Dak double: Cowboys' Prescott beats Redskins with legs, arm

LANDOVER, Md. (AP) — Dak Prescott probably could have kept running — maybe all the way to the end zone.

Instead, the Dallas Cowboys quarterback stiff-armed Washington Redskins cornerback Josh Norman to put an exclamation point on his longest run of the game. Prescott spent Sunday afternoon carving up the Redskins' defense with his arms and legs to the tune of 26 of 30 passing for 269 yards and three touchdowns and 69 yards rushing in a 31-21 Cowboys victory to improve to 2-0.

"If Dak could run the ball well and he can pass the ball well like he showed today, how can you prepare for us?" wide receiver Amari Cooper said. "We as a team can run the ball well and pass the ball well. It's hard to prepare for that."

A week after putting up a perfect 158.3 QB rating, Prescott responded from an interception to lead Dallas on consecutive touchdown drives of 97, 83 and 75 yards. At one point, he completed 18 consecutive passes and wondered the last time he had an in-completion.

"It's just about being in the groove, offense working together," said Prescott, who became the first Cowboys quarterback to compile seven touchdown passes in the first two games of the season since Don Meredith in 1966. "The run game was happening, we were able to throw the ball, receivers were making great catches and you just look up and it's like that."

On the verge of a contract extension that's expected to guarantee him over \$30 million, Prescott connected with three receivers on the touchdowns: Devin Smith, Jason Witten and Cooper. Less than two weeks removed from ending his holdout and agreeing to a \$90 million, six-year deal, Ezekiel Elliott had his workload increased to 23 carries for 111 yards and ran for a touchdown.

"It felt good," Elliott said. "That's my normal workload. I'm used to that. It definitely does feel good to be back out there."

It was a game that felt like it was being played deep in the heart of Texas — an entire side of the lower bowl was full of blue and white Cowboys jerseys, who just about outnumbered Redskins fans. Sounds of "Coop" filled the stadium after Cooper's catches,

and there was a loud "DE-FENSE" chant when Washington had the ball.

The Redskins (0-2) got a rushing touchdown from Adrian Peterson and passing TDs from Case Keenum and Paul Richardson and rookie Terry McLaurin. But their banged-up defense playing without two starters struggled to contain Prescott or cover his receivers.

"There are no excuses to be had," coach Jay Gruden said. "We've got to look at ourselves, and we've got to play better. We're minus a couple of pieces in the secondary. That adds an issue. But really, we should be better than this."

Prescott hasn't had a stretch as good as this in his NFL career, which comes at a perfect juncture amid contract negotiations.

"I have no hesitation about it," owner Jerry Jones said. "I'm very comfortable. He's very comfortable."

OLD-GUY HISTORY

With his 2-yard score late in the second quarter, Witten became the fifth tight end in NFL history with 70-plus touchdown catches. The 37-year-old has two this season after coming out of retirement.

Peterson rushed for his 107th career touchdown, breaking a tie with

Hall of Famer Jim Brown for fifth on the all-time list. Peterson started for Washington in place of injured running back Derrius Guice a week after being inactive.

PENALTIES GALORE

The teams combined for seven holding penalties in the first half alone. By the time all was said and done, Dallas had eight accepted penalties for 67 yards and Washington had six for 44 yards.

Cowboys: Lost DE Antwaun Woods in the second quarter with a left knee injury. ... DE Tyrone Crawford played through a nagging hip injury. ... WR Tavon Austin was out with a concussion.

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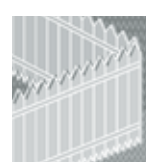

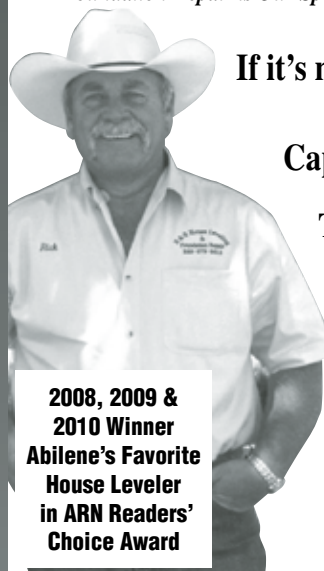
nurses because we weren't watching our patients closely enough. Does this sound like a place you could work for the entirety of your work life? I think not.

