Fat Stock Show Set For March 19

March 19 will be the date of the Littlefield F.F.A. and 4-H stock show according to general superintendent Elwin Matthews Wednesday.

As previously announced the show is to be strictly a fat stock show since the annual fair handles all breeding stock and is to correspond with other big fat stock shows in the state.

Designated weighing points or a point is to be announced by the committee soon. Entry blanks are available at either the county agents office or the Vocational Agriculture teacher's office.

To be eligible to enter an animal in the show the boy must be enrolled in and active in an FFA chapter in the Littlefield F.F.A. district or a 4-H club in Lamb county. All animals must be fitted for the show and must be ready to show when the class is called. When there is not more than three entries in a class the class will not show but in case of hogs will be entered as Miscellaneous.

The animal must be the boys project and must have been owned by him for at least 60 days to meet the ownership rules.

Classes of stock will be published later, however they are available now on the entry blanks.

Local Red Cross Drive Reaches \$1,825 In One Day's Campaign

The Littlefield Red Cross Drive reached \$1,825, \$875 short of the quota, at the end of the first day drive according to Mrs. L.M. Brandon, Red Cross secretary. This is the best results obtained during a first day drive since the war, according to Mrs. Brandon.

Organization plans were being made Wednesday to complete the drive in Littlefield today. The drive commenced Tuesday morning with about 50 volunteers canvassing the city, following the kick-off breakfast at Hays Coffee chop.

Fieldton was reported as the first to go over the top with \$113.35, which exceeded their \$104.50 quota, Wednesday afternoon. Mrs. R. A. Reed is chairman of the campaign at Fieldton.

Spade reported \$215.50 Wednesday afternoon, lacking only \$134.87 of reaching their goal. Rev. E. H. Coates is chairman there.

The Sudan drive started this morning with a kick-off breakfast at the City Cafe. The women are to canvass the residential district and the men the business and rural districts.

Wolfe Shaw, county chairman of the Red Cross, and Gus Shaw attended a banquet held by the Lions Club in Earth Tuesday night and spoke briefly. The Earth group was organizing Wednesday for today's drive. J. E. Chisholm, Jr., is county campaign chairman. The Lamb county quota is \$6,800.

About 50 volunteer workers from Jaycee-ettes, Women's Study Club, Woodmen's Circle, Lions, Rotary and W. O. W. organizations attended the Littlefield kick-off breakfast Tuesday morning at Hays Coffee Shop.

Gus Shaw introduced two out-of-town visitors, Mr. and Mrs. Herman Haber of Pleasant Valley. He is chairman of the drive in that community. Mr. Shaw then introduced the well known County American Red Cross chairman, Wolfe Shaw, who briefly urged volunteers to "go over the top" with the drive.

Work On Program Expected To Start In July

Enlargement To
Enable Everyone
To Have Telephone

A far reaching revamping and enlarging of the Littlefield Telephone system, which will give virtually everybody who wants a telephone an opportunity to acquire this service, was announced Wednesday by G. D. Shelley, district manager.

Work on this immense project will start sometime in July providing materials arrive in sufficient quantities. However, the work will be carried out this summer.

The enlarging of the local service will include building of a large amount of new line and the re-working of some of the existing lines.

At this time there are some outlying sections of Littlefield which cannot now obtain telephone service because of no lines and the enlarging of the service will take care of this condition to a large extent.

Additional switchboards are being installed at the local office to generally take care of the present needs and in anticipation of an increased number of subscribers.

The telephone building will not be enlarged this year.

The men who will carry out the rebuilding of the Littlefield system are now at work elsewhere in this immediate area, but are making their homes in Littlefield.

A dial system is not planned for Littlefield at this time, but it is a likely development for the future.

Amherst and Anton now have dial systems; a dial system will be completed in Sudan sometime this month, and Olton will have a dial system sometime this year.

Littlefield operators handle the long distance calls for Amherst and Anton, and the local office will take care of the long distance needs of Sudan and Olton, when the dial systems have been installed in those cities.

