SELASSIE TO ACCEPT PEACE OFFER, REPORT

March 5—(U.P.)—League of Nations informed privately today that Haile Selassie had sent a message to the Italian legation in Paris.... the suggestion of a committee of 13 that peace negotiations be resumed for settlement of the Italian-Ethiopian war....

The reply will be relayed to Geneva.... It was understood Selassie agrees to negotiate peace.... in the framework of the League of Nations and in the spirit of the covenant....

That has been his attitude throughout whenever peace negotiations were proposed.... There was a threat of a crisis, however, in the situation. Authoritative reports flashed through Geneva that Switzerland had warned if an embargo is imposed on Italy, thereby forcing Italy from the League, Switzerland might follow.... Reports in Paris and other capitals coincidentally dealt with possibility that Hungary, which is also not cooperating in present penalties against Italy also might follow Italy out....

Papers Burned In Utility Lobbying Fight, Testimony

WASHINGTON, March 5—(U.P.)—Testimony that records relating to the Cities Service Utilities campaign against the Wheeler-Rayburn holding company control act had been burned was presented today to the senate lobby committee....

"We never saw that stuff at all," said John Beard, Hagerstown, Md., branch manager of the Cities Service subsidiary.... L. S. Cooke, salesman in a Pennsylvania office, testified his records were "thrown in the wastebasket and then burned in the incinerator."

New Farm Program Is Outlined by Wallace

30 MILLIONS OF ACRES TO BE CHANGED

MEMPHIS, Tenn., March 4—(U.P.)—Secretary of Agriculture Henry Wallace today outlined a broad, flexible, and tentative program under which the federal government proposes to conserve soil, reestablish and maintain a fair farm income, and protect consumers of the future.... Details of the program were revealed officially as the agriculture department began a three day conference here to get reaction of farm leaders and let them help final details, especially as to how it will be applied to their particular sections.... For 1936 the plan calls for shifting approximately 30,000,000 acres normally planted in "soil depressing" crops to commercial crops that are "soil preserving".... About 10,000,000 of the total would be shifted from normal cotton planting, it was indicated.... To those farmers who voluntarily form "soil depressing" crops the government will pay from its approximately \$500,000,000 soil conservation and domestic allotment act fund an undetermined sum per acre....

Northwest Divided Over Jones' Stand

DALHART, March 5—(U.P.)—Northwest Texas farmers commend Congressman Marvin Jones for the AAA and his other farm and ranch programs, while Townsendites tell him he must commit himself definitely to their plan or lose their support.... President Claude McDaniel of the Dallam County Farmers' Protective Association, declared that, "We feel Jones' plan of intelligently controlled production and benefit payments, which are equivalent to a protective tariff, are just what the farmer has been looking for.".... J. N. Johnson, Dalhart, official Townsend club organizer for the north half of the 18th congressional district, represented by Jones, says: "We have written Jones our last letter to find out how he stands on the Townsend Plan. If he does not support us we will find it necessary to endorse another candidate. His answer to our other letters have been shining examples of fence-straddling."

Error Keeps Turkey, San Marino at War

ISTANBUL, March 5—(U.P.)—A recent incident has revealed the fact that the Republic of San Marino is still at war with Turkey.... The manager of a Turkish agricultural institute recently spent a few months in Europe in connection with scientific studies. When he crossed into the territory of San Marino he was greatly astonished when he was arrested as an undesirable national of a country at war with the republic.... In 1915 San Marino joined Italy in a declaration of war on Turkey, but, owing to some omission, it was invited neither to participate in the peace negotiations nor to sign the Treaty of Lausanne with Turkey.... Subjects of the Republic of San Marino in Turkey have always been treated as Italian nationals....

Bryan Memorial Is Planned at Mission

DALLAS, March 5—(U.P.)—A memorial will be erected in honor of William Jennings Bryan near Mission, in the Rio Grande Valley as part of the Texas Centennial activities of 1936. The great commoner purchased a large tract of land near Mission in 1910 and spent much of his life there.... W. A. Webb, general manager of the Texas Centennial Exposition, says that special memorial services will be held for Bryan on Nebraska Day at the Exposition. The governor of Nebraska, R. L. Cochran, and other notables will be invited to attend. The date of Nebraska Day has not been set. A recent communication from Ruth Bryan Owen, daughter of the statesman and present United States minister to Denmark, said that she planned to attend the Exposition before its closing Nov. 29....

