Schools Register 401 Opening Day, Enrollment Shows Decrease

Class Organize and Elect Officers for New School Term

The Rockport schools opened Tuesday with 401 students registering the first day—54 short of the total enrollment of 455 last year.

Classes began Wednesday in the elementary schools and high school students met for short class periods and for organization of classes. Schedules for students are still being re-arranged and this will go on, for another week or so until the school obtains a homemaker teacher.

Late registration of students will probably swell the ranks to 500 or more before the week is out. Total enrollment last year was 588.

"Plans are under way to hold the annual student council election, which is the representative from the student body to the administration," Supt. Wheeler said. This body meets with the superintendent, lays its plans before him, and tries to pass legislation for it. If the plan is good and fits in with the policies of the school as well as for the betterment of spirit among the students, the plan is usually passed by the council.

"The elections will be held for a president of the student body, a vice-president, three councilmen,

and three pep-squad leaders. The idea of democratic government by the students themselves is thus given a fine "airing", and whoever they elect will take the reins over from the preceding president and council."

University Plans For Return of Service Men

AUSTIN, Sept. 6.—With the Army urging every discharged serviceman under 25 years of age to return to school or college, the University of Texas is getting ready for an avalanche of veterans before long.

To make sure that the path of these veterans is cleared of unnecessary hurdles, the University is setting up a simple but well-balanced and effective program to aid them in whatever problems—personal or curricular, that may arise.

Two University faculty members—Walter T. Rolfe, professor of architecture, and Hubert B. Jones, assistant professor of business administration—have been assigned to act as counselors for veterans.

A faculty committee, headed by W. R. Woolrich, dean of the College of Engineering, is to remain in action continuously, to study any matters affecting the veterans and to make recommendations to the University faculty or administration as needed to take care of any situation or emergency.

One change already in effect is that veterans who have seen six months' active service may enroll under individual approval—without having completed the high school work customarily required for admission—at the age of 18. Previously, a student must have attained the age of 21 to be eligible for admission under individual approval.

"We are attempting to develop a workable program here at the University that will be of real advantage to returning servicemen," Vice-President J. Alton Burdine said. "It will not involve a meaningless, elaborate organization but a coordinated program that will seek to be of service to the veterans in finding the course of study which will meet their individual needs most adequately, and in making their adjustments to civilian, student environment easier."

Organization of Kindergarten to Be Discussed

A meeting of all parents interested in sending pre-school age children to kindergarten has been called for 10 o'clock Monday morning to discuss ways and means of organizing a kindergarten. The meeting, called by Supt. Morgan C. Wheeler, will be held in the high school auditorium.

Wheeler reported that he had requests for schooling for over twenty pre-school age children, many of whose mothers are working. Those with children from 4 years old through six are urged to attend the meeting, if they desire to send their children to school.

Applications for 'A' Books Should Be In By Sept. 15

Applications for renewal of basic "A" gasoline ration cards would be in the hands of the local rationing board before Sept. 15. The old "A" books expire on Sept. 21 and a few days will be needed to process the applications and get the books mailed to the applicants.

Blanks are now available at all service stations and have complete instructions printed on them. They should be correctly filled out and either mailed or taken to the ration board.

COMPOSE DOOLITTLE SONG
READING, Pa.—"Doo-little, You Did o' Much," is the title of a song composed by two local women, Kitty Schofer and Flora Schaffer, which will be sung at the official postwar christening of Doolittle, Mo. The newly incorporated town was named in honor of Lt. Gen. James Doolittle, air hero of World War II, leader of the first U. S. bombing raid on Tokyo.

Scouts Sponsor Paper Salvage Pick-Up Here

County Trucks to Make Rounds and Pick Up Paper Over City

Next Friday—Sept. 15—county trucks will make the rounds over Rockport to pick up waste paper that has been collected and placed at the edge of streets in a paper salvage campaign that is being sponsored and carried on by the Boy Scouts here.

"We want to urge that everybody bundle up as much paper as possible and place it at the edge of the street in front of their homes," Scoutmaster Frank Walker urges.

