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Commitments Sought Of Glasgow-Parker For Eastland County Prison

A team of six members of the Eastland County Economic Development Council visited in Austin this past week to garner support for Project HOOS-GOW, the effort to obtain a state prison for Eastland County.

Specific plans called for brief meetings with State Representative Jim Parker and Senator Bob Glasgow at the State Chamber of Commerce Legislative breakfast.

Telephone calls had been made in advance requesting such a conference.

The Eastland County team was deeply disappointed that only Mr. Glasgow attended the breakfast and could only talk with the group for a few minutes. Mr. Parker did not show and when two members

of the party visited his office following breakfast he was not available.

Fortunately one member arrived in Austin early and was able to contact both legislators the previous day.

In general the team found both legislators less than fully informed about the Texas Department of Correction (TDC) prison program and seemed to easily intermix funding and construction requirement of the Pardon and parole Board, the Texas Youth Council, Private Prisons and County jails with that of the TDC. Even though since early January both we informed by letter as to Eastland County's desire for a large 2250 bed state prison

and had promised in phone calls to support our program, there was little evidence that either are adequately doing anything meaningful to help Eastland County get the prison.

This in spite of added letters sent on February 28, March 28 and 29 and April 5 only one reply has been received; that from Mr. Parker of no date stating that his staff could make an appointment for us in Austin and it seemed impossible to see us in Eastland County or his home of Comanche County.

It is obvious that we have not done a very good job in letting our legislators know what has to be done. However we were under the im-

pression that legislators could perhaps have a better feel of how to handle the task of getting support for a large state prison.

In brief conversations on April 5th and 6th they were "pushing" other prison programs such as boot camp, early release and private contract prisons. While Eastland Countians believe there may be a place for this type of modified incarceration which allows prisoners to mix somewhat with the local populace and perhaps be maintained under minimal security standards it is not what we are willing to accept.

It would seem that many

Texas Circuit Literary Festival At Hilton Center May 5-6

The Austin-based Texas Circuit will hold a Literary Festival at the Hilton Center in Cisco on Friday, May 5 and Saturday, May 6. Cisco Junior College and the Cisco Writer's Club are sponsoring the event, with Drs. Monte Lewis, Ken Hammes and Cleatus Rattan as hosts.

Dr. Lewis, history professor, Dr. Hammes, head of the English Department, and Dr. Rattan, English professor, are resident staff Editors of "The Cross Timbers Review", a highly acclaimed CJC Literary publication.

A number of out-of-town publishers, authors, and others interested in writing are expected to attend the Festival. This will be a time to exchange information, study material, and learn of current needs for publication.

The two-day Festival will also include special speakers,

readings by local and area writers, displays of books and other publications, and an evening noon meal.

The program will begin at 1:30 p.m. on Friday, May 5. Editors from the Texas Circuit will open the discussion by telling what kind of material they need. C.A. Wiles, Austin Editor and head of the Circuit, will be among the speakers. Dr. Terence Dalyremple, Editor of the Concho River Review, will also be featured.

After this program the Cisco Writer's Club will read material. There will be a short recess, than at 6 p.m. a dinner will be catered at the Hilton by Oscar's Barbeque. A dessert will be furnished by the college cafeteria.

Speakers for the evening will be H.V. O'Brien, owner of the Eastland County Newspapers, and Dr. Jim Line-

barger, Professor of English and appointed Poet in Residence at North Texas State University, Denton.

H.V. O'Brien will present a historical book which he and his wife, Gaynell have co-authored. Titled "Painting For Freedom," this book has a story with Texas-Mexican setting. It will be "fresh off the press" for the Festival, with some copies expected to be on the local book table.

Dr. Linebarger was born in Midland, but received his B.A. and M.A. degrees in English at Columbia University, New York. His Ph.D. degree is from Emory University, Georgia. Dr. Linebarger joined the University Staff in Denton around 1966, and has since won recognition as a popular teacher and noted poet. He has written a number of books concerning

Narcotic Detection Dog Can Work On Streets

"A specialty narcotics detection dog, is an excellent deterrent to the drug problem, especially in the schools," according to Nancy Birdwell, owner of Scentry Place, Inc.

