Republicans Choose Hoover On Initial Ballot Both Women Fliers Plan Take-Off For Europe Today

Superstition On Friday May Halt Columbia Start

"Friendship" Announces Its Take-Off for 2 This Morning, Planning Stop At Azores.

MISS BOLL REQUESTS FABLED FRIDAY JINX

Start of Bellanca Plane On First Leg of Flight Was Postponed Because Slat For Friday.

(By Associated Press)

ST. JOHNS, N. I., June 14.—Tomorrow's sun, it seemed probable tonight, will shine on two American women flying along different courses to Europe, unless the superstition against beginning an undertaking on a Friday holds one ashore.

The women are Miss Amelia Earhart and Miss Mabel Boll. Miss Earhart announced at Trepassy today that she would take off with her two-man crew at two a. m. Eastern Daylight time, by way of the Azores, where a stop will be made for fuel. Miss Mabel Boll was waiting at Harbor Grace for weather favorable for a hop along the great circle course. She also has two men to operate her plane.

Her Superstitions

It is Miss Boll, riding Charles A. Levine's trans-atlantic monoplane Columbia, who has strong ideas about Friday. She postponed taking off on the first leg of her flight from Roosevelt field because preparations were not completed until Friday.

Both women had planned to follow the great circle course to Europe, but Miss Earhart's explanation of her superstition failed to rise from the water in repeated attempts with the lead of fuel necessary to make the 1,900 mile hop, so 200 gallons of gasoline were jettisoned and the course changed to permit a stop for refueling at the Azores. From there the course will be laid to Lisbon and then to Southampton. The destination of the Columbia has not been announced.

Under Screen Of Bullets, Bandits Make Daring Raid

Seven Robbers Bob Through Convention Traffic Jam To Pillage Bank and Escape With \$16,000.

KANSAS CITY, June 14.—Appearing suddenly in the midst of a republican national convention traffic jam, seven daring bank robbers today staged a holdup of the Home Trust company in the heart of the downtown district and escaped with \$16,000.

Tear gas in the bank interrupted the holdup and the robbers fled, firing wildly. Five persons, including two patrolmen, were wounded and one man fell dead from excitement. Two of the wounded are in a serious condition.

James H. Smith, traffic officer on duty a half block distant, was hit in the neck and right shoulder with a shotgun discharge, after he had shot at the car careening wildly up the crowded block.

Miss Lillian M. Roien, 16, was shot in the face. She fell almost in the car's path, as did the wounded officer.

Darrel Capshaw, a patrolman on duty a block away, was shot in the leg. Charles Monahan and Kenneth Knickerbocker, pedestrians, suffered superficial flesh wounds from stray bullets. Monahan was held in a hospital under a police order.

Alvin Farth, 35, a shoe salesman who saw the holdup, fled from heart disease.

Line-up Employees.
Entering the bank with a fusillade of shooting, six of the men, in command of a leader, took posts as he pre-arrangements, and hastily lined up the 40 employees and a few customers. Two of them hurled the cages, and began scooping up the money.

J. E. Thrushley, safe deposit manager, working below, heard the commotion and rushed into the lobby firing a tear gas pistol. As the gas fumes began to fill the lobby, the leader ordered his men to flee, and they rushed for their car.

Texas Delegates Lead Parade As Hoover Selected

Lone Star State Contingent Heads Colorful Procession As Hosts of Republicans Express Approval.

OPPONENTS HARDLY WERE TO BE SEEN

Heralded Factional Opposition To Secretary Fades Away When Roll Call Stage Is Reached.

CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 14 (AP).—Having paraded through a platform which he stood to stand, the republican host marched on the auditorium tonight to nominate Herbert Hoover for president.

Meeting of the convention was really one of ratification for Hoover for many hours had led to a sufficient number of delegates to overwhelm all opposition. This was forcibly illustrated during the day session of the convention when all attempts to disturb the platform recommendations of the results committee, which ruled against the McNary-Hauser equalization law, were beaten back by huge margins.

