### COMM'N WILL ASK GRANT FOR COUNTY HOME

County commissioners court Monday will submit to Public Works Administration officials at Fort Worth an application for a grant of \$4,000 to be used in improving the county home. County Judge Clyde Garrett has announced. The grant, if given, will be augmented by approximately \$2,000 of county funds to make the improvements.

The plan, Judge Garrett said, is to build 6 rooms to be stuccoed and have concrete floor and with bath, lights, gas for the housing of inmates, together with an 18 by 18 foot chapel or reception room.

The building would be in an L shape.

The building which now houses 28 inmates would be destroyed by the superintendent's home and a recently erected three room structure would be left intact.

The proposed building would be fireproof and provide more sanitary quarters for the inmates. Each room would house two inmates.

The grounds of the home would be beautified.

### Allred Works On Draft of Message For Liquor Laws

AUSTIN, Sept. 14. — Governor James Allred's advice to legislators in liquor regulations will be a seven page message, typewritten. He was at work on it today, assisted by several state authorities.

## New Plan Drafted to Stop Threat of War

### SEEK TO PIN MUSSOLINI ON HIS DEMANDS

GENEVA, Sept. 14. — The League of Nations conciliation committee of five, ignoring the Italian cabinet "no compromise" announcement, today devised a new plan to halt the threat of war between Italy and Ethiopia.

The committee prepared questionnaires to be submitted to both nations on their hopes and plans for war or peace.

The committee's latest attempt to pin down Premier Benito Mussolini to a statement of what Ethiopian concessions will induce him forego war in the series of questions to both Italy and Ethiopia.

Of Italy the committee would ask what concessions it demands.

Of Ethiopia the committee would ask what concessions it would give to avoid armed invasions although submitting to the Laval plan of international control for Ethiopia which the committee is drafting.

### FIVE NATIONS PLEDGE SUPPORT TO LEAGUE

GENEVA, Sept. 14. — Five European nations, ranging from Soviet Russia to little Portugal, pledged themselves before the League of Nations assembly today to full support of the League of Nations and its covenant in the Italian-Ethiopian crisis.

Portugal, Jugoslavia, Rumania, France and Czechoslovakia all ranged themselves with Great Britain, France and other nations who say they will carry out their promise to support the covenant.

The adhesion of Communist Russia the world's greatest military power, joined it anew with republicans France and monarchial Great Britain in the triple Entente of czarist days.

### McAdoo Married To 25 Year Old Nurse

WASHINGTON, Sept. 14. — Senator William Gibbs McAdoo, democrat, Calif., 71 year old former secretary of treasury, was married today to Doris Cross, 25 year old nurse of the public health service and a former resident of San Diego.

It will be the senator's third marriage. His first wife died. His second marriage was to the daughter of President Wilson in a brilliant ceremony on May 7, 1914. They were divorced a year ago.

McAdoo, who became a national political figure as a result of his administration of the treasury during the war, was instrumental in swinging enough votes at the last democratic convention to assure Roosevelt's nomination.

### Ethiopian Forces Move Into Places For Stand Against Italian Attack

ADDIS ABABA, Sept. 14. — Ethiopian troops selected to meet the first Italian attack were moving into position today within striking distance of the frontier.

Fortifications and entrenchments were being constructed at points where a long stand against attackers armed with modern military equipment was felt to be feasible.

As troops moved toward the "front" it was pointed out in the capital that yesterday's preparation for a general mobilization order does not represent a warlike gesture on the part of Haile Selassie's kingdom. It is simply a final step toward putting the nation on the best military basis possible by making available the service of every man capable of aiding in the national defense and it will not be issued until necessary.

Preparations of the order caps six months of gradual preparation which has been pushed as far as possible in the face of foreign embargoes and local limitations in the matter of supplies and training.

### FRENCH TROOPS IN ETHIOPIA AUTHORIZED

PARIS, Sept. 14. — Emperor Haile Selassie today cabled authorization to send into his country as many colonial troops as may be needed to protect the French legation and French nationals in his capital.

Permission to send French troops to Addis Ababa previously had been refused.