PROCESS TAX PLAN IS SENT TO CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, March 5—(U.P.)—Congressional tax experts received from the agriculture department today a plan for a temporary two-year processing taxes on 33 farm products designed to raise \$221,000,000 annually.... At the same time treasury experts submitted schedules showing the amount of revenue which might be derived through wide changes in personal income tax provisions and through a general manufacturers' excise levy.... The house ways and means subcommittee which received the income and sales tax suggestion, made clear they were "just suggestions.".... The processing tax levy, however, received more serious consideration.... Such taxes would raise approximately \$442,000,000 of the \$517,000,000 total, which President Roosevelt told congress the treasury needed to make up losses due to the supreme court AAA decision....

CISCOANS IN FORT WORTH TO CONTACT CHAIRMAN OF HIGHWAY COMMISSION, SEEK ACTION ON 89 PAVEMENT

Secretary J. E. Spenser of the Chamber of Commerce, E. P. Crawford, and Milburn McCarty of Eastland today left for Fort Worth to confer with Chairman Harry Hines of the state highway commission on possibilities of securing an early start on paving of Highway 89, the Weatherford cutoff.... Residents of cities along Highway One west of Weatherford have recently become disturbed over the delay of the cutoff work and the visit today followed action by the Cisco Chamber of Commerce directors at their regular meeting.... It had been indicated that it might be worthwhile to contact Chairman Hines before the March meeting of the highway commission, relative to speeding the paving of the road.... The commission has designated the new cutoff for pavement, if and when funds are available. The road shortens the distance from Cisco to Fort Worth by about 15 miles, at the same time eliminating many curves and hills.... Highway 89 has been graded and improved and was opened to traffic some time ago but nothing further has been done toward laying of pavement.... Since it shortens the distance to Fort Worth and at the same time eliminates objectionable features of the present Highway One route, it is generally used by one weather by persons going to Fort Worth or Dallas.... Milburn McCarty of Eastland has been serving as chairman of the highway committee from this area in an effort to secure an early start upon the road....

P. R. WARWICK WILL RUN FOR COMMISSION

Petition of P. R. Warwick to place his name on the ballot in the city election April 7 was filed in the city secretary's office shortly before noon today.... Warwick announced that he would make the race as an independent candidate. No other candidate besides him and those seeking reelection today had signified their intentions of running for one of the three offices....

The ticket for the city election April 7 will be drawn at the meeting of the city commission Tuesday night, it has been announced by City Secretary J. B. Cate.... At the same time, the election judges for the municipal balloting will be chosen, Cate said.... So far only three candidates have announced for office subject to action in the commissioners' election. All three are seeking reelection, each having served for two previous terms. They are J. R. Burnett, mayor or pro tem and finance commissioner; H. C. Henderson, police commissioner; and W. R. Winston, water commissioner....

Secretary Cate, in announcing that the ticket will be drawn Tuesday night, said that after that time candidates who have not filed their petitions at the secretary's office cannot have their names placed upon the ballots but that their names may be written in.... The deadline was set because of the law prescribing the time which absentee voters may have to cast their ballots before the election and the time necessary for the printing of the tickets....

Survey Made Upon Women in Industry

AUSTIN, March 5—(U.P.)—Clothing plants employ the most women engaged in industry in Texas a survey showed today.... The survey was made by the women's bureau of the United States department of labor at the request of the state department of labor. It covers 43 cities and 369 establishments that were visited in 1932.... Facts developed were.... More Mexicans live in Texas than in any other state in the union; two of every 11 wage earning women were Mexicans; one in each 11 was a negro; women's wages were found to be very low....

Drivers License To Be Issued at Night

ST. CLOUD, Minn., March 5—(U.P.)—A hunger strike of 1,000 convicts at the reformatory was believed broken today when many inmates who had not eaten for 40 hours accepted food.... The ringleaders were reported placed in solitary confinement....

