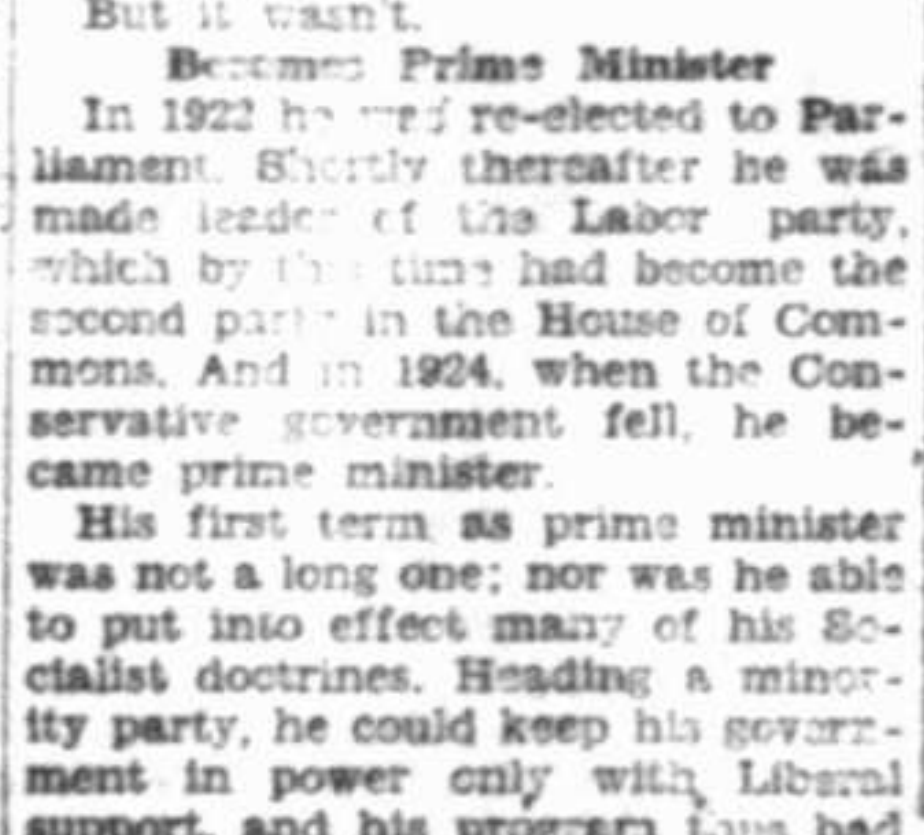

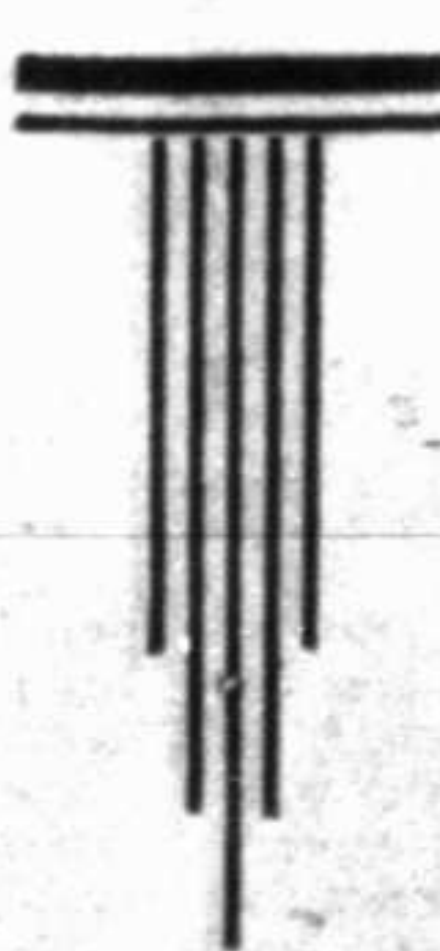

Slatonites Will Attend Services For Anton Today

Score Santa Fe Officials Plan to Go to Las Vegas For Funeral of Former Slaton Railway Head

(Special To The Avalanche)
SLATON, June 11.—Arrangements were being completed here Monday afternoon for about twenty local Santa Fe officials to go to Las Vegas, N. M., for the funeral Wednesday of J. Fred Anton, New Mexico division superintendent of the Santa Fe, who died early Monday at the company's hospital in Clovis, N. M., as a result of injuries received June 3 in an automobile accident near Fort Sumner, N. M.

