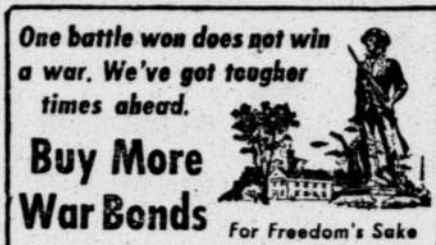

Group Endorses Move To Set Up A Soil Conservation District In Dawson County

H. S. Goss, field representative of the state soil conservation board, conducted a hearing in the district court room in this city Friday, which was reported to be well attended and enthusiastically received.

This hearing was granted after petitions were signed by 75 to 100 farmers requesting that the soil conservation board hold such a hearing, in order that a soil conservation district could be set up here.

Goss spent some time in explaining the state soil conservation law which was written by 93 Texas farmers and was adopted by the 47th Legislature of Texas in their regular session, and is known as the state soil conservation law.

Under this law, the state is divided into 5 state soil conservation subdivisions. From each of these, a farmer and landowner is elected to represent his subdivision on the state soil conservation board. The County Judge of each county is authorized to appoint the representative from each precinct in his county to the county soil conservation board. These representatives meet and choose 1 of their number to represent their county at a district convention where they meet in convention style and elect representatives to the state soil conservation board.

The Dawson County member to the board recently moved to Oklahoma, and an election must be held to select a new state member.

In order to organize a soil conservation district, landowners must first petition for a hearing. A representative of the state board is to conduct the hearing, and if there is sufficient interest and need for a district to be set up, the state soil conservation board authorizes the county agent as a machine for holding an election. At this election there must be a good representative vote of landowners, and 2-3 of those

Ohio Pupils Get Lessons the Easy Way—By Movies

COLUMBUS, O. — Ohio school children see more movies in classrooms than those of any other state.

More than three-fourths of the 1,250,000 pupils and students in Ohio's public, private and parochial schools and universities see their lessons illustrated by motion pictures and lantern slides, B. A. Aughinbaugh, supervisor of the slide and film exchange of the State Department of Education, estimates.

The Ohio slide and film exchange is the world's largest library of pictures and lantern slides. The Motion Picture Herald, publication of the Hollywood movie industry, credited the Ohio exchange in 1942 with handling more films every day than ten theatrical exchanges handle in a week.

The exchange, which Aughinbaugh values at \$1,000,000, has films on nearly 10,000 subjects.

Ohio school children see their U. S. history lessons in movies which depict events from the discovery of America to MacArthur's landing on Luzon.

Titles of films and slides in the exchange range from "Robin Redbreast," a popular feature with first-graders, to "Einstein's Theory of Relativity," from "Choosing Your Vocation" to "Lincoln in the White House."

The motion picture's classroom competition with the textbook began almost 18 years ago when the State Department of Education pioneered in visual education methods.

"Ten years ago we shipped five or six films and slides daily to Ohio schools; now we ship an average of 800 daily," Aughinbaugh said.

Movies and slides from the exchange are distributed to one-room schools and universities alike and are used by schools in every city, county and village in Ohio, Aughinbaugh says.

Cost of the exchange and its operation is paid not by taxpayers or schools but from the Ohio film censor fee charged to Hollywood motion picture producers. Films and slides are distributed free to Ohio schools from kindergartens to universities on a loan basis. Schools borrow films and slides from the exchange as they would borrow books from a library.

Schools and colleges buy their own projectors and movie equipment. School systems in Cincinnati, Youngstown, Akron, Dayton, Cleveland, Toledo, Elyria, Lorain, Springfield and other cities now have their own film libraries to supplement the movies borrowed from the exchange.

"I expect each teacher some day will have films on her desk the same as textbooks," Aughinbaugh says. "Seeing is natural — no child need be taught to see a motion picture."

Aughinbaugh looks forward to the time when a motion picture becomes as compact, portable and convenient as a book. He says:

"The motion picture awaits development of a cheap, practical viewer for the individual by which he will see the motion picture as he now is able to see the 2-by-2-inch lantern slide — by looking through the picture rather than viewing it on a screen. "It will be the final stage of evolution of communication since man began drawing pictures on a cave wall."

