### CONTRACT FOR SCHOOL BUILDING LET TO STEWART CONSTRUCTION CO.

Construction Work Will Start Within Two Weeks.—Will Be Ready For School Next Fall.

The contract for the erection of four new school buildings in the Perryton Independent School District was let Tuesday to the A. F. Stewart Construction Company of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma. Mr. Stewart was here in person. He is one of the leading contractors of the Southwest and we are fortunate to secure the services of his organization. The contractors are taking the entire bond issue of \$175,000 in at par and in return we will get the big building here in Perryton and modern fire proof buildings at Wawaka and two other places yet to be selected. Sufficient funds will be available from this bond issue to equip buildings complete ready for use. The Stewart Construction Company is incorporated in Oklahoma and are now getting a Texas Charter.

Parker and Rittenberry of Amarillo are the architects for these splendid structures. They are the foremost school house architects of the Panhandle. M. C. Parker was present at the contract letting and they will have a representative here on the ground at all times to see that the buildings are constructed according to the plans and specifications.

Mr. Stewart informs us that actual construction work will start within the next two weeks. This assures us that all of these buildings will be ready for occupancy by next fall. This is a wonderful step forward for when these houses are completed the citizens of Perryton Independent School District can justly point with pride to the best school buildings to be found in the entire Panhandle.

### A BETTER ROUTE FOR D-C-D HIGHWAY

We want to suggest a better route for the D-C-D through Beaver County. To our minds the D-C-D should run west on the Texas, Oklahoma State Line to the Apple Ranch, north to Ragsdale Store and then west and north to Sutton's Store. This is a much better route and it is also easier to keep in condition for it will avoid going thru the red hills northwest of Gray, Oklahoma.

Now on the other hand if we would join hands with the Liberal and Gray good roads people we could make a real highway from Perryton to Liberal via Gray. This would give us direct communication on good roads to the Santa Fe Trail. Let's get together and make this road a go—what do you say, Liberal and Gray.—Ochiltree County Herald.

### THE D-C-D COVENTION

The Perryton boosters treated the boys from Guymon royally during the recent convention who were there to attend the D-C-D convention and the trail to the northwest, but immediately thereafter, according to the Ochiltree County Herald, they went to work promoting the trail via Gray and Liberal to the Santa Fe Trail. There's about as many people go down a trail as go up, so if that's the Perryton system the boys are should route the returning tourist via Spearman, as that route is much better anyway than going by Perryton, and the road from Guymon to Spearman is in perfect condition and is being bridged, worked and looked after by Hansford county citizens.—Guymon Tribune.

We are reprinting an article which appeared in our issue of October 28. Also an answer from the Guymon Tribune which was reprinted in the Spearman Reporter. We do not see just what the Guymon Tribune scribe got all "riled" up over. Probably he just wanted to sling a little mud and it just slipped off our way.

You know the D-C-D Highway through Ochiltree county is a city boulevard compared to the D-C-D through Texas county. The writer had occasion to travel the D-C-D from Guymon to Perryton recently and he can truthfully state that the Texas county section was in miserable state. We also note that Tribune states that the road from Guymon to Spearman is in perfect condition and is being bridged, worked and looked after by Hansford county citizens, well we don't doubt the veracity of that statement for one minute for from our own experience we know that it will never be done by the Texas county citizens if they neglect all their roads like they have the D-C-D.

As for Perryton promoting a good trail from here to the Santa Fe Trail. Well why shouldn't we want a good road there. There is at least ten times as much local travel between Liberal and Perryton as there is between Guymon and Perryton. And then, is that not our logical auto trail to the east and north?

We suggested the change in the D-C-D because any fair minded person who has traveled both routes will instantly agree that the south road is much better now and will be easier to keep in condition.

And again we state that we do not see just what the Guymon Tribune scribe got all "riled up" over.