Second Night Session.
It was the second night session of the convention.

John McNab selected to nominate Hoover was on hand an hour before convening tonight to make oratory with those designated to speak for the common secretary's opponents. Will R. West was the Watson orator. A. J. Lill represented Goff; J. N. Tinscher was the Charles man, and O. J. Olson carried the McNary-Hauser equalization law. The Hoover orator, a tall man, wearing a dark business suit, strode the crowd into another without a word in his first sentence by naming Hoover.

Bedlam of Noise.
States lined up for Louden sat tight in their seats while a boom of noise swept back and forth across the hall, with flags waving high above the heads of the overjoyed Hoover enthusiasts. Cowbell, rattles, tambourines and tin pans were brought into play. New Harpynsky, Rhode Island, Kentucky.

Summer Home Of Coolidge Is Described By Lubbock Visitor

F. H. Irons, Denver Railroad Official, Spent Several Days Last Week On Picturesque Estate Near Superior; Rivers Abound In Trout; Buildings Palatial

The grandeur of the pretentious estate of the late oil magnate Pierce, where President Calvin Coolidge arrived yesterday for his summer vacation, was pictured by F. H. Irons, Burlington official, who arrived in Lubbock this week in connection with the construction work of the Denver railway.

The summer white house is on the picturesque Brule river considered one of the most beautiful in America, about thirty-five miles from Superior, Wisconsin. Mr. Irons came here direct from Superior having spent several days last week on the Pierce estate. He has been in intimate touch with the preparations for the president.

The president arrived at the Summer White House yesterday after the trip has been postponed from Monday because of the illness of his wife.

A student of art, a painter, and an architect for more than twenty-five years, Mr. Irons described the beauty of the estate with the capture of an artist.

President Nears Summer Home In Wisconsin Woods

Special Train Speeds Coolidge to Superior, Near the Site of Estate to Become Vacation White House.

CHICAGO, June 14.—(Aboard President Coolidge's special train) Leaving Chicago behind on his way to Superior, Wisconsin, President Coolidge had before him tonight only relatively few miles before reaching his summer white house on the Brule river, tomorrow morning.

The trip, carried out since the departure from Washington, strictly on schedule, was expected to land Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge in Superior in time to allow them to settle down in their new temporary home before luncheon.

Pleased at the change in weather which from a rainy and sodden morning turned into a bright and clear afternoon, Mr. and Mrs. Coolidge spent most of their time gazing at the countryside, the former from the observation platform, the latter from her bed on which she lay all day, fully dressed.

The special train was the object of demonstrations at all stations where it stopped or even where it slowed down. Word of passage of the train had got abroad, although efforts had been made to keep its schedule secret for the president's safety.

Neither Mr. nor Mrs. Coolidge, however, came out on the observation platform to receive the applause of the crowds.

Single Roll Call Suffices to Name Secretary of Commerce As Standard Bearer of G. O. P. In Night Session

ASK RAIL MERGER
I. C. C. Okeh for Orient Sale Requested

WICHITA, Kans., June 14 (AP).—The Santa Fe railway, which today asked the interstate commerce commission for permission to acquire the Orient railroad, faces the prospect of an unsettled wage dispute with 519 operating employees of the Orient.

Eight union representatives, including four officers of the Big Four Brotherhoods, held a conference behind closed doors here today to determine employees' course of action in their proposed strike for higher wages.

E. H. Shaffer, general manager of the Orient, announced the management considers the wage dispute a closed incident since the report of President Coolidge's fact finding board in the case.

With Platform Adopted, Eliminating Reference To Equalization Fee, Convention Started Ballots.

CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 14.—Herbert Hoover was chosen tonight as the republican nominee for president.

A single roll call in the national convention told with impressive finality the story of his overwhelming victory against a united field of rivals.

A foregone conclusion ever since the convention met last Tuesday, his nomination became a reality long before the roll of the states was completed. The final count disclosed the allied candidates against him in complete rout.

