Answerline

Q: Some lightning bolts seem faint, while others light up the entire sky. How powerful is lightning?

A: It's a lot more powerful than most people believe, says Brent McRoberts of Texas A&M University. "We know for a fact that not all lightning bolts are the same strength—some are relatively weak while others are incredibly strong," he explains. "At any given moment, there are about 1,800 to 2,000 thunderstorms on Earth and it's estimated that lightning occurs about 50 times every second. A typical lightning bolt contains about 15 million volts of electricity and can heat up the air around it to well over 50,000 degrees. That's why the total energy of one thunderstorm can easily surpass the energy released during an atomic explosion."

Luminant implodes steam unit

For those who heard – or felt – the rumble Friday morning and wondered why the emergency broadcasting system was not activated, there was a good reason. The boom which resonated through Colorado City at 8:30 a.m. was the sound of Luminant Energy imploding one of the two remaining natural gas steam units at the old power plant south of town.

Very few spectators were on hand to see the impressive display, as the actual day and time had been a well-guarded secret, kept with the public's safety in mind.

The demolition of Unit 5 Friday morning, along with the remaining smoke stack from unit 4, went down quickly as charges ignited and the steel and concrete structure collapsed on itself with a thunderous thud.

Luminant still has plans to demolish Unit 6, the lone remaining natural gas steam unit on the location, sometime in the future.

The power plant still operates the six natural gas combustion turbines which produce 390 megawatts of power. Morgan Creek Power Plant proudly maintains a safety record of 27 years without a lost-time injury and 16 years with no DART injuries.

County receive bids for water treatment

In a called meeting Monday, Mitchell County Commissioners opened bids for a reverse osmosis water desalination project for the county. Two bids, which had to be in by 9 a.m. Monday, were received.

N.A. Water Systems, out of Pennsylvania, put in a bid which roughly

amounted to \$2.3 million, while Bob J. Johnson & Associates, out of Houston, came in with a bid of just over 350,000.

When asked about the vast difference between the two bids, County Judge Ray Mayo said, "We better let the engineers figure this one out."

The court will meet again Monday, June 25, with the possibility of taking action on the bids being an item on the agenda.

Mitchell County recently decided to downgrade their efforts on the water desalination plant, after ne-

Angell joins city council Monday

New City Manager Fabio Angell joined the city council for his first meeting after taking over the reigns of the city last week.

In Tuesday night's city council meeting, Mayor Carol Sue Dakan asked the council to rescind or modify the Council/Mayor policy No.

2011-03, which had been approved by the city council in December of 2011. The mayor began by reading what she called her discussion.

"Why do we have elections?" the Mayor asked. "In my opinion, it is so the citizens can have the freedom to govern themselves by electing peo-

ple who will make decisions based on what the people tell them. This Mayor/Council policy says that one man can control what is discussed and by whom. The words, and I quote, 'It is the discretion of the City Manager to include or exclude the

Workers find hole beneath their feet

While replacing a sewer line in the alley just off of 2nd Street behind Mitchell County Abstract in Colorado City, Lacefield Services workers were shocked when one of them fell through what turned out to be the concrete ceiling of a long-forgotten cistern.

The men were standing in a three-foot deep trench when the structure gave way, opening up a room lined with brick walls. The room measured eight foot long and was six feet wide. The walls, made from older mud bricks, were intact, with what appeared to be four separate drain lines coming into the small room.

City workers picked up broken pottery and glass in the dirt which had once rested atop the underground structure, including a piece which said, "Doss Brothers, Colorado Tex".

The crew called it a day, but returned

CISD to hold town meeting

The Board of Trustees of the Colorado ISD met in regular session last week. The board discussed the buildings in the district and the repairs needed. Board members and the administration discussed future needs of the district and funding currently and projected for the future. Options for funding were discussed.

As a result of this discussion, it was decided that a community meeting would be called to explain what problems the board had identified, what the possible solutions might be and to ask for help from the community in looking at the problems identified and in formulating a longer term plan for where the community would like to see the schools go and what they want for the students.

To achieve that goal, the meeting will be held in the Colorado Middle School Cafeteria, on Tuesday, July 10, at 7 p.m. At this meeting, the board and administration will share what they have been studying and will ask for volunteers to serve on a committee to formulate a plan for the future. Also at this meeting, information about state rules and regulations that will impact the district's options will be presented.

Everyone is invited to the meeting on the 10th and the board hopes this will be the start of a working group which will be instrumental in the development of long term strategies to meet the needs of the students.