Nancy spoke to the Cisco Lions Club on Wednesday and to the Cisco Rotary Club on Thursday, on the advantages of having a detection dog working with the Cisco Police Department. Nancy, and training director/manager of Scentry Place, Freddie Bouillion, brought one of their dogs, a beautiful golden retriever named "Luke," to the two meetings. The animal performed and found several stashes of hidden drugs.

Nancy said when Cisco starts using the detection dog then all of Eastland County would be given a reputation of having a drug dog, and the dopers would begin to stay away. She said the animal could be used in all the other towns. She said this reputation has happened in several other towns.

She said this is especially true at schools. Students know they cannot bring drugs around if there is one of these dogs around that can be used at any time. They keep the drugs and alcohol away from the schools.

She said the worst thing in the world is the innocent kids of druggies. Nancy told about a little girl who became hysterical when she found out that a dog was coming into the school. The teachers finally found out that she had knocked over her parents' drugs, and they made her pick it up before she left. The little girl was afraid that the dog would point her out, when it smelled the drugs on her hands.

Scentry Place, Inc., also contracts searches for government contractors, nuclear power plants, and utility companies, (thanks to bills passed by Ronald Reagan when he was president) and do search and seizure. She said, "If anyone

is found to have at least 3 seeds of marijuana, they can lose their jobs, they are history, no matter how long they have been with the company."

She said recently a 55-year old executive was fired from his position of chairman of the board of a major company. This has been a big boost in the Drug War.

She said drug testing before employment with major contractors is wonderful. Nancy said doesn't it make you feel better to know that if someone who is working on something as important as the Space Shuttle has to be tested for drugs, and if they test positive, they will not get the job.

Nancy said in the smaller communities, the scentry dog will pay for itself with the money made from the new search and seizure law. She said in Carthage, Texas, (which has now been X'ed by dopers) they confiscated \$8 million from busts, after the dog indicated there were drugs to be found.

With the new search and seizure laws, any confiscated money or merchandise will be given to the police department after it goes to court. She said in one south Texas town there was trouble with their district attorney filing these cases, but when this fact was brought out to the public, there was a new district attorney elected, and fast. She said district attorneys can be replaced if they don't work with the police.

Nancy said with these search and seizure laws, a passenger bus, and an major air line jet were recently taken away from two major companies who could not prove that they were trying to stop the drug traffic on their lines. She said these search and seizure cases, are what is hurting the dealers. She said they can be arrested, and be back out on the streets in nothing flat.

but when they lose their money, their cars, and even homes, they are hurting too bad to go on.

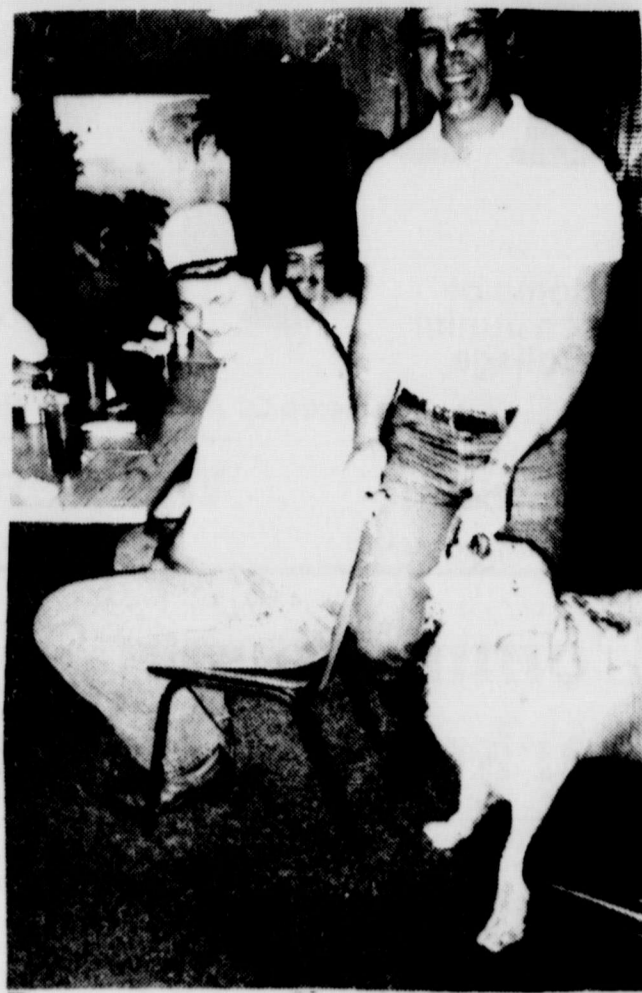
Larry Weikel and Donald Wiley, Cisco police officers, will be ones who will be working with the dog. It was recommended that a golden retriever be used since this is not an area where an aggressive dog is needed. She said local people love these dogs, because they are friendly, they work these searches as games. It is just a game to them to find the hidden "toy."

