Five Meet Death In Oklahoma Interurban Crash

Democratic Pledge Upheld By Executive Committee

Decision Made At Meeting Of Lubbock Group

County Voters In Primary To Be Required To Support All Nominees Of Election; No Change Made In Pledge

Order Is Withheld

Forty-Nine Candidates Are Certified For Ballots In July Elections; Expenses Are Fixed, Announced

VOTERS of Lubbock county will go to the polls for the primary elections in July as full-fledged democrats pledging to support the nominees of their party, according to a decision rendered yesterday by the Lubbock County Democratic Executive Committee in meeting at the court house.

No change will be made this year in the pledge which is to appear at the top of the ballot, heading the list of candidates. Article 111, Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, states that "no official ballot for primary elections shall have on it any symbol or device or any printed matter except a uniform primary test, reading as follows:

"I am a democrat and pledge myself to support the nominees of this primary."

"And any ballot which shall not contain such printed test above the names of the candidates thereon shall be void and shall not be counted."

Forty-nine candidates were certified by the executive committee at its meeting yesterday at which time the body fixed proportionately the amount each candidate was to pay toward election expenses, both for the July primary and the August run-off. Expenses, as set out by the committee, follow: county judge, \$75 each for three candidates; assessor, \$150; county clerk, \$125 each.

McKee Case To Come Thursday

Spectators Are Searched For Weapons As Trial Comes Up At Lamesa; Alleged Slayer Pleads Not Guilty

LAMESA, June 16. — In order to get justice on special venue, the trial of the McKee case for the murder of W. H. Billingsley, a prominent merchant in a dining hall at May 1, was postponed until Thursday, after the defendant entered a plea of not guilty when arraigned yesterday.

Although spectators who entered the court room were searched for weapons and 14 West Texas peace officers in addition to local officers were present, the sheriff's office said trouble was not expected.

Special Venue Ordered. Eighty-nine special venue orders were ordered to the list of 30 regular jurors. Names of more than 20 witnesses were read.

Through his counsel, Harvey B. Reed and J. F. Wills, of Hobbs, N. M., McKee sought for a short time to prepare his defense. His attorneys have called over 30 witnesses but it was understood today only about 10 had been served with formal notice.

Thomas L. Price, district attorney, announced that J. E. Gierhard, former county judge, had been retained as special counsel for the state in addition to A. W. Gibson, county attorney.

Stock Prices Are Swept To New Low Mark

Deflation Is Most Drastic Since Troublesome Days Of Last November Crash; Drop Part Of World-Wide Dip

NEW YORK, June 16. (AP)—The most drastic deflation of stock prices since the troublesome days of last November was experienced on the New York stock exchange and other securities markets today. As measured by the composite price index of 80 representative issues the general level of stock prices plunged to the lowest point since Christmas, and eliminating the effect of the latter months of last year, to the lowest level since August 1935.

The heading decline in stock prices appeared to be a part of a world-wide deflation in the speculative markets, and was accompanied by sharp drops in the cotton and grain exchanges, and further reductions in the prices of commodities and trade in organized markets. While there was a tendency in some quarters to point to the passage and executive approval of the tariff measure as an aggravating factor, opinion in brokerage and banking circles as to its influence was widely varied.

Support lacking. Aggressive banking support was lacking, although the decline was checked in the afternoon by heavy accumulation of shares attributed to brokerage circles to important interests. Selling was in huge volume in late dealings. The day's sales on the stock exchange aggregated \$500,000 shares, the largest turnover this year, save for the \$500,000 share day of May 8.

Approximately 300 stocks sold at new low levels for 1936. The ticker did not print the final quotation until 40 minutes after the closing gong.

Three Get Pen Sentences In Trials Monday

District And Federal Courts Both In Session; Seven Up For Trials; Two Cases Are Continued, Two Dismissed

Wilson Presiding

Joe Lawson Given Fourteen Months On Pro Charges In Federal Court; Dumas And Harris Found Guilty

WHEELS of justice turned with unaccustomed speed here yesterday as consideration was given the cases of seven defendants on a varied array of charges in federal and district courts now in session. Three convictions were obtained, sentences of seven years, two years, and fourteen months being assessed. Two defendants were released when no-bills were returned against them and two other cases were continued until this morning.