Oil line from C-City to Houston could spell more jobs for area

Colorado City finds itself thick in the midst of an oilman's dream, with the intended formation of BridgeTex Pipeline Company LLC, by Oxy Midstream Strategic Development, a subsidiary of Magellan Midstream Partners.

The company intends to develop a new crude oil pipeline system from Colorado City to the Houston, Gulf Coast area, fittingly called the BridgeTex Pipeline Project. It will have an initial design capacity of 278,000 barrels per day. Oxy and Magellan are currently seeking long term shipper commitments on the project.

You can get your Social Security statement online

If you would like to get a Social Security Statement, which provides estimates of your future benefits, it is now available online at www.socialsecurity.gov.

"Our new online Social Security Statement is simple, easy-to-use and provides people with estimates they can use to plan for their retirement," said Michael J. Astrue, Commissioner of Social Security. "The online Statement also provides estimates for disability and survivors benefits, making the Statement an important financial planning tool. People should get in the habit of checking their online Statement each year, around their birthday, for example."

In addition to helping with financial planning, the online Statement also provides workers a convenient way to determine whether their earnings are accurately posted to their Social Security records. This feature is important because Social Security benefits are based on average earnings over a person's lifetime. If the information is incorrect, the person may not receive proper benefits.

The online Statement provides you the opportunity to save or print the document for future reference, or to have handy for discussions with family members or a financial planner.

According to the American Customer Satisfaction Index, users are giving the online Statement a score of 89, making it competitive with our other top-rated, best-in-government online services, such as the Retirement Estimator and online retirement application.

To get a personalized online Statement, you must be age 18 or older and must be able to provide information about yourself that matches information already on file with Social Security. In addition, Social Security uses Experian, an external authentication service provider, for further verification. You must provide identifying information and answer security questions in order to pass this verification. Social Security will not share your Social Security number with Experian, but the identity check is an important part of this new, thorough verification process.

When your identity is verified, you can create a "My Social Security" account with a unique user name and password to access your online Statement. In addition, your online Statement includes links to information about other online Social Security services, such as applications for retirement, disability, and Medicare.

Lewis Eugene "Buck" Buchanan 1950-2012

VIRGINIA -- LTC (R) Lewis Eugene "Buck" Buchanan, the consummate warrior, was born on Johnson Air Force Base in Japan on May 18, 1950 and passed away on June 8, 2012. His parents, Lewis Earl Buchanan and Lilly Y. Buchanan, preceded him in death.

Buck graduated from Itazuke High School in Japan in 1968, graduated summa cum laude from Chaminade College in Hawaii with a degree in business and earned his Master's in Public Administration from the University of Missouri in Kansas City. Buck was interested in everything and maintained a lifelong pursuit of learning.

Buck joined the Army in 1969 at age 19. day, June 28 at noon and will be held every other Thursday. The locations for the meetings will be announced at a later date. Watch the *Record* for more information.

