## XEF ANNOUNCES PROGRAM TO BOOST HIGHWAY

### Motor Bus Of Air To Spread The Gospel Of "Borderway"

Sunday evening at 7:15 o'clock radio station XEF will offer the initial program in a series that will cover a period of six months advertising Highway 90 and the towns and counties in the Winter Garden district.

The entire program will be in the form of an imaginary bus trip along Highway 90, with a dialogue between the announcer, Russ Davis, and J. C. Nettis, secretary of the local Chamber of Commerce, explaining the points of interest during the journey.

This "motor bus of the air" is a new thing in broadcasting in this section of the country. Sound effects similar to those used in sound pictures will be utilized, such as the sound of the motor of the bus during the entire time to lend verisimilitude to the trip. All sound effects are recorded on records and used as appropriate times.

#### Musical Times

Sunday's program will be the beginning of the air journey from San Antonio, and opens with the announcer talking to Mr. Nettis about Highway 90. He tells Mr. Nettis that Al Clark and His Rovers a versatile orchestra, are beginning the trip from San Antonio to Van Horn along Highway 90 by bus and invites him to accompany them. The dialogue that follows Nettis' acceptance is an interesting bit of information which the motor bus of the air passes on its westward journey.

In addition to the dialogue telling of the points of interest, a varied musical program will be offered by Al Clark's orchestra. Each succeeding Sunday there will be given another stage of the journey until the entire trip to Van Horn and return has been completed.

The dialogue is under the direction of Russ Davis, who has done considerable research to collect his information on the points of interest along the famous highway.

A week from tomorrow the motor bus of the air is scheduled to arrive in Del Rio, and at that time the program will be devoted to the points of interest here.—Del Rio Evening News.

## TRAFFIC HELD BY HEAVY RAIN EAST OF HERE

### Rail Damage In Cline And Knippa Areas Now Repaired

Train service as well as highway traffic from the east was delayed from Friday of last week until Monday of this week due to the rains and highwater in the vicinity of Uvalde. Heavy rains that fell in that section of the country early Friday afternoon and Saturday morning washed out several miles of railroad track at Cline and Knippa, east of here between Del Rio and San Antonio.

Reports reaching from the winter garden section reveal that the damage there from high water will reach an enormous sum, much property being destroyed by the flood waters of the Guadalupe, Frio and Nueces rivers. Several lives have been reported lost in the Kerrville country and at Pearsall.

Saturday, as well as Tuesday, good rains fell here and in some places the rainfall was heavier than in others. In the rain received Saturday afternoon some damage was done to the Highway about five miles east of here while Sunday afternoon the rain that fell at Dryden threatened for a time to wash out railroad tracks and to damage the highway.

All water holes have been filled, creeks and draws ran Sunday as results of the rain near here that day.

Normal traffic has just about been resumed and the mail is now coming in regularly thus giving us contact with the outside country.

## HEAVY FINE TO RAISE PRICE ON ACCOUNT OF TAX

A fine of \$1,000 or imprisonment for one year, or both, can be assessed against dealers who raise the price of articles on the false ground that the articles are being taxed, according to announcement of the United States Internal Revenue Collector of Texas, who issued a statement at Austin saying the government could collect the fine and assess the imprisonment of those found guilty of raising prices on the false claim that the articles are taxed under the new tax law or other revenue bearing law of the government.

## Angelo Firms Sell 358,000 Pounds Wool

Three San Angelo houses Friday announced sale of approximately 358,000 pounds of 12 months wool. The highest reported price was 10 1-2 cents a pound.

The Texas Wool & Mohair Company sold a carload of wool, about 30,000 pounds, at from 9 to 10 1-2 cents, to George Devine, representative of Fore, Dupree & Sawyer, and another carload to Summer Willis, representing Walter Marston.

The Texas Stockmen's Supply Company sold 73,000 pounds of wool to Joe Walker, representing Thomas Wolstenholme & Sons Company, and to James A. Hill, representing Robert M. Pitt Company. Of this, 49,000 pounds brought from 9 1-2 to 10 cents while 24,000 pounds drew 7 1-2 to 8 cents a pound.

The second highest reported price was 10 1-2 cents a pound, the 70,000 Alwell Brothers clip going to F. J. Solis of Wright Brothers at this figure. At the same figure, Jeff Harkey of Sheffield sold Mr. Solis 16,000 pounds. The two clips were among the chief units in release of 225,000 pounds through the Wool Growers Central Storage Company.—San Angelo Morning Times.