No Wrinkle On Fighting Gophers

It's a tough problem if the American farmer can't solve it. When gophers moved into an alfalfa field belonging to Horace Graham of the Locket community, Wilbarger County, it seemed to be up to him to control their operations because the state rodent control force isn't always available. Gophers, if you don't know it, work under ground and the damage they can do to grass is plenty. Alfalfa is too valuable as a feed for livestock to allow the rodents to have freedom of a field.

Mr. Graham, who was familiar with the approved control method of placing poisoned food in their runways for the gophers to come to it, decided to improve it and send the poison to them.

County Agricultural Agent Frank Wendt describes Mr. Graham's lethal set-up thus: He reduced the exhaust on his tractor to three-quarters of an inch to increase the pressure, and attached to it a 10-foot flexible hose commonly used on a washing machine. He finds the gopher run by probing with a small iron rod and then inserts the hose. With the tractor motor running at normal speed the pressure sends the exhaust fumes 60 to 75 feet through the runways in about two minutes. The fumes mean instant death to gophers wherever they penetrate, Wendt says.

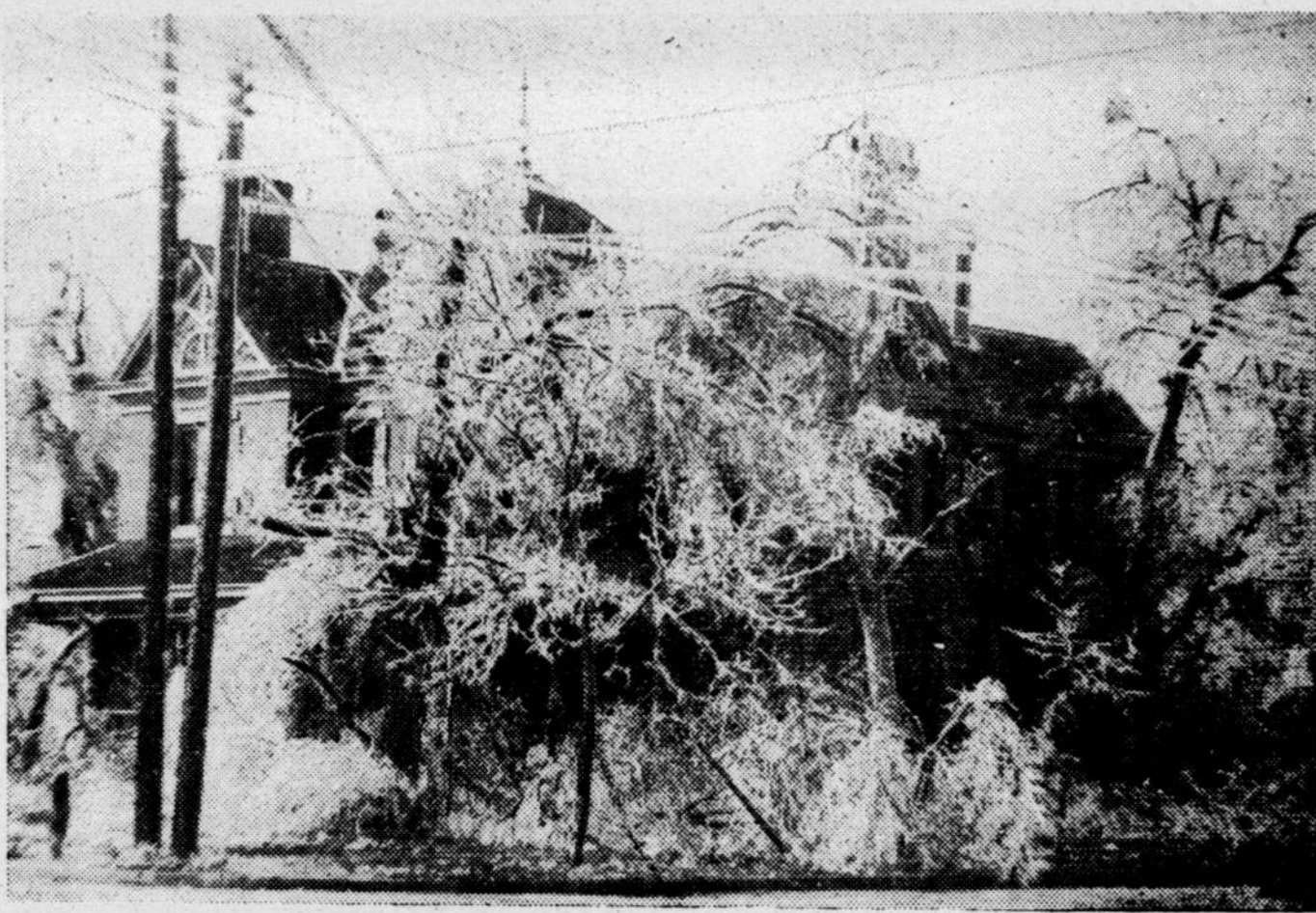

PLAN DAIRY FEED PRODUCTION NOW

The demand for milk and milk products will be at the highest level this year. An adequate supply of the right feeds is the simplest means of obtaining the production needed, says County Agent T. A. Barfield. Planning the feed crop before planting, he adds, insures a better and bigger supply for the dairy herd and more economical milk production.

As a guide to planning the home-grown feed, G. C. Gibson, Dairy Husbandman for A. & M. College Extension Service, suggests the following as the minimum feed requirements for an average dairy cow for one year: Hay, one ton. If no silage is provided, two tons will be needed; silage, three tons; concentrates, one ton, 500 pounds of which should be protein concentrate; and one to two acres of temporary pasture. Acreage of temporary pasture needed will depend upon soil fertility and quality of permanent pasture.

Good pasture, Gibson believes, is the best and most economical source of feed for dairy cows. Temporary pastures should be planted as near cow barns as possible to save cows walking too far to grass and water. After providing for pasturage, dairy farmers should plan to produce all of the good quality hay and silage their herds will require. If the acreage is not large enough to produce all of the feed needed, Gibson suggests growing all of the hay and silage possible and buying concentrates.

"High quality roughage not only

