HOME TOWN TALK

You'll find in this issue the report of a meeting of Midland and Andrews county officials. It sounds as if a road might be opened from Midland directly to Andrews, Eunice, Hobbs and Carlsbad.

We do not envy Midland or any other county a new, useful road if they can get one. But we certainly do hate to see Howard county sit and hold the sack.

Howard county is holding the sack not so much because somebody else won't do anything as it is from refusal of its own people to do anything about it. That's putting it bluntly, but it's the truth.

As long as you've got somebody jumping up and yelling bloody murder about where will the road go you're going to get exactly no place with any road improvement program.

The public should go out tonight and listen to the address of Hon. Claude Miller, in behalf of the gubernatorial candidacy of James Young of Kaufman. There are a number of former Kaufman people in Big Spring who are working for Mr. Young, who undoubtedly is a high-type gentleman, well-trained in statecraft. It appears right at this time he may have difficulty in making the run-off race. You can't tell about this race though. Most of the candidates are finding comfort in a claim that about half the voters yet are undecided as to how they will go in the first primary. Perhaps Mr. Young will poll many of them. That we may be acquainted with the claims of the candidates we should attend the address tonight if possible.

Predictions are being made by editors in a number of counties. It is predicted by one observer that Mr. Sterling will poll 15,000 in his home county, Harris, and that the other candidates will rank thus: Young, 4,000; Ferguson, 3,000; Mayfield, 3,500; Miller, 5,000; Love, 6,000; Small, 1,000.

A Nolan county editor picks Ferguson to lead there with 700 votes with Small second, 500; Sterling and Love, 300 each; Miller and Mayfield 200 each; Young 125.

In Runtels county, it is predicted, Ferguson will lead with 1,000 with Sterling second, 800; Love, third, 600; Young and Miller 400 each; Mayfield 300.

Small will lead in Garrettsburg and Wichita counties, according to one list of predictions from 27 counties. Ferguson will lead in Shelby, Runtels, Lampasas, Henderson, Hunt, Bell, Hill (the Love), Ellis, Cherokee, Collin, Upshur (the Love), Mayfield and Miller, Nolan, Orange, Brazos and Grimes.

The total number of votes predicted for the various candidates in 27 counties lists them in this order: Sterling, Ferguson, Love, Miller, Young, Mayfield, Small, Putnam, Moody, Walker, Lovern.

BOY FLIER DISCOVERED NEAR DEATH

Goldsborough Has Badly Fractured Skull

BENNINGTON, Vt., July 15 (AP)—Frank Goldsborough, 19 year old aviator, was found alive in the wreckage of his airplane in the fastness of a wild mountain-side near here today, but serious fear he may have made his last flight. Examination at a hospital showed a badly fractured skull and the flier's condition was said to be extremely critical.

In Wilderness
Goldsborough crashed in the wilderness of the side of Woodford mountain, half way between here and Dunville Notch, about noon yesterday, while flying from Buffalo, N. Y., to Keen, N. H., with Donald McOkler, a lecturer. McOkler, thrown clear of the wreckage was unable to extricate Goldsborough and wandered about five hours before he reached a farm house and summoned help.

Searching parties combed the mountainside throughout the night and found the youth, unconscious, about 6:30 o'clock this morning, approximately 18 hours after he had fallen. Having found the injured aviator, the task of the searching party was not ended, however, for there remained the task of carrying him for more than two miles through swamp land, tangled underbrush and boulder strewn trails to a point where an ambulance awaited his arrival. Two members of the party, for this purpose provided an improvised stretcher by tying their coats together. Meanwhile exerting every effort not to cause too great distress to the injured youth, who was bleeding at the mouth and nose.

The ambulance, pushing forward over difficult roads required forty minutes to cover the four mile stretch to the hospital here. Awaiting the youth at the hospital was his stepmother, Mrs. Bryce Goldsborough.

