Coach Praises Girls BB Team

Robert Lee High School girls basketball coach, Sam Bean, was a guest of Prin. Garland Davis at Tuesday's meeting of the BCD, and told the 16 members present that his team this year is one of the best with which he has had the privilege to work. He made special mention of the game the girls played last week against Eldorado when the girls took an easy win. Three more district games are ahead of the local lassies.

Mayor Wilson Bryan spoke on the city's water problem and said it is becoming more serious all the time. He said lots of work and study have been done by a committee appointed to try to resolve the water problem. Everyone has been most helpful, the mayor added.

G. C. Allen made a report on the state water development program which was started several years ago. In addition to plans for lakes wherever feasible, underground sources are being explored. Allen said the water search is going on all over the nation, not just in Texas. He pointed out the Army Corps of Engineers called attention 15 years ago to a possible water shortage in 20 years. Allen, who has been on top of the water problem for many years as member, secretary and now president of the Upper Colorado River Authority, said good water must be conserved because it is very expensive and prices of treated water for human consumption will go even higher in the years ahead.

H. S. Lewis Jr., chairman of the brochure committee, announced that all information has been compiled for a new brochure on the City of Robert Lee and surrounding area.

Persons, 18 and over, who have not received a high school diploma are urged to participate in the training, said school officials. The classes will be held Tuesday and Thursday evenings of each week from 6:30 to 9 p.m. at the Robert Lee School.

A spokesman for the school said, "This is an excellent second opportunity for those who cannot speak, read, write and work arithmetic effectively." Certificates will be presented to those who complete the course of study.

Mrs. Pauline Coalson will be in charge of the program. Mrs. C. G. Walker Sr. and Mrs. Naomi Lee Powell will assist her.

Jean McDaniel Wins Award

Robert Lee High School's 1971 Betty Crocker Homemaking Tomorrow is senior Jean McDaniel, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Lee Roy McDaniel. Selected for her performance in a written knowledge and attitude examination administered to senior girls on Dec. 1, Mrs. McDaniel will receive a specially designed award from General Mills, sponsor of the annual education program. Additionally, she is now eligible for state and national honors, including one of 102 college scholarships totaling \$110,000.

The national first place winner — the 1971 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaking Tomorrow — will receive a \$5,000 educational grant. She will be chosen this spring from 51 Homemakers of Tomorrow representing each state and the District of

Columbia at the close of an expense paid educational tour of Washington, D. C., and Colonial Williamsburg, Va. Each of the state winners will be accompanied on this tour by a school advisor. Second, third and fourth place national winners will be awarded \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 scholarships; the other State Homemakers of Tomorrow will receive \$1,500 grants.

State judging centers on scores of school winners in the Dec. 1 test, with personal observation and interviews during the tour added factors in national selections. Second ranking Homemakers of Tomorrow in each state receive \$500 educational grants. The school of every \$1,500 scholarship winner receives a set of Encyclopaedia Britannica.

Austin — Legislators face a week of major decisions. Before the House are key portions of Gov. Preston Smith's finance plan. House followed the Senate in hurrying to a vote the proposal to lift the \$80 million a year welfare spending lid. An emergency \$48.4 million deficit spending bill to avert a welfare crisis is perhaps their biggest problem today. A four-fifth vote of both houses is required to suspend the Texas constitution's "pay as you go" requirement and permit lawmakers to go into the red for the balance of this fiscal year which ends in August. If legislators decline to take

this route, they must pass a tax bill to raise the money by March 1. To place a revenue raising measure into immediate effect would require passage by a two-thirds majority. Alternative is reduction in welfare benefits by early spring. Another matter being moved to an early showdown is Governor Smith's proposal to float a \$450 million state bond issue secured by income from permanent school fund revenue diversion. Both bond issue and tapping of school land lease money would require constitutional amendments. Regardless of the House vote on the bond issue, Lt. Gov. Ben

Barnes sizes up sentiment toward it as cold.

Mood of both houses appears to favor early passage of code of ethics legislation.

