\$400,000 TO BE PAID DAWSON FARMERS

First Bale Of Cotton Off 1938 Crop Ginned Here Sunday; Foster Is Grower

W. B. Collins Is Highest Bidder At Public Auction

Dawson County's first bale of cotton from the 1938 crop was ginned Sunday night about midnight by the Lamesa Gin Company. The bale was grown by J. H. Foster, who lives about sixteen miles southwest of Lamesa.

The cotton from which this was picked, was planted immediately preceding the two days of snow and hard freezing weather which visited this section in mid April of this year. Immediately after the snow melted the seed sprouted and thus, is possibly the earliest cotton on the South Plains. Mr. Foster stated that he had possibly two or three bales open on the forty-five acre field from which this bale was gathered. Wagon weights totaled 1800 pounds, which turned out a 486 pound bale.

H. H. Barron, local auctioneer, supervised the selling of the bale Monday afternoon on the northwest corner of the court house lawn. It was sold to Mr. W. B. Collins, of Collins Dry Goods Company, who offered the highest bid of 14c per pound. The bale is on display in front of the store on the west side of the square.

Although this is the first bale for Dawson county as well as the entire South Plains, it came some later than the first bale last year. It was ginned here on August 14, which was exactly one week earlier than this year.

Several other farmers in the county were picking cotton to try and secure the first bale, although the open cotton is very scattering. A. G. Bearden, of the local Chamber of Commerce made up a premium list Tuesday and \$75 in cash was raised among the business concerns of the city for Mr. Foster.

Subsidies Should Begin Arriving In Next Two Weeks

Announcement Follows College Station Visit

An important announcement is this week released from the County Agent's office in Lamesa.

While Joe C. Williams, local agent, was in Austin last week, he was informed by G. M. Hogan, auditor for the AAA that Dawson county could expect the first subsidy checks within the next two weeks, and that within a few weeks a total of four hundred thousand dollars will be distributed among the farmers of Dawson county.

"We cannot say that the checks will get here on time, however, we will begin to look for subsidy checks in the near future," Mrs. Williams said Thursday. "Notices will be mailed to those who receive checks as they come into the office, likewise a list of checks, as they arrive in the office, will be posted for the convenience of those who come by the office between mailing time," he said.

The County Committee, Joe M. Peterson, W. T. Meeks and W. H. Harris, along with the county agent made a trip to College Station last week to look into the wheat situation for the county.

A complete report of what they found and the whole explanation may be found in the County Agent's column in another place in this issue of the Courier.

State Department Calls For Bids On Gaines County Road

Grading, Drainage And Topping of 25.3 Miles

The State Highway Department has called for bids for September 7th for the grading, drainage and topping of Highway Fifteen from the Dawson County line to Seminole, a distance of 25.3 miles.

This road will connect with the paving across Dawson county, and will give another paved outlet to the west. Connecting with the road which runs from Odessa to Lubbock, through Andrews, Seminole, Seagraves and Brownfield.

This is a Federal Aid Project and the Federal Highway Department is to assist in the building of the road to the extent of fifty per cent of the total cost.

Thus another link in the long sought paving of a shorter route between Fort Worth and El Paso is about to be realized. When this road is complete it will save about one hundred miles over the Bankhead route between these two cities, and it is estimated by road enthusiasts in this section that a large per cent of the tourist travel, will be (Continued on Back Page)

INTEREST IS MOUNTING IN SATURDAY PRIMARY

Saturday the voters of Texas and Dawson county will go to the polls to make their selection of their officials for the next two years. Most of the races were settled in the first primary, however, interest has steadily mounted during the past few days, and the likelihood is that the vote Saturday will practically equal the first primary.

In Dawson county there will be six races to settle. Probably the greatest interest is being shown in the sheriff's

race, in which A. M. (Buck) Bennett and Tom Cooksey are running it off together. In the first primary Bennett polled 1417 votes to lead the ticket, while Cooksey had a total of 1127. There are approximately 1318 votes for them to divide.

In the County Treasurer's race, Miss Eunice Gaines, who polled 1547 votes in the first primary, and Mrs. Annie Crow, with 1351, will battle over the remaining 820 votes.

In the Public Weigher race Granville

Wyatt with 1393 in the first primary and Will McHenry with 1114 votes, have 835 remaining votes to work on.

In the constable's race H. D. Pace polled 1209 votes to lead the primary in July, with Jack Aldridge with 879 votes, leaving 1046 votes for them to battle over.

The Commissioners' race in Precinct One sees Oley Shofner with 301 votes in the first round, pitted with Howard Moore, who polled 251, with 284 remaining votes to scrap over.

