Opponents to Flexible Farm Prop Bill Predict Victory; Veto by Ike Is Seen

Oil Industry Leader Views Threats

SANTA FE (AP)—J. Harold Dunn of Amarillo, Texas, said today that three "black clouds" are threatening the very existence of the oil industry, and called on the industry to so present its case that the public can judge for itself.

Dunn, president of the Shamrock Oil and Gas Corp., said the threats are: Attack on the depletion allowance; foreign imports; and the Supreme Court decision in the Phillips case, permitting the government to set the wellhead price of gas.

The depletion allowance is a 27 1/2 per cent income tax allowance which recognizes that oil and gas are wasting resources. It has been compared with depreciation allowance provided on a physical property such as a manufacturing plant.

Dunn's talk was prepared for delivery to the mid-year conference of the six-state Gulf-South-

west Oil Industry Information committee.

"The consuming public has the power to grant or deny the right to change our system and must in the end receive the benefits or suffer the consequences. There are forces and counterforces working in both directions. Realistically we must expect an informed public to express its desire based upon its self interest."

"The public, our customers who finally must decide the best course to follow and resolve the issues, can do so in the manner which will serve it best only if it is informed. Our greatest failure to date is our failure in this regard."

The consumer is the only one who can give the political power to those who are working to change, with some alarming success, the whole system that

seems until now to have served him so well."

Dunn called the 27 1/2 per cent depletion allowance a reasonable provision, "but no guarantee of elimination of the risk inherent in this business." He said its elimination would have the effect of taxation of capital instead of income.

Dunn said it must be concluded "that those who would change the

Oratory Bogs Down Prompt Bill Voting

WASHINGTON (AP)—Sen. Young (R-ND), reversing his prediction that a Senate group fighting for continued high farm price supports might suffer defeat, said today "I think we're going to win now—there have been some switches."

With six or eight votes apparently controlling the Senate fate of the Eisenhower administration's plan for flexible price supports, Sen. Holland (D-Fla.) questioned Young's claim and noted that even a Senate vote for rigid props would not be final. Holland, who supports the administration on the issue, said in a separate interview:

"They can't win even if they win a Senate test. The President would veto any extension of rigid supports and the whole issue is subject to a conference."

THAT WAS a reference to a compromise-seeking conference with the House, which has passed a modified version of the administration program, to be held after the Senate okays its bill.

That appeared to be many thousands of words of oratory away. There have been two full days of debate and still there remained, on a pad on Vice President Nixon's desk, the names of 18 senators who want to speak on the issue.

Oil Industry Fails to Show 1954 Increase

SANTA FE (AP)—G. R. Bryant of Houston, vice president of the Texas Co., said today a 6 to 8 per cent increase to which the oil industry had geared itself for this year had failed to materialize.

"Apparently the industry this year is not getting the usual percentage increase experienced since the war," Bryant said in an interview attended by other oil executives here for a district meeting of the Oil Industry Information committee. The others agreed with Bryant's description of the outlook for the industry.

The weather is a big factor in the industry's operations for the last six months of the year, Bryant added, the second half operations would improve.

C. A. Coppel of Roswell, vice president of Malco Refineries, said his company's business is following the pattern described by Bryant. He saw the possibility of a drop of 4 to 6 per cent in gasoline sales in New Mexico this year.

Joe T. Dickerson of Midland, vice president of Shell, noted the picture could change quickly, which has happened before in the oil business, and full year operations could compare favorably with former years.

The oil men said exploration costs have gone up sharply in recent years and while there are immense reserves, the cost of finding them has increased the companies' operating costs.

One of Dionne Quintuplets Dies

NORTH BAY, Ont. (AP)—Emilie Dionne, one of the famous quintuplets died at noon today in St. Agathe, Quebec.

Word of the 20-year-old quintuplet's sudden passing was given out late this afternoon by the girl's distraught father, Oliva Dionne. Death was attributed to a stroke, he said.