The result of the convention's one and only ballot was as follows: Hoover 537; Curtis 64; Watson 45; Dawes 4; Coolidge 17; Norris 24; Goff 18; Lowden 74; Hughes 1; not voting 5.

The number necessary for a nomination, considering the absent was 342.

Only the selection of a vice presidential candidate remains to complete the work of the convention. This choice will be made tomorrow. In which direction it will fall was not apparent tonight for at least a score of candidates were flying kites as the party leaders began numerous consultations on the subject after the late adjournment of the convention until tomorrow noon and sought meantime to get in touch with Mr. Hoover himself in Washington and learn whether he had a preference.

Lowden Drops Out
Lowden, Illinois, his nearest competitor in delegate strength, announced before the convention assembled, withdrew entirely at the last minute saying he would not care to be a

Stewart Is Freed On Senate Charge

Jury Acquits Oil Magnate For Refusal To Answer Questions Propounded by Committee.

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, June 14.—Robert W. Stewart, whose resignation as chairman of the board of the Standard Oil Company of Indiana, recently was demanded by John D. Rockefeller, Jr., was acquitted today by a jury in the District of Columbia supreme court of charges of refusing to answer questions of the senate oil committee.

Stewart sprang into the spotlight of the oil investigation by his refusal last February to answer questions of the committee, resulting in his arrest and then his reappearance at a jury in which he admitted he had received \$750,000 of Liberty Bonds from H. S. Coker, president of the Continental Trading Company. He said he had not personally profited a penny from the bonds and had turned them over to his company.

New Producer At Coleman Flows 99 Barrels, 6 Hours

Roof Blown from Drilling
Machine and Oil Sprayed
For More than Quarter
Of Mile.

COLEMAN, June 14.—Blowing the roof from the machine and spraying oil for more than one-quarter of a mile, the E. J. Cunningham, White, Simpson & Pinkerton No. 4-A Jennings in the A. S. Lipscomb survey No. 94, southeast of Santa Anna seven miles, came in for the largest producer yet registered in the Jennings pool flowing 99 barrels in less than six hours from a dry sand around 1,170 feet.

The Darby Oil company drilling in the same pool have one producer and are setting pipe in two drilling wells preparatory to tapping the expected sand. Production from the five Cunningham et al wells and the one Darby Oil company well was conservatively placed at the 800 barrel mark. If the two Darby Oil company wells on the Jennings pool encounter the same sand with the degree of success as registered, production should be moved above the 1,000 barrel figure. All oil is of the high gravity type testing above 40 degrees corrected.

Cunningham, White, Simpson & Pinkerton prepared to move the No. 4-A Jennings and the 3-B Jennings locations as the wells just recently drilled into the sand were placed on the power pumping unit.

The secretary and Mrs. Hoover welcomed the guests and sat down in a circle while the radio report came in. At each demonstration in the convention hall for Mr. Hoover the party clapped and cheered.

Dismiss Jury In Criminal Court

Two Young Men Sentenced To Penitentiary, Charged With Theft; One Is World War Veteran.

AUSTIN, June 14 (AP).—A prohibition referendum should be declared for by the democratic party in national convention at Houston, George B. Terrell, state commissioner of agriculture and "life long prohibitionist," said in a statement here today.

"I am a life long prohibitionist and I know that both 'pros' and 'antis' desire to know the will of the voters on the 18 amendment, since it has been in operation several years. This plank would gain more votes for the democratic ticket than all others combined for it offers a fair and just means of ascertaining the people's belief on a question of paramount importance that must be settled right for their welfare."

"We want temperance and the best means of securing and maintaining it. The people have the inalienable right to alter or amend their constitution in a legal way at any time and should not be denied the right to express their views on any governmental question."

"We are now," he added, "at the parting of the ways and the action of the Houston convention may perpetuate democratic principles and civil liberty or it may destroy them. The pendulum already has swung far toward centralization—a course that inevitably leads to the destruction of state's rights, followed by suppression of individual rights."

