Baughman Will Head One Section of Wildlife Meeting In Florida

J. L. Baughman, chief marine biologist with the Game and Fish Commission, of Rockport, will head a session on "Marine and Wet-land Resources" at the 17th North American Wildlife Conference, which convenes in Miami, Florida, next March. Papers for presentation at this conference should be submitted to the appropriate session chairmen as soon as possible, the Wildlife Management Institute announced today with the release of the names of the distinguished leaders who will preside over the meetings.

Anyone having a subject which he feels merits consideration at this international conference should contact the chairman of the most appropriate meeting. If that panel has been filled, the paper will be referred to the program committee for submission to another chairman. The Institute, sponsor of the annual North American Wildlife Conference, emphasizes that the program is not formulated on an invitation basis; it is composed of papers voluntarily submitted by the authors. There is no restriction on subject matter except that the papers must conform to one phase of the broad subjects outlined in the following agenda. Final selections will be made on the basis of importance, general interest, and timeliness of material. The Wildlife Society, as in the past, will plan the technical programs. Approximately 60 papers will be needed.

The 17th North American Wildlife Conference will be held next March 17, 18, and 19, in Miami's Municipal Bay Front Auditorium. The program will be built around the general theme: "Natural Resources—Your Security!"

The deadline for submitting papers to the chairmen is November 15.

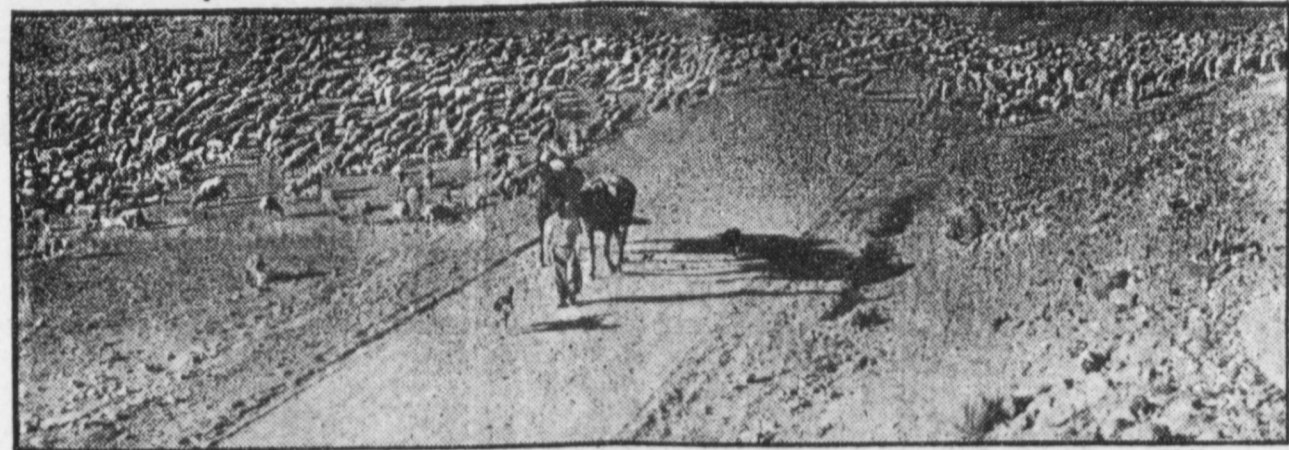
But a small boat from the state marine station in Rockport was able to tow the Garcita home.

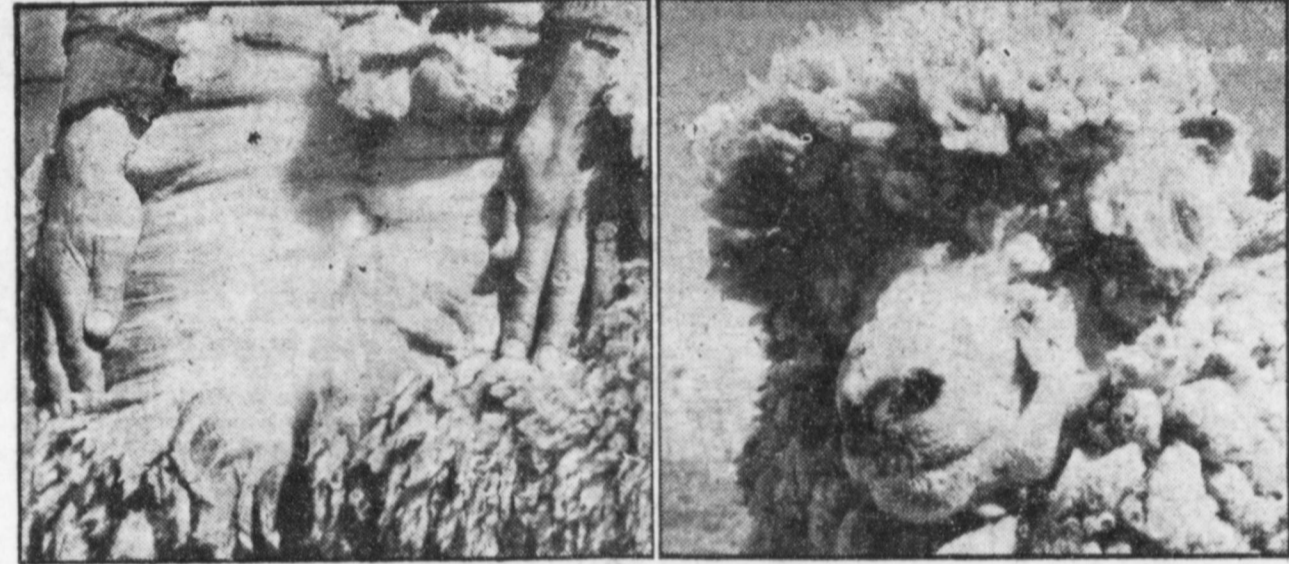
The Garcita was located near Dunham Island at the northern end of Aransas Bay. All personnel aboard the vessel were all right, plane and lifeboat crewmen reported.