Emilie had not been seriously ill and the seizure came without warning, he added. The other sisters, the father said, were deeply shocked by the news.

Three Escape County Jail at Raton

RATON (AP)—The only three prisoners in the Colfax county jail escaped last night after overpowering the night jailer and threatening him with a pocketknife.

One of the escapees, William R. Rega, was to have been released today. He was a material witness in a case of contributing to the delinquency of a minor girl.

Sheriff's officers said the three were together in the large bullpen when Night Jailer John Johnson, about 60, went to return keys to their cells last night around 10 p. m.

They threatened Regent and gagged him in a cell. First word of the break came when the sheriff's office to complain the prisoners were making too much noise and couldn't the sheriff let them down. State Distributes \$28,000 to NM Fire Departments

Artesia Leaders Study Scout Budget, Program

A growth of almost double the number of boys who were in the organization last year has caused the executive committee of the Conquistador council of Boy Scouts to set their budget for next year at \$80,275.

A group of 75 men met last night at the scout aquatic camp at Carlsbad to discuss the new budget and also to discuss filling leadership vacancies in the council.

Jack Maddock, Hobbs oilman and president of the group, presided at the meeting which had representatives from the council—an area roughly bounded by Hobbs, White Mountain, and Tucumcari.

S. P. Yates, Artesia, who recently accepted the finance campaign chairmanship for the entire council area, presented the budget very extensively and each item was discussed in detail.

Most of the discussion centered about the hiring of adequate field service directors for each area in

order to have better coordination among the various areas.

In 1945 the local district had six men working but due to fluctuations steady employees couldn't be kept. Therefore, it was suggested and approved that the office of field service director be set up in each district in order to coordinate the activities and help share the contact load.

The Artesia area is to have Richard Canfield, Topeka, Kans., as the field executive for the Gateway and Conchas districts. Canfield is a graduate of UNM, is married, and has a daughter age nine months. He is expected to arrive here around the first of September.

Yorrell Harris, formerly field executive in Carlsbad, will be moved to the position of director of field service and will have his office in Roswell.

Henry McGinty, field executive at Roswell is moving to Abilene,

Tex., to be chief professional Scouter in that district. His loss leaves Roswell with a need for an executive scouter.

The new plan of field service executives and field service director will have seven men working instead of the original six. They will be guaranteeing a visit to every community where a troop of Boy Scouts is located at regular intervals.

The council has operated at a deficit for the past year due to its complete budget not being raised. Improvements on the three camps have had to come, and, fortunately, an over-subscription of bonds during the war has provided the Council with a safety measure to fall back on.

However, the spending of this money has left the council almost flat, and, in order to take care of the boys now participating in the program and the great number who are waiting to get in, the new

budget has to be raised to the last penny.

A spokesman stated, for purposes of clarification, that only \$775 dollars of that amount raised will be used to pay the charter and national organization registration. The rest is used here for the benefit of the boys directly—payment for leadership, improvements, and upkeep.

The aquatic camp at Carlsbad was cited as an example of the good work the body is doing almost without funds and almost with voluntary help alone. New buildings were put in, and fences were erected which were donated by interested parties.

The aquatic camp has become one of the best known sites in the nation but it still is below the standards set for it by the governing body.

Costs per boy are being kept at \$12 each to allow as many as possible to attend. And the boys are

getting more for their money than they did in 1939, according to the spokesman.

The body created a trust fund—now empty—so that should the possibility arise, interested persons could contribute to the fund for improvement, upkeep, and salaries.

Tom Kramer, Carlsbad, was appointed chairman of a committee to appoint a board of five trustees to operate the trust fund.

The field service system approved last night is a well known system already used and proved by over half of the council's in the western part of the United States. It provides for closer contact and cooperation and more efficient service to the boys.

Attending the meeting from Artesia were Yates, Vernon Mills, head of the local scout board, Donald Bush, Bill Bullock and Dave Button.