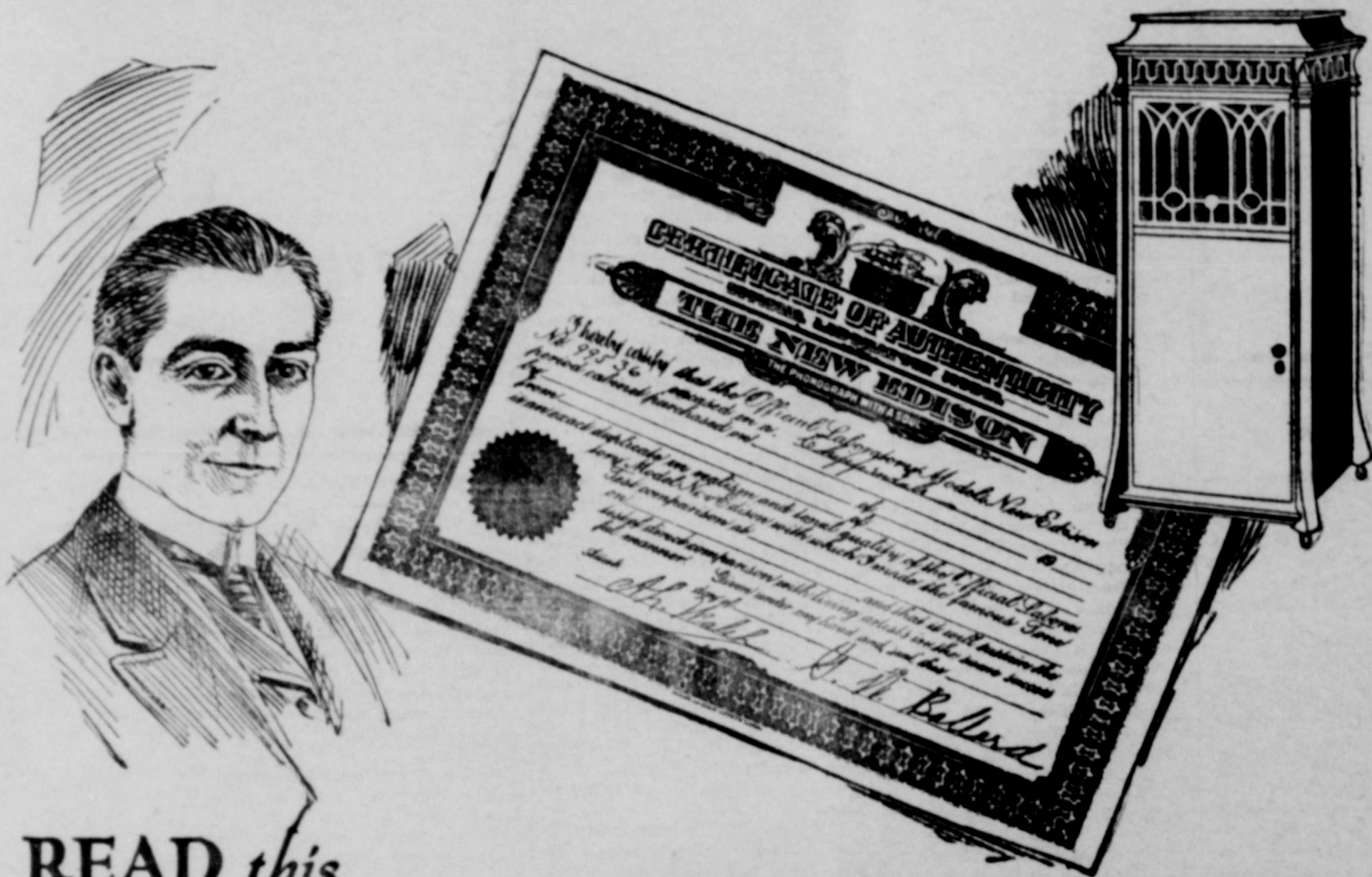

PUBLIC HEALTH NURSES CARE FOR 200,000 IN THE SOUTHWEST

Workers in Red Cross Chapters in Seven States Have Big Job.

If the 194 public health nurses now working under the emblem of the Red Cross in the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross were withdrawn tomorrow, more than 200,000 sick and infirm men, women and children would be left without nursing care and advice, according to Miss Olive Chapman, Director of Nursing of the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross.

The Public Health Nurse is one of the most important officers in the American Red Cross today. Her job is to help the people to get well and to keep well. She teaches mothers how to look after their babies and school children how to avoid illness and disease. She is found in schools, homes, playgrounds, industrial plants, department stores, hospitals, and health centers. Her work is in the small towns and in the big cities. In the rural communities and in the lonely mountain regions of the West. She is wherever there is need for her service, regardless of race, religion or social conditions.

Any form of community work in which the health of the public is concerned is hers. She visits the rich and the poor alike and teaches both the common sense rules of good health. She locates tuberculous patients and cares for them, and at the same time teaches the families how to prevent the disease from spreading to other members. She assists in school medical inspection of children and follows defective children into their homes to advise the parents and induce them to act on the advice of the school doctor. She watches over families in which there are contagious diseases, such as diphtheria, scarlet fever, whooping cough and influenza, and teaches the families how to isolate the patient so as to prevent infection.