General Strike Is Called by Miners

HARRISBURG, Ill., March 5—(U.P.)—A general strike called by Progressive Miners of America in Saline county, the hub of the southern Illinois coal belt, halted work in 10 mines today and threatened to shut down business houses.... Between 3,500 and 4,000 coal miners stayed away from pits in protests against alleged importation of outside labor to work two mines....

Students Strike For Ousted Prof

ALAMEDA, Cal., March 5—(U.P.)—Student pickets, patrolled by three schools and the city hall today in a strike of nearly 4,000 high school and elementary school pupils refusing to return to school until Superintendent William Paden is reinstated....

'SPY MARKET' IS PROBED BY GRAND JURORS

LOS ANGELES, March 5—(U.P.)—Charges that spies obtained war secrets of the U. S. navy and offered them for sale in an "international market" were under investigation today by a federal grand jury.... Extraordinary precautions were reported taken by the department of justice to keep the deliberations of the jury secret because of "delicate considerations" involved in the investigation.... The inquiry was recessed today until next Wednesday, at which time it was said, the grand jury will receive details of the so-called plot.... Two men awaiting questioning in connection with the plot were held in county jail. The first was identified as Henry Thompson, 27, former sailor, who assertedly was discharged from the navy in 1926 for insubordination. The charge under which he is held was listed as the illegal wearing of a naval uniform. Thompson's former roommate, Wilbur Turnstone of Long Beach, was held as a witness. He was brought here recently from Sweetwater, Tex., to testify.... A third man, said to be an Oriental, is being sought by federal agents for questioning....

OFFICER WILL SEEK WITNESS ON VACATION

TRENTON, N. J., March 5—(U.P.)—A representative of Governor Harold Hoffman now is enroute to the Panama Canal zone to attempt to question Dr. John F. Condon, key figure in the Lindbergh kidnapping case, it was learned today.... The governor's agent, Andrew Dutch, state motor vehicle inspector, sailed Friday.... Dr. Condon, the Bronx educator who turned over the \$50,000 ransom money to the kidnaper of Charles Lindbergh, Jr., and one of the state's leading witnesses in gaining the conviction of Hauptmann, is vacationing in the Canal Zone.... Notes Discrepancies.... Governor Hoffman, active in Hauptmann's behalf, has stated repeatedly that there were discrepancies in the story told by Dr. Condon at the trial and before and after Hauptmann's murder conviction.... Meanwhile in New York, Governor Hoffman said today he had no legal right now to grant Hauptmann another reprieve and would not do so unless some situation arose which he and Attorney General David Wilets could lay before the judge who sentenced Hauptmann.... Hoffman made this announcement to newspapermen when he arrived to address a luncheon....

Directs Two Bands He Formerly Joined

FORT WORTH, March 5—Don Gillis, instructor in music at Texas Christian University, now directs both bands which he joined in 1931, his freshman year in college.... Following his graduation last spring, he was appointed director of the Horned Frog Band, in which he served four years as first trombone, and as student assistant director during his junior and senior years.... Recently Governor James V. Allred appointed Gillis director of the 11th Medical Regiment Band in Fort Worth, with the rank of warrant officer....

WALKOUT TO BE EXTENDED NEW THREAT

NEW YORK, March 5—(U.P.)—James Bambrick, leader of New York's five-day elevator strike, threatened today to "take the lid off" and extend the walkout throughout the metropolis unless real estate owners agree to submit the strikers' demands to arbitration.... In a 15-hour conference at the city hall, which ended in a deadlock at 4 a. m. the strikers withdrew demands for immediate acceptance of proposals for higher wages and shorter hours and agree to submit the issue for arbitration.... Bambrick said the union would yield no more and would "fight to the finish" for the arbitration issue. The building owners, represented by the Realty Advisory board, refused to arbitrate. If the owners hold to that stand, Bambrick said, he would order a walk-out of elevator operators and other building service employees in the busy Grand Central zone, which includes some of the world's largest skyscrapers, and other districts previously unaffected....