Magazines and newspapers should be tied into separate bundles, and the bundles should not be so large that it will be difficult to load them.

It is pointed out that the present drive to salvage waste paper is a vital part of the war effort. Every citizen is urged to cooperate to the fullest extent.

Save your paper—have it bundled up and out front early on the morning of Sept. 15, when the trucks manned by boy scouts will be around to collect it.

From waste to war vital paper board in 60 minutes. That's how fast waste paper patriotically saved by Texas homes finds its way into essential uses.

This graphically revealed in a tour of the Dallas plant of Fleming and Sons, Inc., the only mill of its type in Texas.

Texas have never been slow to boost a home product. But they have for the most part been unaware of the fact that their individual waste paper collections, sometimes made with a tongue in the cheek attitude, are getting into action this fast on our country's fighting fronts via this unique Southwestern institution.

No war spawned defense plant, hastily thrown up to meet the national emergency, the Fleming mill is now being operated by the third and fourth generations of the founding family.

The initiative and foresight prompted the establishment of the mill in Texas in 1893, a daring pioneer gesture in a day when industrialists automatically thought of the East and North for such locations, is now serving the war effort well.

Products of the mill, which are composed of a mixture of 90 percent waste paper and only 10 percent of the precious and scarce wood pulp, are channeled 100 percent to Army and Navy requirements and essential civilian goods, such as food packaging.

Waste paper collections in Texas cities, similar to the campaigns the Texas Newspapers' Waste Paper Drive Committee has suggested every community stage beginning Sunday, August, and ending Sept. 20, have so far kept the mill in operation. Probably 80 percent of the country's mills have had shut-downs of varying periods.

"I sincerely believe we would have had to shut down several times but for the constant flow of waste paper from citywide drives," Ervin T. Fleming, Jr., vice-president and production manager stated.

Fleet Taking To Gulf For Larger Shrimp

Unprecedented Amount Of Small Shrimp In Bays This Season

With an almost unprecedented amount of small shrimp in the bays most of the shrimp fleet here began this week turning their attention to the gulf, where the catch is larger size shrimp.

There are two major reasons for the shrimpers neglecting the bay shrimp for the larger ones in the gulf. One is the shortage of headers to process the shrimp. It takes more time and more headers to handle the small shrimp. Another reason is that there is a bigger public demand for larger shrimp, and these command better prices.

"I believe the small size shrimp are really superior to the larger ones," S. F. Jackson, local dealer said, "but the public is in the habit of eating larger shrimp. It we could convince the consumer of the high quality of small shrimp, then we would have a much better market."

Some of the dealers have limited their boats to the amount of shrimp they can bring from the bay. The bay shrimp are about a 50 count and are bringing about 4 cents a pound.

Transportation and storage space has also been a problem during the past week.

Tuesday catch in the gulf was reported to have been good, and fair luck was reported Wednesday. Weather conditions were bad for Thursday in the gulf, and some of the boats were again working the bay.

Postwar Cloth Wears Longer, Looks Better

ST. LOUIS. — The Monsanto
Chemical Company of St. Louis
has announced important new de-
velopments in the treatment of
fibers which will have a great ef-
fect on the textile industry after
the war.

After long research in the Day-
ton and Boston laboratories the
company reported progress in the
following process.

1. Treatment of wool so it won't
shrink.
2. Treatment of both cotton and
wool so the wearing qualities of
these fabrics will be doubled.
3. Treatment of serge to elimi-
nate the shine in the cloth.
4. Treatment of wool so it will
retain a crease. Trousers and suits
made of this treated material will
not rumple even after being out in
the rain or packed in a suitcase.
5. Treatment of fibers so they
won't slip. This means stockings
won't run or seams pull out.

All of these developments are
based on new techniques of treat-
ing either the surface or the heart
of the fiber to produce the desired
effect without changing the tex-
ture or the feel of the material.

New Medical Service For Disabled Vets Proving Helpful

AUSTIN, Sept. 6.—A brand-new Army medical service—unheard-of in World War I—is responsible for the cheerful and optimistic spirits of servicemen who have been wounded or hospitalized for other reasons.

