The comfort of the groves that shadow the picnic parks at Lake Cisco is one of the most noticeable features of the place in late afternoon. Although the district sits rather low upon the little valley floor, under the sharp upswing of the hills atop of which are the Presbyterian encampment and the zoo, so that there seems little possibility for breeze to reach it, the shaded district is ordinarily so cool without wind that its very atmosphere is relaxing. Season by season the visible welcome of these parks gains appeal. Last night family groups were dotted among the trees, lunching at tables, swinging on the playground swings or riding on the see-saws, a community of pleasurable withdrawal from work into rest and play for which such a splendid opportunity is afforded here.

It is unfortunate that local people do not appreciate by their use the rare advantages for recreation that exist here. There is for every person a type of such activity best suited to that person's desires or needs. Whether it consists of quiet and reflective relaxation, picnicking, swimming, boating, fishing, hiking or so forth, the opportunity is here.

The new lights at the swimming pool increase the charm of the place as well as the utility of the system of illumination. Three silvered standards made of three-inch steel pipe support high above the head the dual lamps that spread a glow over the scene, floored with the rest-less glimmering of the dark water. On the island last night the Lobo band played tunes, reminding among the dark, light-starred trees and the moving waters, of stories that an old German immigrant used to tell of concerts by German bands in the gardens of the Fatherland.

These weekly concerts are popular. The space around the pavilion last night was crowded with cars and people who came to hear and see. These Thursday evening concerts by the band are instances in which this splendid organizations can well serve Cisco by attracting visitors here. Ere long, as the news of the regular programs is spread abroad, I have no doubt it will attract great numbers from other places who should like to wim in such an evening of melody and lights or sit among the thers listening.

Crowds Increasing For Sermon Series

The series of evening services being held each Sunday night on the lawn of the First Methodist church continues to draw increasingly large numbers. The weather has been ideal for the messages brought by Rev. Patterson and the lawn is more pleasant and cooler than the church house for the sermons.

DOCTOR HAD ENTERED CELL TO TREAT MAN

Charge of Murder Is Filed Against Comanche Man

PLAINVIEW, June 25 (AP)—Dr. E. F. McLendon, 69, pioneer physician and county health officer, was shot to death today by a prisoner he called to treat at the Hale county jail.

District Attorney Charles Dean said a murder charge would be filed against the man who said he was Henry Egbert King, 39, of Comanche.

Officers said the man, arrested in Petersburg last night, became violent early today when the doctor and two officers entered his cell. The prisoner struck Policeman Nath Burkett with a broomstick, grabbed Burkett's gun, and shot the doctor and slightly wounded Deputy Sheriff Bill Shook.

Ten of 19 Who Escaped Farm Now Recaptured

HUNTSVILLE, June 25. (AP)—The capture of three more of the 19 escapees of the Eastham prison farm, today brought the total back behind the bars to 10 and four were believed surrounded near Glen Rose after kidnapping a young couple and taking their car.

One of the kidnappers was believed to be Ringleader Bybee, and another Harry Roberts, robber of Throckmorton. Captured were: Clyde Brown, 26, theft, Rusk; Aaron Burleson, 28, San Antonio, 72 years for robbery; and Jack Sanders, 31, Dallasite, 20 years for robbery.

The four kidnappers tied up a nightwatchman and a mechanic at Covington and stole another automobile in addition to his own, Harold David, kidnapp victim said. The second machine stolen was wrecked.

BACK-TO-WORK MOVEMENT IS BEGUN TODAY

Dynamite Blasts Rip Up Railway Tracks at Canton, Ohio

YOUNGSTOWN, June 25 (AP)—Dynamite blasts boomed as back-to-work movement in the steel strike locked mills of Mohoning valley got underway after Governor Martin L. Davey of Ohio announced that the plants could resume operations under national guard protection.

President Roosevelt's mediation board planned to leave Cleveland after an unsuccessful attempt to settle the strike with an appeal for a "man to man" conference with steel corporation and unionist officials.

Miners peacefully picketed Bethlehem Steel's Cambria Works at Johnstown but the projected march of 31,000 miners on the city apparently had failed to materialize.

