Jimmie Nail, 39, was killed in an automobile collision near Beaumont.

SOLONS PUSH BILLS SO THEY CAN ADJOURN

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—House Democratic leaders agreed today to put pressure behind presidentially-favored legislation, in order to expedite adjournment of congress.
House Majority Leader Sam Rayburn forecast that congress would be able to quit in three weeks and "probably before that." First move in breaking the House jam was a decision by the agriculture committee to support the Jones sugar quota bill.
Meantime the Senate began its consideration of the \$700,000,000 Wagner housing bill.
Conservative Democrats milled uncertainly toward a bolt from President Roosevelt's program.
They junked his judiciary reorganization bill, but were defeated when they sought, in the Senate Saturday, to add wage and hours legislation to the scrap heap. This bill passed the Senate Saturday and promises now to divide the Democratic party in the lower House.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Aug. 2.—The second of two women shot by Gerald Lee, 26, who went amuck from marital troubles, remained in a critical condition today.
Lee killed his mother-in-law, Mrs. Clyde Devere, 44, and wounded her sister-in-law, Mrs. Edith Anderson, 45, then killed himself.
After his wife sought a divorce Saturday, Lee drove to the house where they slept, then fired five shots at them.

Power Production In State for June Showed Increase

AUSTIN, Texas.—Electrical power production in Texas during June increased sharply over both the preceding month and the corresponding month last year, according to the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. There also was a marked increase for the first six months over the like period last year.
Reports to the Bureau from seventeen of the largest power companies of the State show aggregate production of 201,386,000 kilowatt hours, an increase of 5.2 per cent over May and a rise of 20.8 per cent over June last year. During the first six months of this year, aggregate production was 908,454,000 kilowatt hours, an increase of 17.4 per cent over the corresponding period of 1936. Commercial production increased 12.6 per cent over May and 18.3 per cent over June last year. For the year-to-date the increase over last year was 16.5 per cent. For industrial production the respective increases for the three comparable periods were: 2.6 per cent, 21.9 per cent and 18.4 per cent; for residential, 5.6 per cent, 17.9 per cent and 17.2 per cent; and for miscellaneous uses, 3.6 per cent, 24.6 per cent and 14.9 per cent.

APPOINTMENT DURING RECESS BEING FOUGHT

WASHINGTON, Aug. 2.—Sen. Arthur Vandenberg of Michigan today introduced a resolution to place the Senate on record against a recess appointment to fill the vacancy in the supreme court created by retirement of Associate Justice Willis Van Devanter.
The resolution was introduced after the White House received an opinion by Attorney General Homer Cummings that the President could make the appointment at any time.
The Senate judiciary committee meanwhile voted approval of a resolution for an investigation of the federal judicial system by a special sub-committee.
The inquiry would be a "complete study of all matters relating to the reorganization of the courts of the United States, the appointment of additional judges and the reform of judicial procedure."

Poultry Shipments Grow 100 Per Cent

AUSTIN, Tex.—Almost a 100 per cent increase in poultry shipments from Texas to interstate points over the shipments of June, 1936, was reported for June of this year by the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. A total of 63 cars of poultry were shipped out of the State, compared with 32 cars in June, 1936. Egg shipments for the month totaled 43 cars, against 44 cars a year ago.
Interstate receipts of eggs totaled eleven cars, against seventeen cars in June last year. Of these receipts nine cars came from Kansas and two cars from Nebraska. In June last year fourteen cars were brought into the State from Kansas, one from Missouri and two from Oklahoma.

Ranger Boy Misses A Fatal Crackup Of a Navy Plane

Word has been received in Ranger by R. H. Snyder from his son, Lewis, who is plane captain and first mechanic on plane No. 6, connected with the United States Battleship Mississippi. That his plane cracked up at sea killing the pilot and observer, but at the time Lewis was not up with them.
It is his duty to fly with them and keep the engine in good condition, but for some reason not stated by Lewis, it just so happened that he was not with them on this fatal trip.
Some time ago, while the Mississippi was in Hawaiian waters, this same plane had an accident while landing, tearing off a platoon, breaking the propeller and otherwise damaging the fuselage, but did not turn over. This time no one was hurt. Lewis stated that he was aboard at that time.

GENERAL WAR IS THREATENED BY JAPANESE

The threat of general warfare in China grew acute today. The war spirit was strong in Tokyo and the Japanese army in North China was expected momentarily to drive south, adding other provinces to the newly-dominated Hopei-Changai area, which has a population of more than 20,000,000.
The Japanese were belligerent. They threatened to bombard the former German concession in Tientsin, where hundreds of American civilians are taking refuge. Many Chinese were in the quarters, but the Japanese threat was based on the charge Chinese troops had snipers were hiding there.
The Japanese were close to a clash with the French in Tientsin when they crossed the international bridge and barred the French from crossing to the barracks. Eventually the French exacted an apology.
Another foreign nation to become involved was Soviet Russia, whose consulate in Tientsin was wrecked by "white" Russians. The Soviets charge, angrily, that the raid was tolerated, if not inspired, by the Japanese.
Lt. Gen. Kiyoshi Katsuki, Japanese commander, warned that the war may extend to the entire country. Nanking, the capital, prepared to defend itself against an aerial attack. The Nanking authorities were anxious to avoid war.
Chinese patriotism was mounting. Mme. Chiang Kai-Shek, American-educated wife of China's "strong man," began organizing the women for war service.