In the Precinct Two Commissioners race, Sam Hodge polled 215 votes in the July Primary with G. C. Aten totaling 172. The remaining votes amount to 250.

And there you have the picture as it will appear Saturday. If you can take the way they ran in the first primary and take the votes for them to fight over and then be able to tell who will win, you are a political prognosticator—otherwise you'll just have to wait and see.

A refrigerator is almost necessary in the home to keep food at a certain degree, Miss Phenix told the Sparenborg Home Demonstration club, when they met in the home of Mrs. J. T. Pruitt, August 19.

Only one-half of the homes have refrigerators. If it isn't possible to own a refrigerator, coolers can be used to keep the food in a good condition.

When thinking of buying a refrigerator consider the initial cost. Can the initial cost be balanced by the operating cost? Consider the cubic feet area, shelf area, insulation, and ask what kind of refrigerator it uses. Ask where it was tested and see that corners on inside of box are rounded.

The box should be cleaned thoroughly once a week, keep food covered and take care of it. Don't over load the box.

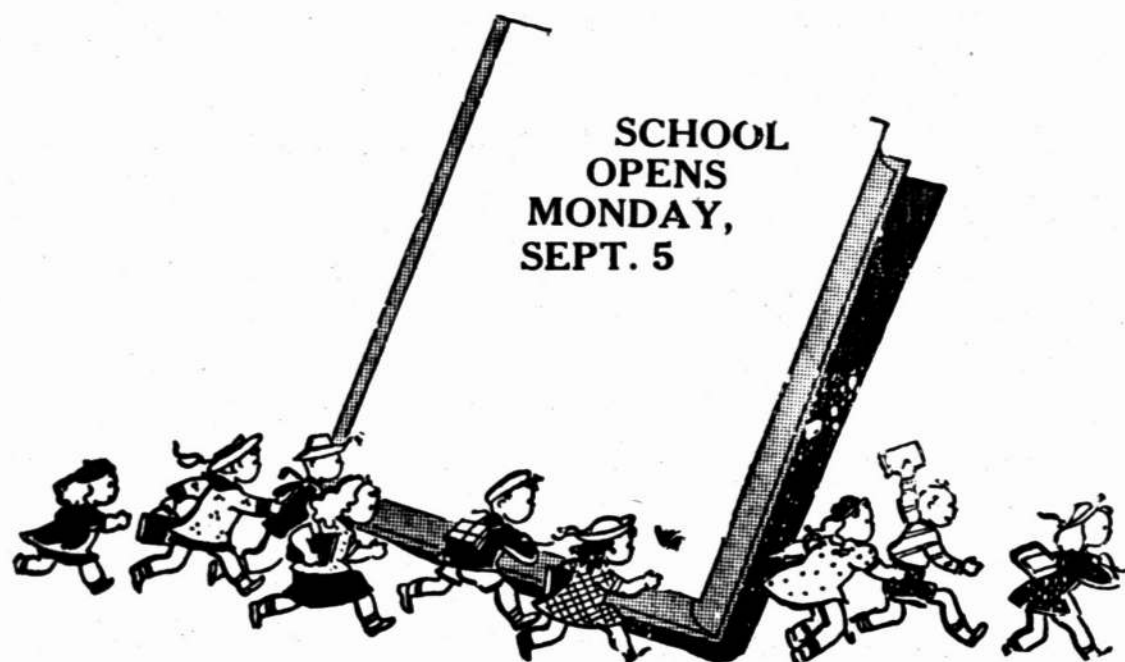

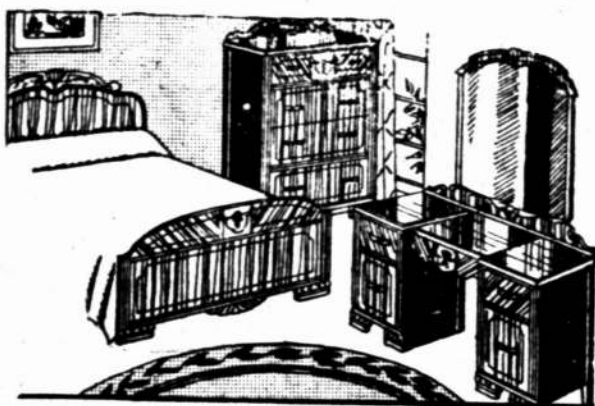

FAIRPLAY NOTES

Farm Program

Several producers have asked if it would be permissible to harvest sudan grass after it is mature and stack it for threshing after the first of the year.