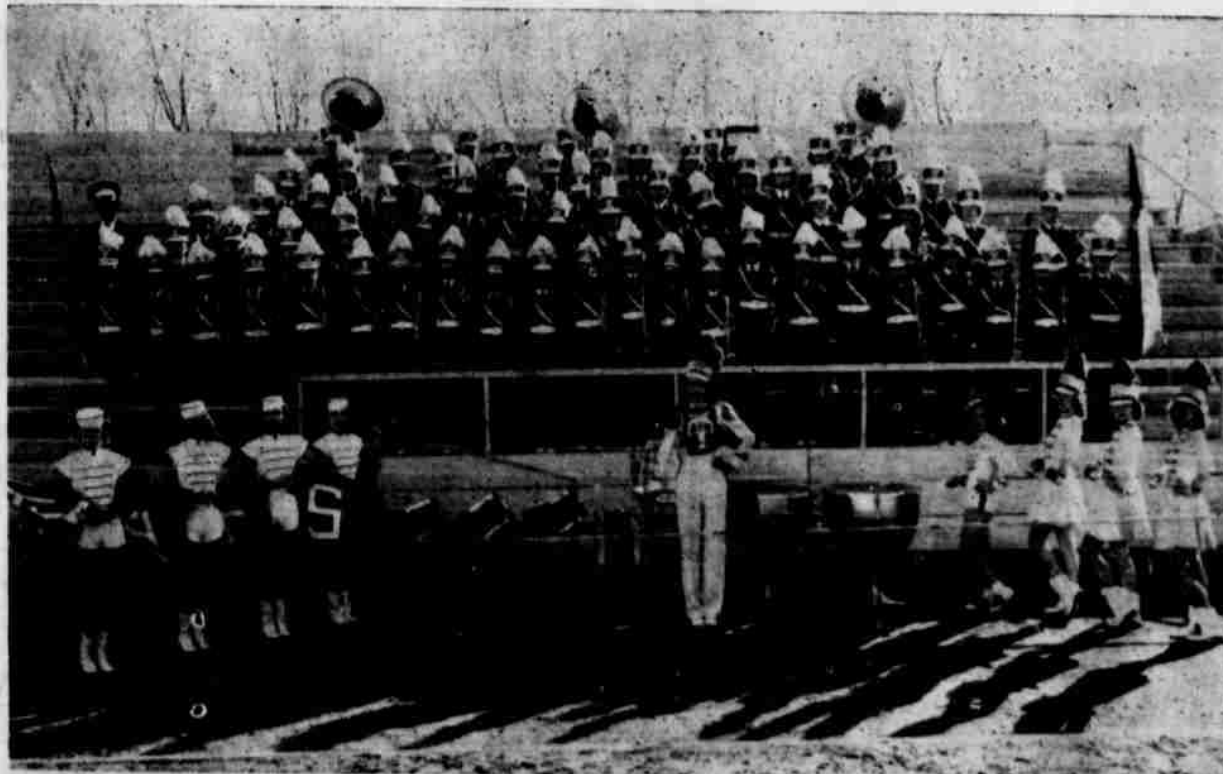

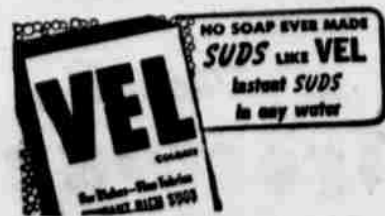

Oatmeal Raisin Bread

1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1 teaspoon soda
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup uncooked rolled oats
1/4 cup raisins

Turn on oven; set at moderately (350° F.). Grease a medium loaf pan about 8 x 4 x 3 in. deep. Resift the baking powder, soda and salt. Fold in oats, raisins and nuts. Beat eggs light and fluffy. Beat in sugar usually. Stir in mixture of milk, vinegar and molasses. Stir in mixture quickly but thoroughly into prepared pan. Bake on oven slightly below center 1 to 1 1/4 hours or until bread shrinks from sides of pan. Let stand in pan 5 minutes before turning out. Makes 1 medium loaf.

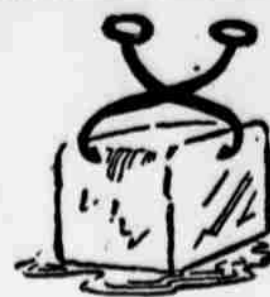

6,816-Acre Mo-Ranch Is Purchased By Texas Synod of Presbyterian Church

The "Mo-Ranch", picturesque 6816-acre property 25 miles west of Kerrville, has been sold to the Synod of Texas of the Presbyterian Church in the United States, for a sum in excess of \$500,000, it was announced recently.

