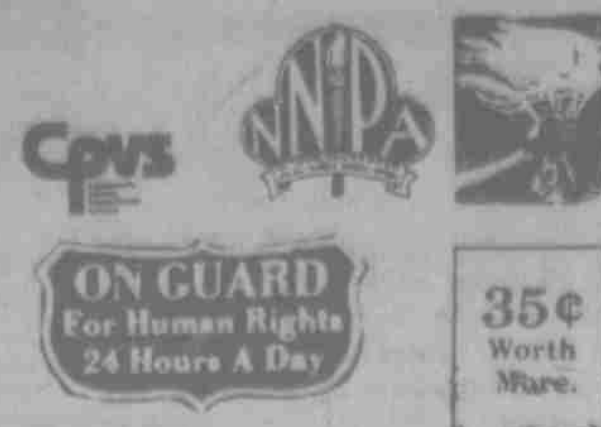

LHFC Offers Mortgage Bond Program With 8.75% Loans

The Lubbock Housing Finance Corporation (LHFC) announced the successful bond closing of its 1990 Mortgage Program for low interest rate FHA and VA loans. The current bond issue of \$8,290,000 was successfully marketed to achieve an attractive 8.75% mortgage loan rate. Loans are available for families who buy a new or existing home in the City of Lubbock.

LHFC President George W. Jackson made the announcement of the program last Thursday and gave credit to the planning and foresight of the Housing Finance Corporation Board of Directors. "This issue culminated efforts over the past year to recycle funds from our 1980 bond program. We are gratified that our efforts assisted in assuring full payment of the 1980 bonds and provided this much-needed mortgage money for Lubbock residents."

Jackson suggested that interested buyers contact their local Realtor or builder, or call any one of the following participating lenders:

First National Bank at Lubbock, 794-1061; Liberty State Bank, 793-3311; McAfee Mortgage and Investment Company, 793-2671; West Central Investments Corpora-

tion, 792-2178.

Wes Hallmark, Vice President of LHFC, noted that this bond issue is unique in providing greater lender flexibility than most recent issues. For instance, all homebuyers with incomes of \$50,000 or less may qualify. Funds are available for new or existing homes. The issue also provides special target funds for several important areas undergoing recent growth and revitalization, including Chatman Hill, Guadalupe, Arnett Benson, and the Overton neighborhoods.

The LHFC has provided over \$140 million for single family housing in Lubbock over the past ten years. Board members of the Housing Finance Corporation include Lubbock City Council members T. J. Patterson and Maggie Trejo. Other members include George Jackson, Wes Hallmark, Juanita Kiesling and David Langston.

Jackson also expressed appreciation on behalf of the Housing Finance Corporation to ex-officio Boardmember, Assistant City Manager Robert Massengale and to former member Richard Lopez. Lopez has served for over six years before his recent retirement from the Housing Finance Corporation Board.