Restore Spanish Ruler's Palace

San Antonio Sets Out to Make Old Governor's Mansion a Museum

(By Associated Press.)
SAN ANTONIO, June 14.—With little more than the old coat of arms over the doorway to begin with, the city of San Antonio is preparing to restore the old Spanish governor's palace on Military plaza here as a public museum.

The old structure, once the most elegant house in town, has crumbled until the second story has disappeared altogether. Second hand stores and cheap clothing stores in the city interior. The Castilian coat of arms and the date of the completion of the building—1749—are the only marks on the ruin which distinguish it as a place of consequence.

Some of the most important decrees issued by Spain in America were announced at the palace. The Spaniards' love for the luxurious furnishings once gave the Alamo to the Texans. At that time the Spaniards were in the Alamo, but the Texans destroyed the palace. Later the bones of the heroes of the Alamo lay in state in the palace.

Col. Zebulon Pike, commissioned to examine the Louisiana purchase in 1807, lost his way and drifted far westward into Spanish territory before he was discovered. He was escorted back to the border and on the way stayed at the governor's palace, noting the luxury of Gov. Cordova's court in his diary.

At that time the palace surrounded a cool patio. The front of the building was one story high, but the other three sides were two stories. Its walls were four feet thick in places. The building will be restored from old pictures with money voted in a recent bond election.

HUNT MISSING LINK.
SEATTLE, June 14.—The British schooner, *Elita M. Morrissey*, commanded by Captain R. A. Bartlett, recently anchored here to load supplies for a trip to northern waters. The expedition will try to determine whether a band of Toltec, passing from Asia to the Alaskan islands, were the first settlers of North America. The ship will visit several islands in the north where mummies are thought to be buried. The explorers hope to find traces of prehistoric man and are northern animals.

DAILY MARKETS

NEW YORK COTTON.

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP).—Unfavorable features in the weather and crop news and relatively firm Liverpool cables were reflected by advances in the cotton market today. Further liquidation of old long accounts caused declines from an opening upturn, but the market firmed up again, October advancing from 16.28 to 20.59, and closing at 20.57. The general market closed steady at net gains of 12 to 19 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 3 to 6 points which was only a partial response to higher Liverpool cables than expected and reports of rains in the south. Actual months sold about 7 to 10 points, but higher after the call for offerings increased around the 20 1-2 cent level for October, and the market eased off during midday.

The report of the census bureau showing domestic consumption of 1,710 bales for May compared with 325,154 for April and 638,948 for May last year, was slightly under recent bullish expectations and probably accounted for selling by some of the recent buyers. Demand increased as prices approached 20 1-4 cents for October, however, and the market turned upward again during the afternoon.

NEW ORLEANS COTTON.

NEW ORLEANS, June 14 (AP).—The cotton market was alternately quiet and active today but the trend of prices was decidedly upward. Following a morning session during which prices eased off on the belief that the larger mill consumption indicated in view of the recent slack demand, an accumulated stock of unsold goods, the market rallied towards mid-season on heavy rains in the belt and promises of another

er cool weevil report tomorrow. October contracts after trading off to 19.99, 7 points up, rallied to 20.02, or 10 points up for the day. The option closed at the top with the general market very steady at net advances of 8 to 10 points.

Liverpool cables were 3 to 5 penny points better than due and first trades here showed gains of 3 to 6 points. Prices advanced a little further in early trading on early reports of rains overnight in the belt July trading to 20.23, October 19.99, and December 19.97, or 5 to 7 points above the previous close. NEW YORK, June 14 (AP).—The cottonseed oil market was extremely quiet today. Prime crude nominal; prime summer yellow spot 10.10; July closed 10.15; September 10.46; October 10.33; December 10.60; January 10.60.

WALL STREET STOCKS.

NEW YORK, June 14 (AP).—Lowering of the call money rate from 6 to 5 1-2 percent stimulated the further recovery of prices in today's stock market. The rally was impeded somewhat by profit-taking, particularly on the part of traders who bought stocks for a turn in Tuesday's sharp reaction. Trading showed a marked falling off in volume, the day's sales totalling less than 3,000,000 shares.