A University of Texas physical education class recently heard an Army doctor describe the Army's new reconditioning service—barely a year old—which seeks to restore every soldier to his military unit or to civilian life "mentally and physically prepared to take up his duties with maximum efficiency."

Lt. Col. R. L. Deter, reconditioning officer at Camp Swift, Texas, told the class that this program is now in effect in every U. S. Army hospital the world over.

Reconditioning is started within 48 hours after a soldier reaches the hospital, he said, "just as soon as a wounded man recovers from shock, or as soon as the cast hardens on a broken arm or leg."

The hospitalized soldier is kept busy throughout his waking hours "so that there will be no lying in bed staring at the ceiling and feeling sorry for himself," Colonel Deter declared.

He takes physical exercise—to work his arms and torso, if he has a leg injury, or vice versa. He takes lessons in handicraft, hears lectures on military subjects, is entertained with musical and other programs in the hospital ward, and often enrolls in correspondence lessons.

This program has been so successful that it has been possible to cut in half the period of hospitalization for certain types of diseases. It has "salvaged a tremendous number of men who otherwise would have been lost to future military service," Colonel Deter asserted.

Deter is in charge of the reconditioning program in the regional Hospital at Camp Swift, under the direction of Col. A. K. Brown, hospital commanding officer.

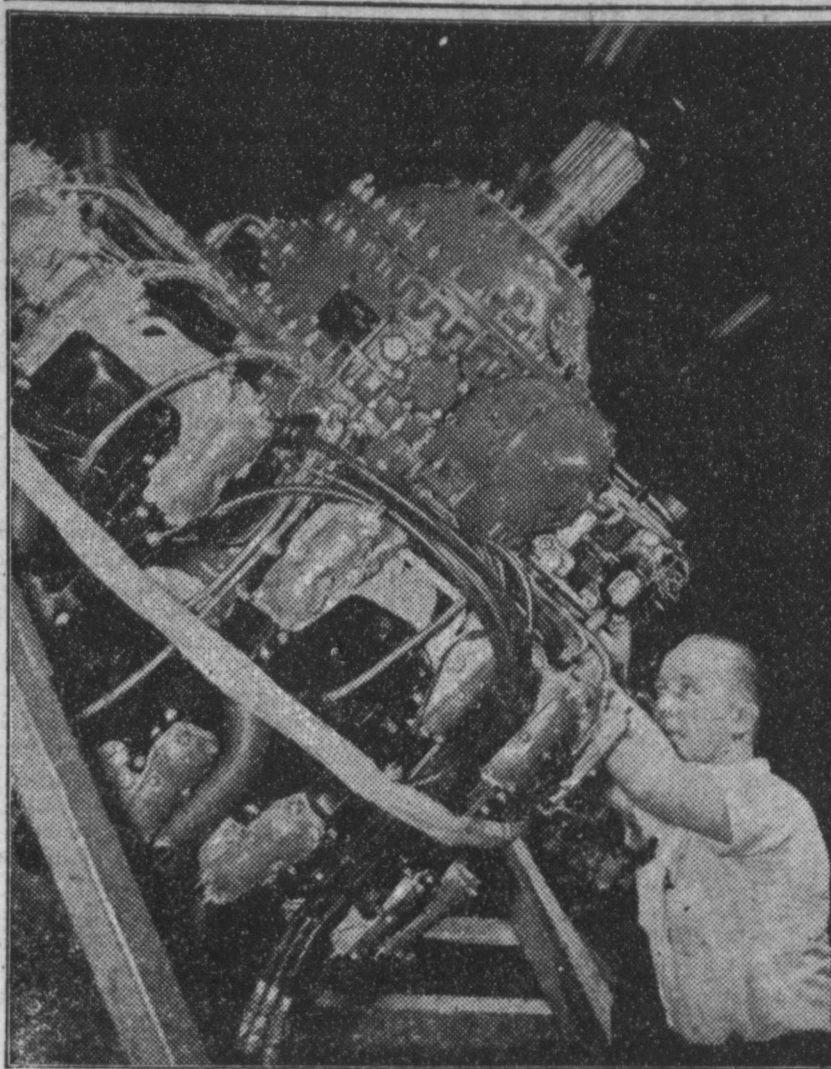

Women Workers Who Marry Should Tell Board

Women workers should notify the Social Security Board when they marry so their names can be changed on the Board's records at Baltimore.