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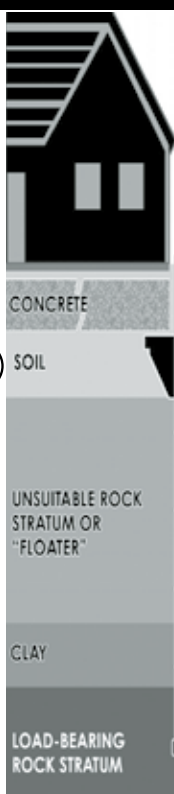

Opening lead -- king of diamonds.

Declarer can sometimes draw astonishingly accurate conclusions about the composition of the unseen hands from the plays made by the defenders. An outstanding example is provided by today's deal, which was played by Dorothy Hayden Truscott in a national pairs championship many years ago.

Truscott was South and got to three notrump as shown. West led the king of diamonds and continued with

the ace, East discarding a club after considerable thought. West then shifted to the jack of hearts. Truscott took the ace and led a heart toward the king, hoping for a 3-2 division, but West showed out, discarding a diamond.

Forced to abandon hearts, Truscott turned her attention to spades, the only other suit that offered a chance for the contract. But instead of taking the normal-looking finesse, Truscott led a spade to the ace and a low spade! West had to win with the king, and declarer wound up with 10 tricks for an excellent score. Had she finessed in spades, she would eventually have gone down one.

The key to Truscott's remarkable play was East's reluctant discard of a club at trick two. First, she made the assumption that West had the king of spades for his vulnerable three-diamond bid. Next, the play thus far had disclosed that East started with one diamond and four hearts. If his remaining cards had consisted of three spades and five clubs, he would have had no problem discarding a club at trick two.

East's lengthy huddle must therefore have been based on a holding of four spades and four clubs, which in turn meant that West had the doubleton king of spades.

Today in History

Today is Monday, Sept. 16, the 259th day of 2019. There are 106 days left in the year.

Today's Highlights in History:

On Sept. 16, 2001, President George W. Bush, speaking on the South Lawn of the White House, said there was "no question" Osama bin Laden and his followers were the prime suspects in the Sept. 11 attacks; Bush pledged the government would "find them, get them running and hunt them down." On this date:

In 1810, Mexico began its revolt against Spanish rule.

In 1893, more than 100,000 settlers swarmed onto a section of land in Oklahoma known as the "Cherokee Strip."

In 1910, Jessica Medlar Raiche of Mineola, N.Y., made the first accredited solo airplane flight by a woman in the United States.

In 1940, President Franklin D. Roosevelt signed the Selective Training and Service Act. Samuel T. Rayburn of Texas was elected Speaker of the U.S. House of Representatives.

In 1974, President Gerald R. Ford announced a conditional amnesty program for Vietnam war deserters and draft-evaders.

In 1976, the Episcopal Church, at its General Convention in Minneapolis, formally approved the ordination of women as priests and bishops.

In 1982, the massacre of between 1,200 and 1,400 Palestinian men, women and children at the hands of Israeli-allied Christian Phalange militiamen began in west Beirut's Sabra and Shatila refugee camps.

In 1987, two dozen countries signed the Montreal Protocol, a treaty designed to save the Earth's ozone layer by calling on nations to reduce emissions of harmful chemicals by the year 2000.

In 1994, a federal jury in Anchorage, Alaska, ordered Exxon Corp. to pay \$5 billion in punitive damages for the 1989 Exxon Valdez (val-DEEZ') oil spill (the U.S. Supreme Court later reduced that amount to \$507.5 million). Two astronauts from the space shuttle Discovery went on the first untethered spacewalk in ten years.

In 2005, President George W. Bush ruled out raising taxes to pay the massive costs of Gulf Coast reconstruction in the wake of Hurricane Katrina, saying other government spending had to be cut to pay for the recovery effort.

In 2007, contractors for the U.S. security firm Blackwater USA guarding a U.S. State Department convoy in Baghdad opened fire on civilian vehicles, mistakenly believing they were under attack; 14 Iraqis died.

O.J. Simpson was arrested in the alleged armed robbery of sports memorabilia collectors in Las Vegas. (Simpson was later convicted of kidnapping and armed robbery and sentenced to nine to 33 years in prison; he was released in 2017.)