A truce agreement entered into between the company and the union men after the strike here last February 28 expires Sunday midnight. The company already has placed guards in its power plant in El Paso and the Rio Grande plant across the state line in N. M.

The union men had submitted an agreement calling for recognition and wage increases. The company statement said the only negotiation would be through employees representation plan, representing all employees of the company.

### Activity Reported At Suez Entrance

LONDON, Sept. 14. — Unusual naval activity in the Eastern Mediterranean, within a day's sailing of the Suez Canal, was reported today by the Athens correspondent of the Daily Herald.

Three troop ships, escorted by destroyers, landed about 5,000 men and supplies of oil and gasoline off the Asia minor coast about 435 miles from Port Said and destroyers and aircraft were patrolling constantly around the island.

### DRILLING TO START OCT. 1 NEAR CISCO

A. A. Wisdom, Houston oil operator, announced here Saturday he had completed arrangements to drill six miles south of Cisco on the Gus Wende 149.5 acres tract beginning Oct. 1. The well will be drilled on the southwest quarter of section 62, block 3, H. & T. C. survey 660 feet from the south line and 330 feet from the east line.

The location is 1 1/2 miles northwest of the old Humble School well and is near the Rising Star highway. Drilling operations will be started by October 1, Wisdom said.

Phillips Petroleum company has a half interest in the 1500 acre block and in the well.

The old Humble School well has been a producer for many years and the area is considered good oil and gas acreage but has not been developed as extensively as other sections in this locality.

The well will be drilled to a depth of 3,500 feet, Wisdom said Saturday.

### CASING SET AT 402 FEET IN GOWAN WELL

EASTLAND, Sept. 14. — Ten inch casing was being set at 402 feet today on States Oil corporation's Number One J. O. Gorman, section 65, H. and T. C. railway survey, block 20, near Gorman.

The well is an offset to Kirk and Davidson's Number One Gorman well, block 25, H. and T. C. railway survey, which is credited as being a pointer to what was formerly a dormant Gorman area.

Davidson and Kirk's well was brought in the latter part of July and gauged 120 barrels for 24 hours. The well is still flowing at 70 barrels a day and is being pinched back, G. A. Davidson said recently.

The Davidson-Kirk well underwent acidization test, however, before production hit the 120 barrel mark.

Other operations are in progress near Gorman, some being in Comanche.

EASTLAND, Sept. 14. — Schedule of distribution of recently arrived tax exemption certificates to cotton producers was announced today by A. E. Arthur, assistant in cotton adjustment.

The certificates will be distributed at the Chamber of Commerce office in Cisco, Higginbotham Brothers in Rising Star, the building back of Judge Chapman's office in Gorman, and the Chamber of Commerce in Ranger.

### 11 Tongues Spoken At Police Station

BOSTON, Sept. 14. — Whether the prisoner speaks French, Lithuanian, Gaelic, Polish, German, or Greek, Italian, Swedish, Spanish, or Chinese, police of the Hyde Park station can converse with him fluently.

They claim the title of being the most linguistic station in Boston. The policemen speak a total of 11 languages, including ancient and modern Latin.

### DETAIL WORK IS STARTED UPON PROJECTS SOUGHT BY COUNTY

EASTLAND, Sept. 14. — W. M. Sheriffs, engineer employed by the county, is preparing projects submitted recently to Works Progress Administration in complete detail. County Judge Clyde L. Garrett announced today. Applications submitted recently only generally describe the projects.

Officials have announced the county submitted applications for road projects which total \$1,013,408.75. Other projects submitted by the county amounting to \$23,794 bring the total asked to \$1,037,202.78. The non road projects ask for funds for improvement on the county home, electrical help for agent residence and redrafting of county records and transcribing of county records.

The county, it was said, submitted applications for 15 projects.

Eastland, Ranger, and Cisco have submitted applications for 26 projects. Cisco's 6 proposals total \$91,975.66, Ranger's seven, \$76,926; and Eastland's 13, \$102,647.65.

Other communities in the county have submitted five proposals to WPA which total \$35,849.