J. W. Doak, field man for the AAA, gave us the information that the producer who grows and sells the sudan in bundles that is later threshed and the seed placed on the market will be held responsible for the seed being threshed and put on the market. Such producer according to Mr. Doak, will be violating his agreement with the AAA and will be required to repay the amount of money that he gets from the AAA as he will be out of compliance with the farm program.

We have had inquiry about putting cane in silos if sold to some other party or bought by another party and placed in trench silo. We have a letter from the state office that such producer who sells the cane off the retired land will be deemed to be out of compliance and he will be called on to refund any government rentals that he might receive under the 1938 program. We advise that cane harvested be not sold for the purpose of being put in trench silos if it comes off of retired land, as such practices is in violation of the agreement with the AAA.

County Chairman Joe M. Peterson, of the AAA announces that according to the letter below that farmers who are entitled to receive a wheat base will be allowed a base.

The letter:
Hon. George Mahon,
Member of Congress, Colorado, Texas,
Dear Mr. Mahon:

This is in reply to your letter of August 4, enclosing a letter from Mr. L. S. Munger, of Lamesa, Texas, relative to the wheat acreage allotments. It appears that Mr. Munger has been misinformed in regard to a wheat allotment for farms in Dawson county. Although no county allotments were set up for Dawson county, farmers who are eligible for wheat allotments will receive allotments from the reserve set up for this purpose.

County acreage allotments are based on the most reliable data of the Federal Government, but, as you know, in counties in which a small acreage is normally planted, it is difficult to arrive at the exact acreage of such crop. For this reason, it was not possible to establish county wheat acreage allotments for some counties until after all eligible farms in the county submitted worksheets and they are tabulated and analyzed; therefore, any farmers in Dawson county who are eligible for wheat allotment should file the necessary data with the county agent so that an allotment may be set up for them.

Mr. Mahon's letter to Mr. Joe M. Peterson:

Dear Joe:
You will note that I am enclosing a letter from the Secretary of Agriculture Wallace with reference to a wheat allotment for Dawson county.

You will note that Mr. Wallace states that Dawson county received no county allotment for wheat, farmers who are eligible for wheat allotments will receive them. I am mighty glad of this favorable indication, and hope that everything can be worked out satisfactory.

The county committee called Mr. Mahon's attention to the wheat situation when he was in our county some two weeks ago. He promised to do everything possible to aid this county in securing wheat acreage allotment for those producers who were eligible to receive wheat acreage allotments.

The county committee, Joe M. Peterson, W. T. Meeks and W. H. Harris along with the county agent made a trip to College Station to look into the wheat situation for the county, along with other important matters.

The committee is glad to report that of the fifteen thousand subsidy applications in the state office when they were there that twelve hundred of the applications there were from Dawson county. The payment on the subsidy will be sixty per cent of the base acreage and allotment of pounds under the 1937 work sheet. The State committee reported that only sixty per cent could be paid on account of all cotton lost in fires would draw subsidy payment up to the amount allowed each farm. That all farms who had cotton base and made no cotton would be paid a subsidy. The committee had this to say: The reason for not paying but sixty per cent is due to the fact that all producers who had cotton allotments last year would be taken care of, even though they made no cotton. Had subsidy payments or partial allowed to those who produced cotton only, some who had complete or partial failures would not receive anything.

We found also at the state office that there were one hundred and two counties who had been approved on the Feed Acreage allotments and that while there, our county was approved. Making our county number one hundred and three in the state for approval out of two hundred fifty four counties.

Mr. G. M. Hogan auditor for the AAA stated that we could expect to receive a few checks within two weeks time. There will be due some four hundred thousand dollars into the county in the next few weeks. We cannot say that we will get the checks on time. However, we will begin to look for subsidy checks in the near future. Notices will be mailed to those who receive checks as they come into this office. Likewise, a list of checks as they arrive in the office will be posted for the convenience of those who come by the office between mailing time.

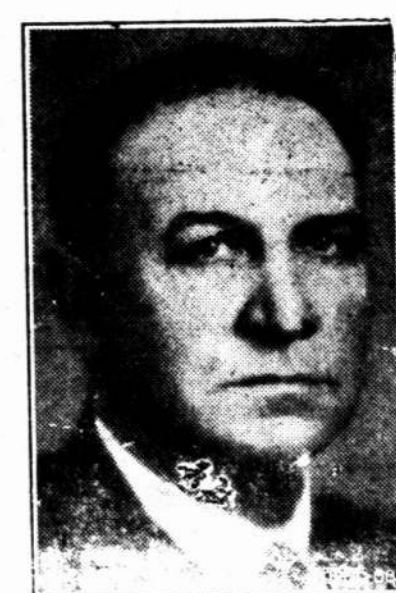

Texas Game Laws Given For The Protection Of Wildlife

1938 Federal Migratory Bird Regulations as prescribed by the United States Department of Agriculture and approved by the President.