Dr. John Trotter, the first surgeon who examined Goldsborough, offered a fractured skull as the youth's only major injury, but said that with his long period of exposure and lack of attendance was sufficient to make his condition most critical.

George W. Thomasson, 81, pioneer Coahoma resident, died at his home at 8 o'clock this morning.

Funeral services for the long time resident of Howard county will be held at the Church of Christ, Coahoma, at 3:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The Rev. Mr. Forehand of Garden City will conduct the rites. D. C. Riley of Lubbock will have charge of the musical arrangements. Burial will be in the Coahoma cemetery. Eberly Funeral Home has charge of the body.

Mr. Thomasson is survived by ten children, thirty grandchildren and 10 great grandchildren.

Surviving children are T. F. Thomasson, Lake Arthur, N. M.; W. A. Thomasson, Stanton; D. A. Thomasson, Toyah; Mrs. R. A. Holden, California; Mrs. E. H. Fuqua, George Thomasson, B. R. Thomasson, F. B. Thomasson, Mrs. O. E. Musgrove and B. E. Thomasson, of Coahoma.

Mr. Thomasson was a retired farmer of Coahoma. He moved there 23 years ago.

NEW ROAD IS PLANNED

Midland and Andrews Men Confer On Matter

MIDLAND, Texas, July 15.—Construction of a brand new road from Andrews to Hobbs via Eunice to connect with the Midland and Odessa roads to Andrews and thence to Hobbs was indicated this morning by the Andrews county court.

The proposed road would follow hard land in a northwesterly direction from Andrews to Eunice and over a proposed new state of New Mexico highway into Hobbs, and either direct from Eunice to Carlsbad Cavern, or to a cut-off connecting with the Lovington-Hobbs to Carlsbad road.

The Midland county commissioners court and the Midland chamber of commerce were represented at the Andrews court Monday morning by County Judge M. R. Hill, Clarence Scharbauer, Sam Preston and the Midland chamber secretary. A delegation of Eunice citizens also appeared before the Andrews court and a harmonious meeting was held. The Andrews court appeared to be unanimous for a road to afford a faster, shorter connection to Hobbs and to Carlsbad cavern. The proposed new construction will be done by Andrews county and Lea county, New Mexico.

Representatives of the Midland court and chamber of commerce told of a meeting at Abilene, attended by these same men and Donald Hutt several weeks ago at which Judge Ely expressed interest in a new road from Midland to afford a shorter route to Carlsbad Cavern. The Midland men assured Andrews of complete cooperation and urged quick action on the proposed shorter and faster route to Hobbs and the cavern. They pointed out that such a road would bring a vast amount of travel and business to Andrews and would be of benefit to Odessa, Big Spring, Midland and other states east of Andrews.

At present traffic between Eunice and Hobbs goes generally via Monmouth, which would make the proposed new route 12 to 13 miles.

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ADDITION OF FOUR FIREMEN PLACES SIX ON DUTY AT ALL HOURS; SUBSTATION PLANNED

Four new firemen have been added to the Big Spring force, it was announced today.

The new men are Boyd Carpenter, F. Hefferman, Tommie Marsh and Gaylor.

The addition of the four men brings the total of regular firemen to eight, with six on duty at all hours. Plans for the establishment of the new substation in the south part of the city have not been completed. When a site is procured two additional firemen will be obtained, bringing total to 10. The two will have charge of the substation and will be on duty day and night. The city commission, at the last regular meeting, authorized City Manager V. R. Smithman, to proceed with enlarging the force of firemen and creating the substation.

Candidates Prove Statistics Can Be Made to Prove Anything; Here's How They Dope Their Own Races

DALLAS, July 14. (AP)—Often it has been said that statistics can be made to prove anything and supporters of seven candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor are working their figures overtime and proving the truth of that saying.

Each of the seven camps can show the visitor how its leader is going to receive at least 150,000 votes. That would mean 1,050,000 votes, not counting the ballots to be cast for the four remaining candidates. However, the experts say the total vote won't be over 750,000 or 800,000.