### Gunplay, Flow of Oil To Be Shown In Oil Belt Book Appearing in October

Blazing six-guns, action, romance, rivers of black gold, all a part of the great Ranger oil boom have been reconstructed by Boyce House, West Texas newspaperman and author, in his book, "Oil Boom," which is due to leave the press early in October.

House went through the boom as an editor and reporter and saw first hand most of the incidents and historical events which he treats with an originality and ease that makes his book not only interesting reading but historically correct.

Humor, pathos, and adventure are cleverly interwoven with the romance of those early boom days.

Some of the historical incidents places and familiar scenes recorded are the sled that hauled folks across the mud on Main street in Ranger, the cemetery that was not for sale, the gun fight in which three were killed, the Belgian count who fought a drifter.

House draws intimate word pictures of the indomitable men who played leading parts in the drama of the Ranger oil boom. There was Colonel W. K. Gordon whose faith resulted in the discovery of the Ranger field, Tom Harrell's meteoric rise from country school teacher to multi-millionaire, and Brock Walker's leap from stage-coach driver to millions.

Money flowed into the Ranger area in amounts that staggered the imagination of men and resulted in financial recklessness and skyrocketing prices. Fifty dollars was paid for service car fare from Cisco to Breckenridge, a day and a half on muddy roads to go 30 miles. It was nothing for a million and a half dollars cash to change hands daily. These and scores of other interesting conditions are vividly pictured in "Oil Boom."

Exchanges by Professor S. P. Ziegler of T. C. U., illustrate oil field scenes.

Many residents throughout the West Texas oil and gas area are urging advance orders of House's book as a civic service and an encouragement for a book that will retain the true historical story of Eastland county's great oil field for the future. The Tardy Publishing company of Dallas, will publish the book.

House has been editor of the Cisco News, Ranger Times, and Oil Belt News.

### FINGERPRINTS OF SINGER ARE FOUND ON GUN

CHESTER, Pa., Sept. 14. — Evelyn's Hoey's fingerprints are the only ones on the pearl handle of the pistol with which she was killed Wednesday night, the United Press learned today.

Charles Dunlap, veteran fingerprint expert of the Chester police department, who was called in on the Hoey case, supplied the evidence which makes the Hoey case look like a suicide.

"The prints on the gun are those of Mrs. Hoey's right ring and middle fingers," Dunlap revealed in an interview at his office.

"It is, in my opinion, absolute proof of suicide."

Miss Hoey, one of the best known present day musical comedy stars, was shot through the head in the bedroom of Henry Huddleston Rogers III, at the Rogers country home Wednesday night.

## WPA PROJECT GRANTED OKEH BY OFFICIALS

A United Press dispatch to the Daily News Saturday said that Cisco had been given \$5,068 for construction of a WPA park construction project in the area east of the Lake Cisco swimming pool.

The project calls for an improvement program in the area, clearing out the creek bed, clearing away of brush, terracing and landscaping the ground.

The park area is a spot of ground 5.6 acres in area immediately below the dam of the swimming pool and with the creek channel that formerly ran through Lake Cisco a part of it.

A dispatch from the United Press bureau at Washington on September 5 told of approval by President Roosevelt of the project which would give the Cisco creek bed park an early start.

It then remained for the Works Progress Administration headquarters at San Antonio to approve the project and allocate the money for the beginning of work here.

Details concerning the date for the beginning of work on the project were not immediately available.

### Adjoins State Park

The new park site is adjacent to the area, development of which is being sought for a state park.

The area now is a mass of undergrowth and debris, considerably from the value of the swimming pool. The pool does not drain as well at present as it should under present conditions, and a part of the park building program calls for improvement of drainage by cutting back of brush and replacing the creek bed.

It has been pointed out that when the area below the swimming pool is made into a park more people will be induced to come here to visit the new scenic beauty spot.

The construction of the park will be a part of a program for general development of the area about Cisco, of which the state park is the most important part.

It has been pointed out that development of both the state park and the creek bed park will be important factors in attracting more persons to Cisco for the Centennial.