The case of E. W. Herman and his son, Vernon Herman, charged with violation of prohibition law, which was started yesterday in the federal division of Federal court before Judge Jas. C. Wilson, was continued over until this morning.

The two men were arrested April 25, when state rangers, assisted by officers of Lubbock and Hale counties, raided their farm in Lamb county. Officers confiscated 350 gallons of whiskey in the raid.

Joe Lawson, charged with violation of the prohibition law, was found guilty and assessed a term of 14 months in the penitentiary by a jury in Federal court here yesterday morning.

Preston Neptentall, also charged with violation of the law, was released when a no-bill was returned against him. He had been charged with violation of the Mann Act.

Charged with theft of an automobile, J. H. Dumas, yesterday was found guilty in a jury trial in district court before Judge Homer L. Pharr, and sentenced to seven years in the penitentiary.

One other case, that of Ralph Harris, was tried in the court Monday. Harris was found guilty of car theft and assessed a term of two years in the pen. He had been tried on similar charges two weeks ago, found guilty and given a five-year suspended sentence.

GOP Welcomes Tariff Issue In Elections

Democratic Challenge Accepted By Republican Chiefs As Hoover Prepares To Put Signature On Measure

WASHINGTON, June 16. (AP)—The challenge of the democratic national executive committee that the tariff would be "the issue" in the November congressional elections was accepted by republican leaders today as President Hoover arranged to sign the bill and demagogues in and out of congress assailed the executive's week-end statement.

"Let it be an issue," said Senator Watson of Indiana, "the republican chiefs. We have never lost yet on that issue. The people of America have prospered under tariff protection."

Hoover Scored. Taking the floor soon after the senate met, Senator Harrison, democratic, to the president, Mr. Hoover of "hypocrisy and deception" in his statement announcing he would approve the Hawley-Smoot measure.

Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, in a statement to the press described the president's announcement as "an approval of the tariff bill with emphasis and important reservations."

Vice President Curtis today signed the bill and sent it to the White House. The President was expected to sign it tomorrow. If it is signed tomorrow it will take effect Wednesday.

Relief Comes After Floods Ravage Texas

Sunshine, Receding Streams Bring Halt To Rampage Of Rivers In South And West Texas Over Week-End

Nine Persons Die

Vast Property Damage Caused Over Wide Section; Crops Seriously Hurt; Dams Are Filled To Capacity

(By Associated Press)

SUNSHINE and receding streams brought relief to storm-stricken areas in widely separated sections of Texas Monday, after inestimable damage to growing crops and rambling creeks and rivers wrought a death toll of nine persons in west and south Texas areas over the week-end.

Flood waters that came down Pecan creek and middle and south Concho rivers more than filled the lake above New Nashworthy dam, near San Angelo, its capacity of 3,500,000 gallons being thoroughly tested by the great wall of water behind it. It was said more water passed through its gates than was retained after the gates were closed. The Concho, Ben Picklin and Metcalfe dams also were full.

Camps Inundated. The water at Christoval, Tom Green county, reached its greatest height since 1908, several tourists camps having been inundated. More than six inches of rain in Uvalde disrupted automobile and railroad traffic in that south Texas area and washed fields appreciably. It was reported, Diley, Hondo, Kerrville and Luling, all in south Texas, reported rains ranging from 1.5 to 2.5 inches, for 24 hours ending Monday.

One hundred and fifty men, including members of the San Angelo fire department and Sheriff's office, were searching for the body of C. C. Lee of Luling, drowned Sunday in Flood Grape creek.

Repair Damage. Wichita Falls was repairing damage to city streets caused by heavy rain, which sent the Wichita river to within three feet of flood stage, and Lake Wichita to its greatest.