GRAND JURY CALLED FOR NEGRO CASE

WHEELER, Texas, July 15 (AP)—Judge W. R. Ewing of the 31st district court today convened a special term of the court and summoned a grand jury to meet Thursday to consider an indictment against Jesse Lee Washington, negro charged with the slaying last Friday of Mrs. Henry Vaughan, white.

Judge Ewing announced that on account of the inflamed feeling here over Mrs. Vaughan's brutal slaying near Shamrock when she was clubbed to death with an iron pipe, he would transfer the case to Miami for trial. He said his court would convene at Miami on July 21 and the case would be set for trial on July 28.

Decision to convene a special term was reached at a conference between Judge Ewing and officers and citizens of this section. A report that Washington was being transferred to the jail here and not to Miami was discounted. It was said they did not know where he was being held.

ERICK, Okla., July 15 (AP)—While petitions were being circulated here today asking citizens whether they desire negroes to reside in their midst in the future, reports were current on the street that Jesse Lee Washington, negro, who killed Mrs. Henry Vaughan at her farm home near Shamrock, Tex., last week, was being taken to Wheeler, Tex.

In a tense session today, Erick business men at a special meeting flatly refused to approve the action of the hoodlum gang that chased negroes from this community over the week end. The business men counseled cool headed action and refused to attach their names to the petition suggesting that negroes not be allowed to reside in this section.

The report of Washington's removal from the Granite, Okla., reformatory, where he had been held following threats of mob action, was to the effect he was being taken to Wheeler for arraignment and preliminary hearing. Fear was expressed that the negro if arraigned there, officers might be unable to give him protection.

Frank Tackett, father of the murdered woman, and Leo Rosson, brother in law, both were reported to have gone to Wheeler, accompanied by several others from Erick.

Tom Love

Tom Love's supporters can figure his chances in the race. Herbert Hoover got 327,036 votes two years ago, they point out. They figure 267,000 of the Hoover followers will go into the democratic primary. Love is the only candidate for governor who supported President Hoover and he should get at least 60 per cent of these 267,000 votes, which would be something like 160,000, they contend. Besides, Love got 202,329 votes in the lieutenant governor's race in 1928.

Earle B. Mayfield's cohorts will reply that their candidate obtained 300,246 votes in the United States senate race two years ago in a field which included such figures as Senator Tom Connally, Congressman Tom Blanton, Alvin Owsley and Mrs. Minnie Fisher Cunningham. Mayfield could lose 50,000 and still receive 150,000, they point out.

Supporters of Ross Sterling, Jim Young and Clint Small use a little more indirect way of figuring but they too are doing their adding and subtracting.

As To Sterling
Sterling's followers say he has made the state road bond question the paramount issue and as the leader of the road bond forces should get practically all the support of those agreeing with him on that proposal. Conceding that the highway bond issue would not carry, which its proponents are by no means willing to do, it is inconceivable it is opposed by four-fifths of the voters, they state.

Those who endorse Small divided his chart into sections. Of 175,000 votes in his home territory, West Texas, he should get 100,000, they contend. Surely he can pick up 50,000 of the other 75,000, they add. Jim Young admits he was selected by "regular" democratic leaders as their candidate to defeat the factional chieftains and effect harmony in the party. If at least 150,000 voters aren't against the "professional politicians" and against the road bond issue, his supporters confess they are no judges of politics.

All of which means exactly nothing, or about that, but it gives the boys with little to do and the long summer days to do it in a chance to get out their pencils and work up their own set of figures.

Sanitation Inspector Declares Rumors About Milk Ordinance Circulated Here Are Unfounded

In an effort to have dairymen, butter and buttermilk peddlers of Howard county understand the exact status of the milk ordinance, over which so much controversy has raged during the past week, J. M. Williams, sanitation inspector, today issued a statement in regard to the measure.