Included in the Slaton party to attend the funeral were G. L. Miller, George Marriott, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Kline, W. B. Jones, Mr. and Mrs. C. W. Taylor, and others. J. A. Gillies, Slaton division superintendent, found it impossible to attend the funeral.

Anton Widely Known
Mr. Anton was superintendent of the Slaton division from August 10, 1920, to April 1, 1927, when he was transferred to the superintendency of the New Mexico division, with headquarters at Las Vegas. While on the Slaton division, Anton was widely and popularly known throughout the South Plains. He was a member of the Slaton Rotary club, took an active part in civic affairs and his family was socially prominent here.

When the Wort Worth and Denver railway company began its fight to build a line into the South Plains region, Anton was a star witness for the Santa Fe in hearings conducted by the Interstate Commerce Commission.

It has been rumored that Anton was slated to become manager of the Orient lines, recently purchased by the Santa Fe.
Mr. Anton was born on May 23, 1885, at Hager, Va. At the age of fourteen he began his railway career with the Baltimore & Ohio. He served in capacities of yard clerk, yardmaster, switchman, engine foreman, night yardmaster, general yardmaster, assistant trainmaster, trainmaster and division superintendent. He became connected with the Santa Fe in 1906. While superintendent of the Slaton division, the town of Anton, Hockley county, was founded and named for him.