Nancy said Cisco has a good Chief of Police, Billy Rains, and some outstanding

good law enforcement officers, and the city needs to back them, with this dog. She said the two men will have one week's training with the dog, and then they will have to come back once a year, for one week to be recertified.

Cisco began a campaign to raise money to buy a K-9 Police Patrol Dog, last year. The First National Bank and Olney Savings, each has a special Patrol Dog Fund account. The cost of the dog from Scentry Place, Inc., is \$3600.

As soon as the money is raised, the dog will be coming into Cisco, to help fight the Drug War, and to make the schools and streets clean.

legislators are looking primarily at the initial cost of construction for modern, safe prisons and are willing to accept old army camps and the like as detention facilities because they are cheap.

This will be poor economy in the long run, violates basic principles espoused in Federal law (Ruiz vs Lynaugh case) and cannot adequately protect our citizens.

Eastland Counties, like other law abiding people of Texas are willing to pay the price to incarcerate those who break our laws and threaten our safety. We have not other choice.

We hope that many local citizens will write our legislators and demand that they become very active in doing what we in Eastland County want. We want them to make valiant efforts to convince other legislators that they should follow our example.

Specifically it would be good to mention that we want prisons in West Texas where we can get some economic benefit from payroll and any products purchased locally. We have been paying taxes in this state for over 75 years supporting prisons in East and Southeastern Texas. We want our fair share.

Specifically we want adequate consideration for Eastland County to have a state prison sited here. Our location on a freeway, cheap adequate water and utilities and our closeness to major cities make our county an ideal location.

Secondly advise them that we want maximum security for prisons in our county which means that we can obtain a new and properly constructed 2250 bed unit.

Thirdly, to get state prisoners out of our county jails (which is very expensive for us) will require statewide construction of at least 11,000 beds this year as recommended by the Department of Corrections and Governor Clements.

Let's insist they quit arguing about the method of financing and recognize that we have an emergency situation which must be taken care of immediately!

The council has invited both of our legislators to have breakfast with us that morning and go en-masse to the Board meeting.

This will let the Board know that we seriously desire a state prison in this county and, if our elected legislators attend with us, that they are support vigorously their constituency in this cause.

Section 1619 Help SSI Disable Try To Work

Special provisions in the Social Security law now give disabled people who get supplemental security income (SSI) payments a chance to work without losing their benefit, Glyn Hammons, Social Security manager in Abilene, said today.

Both cash payments and Medicaid eligibility can continue as long as the SSI recipient remains disabled and meets the income and resource requirements of the SSI program, Hammons said.

If a disabled person's earnings are too high for cash SSI payments, Medicaid coverage will still be continued. This coverage will continue until the person can afford similar medical care or until his or health improves. Cash payments can be reinstated if earnings again drop below the

SSI limits. This part of the Social Security law, called Section 1619, was enacted by Congress as a way to help disabled SSI recipients become self-supporting. It was felt that a safety net of guaranteed continuing eligibility might encourage more people to try to work.

