

**MANY ATTENDED RATE
MEETING TUESDAY NIGHT**

There was a large attendance at the rate meeting on last Tuesday evening in spite of the fact that many from the country did not come in on account of the threatening weather. C. L. Lockwood, Traffic Manager for the Southwest Wheat Grower's Association was present. Mr. Lockwood has been making a series of lectures in this section relative to the rate situation from and to points on the Spearman branch. The main points brought out were as follows:

The rails are not in line with those from the competitive territory of the Rock Island on the north at Texhoma, Texas which has a rate of 35c to the Texas mills as compared with 44c from Perryton and Spearman to the same destinations. The Rock Island moves this grain through New Mexico, Texas and Oklahoma in order to make delivery while the Santa Fe only crosses a small part of Oklahoma in order to deliver their shipments and with a great deal less mileage than the Rock Island.

These rates have been investigated by the Interstate Commerce Commission and they are now awaiting a decision, which will be a great step toward the adjustment desired. On October 15, 1923, the Texas rate question was heard before the Railroad Commission of Texas at Austin in which the Texas Wheat Growers Association asked for a ten per cent reduction in the Texas rates. On November 5, 1923, the Oklahoma case, down as Docket 12244 was heard in which the I. C. C. was asked to put in a scale of rates such as apply between Iowa and South Dakota which has a maximum rate of 31½c. These cases are now in the hands of the I. C. C. awaiting decision and we have hopes that with the pressure that is being brought to bear upon the government that these rates will be put in.

W. E. Goodloe of Amarillo, Division Freight Agt. for the Santa Fe was present and presented the Santa Fe's side of the argument in a very able manner. The Santa Fe was censored by Mr. Lockwood for not looking more closely into the needs of this part of the country and co-operating more closely with the business men and farmers. By so doing, a better understanding could be had and more satisfaction could be obtained for all concerned.

Mr. Lockwood preached co-operation between the shipper and the railroad and asked that they get together and work out their differences with reasonable conferences where all matters could be brought out and disposed of to the benefit of all.

Mr. Godloe and Mr. Lockwood were taken to Spearman on Wednesday night and to Booker and Follett on Thursday to address the shippers at those points on just what is being done toward getting a lower adjustment of our rates. We feel that the meeting here was of much benefit to our people. We now know just what is being done and the procedure that is employed. Mr. Lockwood and his office are doing everything in their power to get rates lowered and we feel that the Santa Fe people are going to do their part in getting a reduction.

The Perryton baseball team sallied forth to Spearman on last Sunday afternoon to meet the ball tossers from that place. We are sorry to say that they were defeated by a score of ten to four. It was a good clean game with no wrangling and every body had a good time. Spearman will play a return game here soon. The Perryton team is getting better every day. We have some excellent material and with a little more practice our boys will be able to hold their own with any team in this section. JOSEPH R. HENLINE

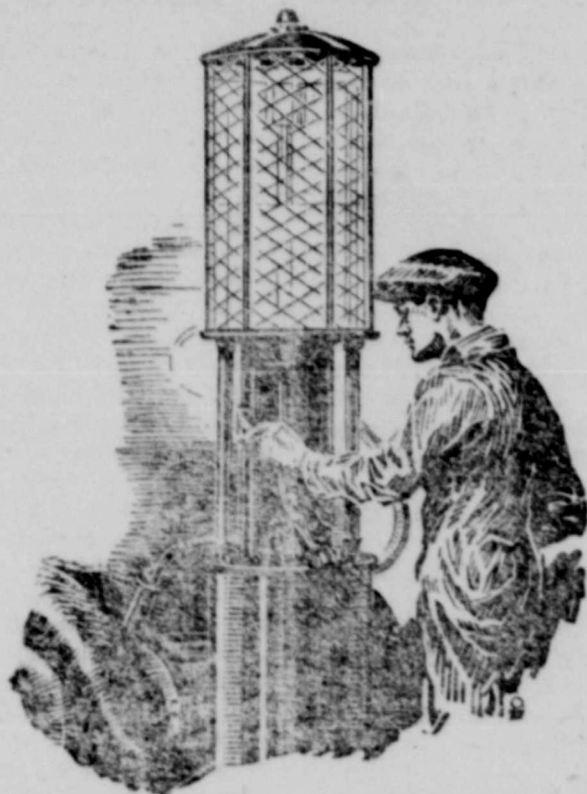
Joseph R. Henline was born October 5th, 1856, in McLean County, Illinois, and died June 17th, 1924, age 67 years, eight months and twelve days.