Built on the north fork of the Guadalupe River, at an original cost in excess of \$1,000,000, it was the property of the late Dan Moran, former president of Continental Oil Company.

Announcement of the purchase was of the board of the ranch, an organization authorized and formed by the Synod of Texas in its annual meeting in September, 1948.

The property has been acquired for general Synod use as a conference site, a young people's summer conference headquarters, as a meeting place for the Synod, and a central location from which will stem all Synod activities, the announcement said.

"Mo-Ranch" has been a 200-guest week-end estate, with a completely furnished lodge, with capacity for 32 guests, a Scout building originally designed for use by Boy Scouts which will accommodate 100, a community building with dormitory space for 58 guests, and a 20-guest main residence.

Gymnasium Included

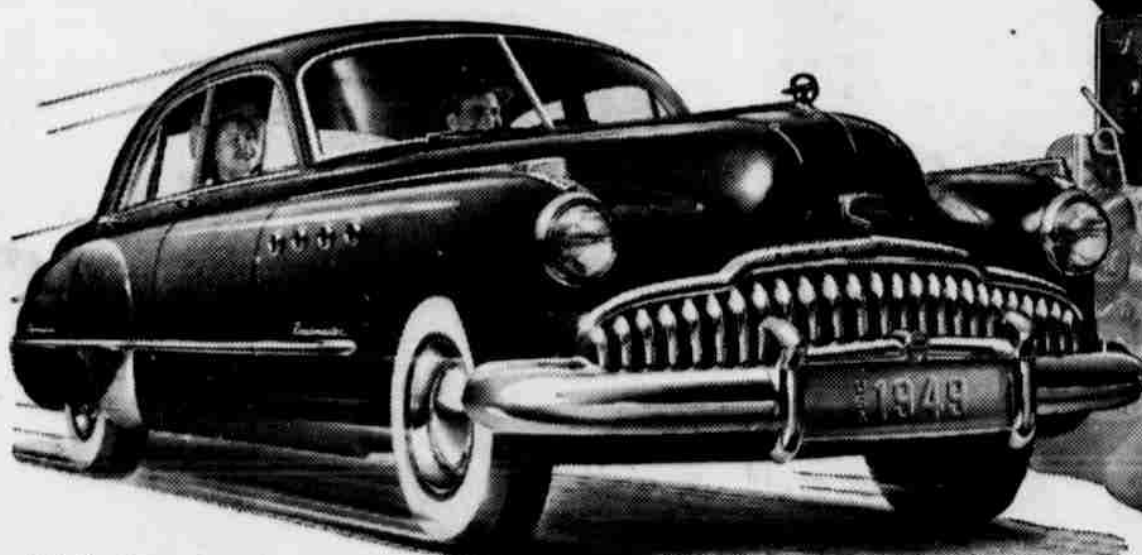

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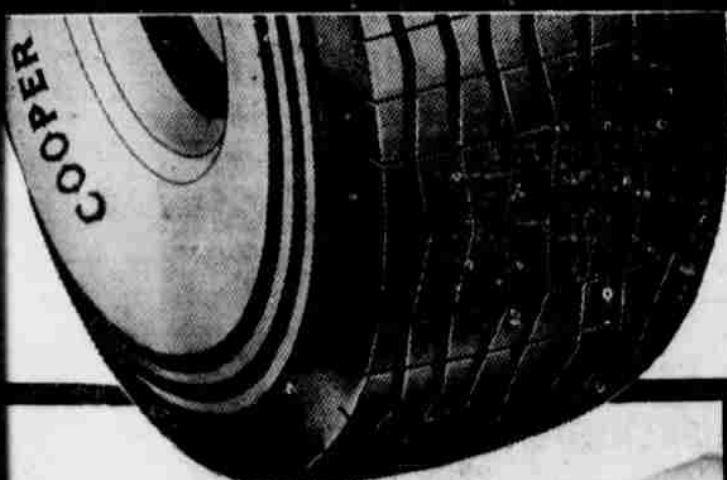

