Union Oil Will Drill Deep Test Near City

A 4000-foot test will be drilled by the Union Oil of California on a block of acreage approximately 4,000 acres, operations scheduled to begin within the next 30 days. The block of acreage begins a short distance west of the city.

The location will be somewhere southeast of the old Safety First well, which was drilled a few years ago and made considerable oil of a very high gravity.

The acreage is made up of land owned by the following: Dee Oliver, Mrs. W. E. Allen, B. F. Jones, M. C. Golden, J. F. Currie, First National Bank of Ft. Worth Farmers and Merchants State Bank of Ballinger, and Chas. Castor.

Smith Opposes Fee System of McNary Bill

NEW YORK, Aug. 3.—Governor Al Smith made it plain that he is absolutely opposed to an equalization fee as contained in the McNary-Haugen bill, but he does approve the principle of controlling the sale of surplus farm commodities and assessing the cost on the units benefited.

The governor laughed, but refused to comment, when informed that Colonel Theodore Roosevelt declared that George N. Peek, Illinois farm leader, misrepresented rather than represented the farmers.

CHINESE CLAIM OLDEST MAN IN WORLD AT 250; MARRIED 14 TIMES

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Married fourteen times and still happy and well at the age of 250 years, Li Ching-Yun, herbalist and traveler, is described by the North China Herald as "an old and respected resident of Shang-chuan village, Kailshien, a place to the north of Wanshsien, Szechuan."

Li claims that most of his friends, who are disciples of his mode of living, are nearly as old as he, according to the newspaper.

In spite of his years, it appears that Li is "young in spirit and physically strong."

"Born in the 17th year of the reign of Kang Hsi," the newspaper declares, "Mr. Li has traveled very widely. Numerous military and civil leaders have conferred honors upon him."

"When he was only a few years old he could read and write. Gathering medical herbs was his trade until he was 100 years old. After that he traveled again, selling his medicines as a living."

Li's fourteen marriages, it is declared, have vested him with 11 generations of descendants, numbering 180 persons. His eyesight is good, he has a wonderful memory and the gift of answering all sorts of questions, and the finger-nails of his right hand are the longest in his province.

Baltimore Park Keeps Calendar Date On Plants and Flowers

BALTIMORE, Aug. 3.—Baltimore has something new to "say with flowers"—it's the date.

The floral calendar is established in the city's downtown "sunken gardens" on St. Paul street, near the courthouse. Gardeners formed the letters of the month with blooming flowers. The date is "written" with potted plants.

At 5 a. m. long before official Baltimore migrates to the business district, two gardeners rearrange the plants forming the date.

Plants of the variety used to reproduce the "Tom Thumb" locomotive on the slope of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad's Mount Royal station, are used in the city's calendar of flowers.

King George Approves War Outlaw Pact

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Royal approval for the American anti-war treaty was given by King George in a speech from the throne this afternoon, proroguing parliament. The king was not present when the speech was read.

Road Machinery Will Be Bought

AUSTIN, Aug. 3.—The highway commission in executive session today approved recommendations of the purchase of \$500,000.00 worth of road machinery and equipment. Bids were submitted to the board of control for awarding contracts. It was not disclosed when the board will make awards.

FRENCH WAR BRIDES REGAIN CITIZENSHIP

PARIS, Aug. 3.—Fifteen thousand Frenchwomen who married foreigners took advantage of the opportunity to regain citizenship in France during the year accorded for this privilege which expires on August 10.

Officials said that 15,000 was a small proportion of the Frenchwomen who lost their nationality through wedlock, particularly in view of wartime romance where it was estimated more Americans won brides in France than soldiers of any other allied nation.

War brides automatically became American and, according to officials, they apparently are content to remain Americans.

French obstacle was removed from the path of aliens-by-marriage who wished to enjoy again the protection of the tri-color. The law permitting this went into effect on August 10, 1927. The women were required only to file a declaration expressing their desire to become subjects of France again.

With the expiration of the law French-born wives of foreigners will have no legal recourse to their native land if they should be left helpless through death, divorce or desertion.

Study Buying Habits of People to Figure Living Costs

BERKELEY, Aug. 3.—A man working at pick and shovel in the wide open spaces needs to earn only \$114 a month to support a wife, while the clerk in a "white collar" job must fork over \$160 every 30 days to keep the home fires burning.

These figures were revealed today by the Heller Committee for Economic Research at the University of California, which under the direction of Dr. Jessica B. Peixotto, has completed a survey of "buying habits" of persons in various classes of society.

The clerk will find it necessary to spend about \$642 a year for shelter and house operation and \$585 a year for food, the committee found. He and his wife will spend \$345 for clothing during the year and \$454 on miscellaneous items.

The laborer's budget, prepared on simpler lines, will require \$425 a year for food, \$199 for clothing, \$489 for shelter and house operation and \$335 for miscellaneous items.

NEW LONDON, Aug. 3.—Fred Stone, noted actor, was hurt today when the airplane in which he was flying tail-spun and crashed a hundred feet. Both of his legs were broken, it was understood, and he received injuries about the head.

Woman Slays Another And Takes Poison

WACO, Aug. 3.—Miss Charline Lawson, clerk in the office of the Times-Herald and News-Tribune, was shot and instantly killed by Mrs. B. O. Ashworth, wife of the cashier for both papers, here today. Mrs. Ashworth then drank poison and died immediately after she administered some to her daughter, Virginia, but the baby will recover, physicians said.