JUDGE CORRELL DEFENDS
SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

My attention was this morning called to the article written in the last issue of your paper, enent the court house proposition, by Mr. W. M. Shradler, wherein he states that those favoring the school bonds misrepresented the facts. As I was one of those who did advocate the voting of this bond issue, the accusation of course applies to me. I wish to state again, as many times before, that in so far as the bond issue increased or affected taxes, that the amount of such increase may be figured with the same mathematical precision as the interest on a promissory note. No man could misrepresent this proposition in such manner as to mislead any one, if that one would test the figures given. The issue was \$175,000.00, it bears 5 per cent interest payable semiannually and the bonds are due in 40 years from date. It requires \$13,125.00 per year to pay 5 per cent interest on these bonds and set aside 1-40th of the principal. There are 483 sections of land in the district, including the section on which the town stands. Divide the \$13,125.00 by the number of sections of land, and you must arrive at the exact amount that the bond issue could raise your taxes, and not a penny more. It did not raise it that much, for the section of land on which the town stands represents a value of around \$750,000.00 which is equivalent to 39 sections of land at \$30.00 per acre. Get one of your boys in high school to figure this out for you, and if it is incorrect in any particular, call to my attention and I will make a public correction.

This is submitted for the reason that so many seem to think that all their tax burdens in this district are the direct result of the bond issue, and it should be corrected, and people get the real facts in the interest of harmony and good will. In the school is a bad place to make trouble. We ought in those cases to try and minimize our grievances instead of magnifying them. I do not want to be understood to say that honest criticism is not good for any public institution it is, but let's be sure of our position first when to be asserted as facts.

In the figures given above, one must remember that we are dealing with the land alone, the personal property, outside of the town, is not taken into

the calculation, when that is brought in for its share of the taxes, Mr. Shradler will find the facts were not misrepresented to him, though he may have misunderstood. The taxes for bonds and those for maintenance are two separate propositions. The schools in this district should be handled at a saving over the old scheme of isolated common school districts, whether it is being done or not, is not the fault of the system; it must be a fault from some other cause, and if such is the case, then it behooves every good citizen to try and locate the trouble and when done to put his shoulder to the wheel and correct it.

The present district has never represented the best judgement of the writer. I opposed it when first brought to my attention, I thought then it was a mistake and believe so yet. That a large district should be established in the county I do not believe any one can successfully deny; or that it was necessary to incorporate into a central district sufficient land to bear a reasonable tax for the purpose of voting bonds and building a central high school without confiscating property, can be seriously disputed. But my objection to the present district was and is (a) it is too large and unwieldy to everyone the natural prejudices that were sure to, and did, arise (b) the shape of the present district is indefensible. It was my idea to lay off a district 15 miles square the town of Perryton being the geographical center, and I have never had occasion to change that idea. Though, since it has been done as it

is, we certainly want to support it with our best co-operation until it can be corrected, which can be done, and I believe will be done, if we will only get to be friends instead of at enmity with each other. And to that end let me, in closing propose the following to the Board:

By proper resolutions, rule and regulation for the government of the board and the schools provide:

1. That every one to be voted for as trustee shall file his or her application with the board at least 10 days before the election. (Thirty days would be better) and that a printed ticket should be made up entitled "Official Ballot" and any name voted for not legally appearing thereon be disregarded.

2. That at every election for trustees each school community, to be designed by each school maintained in the district outside of the town, elect three supervisors who should have the authority of common school district trustees in the management of the school elected for, subject to the supervision of the central board.

2. That the supervisors of each school, with such assistance as they require from the Superintendent, make up a budget for their school on or before May 1st, each year, for their respective requirements for the ensuing year, and file it with the Board.

3. That on or before May 15th, of each year, one or more of these supervisors from each and every school shall meet with the School Board to make up the budget for the entire district for the ensuing year, and ascertain the rate of tax to be levied and collected. Also to check over, as they may desire, the budget for the town school, which shall be made up by the Superintendent before said meeting. All estimates to be filed with the board, and fully itemized.

4. That the superintendent be required to make up and file with the board an estimate of the needed supplies for all schools for the ensuing year, and providing that where there is to be a change of superintendents, that this must be filed before the last pay voucher of the out-going superintendent is paid.

5. Bid for such supplies to be advertised for, and the contract, or contracts awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.

6. That bids for the delivery of coal and all other supplies to the respective schools be advertised for and awarded to the lowest responsible bidder.

7. That the office of a assessor and collector of taxes be let on sealed bids to the lowest bidder furnishing approved bond.

8. That all work involving the expenditure of more than \$100.00 be let on sealed bids after proper advertisement.

9. That taxes be payable in two installments or more, the first to be October 1st, and the last January 31st, or such date as may be decided on.

The above is submitted without comment for the sober reflection of the people interested. I would invite a friendly discussion of these suggested rules so that we may find whether any are worable, and if so might adopt those promising better feeling and more efficient administration, if such it will do. We have no criticism

to make of any one on the board because the office of school trustee is a hard one to fill and is a thankless one at that.