Directors of the New York federal reserve bank, who met after

the close of the market, announced no change in the New York federal reserve discount rate. The statement of broken loans covering the week ended Wednesday night showed a decrease of \$135,549,000, bringing the total down to \$4,427,691,000. This was about in line with expectations.

Except for a few favorable dividend announcements, there was little in the day's news to influence the price movement. Lowering of the call money rate was believed to reflect the passing of the mid-month strain on the market.

FORT WORTH LIVESTOCK.

FORT WORTH, June 14 (AP).—The cattle trade here today generally was steady, steers selling from 9.00 to 10.25, cows 8.00 to 9.65, and calves 10.75 to 13.00. The hog market was steady to 15c lower, with a top price of 9.00. The bulk of the receipts sold from 9.00 to 9.40. Sows brought from 7.75 to 8.00. Pigs were scarce. The sheep trade was steady, with lambs selling from 12.50 to 14.00.

\$45,000 IN SMOKE

RINARD, Ill., June 13.—An over-ambitious clerk in the store of Charles Keith recently put \$45,000 to the smoke test. In cleaning up the store he inadvertently included in his bonfire notes and stocks which Keith had taken from his safety deposit box.

Keep Air "Log" Plane Traffic Is Becoming Heavy

SAN ANTONIO, June 14 (AP).—Air traffic here has become so heavy that the San Antonio Light has recognized it, just as seaport newspapers recognize the movement of salt water craft.

The newspaper keeps a careful log of each of the seven local landing fields and compiles a daily list of arrivals and departures, with the names of the pilots and passengers and the points of takeoff or destinations.

As four of the local fields are government fields, one a municipal and commercial field and the other two private commercial fields the list is frequently a long one, and is of great interest to the hundreds of fliers and flying enthusiasts in this vicinity.

So far as the editors know, the idea has never been adopted by any other newspaper.

Republicans Considering Hoover Running Mate

Wide Choice For Selection Given To Party Leaders

Conferences Being Held To Determine Man Who Will Carry On With Hoover For Party Success.

(By Associated Press.)
KANSAS CITY, June 14 (AP).—Groups of Republican leaders went into conferences tonight seeking to find a vice-presidential candidate acceptable to Herbert Hoover and to the convention and hopes were held out that sufficient strength could be mustered overnight for one man to assure his nomination tomorrow. There are some twenty candidates under consideration.

KANSAS CITY, June 14 (AP).—By an active personal campaign, securing the tacit approval of Herbert Hoover, Representative Tilson of Connecticut, has stolen a march on the field of vice-presidential candidates whose fate had been more or less entrusted to the fortunes of a conference of leaders who hoped tonight to get a definite word from the secretary after he is actually nominated.

Mr. Tilson went direct to Hoover over the long distance telephone today to ask if there was any objection to his campaign for the vice-presidency. Mr. Tilson said that Mr. Hoover without committing himself on any candidate declared Tilson's activities perfectly acceptable.

While the Connecticut representative, who is floor leader of the House, was busy bagging votes this afternoon, a self-appointed board of strategy was active in another quarter trying to solve the puzzle of what the contest had developed by virtue of the record number of entries.

These working over the situation went to the floor tonight to ascertain definitely the views of the delegates and it was their hope that during the night an agreement might be reached, perhaps with the consent of Mr. Hoover who was expected to speak at least in a general way after his nomination.

Prominent in the discussion aside from Tilson were the names of Vice-President Dawes, Senators McKelvey of New Hampshire; Curtis of Kansas; Fess of Ohio, and Denen of Illinois; Governor Fuller of Massachusetts; and Arthur M. Hyde, former governor of Missouri.

KANSAS CITY, June 14 (AP).—Problem of agreeing on a Republican candidate for vice-president engaged paramount interest of the Texas delegation to the national convention tonight.

