School Bond Election Notice In This Issue

Official notice of the Robert Lee School Bond Election Dec. 19 appears in this issue of The Observer.

The proposal calls for a bond issue of not to exceed \$295,000 for construction of 16 classrooms, offices and an auditorium.

If approved, the bonds will be carried over a 25-year period at an interest rate of 3.235 per cent.

It appears that no increased tax rates or property valuations will be necessary to finance the bonds. Anticipated additional revenue from oil properties in the district are expected to carry the bond payments.

MOSE JACKSON, HOUSE MOVER DIES SUDDENLY

J. M. (Mose) Jackson, 60, former well known Robert Lee resident, died suddenly Tuesday at his home in San Angelo.

He had sat down to the dinner table with his wife, when he was stricken and slumped to the floor. An ambulance was called to rush him to a hospital but he was dead upon arrival.

The body was brought to Robert Lee in charge of Cliff Funeral Home. Services were held from the Baptist church at 3 p. m. Wednesday in charge of the pastor, the Rev. James C. Shipman. Burial was in the Robert Lee cemetery.

Pallbearers were Oliver Pittman, Edd Fiveash, Red Clupps, Chester Allen, Alton Roberts and Lenn Roberts.

James Moses Jackson was born April 20, 1893 in Brown County. In early manhood he came to Robert Lee and made his home for some time with the Summers family in Valley View community. He married Miss Ona Roberts in June, 1929.

For many years he was engaged in the house moving business and six years ago moved to San Angelo where the family resided in their own home at 906 East 23rd St.

He is survived by his wife and one son, James, at home. Also surviving are a brother, John Jackson, of Bronte, and a sister, Mrs. Annie Smith of Houston.

C. E. (DooDad) Davis continues as a patient at Coke County Memorial Hospital. His condition has not responded to treatment as well as was hoped for.

Marching Band Rates High In District Meet

The Robert Lee High School Band entered the Inerscholastic League marching competition Saturday in San Angelo and brought home a second division rating.

This was a fine showing for Robert Lee in that it marks the first time the local band has entered and at the same time rate so high in comparison to other bands of Class B. Second division is rated as excellent; first division as superior.

Other ratings given were Sonora, first; Wingate, Eden and Loraine each received third division.

Some of the judges comments on the local band were "a town of much larger size would be proud of this group" and "you could have done a lot better playing in pleasant weather." The band received "plus" in inspection, commands and discipline.

Highlight of the program was a talk given by Delbert Downing, manager of the Midland Chamber of Commerce. A number of guests considered it one of the best speeches they ever heard.

The banquet was served in the school cafeteria to 115 men, nearly half of whom were out of town guests of the BCD. A tasty turkey dinner had been prepared by ladies who are in charge of school lunches and freshmen basket ball girls served.

Robert Vaughan, president of the BCD, was master of ceremonies and E. L. Beulow of San Angelo, introduced the speaker. Musical entertainment was provided by Annette Simpson, Barbara Casey and Pete Delgado.

Downing, a native of Stephens County, is a tall friendly man with an optimistic outlook. He is a philosopher of the first order, and mixes humor with his remarks.

Progress will not eat up the small communities as long as people who live in them appreciate and use them, Downing told his audience here Thursday night.

Twenty-five years ago, said the speaker, there were 2,490 post offices in Texas. Last year, there were 1,950 post offices, indicating many communities have been absorbed by progress.

"Will Robert Lee or even Midland be next?" asked Downing. "They will not," he continued, "if citizens keep their towns strong and healthy and support them."

Downing also stressed three of the ingredients that make up a community: The school, church and home.

"The schools. How tremendously important they are. How many times the lack of schools have driven people away from a community."

The finished product of the American school system, Downing added, is a man, "who is tolerant — almost to the point of appeasement."

"You should try to improve your school any time you can," he speaker said.

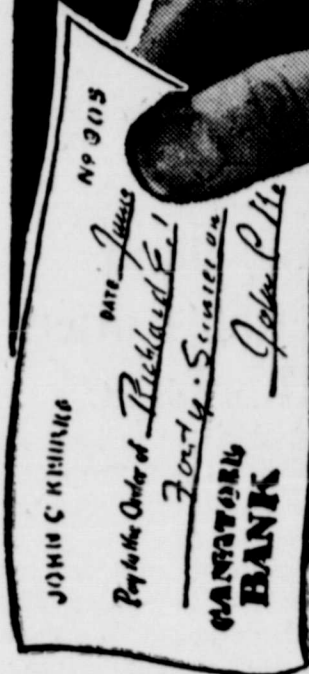

Notes From The Oil Field

New Producer On W. I. Tubb

The Jameson (Strawn) field of Coke County has been extended one location west on the west side with the completion of American Republics Corp. 1 W. I. Tubb for a calculated daily flowing potential of 245 barrels of 43 gravity oil plus two-tenths of 1 per cent water, with gas-oil ratio of 1,010-1.

The potential was based on an actual 19-hour flow of 196.60 barrels of oil through a 12-64 inch choke and perforations between 6,106-134 feet and 6,182-6,202 feet in 5½-inch casing cemented at 6,392 feet on total depth of 6,651 feet. Top of pay was picked at 6,058 feet on elevation of 1,963 feet. Pay section was fractured with 6,000 gallons.

Tubing pressure was 1,800 pounds, with packer on casing.

Location is in J. M. Norwood survey, Abst. 1285.

Wrather Finals Second Oiler In Wendland

J. D. Wrather Jr. of Midland and Dallas 1 H. G. Wendland, Coke County project located in Jose A. Guitierrez survey, 8½ miles southeast of Robert Lee, has been completed as the second well in the Wendland (Ellenburger) field.

The well was completed for a calculated daily flowing potential of 182.41 barrels of 51.7 gravity oil plus 15.44 barrels of water.

The potential was based on an actual 18-hour flow of 136.81 barrels of oil plus 11.69 barrels of water through a ¼-inch choke and pay section between 6,274-84 feet.

Cotton Control Vote Coming Up Tuesday, Dec. 15

The Cotton Referendum will be held Tuesday, December 15, 1953. It is very important that every eligible voter vote in this referendum. The polls will open at 8:00 A. M. and close at 7:00 P. M.

Farmers eligible to vote in the referendum will be those farmers who were engaged in the production of cotton in 1953 as Owner-Operator, Cost Tenant, Standing-rent or fixed rent tenant or landlord (other than a landlord of a standing-rent, cash-rent or fixed-rent tenant) or a share tenant or as share enant or sharecropper.

No cotton farmer shall be entitled to more than one vote in the referendum, even though he may have been engaged in 1953 in production of cotton on two or more farms in two or more communities, County or state.

In Texas the wives of eligible husbands or husbands of eligible wives will be entitled to a vote. No person shall be eligible to vote in any community other than the Community in which he now resides.

All producers in A and C communities will vote at the Agricultural building in Robert Lee, B community will vote at the City Hall in Bronte.
