### Eggs Are Useful

Ordinarily the housewife supplies her family with its protein food by serving meat in some form, but during Lent, when meat is off the menu occasionally during the week, she must look elsewhere for her protein.

Protein is found in meat, fish, fowl, the legumes (dried beans, peas, lentils), milk and milk products and eggs. Of these it has been found that the protein of the egg is of rather poor quality because they do not yield sufficient amounts of certain of the simple digestion products which are necessary for the growth of muscle. Eggs are actually "full of meat," and contain everything the body needs for its development, but must be properly combined with other foods.

Eggs are a concentrated food in that there is no bulk in the way of connecting tissue and all concentrated foods must be wisely chosen.

Much has been learned in the last few years about the vitamin content of eggs, particularly the

egg yolk, and they come under the list of protective foods along with spinach, orange juice and cod liver oil.

Properly cooked eggs are easily digested and can be served to an entire family from the two-year-old up. This does not mean that a two-year-old child may eat "deviled eggs," nor fried eggs nor eggs served in any of the highly seasoned sauces. But it does mean he may have poached eggs, eggs soft cooked in the shell, eggs hard cooked in the shell, carefully scrambled eggs, baked omelets and shirred eggs.

In planning meals in which eggs form the main dish, do not serve a dessert rich in eggs such as a custard or soufflé. If a custard is used, it should be regarded as the "main dish" and the rest of the meal built around it.

Keep in mind that eggs are always cooked at a low temperature.

To soft cook an egg in the shell, lower it carefully into enough boiling water to completely cover it, reduce heat and let stand five minutes. Do not let the water bubble. To hard cook an egg, let it stand in hot water just at the boiling point, but not bubbling, for 30 minutes. The yolk

of the egg cooked in this fashion is dry, crumbly and mealy and easily digested and the white firm and tender.

Milk and fresh vegetables combine with eggs to make a perfect meal. Milk supplies the lime lacking in eggs and fresh vegetables furnish bulk as well as their mineral content. However, the mineral content of eggs is fairly high so vegetables should be chosen chiefly for their "roughage."

Many grown-ups will welcome eggs if mushrooms are added for flavor. A bit of anchovy paste adds zest to the mildly flavored egg. A cream soup makes an excellent beginning for the dinner in which eggs figure as the main dish. Poached eggs on a bed of hot, nicely seasoned spinach make as attractive and satisfying a "piece de resistance" for the Lenten season as the most fastidious may desire and if there are no children under ten years of age at the family table the ways of cooking eggs are legion.

Six eggs, 1-4 pound mushrooms,

3 tablespoons butter, 1 tablespoon flour, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-8 teaspoon pepper, 1 cup milk, triangles or rounds of hot lightly buttered toast.

Hard cook eggs. Wipe or peel mushrooms and break in pieces. Melt butter, add mushrooms and cook over a low fire for ten minutes. Sprinkle with flour and stir with a fork until perfectly blended. Add salt, pepper and milk. Cover and simmer five minutes. Add eggs cut in thick slices and make very hot. Serve on toast arranged on a hot platter. Garnish with sprigs of parsley.