Husband Held For Slayings

Former Army Officer Jailed After Wife And Mother-In-Law Shot To Death; Refuses To Make Statement

(By Associated Press) JACKSON, Miss., June 16. (P)—Two women were shot and killed here today and the husband of one, a former army officer, was in jail charged with murder.

Major Edward O. Lohr, 36-year-old former officer of the Mississippi National guard, refused to talk after placed in jail following the shooting to death of his wife and mother-in-law in the Lohr home today but told Chief of Police John Simmons he was not alone in the house at the time.

Mrs. Lohr, 34, was shot twice in the chest and once in the leg. She was found sitting at a dressing table with her head resting on the table. A pistol was nearby.

Her mother, Mrs. Hanne P. Nixon, 58, was lying between two beds on the floor. She had been shot in the head, arm and hand.

Negro Spirituals and Slave Songs to Feature Tech Artist Course Tonight

Negro spirituals and slave songs will feature the program to-night when the Fisk Jubilee singers, first scheduled entertainment of the summer artist's course, appear at the Texas Tech gymnasium at 8:30 o'clock.

The singers, composed of a sextet of two women and four men, the third generation of negro singers bearing their title, is composed of graduates of Fisk university, Nashville, Tenn.

Last summer, they sang in some 30 colleges, including the universities of California, Missouri, Minnesota, Wisconsin, Michigan, Texas and New Mexico. They have made four tours of Europe and have sung to practically every city of the United States.

The second number of the artist course will be on July 2, a play entitled "Grumpy," while the third number is a light opera to be presented July 15.

Tech Asks For Three Million Appropriation

Budget Needs Presented To Board of Control Monday By Dr. Horn, Gaston And Four College Directors

AUSTIN, June 16.—Budget appropriations totalling \$3,345,430 for the biennium ending August 31, 1937 were asked of the State Board of Control today by Texas Technological college. The amount is three times the sum allotted the college for the current biennium. The college asked \$1,115,145 for the year ending August 31, 1936 and \$1,565,145 for the year ending August 31, 1937.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president, and W. T. Gaston, business manager of Texas Tech, together with four directors presented the claims for the local institution's next biennium.

In addition to the two local men, directors who compose the legislative committee, are Clifford B. Jones, of Spur; Houston Harris, San Angelo; Riley Strickland, of Amarillo; and Thomas Johnson of McKinney.

A total of \$1,221,200 was asked for buildings by the Tech officials. Included in the budget are the outlined needs of a new library building, enlargement of the administration building and a dairy manufacturing building.

Three hundred and sixty items, grouped into six general divisions are named in the budget.

Capone Brothers May Be Separated

CHICAGO, June 16. (P)—The two main Capone brothers, "Scarface" Al and Ralph J. who have kept fairly free from jails and prisons during their tumultuous careers in Chicago's gangland, will be separated for the next three years if a sentence for income tax frauds imposed today by Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson on Ralph stands.

Ralph Capone, the elder of Scarface, has never achieved the widespread publicity of Al, but government investigators discovered that between 1924 and 1929, he had deposited \$1,571,096 under seven different names in one Chicago bank and had failed to mention it in his income tax returns. Consequently, Ralph was indicted for attempting to defraud the United States and for failure to pay income taxes and concealment of assets.

Three Others Injured When Auto Smashed

Grade Crossing Near Norman Scene Of Fatal Collision Monday Night; Parts Of Car Scattered 200 Yards

Children Included

Six Of One Family Among Victims; Accident Occurs When Automobile Drives On Track Before Interurban

(By Associated Press)

NORMAN, Okla., June 16.—Five persons were killed and three others were injured critically when an interurban car collided with a motor car at a grade crossing north of here tonight.

The dead: Ernie Reynolds, 17; Rava Reynolds, 17; Eugene Reynolds, 4; Mrs. Mildred Shelton, 26; of Norman; Dale Heneger, 15, of Norman.