reduces the need for concentrates," says Barfield, "but lowers the protein content of the concentrate mixture required."

Only hay and silage crops which will yield the largest amount of digestible nutrients per acre should be planted. Silage is the best substitute for pasture and all dairymen should provide silage for their herds. Silage will maintain production during the summer when pastures are dry, and during the winter when little pasture is available.

Africa Is Short Of Houses, To

AP Newsfeatures

JOHANNESBURG—South Africa's housing shortage is acute and many Europeans in large cities are forced to live in garages and other unsuitable structures without sanitary conveniences.

Aggravating the situation is the scarcity of business premises with many flats being used for tailoring dressmaking and so forth.

J. D. Briggs, chairman of the South African Labor Party, blames local authorities. Even before the war, when money, materials and labor were plentiful, they failed to undertake adequate housing schemes for Europeans and natives, he says.

Now the labor shortage is acute, but building speculators have been erecting houses at exorbitant prices while essential housing for workers is held up.

Several solutions to the labor shortage have been suggested. Dr. E. J. Hamlin, Johannesburg's city engineer, who has just relinquished the post of government housing director, said the position would be eased greatly if the government guaranteed full employment to the building workers for 10 years after the war, thus attracting more artisans.

Johannesburg's post-war committee, following a report by Dr. Hamlin, said the law should be amended to allow non-Europeans who are present are excluded from working in urban areas, to be trained for building homes for non-Europeans in specified regions. The building workers, who fear dilution of the European labor market if non-Europeans are trained, say they have no objection if non-Europeans are paid the same wages as Europeans.

Other observers said wages of about \$1 an hour make capital costs of housing prohibitive for non-European workers earning \$1.50 daily.

In the meantime the situation is rapidly becoming worse as men and women are demobilized from the defense forces. The government is busy converting empty army camps into garden villages to give some relief.

BORING BEETLES SQUELCH CHATTER

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Lead-eating beetles that gnaw on telephone wire covering at Camp Pendleton are driving husky Marine maintenance crews wacky.

The male beetle — *Scodicia Declics* by name — nibbles holes in the lead in which his wife lays her eggs. As the beetle gnaws, phone conversations become blurred and spluttery.