### ABILENE UNDERPASS IS GIVEN APPROVAL

### "MARTYRDOM" CLAIMS OF LONG MEN GROWING

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 14. — Huey Long's supporters began an aggressive movement today to capitalize on their claim of martyrdom and stir the state into active resistance of any effort to overthrow the Long regime.

Gerald Smith, throwing off the restraint that characterized his funeral oration over the grave of his leader, pleaded for continuance of the Long tradition in a speech last night.

Smith, shifting from Baton Rouge to New Orleans and planning a quick counter march to Alexandria in central Louisiana, planned to continue his offensive today.

Miss Effie King, head of the science department of Randolph has announced that she will offer a special nature study course to teachers on Saturday mornings. It is a course required for elementary certificates and carries three college credits a semester.

## ConstitutionWeek

Daughters of the American Revolution all over the nation this week will be observing national constitution week, honoring the basic laws of the country and the men who have helped to formulate them.

Mrs. Phillip Pettit, speaking for the Cisco Chapter of the D. A. R., known as the Charles Crawford chapter, has urged all adults to read or reread the constitution as a basis for a new understanding of the principles of the American nation. At the same time, the D. A. R. is urging that parents talk with all children old enough to understand it, about the constitution this week.

Constitution Week is being observed as a means of promoting more loyalty to the United States government. Chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution all over the nation will be stressing the importance of the constitution as the basis for the republic. They will be stressing the importance of it as guaranteeing to the citizens of the United States the freedom of which the nation has been proud since the days of the revolution.

The constitution was drafted by 55 delegates to a convention which met at Philadelphia from May 29 to September 17, 1787, and who completed the document and adjourned 148 years ago Monday.

The farmers of the constitution had as their chief aim not personal gain but the unification of their respective colonies—which at that time already had achieved their independence. The meeting presided over by General George Washington held some stormy sessions but it finally ended with the completion of a work that was termed "the greatest document that ever emanated from the mind of man."

A proof of its perfection is the fact that the constitution was made broad enough and elastic enough to unify the states of the entire nation with interests that vary according to sections and to stand the test of time.

Naturally the constitution was not perfect, but it was so nearly so that it has been the basis for all law of the country, with few changes, for 148 years, while the Texas constitution, much more specific, has been patched and amended until it is hardly recognizable.

The constitution is an instrument of the people. It is their pledge of good faith in the federal government and their pledge from the federal government that it will never trample on the rights of individuals. While the lawmakers sent to the national congress may enact legislation, they can never make valid laws which are in conflict with the constitution and the constitution itself can be changed only with the consent of the people of two thirds of the states.

OLD MEDICINE SHOW REPLACED  
BY MODERN GROVE TRAILER TRAINNewest Comet Is  
Racing Toward Sun

WILLIAMS BAY, Wis., Sept. 14.—Like some gigantic insect lured by the light, the new comet discovered at Kerkers Observatory is rapidly approaching the sun, and will be nearest to it on Dec. 9, when it will begin swinging away.

This solar game of tag was described here by Prof. George Van Biesbroeck, discovered of the new-comer, who has computed the comet's path.

"At present," Van Biesbroeck said, "its distance from the sun is almost double the distance between the earth and the sun, but on Dec. 9 it will be only one and one-fourth as great."

The discovery was made when the astronomer examined a photographic plate of the Sagittarius ("The Archer") Constellation taken on the night of August 20.

The Biesbroeck comet, the professor admitted, is somewhat unorthodox as comets go. Instead of keeping its tail conveniently pointed away from the sun, it makes the appendage describe a 90-degree angle with the line joining the comet and the sun.

But you'd never know it, Biesbroeck said, in effect. Its brightness is expected to increase until the middle of December—but it will almost certainly remain beyond observation with the naked eye.

Super-sensitive microphones are carried, through the use of which complete stage shows can be amplified so that every person in a crowded grandstand can hear the slightest whisper.

The unit carries an applause meter, similar to that used on national radio programs, with which applause from the stands may be accurately measured on an electrical meter to determine winners in amateur, old fiddler, and other contests.