The injured: Carl Reynolds, 20; Leona Reynolds, 16; Martha Reynolds, 12.

All of the Reynolds were the children of Jim Reynolds, farmer, living four and one-half miles southwest of Moore. Mrs. Shelton is the wife of Joe Shelton, Norman automobile mechanic.

The accident was reported to have occurred when the motor car drove on the tracks in the path of the interurban car which was said to have been traveling at a high rate of speed.

The automobile was demolished. Parts of it were found more than 200 yards away from the scene. A telephone pole was broken off when the car was thrown against it.

All of the dead were believed to have been killed instantly. The injured were in the American Legion hospital. It had not been determined whether they would live.

Carol II Will Be Coronated as New King of Rumania

BUCHAREST, June 16. (P)—Now that Carol II has swept all obstacles from his path to a full and valid kingship of Rumania, he plans today for an impressive coronation that will be the last triumph in the journey of an exile to a throne.

Two weeks ago Carol was a private citizen in a foreign land, "Carol" having been his name, with the throne of his father, which he renounced four years earlier, occupied by his own nine-year-old son.

Today Carol Caraiman is King Carol II. His divorce was recognized as morally non-existent by the Rumanian parliament, his wife, whom he proclaimed Queen Helen, was reported near a reconciliation with him, and his son was merely a carefree little crown prince.