She takes care of the mother before the baby arrives and builds for the future by showing the mother how to care for her baby. She gives instruction in sanitary living conditions, and even at times in questions of diet.

She is the closest point of contact between the great American Red Cross and the public.

There is a known shortage in the United States today of several thousand public health nurses and there is a greater shortage of hospital and private nurses. Many chapters in the Southwestern Division of the American Red Cross maintain public health nurses and conduct work of a greater or less scope through the agency of such a nurse. These chapters are depending upon the membership fees coming in from the annual Red Cross Roll Call to finance their public health nursing program for the coming year. The Roll Call will take place November 11th to 24th, according to announcement given out at the local Red Cross headquarters.

MALNUTRITION IN AMERICA AMONG RICH AND POOR ALIKE

Only four per cent of the children in the plains section in the United States are normal, according to a survey recently made by the American Red Cross and the United States Public Health Service jointly. A large percentage of subnormal children are so because of malnutrition. Malnutrition is answerable for more ill in the child life of America than any other one cause, it has been ascertained, and this condition is found as frequently among the children of the rich as in the families of the poor.

The Red Cross, through its nutrition classes and diet educational work, is endeavoring to correct the widespread condition of under-nourishment and to lay the foundation for a healthier next generation by building up the strength of the children. In the United States there are over 1,000 nutrition classes in which more than 22,000 children are enrolled. In addition to this there are 163 classes in Food Selection with over 1,500 students, all of whom either are in advanced school grades or are adults.

With a work of this magnitude, with an effort constantly to increase its scope, the Red Cross hopes in the next few years to teach American children what to eat, when to eat it, and how much of it to eat, so that under-nourishment will no longer be a menace to the health of the nation.

SOUTHWESTERN GIRLS SERVING AS RED CROSS NURSES IN RUSSIA

The American Red Cross Commission to western Russia and the Baltic States, which is under the direction of Lieutenant Colonel Edward W. Ryan, issues a monthly bulletin printed in English, and giving news of the work of the commission. The last number to reach this country is the September issue. In it there is mention of three Southwestern Division workers who had arrived during August. They are Miss Nell W. Crouch, of Lawrence, Kan.; Miss Hazel M. Drake and Miss Gladys S. Nicholson, of Kansas City. They have joined the commission as nurses and bring the total of nurses on the commission's staff up to twelve. Miss Nicholson and Miss Crouch have been assigned to the Liban District and Miss Drake goes to Kovno.

Why should they not be punished for the crimes they committed against all civilization and humanity? Hearst wails that the indemnity is excessive. It is nothing of the sort. The indemnity is not any more expensive to Germany than was the load of militarism it was carrying, and the taxation to meet the indemnity is but little more than was the taxation to keep up its militarism and kaiseristic warlordism. It is not as much when the time of all its citizens who were forced to do military duty is counted, for that time would have produced billions if employed in peaceful pursuits. All the allied countries are out billions of dollars and millions of sturdy young lives, and the misery they suffered must continue for generations yet. And if Germany finds its burden heavy to carry, it has nobody to blame but itself. What would Mr. Hearst wish—that the rest of the world pay Germany an indemnity, instead of its paying one to the others? He is making his editors, good brainy men, prostitute their noble calling and talk with the same high intelligence of the sandbag.

One may judge by the Newberry case that all a man needs to do to get a seat in the United States Senate is to put plenty of money in his purse. Nothing else makes a particle of difference.

**County Health Notes**

Last week all the children in the Health Clubs of the Perryton Schools who had not had any marks of discreditation after their name received their Junior Red Cross Pins. The first duty of Junior Red Crossers is to make themselves physically fit. What is it worth to us if we learn the school curriculum and lose our health. Should we not also make it a part of our education to observe and practice good manners and respect? When we meet people in our every day life and deal with them, do we not judge them principally by their personality and not by how

much Latin or Algebra - they may know?

The Red Cross folding scales have arrived and can be taken to any of the rural schools who wish to weigh the children, if there are no scales in the district.

Miss Thomas spent Thursday of last week at the Blodgett School. They had the home nursing demonstration in the afternoon. The nurse spent the night on Wednesday at Mrs. Reed's and on Thursday with Mrs. Slavin and came back to Perryton with them on Friday. She stopped a few minutes at the Wawaka School. They report that the hot lunches were going fine. They must be good for their main trouble seems to be in getting a kettle large enough to hold all that the children want.

