A Letter From Home To Boys In Service

A Salute To The Home Boys In The Armed Forces

Dear Buddies:

I hope you will permit me to address you in such a manner. Even though you are a captain, lieutenant, sergeant, corporal or a buck private in the rear rank, or if you have been promoted to the special service of K. P. duty, you are a General to the folks back home. We salute you one and all.

Saturday was July 4th, Independence day. It was celebrated in a somber sort of way. How many more times is this Battle for Independence going to have to be fought? This was the thought that occurred to me on that occasion.

Democracy is a great concept. It represents the highest humanitarian ideals. It places the dignity of the human spirit first among temporal values. The Declaration of Independence says our inalienable rights are the rights to Life, Liberty and the pursuit of Happiness. These are the ideals for which you are and will be fighting. You are the ones to whom the preservation of these ideals mean the most, since the greater part of your life lies ahead of you.

I would like to know that this is the last war. I would like to see the forces of evil that is continuously seeking to destroy the finer things of life completely erased. I hope that some of our Abernathy boys can have a part in the final consummation of these plans.

We are still maintaining our Home Guard organization. The men and boys are learning many of the fundamentals of military training. Several of the boys have gone from our ranks into the service and they all say that what they have learned has been worth a lot to them.

We have had rain. Too much in some places and too little in others, but on the whole, everything is looking pretty good. We are hoping that we can harvest a bountiful crop so that we can put more into the war effort.

The U. S. O. drive has been continued here and Abernathy has oversubscribed her quota. We hope that the funds going into this channel makes the way a little easier and happier for you.

May God's blessings continue to rest upon you and may your efforts be crowned with lasting and favorable results.

Following are portions of a letter which he wrote his parents while aboard ship. It was received here last week:

"I was surprised when I found out we were sailing, but I have always wanted to see the world and now I have my chance. I suppose you thought of my birthday, but who would have thought I would spend it like this. I hope I can spend my next one at home. I am sending you gifts for Mother's Day and Father's Day, although they may be a year reaching you.

"I have enjoyed my trip so far, and I'm anxious to see what they have in..... You have heard of sea sickness-- I got mine! It did not hurt me as much as it did some of the boys.

"Please, mother, don't worry about me. I feel just as safe over here as I do anywhere, and I feel like the same God is over here and He, alone, can keep me safe and deliver me back to you. And, some day you will hear foot steps, and look, see whose here! I believe in God, and I know our's is a just cause, and I'm sure He will watch over us and give us Victory over the enemy. And you can rest assured that if I am on the firing line, you'll be there, for the memory of your face is stamped on my heart and will ride the waves of the deep or wade with me into the jungles of the isles. So, be of good cheer, mother, and let us hope that some day it will be over and all will be well with us again. With love, your son, J. D."

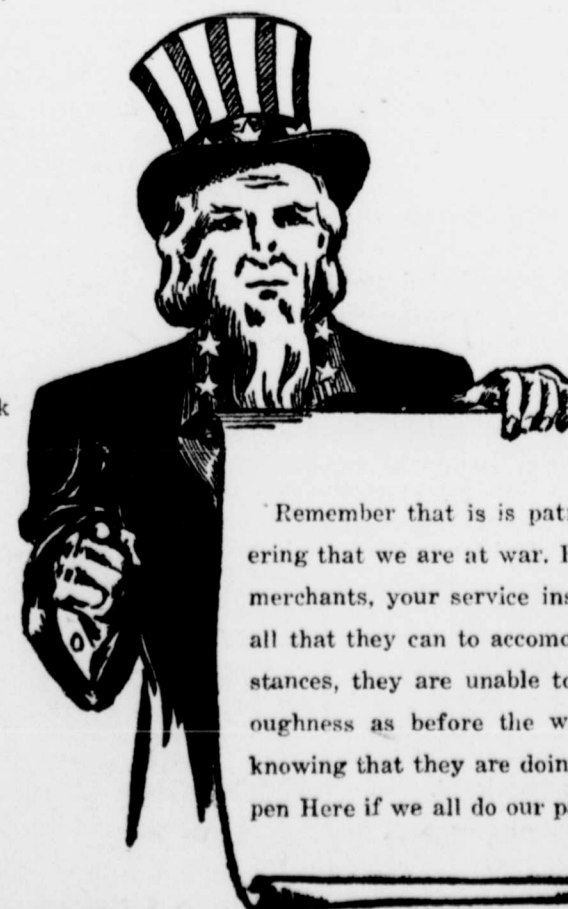