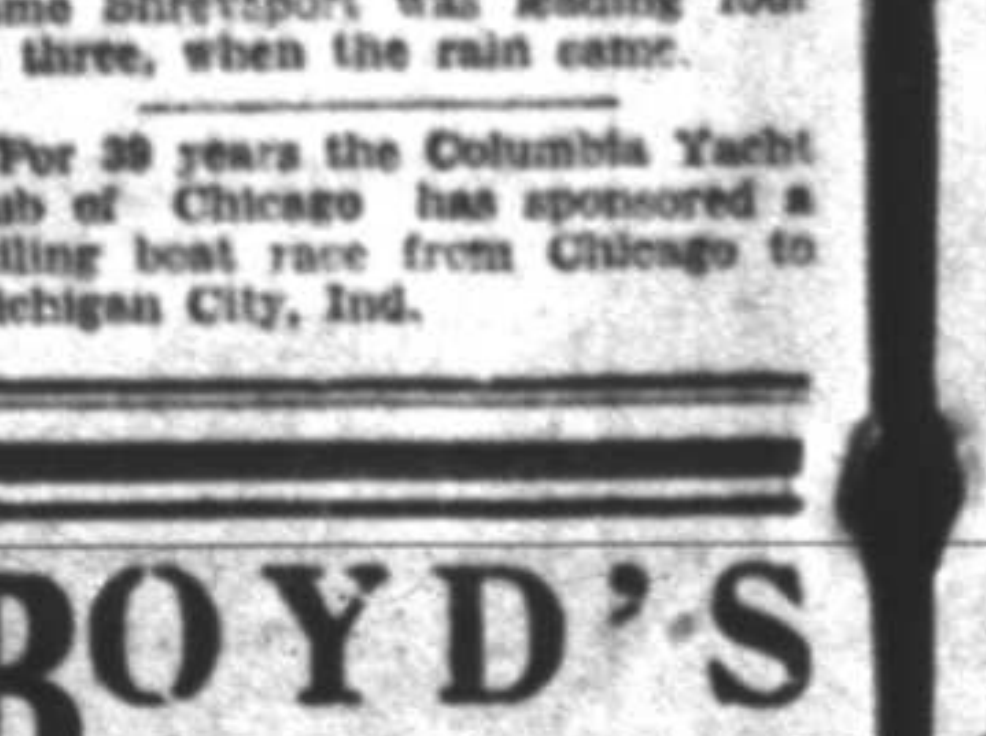

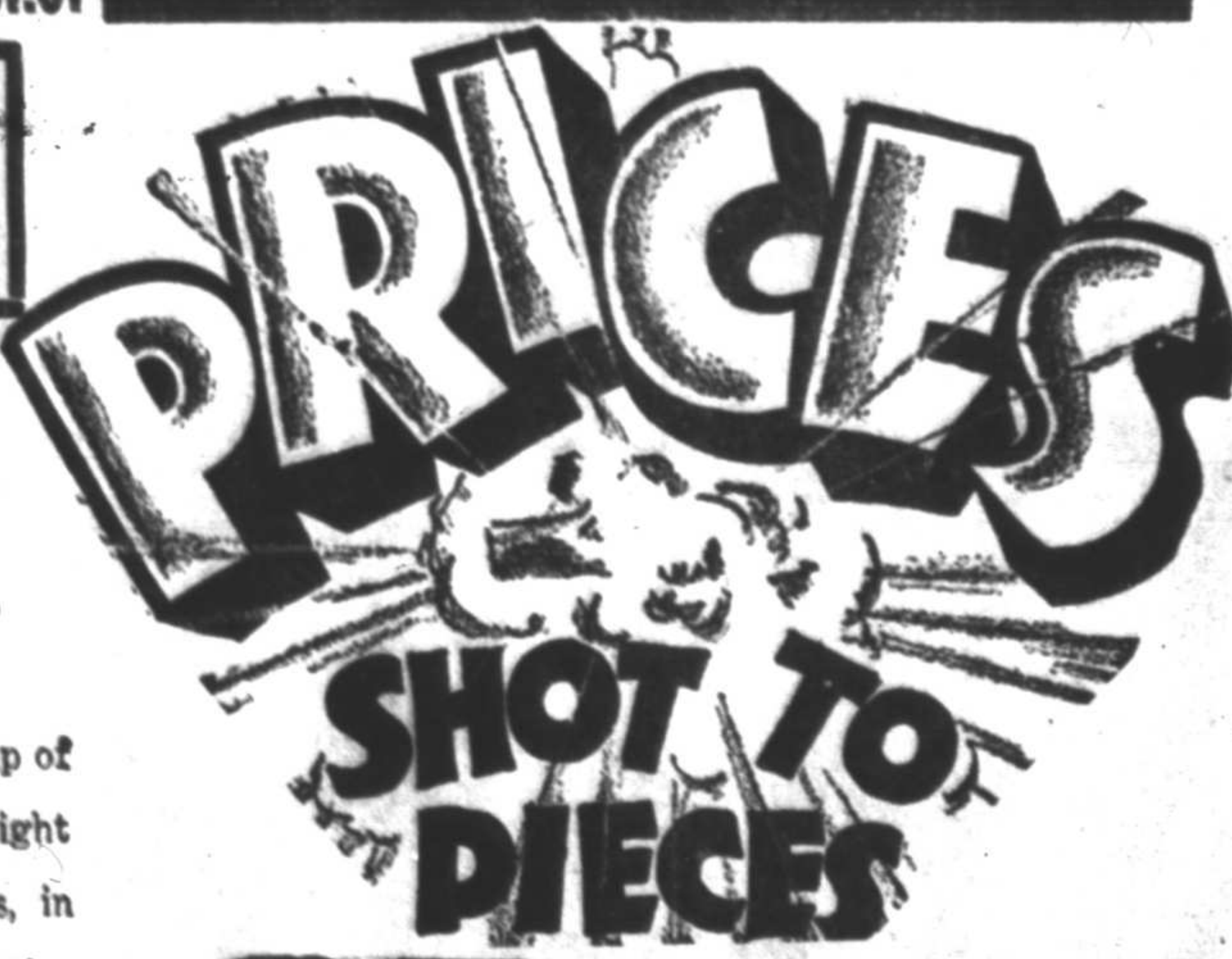

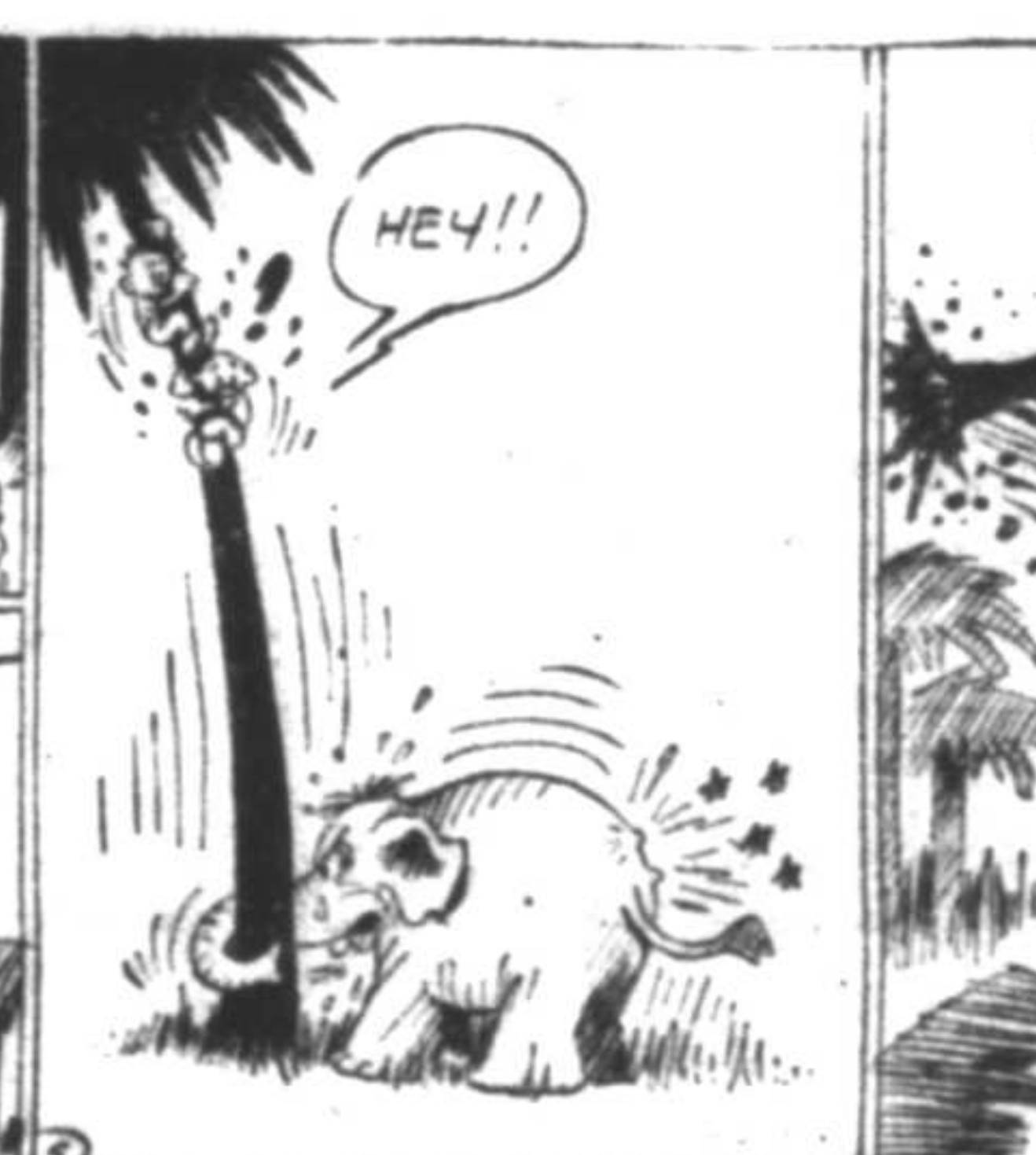

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Cotton July Liquidation Features Cotton Livestock Liberal Supply Of Cattle Is Offered Grain Prices Fall Due To Stock Crash

Cotton

NEW ORLEANS COTTON

NEW ORLEANS, June 16. (AP)—

Further drastic liquidation of the July option near the cotton market today and at one time during the morning the bid premium of July over October existing until recently was practically wiped out.

