Record Crop Being Harvested

Showers Thursday and clouds and high humidity Friday has slowed down the wheat harvest that was really getting underway this week. Some farmers were getting back in the fields by late afternoon Friday to harvest what appears to be a bumper crop.

Several farmers have said "It's the best wheat I ever had". There have been reports of as high as 47 bushels per acre on dryland. Probably when it is all over the dryland wheat will average 20 to 30 bushels per acre overall.

According to Martin L. Chandler, Hansford County ASCS Executive Director there are approximately 80,123 acres of wheat planted for harvest this year, with the exception of some wheat in the northern part of the county that was hailed out. The market price for wheat has been erratic this past week.

The highest price on the local market was \$4.25 and then it dropped to \$3.89 and Friday afternoon was back up to \$4.12.

This price is a boon to dryland farmers because they do not have the high cost of production as compared to the irrigation farmer. This is the first good dryland wheat crop to be harvested in the county since 1973.

There is a limited amount of wheat being stored on the ground in Hansford County, but our neighboring county of Ochiltree has lots of wheat on the ground.

Fuel suppliers in the county are having a hard time keeping up with the demand of farmers for fuel for their machinery. Word was received at the ASCS office Friday that extra allocations of fuel were being sent to the area to help alleviate the situation.

The paintings on display at the library include watercolors, oils, acrylics, watercolor gouache, and watercolor/pen and ink. She most enjoys working in transparent watercolor.

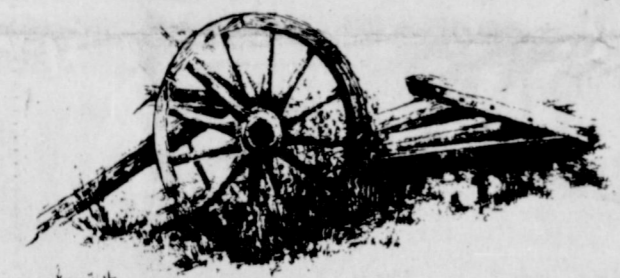
Martha's paintings are done from on-scene sketching, from still lifes that have been set up, and some are composites from photographs she's taken. She also does creative paintings from memory.

The deadline for submitting your family story to be included in the Hansford County History Book is July 18.

A spokesman for the Hansford County Historical Commission said that approximately 339 stories have been turned in as of Friday. A telephone committee is now in operation contacting people who have not yet turned their history in. Every effort is being made by the Commission to see the Hansford County has an interesting and complete history book, so if you have not turned in your story, won't you please do so?

You may submit a story for 500 words or less free of charge. If more words are needed they are 10 cents a word. Pictures

may also be submitted with your story.

The books will sell for \$35.00 and \$1.75 sales tax.

Memorial and tribute pages are also being sold. As of Friday, 15 special pages have been sold. Cost of a memorial page is \$150 for a full page, \$80.00 for a half page and \$45.00 for a fourth page.

It is expected that the book will go to press about the first of 1980. Committees are working on the overall history of the county at the present time.

Farmers Must File Priority Request For Natural Gas

Martin L. Chandler, County Executive Director of the Hansford County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee, today reminded farmers, food processors, food distributors and other agricultural concerns desiring protection against natural gas curtailments to file a written priority request with their supplier no later than July 15, 1979. The Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC), originally designated June 15 as the last day for this requirement but extended it by one month.

"Users of interstate natural gas have been certified by the Secretary of Agriculture to be protected up to the full requirement against curtailment", Chandler said.

The request should include: Name and Address

-----Intended end user and volumes of natural gas needed
-----Natural gas purchases for most recent 12 months for which records are available
-----Documentation to support calculation of needs
-----Standard industrial classification (SIC) code numbers such as 01 for crops and 02 for livestock, and
-----Signature swearing or affirming to accuracy of the request.

-----Suggested that local natural gas suppliers be contacted concerning procedures for obtaining agricultural priority.
"If additional assistance is needed, our state and county offices will soon have information regarding eligible 'Essential Agricultural Uses' as well as a suggested format for filing", the ASCS Official said.

The La Casita Room of the Gruver State Bank will be the sight for a similar session on home food preservation, Thursday, July 19 at 2:00 p.m.

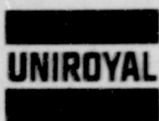

The Spearman W.I.F.E. chapter 15 would like to share the following wheat recipes with every one. The wheat in our area is of such excellent quality this year and we think you'll enjoy trying something new and nutritious for your family and friends.

The following recipe was prepared by Gager Turner and was served on tossed salad at the '59 Class Reunion.

WHEAT SPRINKLES
soak 1 qt. of fresh clean wheat 1 1/2 - 2 hours. Drain & pat dry a cup of wheat at a time. Fry it in a deep fat fryer of oil until wheat begins to float to top of oil and is popped.

Drain cooked wheat when all wheat has been cooked.

Combine:
garlic salt
salt
Kraft grated Amer. Cheese - sharp cheddar flavor & other seasoning you might like

WHEAT CHILI
3/4 to 4 lbs. hamburger
7 T. minced dried onion (or 1 medium onion)
3 T. green pepper
1 fresh tomato chopped (important)

1 1/2 t. salt
1/4 t. pepper
1 1/2 t. c chili powder (or to taste)
1/4 t. granulated garlic
1 15 oz. can tomato sauce
1 15 oz. can of water
1 c. catsup

3 c. cooked whole wheat (as prepared for cereal)

Brown hamburger slightly. Drain grease. Add remaining ingredients and simmer 3 to 4 hours in a crockpot, until pepper is cooked and flavors are blended. Or cook on top of the stove, simmer on low heat 1 hour.