Mrs. Ashworth lived until she reached a local hospital.

Boy Scouts To Meet Tonight

A regular meeting of the local Boy Scout troop will be held at the Eighth Street Presbyterian Church tonight. This meeting is primarily an organization and classification session, as the boys applying for membership have not been assigned to troop units.

Thirty boys had registered when the last check was made, and it is believed that the enrollment will pass the 32 mark tonight, which is the maximum troop membership. Moves for the organization of other troops will of necessity be accelerated after this meeting, as the membership in the Presbyterian and First Christian churches troop will be too large. The ideal number of Scouts for a troop is 24, it is said.

The Baptist and Methodist churches will each sponsor a Boy Scout troop. Several Scouts in the present troop are members of these churches, but will be transferred to their respective church troops as soon as organization is underway.

Registration and preliminary tests will be the object of the meeting tonight. Parents are invited to attend.

Clock at Hampton Court Palace Stops When Some Great Dies

HAMPTON, Eng., Aug. 3.—For nearly two centuries the famous astronomical clock at Hampton Court Palace has stopped whenever a resident of the palace dies.

It ceased functioning recently within a few hours of the death of Lady MacGregor, who occupied a suite in the building, restarting some days afterwards.

"The Whale" Is Abandoned In Mid-Ocean

LONDON, Aug. 3.—Captain Frank Courtney's trans-Atlantic seaplane, the Whale, forced down by fire during an attempted Azores to Newfoundland flight yesterday, has been abandoned at sea, according to a radiogram from the liner Cedric to the Evening News yesterday afternoon.

Courtney and his companions are safe aboard the liner Minnawaska en route to New York. The crew of the Whale, in addition to Courtney, is composed of E. H. Hosmer, wealthy Montreal banker of the flight; Fred Pierce, mechanic; and E. W. Gilmore, wireless operator.

Scotch Music Festival at Banff On Aug. 31 Has Prince's Aid

BANFF, Alberta, Aug. 3.—The Prince of Wales has again given his patronage to the Highland Gathering of Scottish Music Festival in the Canadian Rockies, running here from August 31 to September 3. Initiated a year ago, this living pageant of Scotland's games, dances and folk-songs had from the start the support of the prince, and quickly established itself as an institution in the Canadian West.

Ralston, Canada's Minister of National Defence, who is honorary Patron of this gathering, the Highland Regiments of the Dominion will be represented by delegate pipers, and there will be additional pipers from other units of the Canadian Militia and from other pipe bands.

ROAD DEVELOPMENT
ADVANCES

Twenty years ago a good rock road for wagon and horse travel was considered the limit to improvement for this method of transportation. Today the bare rock road is fast passing into history as a suitable surface for modern traffic.

Pavements have been laid on tens of thousands of miles of rural highways. Where heavy state highways are not warranted, all gravel and macadam road beds are being surfaced with a two or three inch water proof coating of asphaltic concrete. This utilizes the well compacted old road as a base for an economical and efficient method of hardsurfacing.

Where even this second type is

not warranted, road oil is today being placed on thousands of miles of country roads. It has been found that this method of treatment against preserves the road base by preventing the blowing away in dust of tons of road surfacing, which, in addition to damaging the road, buries the neighborhood countryside in a coating of dirt which ruins thousands of dollars worth of crops.

And so the road improvements continue. Wider highways are superseding the narrower pavements and dust-proof highways are superseding the dust nuisances of a few years ago.

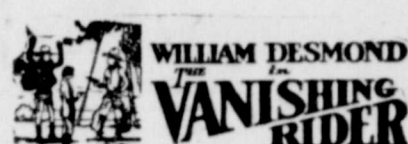

NEW GAME LAWS TO GIVE BETTER BIRD SHOOTING

WASHINGTON, Aug. 3.—An increase in the number of woodcock is expected as a result of new open season game laws for this bird, according to experts of the Biological Survey of the Agriculture Department.

Last year it was feared this fowl would become extinct, and a number of changes were agreed on for this year in the migratory bird treaty act. A general readjustment in federal seasons on the bird has resulted. Changes were worked out so that there would be a minimum of conflict with state laws, the Agriculture department declared. In most instances it has been arranged so

the woodcock seasons would open simultaneously with, or later than the state seasons on quail and other upland fowl.

The hunting period on woodcock throughout the country this year will be limited to one month. The new schedule for open season on woodcock is as follows:

Maine, Vermont and North Dakota; all of October.

New Hampshire, Massachusetts, Rhode Island and Connecticut, October 20 to November 19.

New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Indiana, Michigan, Wisconsin and Iowa; October 15 to November 14.

Maryland, District of Columbia and Missouri; November 10 to December 10.

Delaware, Virginia, West Virginia, Kentucky, Arkansas and Oklahoma; November 14 to December 15.

North and South Carolina,

Georgia, Alabama, Mississippi and Louisiana; all of December. Other changes in the bird treaty effective this year affect waterfowl in Massachusetts and doves in Georgia and Louisiana.

October 1 to January 15 will be established as the period for hunting waterfowl in Barnstable County, Mass., south and east Cape Cod canal, under the new provisions. This confronts with the open season in Dukes and Nantucket Counties.

The open season on mourning doves in Georgia extends from October 16 to January 31, conforming with the state season; a split season on this fowl will be established in Louisiana, from September 1 to 30 and from November 20 to January 31.