Poor cables and weakness in the stock market coupled with a fresh decline in silver helped the decline.

At the lowest July broke through the 13-cent line to 12.88, down 61 points from Saturday's close.

Other months declined in sympathy, October dropping to 12.84, down 38 points. The general market closed barely steady at net losses for the day of 45 to 56 points.

Liverpool

Liverpool came in 13 points better than due to 13 points worse than due and 14 points here showed losses of 16 to 24 points. There was a slight rally after the start on covering but the liquidation of the near months persisted any by the end of the first hour July traded down to 13.15 and October to 13.02.

The market continued weak for the July position which eventually traded down to 12.93, off 61 points from Saturday's close.

October dropped to 12.84, down 38 points. From these low levels there was a good rally before mid-session of 30 points on July and about 20 points on October and a somewhat steadier feeling prevailed.

The market turned easy again in late trading, July dropping to 13.00 and closing at that price. New crop months made new lows at 12.76, for October and 12.93 for December and closed at those prices, 56 points net down on July and 45 to 48 points down on new crop months.

NEW YORK COTTON

NEW YORK, June 16. (AP)—

Cotton prices made new low records for the season today under a further selling of July, attributed to liquidation of trailing long accounts and more or less general selling of later months promoted by weakness in stocks and grains and a favorable view of crop advices.

July contracts closed at 13.24, while the new October closed at 12.76 with the general market closing easy at net declines of 37 to 51 points.

Opening Easy

The opening was easy at a decline of 6 to 27 points in response to relatively easy Liverpool cables and a favorable interpretation of the weather map. Stop orders were uncovered on the decline and sent July off to 13.24.

Weakness in the grain and stock markets seemed to stimulate the selling of cotton while the gradual disappearance of the July premium had an unsettling effect on sentiment. The decline to approximately 13 1/4 for July and about the 12 3/4 level for new December contracts brought in considerable covering or buying for a reaction.

Market Weakens

The market weakened again in the last hour under a renewal of the selling movement, with all the new crop months reaching the lowest levels of the day and session. The closing price for July showed a rally of 16 points from the low, but other months were at the low with the old December closing at 12.88 and the new December at 12.84. The closing quotation for July showed a premium of 56 points over the new October compared with 70 points at the close of last week.

CHICAGO GRAIN

CHICAGO, June 16. (AP)—

Disturbed by stock market weakness and by much talk of probable foreign retaliation against United States agricultural products, wheat prices today fell as much as 40¢ a bushel. All other grain values collapsed with wheat, breaking the season's low record, and in some cases overturning figures that went back for many years.

July wheat for example, plunged down below any point heretofore touched since 1914 and rye since 1900. The day's lowest prices were simultaneous with announcement that the new tariff bill had reached the White House for President Hoover's promised signature.

Closing Nervous.

Closing quotations on wheat were nervous, 2-4 1/2 1-3¢ a bushel lower than Saturday's finish. Corn closed 1 1/2-2 1/2¢ down, oats 2-4 1/2¢ off, and provisions unchanged to a seaback of 3¢.

Heavy general selling of wheat came quickly into prominence again largely as soon as trading opened. Sharp downturns in Liverpool wheat quotations had preceded the start of business here, and there were also dispatches at hand telling of further rains in Canada, and the American Northwest beneficial to the spring wheat crop. Of still greater significance apparently to the average trader was the fact that President Hoover had made known his intention to sign the tariff bill, and that in various quarters opinions were expressed the result would be further tightening up of European import duties on wheat from the United States.

Cotton Acreage Destroyed By Rain

(By Staff Correspondent)

LAMESA, June 16.—About 50,000 acres of cotton, just beginning to show signs of becoming a crop, was destroyed by a rain which varied from three to six inches and which swept over a large area in Dawson and other counties late Saturday.

Many farmers Sunday and Monday in checking up their losses found the crop was virtually 100 per cent ruined by the rainfall, which assumed the proportions of a cloudburst at times.