Waterfowl
The 1938 season on waterfowl, including Wilson's Snipe or Jacksnipe and Coot shall be November 15 to December 29, both dates inclusive.

The hours of hunting waterfowl, coot rails and gallinules, Wilson Snipe or Jacksnipe shall be from 7 a. m. to 4 p. m., standards time.

The use of live decoys will not be permitted. Baiting will not be permitted.

Under Federal law, all migratory waterfowl hunters who are over sixteen years of age are required to purchase and have in their possession, a Federal Duck Hunting Stamp. These stamps are sold at \$1.00 each at Post Offices. A person must write his signature in ink across the face of the stamp, but it is not absolutely necessary that the Stamp be attached to the State Hunting License. Each stamp shall expire and be void after the 30th day of June next succeeding its issuance.

There is no open season on Ross' Geese, Wood Duck and Swans.

Bag and possession limits on Migratory Waterfowl are as follows:

Ducks—(Except Wood Duck and Swans)—Ten in the aggregate of all kinds, of which not more than 3 of any one, or more than 3 in the aggregate, may be of the following species: canvasback, redhead, buffhead and ruddy; and any person at any time may possess not more than 20 ducks in the aggregate of all kinds, of which not more than 6 of any one, or more than 6 in the aggregate, may be of the following species:

Canvasback, redhead, buffhead and ruddy.

Geese and Brant—(Except Ross' Geese)—Five in the aggregate of all kinds, and any person at any time may possess not more than 10 in the aggregate of all kinds.

Sora—Fifteen, and any person at any time may possess not more than 15.

Coot—Twenty-five, and any person at any one time may possess not more than 25.

Wilson's Snipe or Jacksnipe—Fifteen and any person at any one time may possess not more than 15.

September 1 to November 30, both dates inclusive—Rails and Gallinules—(Except Coot)—Fifteen in the aggregate of all kinds, and any person at any one time may possess not more than 15 in the aggregate of all kinds.

Dove—The 1938 season on mourning doves and whitewinged doves shall be as follows: In the counties of Yoakum, Terry, Lynn, Garza, Kent, Stonewall, Haskell, Throckmorton, Young, Jack Wise, Denton, Collin and Hunt, and all counties north thereof, and in the counties of Parker, Tarrant, Dallas, Rockwall, Kaufman, Johnson, Hopkins, Delta and Franklin, September 1 to October 31; in the remainder of the state, September 15 to November 15.

The bag limit shall be fifteen in the aggregate of both kinds, and any person at any one time may possess not more than 15 in the aggregate of both kinds.

The hours of hunting shall be 7 a. m. to sunset, standard time, on doves only. All migratory birds may be taken with a shotgun only, not larger than No. 12 gauge and capable of holding not more than three shells.

No migratory bird can be possessed more than ten days after the closing dates of seasons.

The federal regulations do not permit the use of a motor boat, sail boat or any craft or device of any kind towed by a power boat or sail boat. It is a violation to shoot doves or any migratory game birds from an automobile. A hunter may use a row boat as a blind for taking migratory waterfowl as long as there is no motor attached to the boat.

State regulations are same as Federal regulations.

The Brownfield road project has been approved by the Works Progress Administration and \$13,473.00 allotted for the first ten mile section for grading and drainage. The road is to be built in sections and this is the first section which will go to Punkin Center.

Actual construction will begin Friday, August 26th and will be pushed forward to completion as rapidly as possible.

The securing of right-of-way on this road is being secured right along and it is thought no serious trouble will be experienced in securing the needed land.

Present plans call for ultimate hard-surfacing of this road through Brownfield. Road enthusiasts of Lamesa and Dawson county have put forth much time and effort to secure this road, as it will not only give a near and direct route to Brownfield, but will furnish a much needed farm-to-market road for this section of Dawson county.

First they used running water to keep milk and butter fresh and cool. Then the refrigerators, then electricity and kerosene and gas. There are many different makes, that will keep food fresh and save expense. A 6-foot box can be operated as economical as a 5-foot. See that the shelves are not closer than 5 inches apart. Don't open too often and don't stack food so the air can't get around it. The glass bottles are best for your milk. The square dishes are better and all should be covered. Bananas can be kept in a big mouth one half gallon jar covered. Your milk should be in the coldest place underneath the ice chamber. Your meat next.