Stalin Statement Russia Ready For War World Topic

By United Press.... The interview which Josef Stalin gave to Roy W. Howard chair-man of the board of the Scripps-Howard newspapers, warning Japan of the danger of war if she invades Mongolia and accusing Germany of aggressive ambitions, was a subject of official discussion throughout the world today.... The interview occupied a prominent place in the Russia, Britain, France, U. S., Canada, Japan, the South American republics, and most other countries. In Germany and Poland it was suppressed.... A few German papers printed an abbreviated version before they received instructions....

Roosevelt Signs AAA Substitute

President Roosevelt very promptly signed the soil conservation subsidy bill intended to replace the invalidated Agricultural Adjustment Act. In a statement, the president said the law represented an attempt to develop a long time program for American agriculture, but added that he did not regard the measure as a panacea or as a final plan. He considers it a new basis to build and improve upon as experiences disclose its points of weakness and of strength. The new law authorizes not more than \$500,000,000 in any one year in subsidies to farmers for diverting crop lands to soil conservation purposes or "other economic use of land." For two years, the subsidies would be paid to farmers or to states which set up program approved by the secretary of agriculture. After two years, the so-called permanent plan would embrace the cooperative federal-state system.

In all the agricultural states of the south and west and the middle-west, farm leaders are very active. They are organizing from precinct to the top. Just now the Washington correspondents have discovered that the supreme court will not recess the coming spring but will give hearing to the important new deal measures which have been enacted in recent months. Growers of things are all-powerful in this republic when they are organized and are government conscious, ever determined to battle for equal justice for the growers as "equal justice" has been meted out for 70 years by past administrations and congress to the makers of things of America.

Let Us Defend Rights Won in 1776

An enormous amount of water has run over the dam since the day when Washington and Jefferson were risking the scaffold for the sake of liberty and democracy, trusting lady that she is, seems to have gotten her feet wet way up to the ears, or thereabouts.

To prove that statement you need only reflect that one of the best ways to get yourself a reputation as a dangerous citizen these days is to go about repeating the very phrases which our founding fathers used in the great struggle for independence.

This discovery has been made over and over, of late, by our school teachers and university professors. It is not surprising, therefore, that the most stirring call to arms for the defense of old-fashioned ideas about liberty and freedom should have come from the recent meeting of the National Educational Association at St. Louis.

The author of this call to arms was Dr. Charles A. Beard, famous historian, and his words are worth repeating here: "Let us rededicate ourselves to the American tradition of liberty and to the faith that error need not be feared where reason is free to combat it."

"Let us assert anew against brute force the values of independent scientific inquiry, of the unhampered search for truth, of the fair hearing and the fair play, and uphold them by fearless and united effort."

"Not for the gratification of pride nor with any gesture of false superiority. Not out of any academic pique. But because in this spirit and by this procedure alone can American democracy cope with its gravest problems under the force of law, thus maintaining amid the wreck and ruin of parliamentary institutions, east and west, the example of a nation that has not lost its head or its heart."

When you remember how our country was born, and the ideals to which it was dedicated, you can see that no good American can pledge himself to less than that. For that plea simply embodies the fundamentals of Americanism. And in a period when there is so much attempted repression, so many appeals to ignorance and prejudice, we cannot afford to forget them.

Our forefathers thought enough of those fundamentals

to fight and die for them. They believed that when a people has lost the right to speak freely, to debate without hindrance, to print what seems good to individual consciences, and to assemble openly whenever the spirit moves it, it has lost everything worth having.

So they fought for and won those rights. But they did not win them forever. It is up to us to be vigilant enough to keep them.

They are under attack today. If we fail in their defense, America's great day is over.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, March 5.—(AP)—Bexar county was the only one of the state's 254 that refused to issue drivers' licenses under the new state law. State highway patrolmen were sent to San Antonio for the purpose.

The state's experience in direct issuance of licenses may result in a considerable saving in future years. The drivers' licenses are being issued at San Antonio at an average cost of two cents each. The issuing expense is about \$100 a day and it is estimated a total of 200,000 licenses will be issued there at a total cost of \$4,000.

In counties where the licenses are being issued by county tax collectors, the state pays five cents per license. The big future saving is possible, however, on automobile licenses. County tax collectors who objected to issuing the drivers' licenses said the drivers' cards would take more time than automobile licenses. If drivers' licenses can be issued for two cents, automobile licenses should cost no more.