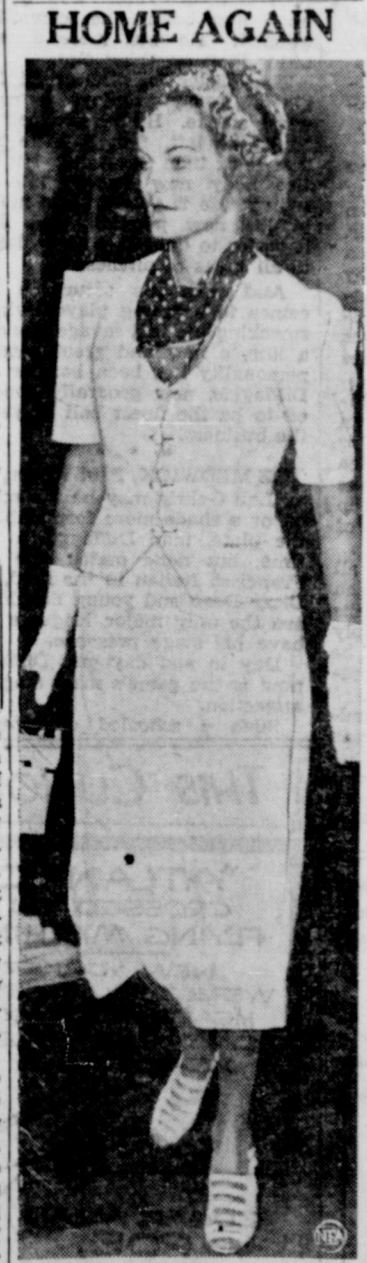

Cattle Shipments Increase 90 Per Cent

AUSTIN, Tex.—Shipments of all classes of Texas livestock during June totaled 8,177 cars, compared with 4,321 cars last year, an increase of 90 per cent, according to a report from the University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.
Cattle shipments of 5,786 cars increased 112 per cent over June last year; calf shipments, 758 cars, increased 33 per cent, and sheep shipments, 1,221 cars, increased 136 per cent. Hog shipments totaled 412 cars, a decrease of nearly 20 per cent.
Aggregate shipments of Texas live stock during the first six months of the year were 46,681 cars, against 32,748 cars during the corresponding period last year, an increase of 40 per cent.
Shipments of cattle to the Fort Worth market were more than double those of June last year and shipments of sheep to this market increased 67 per cent over a year ago.



Reducing School Aid Is Fought In An Order Served

AUSTIN, August 2.—An order restraining the state school board from changing the per capita apportionment July 6 was served today.
The order was granted after the San Antonio Independent School District petitioned the court for a permanent injunction to keep the board from lowering the \$22 per capita it set. The automatic tax board refused to sustain the \$22 figure by failure to vote a sufficient school tax.
The state school board was to meet today to discuss a possible reduction.

Broker Suspended by Exchange Board

WASHINGTON, August 2.—The securities and exchange commission today expelled Michael Meehan, once known as the "boy wizard" of Wall Street, from membership on three national securities exchanges on charges of stock manipulation.

MADRID, August 2.—Gen. Francisco Franco's eastern army sought today to consolidate important gains in the mountains in operations designed to drive a wedge between Madrid and Valencia, temporary loyalist capital. Nationalists claimed to have broken, completely, the loyalist attack.

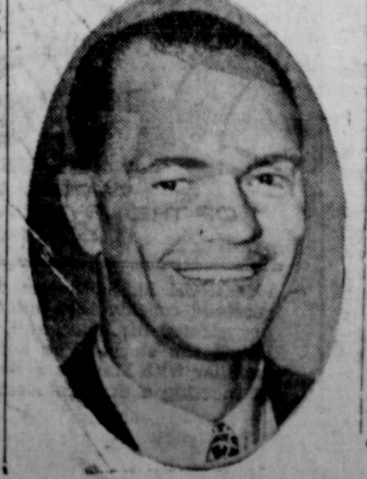

Removing the 'Fever' From a Public Crisis

For several days recently, the newsreel pictures of the Memorial Day clash between steel strikers and police at South Chicago became a celebrated cause for the newsreel owners, a Senate investigating committee, and some sections of the public at large.