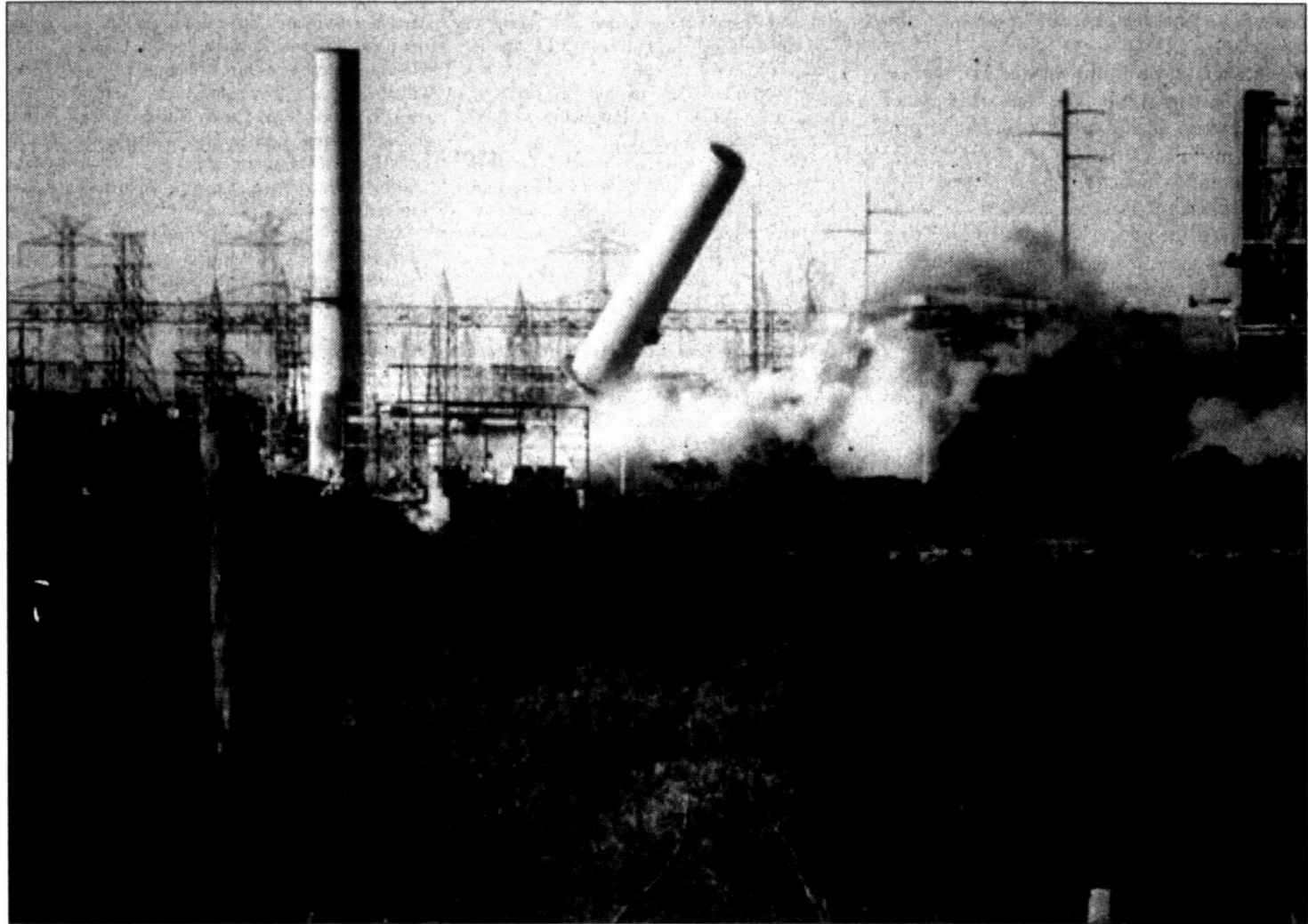
Library goes CSI

On June 15, a subject in the 100 block of 2nd Street had an argument with a co-worker and had been threatened with bodily harm. A report was taken and the case is under investigation.

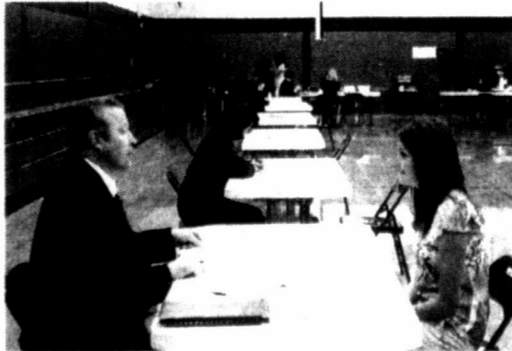
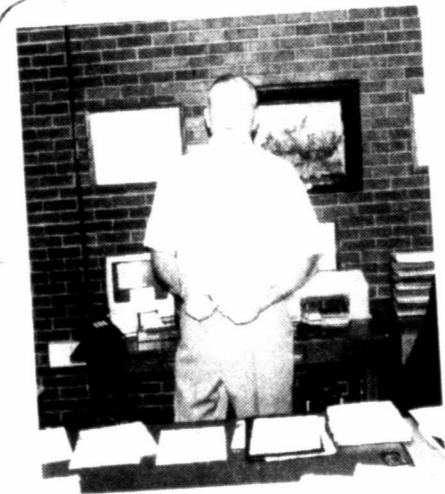
On June 16, an 18-year-old

The movie *Bernie* made its debut in Carthage a few weeks ago. Every showing was sold out and folding chairs had to be brought in to accommodate the crowds. The audiences howled and applauded at the local story, which is about a popular Carthage undertaker, Bernhardt Tiede II, who donated lots of money to needy causes. He helped pay college tuition for a couple of Carthage young people. The money he so generously passed around came from a wealthy widow woman he befriended. He killed her and put her body in a deep freeze. He's now in prison. One line in the movie says, "She spent her first few days in the hereafter between the beans and the peas."

Kay Baby Epperson of Rusk plays a town gossip in the movie. She says it's a funny movie. "It's typical East Texas. I compare it to *The Help*. And one of those ladies got a best supporting actress award. Hell, I might be in Hollywood next year."