According to Williams there are but three requirements for butter peddlers. The cows must undergo a tuberculin test. The handlers of the butter and the milk must have health certificates showing them free from contagious diseases. The products must be labeled with the name and address of the producer and the weight of the butter.

"It is not necessary," Williams said, "for the entire family to have physical examinations; only those handling the butter or milking the cows. It is neither necessary nor compulsory for barns to have concrete floors. If the butter producer wishes to milk his cows in the open, it is all right. There are only the three major requirements in the ordinance that refer to the butter seller."

Speaking of the many rumors which have been rife since the agitation over the ordinance was first started, Williams declared each is unfounded. There has been no effort made to enforce the ordinance, and there will not be for several months. "No one has been stopped from selling anything," Williams said. "The unfounded rumors that peddlers of milk, butter, vegetables, chickens and everything else have been molested are entirely without foundation. The health department has done nothing toward enforcing the ordinance."

According to Williams he has merely endeavored to acquaint himself with the dairymen of the county, and to familiarize them with the requirements as set down by the standard milk code.

He declared he would be glad to meet with the farmers and dairymen at any time to discuss the ordinance, explain the various phrases of it, and what

ATTEMPTED ESCAPE IS THWARTED

One Gets Away; Life-Termner's Heart Pierced

PECOS, Texas, July 15 (AP)—The steady aim and cool nerve of Mrs. John Duncan, wife of the Reeves county jailer, prevented wholesale jail delivery and probably saved the life of her husband here last night.

A bullet from Mrs. Duncan's pistol pierced the heart of Willie Hernandez, a life-termner, as the prisoner came down the steps, after Duncan had been slugged by Hernandez when he went into the cell.

Pedro Aguilar, under death sentence for murder, got away, after Duncan had been slugged. Duncan called a warning to his wife on the floor below and she attempted to stop the on-coming prisoners, but Aguilar got away.

Hernandez, the dead man, known as "Willie the Hog," was given the death penalty five years ago for the murder of John Paddock, whose body was found in the ruins of his burned filling station north of Pecos, but the verdict was reversed and on a second trial he got life imprisonment. The judgment had been affirmed and he was awaiting transfer to Huntsville. Aguilar was given death for the murder of Toota Dahan, a deputy sheriff in Ward county last spring. It was believed Aguilar was headed for the Mexican border.

Hobbs Marketing Schedule Allows 35,000 Barrels

ROSWELL, N. M., July 15 (AP)—The Hobbs pool of Lea county, N. M., will go on a daily marketing schedule of 35,000 barrels of oil today or tomorrow under the proration agreement reached by 24 operators of the Hobbs area.

The agreement has the approval of the state land commissioner, Austin D. Crile of New Mexico and State Geologist Glen Staley. The proration agreement will give Hobbs a monthly production of 700,000 barrels. The field at present has a potential production based upon active wells of 24 companies of 4,710,000 barrels monthly.

Operators entering the proration arrangement have agreed no well in the Hobbs pool will be shut unless necessary. No oil will be placed in storage on the field; no wells in the area will be placed on air or gas lift; and no well will be operated in such a manner as would unnecessarily or unreasonably waste gas or dissipate gas pressure in the field.

The proration agreement will be in force for six months from the date of signing and may be renewed or extended for successive periods of six months each thereafter by agreement of all parties and with consent of the state officials. The agreement is based on the pipeline outlet of the Hobbs pool to be equally prorated among the 24 producing companies.

Jones Valley Off Of Gas Service As Main Is Re-routed

Gas was cut off in Jones Valley from 1 to 5 p. m. Tuesday while the main was being re-routed. This was made necessary because of low water mains being strung in that section by the City of Big Spring.

Clarence Saunders Stores Unaffected By Memphis Action

Clarence Saunders stores in Big Spring are not affected by the involuntary petition in bankruptcy which was filed in federal court in Memphis Monday against the Clarence Saunders Stores, Inc. According to Ralph Linick, manager of the No. 2 store here, located at 234 West Third street, Saunders has no connection with the local organization.