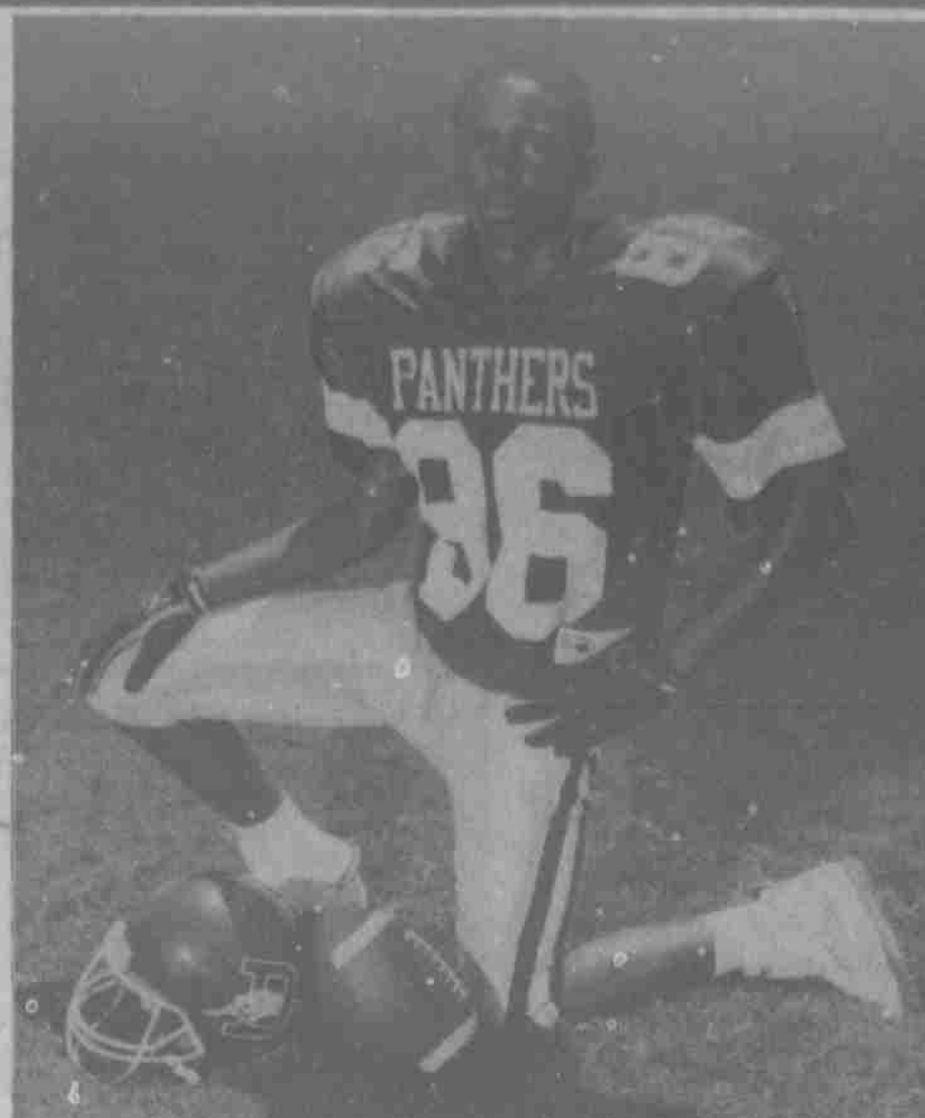
Celebration Set For Southwest Digest

Eyes In The Sky!