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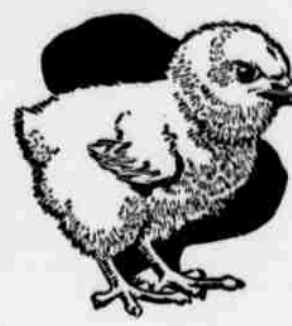

Cotton Crop of 1,500,000 To 2 Million Bales Forecast For Area For 1949

A cotton crop of 1,500,000 to 2,000,000 bales from 3,000,000 acres was predicted Saturday for the South Plains in the first 1949 forecasts of K. N. Clapp, area representative since 1923 of Anderson-Clayton & Co., Houston cotton merchants.

The figures are far in excess of any previous records in this area. The biggest crop was 959,000 bales in 1937 and the largest acreage approximately 2,100,000 last year.

Clapp, however, qualified his 1949 crop forecast as being dependent upon approximately normal rainfall during the summer growing season.

He said also that the acreage actually planted in cotton will be affected considerably by whatever Congress may do about parity prices for grain sorghums this year.

If Congress should approve 90 per cent of parity as the support price for sorghums, Clapp believes cotton planting above the Caprock would be reduced by as much as 500,000 acres to a minimum total of around 2,500,000 is still a record-breaker.

If adequate support is refused for sorghum, the forecaster regards his 3,000,000-acre estimate for cotton as conservative.

Clapp's report points to prospects which, from the present viewpoint, are favorable and unfavorable.

"Cotton plantings may reach 80 per cent of all cultivated areas in Dawson, Lamb, Lubbock and Lynn counties, and average 65 per cent in 12 of the most productive counties," the report stated.

"This would be an unhealthy condition," he commented.

The report continued, in more optimistic vein:

"Subsoil moisture conditions are excellent—as good as I ever have observed at this time of year. There was practically no runoff of the four inches of rain, sleet and snow received during January. In moisture value it probably was double that of the same quantity of average rainfall. Soil is wet to 24 inches and damp down to the caliche strata, which stops penetration.

"Final production is a large question mark. This area can promise more and produce less, and promise less and produce more, than any on the globe.

"We cite the near-million bale crops of 1937 and 1947. Neither year gave early promise of crops of half those amounts. Conversely, last year's crop looked good for over a million bales on Aug. 1. Prospects deteriorated 50 per cent in 30 days because of heat, drought and lack of subsoil moisture.

"With normal moisture 3,000,000 acres of land should easily produce 1,500,000

bales and 2,000,000 would not be improbable.

"With five more inches of rain before May 1, and a few thunder showers to germinate seed at planting time, the large acreage should produce more than 1,000,000 bales, even with summer drought conditions as severe as those last year."

This optimistic outlook, even if summer drought should prevail, is based upon the fact, he explained, that the subsoil has excellent moisture reserves now. Last year it was almost devoid of such moisture, and the area still ginned 641,000 bales.

No estimates have been reported on the irrigated acreage likely to be put in cotton this year. But the consensus of authorities appeared unanimous Saturday that it will exceed somewhat more than 400,000 acres harvested last year. Present guesses as to 1949 average somewhat above 500,000 irrigated acres as a minimum, with some going as high as 800,000, if supports are refused sorghums.

Irrigated land is relied upon to average close to a bale per acre, even under drought conditions. With natural moisture to ease the drain on irrigation wells, the average yield probably would be close to—and might exceed—one and one-quarter bales per acre.

The consensus thus appears to be that, come what may, the South Plains will produce well above the average crop of around 500,000 bales during the past 15 years.

Opinion was equally unanimous that the weather—with particular reference to moisture and hail—will determine how much more than an average crop the area will harvest.

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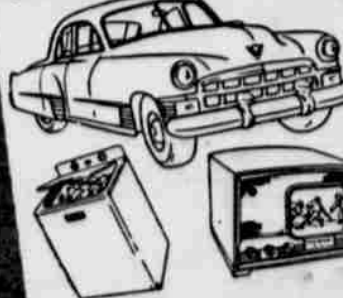