An electrical display which accompanied the rain, resulted in the death of two persons, the injury of several others and the loss of numerous head of livestock.

The heaviest part of the storm seemed to be west of Lamesa where the loss was greatest to cotton and spring crops.

Some farmers were of the opinion that the crop of cotton would not be replanted. "It is the 15th of June and that leaves only about four months until our first frost," J. E. Garland said.

Path of the storm was across Lynn and Dawson counties. It was several miles wide.

The body of a supposed gang victim, from which the head, hands and feet had been removed evidently to prevent identification, was taken from the sanitary district canal at Lockport, near here today.

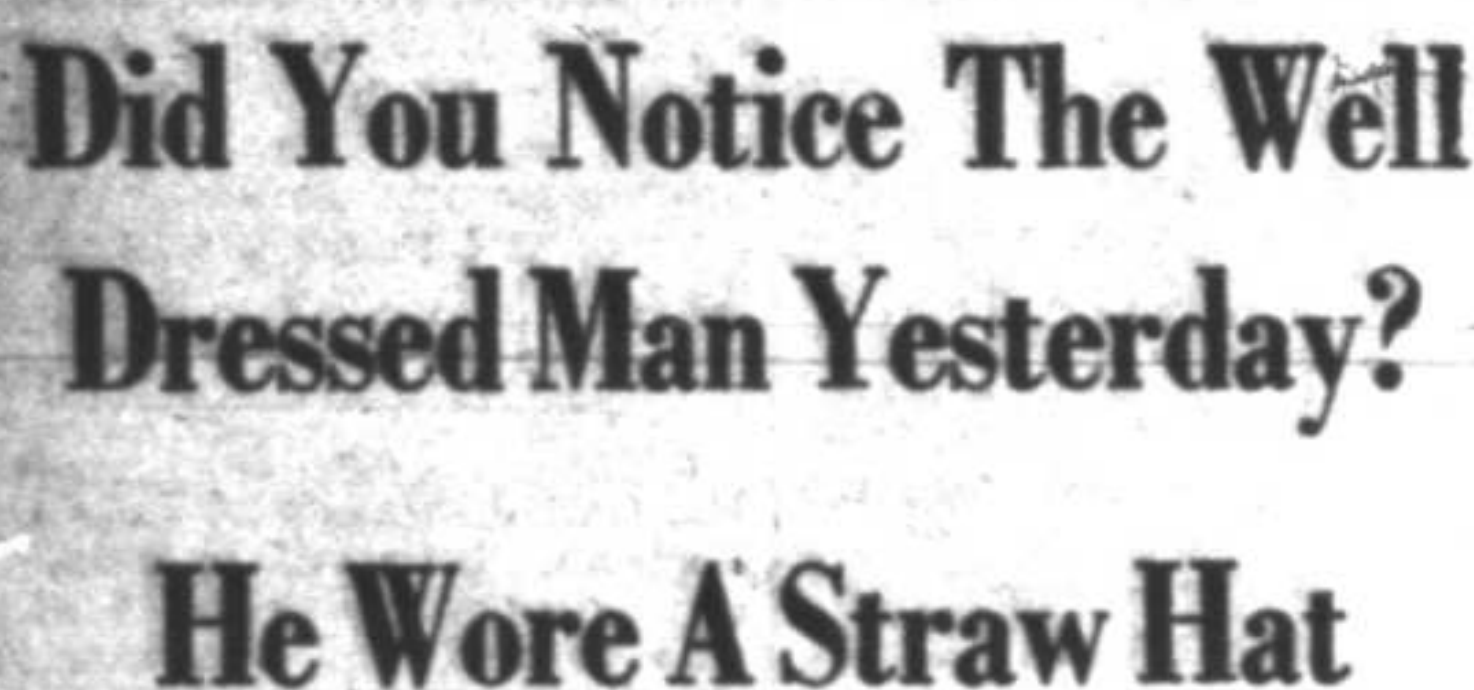