As to the courthouse bonds, personally, I do not believe this is the time to talk about more taxes for any purpose.

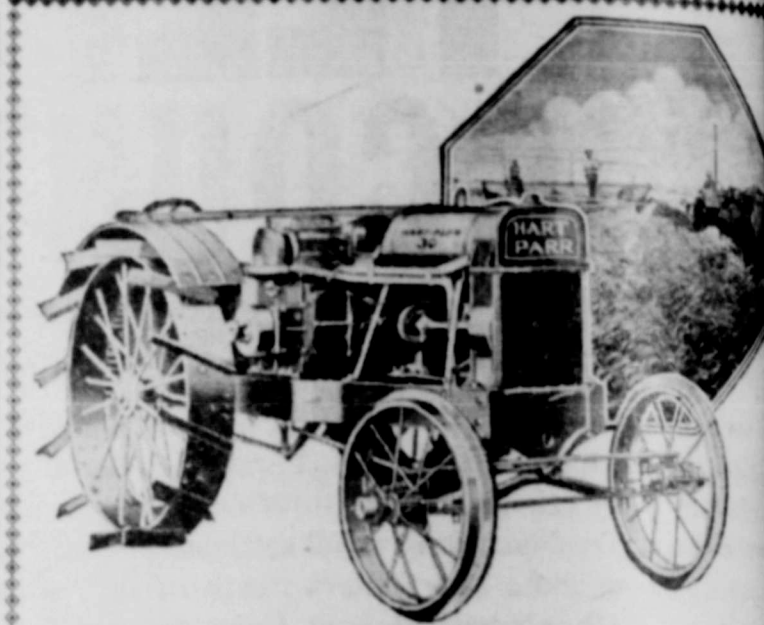

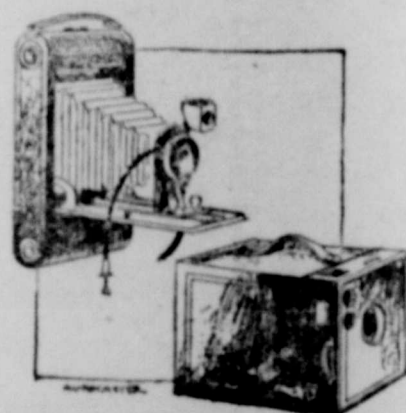

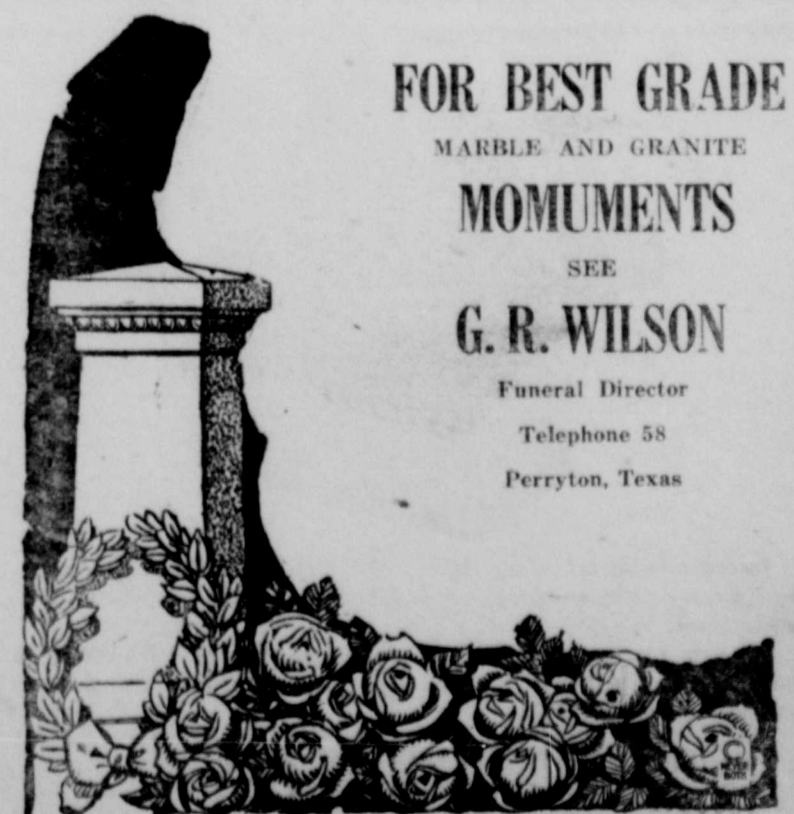

SHENANDOAH PASSES. TOO FEW OWN HOMES. A LADY VICE-PRESIDENT. THE PEOPLE'S INDEPENDENCE.

The airship Shenandoah, sailing toward Albany, above the Hudson, last week, passed the Twentieth Century, the fastest New York Central train, coming from Chicago. The airship carried 120 human beings, the express train many more. The passengers on the fast train bent their necks looking upward, and thought how strange it was traveling up there in the air.