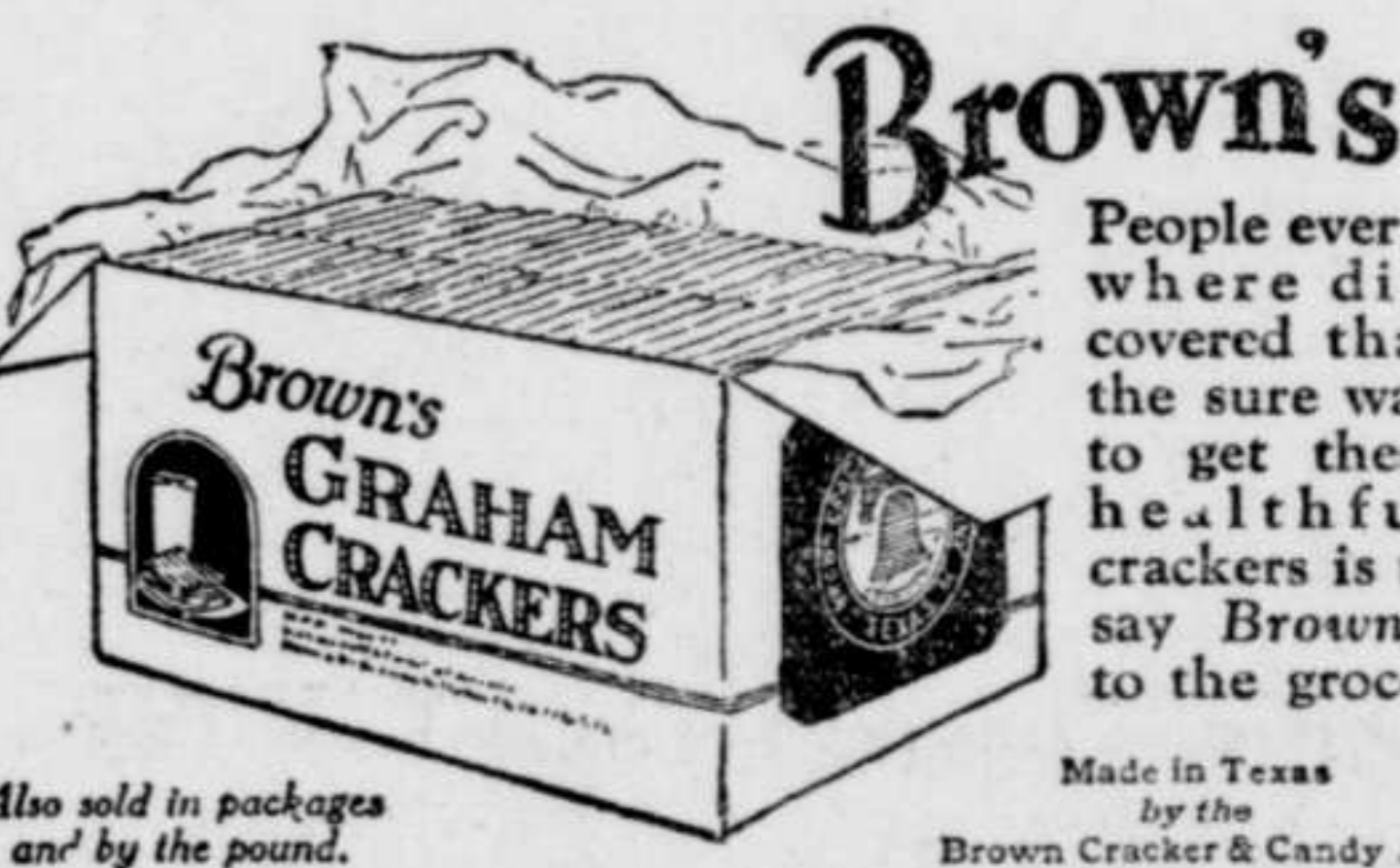

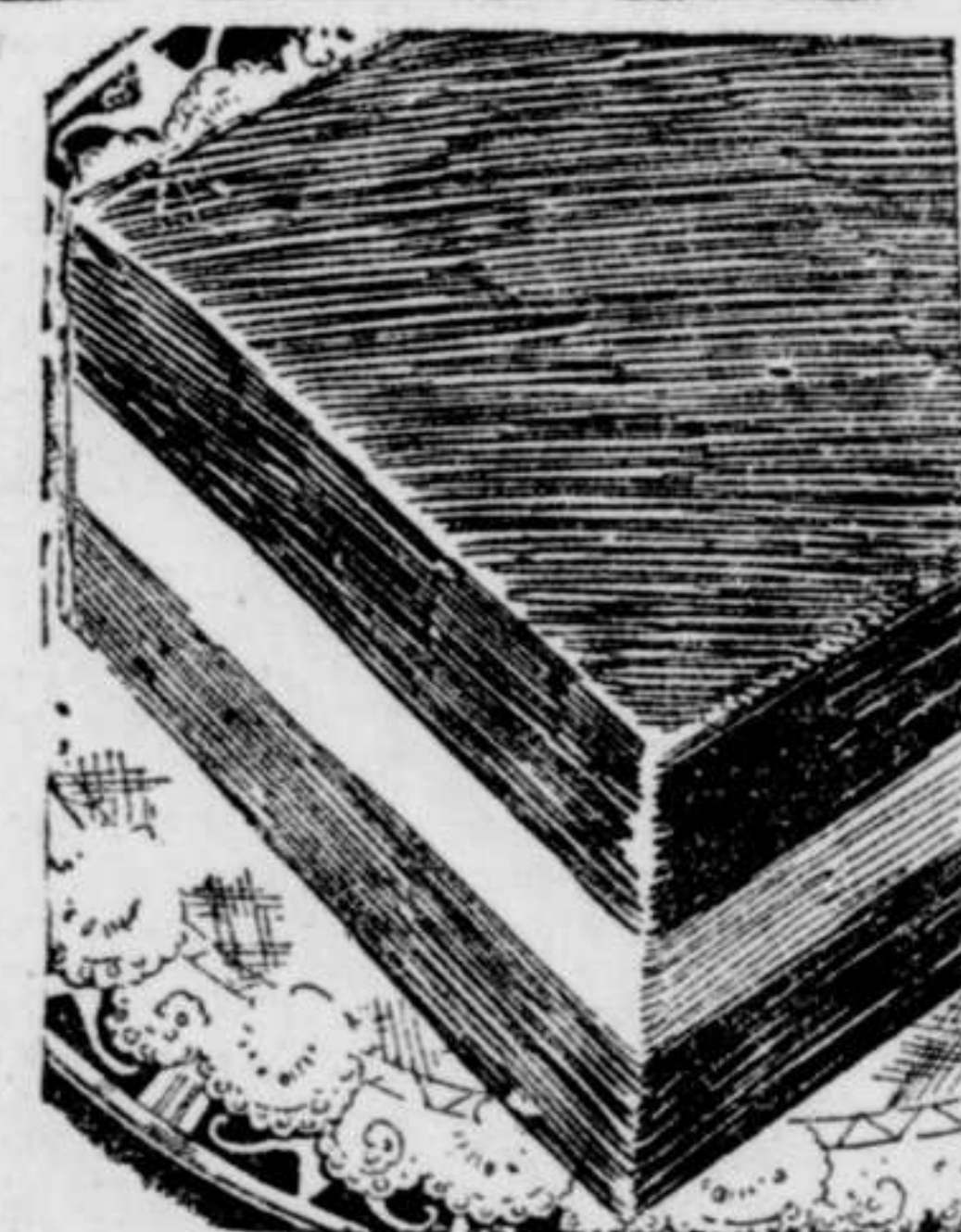

## Ranger Jim McCoy Tells About Brutal Treatment Of Man

Report Of Brutal Torture Of Doss Moore Given To Officers By Ranger: Man Is In Critical Condition

(By Associated Press)  
AUSTIN, Mar. 22.—State Ranger Jim McCoy, who has been investigating an attack upon Doss Moore early this week at San Saba, reported here today that Moore had been brutally tortured.

Stan Hawkins and Lee Bob Smith were arrested by McCoy and San Saba county officers and were charged with assault with intent to kill in connection with the attack. Robbery charges also were filed against them in connection with the rifling of Moore's San Saba residence.

"I never saw anything like it in my life," McCoy said. "Moore can hardly draw a breath, so great is his agony."

Moore was tied to a limb of a tree and cruelly beaten, McCoy stated, and the tree was splattered with blood. His body is cut in a dozen places, both of his jaws are broken, one of his ears has been twisted nearly from the head, and his face is so swollen that physicians are unable to ascertain whether the eyes are injured.

The Ranger said that apparently Moore was struck in the face several times with a heavy instrument.