The Brillhart School, Miss Bolton teacher, expects to start their hot lunches this week.

The state library is sending three boxes of books to be used in the county, and the library will be in the Red Cross Health Center. Mrs. Garrett will give out the books Monday and Saturday p. m. There are several children's stories among them.

Monday's Home Nursing class at Perryton was largely attended. The time was devoted to demonstrating the care of the sick.

Our country is only just beginning to wake up, but it is awakening fast to the realization of the value of our schools and the advantages which may be gained from them aside from the simple task of learning the three R's.

On the health and strength of our children will depend the burden of the next generation. Every child has an inherent right to be well born and be in perfect physical condition, but how many of us bear that right? But practically every baby at birth has a normal constitution for there are very few inherited abnormal conditions. We are therefore nearly totally dependent on the people with whom we spend our childhood for these inherent rights. (This does not include feeble mindedness.)

The vigor and stability of the common wealth demand that most careful nurture of the children; when the care which is originally the function of the parent, is neglected for whatever cause, the state in place of parent must exert its right to protect its wards against the havoc which is wrought in the neglect of their physical condition. Health is an indispensable complement to a wise and happy state. But we have before us our prisons, jails, reformatories, insane asylums, homes for the feeble minded. Homes for the blind, almshouses and sanatoria, which must be supported by our taxes and which stand as monuments to our filial, and the neglect of our youths.

Miss Thomas gave a demonstration at the Ochiltree School Friday night. The grade children there show a great interest in their Health Clubs in Mrs. Hudson's and Miss Conley's rooms.

## **IMPROVEMENT NOTED IN WOOL MARKETING**

Product in Much Better Condition Than Last Year.

Much Credit Due Department of Agriculture for Demonstrations Showing Proper Handling and Preparing.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Wool received at concentration points for pooling is in much better condition than that handled last year, according to officials in charge of wool pools, who state that the improvement is due largely to the demonstrations conducted last season by the United States Department of Agriculture, showing the proper manner of handling and preparing wool for market. The owners of wool clips who were penalized in 1920 on account of staple twine, burrs or seed have taken precautions this season to see that their product is free from objectionable foreign matter and in excellent condition when received at the concentration point. The percentage of untied fleeces is much smaller than in 1920, with a considerable number of fleeces boxed.

Special emphasis has been placed on the work of the expert graders in demonstrating to producers and others the value of grading the wool clip. The subdivisions within the grades established enable the producers of long staple wool to obtain full value for their clip on the basis of grade. In addition to the regular grades, provision also is made for the various kinds of defective wool which constitutes rejects. The wool growers are realizing the value of grading and the necessity for the elimination of rejects from their wool in order to obtain maximum return for their product.

One large wool pool in the Middle West, which assembled and graded 340,000 pounds of wool in 1920, reports that 400,000 pounds have been received to date this year. One of the largest co-operative wool growers' associations in the Northwest has increased its membership from 1,000 to 1,700 in the last 30 days, and reports that more than 1,500,000 pounds of wool have been received at its concentration point.

## **RUNTS ARE NOT PROFITABLE**

If Stunted Animals Could Be Eliminated Farmers' Incomes Would Be Greatly Increased.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

A questionnaire survey conducted among 1,000 leading farmers and breeders by the United States Department of Agriculture indicates that about 7 per cent of the annual production of farm live stock in the



Farmers Say it Does Not Pay to Raise Runts.

United States consists of runts and undersized specimens of the various breeds and classes. Farmers report that their annual incomes from live stock would be increased an average of 13 per cent if runts could be eliminated. Better methods of feeding and breeding, breeding better stock, the use of purebred registered sires, good care and systematic attention, better housing and sanitation, proper care of the dam before the birth of young, practical control of such objectionable parasites as worms and lice, the control of disease, and the culling from the farm of all stunted stock which indicates no possibilities of successful reproduction and rehabilitation are the control methods recommended by these experienced farmers. About three-quarters of them say that it does not pay to raise runts, while the balance maintain that the Tom Thumbs of the live stock world can be raised successfully only when well bred and when plenty of cheap feed is available and dependable markets are readily accessible.

## **BARBERRY CUTS WHEAT YIELD**

Scientific Investigation Has Proven That Rust Gets Its Start in Barberrry Bushes.

