be offered for sale when school begins.

This seems to be the only method of lighting our stadium. Unless the people buy these tickets it will be impossible to light the field this year. We are appealing to the civic pride of every adult to buy these tickets so that we may have a progressive community project completed. Tickets will be offered for sale at the drug stores until football season. There will be seven home games this season including such games with Floydada, Levelland, and Roby. There will be a saving of more than a dollar and twenty-five cents for straight gate admission prices.

All games except holiday games will be played at night. This will give every business man and employee a chance to see the games without closing their places of business.

By following this method we can light the football field without spending a cent of the taxpayer's money. Buy a ticket and have a part in building a worthwhile community project.

Not only will football games be played at night, but this field can be used for political rallies, pageants and commencement exercises and other purposes.

Rural Correspondent Prize Winners For Best Writers In U. S.

New York, July 24—Who is the best country correspondent in the United States The award, announced today, goes to Mrs. Mary Elizabeth Mahnkey of Oasis, Missouri. She is the only newspaper correspondent in a village of 27 inhabitants, and she writes her news for the Weekly Republican of Forsythe, Missouri, which has a circulation of 875 among the farmers of the Ozark hills.

Mrs. Mahnkey was selected out of 1581 rural correspondents nominated for a prize given by Wheeler McMillen, editor of The Country Home, a national farm magazine published in New York. As winner, she receives a silver trophy, \$50 in cash, and a trip to New York City.

Harnessing Electricity to Make Radium

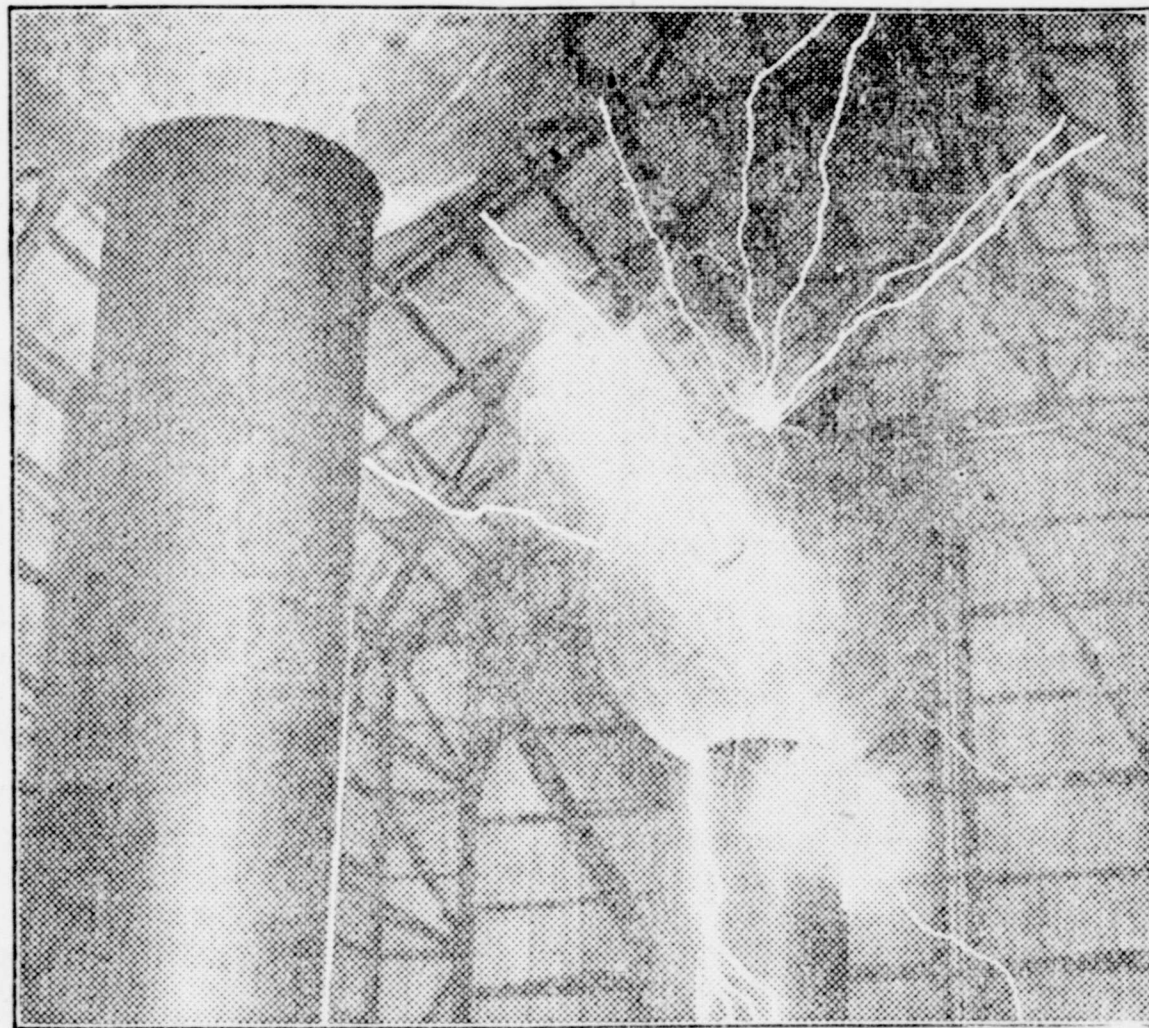
Experimental Laboratory at Round Hill, Mass.,
Tests Huge Generator