None have been favored definitely by a majority of the delegation. National Committeeman R. B. Greaser of Brownsville said. He has been endorsed by the Texas state convention as vice-presidential candidate but regards the action as merely a tribute.

Voting again as a unit, the Texas group registered its preference today for the controversial majority report of the platform committee.

The delegation, it is understood, unanimously adopted a minority substitute report carrying a farm relief plank embodying the disputed equalization fee.

The majority report was signed by Judge C. C. Harris of San Angelo as the Texas member of the committee.

Lowden Drops Out Of Race, Ired Over Farm Relief Plank

Statement of Withdrawal From Race Takes Place Of Speech Scheduled For Nomination.

(By Associated Press.)

CONVENTION HALL, KANSAS CITY, June 14.—As the Republican convention met to cast the ballot nominating Herbert Hoover for the presidency tonight, former Governor Frank O. Lowden, of Illinois, the chief candidate against him, withdrew his name from consideration because he could not accept as satisfactory the administration farm relief plank written today in to the party platform.

Springing a real surprise, the former governor authorized the reading of his statement of withdrawal from the convention platform in place of the speech which was to have been delivered placing him in nomination. The denouncement followed closely upon a twenty minute demonstration for Hoover, who just previously had been placed in nomination.

Mounting the platform just as the big Hoover racket was dying out, Otis F. Glenn, Republican nominee for the senate in Illinois and the man who was to have nominated Lowden, announced bluntly that the former governor had authorized him to make the statement by which he released the delegates from Illinois and elsewhere, pledged to him.

Texas Delegates Lead Parade As Hoover Selected

Republicans Give Vent to Wild Enthusiasm When the Commerce Secretary's Name In Nomination.

Louisiana, Tennessee, Pennsylvania, New York and other Hoover state standards were tossed about as the outbreak continued, despite the efforts of Chairman Moses to maintain order.

Finally, Texas started a parade around the hall with Louisiana close in pursuit. The figure of an elephant was hoisted by a Utah delegate and joined in the parade as it grew. Chairman Moses again tried to gain order but he was shouted down and a huge picture of Hoover was lifted. Other speakers tabled amid such a din that persons in the rear of the hall had no chance to hear Moses' vigorous pounding of the gavel.

Eulogizes Hoover.

The call for Hoover, McNab said, was based on the need of the American people. Hoover's life, he said, was an epic, his career a living example of the heights of Americanism a man might reach by his own devotion.

McNab sketched Hoover's activities in getting food to the starving during the World war, declaring he was "the greatest task in history, and that the commerce secretary's success constituted a great romance."

Always Republican.

"Always a republican" was the way the speaker described Hoover at one point in speaking of his work in the department of commerce. The secretary's work in the Mississippi flood area, he said, had earned him the gratitude of millions of people. "He is no superman in private life," he said. "He loves his friends and he likes to laugh and play. He craves his fellow man's affection in return."

A minute later, Arizona's name was called and she yielded to Illinois, which sent Mr. Glenn to the stand to speak for Frank O. Lowden.

Gives Lowden Message.

Glenn said Governor Lowden had sent a message that he had stated he did not want the nomination unless the republican party was prepared to meet fully and fairly the agricultural problem. "I have insisted upon no particular remedy," the governor's message said, "but have stated at all times that if there were a better method than the equalization fee he would accept it. I feel, however, that it is the duty of the republican party to find some way by which agriculture could be rescued from the ruin which threatens it. This in my judgment the convention by its platform just adopted, has failed to do. I therefore authorize the withdrawal of my name. My interest in the cause is in no way abated."

The message was signed and the signature was read by Glenn in a firm voice: "Frank O. Lowden." When Glenn had concluded he was given a moderate cheer, and Moore ordered the roll call continued.

Speaks for Watson.

Indiana was reached and Wood, a veteran member of the house, came to the stand to speak for Watson.

"We have not withdrawn our candidate," he said in his opening remarks. "He is entitled to the respect of everyone in this convention. He has never wavered in his loyalty and fealty to his party."