State salaries in particular are so low that they continue a steady economic loss to the departments and institutions of government.

A mediocre man, or a man with just a little above ordinary ability, can command from 50 to 100 per cent more salary elsewhere than in public employment. The outstanding men in the professions in education and administration are steadily drawn away from Texas by much higher compensation elsewhere.

The University of Texas especially has suffered from the loss of distinguished educators and inability to get the men it wants. Accountants, executives, ranger captains, technicians, when they stay in state service out of devotion to it or lack of the financial incentive, are paid about half what the rate of their service would command.

When Dudley F. ## Black Widow Bite Produces No Pain

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 14 — The dreaded bite of a black widow spider had failed early Saturday to produce any painful or serious effects for Homer Guest, who has been under medical treatment since Thursday when he reported that he had been bitten.

### Chinese 'Poker' In Home Sanctioned

SHANGHAI, Sept. 14 — If you  
are a Chinese and want to invite  
friends to your house for an infor-  
mal game of Mah Jong, it's within the  
law provided you play for small  
stakes.

The new Chinese criminal code  
enforcement of which has begun re-  
verses an earlier court ruling on  
gambling in the home.

Under the earlier pronounce-  
ment, anyone playing any game  
for any amount of money was liable  
to criminal prosecution. The law  
aroused considerable opposition  
among the masses, to whom a soci-  
able game of Mah Jong is what  
poker is to the American business  
man.

The law, accordingly, was re-  
vised to permit playing for stakes  
in the home, but the line of demar-  
cation between friendly playing and  
gambling was not too clear. If the  
game is played primarily for amuse-  
ment, rather than for profit, the act  
will be allowed by the law. Exactly  
what determines the primary motive  
of the parlor game was not defined.  
Nanking, however, will continue  
its ban on gambling in dens, whet-  
ter for profit or entertainment. The  
courts, presumably will decide when  
a home has become a gambling den.

## Weekly Sunday School Lesson

### TIMOTHY

(A Christian Worker in Training)

Text: II Timothy 1:1-14  
The International Uniform  
Sunday School Lesson for Sept.  
15.

BY WM. E. GILROY, D. D.  
Editor of Advance

TIMOTHY is inevitably asso-  
ciated with Paul. The rela-  
tionship between them was al-  
most as real as if Timothy had  
been Paul's own son. It did  
credit to the disciple as well as  
the master.

Not every one who has the  
privilege of learning from a  
great teacher has the spirit and  
the willingness to learn or to be  
inspired by his great example.

Paul, with all his might, had  
elements of weakness. He was  
not above criticism. There are  
indications also, here and there,  
that he was rather an exacting  
master and a strict disciplin-  
arian.

Timothy might have found  
occasion for disregarding or re-  
belling against Paul's instruc-  
tions and discipline, but he had  
the good sense to perceive the  
greatness of the man who was  
willing to guide and instruct  
him, and evidently Paul also  
had reason to feel proud of his  
disciple.

FORTUNATELY, out of this  
relationship there have come  
the two letters in our New  
Testament that are so instruc-  
tive and vital for youth today.  
Paul was now an old man. As  
he himself puts it, he was  
"ready to be offered," and the  
shadow of the martyr's death  
was already hanging over him.  
This second letter was to be  
among his last writings. There  
is in it, therefore, something of  
the quality of a last will and  
testament.

Paul had no worldly goods  
with which to endow Timothy,  
but he could leave to him a

heritage of good will and guid-  
ance greater than any material  
endowment could give. His  
greeting to Timothy is full of  
tender affection. He calls him  
"my beloved child."

He thanks God "with prayer  
unceasing" for what Timothy  
has meant to him, and speaks of  
the longing to see him. It is a  
very tender picture of the inner  
life of a man who was so strong  
in conscience and so firm in will  
that nothing could move him.

It is not that the supreme miracle  
of Christianity—the tender-  
ness that it combines with great-

gifts does not always have the  
energy and zeal to display these  
gifts and use them aright.