If they do this they will make it easier for themselves and the Board when the time comes to file claims for old-age survivors insurance benefits.

For the women who marries and wants to change her name, the Board has provided a special form which may be obtained at the local field office of the Board. She should fill it out, attach the social security card bearing her maiden name and send the form to the Board.

The Board does not assign her a new number, but issues a new card bearing her present name and the number that was originally assigned to her. She thus will have only one social security number during her entire life-time. If she had more than one number, she might stand to lose her benefits.

The Board keeps all information it receives from the worker strictly confidential.

The worker obtains further information from Mr. Glenn T. Dunn, manager of the Corpus Christi field office of the Social Security Board.

Answer Man Helps Army Solve Riddles

DETROIT, Mich.—"Answer man" is the title of Peter Conjei of 15313 Rossini Drive, Detroit, who is a civilian technical representative of Packard Motor Company with the Army Air Forces. He earned the title from Major Herman N. Gauss, chief of an air service command somewhere in England.

"Conjei has solved every one of our engineering problems," Major Gauss commented. "Nobody works harder or longer than our 'answer man'."

Conjei arrived in England to work with Army experts in battlefront maintenance of Rolls-Royce aircraft engines. Shortly after his arrival he was assigned to supervise the tuning-up of the Mustang fighter "Eky-Clipper" which was presented to the Army Air Corps by Packard workers.

While on the homefront Conjei was assistant foreman in the Packard's aircraft engine division. He was awarded the War Production Board's Certificate of Merit for suggesting combined operations in Rolls-Royce engine parts assembly. His suggestion increased assembly output by 55 per cent and cut tool requirements from 14 complete sets to two.