Youth Wounded By Customs Inspector

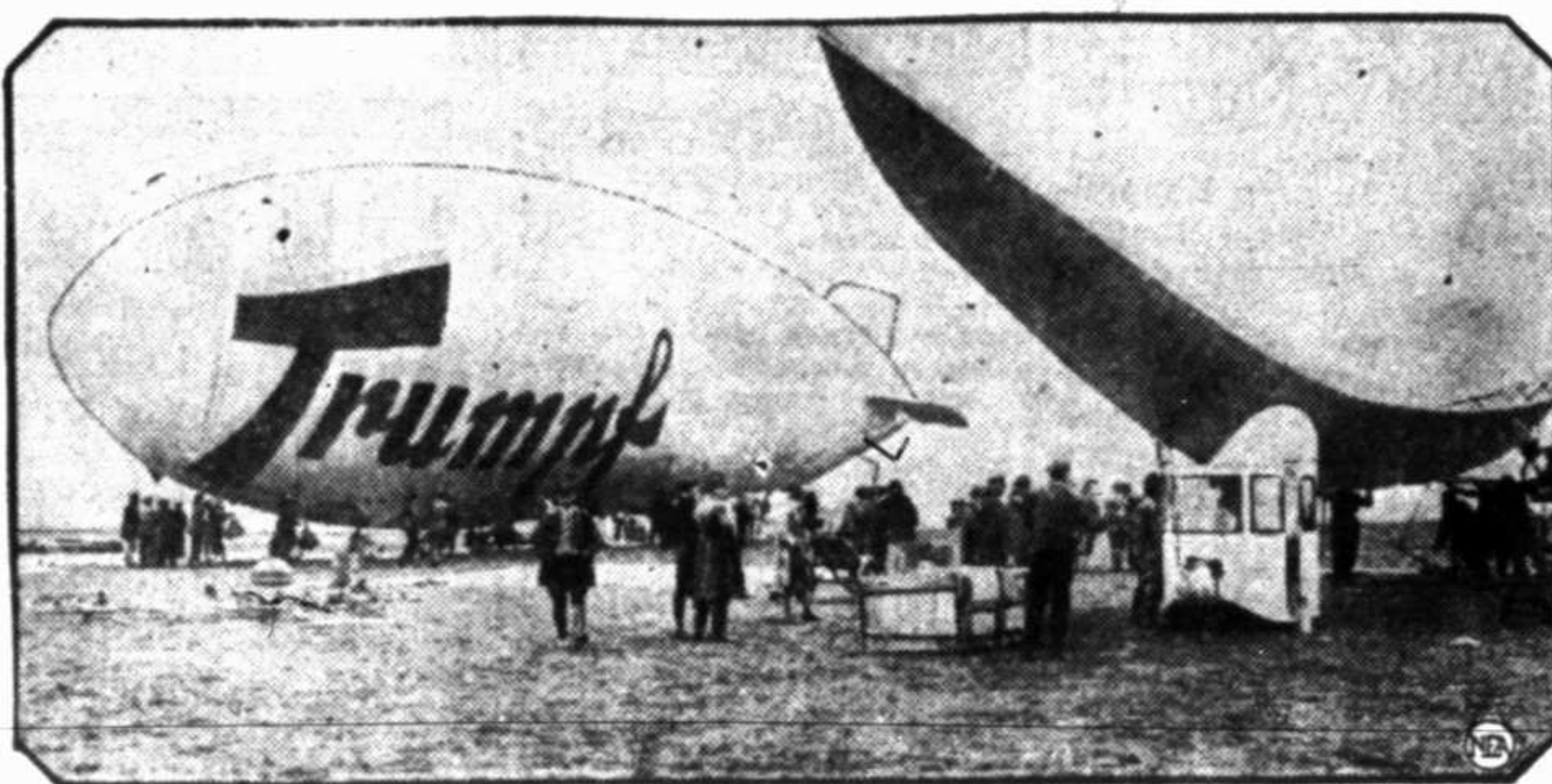

Mallick said he was walking behind Eugster when the youth was shot and saw a man wearing a custom officer's cap appear from behind a bush.

Two Theatrical Stars Plunge Down Into Darkness That Know No Dawn

NEW YORK, June 11. (AP)—Two stars that had been some time sliding downward along the theatrical firmament had plunged into the darkness that knows no dawn today.

Margaret Lawrence and Louis Bennington were dead, with bullets through their hearts, and all that remained of two careers that once held such high promise was the routine business of officialdom, autopsies and inquests and investigations.

Miss Lawrence, who had spent more than half her 40 years on the stage, was under equity suspension for "walking out" on a play in which she was being starred. Bennington had been replaced as leading man in a play that opened tonight because he failed to attend rehearsals.

Appeared Together
Their last appearance on the boards had been together in a vaudeville sketch in an untimed theater, and the sketch had proved unsuccessful. Miss Lawrence had weathered the setbacks of recent months at least financially for police found almost \$1,000 in her rent house apartment but Bennington was known to be without cash a few days ago having borrowed a dollar from a Lamb's club bellhop. For the last month the talented comedienne and the movie cowboy who rose to stardom in the stage had lived in the actress' apartment.

Bennington had a wife and daughter in California, and a brother engaged at a movie studio there.

The commissioner pointed out that since 1920 the annual fire loss in the United States had been approximately \$500,000,000 annually.

He placed the annual death list at 15,000.

The recent Cleveland disaster in which 124 persons were killed was mentioned by Mr. Deweese, who said the Texas fire insurance department was devising plans to guard against such tragedies in Texas.

Early Season Pitching Of Star Hurlers Disappointing

Many Club Aces In Major Leagues Having Bad Year; Larry Benton And Irvin Hadley Fail To Come Through

"You Never Can Tell When a Bad Year Is Coming Along" Is Borne Out by Failure of Big Guns To Hit Stride This Season; Donohue Another

NEW YORK, June 11.—There seem to be a number of crack pitchers near the bottom of the pitching averages just now who bear out a statement once made by Walter Hoyt—"You never can tell when a bad year is coming along."

Hoyt, whose major league pitching record is one of rare consistency and efficiency over a number of years, pointed out before the current campaign got under way that any one of a number of pitchers who were counted on to win at least 20 games might prove disappointing.

"It wasn't any particular man that he singled out. It seemed to be more a case of what has happened in previous years and what could very easily happen again."

There's my case, he said. "I've had two good years in a row now. I won 22 games for the Yankees in 1927 and 23 in 1928, but that isn't any reason to believe I will again. Of course, I expect to win plenty, but there's no telling when a bad year is coming along."