Today, people in all 50 States work and receive SSI under Section 1619, said Hammons. About 1/3 percent of the 2 million disabled Americans receiving SSI currently participate in this program.

Improve Fish Production In Farm Ponds Needed In Local Areas

Eastland County boasts an abundance of farm ponds but most are producing fish far below their potential. That assessment comes from Crystal Wilbanks, County Extension Agent, with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Texas has about one-half million acres of small farm ponds. Stocked with channel

or blue catfish, these ponds can produce up to a thousand pounds of fish per acre annually if managed properly," points out Don Steinbach, Fisheries Specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, College Station.

"On the other hand, annual fish production may be only 50 to 75 pounds per acre for unmanaged ponds with fish

species such as small sunfish".

Just what does it take to have a productive farm fish pond? "A lot of things come under consideration," says Steinbach. "Anyone putting in a farm fish pond must then be serious about managing it. A good fish producing pond

doesn't just happen." Fisheries Specialist Don Steinbach will use electro fishing gear to sample a pond to determine the kind of fish present and what level of management is required to create a good fishery.

A meeting has been scheduled by County Agent Wilbanks for TUESDAY, APRIL 18th, at 6:00 p.m. at Dewey Hames' stock tank located 6 1/4 miles east of the Ranger Dairy Queen. Directions are as follows: take South exit

#354 (immediately after crossing under old highway 80) proceed 1 1/4 miles to Russell Creek. Gate will be on the right. Flags and signs will be posted. Please bring your lawn chairs.

In case of rain, we will meet at the Ranger Community Building located behind the swimming pool on west main.

The specialist will discuss the following factors in establishing and managing farm ponds: 1) locating and preparing the pond; 2) stocking the pond; 3) fertilizing the pond; 4) feeding the fish; 5) clearing ponds of rough fish and weeds; 6) fishing and fish fertilizer.

Ron Bailey, Soil Conservation Service representative will also be on hand to discuss the SCS sponsored fish stocking program.

Door prizes will be provided by H&R Feed Store, Ranger; Thornton's Feed Mill, Cisco; Carbon Farm Supply, Carbon, and Eastland Farm and Ranch Center, Eastland.

Pecan Grafting Workshop To Be Held April 21, In Cisco

Pecan budding and grafting will be taught at an Eastland County Pecan Propagation Workshop Friday, April 21. The workshop will be held in the Agriculture Building at Cisco Junior College and will be sponsored by the Eastland County Pecan Growers Association.

The workshop will begin at 9:30 a.m. in the Agriculture building, which is located on the east side of Highway 6, across from the main cam-

pus. Charles Walker, President of the association, says everyone wishing to learn how to bud and graft pecans should attend.

Dan Childress, a pecan grower, who has had experiences with many pecan varieties will discuss the recommended varieties of pecans for this area of the state.

County Extension Agent, DeMarquis Gordon will discuss the techniques of several kinds of grafting with the aid of a video tape.

After noon, the workshop will continue in the Bo McMillan Pecan Orchard where demonstrations will be given and participants will practice the skills of pecan grafting.

Walker says, the growers association will have some grafting wood and tape for sale at the workshop. Men, women and students from all areas of West and Central Texas have been trained at the workshop during the past 36 years, says Gordon.

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Rental Assistance Available At King Manor Apartments

As many as 17 families in Ranger meeting income guidelines may qualify for Rental Assistance through the Farmers Home Administration.

Very low and low income households may inquire and pick up applications for qualifying at the office of King Manor Apartments, 107 Blundell, Ranger.

Rental Assistance is for eligible residents who's annual gross adjusted income qualifies them as very low or low income households.

To file an application for a Rental Assistance unit, applicants must: complete a written application which discloses name, age and relationship of all household members, disclose amount and source of household income and assets, provide credit and landlord references, provide written permission to allow the manager to verify all information.

When an approved housing unit is available, applicants will be required to pay a

security deposit in advance, sign a written lease, pay the first month's rent in advance, make security deposits with the utility companies to have the services turned on, and complete a "Move In" inspection of the unit with the property manager.