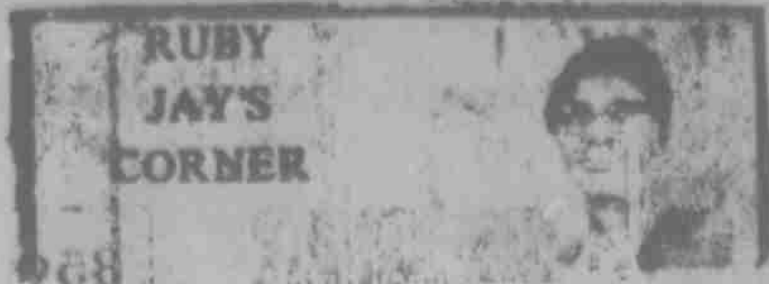

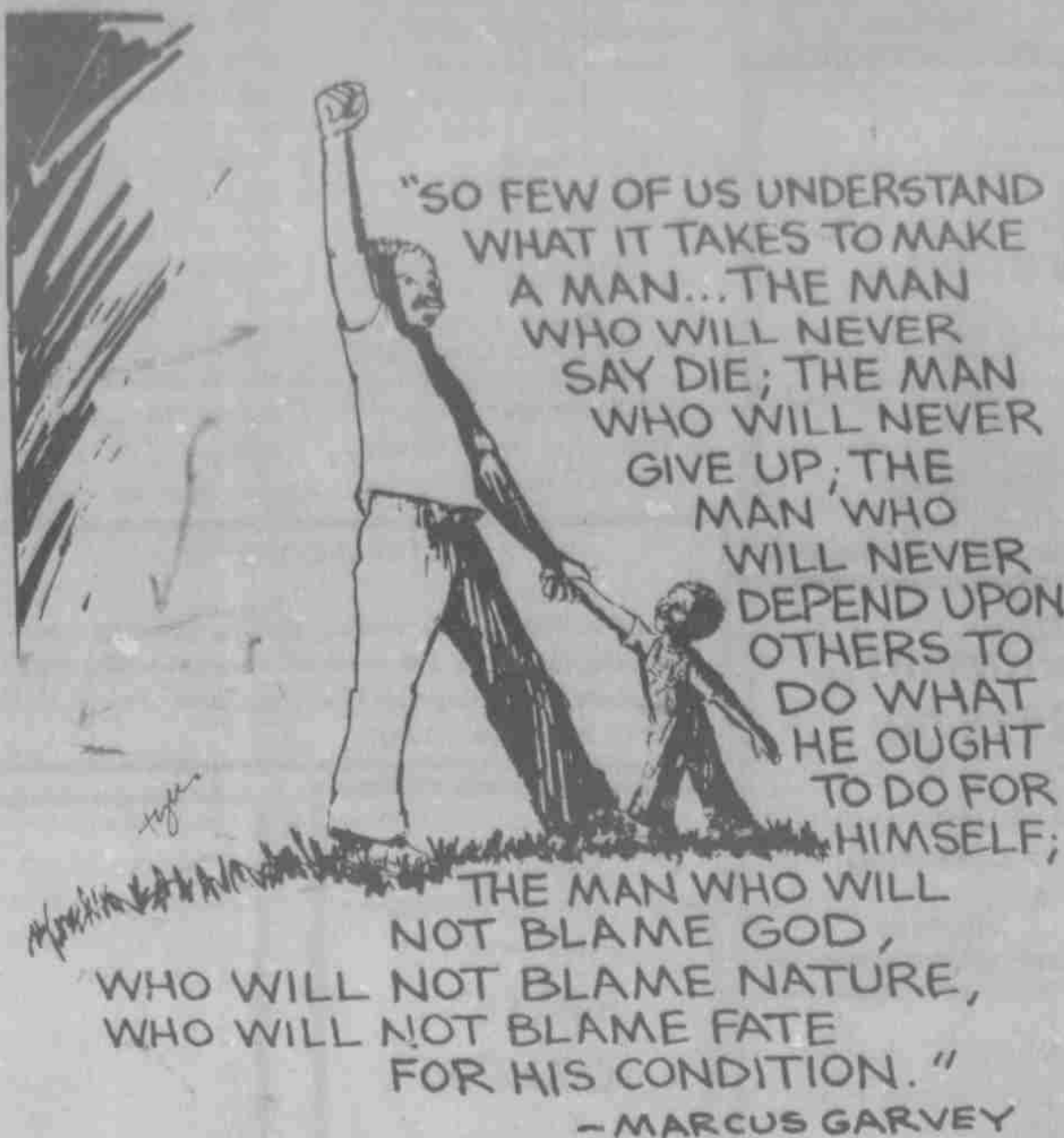
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Jerome Moore BBQ Fund Raiser A Success

A National Shame

Ending America's Child Neglect

Six months ago President Bush and the nation's governors adopted six national education goals that, if reached, would make our country's educational achievement second to none. The first goal is that "by the year 2000, all children in America will start school ready to learn."

Readiness for learning was made the top goal in recognition of the fact that classroom achievement largely depends on youngsters' experiences from birth through the preschool years. Its inclusion is a tacit acknowledgment that our country is neglecting the youngest among us.

In our treatment of preschool children, the United States stands alone among the world's industrialized nations. And we do not stand tall.

Twenty-three percent (almost one in four) of America's children under the age of six are poor. That's the highest child poverty rate in any industrialized nation.

The United States—unlike West Germany, Sweden, Canada, France, Great Britain, and Japan—does not make health care universally available. The U.S. Census Bureau estimates that over 60 million Americans—28 percent of the population—lack even minimally adequate health insurance coverage.

Not only are millions of infants and young children denied access to needed medical care, in the United States working parents can lose their jobs if they must stay home to care for a newborn or seriously ill child.

