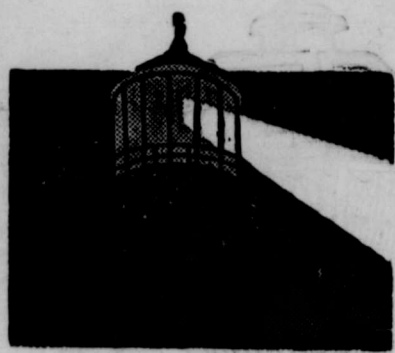




On The BEAM

Contract Bid To San Antonio Firm

A contract for 13.555 miles of construction on Interstate Highway 20, in Mitchell and Nolan Counties, has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, it was announced this week by the State Highway Commission.

Subject to the concurrence of the Bureau of Public Roads, low bid of Allan Construction Co. Inc., of \$2,382,971.81 on the project.

Grading, structures, flexible base asphalt, concrete paving, signing and delineation located 2 miles east of Lorraine, from Mitchell County line to 1.0 miles southwest of Roscoe and 12 miles east of Sweetwater is expected to take 440 working days, according to J. C. Roberts, District Highway Engineer, Abilene.

B. R. Wilkinson, resident engineer at Colorado City, will be in active charge of the project while it is under construction.
