Through The Editor's Specs

As gratifying as have been the big yield, the high quality and the good price for peanuts this fall, these are not the only encouraging facts confronting the peanut farmers of our area. And indeed they may not be the most encouraging.

As James Rutherford at the First State Bank pointed out this week, none of the peanuts brought to market in Rising Star were placed in government loan. All of them were sold to private industry.

What this means in terms of the peanut economy is substantially that the demand for peanuts supports the price paid. No tax money has had to be pledged, no artificial support has been needed to keep the price at a level where it is profitable for the grower. This is the normal supply and demand result, and bringing it about has been the objective of the price support program. That program of course, continues, but the fact that private industry needs the crop badly enough to pay a price equal to or above the support price indicates that the main cash crop of our area is on a sound economic basis and this is certainly encouraging in view of the efforts being made at Washington to have peanuts removed from the support program.

A great deal of credit must go to the support program in limiting acreage and otherwise regulating production. Credit is also due private business efforts in expanding the market for peanuts by encouraging new and great uses for the peanut.

The net result is that peanut production has a future and that brightens the future for our section.

Thursday of next week will be Thanksgiving, and as usual it will mean a long week-end of vacationing, visiting, going to ball games and otherwise taking time from the ordinary affairs of life to live it up a little.

Consequently the Thanksgiving season is one of the most hazardous as respects highway conditions in the whole round of the year.

So while you enjoy yourself during the happy season be thankful for life by being more careful of it.

Air Force Captain W. J. Honea, was on hand to present him with the citation accompanying the medal. Sergeant Honea received the award for meritorious service during his recent tour of duty at Tan Son Nhut AB, Vietnam. While assigned to the 377th Combat Support Group at Tan Son Nhut, the sergeant served with a second son, U. S. Air Force First Lieutenant Charles M. Honea.

Sergeant Honea, son of Mrs. A. O. Angel of May, Texas, is now supply inventory superintendent at Twelfth Air Force headquarters at Bergstrom. Captain Honea, an Air Force Academy graduate, is a pilot instructor at Laughlin AFB, Texas, while his brother, a former pilot with the 19th Air Commando Squadron in Vietnam, is receiving B-52 Stratofortress training at Castle AFB, Calif.

A 26-year service veteran, Sergeant Honea began his career with the U. S. Army Air Corps in 1942 and served in the European Theater of Operations during World War II. He is also a veteran of the Korean War.

This could be a most critical fire season for range and forest fires. We have a large amount of grass and vegetation this fall. Abundant rainfall during the growing season produced a large quantity, and since the frosts this vegetation is like a tinder box.

Especially will this be the case with low humidity and high winds during the Thanksgiving period when folks are cleaning up around the home for Thanksgiving.

Carelessness with trash burning around the house is a major cause of fires, particularly between November and February. Trash around the home should be disposed of in a fire-safe trash burner.

The peanut yields in the county continue to look very good. Several more farmers have told me their yields are the best they have ever made. Not only are yields high but peanuts are grading extremely high. I've heard of several dry land farms that averaged over 60 bushels per acre and irrigated farms that averaged over 90 bushels.

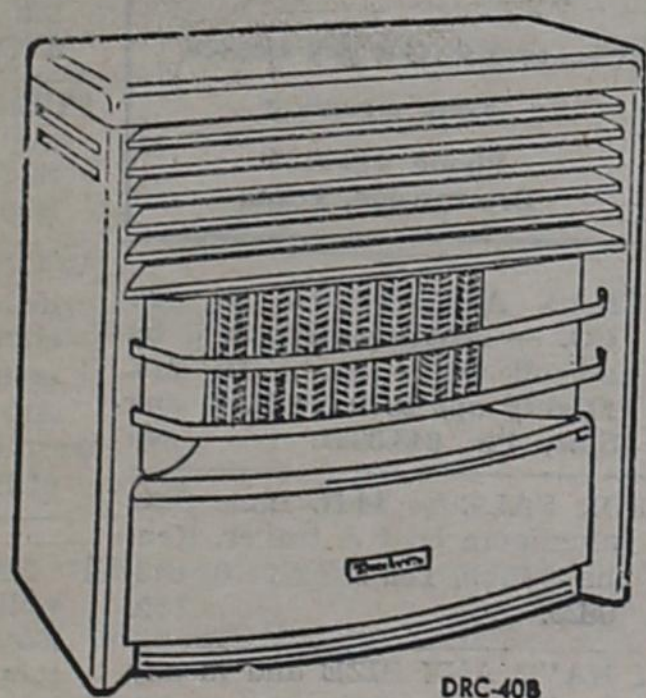