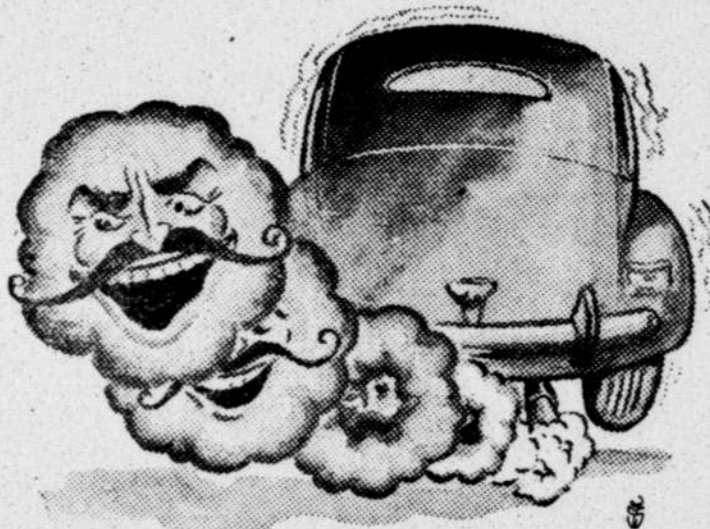

Homeaid: When To Call the Doctor

Fewer and busier doctors make it important to recognize symptoms that necessitate calling one or whether home remedies may be used instead.

The Farm Security Administration in its "Handbook of Health for Farm Families," approved by the U. S. Public Health Service offers the following simple suggestions that may serve in lieu of a doctor or until one arrives:

When you have a cold, go to bed the first day and keep warm. If you have a temperature stay in bed while it lasts. Drink plenty of water and fruit juices and eat light food. Gargle with warm salt water.

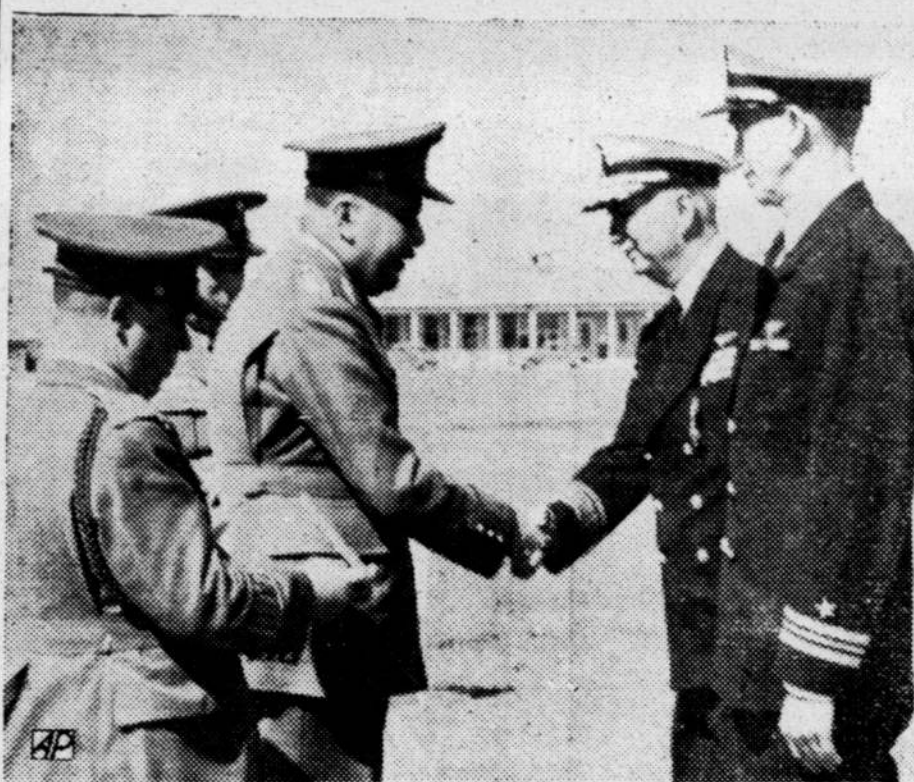

A stomach ache can be serious—if the pain lasts more than four hours see a doctor. In the meantime eat very lightly, omitting fried foods. Under no circumstances take a cathartic.

If head aches, lie down; apply heat, such as a hot water bottle, to the head. An aspirin tablet may help.

A small cut should be cleaned with soap and water and an antiseptic like fresh iodine or mercurchrome should be applied. Cover it with a clean bandage.

A doctor should be consulted when:

Any ailment does not clear up promptly.

There are severe injuries to any part of the body, especially to the head.

Rash or skin blemishes appear on the body.

Steady pain persists in the head, ears, eyes, back, joints or abdomen.