Creditors filing the petition and the amounts they claimed were Oliver Finnie Company \$2,450; Myers Paper Company, \$103; and Lucas Packing company, Lucedale, Miss. \$400.

The petition contended Saunders corporation, operating stores in Tennessee, Arkansas and other states, admitted a state of bankruptcy by paying a claim to a local coal company, thus allegedly making that concern a preferred creditor.

Mr. Saunders said he would not announce whether he would fight the action before he read the bill, which he said he "had not seen."

He said any action against the Clarence Saunders Stores, Inc., affects 150 stores controlled by that unit of his holdings but does not affect his extensive chain in California and many in the east, midwest and Kentucky. Stores not affected number 230, he said.

Saunders said cities with stores affected by the petition include Dallas, Fort Worth and Wichita Falls, Texas; Little Rock, St. Louis, Birmingham, Shreveport, La.; Nashville, Chattanooga, Memphis, Montgomery, Ala., and Roanoke, Va.

STANDARD OPENS WAY FOR USE OF NEW OIL REFINING PROCESS

NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—The Standard Oil Company of New Jersey announced today organization of a company under which a new refining process is made available to 17 oil companies. The announcement describes the process as capable of doubling production.

In return for use of the process the new company will pay a fixed and running royalty to the Standard of New Jersey and the German I. G. Farbenindustrie.

The companies involved are: Atlantic Refining Company; Barnsdall Corporation; Cities Service Company; Continental Oil company; and Mid-Continent Petroleum Corporation.

tion, Pure Oil Company, Shell Oil Company, Sinclair Refining Company, the Standard companies of California, Indiana, New Jersey, New York and Ohio, The Texas Company, Union Oil Company of California and the Vacuum Oil Company.

The total crude oil running capacity of the group is 2,263,700 barrels daily while the total listed capacity of the industry in the United States is 3,765,585 barrels.

Oil men expect the new process to become an important factor in the control of crude oil production and price cutting.

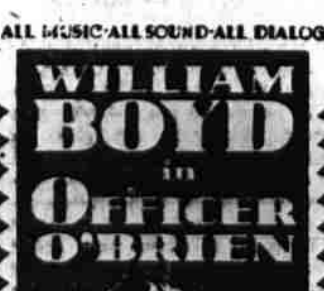

OIL OUTPUT DECREASES

Oklahoma Decline Leads Week's Trend

TULSA, Okla., July 15 (AP)—Oklahoma fields set the pace in the decline of estimated daily average production of crude oil throughout the nation during the week ending July 12, the decrease for the week in this state being more than half the total decrease for the entire United States, the Oil & Gas Journal says today.

Estimated daily average production for the nation during the last week was 2,541,430 barrels, as against 2,610,283 the previous week, his was a decrease of 68,853 barrels.

Production of Oklahoma fields dropped from 655,120 barrels during the week ending July 5, to 615,535 barrels last week, a decrease of 39,585 barrels. Seminole production was below the 200,000 barrel mark, dropping from 202,895 barrels to 178,765 barrels. The biggest decline in the state, however, was at Oklahoma City, where a decrease of 145 barrels brought the daily total down to 83,480 barrels.

West Texas production was off about 2,000 barrels for the week, and slight decreases were shown by most of the other sections of the continent area, including North Louisiana and Arkansas.

Kansas production was 127,776 barrels, compared with 131,235 for the previous week.

Gulf coast and Southwest Texas crude fields joined in the general downward movement with all declines, as did the eastern states when production slumped 1,000 barrels. After its big spurt of a week the Rocky Mountain area was down again, with a decrease for the week of 13,881 barrels.

California, one of the major producing areas, showed an increase for the week, the total gain for that state only 4,000 barrels daily.