## MARATHON BANK QUILTS BUSINESS THE PAST WEEK

### Deposits Are Guaranteed By Officials Of The Bank

The Marathon State bank, one of Brewster county's three financial institutions, is to liquidate its obligations and go out of business. It was announced here Wednesday by H. L. Hord of Marfa, the president. Depositors will be paid 100 cents on the dollar, it was stated, all deposits being guaranteed by the A. S. Gage estate, through an arrangement made by the bank officials and the estate management.

The announcement made by the officers and directors of the bank Wednesday is as follows: "The directors and stockholders of the Marathon State bank, in order to safeguard the depositors of the bank, have this day sold the assets of this bank to the estate of A. S. Gage, deceased, for a sufficient amount to pay each depositor and creditor 100 cents on the dollar. This payment to the depositors is guaranteed by the estate of A. S. Gage."

The Marathon bank was organized in 1909. It owns a modern banking house, which together with fixtures, is valued at approximately \$15,000, and showed deposits of \$64,000 in the last quarterly statement issued, and a capital and surplus of approximately \$32,000.

H. L. Hord of Marfa is the president and Earl Clark cashier. Directors are H. L. Hord, E. R. Holland, J. J. Roberts, Warren Henderson and Earl Clark.—Alpine Avalanche.

## Taxes Collected In June Amount To Large Sum

A sum of \$15,123.22 was the amount of taxes that were collected during the month of June as shown by the records of the Tax Collector, Lee Cook. Of this amount, \$1,592.12 was collected as school taxes while there was \$365.54 collected off the delinquent roll for taxes of 1930. Of the total amount of taxes collected about ninety per cent was from those tax payers who took advantage of the split tax.

The tax collectors office is now very busy closing up its books as the fiscal year ended June 30 and are making their annual reports. As soon as all reports are finished and approved the list of delinquent lands and lots will be published.

Tom Kent, who rooms at the McLymont home, was across the street at the Kerr Hotel Coffee Shop eating when he noticed an old sedan drive up in front of the house and a man get out and go in. About five minutes later the man walked out and departed in the car. Mr. Kent did not know whether the car was a Buick or Chevrolet and thought that it was some one that had driven up to the house to see the McLymonts. W. E. Sturman also saw the car and noticed that it did not belong here and stated that it was a Chevrolet, but he too did not give the matter a thought. It was sometime later that Mr. Kent missed his watch when Mrs. Kent asked him the time. All dresser drawers in the bed room of Mr. and Mrs. McLymont were ransacked as well as the clothes closet, but nothing else but the watches have been missed.

Soon as the robbery was discovered officers were notified and Mr. McLymont phoned Sheriff Hale at Alpine and Mr. Kent got in touch with Del Rio officers and filing stations in that city. Messages were also sent to officers at Fort Stockton and other places. Mr. Hunter deputy sheriff also notified Sheriff Whitler at Del Rio.

The car was headed east when it stopped in front of the home but chances are that it turned around and went west.

## WHAT THE NEW TAXES MEAN

A recent Associated Press dispatch from Washington gave an interesting insight into what the new revenue bill will mean to the wage earner.

A married business man with one child, having a net income of \$6,000, will pay an income tax to the Federal government of \$124 as against \$23.63 in the past. If he buys a \$600 automobile he will have to pay a new tax of \$18 plus 60 cents for taxes on tires, etc. If he uses 700 gallons of gasoline during the year and 30 gallons of lubricating oil, he will pay a tax of \$8.20, in addition to state gas and oil taxes. If his wife gets a \$200 fur coat the tax will be \$20.

If he makes home brew he will pay about \$3 in taxes on malt. His wife's perfumes powder, etc., will cost another \$3. If he buys a \$75 radio and pays \$100 for an electric refrigerator, the taxes will be \$3.75 and \$5, respectively. He will pay increased taxes on cameras, electricity, matches, the telephone and a hundred other commodities and services. If he spends \$2 a week for shows and movies, the Treasury will get \$10 from him by the end of the year.

His total direct taxes will be about \$310, as against about \$174 under the old rates—an increase of \$236.

It looks as if the new bill will fatten a depleted Treasury—but it's going to make a deep hole in the public pocketbook. And these taxes are only a beginning unless definite steps are taken to curb the expense of government, the cost of which increases like compound interest as the number of public employees grows.—Industrial News Review.

## ON TEXAS FARMS

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Heralding poultry profits in days of eight-cent eggs is not exactly popular writing. Yet so many poultry demonstrators working with county and home demonstration agents are making small profits that the truth might as well be told. Here's a typical one: Q. Rhoden of Conroe, Montgomery county, has 127 hens that averaged 18 1-2 eggs each per month for the first six months of the poultry year for an average monthly profit above feed cost of \$19.65 for the flock.