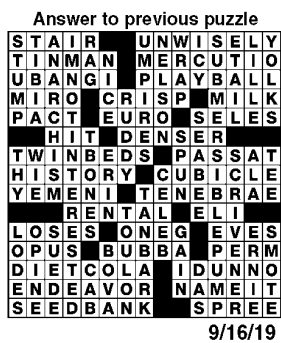
In 2013, Aaron Alexis, a former U.S. Navy reservist, went on a shooting rampage inside the Washington Navy Yard, killing 12 victims before being shot dead by police.

Ten years ago: Sen. Max Baucus, D-Mt., chairman of the Senate Finance Committee, unveiled sweeping legislation to remake the nation's costly health care system. Mary Travers, 72, one part of the folk trio Peter, Paul and Mary, died in Danbury, Connecticut.

Five years ago: President Barack Obama declared that the Ebola epidemic in West Africa could threaten security around the world and ordered 3,000 U.S. troops to the region in emergency aid muscle. After a day of public pressure from angry fans and concerned sponsors, the Minnesota Vikings reversed course and placed star running back Adrian Peterson on the exempt-commissioner's permission list while he addressed a felony charge of child abuse in Texas. (The Vikings had initially decided that Peterson could play with the team while the legal process played out; Peterson later pleaded no contest to misdemeanor reckless assault for physically disciplining his 4-year-old son with a wooden switch.)

One year ago: At least 17 people were confirmed dead from Hurricane Florence, and the North Carolina city of Wilmington was cut off by still-rising waters as catastrophic flooding spread across the Carolinas. Some Republican senators considering the Supreme Court nomination of Brett Kavanaugh expressed concern over a woman's allegation that a drunken Kavanaugh had groped her and tried to take off her clothes at a party when they were teenagers.

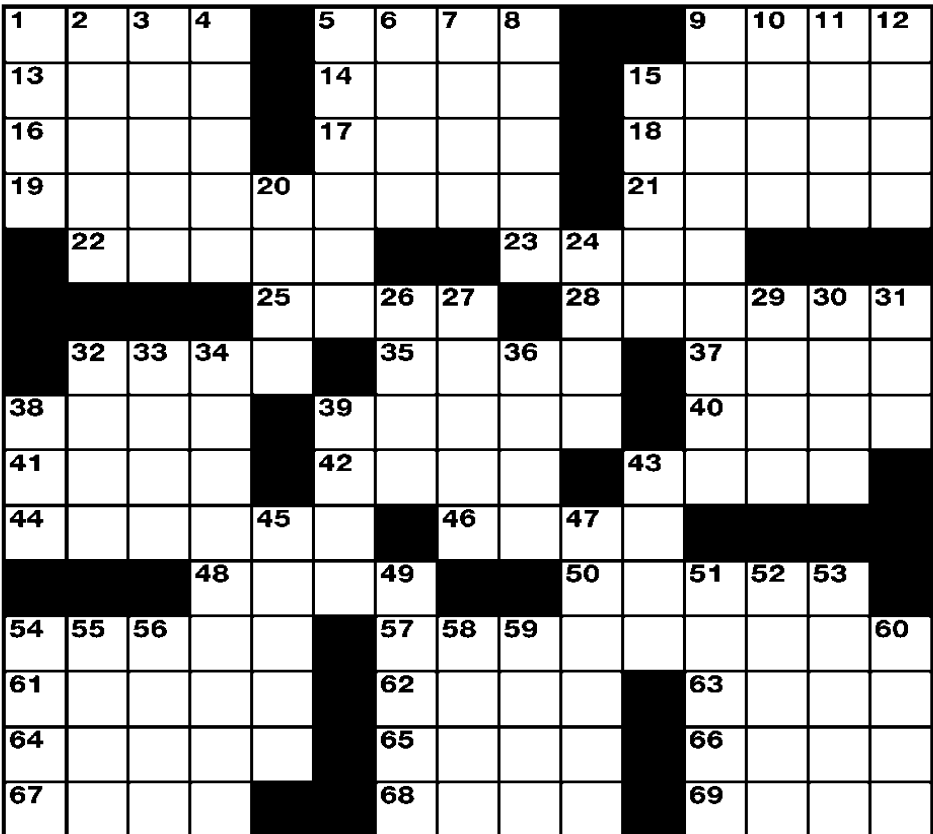