Timothy surely must have  
felt the thrill of a young man  
to whom an older man, who  
had fought a good fight, was  
committing a further trust.  
What inspiration to carry on  
there must have been in the  
realization that Paul trusted  
him and looked to him to con-  
tinue the mission that he had  
accomplished so mightily!

Elsewhere Paul urged Tim-  
othy to endure hardness as a  
good soldier of Jesus Christ.  
The task on which he was  
launched was not one that could  
be performed by enthusiasm and  
earnestness alone. It called for  
qualities of stability and courage

reason to believe that Timothy

## TRUCK MAKES FAST RUN UP FAMOUS PEAK

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo.,  
Sept. 14 — Pikes Peak, land mark  
for gold seekers who swarmed over  
the plains of the West a half cen-  
tury ago was the scene of an unusu-  
al speed test recently. A 1-2 ton  
truck, a far cry from the ox-wagon

trains of the sixties which trans-  
ported thousands to the alluring

sped up the 12.4 mile climb to the

above sea level.

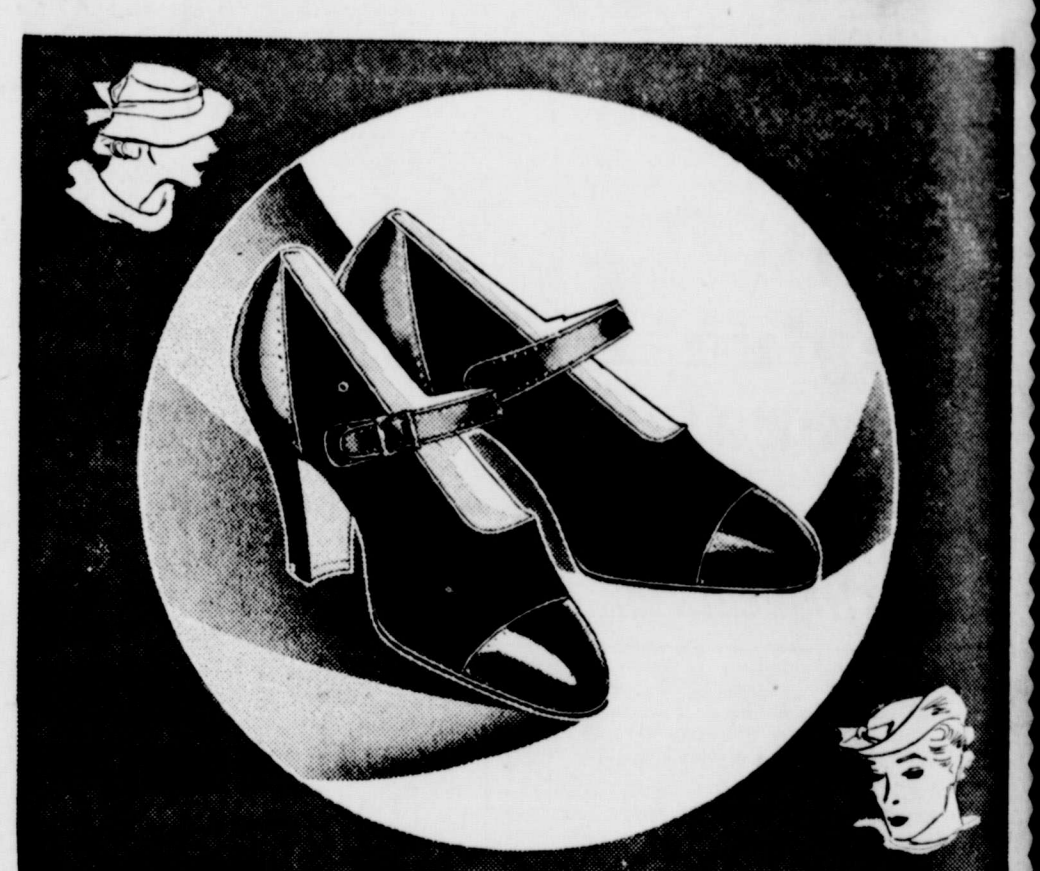
W. P. Bentrup, Colorado Springs,