Applicants for occupancy are considered on a first-come, first-serve basis established by the filing of a completed application for rental.

King Manor Apartments is financed by the USDA, Farmers Home Administration, and is operated in accordance with FmHA guidelines. It is an Equal Housing Opportunity Community.

Three Rental Assistance units are separate from the section 8 program thru HUD that we have asked for. We're still trying to get those approved.

Local Club business was also discussed at the meeting. Susie Lewis brought suggestions from Dr. Monte Lewis

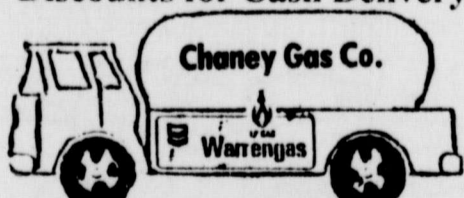

HIGHLIGHTS

AUSTIN—Those who seek to rid themselves of Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower by abolishing his elective office should read a page in recent legislative history.

The play doesn't always work. Turn to the chapter titled, "The Life of Jim Mattox", and recall that redistricting conservatives in the Legislature sought to end his liberal political career by shredding the congressional district he had held for years.

It ended his days in Congress. But, he rode the sympathy backlash all the way up to the Attorney General's office, and he's been giving them hell ever since.

Political Creature

The conservative farm and ranch leaders who seek to make Hightower defunct by making his office appointive are not likely to succeed. But if they do, they likely will see Hightower again in the future. He is as political a creature as anybody around today.

Who knows? Someday it might be Gov. Hightower appointing the new agriculture commissioner, someone who would be farther left than the editor of *Mother Jones* magazine.

Hightower's agency faces sunset hearings this session. The Senate has already approved his continued employment, and the House is

likely to do the same.

The patron saint of farming people, Willie Nelson, gave pro-Hightower testimony to the House panel last week, as did former Congresswoman Barbara Jordan.

But Gov. Bill Clements has the power to veto the sunset bill if it doesn't axe Hightower, and he hasn't committed. Clements knows the Mattox lesson.

For those who don't, imagine if Hightower were legislated out of his job. Then try to estimate the speed with which he would rush down to party headquarters and scribble his check to file for another office.

Yes, an office more powerful than an ag commissioner and one he might win without the sympathy vote. "Best leave the yellow dog alone," one observer quipped last week.

PUC Heat Turned On

Some leftist consumer advocates in Austin thought the last thing they would see under Clements was a pro-consumer Public Utility Commission.

Now the PUC is taking all kinds of political heat for deciding to refund \$128 million in tax overcharges to customers of GTE Southwest.

The PUC nailed GTE for allegedly charging customers for taxes it never forwarded to state and federal governments and ordered refunds dating back to Jan. 1, 1987.

The decision held that Texas replaced gross receipts taxes with sales taxes and GTE continued to charge ratepayers for both sets of taxes and pocketed the gross receipts taxes.

Clements, Lt. Gov. Bill Hobby and Speaker Gib Lewis said a special session of the Legislature may be needed to overhaul the PUC and they will name a special team to investigate the commission.

Meanwhile, two Clements' appointees to the three-member com-

mission face confirmation hearings in the Senate amid the implied political threats, and consumer leaders accuse GTE of waging legislative warfare to overturn the decision.

Hobby Breaks Tie Vote

With Lt. Gov. Hobby casting a rate vote last week, the Senate approved a resolution directing the State Board of Education to develop a comprehensive health care curriculum that includes sex education.

The resolution passed easily on a voice vote, but only after its sponsor, Sen. Eddie Bernice Johnson of Dallas stopped what she called a "non-sensible" amendment by Victoria Sen. Ken Arnbrister, on a 16-15 vote.

Arnbrister's amendment would allow school districts to choose not to teach sex education and would have stricken a provision providing information on contraceptives.

The vote was 15-15 on a motion to table the amendment before Hobby voted to table it.

Jury Trial Retained

Sen. Bob Glasgow last week unveiled his compromise workers' compensation bill. His reform package retains the right to a jury trial and puts tougher safety requirements on businesses.