Outboards to Race At Aransas Pass Sunday Afternoon

An estimated 100 boats will compete in the outboard races at Aransas Pass Sunday afternoon, Aug. 12. Sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce and the Outboard Boating Club of Corpus Christi, the sports event, first of its kind ever to be held in Aransas Pass, will take place in picturesque Conn Brown Harbor.

The land locked harbor, home of the large gulf shrimping fleet, provides an ideal setting for the races. From roadways, which all but encircle the harbor, thousands of visitors from their automobiles may get an unobstructed view of the boats over the entire route of the race. During the races, which are scheduled from 1 to 5 p. m., all shrimp trawlers will be moved from the harbor.

A booster caravan, publicizing the races, will visit in neighboring South Texas towns Saturday, Mrs. Esther McNeill, secretary-manager of the Aransas Pass Chamber of Commerce, announced this week. Towns to be visited are Ingleside, Gregory, Taft, Sinton, Beeville, Refugio, Woodsboro and Rockport.

School Bond Election Carries By 66-Vote Margin Tuesday

Third School Bond Election Carries By Substantial Margin In Three Polling Places In County

The Aransas County Independent School District bond election for issuing \$325,000 in bonds for the purpose of building a new school plant, which was held Tuesday, Aug. 7, carried by a margin of 66 ballots, according to unofficial reports of election judges.

The polling place at the Rockport school house showed 159 votes cast for the issuance of the bonds and 138 against.

Equalization Board Raises Valuation

Aransas County commissioners, acting in the capacity of an equalization board, met Monday and Tuesday mornings with the oil, mineral and utility interests of the county and raised the total valuation of representative companies. The increased valuation in the county about to \$1,250,000 over last year's valuation.

Tuesday afternoon the equalization board of Aransas County Independent School District met with representatives of the mineral, oil and utility interest and arrived at a complete agreement on the valuation of the various interests. S. F. Jackson, T. C. Kelly and James Jarboe composed the equalization board.

Lamar Wildcat Sets Pipe; West Fulton Has New Prospects

A St. Charles Bay wildcat in Aransas County was setting pipe Saturday, an Aransas Bay wildcat has reported some show and in the new West Fulton Beach Field, one well was completing and another had good shows.

Sun Oil Co. No. 1 St. Charles State Tract 387, wildcat 2 miles southeast of Lamar, recovered fish lost at 9,744 feet and was setting 7-inch pipe around 6,280 feet, where the well had kicked.

Humble Oil and Refining Co. No. 1 Aransas Bay State Tract 118, 1 1/4 miles south of Lamar, recovered sand and shale with gas odor on core at 8,353-68 feet, and was coring ahead below 8,396 feet.

Drillstem test was attempted at 8,262-97 feet, but had packer failure. Sandy shale with oil odor was cored at 8,300-13 feet, sand and shale with gas odor at 8,353-63 feet.

In the new West Fulton Beach Field, Phillips Petroleum Co. No. 11 Copano Bay State, in Tract 45, with some good oil and gas shows and was due to reach 7,820 feet (contract depth) by Saturday. This test is 1,320 feet north of No. 9 Copano, F-2 Sand oil discovery at 6,660-70 feet.—Phillips No. 12 Copano, also in Tract 45, had set pipe and was preparing to complete in Sand B-7.

In Salt Lake Field, Atlantic Refining Co. No. 6 V. G. Wynne was coring below 7,880 feet.

On the 20-minute test at 7,202-59 feet, recovery was 306 feet of oil cut with water cushion, 420 feet of pipe line oil and 310 feet of oil cut mud.