If Governor Smith's finance program doesn't fare better than he anticipates, Barnes says, he will ask House Speaker Gus Mutscher to join him in urging the Governor to submit some alternatives.

NEW CAR INSURANCE PLAN OFFERED — Auto insurance agents in a hearing before the Insurance Board proposed "a much better insurance package" at reduced cost.

But a spokesman acknowledged no actuarial studies have been made to back up their claim.

While their plan keeps present liability coverage, it also would extend unlimited medical expense benefits to the insured regardless of who is at fault in accidents. It would replace up to 60 per cent of wages lost due to accident injuries to maximum of \$250 a week, and provide death and dismemberment coverage.

Although all the above (proposed as mandatory coverage in each policy) would increase costs, agents claimed the overall premium would be reduced if \$150 deductible damage coverage was substituted for \$50 and \$100 deductible.

AG OPINIONS — A Justice of the Peace is not authorized or required to present the state's case, or undertake representation of the state's interest, in any matter before him, Atty. Gen. Crawford C. Martin has held.

In another recent opinion, Martin concluded that the El Paso county treasurer is duty bound to countersign checks signed by the county auditor when the commissioners court orders money transferred from the general fund to a special bank account for disbursement by check to welfare recipients. However, said Martin, the treasurer may refer checks to the commissioners court for direction.

Martin obtained a \$1,000 judgment against Proter Steel Corporation of El Paso as the result of an air pollution suit.

FEDERAL HELP LAUDED — Word that the Secretary of Interior has announced the availability of more than \$2 million to the State of Texas for fish and wildlife research in 1971 was greeted with enthusiasm by E. A. (Gene) Walker, director of Wildlife Services for the State.

Texas has participated in the Federal-State wildlife program since 1937 and the Sport Fish restoration project since 1950.

"This is the backbone of the work program in Wildlife and Fisheries," said Walker, "and the results of this basic research has provided tremendous increases in hunting and fishing opportunities for the people of this state."

As an example Walker cited the fact that Texas has more deer than any other state; larger bag limits and longer seasons on quail ... just to mention a few of the benefits made possible by federal financial assistance.

The Lone Star State will receive \$1,538,500 in wildlife funds and \$653,750 for fish restoration.

Money for wildlife research is derived from the 11 per cent excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition. Funds for fish projects come from a levy of 10 per cent on sport fishing equipment.

TREASURE DISPLAY URGED — An interim committee advised the Legislature in a written report to direct permanent display of treasure recovered from ancient Spanish galleons off Padre Island.

Actual ownership still is the subject of a dispute in court. Platoro Inc. of Gary, Ind., which recovered the artifacts, won a de-

cision in the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals that it had a valid contract with the state for a 50-50 share of the treasure.

House interim committee on housing the treasure concluded it should become the property of the permanent school fund, and transferred around the state in a mobile unit occasionally, so school children can see it in their own communities.

REGISTRATION EXTENSION VOTED — A bill to extend voter registration through February sailed through the Senate 27-1 but ran into a delay in the House.

Still another would change the name of Pan American College, Edinburg, to Pan American University.

Short Snorts

A new Senate bill would require advance permits and strict security and health standards for rock festivals in rural areas where more than 5,000 people are

expected to remain 12 hours or longer.

Charles G. Scruggs of Dallas was nominated for the Texas Tech University board of regents.

A Senate study committee recommended a state open housing law.

Bills call for establishment of a University of South Texas at Corpus Christi and a University of Houston branch at Clear Lake.

Texas is recovering from the credit crunch (tight money) of 1968-70, according to a University of Texas Bureau of Business Research study.

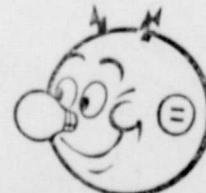

Add a Bit of Spice

Make ordinary dishes sparkle by adding an extra dash of just the right spice or herb.

Spices and herbs not only add flavor but also color and aroma to mild foods.