Body of Escaped Convict Is Found

UNTSVILLE, Texas, July 15 (AP)—The body of a man found on banks of the Brazos River near Ramsey, late prison farm was positively identified as that of G. G. Bryan, alias Rex Stone, former term from El Paso county, territorial officials announced today.

Bryan had escaped from the prison on June 9 and his decomposed body was found two days later, was identified by tattoo marks on his body, officials said.

OIL BRIEFS

NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—Phillips Petroleum Company today announced acquisition of the marketing facilities of the Gillespie Oil Company of New Mexico, a wholly owned subsidiary of the Reserve Petroleum Company. The purchase consists of eight retail service stations in Albuquerque, one each at Santa Fe, Ute Park and Las Vegas, six bulk stations and 118 resale retail outlets located in Albuquerque, Santa Fe and other strategic points in New Mexico. The refinery and other interests of Gillespie oil are not affected by the transaction.

The Great Lake Pipe Line Company has been formed by the Burdall Corp. and Continental Oil Company to construct a 1,400 mile gasoline pipe line, eight inches in diameter, from Barnsdall, Okla., to Des Moines, Iowa. A 6-inch branch will run from Des Moines to Chicago, a 4-inch branch from Des Moines to Council Bluffs and Omaha, and a 4-inch line from Chicago to Milwaukee. The capacity of the line will be 30,000 barrels daily. The cost of constructing the line will be upward of \$12,000,000.