Kay Baby has all the earmarks of a genuine character. She is 70 years old, blonde and has a loud, lyrical voice that demands attention. When she walks into a room, people notice her. For the movie debut she had her diamond ring cleaned ("so I can be me"). Kay Baby says she is living the American dream. She wants her tombstone to read: "She didn't miss a damn thing." She knows her mother and grandmother are in heaven saying, "My God, they're paying that woman to talk."

The movie has some big stars: Shirley MacLaine, Matthew McConaughey (he grew up in Longview) and Jack Black, who plays Bernie. He went to see Bernie in prison. "He spent two days down there just watching his manners," says Kay Baby. "People who live in Carthage said he nailed him."

Texas Monthly magazine did a cover article on the movie. About half of it was about Kay Baby. She had a typical reaction. "Well, you know, I've got a lot of flavor here. I'm seasoned, so to speak."

The movie was filmed around Bastrop. She got in her car to drive there and had a wreck just a half-mile from town. "Seventeen thousand dollars damage to my new Lincoln. I called my brother and sister-in-law. They were trying to get me to go to the hospital and I said, are you crazy? I'll go to the hospital in Bastrop. I can't miss this. This comes around only once and I gotta go."

After the previews for the movie came out, a friend called Kay Baby and told her he had seen her in the trailer. "Well I thought he was talking about a trailer house. Lord, I didn't know anything about a trailer. What's a trailer? When she asked if the movie was being made for television, she was told no, that it was a popcorn movie. "Now I know that that means. You have to go to the theater to see it and buy a box of popcorn."

I asked Kay Baby what was ahead for her. "I would like to do a movie with Jack Nicholson, Anthony Hopkins and Sandra Bullock. So if you're a writer out there, I would love for you to write me a movie."

negotiations with the City of Colorado City ran into some difficulty. As a result, the county downgraded plans from a 750,000-gallon facility to a 250,000-gallon per day facility and began looking into reverse osmosis.

Reverse osmosis is a form of desalination which involves a membrane-technology filtration method to remove many types of molecules and ions from solutions.

The largest and most important application of reverse osmosis is for the separation of pure water from seawater and brackish waters; seawater or brackish water is pressurized against one surface of the membrane, causing transport of salt-depleted water across the membrane and emergence of potable drinking water from the low-pressure side.

to finish the septic lines. What remains is the question of what to do with the old cistern.

With a little amateur, though well-intended hometown archeology, it was determined the room was part of a multiple room cistern system, however, the other compartment had caved in or been filled in at some point prior to its discovery.

Code Enforcement Officer David Hoover said he felt the best thing was that the cistern be filled in to prevent anyone from falling in or becoming trapped inside. The actual depth of the cistern has not been determined as any digging was treacherous, due to large, overhanging chunks of concrete which remained of the ceiling and still undetermined pitfalls or decaying portions of the structure.

According to their website, <http://www.magellanlp.com>, BridgeTex will provide operational tankage to segregate and batch crude oil pipeline movements.

In Colorado City, the system would have approximately 1,000,000 barrels of breakout storage, capable of delivery into the pipeline system. The 400-mile pipeline from Colorado City would offer shippers access to over 2.2 million barrels per day, almost doubling Magellan's distribution system from 370,000 barrels per day to approximately 700,000.

It is still unclear how many jobs could be offered in Mitchell County if things go along as planned, as calls to BridgeTex have not been returned as of deadline.

subject from the agenda gives him that power."

The Mayor went on to say the city had a charter, voted on by the citizens, which does not deny anyone from putting anything on the agenda.

"Seven elected officials should be able to put any items as suggested by the citizens or as by needed by the council members, on the agenda at will," She continued. "The city council itself should have the final say whether an item is discussed by making a motion or seconding a motion to discuss the agenda item. As for called meeting by the city manager, mayor or councilmen, that is defined in the charter. Also, the policy says if four councilmen want an item they can have it put on the agenda. Four council members discussing an agenda item is a violation of the Open Meetings Act."

The Mayor continued, quoting an incident in Alpine as an example where council members were in violation of the Open Meetings Act.

Andrew Fuller made the motion to rescind the policy, but it died after no second was raised. Council member Keith Hiser asked at this point to modify the policy. His motion was seconded by Marcello Alvarez.

Hiser went on to say he had discussed the policy with newly hired City Manager Fabio Angell, and that Angell himself had pointed out he felt it gave too much power to the city manager.

"I would suggest we modify the way that was written," Hiser said. "It was designed to respect

everyone's time, to where we weren't just bringing 'dead cat' issues before the council. It was not intended to give that much power to the city manager."