Lindbergh alighted at the U. D. Sawyer ranch about dusk last Friday and spent the night, Saturday morning and Saturday noon there.

The news didn't get to Lubbock until yesterday.

Lindy was on his way to Albuquerque, N. M. He explained to his host that he was tired of crowds and "wanted to rest."

## Electra Man Found On Galveston Wall

Lewis O. Mood Discovered In Dying Condition With His Head Dangling Over Sea Wall

GALVESTON, Mar. 22.—Lewis O. Mood, insurance agent at Electra, was found in a dying condition with his head dangling over the seawall here Thursday. He died before he could be taken to a hospital.

John Harris, justice of the peace, deferred the inquest pending an autopsy.

Mood arrived here yesterday and registered at a hotel. His baggage was meager and no money was found in his pockets. A letter addressed to his wife at Box 833, Electra, was on his body. He had apparently been a cheerful frame of mind at his hotel early last evening.

## Mystery Of Wood's Death Is Still Unclear

GALVESTON, March 22. (AP)—Mystery surrounding the death of Lewis O. Mood, 35, Electra insurance agent, had not been cleared today, despite investigation by officers.

An autopsy started yesterday was not completed, and police investigated unusual aspects. He was found in a dying condition with his head hanging over the edge of the seawall here Wednesday.