Hogs, too, are down, but not 36 club boys of Taylor county who are building self-feeders out of scrap lumber for 10 cents apiece, from which their hogs will be fed for killing, curing and selling from the farm under a trade mark the boys are devising.

Interest in a few good sheep to each farm is taking hold in Red River county where the county agent reports an importation of a few registered Hampshire bucks and ewes. A buck circle similar to bull circles is planned for breeding up the grade flocks.

## Texas Industrial Activities

The Schroeder-Young refinery at Pilot Point will have a daily capacity of 500 barrels of crude oil with 1,000 barrels possible by only a slight chance. It will turn out gasoline, kerosene, engine oil and road oil, using the crude from the nearby Denton County field.

Valuable asphalt deposits have been found in Anderson County, according to a Palestine dispatch. A company is being formed to use the asphalt in the making of dyes, analysis showing the mineral to be particularly rich in chemicals essential to the dye industry.

Texas hardwood is on its way to Oporto, Portugal, the shipment of a carload of Texas hardwood lumber being made from Mount Pleasant.

The Ranger Fruit and Truck Growers Association canner is being operated on full time and a considerable increase is expected in this season's total over last. The Smithville Chamber of Commerce has set up a small canner for use of farmers in that community.

The Mount Pleasant plant of the Texas Milk Products Co., handled nearly 1,000,000 pounds of milk in April and exceeded a million pounds in May.

### RECIPES AND MENUS

By Department of Home Economics

DENTON, July 7.—The buffet luncheon offers an excellent means of entertaining a large number of guests where the time, space and maid service are limited. Such a form of service also simplifies the entertainment since grouping may be made with a view of mutual interest of the individuals.

The main-course foods are placed on a large table and two friends assist by serving the meat and salad. The guests serve themselves to other dishes. Guests are then seated at card tables in groups of four. Rolls may be served from the large table or may be passed by maid after guests are seated.

A menu which lends itself easily to this type of service: Chicken a la king in bread cases, buttered green peas, potatoes creamed in half shells, buttered rolls, stuffed tomato salad, olives, coffee, cream, sugar, strawberry shortcake, mints, nuts.

## RECIPES

Chicken A La King: Cook until tender two small hens or one large hen. The time of cooking depends on the fowl; in pressure cooker only 45 minutes under 15 pound pressure will be necessary. Remove meat from bones and chop fine. Add this to a cream sauce.

Sauce: Scald 2 c of milk and add to a paste made by mixing 4 t butter, 4 t flour and 1 t salt. Stir well and cook in a double boiler for 15 minutes. Bread cases: Two pullman loaves, cut into slices 1 1/2—2 inches thick; outer crust is trimmed away, and a well made center of each piece. Brush with butter and toast.

Bread Cases: Two pullman loaves will be required for these. The bread is cut into slices 1 1/2—2 inches in thickness; the outer crust is trimmed away, and a well made in the center of each piece. A biscuit cutter may be used for this. The bread is then brushed over with butter and toasted on both sides in a medium oven.

Stuffed Tomatoes: Twenty ripe but firm tomatoes. These are stuffed with any desired filling such as cream cheese, or cucumber and carrots combined with mayonnaise dressing.

Creamed Potatoes in Half Shells: Ten medium sized potatoes are used. These are baked in the oven until tender. Cut lengthwise, remove potato from shell, season, beat until light, return to shells and brown slightly.

Strawberry Shortcake: 4 c flour, 8 t baking powder, 1 t salt, 2 T sugar, 2-3 c butter, 1 1/2 c milk. Mix dry ingredients and sift twice. Cut butter into dry mixture, and add milk gradually. Divide into 2 parts. Roll thin and cut into desired shapes, brush with butter, place on buttered tins and bake for 10-12 minutes in hot oven.

Cut or crush berries, sweeten to taste, and put between and on top of short cake. Top with whipped cream.

Mints: 4 t sweet cream, 5 drops of oil of peppermint, powdered sugar.

gar, coloring. Method: Sifted powdered sugar is added to cream until a soft consistency is formed. The coloring and peppermint oil are then added and thoroughly incorporated with cream-sugar mixture. More sugar is added until a stiff and somewhat dry consistency is obtained. It is then rolled into long rolls, 1-2—3-4 inch in thickness, cut into 1-4—1-2 inch pieces, and placed in the ice box to make firm and dry.

## Optical Tests In Davis Mountains For Observatory

Optical tests are being made in the Davis Mountains this past week under the direction of Dr. C. T. Mehlin, of the famous Yerkes Observatory of the University of Chicago, who are making observations preliminary to the location of the W. J. McDonald Astronomical Observatory of the University of Texas.