One dynamite blast ripped up the railway tracks in the northeast section of Canton, Ohio, and a Republic employee in the same section reported that his home had been bombed.

Russia Sent Arms to Spanish War. Say's Eden Today

LONDON, June 25. (AP)—British liberals and conservatives, clashing in the house of commons over German intervention in Spain, today heard Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden declare that Soviet Russia, as well as Germany and Italy, sent "very large" shipments of arms to Spain.

Eden joined Premier Chamberlain in urging a cool British attitude toward the Italo-German withdrawal from the neutrality patrol, saying they had not lost control of the plan yet and that retention of peace in Europe was not hopeless.

Meanwhile Italian and German warships strung in and out of the Mediterranean with British and French represented too.

Special Session of Legislature Ends

AUSTIN, June 25. (AP)—The house virtually ended its work of the special anti-gambling session by sending Governor Allred bills outlawing dog track betting and tightening statutes against bookies.

The session was scheduled to end at noon today.

COMM'N ADDS STRUCTURE TO CURRENT LIST

Probably Will Be Undertaken Following Completion of E. 8th

Construction of the overpass to carry the new route of Highway No. One on Eighth street over the Katy railroad—never in doubt since approval of the east end of the relocation project over east Eighth—definitely was assured today after the state highway commission yesterday ordered it added to the current grade elimination program.

The construction will be done with federal funds, but the state highway department has the disposition of the projects subject to federal approval.

The overpass probably will not be started until the paving of the east half of the new route over Eighth street is completed, but this work is expected to get underway within a few weeks, or shortly after the new fiscal year begins. The west half of the relocation already has been completed and is now in use.

The overpass, to be a beautiful structure of concrete and steel, carrying four lanes of traffic, will cost in the neighborhood of \$175,000. Its west approach will be shortened to descend from the apex of the curve over the Katy tracks, one block off D avenue, to join the street level some distance between the intersection with D, while the east approach will be lengthened over several blocks.

The grade will not violate federal engineering requirements that it be no greater than six per cent, however, and visibility will be great enough to insure safety.

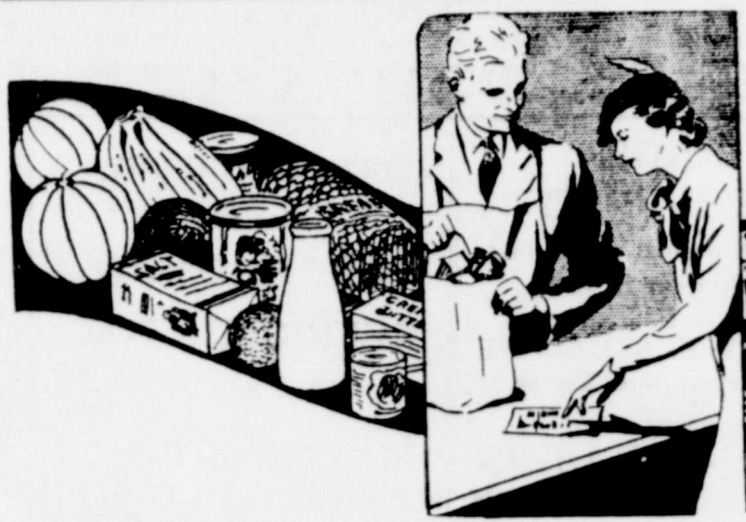

Shallow Well Forty Barrel Production

MORAN, June 25.—The highly productive Sedwick sand was tapped again last Thursday on the John Dennis lease for a 40 barrel initial production. This is one of the best shallow wells drilled here in a long time, and will in all probability create considerable drilling in the Sedwick field, especially in deepening old wells.

Judge John T. Cross of Fort Worth, who has the 240 acre Dennis block under lease, brought the well in. He topped the gas formation at 619 feet, and the bottom of the hole is 670, showing better than 50 feet of sand. This is the Sedwick sand, which yielded such rich dividends during the early 1920's on through the early '30's, and is still being produced on various leases. There are no wells immediately north of this well, which leaves considerable unproved territory there.