In this conversation he pointed out the bad year George Uhle had after winning 27 games in 1926 and what followed from Charley Root of the Cubs in 1928 after he had won 26 games in 1927.

Manager Jack Hendricks of the Cincinnati Reds based his pre-season predictions for the spot the Reds would finish on the excellent pitching performances he expected of Pete Donohue.

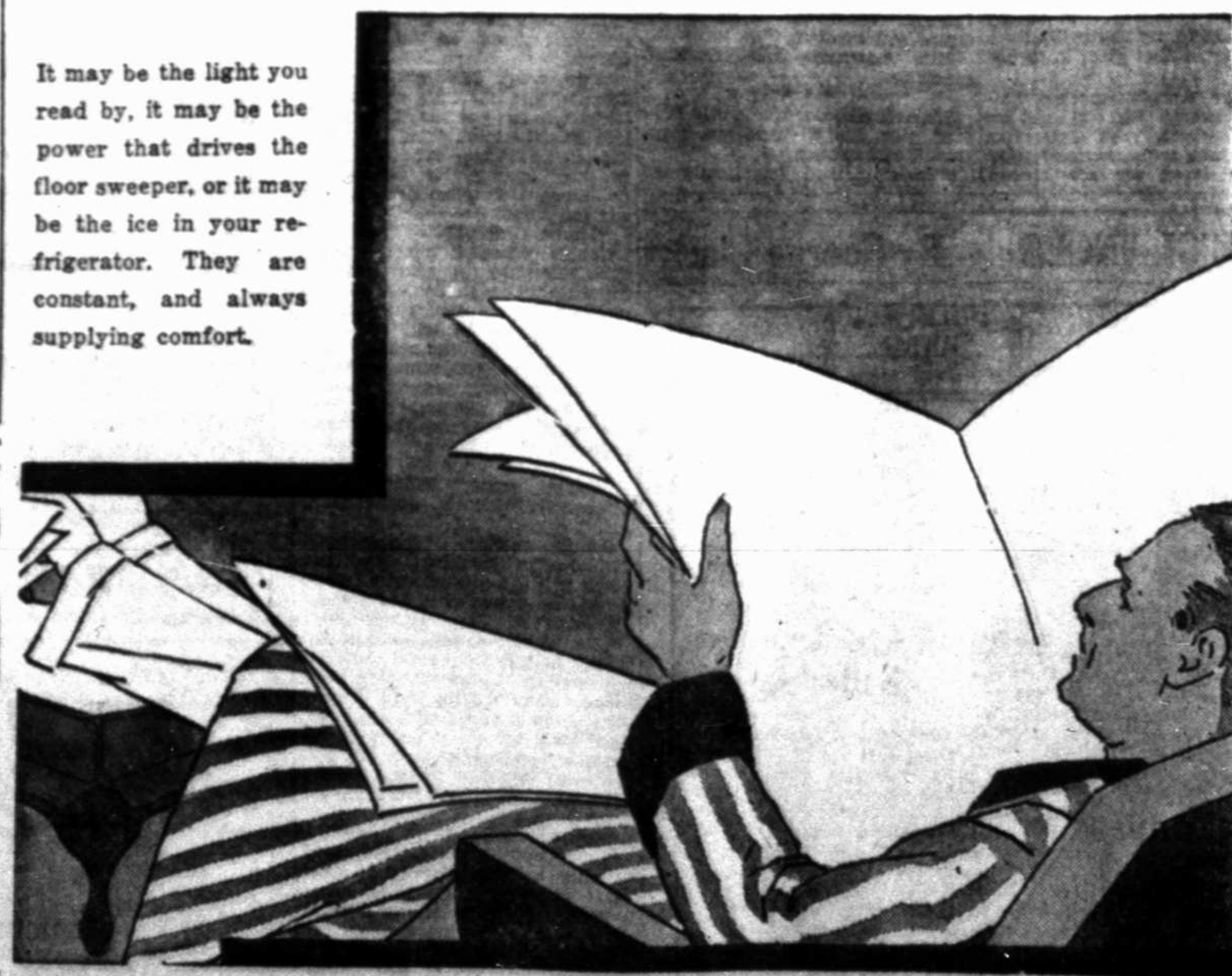