Germany, Japan, Canada, France, Sweden, Austria, Finland, and Italy guarantee all employees the right to a minimum of 12 weeks paid parental

or maternity leave. U.S. workers enjoy no such guarantee. Just last month the White House vetoed a bill that would have allowed employees up to 12 weeks of unpaid leave for birth, adoption, or serious family illness.

In West Germany, Sweden, and France, 70 to 80 percent of all three- to five-year-olds attend preschool programs that are either run under the auspices of the public school system or heavily subsidized by the government. In the United States, only 46 percent of three-

and four-year-olds attend any form of child care—and only 16 percent of the cost is publicly financed. The result, according to the U.S. General Accounting Office, is that while two-thirds of children whose parents earn over \$35,000 a year are enrolled in preschools, only one-third of those who parents earn under \$10,000 are enrolled.

These facts should be a source of deep national shame. They amount to a clear case of child neglect. And they will prevent us from reaching our national education goals.

How can our country expect to become number one in learning when we allow so many children to begin their formal schooling hobbled by malnutrition, illness, lack of critical developmental opportunities, and other destructive consequences of social neglect?

The answer is straightforward. We can't. That is why, earlier this summer, I proposed programs to help prepare America's children to learn. These programs—which I'll discuss in subsequent columns—focus on readiness for preschool and elementary children.

Some might suggest that the National Education Association, whose two million members are overwhelmingly K-12 and higher education employees, confine its concern to what happens in schools. Again the answer is straightforward. We can't.

What happens to students in our classrooms depends on what happens to them before they ever step through a schoolhouse door. And because we care about our students, their learning, and their futures, we will continue to insist that our country end its shameful record of child neglect.

A Little Means A Lot

The U. S. Small Business Administration (SBA) has initiated a new loan program, making it easier for small firms to get loans for \$50,000 or less. Mondy is getting harder to borrow. A May 11, 1990 Wall Street Journal article quoted American Bankers Association officials admitting that bankers are particularly reluctant now

to lend to small businesses.

According to Walter Fronstin of Lubbock's SBA office, this new program makes available small business loans to those most adversely affected by a stringent money policy - small business men and women, minorities and economically and socially disadvantaged people trying to operate small firms.

Fronstin also points out that the incentive for banks to make these small loans is a 1 percent optional fee, simplified loan application procedures and the U. S. Government's guarantee

of 90 percent of the loan.

Small businesses are vital for jobs creation, increasing exports and expanding the economy. "It is extremely important to us all," Fronstin says, "that financing at all levels is available to keep alive the incentive for small business formation and operation."

In the Book of Judges 5:23 are recorded these words: "Curse ye Meroz, said the angel of the Lord, curse ye bitterly the inhabitants thereof; because they came not to the help of the Lord, to the help of the Lord against the mighty."

In the song of Deborah and Barak (Judges 5:1-31a) the sin of the men of Meroz is described in very remarkable terms: "They came not to the help of the Lord." Everywhere we read of the Lord's coming to the help of man; but man coming to the help of the Lord seems strange. The tribes of Israel were called to join battle against Jabin, king of Hazor, who for twenty years had mightily oppressed them. The call to join battle in the spirit of their covenant unity went through the tribes like a wild fire. It was left to the leaders to decide whether or not to respond. The majority on this occasion responded. However, the people of Meroz declined the summons. What these people of Israel had forgotten was that God had entered into a marriage covenant with Israel. The kingdom of Israel was His kingdom. The interests of Israel were His interests; and He had associated with them the glory of His own name.

In the midst of the enthusiasm of the battle it comes to Deborah's mind that one city had been cold and selfish, deaf to the voice of duty, and careless of God's call. So right away she turns of the traitor city with the words of burning wrath which have stamped its name with disgrace forever in the language of Judges 5:23.