The proposal retains many of the changes in benefits already approved by the House.

Glasgow's measure will be presented as a complete substitute for a bill by Rep. Richard Smith, R-Bryan.

Purple Martins To Receive Some Help
Texans interested in purple martins now have an opportunity to participate in martin research, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

Catrina Martin said the organization called the Purple martin Conservation Association has established a colony register program in an attempt to locate as many martin colonies in North America as possible. Purple martins may be declining in some parts of their breeding range, Martin said, and the numbers and locations of colonies are needed to begin research.

The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's new program for listing lake and bay fish records has attracted considerable interest from fishermen, officials said.

The department has been maintaining official state fish records since the early 1970's, but it was not until 1988 that the agency began listing water body records.

Fishery Technician Danny Lewis of Tyler said the water body record program gives anglers a realistic way to get recognition for outstanding catches while providing extra data for the department's fishery management efforts.

Officials said some unofficial lake record fish were never weighed on certified scales or otherwise properly documented. As a result some of the new lake record fish may not be as large as fish caught before the TPWD started the program.

Anglers catching potential state or water body record fish need to obtain one of the department's fish record applications from a department office, game warden, tackle shop or marina. The fish must be weighed on scales certified for trade by the Texas Agriculture Department, and the weighing must

be witnessed by two observers. The forms also may be obtained through the mail by calling toll-free 1-800-792-1112.

The rain the past week was sure timely for pastures, rangeland, small grains, lawns and other vegetation. We are in good condition with soil moisture compared to other years. However, the freeze on April 11th, was not as welcomed. This is very late for a freeze. It may have done further damage to the fruit crop.

Farmers, ranchers, and small business managers in Eastland County can attend an upcoming short course to improve their computer skills as a step toward boosting profits.

The short course May 3-5 at Tarleton State University will cover "Advanced Electronic Spreadsheet Development and Applications in Agriculture". Lotus 1-2-3 spreadsheet software will be used for the in-depth, hands-on training.

The training on microcom-

puter applications is a joint effort of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the Continuing Education Department of Tarleton State University.

"The Extension Service is dedicated to helping Texas agricultural businesses achieve profitability in their operations," said Dr. Ashley Lovell, Extension Service Economist who is directing the short course. "To do this, managers must continue to improve their financial management skills in budgeting, planning and record keeping. The microcomputer can be used to enhance these skills."

Trained Dog Act New To Festival

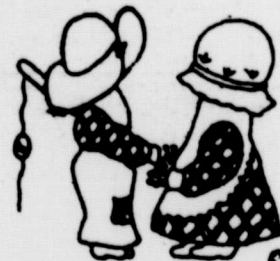

This type dog, a "schutzhund," is a German terrier for a working dog, also meaning protection dog. It began near the turn of the century when it was not as much a sport, but a test of breeding stock.

In order to be a good schutzhund, a dog has to have a stable temperament and be athletic and structurally correct. Since schutzhund work

is very demanding, physically and mentally, a dhi who is not stable will not have the temperament and drive that is needed.

These unique German shepherds and rottweiler will demonstrate many exercises, and promise to be a real treat for Festival visitors.