Diarrhea lasts more than a day or two.

Symptoms come on gradually and indicate serious chronic conditions, loss of weight or appetite.

There is unexpected bleeding from any part of the body.

A cough lasts longer than a week. Swelling or lumps appear in any part of the body.

Feet or ankles swell.

There is shortness of breath.

Sores don't heal promptly.

RICHMOND, Va. — Sportsmen can be thankful for the restoration of Virginia white-tail deer to their native mountains.

Virtually exterminated about 1900, the herds came back when hunters contributed money and won state and popular support for the program. There was an open season for the first time in many years in Augusta county in 1944 and the advisability of allowing shooting in nine other mountain counties in the near future is being considered.

The restocking program, begun in 1928, was greatly accelerated in 1936, continuing until 1943 with the aid of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service and National Forest Service. During the period 1783 deer were liberated on ranges carefully surveyed for food, cover and character of farm problems. The deer were liberated at 66 points in 23 counties, and have been allowed to increase naturally.

The potential increase from a pair of deer is 35 fawns in ten years. The sportsmen believe the state is well on its way to becoming one of the leading deer-hunting states of the union.

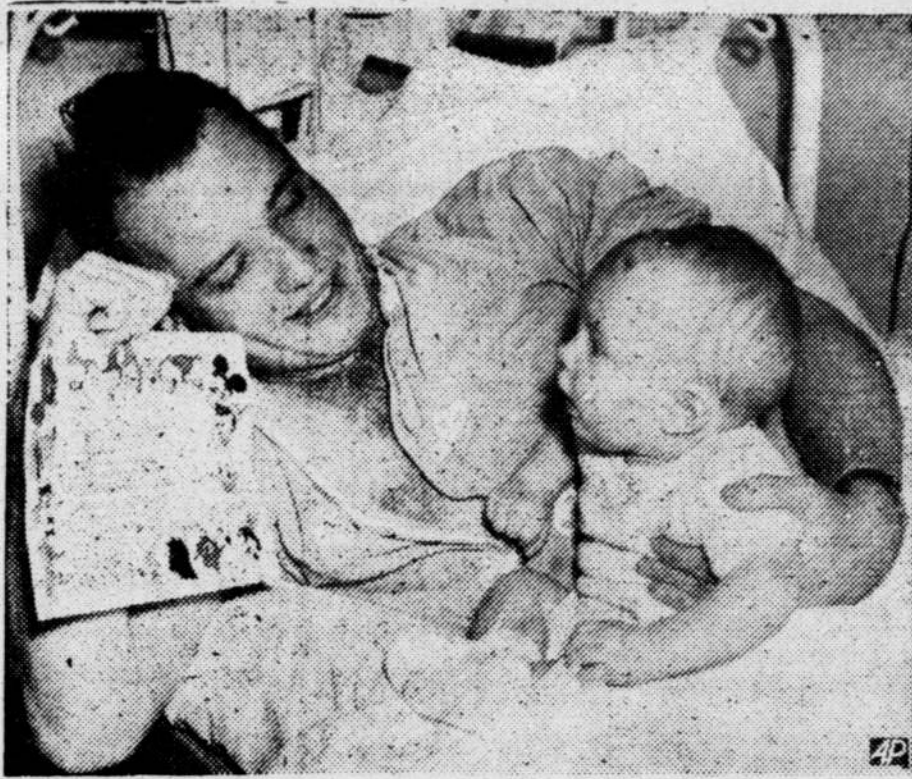

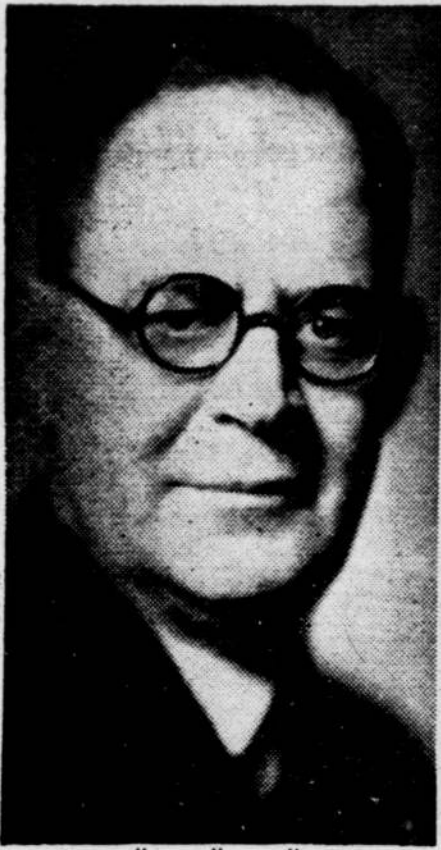

"His courageous action was in keeping with the high traditions of the armed forces of the United States."