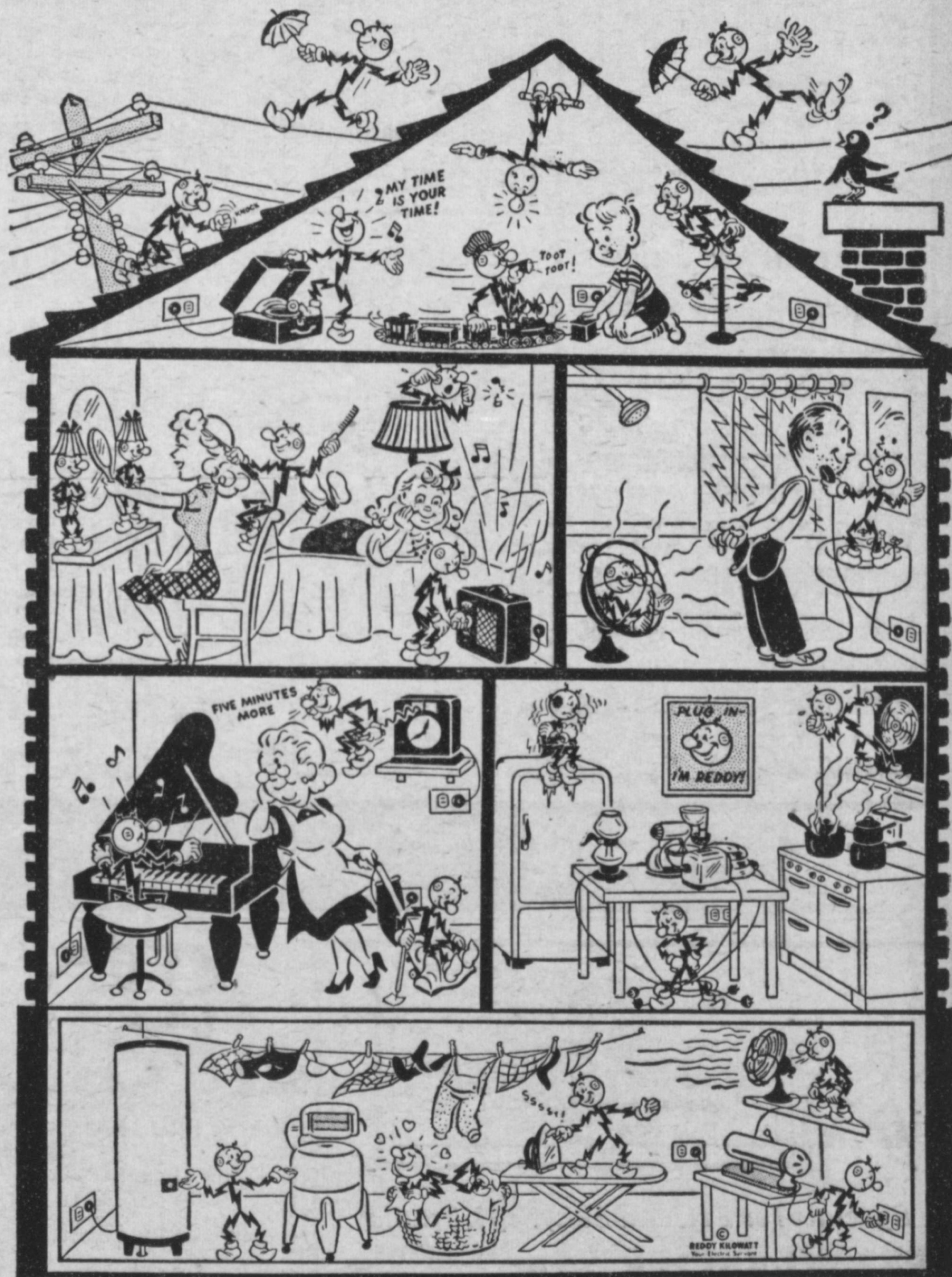

sections of the country, are dangerously low, though, and need constant replenishment from waste paper drives in all sections of Texas.
In one hour from the time a box car is unloaded, this waste paper can go through the grinding jaws of the beaters, over the giant rollers of the paper machine and come out of the cutters ready for packaging and transfer as outbound freight.
Patriotic Texans can not only "praise the Lord" for such rapid transit of what the War Production Board terms the nation's No. 1 war material, but they can also be content in the knowledge that they are really helping to "pass the ammunition."
Paper for the packaging of shells represents the greatest tonnage of Fleming's outgoing product, and a group of ordnance plants is receiving the majority of the output.
Other large orders are for bullet proof gas tank molds and Ration K and C containers. "Paperboard" which is produced in large quantities goes for food packaging, at least a part of which reaches the armed forces the rest being routed for civilian consumption.
Devoid of technical terms waste paper follows a comparatively simple route at the mill, once the all important job of getting collections there has been accomplished.
Unloading from box cars finds the bales of waste paper on the storage platform which in pre-war days held 550 tons of paper daily. Now the capacity is about 200 tons.
Eight box cars daily are "consumed" by the mill or about 160 tons of paper. Between 145 and 150 tons of reclaimed paper is shipped out per day, the difference representing what is lost in the process of found unfit for use.
Present inventories, without constant additions from municipal waste paper collections, would keep the mill going only one and one-half days, Fleming declared.
These staggering figures reveal not only the acute need for every scrap of waste paper but show what collections have already accomplished in WPB's fight to keep dwindling paper supplies balanced with heavily increased wartime demands for all types of paper products. They also back Fleming's assertion that "we are running from hand to mouth."
When the paper is fed into the beaters it is ground into minute particles in a mixture that is 90 percent water and 10 percent paper. After the paper is thoroughly ground it is fed into the paper machine where giant rollers extend 320 feet or approximately the height of a 30-story skyscraper. There it is rolled into sheets 114 inches wide and the moisture extracted at a temperature of 272 degrees Fahrenheit.
When the proper consistency and thickness have been attained the sheets pass through the cutter and come out the required sizes. Packaging and shipping follow quickly.
To keep this part of Texas' stake in the war in operation and provide waste paper stocks for hard pressed mills in other sections of the country, A. Patrick Flood of Austin, state salvage manager, has appealed for every city and town to vigorously promote its own waste paper drive.