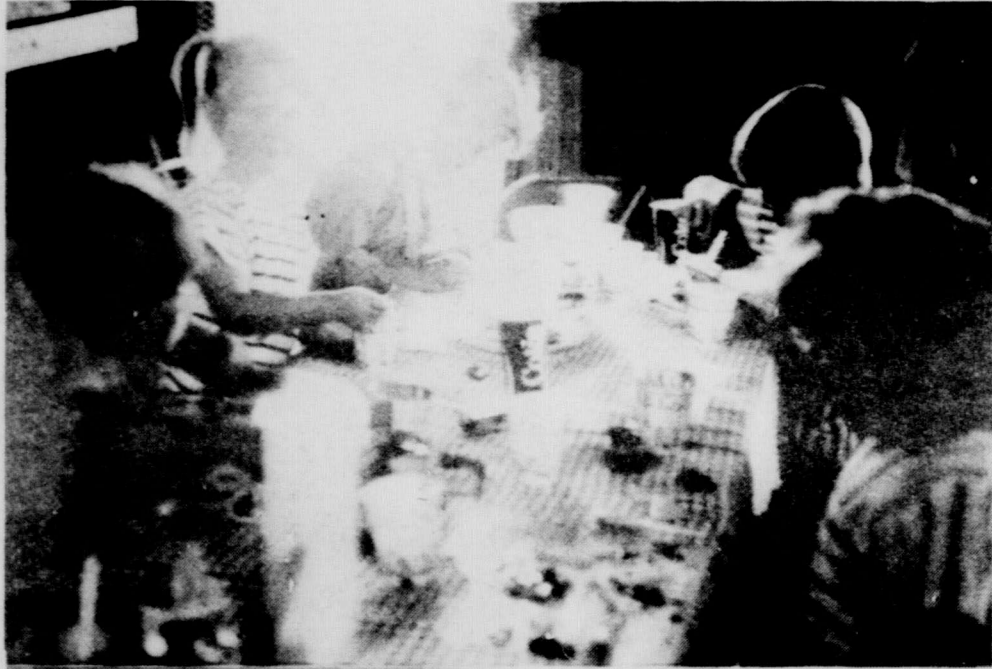

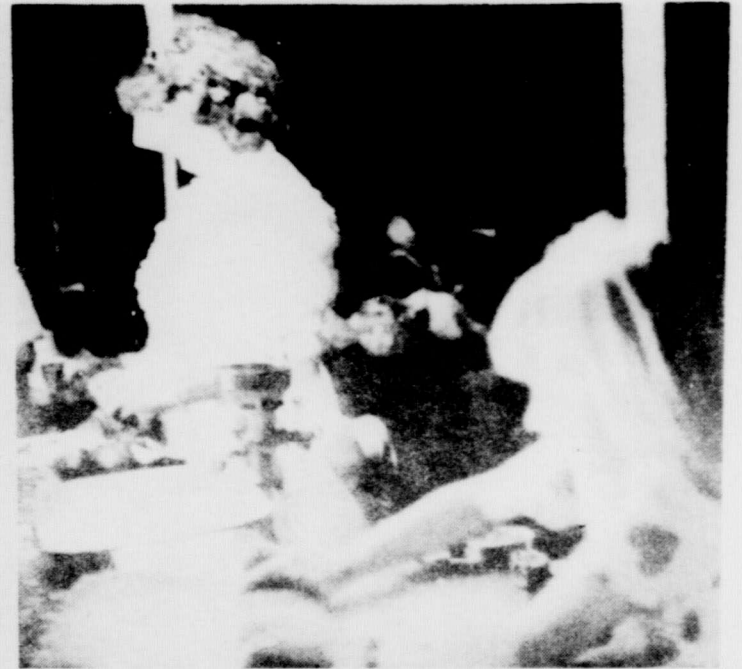
Cookie Decorating Lady To Be Back

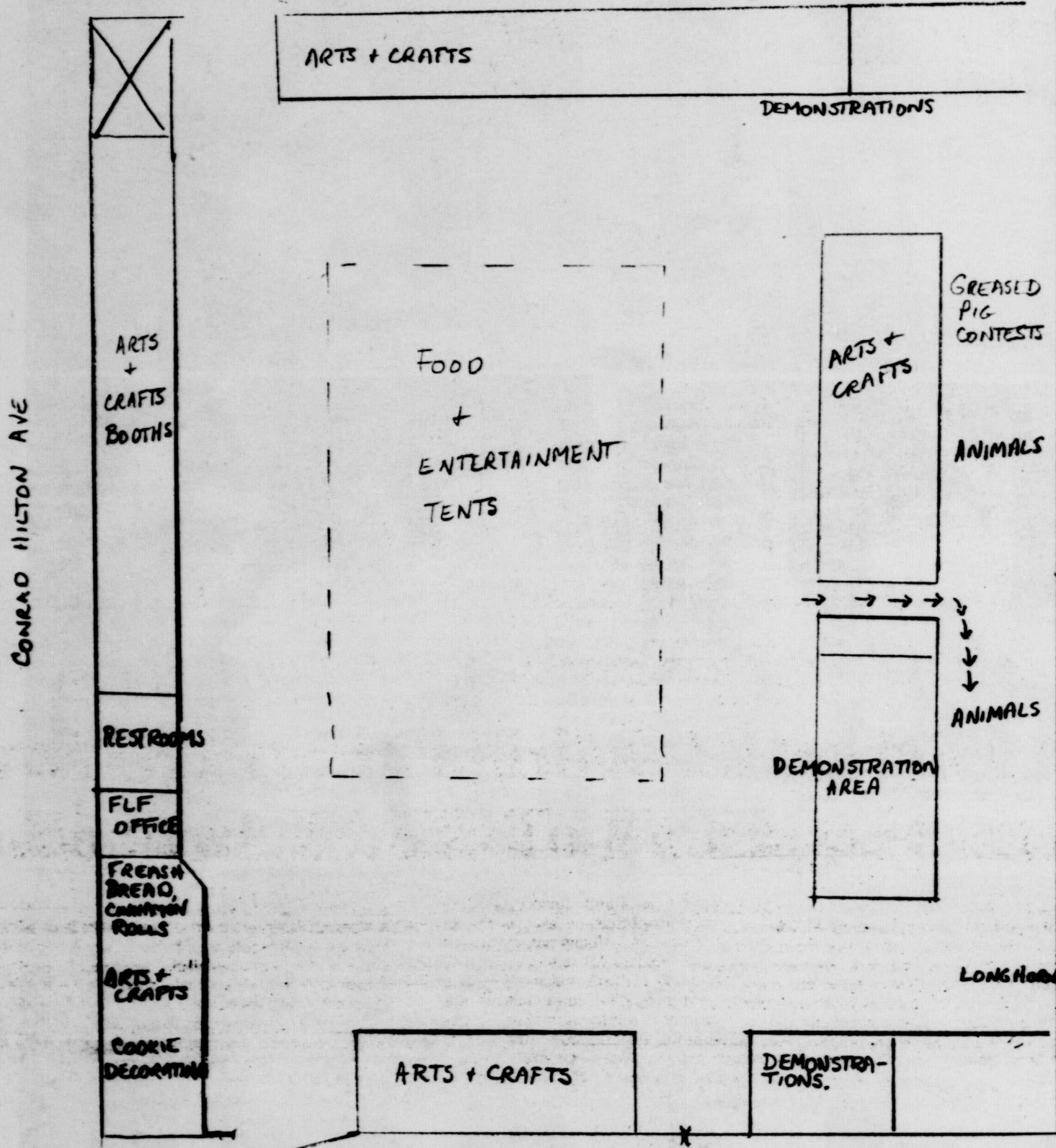

Several weeks ago it was reported to readers that due to uncomfortable working conditions, such as inclement weather, the speckled Cochins of Local Egg-Layers' Union No. 929 had threatened a work slowdown, which would have been a definite threat to one of the crowd-pleasing exhibits of the 16th Annual Cisco Folklife Festival.

The list of grievances, which reliable sources

report still exist, included harassment of neighboring felines, theft of coffee break snacks by resident canines, and excessive noise produced by equipment not sanctioned by OSHA. It was felt that at that time extreme cold and snow were the most influencing sources of discontent.

One worker had cackled that she would get back to egg production when her working conditions and fringe benefits were what she

expected. When threatened by a definite lay-off by management, that worker and others seem to have had a change in attitude.

At last report, egg production had increased, and several chickens were even seen assuming around-the-clock involvement. At press time it was not known if there will have been enough 24 hour days which are required to produce baby chick for the Festival visitors' pleasure.

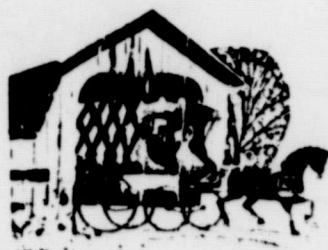