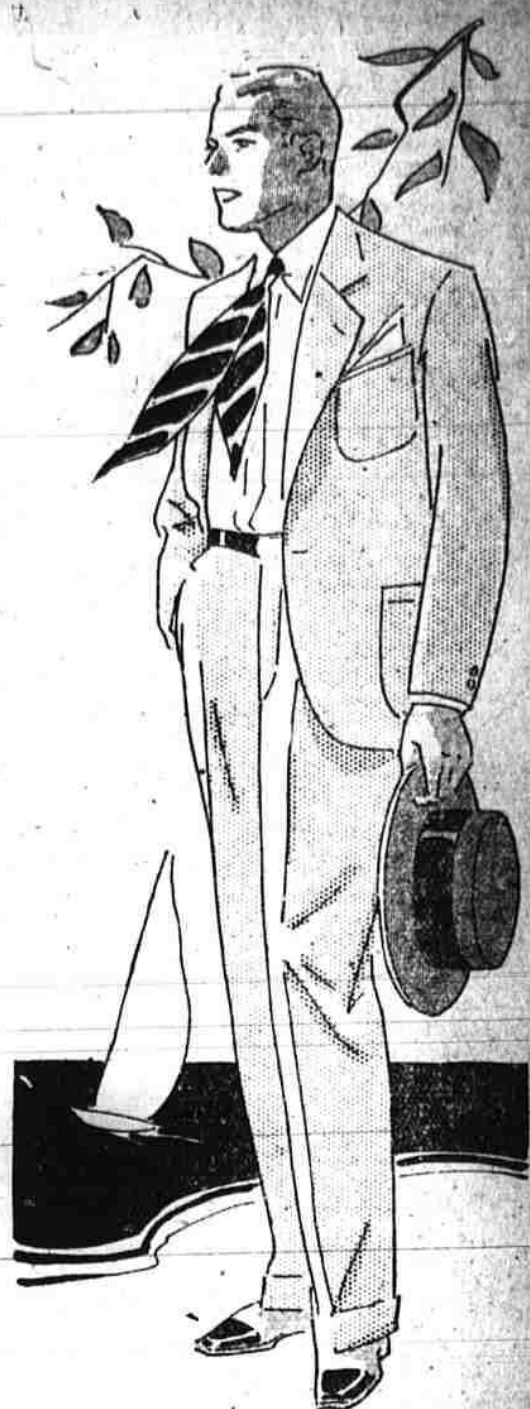

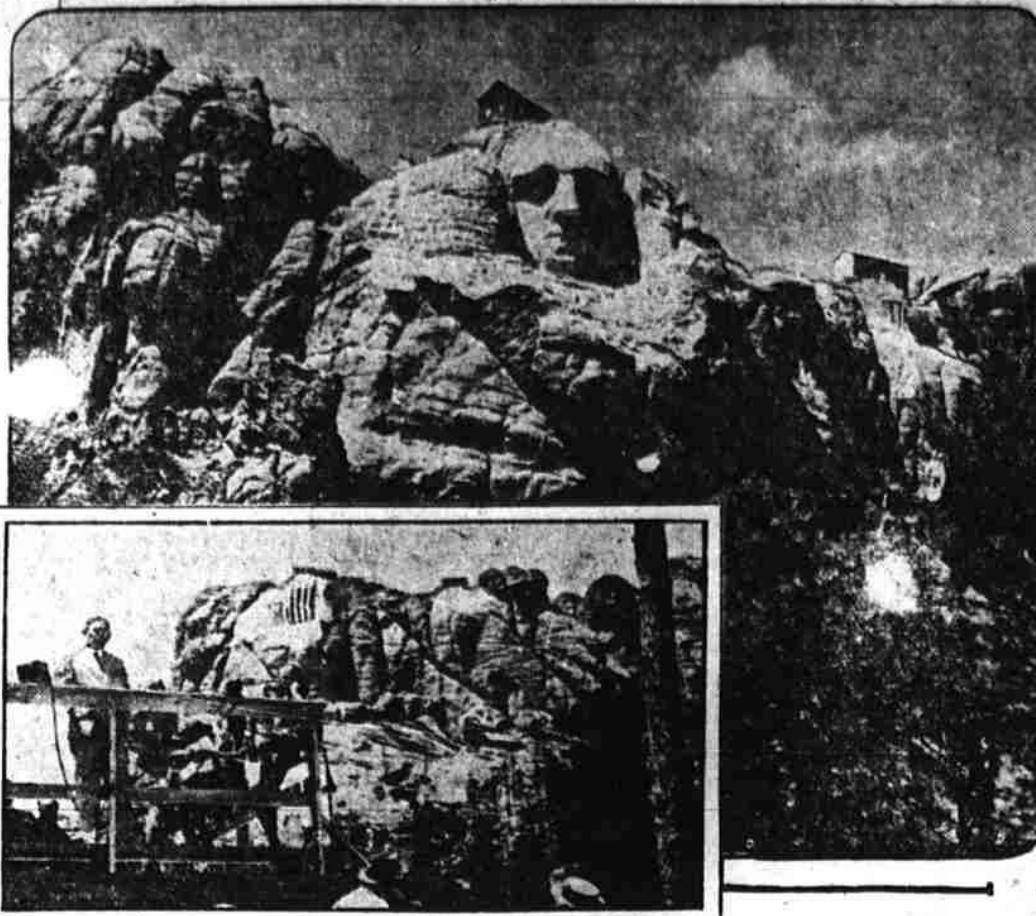

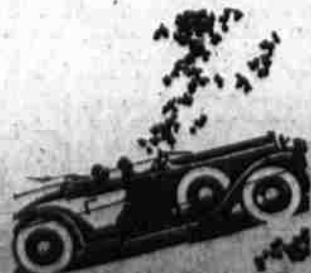

Leaves \$12,000,000 To Three Heirs

NEW YORK, July 15 (AP)—Mrs. John A. Flieger is dead, leaving a fortune of \$12,000,000 accumulated from a \$1,000,000 trust fund created for her by the late Henry M. Flieger when he divorced her in 1901 on the grounds of incurable insanity.

She died Saturday of cerebral hemorrhage in her private cottage on the grounds of a sanitarium at Central Valley, N. Y., and was buried yesterday in Cypress Hills cemetery, Brooklyn. She was at the sanitarium when Flieger obtained a divorce in Florida under a special act of the legislature as the state statutes do not recognize insanity as a cause for divorce. The marriage was in 1883.