A letter found in Mood's pocket was addressed to his wife and gave no hint of despondency or intention of suicide. "I mentioned plans for a fishing trip the next day. Before leaving the hotel, he left an early call for the next morning to be up early for the fishing trip."

His automobile was missed today and police searched for it. They said an inquest was to be held as soon as the findings of the autopsy are available.

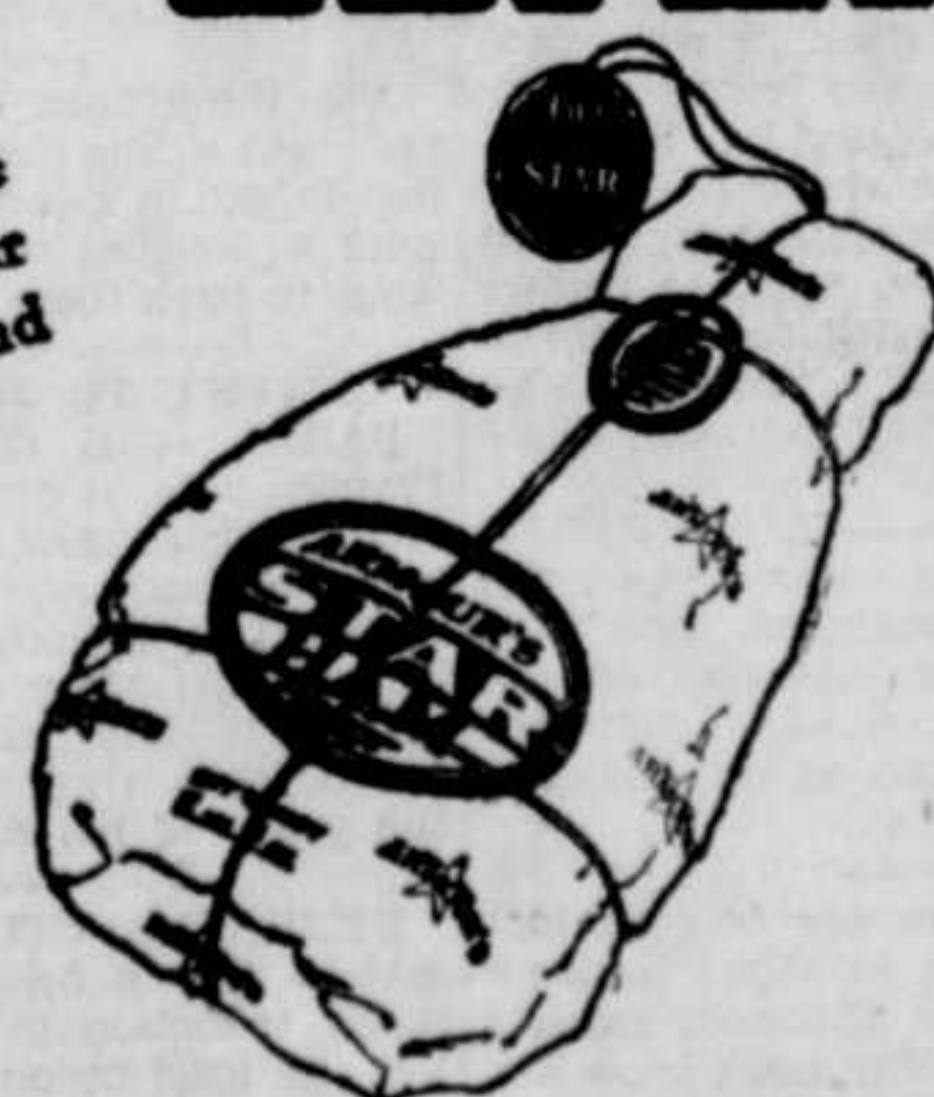

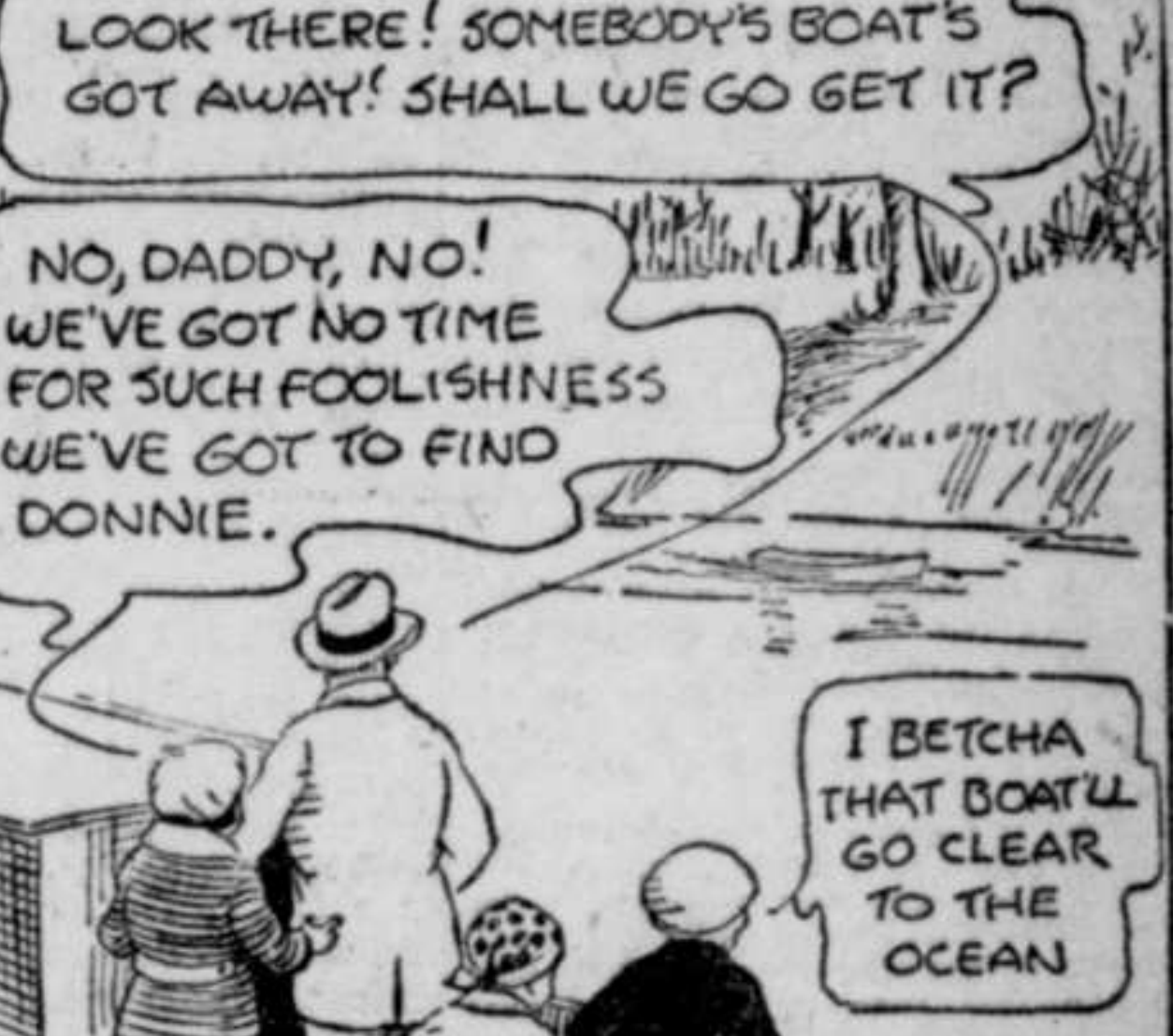

### Cheers Ring Out As Governor Long Is Charged By Cyr

(By Associated Press)  
BATON ROUGE, La., Mar. 22.—Lieutenant-Governor Paul N. Cyr today called upon the senate and the state "to do something to save the state from the disgrace and the industrial ruin which Governor Long is bringing upon" them.

He charged the Governor with a fattened highway commission payroll, with dealing unfairly with the state in the granting of oil leases, and "attempting the greatest tyranny in office ever attempted in the history of Louisiana."

The chamber was jammed with auditors who broke into a tumult of applause.

**Humiliated Long Enough**  
"I wish to tell you, my friends," said the Lieutenant-Governor, "that I have been humiliated in trying to get along with this man Long. But the time has come when I am forced to publicly explain my attitude toward the executive."

"I helped Governor Long in his campaign because I thought him an intelligent man who had done some good for the state and who intended to aid Louisiana in many ways. Today I find myself with the biggest political tyrant that ever tried to rule the state of Louisiana."

The speaker then attacked the manipulation of oil leases in the state in which he said the Governor

was interested. Pausing a moment, he said: "If the good Lord will ever forgive me for supporting Huey Long, it will take a great weight off my conscience."