The Dennis well is in section 15, L. A. L., just east of the big Greer Mountain. There have been many producing shallow wells to the south of the mountains and on through the Sedwick territory, many of which will be deepened on strength of the Dennis well.

This well struck the gas formation last week, and by the middle of the week drillers reported a 30 barrel well. Cavings were removed, which stepped the production up to actual test Sunday of 40 barrels.

July Texas Oil Allowable Set At 1,385,476 Bbls.

AUSTIN, June 25 (P)—The railroad commission Thursday issued a new proration order fixing the allowable crude oil production for Texas on July 1 at 1,385,476 barrels.

The figure represented an increase of 35,214 barrels over the basic allowable for June and 10,376 more than the federal bureau of mines and estimated the national market demand would require from Texas.

The allowable production on June 17, however, was 1,407,652 barrels, having increased normally from the figure set at the start of the month because of new completions.

A statement by C. V. Terrell, chairman of the commission, which administers conservation laws in Texas, said that during the past 12 months Texas had underproduced the allowable 2 1/4 per cent. "That was occasioned by the natural decline in submarginal wells, together with shut downs for mechanical and physical difficulties causing wells to produce less than the allowable assigned them," he said.

The factor on which the allowable of the big east Texas field is computed, 2.32 per cent of the average hourly per well production, was not changed and was calculated to permit production on July 1 of 466,000 barrels, which compared with 462,000 on June 1 and 459,300 on May 1.

Scientists See Drive to Purify Air of Germs

BOSTON, June 25. (P)—Harvard scientists disclosed last night a concerted drive to purify, even as water supplies have been purified, what they described as the last great medium of human infection—the air.

They envisaged, should it be successful, a drop in the high rate, and deaths from, diseases entering through the nose and throat—such as the common cold, influenza, pneumonia, and many of the childhood diseases, including measles and diphtheria.

Their hopes are based on an application of ultra-violet ray, with which, if tests by medical science support their laboratory findings, they will be able to purify the air of the schoolroom, the public meeting place, the hospital operating theater and the isolation hospital.

William F. Wells, Harvard school of public health, said bacteriology has shown that organisms causing infections entering through the nose and throat, can travel upon the air from person to person. The laboratory, he continued, has demonstrated that, given the right conditions, the ray kills those organisms, when it hits them, almost instantaneously.

The intensity of the death ray which will destroy microbes in less than 60 seconds, Wells explained, has been found to have little or no effect upon individuals provided they do not gaze steadily at the light.

Mangum Area Is Being Mapped for Proposed Damsite

Howard McMahon of Austin, state reclamation engineer, arrived Monday afternoon in Eastland to check progress of a crew making a topographical survey for mapping of the proposed lake and dams site near Mangum, Eastland county, in the Leon river flood control district.

The work being conducted by the crew of the Texas reclamation department will be completed in a month or six weeks. The mapping was at the request of the directors of the Leon River Flood Control district of which Frank Sparks, Eastland, is chairman.

Land being mapped at two-foot contour intervals is estimated as covering 10,000 acres. The maps

will be given to the directors following the completion, according to McMahon.

McMahon, explaining the work, stated it served the purpose of bringing the project "into the office" of directors. From the mapping directors can formulate plans for the proposed dam and lake-site without leaving an office. Any engineer could design a project from the work now being conducted, said McMahon.

The ultimate goal of district directors is inclusion of the project in the federal government's list of water conservation and irrigation plans. The district, created by the legislature, is composed of Eastland and Callahan counties.

Pete Ball, technical assistant, is in charge of the mapping. He has four assistants.

The Texas reclamation department was created 27 years ago. It acts as a consulting engineering department in flood control work and levee work in Texas.

New Wells Provide Guam with Water

AGANA, Guam, June 25. (P)—B. V. McCandlish, governor of Guam, has solved a water supply problem that has baffled farmers of northern Guam since the days of Spanish occupation.

For generations they have caught the scanty rainfall behind dams and endeavored to make this water suffice for their crops as there are no streams in this section. In dry periods they laboriously hauled in water on ox carts. Believing there might be artesian water available, Governor