The airman is a member of the 490th Bomb Group, which is a unit of the Third Air Division, the division cited by the President for its historic England-Africa shuttle bombing of Messerschmitt Aircraft Plants at Regensburg, Germany.

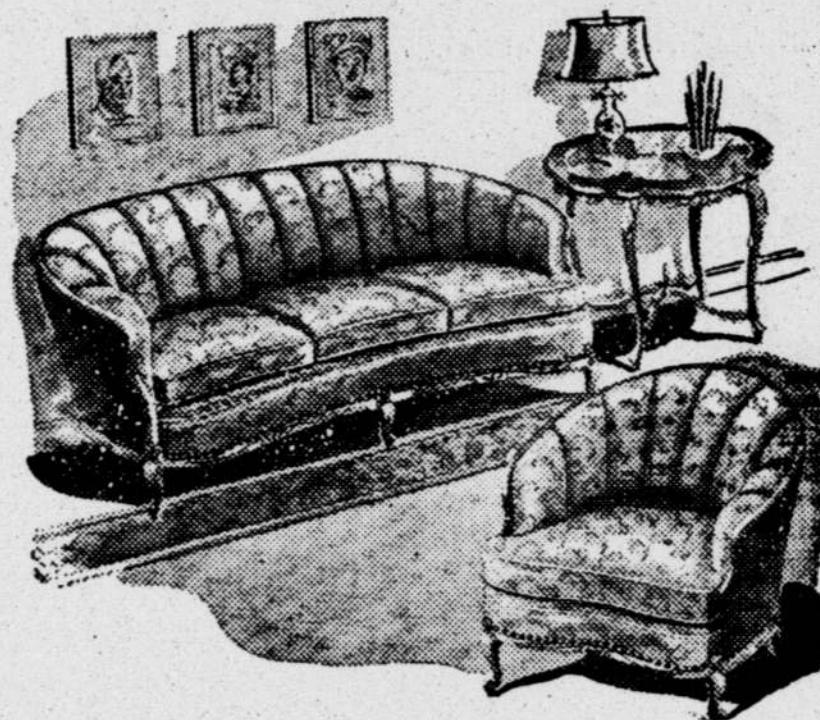

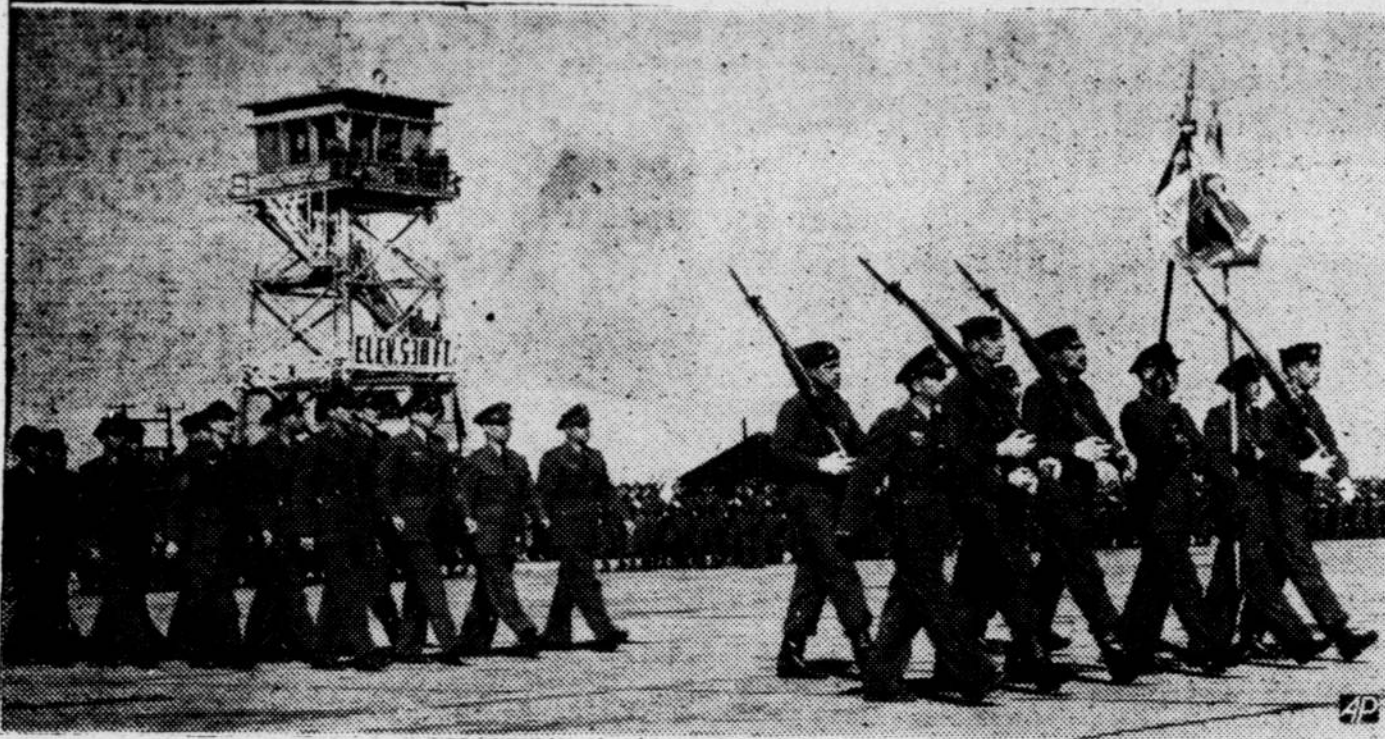

Powell Makes Good Living (For You) Breeding Flies

NEW YORK—John Powell raises flies. He also raises cockroaches, and sometimes throws in a milkweed beetle or two just to keep the score even. Eighteen years ago he caught the first couple hundreds of his assortment at a New York fish market, and they've been thriving ever since—except when he kills part of them off, which is every day of the week.

This crawly enterprise isn't a fly-by-night as it sounds. Powell is the head of an organization which manufactures raw materials for insecticides. In order to test the lethal ability of his products, Powell bumps off about 15,000 flies a day.

Five hundred at a time — all exactly five days old—are put into a 6x6x6 foot death chamber. The fly-killer being tested is squirted in through a spray that looks like the one the dentist uses when he's cleaning out a filling.

After the ten minute test, most of the flies are knocked out. Then the substance is blown out of the chamber, the insects are gathered up with a kind of hand vacuum cleaner and deposited in a screened box. There they are given a chance to fight for their lives, provided with sugar water for food and plenty of light, a census is taken, the corpses are gathered up and cremated in the laboratory oven.

Eighteen years of breeding flies under ideal conditions has produced a physical 400 of the fly world, usually husky and sturdy, Powell explains. But they're no smarter than your very own run-of-the-air houseflies. When Powell wants to