At two cents each the state would spend only \$200,000 for licensing 10,000,000 automobiles. Now it pays out three times \$200,000 to have them licensed through county offices.

"Texas Our Texas," is in no danger of being pre-empted by some alert copyright. The copyright to the official state song already is held by the state. It was issued to the authors Mrs. Gladys Yeakum Wright and W. J. Marsh and transferred to the state when the song was adopted.

The delivery of the copyright was made to Mrs. Jane Y. McCallum, secretary of state, co-incident with presentation of a \$1,000 prize to the authors. The prize was offered by prominent citizens. The transfer took place at a joint session of the Texas house and senate. The song was sung then by all present, led by a soloist and an Austin choral organization.

State plans for improving the capitol building are being trimmed because a \$30,000 appropriation for the purpose is insufficient to do all that was planned. One item that is being repainted of the dome. That is quite a job. The dome rises 315 feet above the first floor level. It is an iron structure fabricated in Belgium. It is the second dome made for the capitol. The vessel carrying the first was sunk.

The other principal project is re-flooring. In doing this it is planned to replace the glass flooring in the rotunda with terrazzo. The design of this has the seal of the state in a central circle surrounded by circles reproducing the coats of arms of France, Spain, Mexico, the Confederate States and the United States.

The death of the late king of Great Britain will prevent an official of that government participating in the Texas Centennial observance of the Fall of the Alamo, March 6. Court mourning prevents

any official taking part in such affairs. Instead a British flag will be sent to San Antonio to be placed in the Alamo Shrine in honor of Englishmen who participated in its defense. The German government will be represented by one of its consuls.

A visitors' register kept in the hall of the House of Representatives has columns in which visitors are requested to place their names, homelife, home state, and occupation. Not one in 50 who register fills out the occupational column.

Remarkable similarity in handwriting is reflected by the register. This is due partly to one member of a party of tourists registering for all of the party. But there is also a marked similarity in the writing of visitors who register on different days.

Admiral Richard Byrd was able to place a two-year Antarctic expedition so that all moved along without a hitch, but when he left arrangements to others for so simple a thing as an Austin lecture, things went askew. Attempting to show his films at Gregory gymnasium at the University of Texas in the afternoon, it was found the place had not been sufficiently darkened. Byrd gave an extra "matinee" before the night lecture for all who could return after dark. Behind the Scenes in Washington

BY RODNEY DUTCHER

WASHINGTON.—Lawyers may differ among themselves as to the breadth or narrowness of the TVA decision, but almost any one of them will still tell you he would give his right eye—or, at least, a couple of minor toes—to know just what went on in the secret U. S. Supreme Court conferences which produced the opinion.

Only nine men know. But the deduction of those who best know the court and its ways is that there was more turmoil among the black-robed gentlemen than at any time previously in this generation.

Their idea is that a court which so frequently has whacked at New Deal legislation must have been forced into a bit of a dither before it handed down a decision favorable to the New Deal.

The administration's lawyers, including some of the most clear-headed ones, have it all figured out that a conservative majority of justices originally wrote an opinion which declared TVA and the sale of power unconstitutional and that in the 60 days elapsing before the decision the majority was persuaded to change its attitude—with the exception of Justice McReynolds, who opined TVA was accomplishing unconstitutional purposes.

ASIDE from the long delay on the opinion, there is "evidence" that an original dissenting opinion was such as to cause a change. The concurring opinion of Brandeis, Stone, Cardozo, and Roberts, agreeing as to constitutionality, here evidence that some of it had once been part of a dissenting opinion.

Emphasis by Brandeis, who delivered it, on historical evidence that in earlier years the court had been loath to declare acts of Congress unconstitutional seemed to indicate a presupposition that a majority had declared an act unconstitutional in this case. In the subsequent legal games Hughes has been given credit for "seeing the light" and persuading Sutherland, Butler, and Van Dusen to go along with him.

HIGH up in the administration it is believed that certain external facts also finally influenced the court:

1.—The definite romantic popularity of TVA, including common belief in its reasonableness, as the fact that to ruin it would be even more unpopular than the action against AAA.