In a few years that well-appointed express train will be out of date as the stage coach is now. The young Vanderbilt boys and George F. Baker, real boss of the New York Central, would do well to begin planning now for transportation through the air. They have the terminals, can raise money, and should see the warning written in the sky by smoke from the exhaust pipes of the big flying ship.

President Coolidge tells real estate men he wants to see this country a home-owning nation. That's better than Henry Navarre's wish that every Frenchman should have a chicken cooking on the stove. La Poule, au pote.

Frenchmen, seven millions of them, own the soil of France, thanks to the revolution. That's what helped them to hold Verdun.

The peasants own Sweden. That enabled Charles XII. to march with only 12,000 of them through Peter's great armies.

Too few own their homes and the land, in this country.

The Agricultural Department reports the worst crops in many years. That's bad news for those who eat the crops, but may mean better prices for farmers not able to make a living recently. The Chicago Board of Trade expects higher prices for grain, and

with the wheat crop cut more than forty million bushels something ought to happen.

Federal District Judges Carpenter and Wilkerson set aside President Coolidge's pardon of Philip Grossman, in Chicago, denying the President's power in civil cases and adding: "To allow such power to the Executive is to strike a death blow at the independence of the judiciary."

That's a good saying and courageous. All Federal judges depend on the President for appointment and promotion.

It's also a saying for the people to remember in case they happen, some day, to get rulers that represent them, and nobody else. At present our system "Allows such power to the judiciary as to endanger the independence of the people." You see it when the casting of one single appointed Supreme Court vote, in the majority, has power to over-rule an elected Congress. And when Congress is ruled by a bare majority, in a court beyond the people's control, that is not democracy.

If there exists any power greater than the people's power, then what we call self-government is a joke, as when a farmer lets his baby "drive the horses," the farmer, however, holding the reins, while the baby only thinks he is driving.

Well thought out power to recall every one of their public servants, whether elected or appointed by an elected official, is what the people will have eventually. That will come when they really take an interest in their government and thus prove their fitness to govern themselves.

Mrs. Genevieve Allen, of San Francisco, suggested that some woman be nominated for Vice-President. It isn't necessary to say what old politicians think of that. Nevertheless, young politicians will live to see things in politics more surprising.

The time hasn't come yet, however, for, strangely enough, at this moment more women than men would be shocked at the idea of a woman on the Presidential ticket.

Perhaps, some day, the world will bless the big war, although it did cost 250 millions and 20 million lives.

Poison gas will do more good than it has ever done harm; it has been used to destroy the boll weevil. And now, in the Ukraine, Trotsky orders his army fliers to use gas against locusts and field mice.

We could use it here, a heavy variety, to destroy prairie dog colonies, snakes in their breeding places, and rats in city sewers.

LIGHT PLANT BURNS

Last Friday morning at about 3:30 a.m. a disastrous fire totally destroyed the Miami's Municipal Light and Water system. The plant being a loss of approximately \$22,000. No insurance was carried, making it a total loss. Practically all the equipment was ruined.

It is not certain how the fire originated but when the alarm was given the flames were going out at the roof, and all hope of saving the building and equipment was gone.

The City officials immediately made arrangements with the Santa Fe to furnish the city water. The water system was connected with the Santa Fe pump at once, thus insuring us of an abundance of water.

Several of the business houses have installed Delco lighting systems which will help to relieve the situation until the plant can be rebuilt.

Two new seventy-five H. P. Fairbanks-Morse engines and generator have been contracted for which are to be shipped in about thirty days.

The walls of old building are in good shape and rubbish is being cleaned away and a roof is being added. Every effort is being put forth to have the building ready to immediately install the new machinery as soon as it arrives. When these engines are installed Miami will have a bigger and better lighting system than it has ever had.—Miami Chief.

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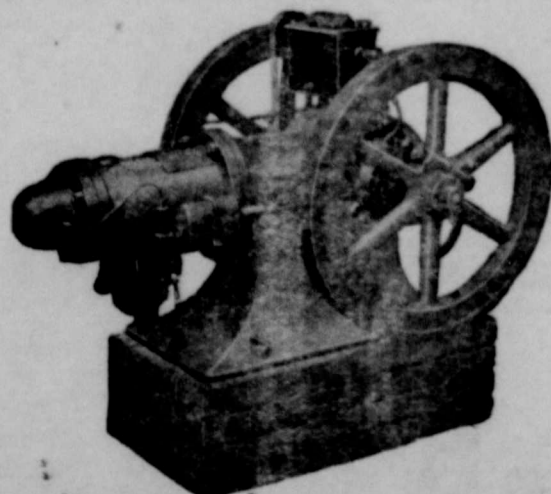
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