The Meroz disposition is still with us as we approach the twenty-first century. There is always a struggle going on against wickedness, and against those conditions of life which make wickedness so easy for many around us. There is the same struggle of God's people against oppression as we waged by Israel against the mighty army of Jabin. That struggle never ceases; it changes its outward form, but its essence remains. It dies out here to emerge there. It seems to decline in interest or attraction, but it never stops. It is the "warfare in which there is no discharge." Today, Israel fights on the side of the poor, helpless, and homeless. She fights against the ruthless oil companies, the outrageous cost of medical care, and for equity in job placement. Today, Israel fights in the struggle of all that is good against the enemies of God; she fights against sin and sorrow, against error, against crime, against want, against starvation; Israel fights -- and Meroz stays home. What is your excuse for not coming to the help of the Lord?

(I'm now just a nobody, trying to tell everybody, about somebody, who can save everybody.)

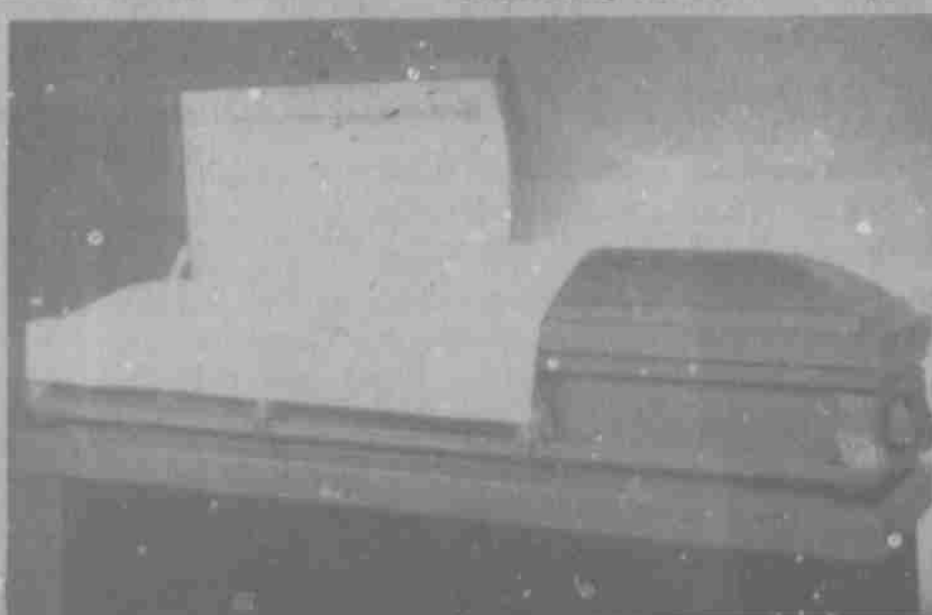

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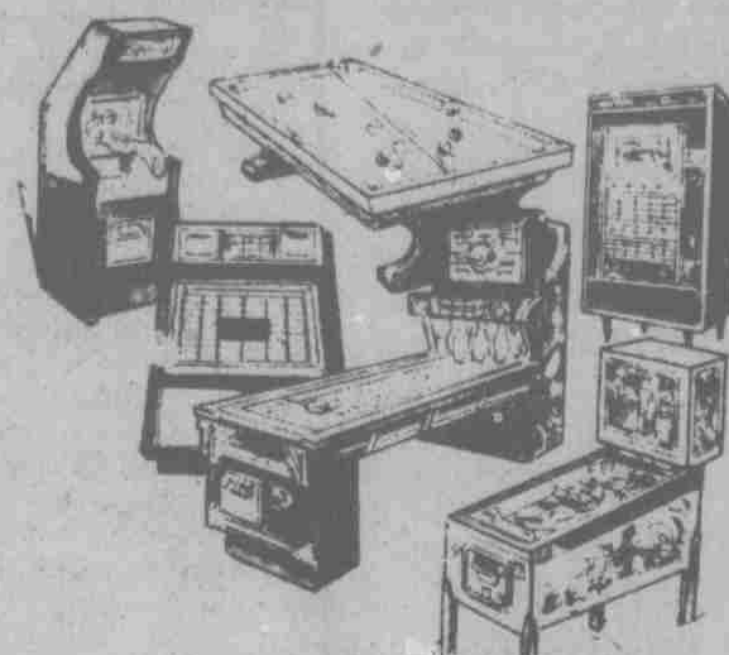
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In Appreciation to Employers