Mrs. Anderson is survived by six children, Mrs. Mabel Goodwin, Mrs. Annie Sheffield, Jess, H. A. and Charles, all of Welch, and John D. of Rockport.

Special Meeting Tonight Fulton Woman's Club

The Fulton Woman's Club will have a special meeting tonight (Thursday) Aug. 9, at the school house at 8 p. m. All members are urged to attend.

At the Fulton school there were 51 votes cast in favor of the bonds and 15 against; while in Lamar there were 12 ballots favoring the bonds and two against them, making a total of 222 ballots for the issuance of the bonds and 156 against. This is a majority of 66 for the issuance of bonds for building a new school plant.

The scholastic census in Aransas County has more than doubled in the last ten years. There were 202 pupils in the grade schools in 1940-41, and at the end of the May 1951 school term there were 605 grade school pupils in the county.

Last year the school board saw the need of a new school plant and called an election for Aug. 12, 1950, to issue \$425,000 in bonds to build a new high school plant and maintain the school plants then in use. This election was defeated by a margin of four votes.

Some patrons of the school presented a petition calling for another bond election for a \$425,000 bond issue on the same terms as the bond election held on Aug. 12. The trustees set Sept. 16, 1950, for the second election and the issue was defeated again on this date by a 47 vote margin.

This year the situation proved to be more serious than last year, so a mass meeting of school patrons was called for July 17, 1951, when architects drawings and plans of the tentative school building was presented and those present at this meeting expressed their views in regard to calling for an election to issue \$325,000 in bonds to be used for the school.

A petition was circulated calling for this election and the trustees set the date for Aug. 7, and the election carried.

This \$325,000 will be used to build and equip a new high school plant, add two class rooms and an office to the Fulton elementary school building, build a bus garage and remodel the home economics building and repair the present high school building.

The school board plan to start actual work as soon as legal formalities are met. Work will start on the Fulton school plant immediately and will be rushed to a speedy completion.

The trustees have received a notice from the State School Agency accepting their request to pay off all the bonds now held by the agency, without waiting for them to mature. By paying this \$31,000 now, a considerable amount of interest will be saved.

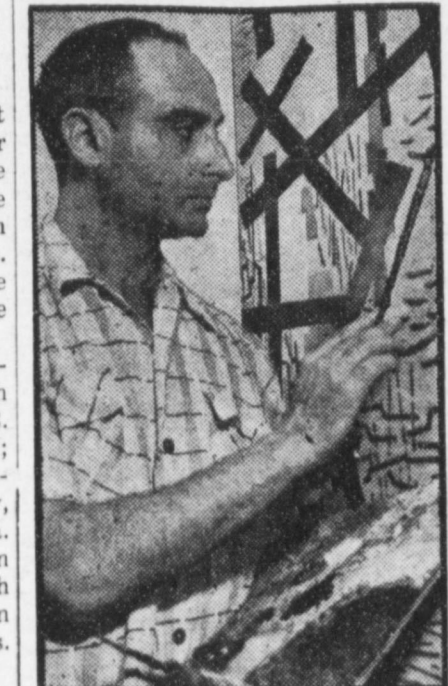

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 6

Proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas amending Article III, Section 51a, providing that the Legislature shall have the power to provide assistance to and provide for the payment of same to residents of the State of Texas who are needy aged persons over the age of sixty-five (65) years, needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; needy children under the age of sixteen (16) years; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollars (\$35,000,000) limitation upon expenditures for such purposes and providing for a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) upon such expenditures; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; prohibiting payment of assistance after disposition of property under certain conditions; providing for the acceptance of financial aid from the Government of the United States of America for such assistance; providing that the payment of such from State funds shall never exceed the payments from Federal funds; providing for the necessary election, and providing for the form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 51a of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended, and the same is hereby amended so that the same shall hereafter read as follows:

"Section 51a. The Legislature shall have the power, by general laws to provide, subject to limitations and restrictions herein contained, and such other limitations, restrictions, and regulations as may by the Legislature be deemed expedient for assistance to, and for the payment of assistance to:

"(1) Needy aged persons who are over the age of sixty-five (65) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application; provided that the maximum payment per month from State funds shall not be more than Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month.

"Any applicant for or recipient of assistance, including the spouse in each instance, who shall dispose of any property after June 1, 1952, and any person who initially applies for assistance after June 1, 1957, who has disposed of any property within five (5) years prior to the date of application, shall be ineligible to receive assistance; provided, that if such property was disposed of by bona fide sale and conveyance, and for value commensurate with the actual market value thereof, such disposition shall not affect eligibility for assistance if it be shown that all proceeds from such sale have been used by such person and spouse for normal living expenses, or for the purchase of other real property of like value. If any recipient of assistance or spouse shall sell any real property, neither such recipient nor spouse shall thereafter receive assistance until all net proceeds of said sale have been expended for normal living expenses; and in case of disposition of such property by gifts or for an amount less than its actual market value, such person and spouse shall not thereafter receive assistance until the expiration of the period of time during which the net proceeds of said sale would have paid their normal living expenses had the actual market value been realized therefrom.