Hiser suggested to strike out the words "at the discretion of the city manager" and replace them with "a majority of the city council."

Mayor Dakan stated she felt it was a violation of the Open Meetings Act and was echoed by Councilman Andrew Fuller. However, she yielded the floor and the motion to modify passed 5-2, with herself and Fuller voting opposed.

In other business, the council voted unanimously to accept a bid for air conditioning and heating, along with new lights for the Heart of West Texas Museum. Though the total bid was over \$25,000, a grant had already been secured by Amie Wood, which would pay all but \$5,000 of the bid. The bid was awarded to Laceyfield Services of Colorado City.

The council members also adopted a resolution, allowing Angell the authority to seek bids for sewer lines, pertaining to the new Mitchell County Law Enforcement Center.

A motion to move July's city council meeting from July 17 to July 10, was tabled after Mayor Dakan told the council, "That won't work."

Sammy Contreras was nominated and elected to be the Mayor Pro Tem, after being nominated by Alvarez. Councilman Hiser recommended he be elected by acclamation.

After David Hoover, the city's Code Enforcement Officer addressed the council, the council

decided to accept a bid from Maria Rubio to purchase property located at 1838 Locust Street in Colorado City for the price of \$1,000.

Former Interim City Manager Belinda Blessingame was recognized by Angell for her "outstanding service to the community" while the city was without a full time city manager.

"It is an honor to be here tonight to recognize you for all your hard work," the new city manager told Blessingame. "You kept that ship going in the right direction. You have key players who are very skillful here and we recognize them, but it is also a recognition of your leadership."

He presented the certificate of appreciation to Blessingame on behalf of the city and the city council, as well as himself and his office.

Land in Lea County, New Mexico, owned by the Heart of West Texas Museum, has been offered an oil and gas lease. Amie Wood again spoke to the council and when they asked her for a recommendation on the lease, she suggested it be tabled for the time being, stating they still did not know everything they needed to know about the offer to make a rational decision. The council agreed and the item was tabled until a later time.

None of the members offered any suggestions to be placed on July's agenda and the council did not go into executive session, though it had been on the agenda as a possibility.

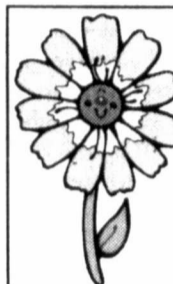

FBC committee expands goal



First Baptist Church
Colorado City, Texas

Back in the winter, the First Baptist Church of Colorado City formed a committee to help save the beautiful stained glass windows which have adorned the church since 1928. The Save the Windows Committee consists of Janet Mayo, Lulu Boyd, Kay Fite, Jamie Hammond, Brenda Kelley and Betty Shaun. And the committee is taking on a project even bigger than saving the stained glass needing repair.

After raising their initial goal of \$100,000 to save the windows suffering from erosion from moisture around the edges, committee members decided the rest of the windows should be sealed to prevent their further erosion, as well. So, the group pushed their goal to \$130,000 to be able to give the historical artworks the protection they need.

The endangered windows are magnificent pieces of art, and they are in dire need of repair or they may be lost forever, taking a large portion of the church's history with them.

"It sounds like a big challenge," the committee said in a handwritten letter. "But we know together we can reach this goal and preserve these windows for future generations."

Before the campaigns had a chance to officially begin on April 1, support had already begun to come into the church. The committee had already received over \$38,000 in donations, helping to raise their hopes of having the entire amount needed by the end of the year.

The group has also planned an ice cream social on July 8th at the church, where they will be selling pieces of stained glass to those in attendance. Many sizes will be available and pricing will range from \$2 to several hundred, according to Mayo.

Mayo said that approximately \$106,000 has been raised so far and a dedication service will be held after the goal is reached.

The present building of the First Baptist Church was constructed in 1928 and the windows were a part of the original building. A portion of the windows were damaged in a hail storm in 1974. After they were repaired, clear glass was placed over them to protect them.

Before the original church was built in 1928, a mission was started at the site in 1881 by George Washington Baines. Baines was the grandfather of Lyndon Baines Johnson, the 36th President of the United States. Baines also served as president of Baylor University at its first location in Independence, Texas.

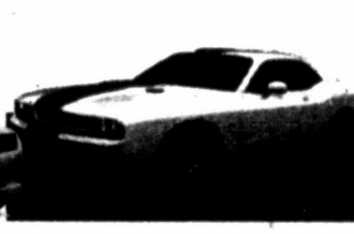