2.—The storm over the AAA as the danger to the court's prestige inherent in cumulative effect of series of opinions arousing resentment.

3.—Obvious intention of the administration to make use of 4 and 54 divisions of the court to charge lack of infallibility.

4.—The attack on the AAA decision by Senator George W. Norris.

SUCH explanations cannot be taken as gospel, and the court guards its secrets well. But enough justices have whispered to the secretaries in time past to make it plain that the court sometimes fights and wrangles like a legislative body and that a majority opinion may be drafted by a dozen times before it is evant and from the bench.

Politically, the visible effect you can expect is a soft-pedaling criticism by members of the administration itself—such as Secretary Ickes and Wallace—but continuance of attack from pro-administration sources, whose words likely will have the administration's secret approval.

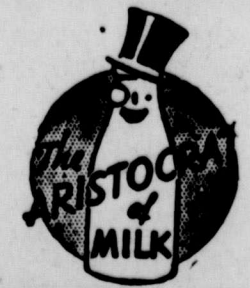

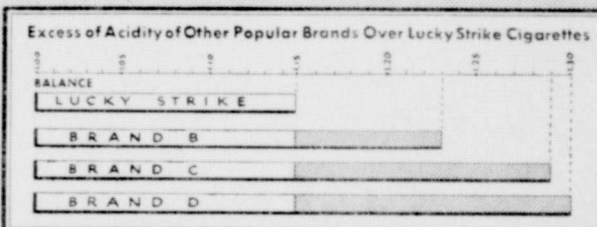

Captured by Indians When a Child,
Minister Tells of Life as Savage

Dr. J. A. Newsom, 68, who is a Baptist minister, spoke to the high school students yesterday, telling them of the life of the American Indian.

Dr. Newsom was captured in the Texas panhandle at the age of 5 by the Muskogee Indians and taken to Oklahoma, where he was held for 17 years. At the age of 22 he entered school, went to college, and became a preacher. He has made a tour of 21 foreign countries.

"Men and women will never go deeper into savagery than the American Indian," he told of the brutal killings of white children. He gave several illustrations of the savagery of the Indian.

Indian Misunderstood
"If the whites had understood the Indians much bloodshed could have been saved," he said. He said the Indian hated a coward but would bow to his superior.

He had much praise for the whites and their work in civilizing the Indian, and told of Indians who are now in congress representing Oklahoma.

He told how food was prepared and the peculiar foods eaten by the Indians.

"The Indian believed that the secret of long life was in eating. He never needed medicine, for he took care of his body. He was never bald headed, for he was always bareheaded. He was never hunchbacked, for he developed strong lungs."

Powerful Lungs
To prove the power of his lungs, he, at the age of 68, took a third of an innertube with one end tied up and through the open end he blew it up until it burst.

He displayed many ribbons and medals which his boy, who is 21, won in athletic contests. There is talk of sending his son to the Olympics in Germany this year, he said.

"The boy with clean lungs will never die of pneumonia. It is the boy who smokes that dies of it," he said.

relief and the American morale by saying, "I never talk on controversial subjects." A moment later, however, he said, "Last year was the best year our company ever had, better than 1929, by \$17,000,000. I think our business is a good barometer for the business of the nation."

He was keenly interested in Lake Cisco and the city. "That's a fine body of water," he said after he had seen it and its advantages were pointed out to him in reply to his questions. Later, as the sightseeing group drove back into Cisco, he said, "You have quite a town here, haven't you?"

Almost as interested in cattle and farming as in business, the executive saw many possibilities for developments in the area about Cisco as has always been a great cattle state," he said. He asked many questions, too, concerning oil development in the area about Cisco, and some of the wells near the city were pointed out to him.

Quiet But Alert

After saving his money he purchased a small butcher shop at Longmont, Colo., but refused to bribe the butcher of the town's principal hotel with a pint of whisky, and soon lost the shop.

Later he went to work in a dry goods store in the same town and soon was taken into a partnership. He purchased three stores owned by his firm and began the chain department store business which has proved to be one of the most successful in the world.