It is expected that the optical tests to be made by these astronomers will consume practically the entire Summer and at the conclusion of that period they will probably make definite recommendations as to the location of the observatory in Texas.

Under the term of the will of the late W. J. McDonald, Paris, the regents of the University of Texas became trustees of a fund which is now slightly in excess of \$540,000 "to be used and devoted for the purpose of aiding in erecting and equipping an astronomical observatory to be kept and used in connection with and as a part of the University for the study and promotion of the study of astronomical science."

The observers will pick out certain key localities, beginning with the regions about Austin, the Davis Mountains and El Paso, and will make a thorough study of every region that is likely to be desirable as a site for the observatory.

A few of the many climatic requirements are: lack of cloudiness, and excessive rainfall, day and night; lack of high winds and dust storms; a region where the sky is most transparent to ultraviolet light; a region or locality in which star images are steady; accessibility; proximity to adequate water supply and to facilities for securing electric service.

## INTERESTING FACTS OF TERRELL COUNTY

The following clippings were taken from the Saturday issue of the San Angelo Morning Times from its "Top of the Windmill" column which is edited by Sam Ashburn.

They say that Joe Kerr out Sanderson way, is smiling these days that last year the depression worried him, but this year he has forgotten it. Anyway cattle are as high now as they were this time last year.

Fedora is a town without inhabitants. Many years ago when Terrell county was part of Pecos county, promoters bought a section of land near Dryden on the Southern Pacific. They sold it out all over the United States, Canada and South America. More than 1200 people bought lots paying from \$1 to \$100 for them but the town still remains a collection of grass and blue sky.

The Big Canyon ranch, in Terrell county part of the property of the Dick Russell estate and one of the biggest sheep outfits in the country, will have an auction of sheep and cattle at a date reported here to be the first Tuesday in July. It is said that the measure is being taken to clear title of lien holders and to place the livestock under one lien, with the operation of the ranch not to be disturbed. The ranch, which sold part of its holdings several months ago to Alex Mitchell, is so called from the mighty canyon that runs its entire length. The ranch is believed to have about 10,000 or more head of sheep and many head of cattle and goats.

The Downie ranch property in Terrell county has been divided among the heirs and Mrs. Ed Downie, widow of the son of Charles Downie, has been visiting on the ranch this summer.

In the last few days Alex Mitchell of Sanderson has shipped about ten double deck cars of fat lambs; Lew Rust of Del Rio has moved out about 10 doubles; Earl Wilson of Del Rio about 6 doubles. At the prices of today a double deck of fat lambs brings in from \$600 to \$750 to the country.

Russell Menzies has sold and traded about 4000 of his yearlings

ewes. In some instances he has traded ewes for muttons, shipping the muttons to market.

Yesterday there was held at the Chandler ranch between Sheffield and Dryden, the annual picnic put on by Herman Chandler and M. H. Goode Jr. The picnic is held at the point where Independence flows into the Pecos. From Independence west the country is pretty dry.

## Goodyear Airship Passes Over City Last Thursday

The "Volunteer," western unit of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company's fleet of non-rigid Zeppelin-type airships, flew over Sanderson last Thursday, enroute from Akron, Ohio to Los Angeles. This ship was first sighted coming out of the east at about 1 o'clock p. m.

A note dropped by the pilot of the craft, Verner L. Smith, veteran airship man, revealed that the "Volunteer" is 140 feet long, 40 feet in diameter and contains 112,000 cubic feet of non-inflammable helium gas. The ship is powered with two 110-horsepower motors and has a top speed of more than 60 miles-per-hour.

The "Volunteer" was first placed in service at Los Angeles in 1929, but was shipped from Akron, Ohio to the coast city for assembly. The airship holds several flying records for craft of its type, as does Pilot Smith, in charge of the ship. Recently the ship made the first west to east crossing of the United States accomplished by a non-rigid lighter than air craft.

During the year 1931 the "Volunteer" flew 2,800 hours without an accident of any kind and during that period carried thousands of passengers on flights over points of interest in California and Arizona.

The flight to Los Angeles is being made by easy stages and each night the airship is moored to a portable mooring mast affixed to the top of a special bus. This bus, painted conspicuously in silver and yellow, passed through the city soon after the airship had flown over.

A ground crew of 12 men is making the trip over-land in the bus and two smaller cars. They assist in holding the ship on the ground after a landing and guard the craft while it is moored.

Pilot Smith is holder of the safety flying record for two different years. In 1929 he flew 1,107 hours without an accident of any description and in 1931 flew more than 1,300 hours without mishap, to improve his own record.

Ships of the "Volunteer" type have carried more than 80,000 persons without an accident resulting in injury or death to a single passenger.