"(2) Needy blind persons who are over the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that no such assistance shall be paid to any inmate of any State-supported institution, while such inmate; and provided that any resident of the State, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for five (5) years during the nine (9) years immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance including the one (1) year continuously immediately preceding the filing of such application.

"(3) Needy children who are under the age of sixteen (16) years; provided that any child, if otherwise eligible, may not be excluded who has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the filing of the application for such assistance, or, if said child is under the age of one (1) year, whose parent or other relative with whom the child is living has resided in the State for one (1) year immediately preceding the birth of such child.

"The Legislature shall have the authority to accept from the Federal Government of the United States such financial aid for the assistance of the needy aged, needy blind, and needy children

as such Government may offer not inconsistent with restrictions herein set forth; provided, however, that the amount of such assistance out of State funds to each person assisted shall never exceed the amount so expended out of Federal funds; and provided further that the total amount of money to be expended out of State funds for such assistance to the needy aged, needy blind and needy children shall never exceed the sum of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year.

"Should the Legislature enact enabling laws and provide an additional appropriation hereto in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such Acts shall not be invalid by reason of their anticipatory character."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of Texas at the Election to be held throughout the State of Texas on the Second Tuesday in November, 1951, at which election there shall be printed on such ballot the following clause:

"FOR the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age; removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions: providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year.

"AGAINST the amendment to the Constitution giving the Legislature power to set up a system of payments of assistance to needy persons over sixty-five (65) years of age; to needy blind persons over the age of sixteen (16) years; to needy children under sixteen (16) years of age, removing the Thirty-five Million Dollar (\$35,000,000) limitation upon amount of State expenditures for such purposes; disqualifying persons who dispose of property under certain conditions; providing a maximum payment of Thirty Dollars (\$30) per month from State funds for old age assistance; providing for the acceptance and expenditure of funds from the Federal Government; providing that expenditures from State funds shall not exceed the expenditure from Federal funds with respect to any individual; and providing conditions as to residence within the State in order to be eligible to receive assistance; and providing a limitation of Forty-two Million Dollars (\$42,000,000) per year on State fund expenditures for such purpose each year."

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published and held as required by the Constitution and Laws of the State of Texas. c20

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 22

proposing an Amendment to the Constitution of Texas by adding to Article XVI thereof a new Section to be numbered 63, and authorizing the Legislature to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the several counties of this State; providing that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary, and authorized by the qualified voters of such county; providing the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein; and providing that administration of said system may be committed to the same body set up to administer the statewide municipal retirement system authorized under Section 51f of Article III; providing for the calling of an election and the publication and issuance of the proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding thereto a new Section, to be numbered Section 63, which shall read as follows:

"Section 63. The Legislature shall have the authority to provide for a statewide system of retirement and disability pensions for appointive officers and employees of the counties of this State under such a plan and program as the Legislature shall authorize; provided, that participation therein by counties shall be voluntary and shall first be authorized by

vote of the qualified voters of such county; provided further that the Legislature shall not be authorized to make an appropriation to pay any retirement or disability benefits authorized herein. Administration of such system may be committed to the same body as may be set up to administer the municipal retirement system provided for by Section 51f of Article III."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors at an election to be held throughout this State on the second Tuesday in November, 1951, and at said election the ballots shall have printed thereon the words:

"FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees," and

"AGAINST the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees."

Each voter shall strike out one of said clauses on his ballot, leaving the one unmarked which expresses his vote upon the proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the foregoing proposed Amendment published as required by the Constitution for proposed amendments thereto.

Sec. 4. If at said election, a majority of the votes are "FOR the Constitutional Amendment authorizing a statewide system for retirement and disability pensions for appointive county officials and employees" the foregoing proposed Amendment shall become Section 63 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, and proclamation shall be made by the Governor thereof. c20

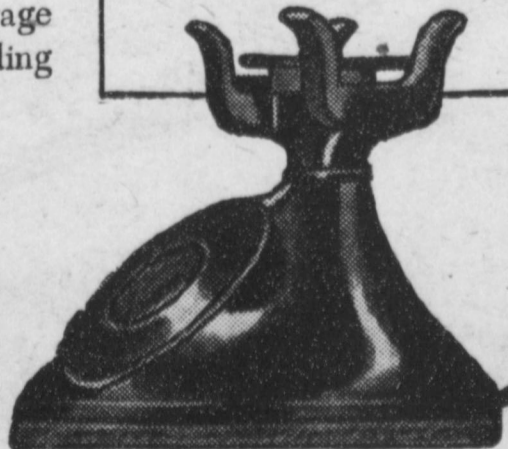