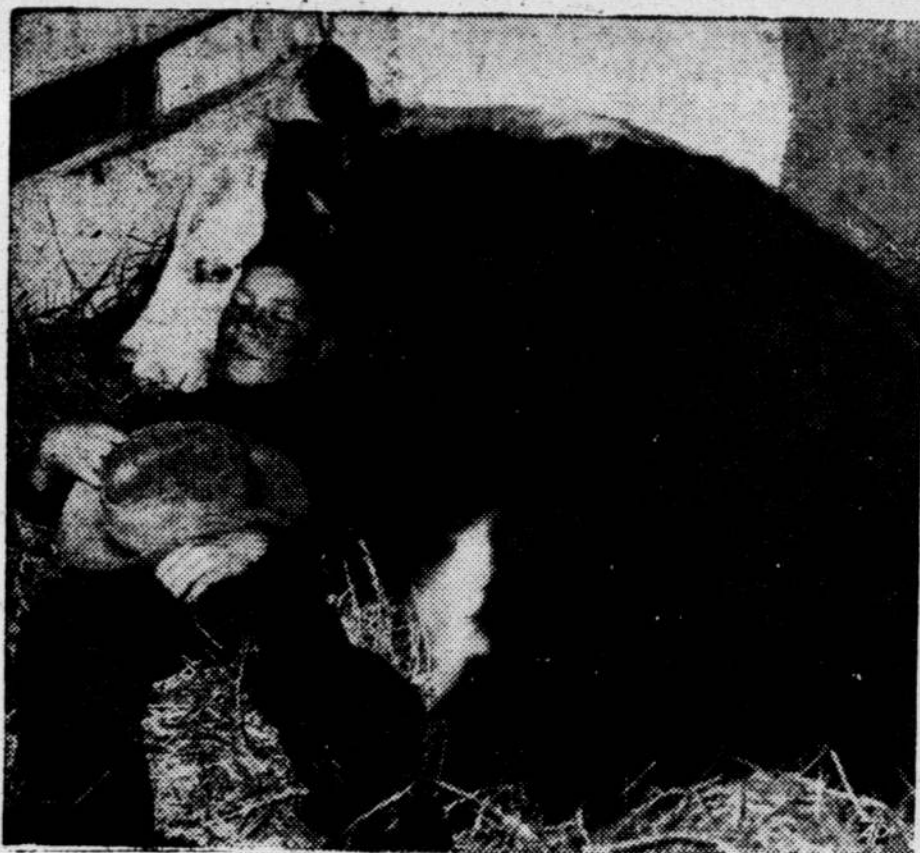

Doctors May Have Mother Substance Of Polio In Mice

STOCKHOLM — Three Swedish medical researchers have observed a virus-like albuminous substance in the intestines of experimental mice which they think may be the "mother substance" to the infantile paralysis virus.

Their report to the board of King Gustav's 80th Birthday Fund for Medical Research declares that the

detection of this substance appeared to open up new, sensational possibilities in the struggle to find the cause and cure of the crippling disease.

The report made by Drs. The Svedberg, Arne Tiselius and Sven Gard — all of whom received earlier medical training in the United States — suggests tentatively that as a result of some as yet unexplainable mutation, possibly caused by an auxiliary infection, the "mother substance" is changed into the real poliomyelitis virus.

"From this it is thought that this normally inactive and harmless virus-like albumin in the intestines may constitute the mother substance of the true sickness producing in-

fantile paralysis virus and that heretofore unknown factors and circumstances are able to change its character so that it becomes the true sickness-producing virus," the doctors reported.

"It also seems possible that a preliminary form of the infantile paralysis virus may be produced in the intestines and under certain conditions is transformed into the sickness-producing substance which is then able to pass into the central nervous system and produce typical symptoms of infantile paralysis."

The doctors recalled that most cases of infantile paralysis are characterized by a "double illness" beginning with an acute cold accompanied by fever after which paralysis sets in.

PAPER FROM BAMBOO CITED AS POSSIBILITY

WASHINGTON (AP) — Bamboo culture may become important in the Western hemisphere, although the giant grass is not likely to be used as it is in the Orient, according to Dr. F. A. McClure, consultant of the Office of Foreign Agriculture Relations, writing in Agriculture in the Americas, U. S. Department of Agriculture monthly.

Paper can be manufactured from bamboo and the possibility of using it for rayon is being tested, Dr. McClure says.

New techniques permit impregnation of the bamboo with plastics, stiffening it, reducing water absorption, preventing insect at-

tacks and permitting a beautiful finish.

voting must favor the move. When the move is favored, this district will be divided into 5 subdivisions from which 1 representative will be elected from each district to administer affairs of the

soil conservation district.

All the affairs of the soil conservation district are conducted by the member of the district. If the board sees fit to call in other agencies who are representative of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, they may do so.

A soil conservation district under the state law is a subdivision of the State government. No landowner is compelled to cooperate in any move made by this district board. The action of farmers is voluntary. No agency of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, or no member of the state conservation board will offer assistance to any farmer without he first requests assistance along this line.

Men on the board must own land in the district where they are elected, and must live on the farm and be actively engaged in farming.

The next step for establishing a soil conservation district in Dawson County will be the election of representatives, if the state board approves the project.

It is reported that at last Friday's hearing, everybody expressing an opinion verbally was in favor of the soil conservation district. A straw vote was taken, in which 49 favored such a move, 1 opposed it and 10 didn't cast votes.

In case the state board grants an election, the local county agent will call a meeting and explain the law to farmers here and answer any questions that might arise.