Spices are the roots, stems, bark, leaves, seeds, fruits or buds of aromatic plants. Normally, "spice" means seeds and herbs which are either dried, whole, ground or crushed.

Effective use of spices and herbs is an art acquired through practice. Begin by experimenting with a few at a time.

Some spices and herbs seem to belong with certain foods. Sage is associated with pork dishes, dressings and stuffings. Basil is used for most vegetables, especially tomatoes. Chervil and parsley go well in salads, stews

and sauces. Cayenne and paprika are used in stuffed eggs, vegetables and salad dressings. Dill suggests pickles, and mint is good with tea, ice cream and candy.

To be sure your cooking has all the appetizing flavor you want, check the storage shelf occasionally. Certain spices and herbs may be down to mere tag-ends; others may need replacing because they've been mistakenly stored near heat or in direct sunlight. Even with the most careful storage, spices and herbs, especially in ground form, lose their vitality after a time. That's the time to throw out and replace with a fresh and potent supply.

Home Sewing Picture

A big change is taking place in the home sewing scene. What sewing early homemakers did out of necessity, the modern homemaker now does of her own choosing.

According to pattern company estimates, almost 44 million home sewers make 500 million garments a year. These homemakers spend \$2 billion on fabrics and \$400 million to purchase 2 million new sewing machines annually.

There are many reasons for the home sewing boom. Economy is an important one as the woman who sews at home can save 60 to 70 per cent on most garments she makes.

Although economy is a strong incentive, homemakers give other reasons for sewing at home.

Clothing made at home is of better quality. For those family members that are hard to fit, the clothing is more satisfactory. And today's simpler fashions make the sewing job easier, with more individuality possible.

One of the most compelling reasons, however, is psychological. With more leisure time, many women find sewing a satisfying outlet for self-expression and creativity.

Husbands and Housework

How much time does the average man spend taking care of his home?

About an hour and a half a day, or 11 hours each week.

But, that amount doesn't appear to increase even when his wife decides to take an outside job.

A recent survey showed that husbands helped with cooking, marketing and record keeping. Their housework of 11 hours was gauged against 51 hours for the full-time housewife. If the wife was employed outside the home, she still puts in 35 hours doing housework.

Teen-agers in the survey gave nearly three hours a day to chores when their mother worked and two hours when she was at home.

Flexibility Helps In Dry Years

By Rex Brand

Variability in grass production from year to year presents two main problems to the Rancher: (1) How to make adjustments in the number of livestock rapidly enough to prevent over use of grass plants when production is low, and (2) How to keep income high as possible when the source of income, the grass crop, is so variable.

Flexibility in grazing is a method of overcoming the variation in grass production because of erratic rainfall. Sooner or later during serious droughts every rancher makes some adjustments in livestock numbers on his grassland. Often these adjustments are made late to avoid loss in animal weights, injury to grass plants, and costly feed bills. One means of helping overcome this is by stocking a basic breeding herd of livestock below what the average year will carry. Less rainfall is received about half of the time than the average. So a basic herd stocked according to the average year will often be short of grass. During years of average or above rainfall, the extra grass produced may be utilized by keeping stocker animals from the base herd or buying additional stocker animals. By using this type system, one will be able to readily adjust the number of animals to the grass being produced before damaging the grass plants, costly feed bills and lowering livestock prices.

With flexibility, one can grow more pounds of grass per acre and produce more pounds of livestock. Flexibility in stocking rates is the key to successful ranching operations.