Your barberry bush may be reducing your wheat yield or increasing the cost of a loaf of bread. Wheat rust in some years causes a loss of 200,000,000 bushels of wheat and scientific investigation has proved that the fungus which is responsible for this disease gets its start in the spring from the common barberry plant. More than 4,000,000 barberry bushes have been located by federal workers and 3,500,000 plants destroyed. One bush may infect acres of wheat and it will be worth while to look around your farm and adjoining country and see that they do not harbor any of these wheat thieves.

## **A NEWSPAPER'S TWO SOURCES OF REVENUE**

Subscriptions and advertising are the only sources of revenue a newspaper has, and often the subscriptions do not pay for the cost of the paper.

Advertising today, especially in newspapers, is the greatest business getter there is. This is acknowledged by men who know. People read advertisements in newspapers. They have been educated to do so. Every merchant in our town ought to advertise. You remember the story about John Wanamaker. The first day he was in business his receipts were \$24.64. He kept 64c and spent the \$24 the next day in advertising. We can't all duplicate this feat, but according to the best statistics available, three per cent of the gross sales should be put aside for advertising.

Possibly you will say, "I don't need to advertise. I've been in this town thirty years and everybody knows me."

Probably they do, but did you ever stop to think of the sales you lose because your fellow competitor advertises? He may advertise the same goods you have in your stock, but the people don't know you have them. And then how much more business would you do if you did advertise?

We can't all be John Wanamakers, but we can all advertise in proportion to our business. Results will be are if you advertise honestly and give service. A newspaper can bring people to your store, but it can't make people buy your goods. Your clerk must do that, and it depends on the service you give as to how successful your business will be.

What is done in the big cities can be done right here in this town if you show the pep, give the service and advertise. Make business good. You can do it through this newspaper.

## SCHOOL GIRL SHOWS ABILITY

Makes Good With Small Herd of Cows and is Successful With Chickens and Hogs.

(Prepared by the United States Department of Agriculture.)

Elizabeth Farley is a seventeen-year-old club girl, a senior in the high school at Amherst, Mass. About four years ago, after experimenting with the 4-H garden and poultry clubs of the United States Department of Agriculture for several years, she decided to purchase a cow. Her father attempted to discourage her, saying that she had no knowledge of milking and no place to house an animal. Her father went away for a week-end trip, however, and when he returned he found that Elizabeth was the owner of a registered Jersey cow which she had learned to milk, and for which she had rented a stall in a neighbor's barn. Profits from previous poultry work supplied the funds for this venture.

Elizabeth remained in club work and because of the demand for milk purchased other registered cows and calves. For two years the cattle had to be staked out every day in a pasture 10 minutes' walk from the house and as the pasture brook dried up she had also to carry water to them. One cow nearly died of sickness. Until a year ago Elizabeth did all her own work, including delivering the milk.

Her next live-stock venture was a bred registered Chester-White sow. This sow had a litter of 13 pigs, 10 of which lived, although the sow became sick and died later. When Elizabeth purchased 300 day-old chicks. As they grew she sold the cockerels and some of the pullets, reserving the others for winter laying. A year ago she found that she needed pas-

ture and hay land so she bought 12 acres of land, for which the cows are paying.

At the present time this high-school girl has nine purebred Jersey cows and four calves valued by specialists in the Agricultural college at \$3,000. She hires two boys to help care for the herd and milk the cows. She delivers 80 quarts of milk daily in an old milk wagon which she bought this summer for \$5 and repaired herself. She grows her own feed on her own land.

In addition to her dairy herd she has a large flock of chickens, a number of purebred pigs, and a horse. Her entire indebtedness is one note for \$300. Elizabeth is planning to go to the Massachusetts Agricultural college as soon as she has finished high school.

## TROUBLE WITH POOR SILAGE

Moldy Condition Not the Result of Leaky Silos, but Due to Lack of Moisture.

Many farmers have trouble with moldy silage. Now, moldy silage is usually not the result of leaky silos, although air leaks in the silo will bring about mold. Practically all silos that are put up nowadays are air-tight; but moldy silage is frequently found in air-tight silos. Whenever mold is found in silage one may be almost certain that there was a lack of moisture when it was put in. When the stalks are somewhat dry it is impossible in packing and in settling the silage to get rid of all the air, which must be forced out if mold is to be prevented.

## CLEANLINESS IS IMPORTANT

Utensils Must Be Kept Clean by Sterilizing, Not Simply Washed to Remove Impurities.

Cleanliness is godliness, especially in the dairy business. All the sanitary precautions taken for housing the dairy herd will be of no avail, if the utensils used in handling the milk are not kept clean. To be sure such utensils are clean, they must be sterilized, not simply washed to remove impurities that may be seen.