The trust fund consisted largely of Standard Oil security, dividends from which multiplied the original sum twelve-fold. Flieger was one of the founders of Standard Oil.

The principal heirs are two nephews, George W. Taylor and William Taylor and a grandniece, Ruth E. Taylor of Pasco, Wash.

Flieger, who in addition to his oil interests was the builder and owner of the Florida East Coast railway, married again after his death in 1913 his widow married Robert W. Bingham, publisher of the Louisville Courier-Journal and the Louisville Times. She has since died.

CALLS DRY LAW REPEAL AN EMPTY GESTURE

BOSTON (INS).—Ellhu D. Stone, assistant United States attorney, in an address delivered here recently, declared repeal of the Massachusetts dry law would constitute an empty gesture which would give sanction to "a philosophy that one may reduce the question of obedience to the law to selective process."

Von Hindenburg Throws Surprise With Announcement

BERLIN, July 15 (AP)—Venerable President Von Hindenburg threw something akin to a political bombshell today when he notified the Prussian premier, Dr. Otto Braun, that he must decline to participate in the festivities planned at Coblenz, Treves, Aix-La-Chapelle and Wiesbaden in celebration of the liberation of German soil from foreign troops.

The president's refusal was based upon the fact that the Prussian government has not yet lifted the ban on the "Stahlhelm," an organization of former service men who participated in the war. President Von Hindenburg is an honorary member of this organization.

The president explained that his consent to make a five day trip

next Friday was given on the assumption that the ban on the "Stahlhelm" would be lifted by that time, so that they might join in the festivities.

"The Prussian government," he said, "has, however made the lifting of the ban subject to conditions from which I am compelled to conclude that these old front-line fighters will not be permitted to meet me in closed formations although this form of demonstration has been permitted to all other organizations, I am unable to agree to this prejudiced treatment of the 'Stahlhelm.'"

While eliminating his visits to Prussian cities, the soldier president said he would stand by his acceptance of invitations to the Bavarian county of the Palatinate and its capital, Speyer, as well as to the Hessian city of Mayence.

MURDER CHARGE FILED

WICHITA FALLS, July 15 (AP)—Dewey Hanners of Pampa faced charges of murder today after the fatal shooting of Frank Blumhoff here. Hanners said he had been estranged from his wife and that he had called at the house where Blumhoff was killed to inquire if she were there. Mrs. Hanners called officers, and Hanners was arrested.

Chicago Gunman Safe By Half Hour

GRAND RAPIDS, Mich., July 15 (AP)—Fred Burke, notorious Chicago gunman with \$10,000 in rewards on his head, still is at large today. Chicago detectives who raided a cottage on Hess Lake, 40 miles north of here in Newaygo county, Sunday night, expecting to find Burke there with a blonde young woman, discovered he had eluded them by half an hour.

Through a coincidence Burke had learned that the officers were coming and driven away taking his woman companion with him. About 6:30 p. m. a Newaygo county deputy sheriff went to a country store near the lake to telephone. Wm. A. Smith, in whose cottage Burke and the woman had been living for the past three months, was in the store and heard the deputy mention Burke's name. Smith left the store, and half an hour later Burke drove past. The blonde was with him.

At the cottage the officers found Smith and another man and a woman who said she was Smith's wife. They confiscated 100 quarts of whiskey and a number of guns and ammunition. Search of the district was continued but officers believed that Burke once more had escaped.

The tip which led to the raid on the Smith cottage at Hess Lake is believed to have come from Thomas Bonner, petty Chicago racketeer who was slain last Thursday. Bonner's widow identified a photograph of Burke as that of the slayer. Bonner had visited Burke in Newaygo county according to police, and was killed for telling where Burke might be found.

Burke is hunted for complicity in the St. Valentine's Day massacre at Chicago, the slaying of a St. Joseph, Mich., policeman, robbery of a bank at Jefferson, Wis., the slaying of Bonner and numerous other slayings and robberies.