This little drama unfolded when the newsreel firm decided, as a matter of public policy, not to release the pictures. Then the LaFollette Civil Liberties Committee ordered a showing for its own benefit. And finally, certain groups of self-appointed public defenders began calling for general exhibition of the scenes all over the country.

The outcome was that all of them, in turn, had their way. And eventually, the pictures did go into the theaters. What happened then is significant for the lesson it conveys to impulsive go-getters on both sides of the labor-industry fence.

Just what did the average citizen do when he got his first view of the films? The answer is unexcitingly given in a recent issue of Variety, the radio, stage and screen publication.

Theaters showing the film reported that there was little or no reaction to the reels when they were screened, spectators sitting through very quietly in virtually all cases. In fact, the booring, when it was noted at all, was on as strong as it frequently is against some foreign dictator.

The response was so slight that theater operators themselves were surprised, and in some cases were forced to discard precautionary measure of "playing down the billing," in favor of stronger ballyhoo for trade.

Now it may have been an accidental combination of good sense and circumstances that took the "fever" out of this potentially dangerous situation. The details don't have to be remembered. Nor is it significant that the film itself showed nothing conclusive about the guilt or innocence of either side in the strike clash.

But all-important is the cue that this result provides for the men who are delegated to settle today's touchy social problems. The individual citizen, given time enough and a fair chance to mull over a "crisis" in his own deliberate way, usually comes up with the astounding decision that there isn't any "crisis" at all.

Of course, it is impossible to call in all the millions of Americans, put them around a table and let them hash out their problems that way. Obviously, nothing ever would be accomplished. But the leaders to whom the bargaining duties have fallen can make themselves aware of the public will and be guided by it.

If that were done, it is safe to assume that the chorus of curbstone jingoists, who are too quick to "fear the worst," would be effectively silenced.

The Spanish war may be heartless, but some pictures show that those executed are usually accorded a final 21-machine gun salute.

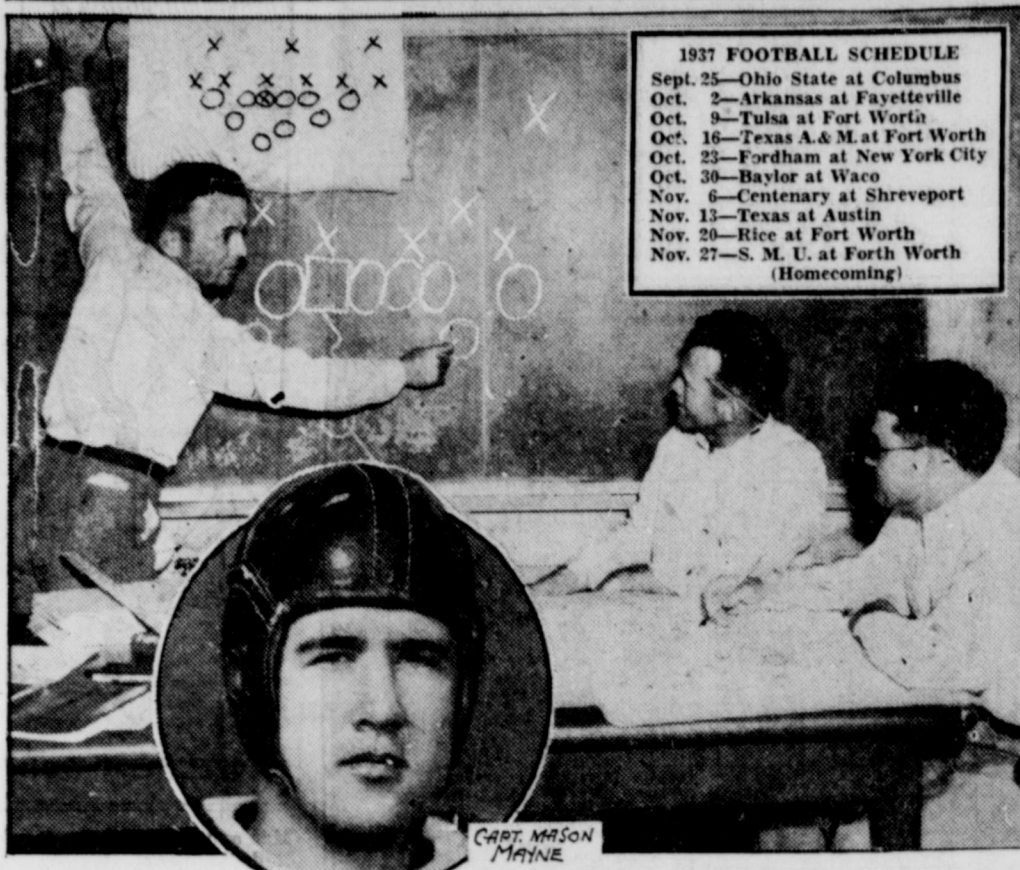