SINCE the discovery eighteen months ago by French physi-
cists Jean-Frédéric Joliot and his wife Irène Curie-Joliot,
daughter of the late Marie Curie, of how to make some ordinary
elements radioactive, physicists and chemists have attempted to
produce sufficient quantities of these elements to try their value in
treating malignant diseases such as cancer.

The difficulty, reports *The Liter-
ary Digest*, is that only a few atoms
of the element become radioactive
under the bombardment of atomic
bullets. Two things are needed:
higher voltages to increase the num-

bombardment experiments. On the
top of two towers are large metal
balls which collect the charge gen-
erated electrostatically.

Between the balls will be placed
the world's largest vacuum tube, a
foot in diameter, twenty feet long,
divided into five sections. It is pro-
vided internally with specially de-

ber and power of the bombarding
particles, and a quick method of
separating or concentrating the
radioactive atoms after they have
received the activating treatment.

World's Largest Vacuum Tube

At Round Hill, Mass., a huge
high-voltage generator, built by Dr.
Robert Van de Graaff, of M. I. T.,
and his associates, Drs. Lester and
Chester Van Atta, will undergo

signed metal shields to act like
lenses in focusing the highly-
charged particles passing through
the tube.

Starting from one end, particles,
swept along by the enormous volt-
age, will strike at tremendous
velocities a target of the substance

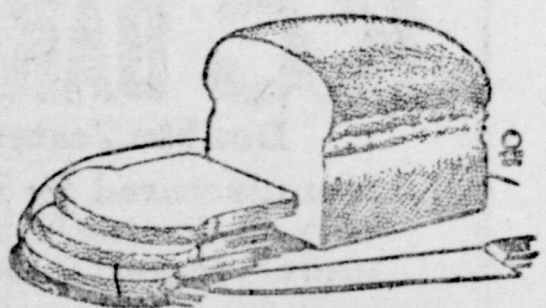

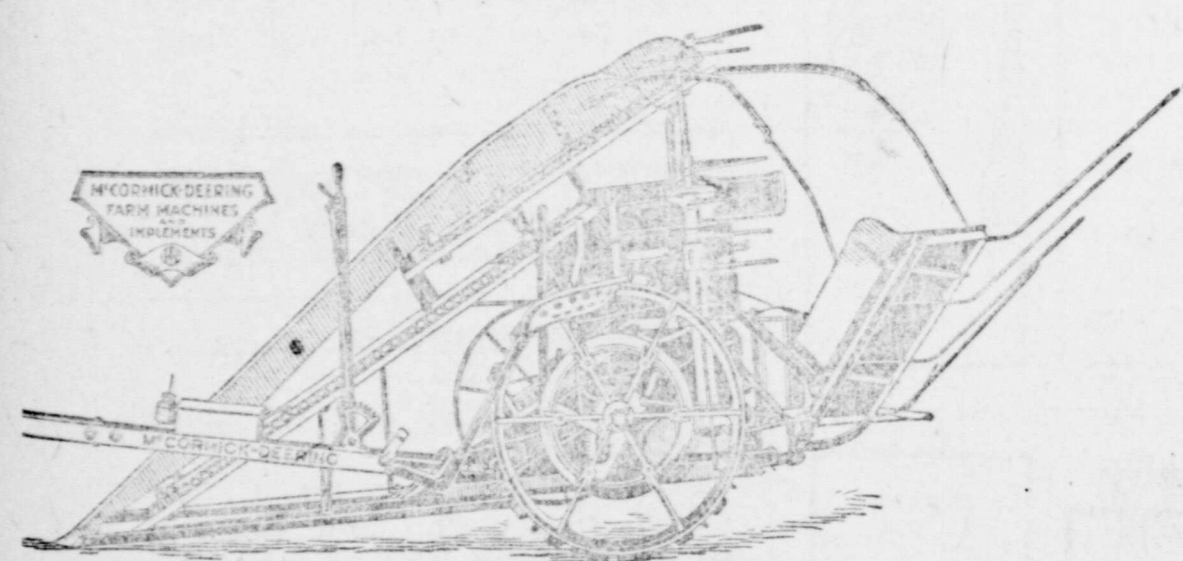