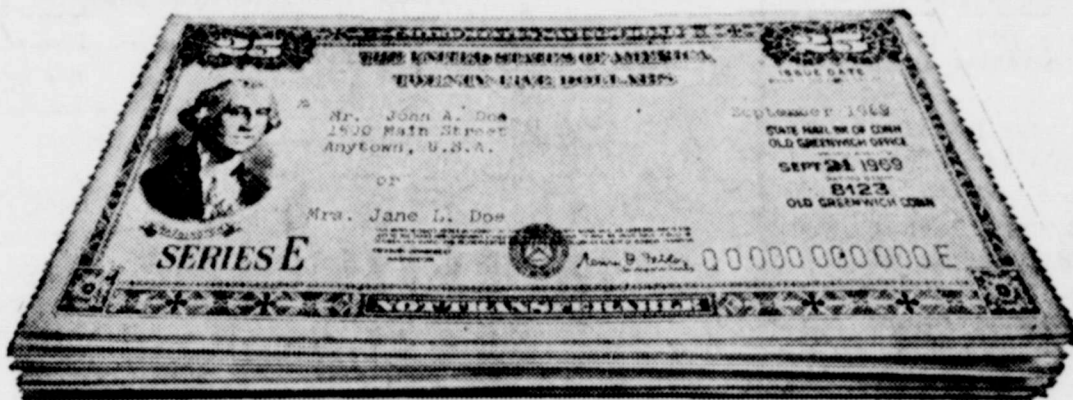

Washington — The mayor of a small town in Italy was having trouble getting this city council to approve his recommended budget. According to a foreign newspaper report, he hit upon an idea of unusual strategy. He spent a night in a hut, performing rites involving the sacrifice of a black hen. It seems he depended upon two good spirits by the names of Rakel and Bayel who, he said, looked after economic and financial affairs. Just maybe Washington should be calling Rakel, Bayel and one black hen to report immediately. President Nixon submitted his Fiscal Year 1972 Budget to the Congress this past week based on the theory of a "full employment."

The idea is fairly simple. With unemployment hovering around 6 per cent, the U. S. economy is underproducing very seriously. Whenever the economy underproduces, the Federal revenues suffer severely.

In the next fiscal year it is estimated that Federal revenues from all sources, including social security taxes, should be about \$230 billion. Since the economy is underproducing badly, the actual revenue is estimated to be about \$215 billion.

Since there is underproduction and unemployment, the administration says the economy needs stimulation. To stimulate, the idea is to set the spending level at a rate of Federal tax collections that would come in if there were full employment. Based on this theory, a balanced budget is accomplished on "full employment." The result, however, is a \$15 billion actual deficit.

The fiscal year budget of 1961 is an example of what might have happened had the "full employment" concept been applied. In that budget the actual deficit was \$3.4 billion. Unemployment stood above 6 per cent, about where it is today. If the "full employment" idea had been applied, there would have been a \$11.3 billion surplus.

A "full employment budget" can be defined as the excess over Federal spending that would have been collected had there been full employment. Full employment, in turn, is defined, as existing when unemployment drops to 3 per cent or less of the labor force.

In accordance with the rules now adopted by the President, it is all right to have an unbalanced budget when there is high unemployment.

This idea is not new. The theory was proposed several years ago by some of the economists who are now in the Administration, one of which is Mr. George Shultz, the President's economic counselor. Dr. Walter Heller, chief economic advisor to President Kennedy, has been a long-time advocate of the theory.

A book published last year called "The Real Majority," authored by Richard M. Scammon and Ben J. Wattenberg, political writers, portrayed the typical American voter as a 47 year old housewife, living in the suburbs of Dayton, whose husband is a machinist. She is greatly upset about such things as crime, urban unrest, student riots, drugs, pornography and other related "social issues." Her views in this regard are conservative. The writers say, however, that the same average citizen is more liberal on "bread and butter" is-

sues. It would appear that in the case of a "full employment budget," a liberal position is being taken by the President. The position seems to favor strong support for "law and order" but soft pedals our serious economic condition. Some of us feel that there is serious error in these as-

sumptions. It is not complimentary to the citizen of this country to think that they are not equally concerned with high government spending, high taxes, inflation—to assume that Americans are "liberal on bread and butter issues." There is sufficient evidence to show that a large percentage of people have a great concern—yes, fear—of a big overpowering Federal Government. Although the demands for more services of one sort or another are great, there is also demand on the part of many that government spending, heavy taxes and rising inflation be brought under control. An administration and a congress which does not meet this test will undoubtedly
