

Judge Submits Request To Governor

Will County Be Disaster Area?

Will Mitchell County be declared a drought disaster county for the years 1977 and 1978?

According to Judge Bill Carter, that question should be answered sometime this week.

And, Carter noted, the prospects seem bright that Mitchell County will be declared a drought disaster area, thereby qualifying producers for Small Business Administration loans.

At Monday's meeting of the Mitchell County Commissioners, Don Stewart,

Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Executive Director, presented the request to Governor Dolph Briscoe.

Stewart, representing the ASCS county committee, asked that Carter make the request to Governor Briscoe.

Thus, Carter sent a letter to Briscoe stating, "It is estimated that 1,500 families have been affected by our drought situation and that the best available

information shows the dollar loss to be \$10 million for the incident period beginning Oct. 1, 1977, through the present."

Carter noted that the letter was sent to Briscoe Wednesday and that he would call the governor's office tomorrow (Monday) to be certain that it was received. A reply is expected within a week to 10 days.

Apparently, some producers are confused that they are eligible for Small Business Administration

disaster loans now, noted Stewart.

But that is not the case. Until word is received from the governor's office that the county is a drought disaster county, producers are not eligible for SBA loans.

However, Stewart said that producers can begin obtaining applications from the SBA office in Abilene with the hope that the county will be declared a drought disaster county.

In fact, Stewart said that the ASCS office had received four applications to verify Friday.

Although the producer can get a start on the applications for the SBA loans now, no loans will be granted until the county is declared a designated drought disaster, noted Stewart.

Stewart explained that according to the SBA disaster loan program, if a county adjoins another county that is a designated drought disaster area, that county becomes eligible for the SBA loans.

Nolan County became eligible for the SBA loans because that county adjoins Runnels County, a designated disaster area.

Should Mitchell County be declared a designated drought disaster county, adjoining counties will also be eligible for SBA loans. Those adjoining counties include Scurry, Fisher, Borden, Howard, Sterling and Coke.

Crop losses considered to be eligible for the SBA disaster loans include any crop loss resulting from a physical disaster, including corn, milo, soybeans, oats, wheat, rye, barley, hay and pasture.

The amount of physical loss to each crop is computed by the acres planted times the established normal yield times the percentages of loss times the market price. From that figure, any insurance collected, any ASCS disaster payments or recoveries from any other source are subtracted.

Council To Consider Zoning

City Council of Colorado City will meet Tuesday in a regular session to take up an item of business that was tabled at the last meeting.

At the Aug. 8 meeting, City Manager James Campbell suggested to the council that they consider amending the area on E. 18th Street along the south side from Austin Street to Watson Street to be zoned as a mobile home district.

Councilmember Buddy Hertenberger noted that he was not familiar with the area in question and requested that the council delay action until he had the opportunity to review it.

In other business, the council will consider a zone change from a multi-family residential to a local retail for all of Block 82. The Planning and Zoning Board will hear the request Monday.

Councilmembers will also consider bidding for lease city-owned property for oil, gas and mineral rights.

The meeting will begin at 7 p.m. at City Hall.

established normal yield minus the harvested, estimated or appraised yield.

On other crops—soybeans, oats and hay—the SBA will accept the Statistical Reporting Service county average for that crop, minus harvested, estimated or appraised yield.

If the normal yield for the crop is not available from USDA, information from state government, agricultural units, land grant universities and college yields will be accepted.

According to David Marion, Farmers Home Administration director, if a FmHA borrower suffers a disaster loss, he should first file with the FmHA instead of the SBA.

Regarding the SBA loans, the normal term of the loan is up to 30 years but is based on the ability to repay. Most loans are expected to run from five to 10 years, according to the SBA.

Loans will be repaid in equal annual installments, including principal and interest with the interest rate on physical disaster loans three per cent on the first \$250,000 and six and five eighths per cent on all loans over \$250,000.

Up to 50 per cent of the eligible loan amount may be used to pay outstanding obligations, such as accounts payable, crop loans—excluding those owed to FmHA or other USDA units—and notes payable and reasonable operating expenses including living expenses.

At least 50 per cent of this eligible loan amount must be held for operating expenses in the new crop year.

For SBA loan purposes, market price has been defined as the average price for the marketing period just prior to the disaster as determined by USDA.

Necessary collateral to secure an SBA loan includes liens on crops, machinery, equipment, livestock and real estate, subject to any existing liens.

Losses may be verified by ASCS, FmHA, other USDA agency or an SBA verifier.

Tenant farmers, landlords, partnerships, proprietorships and corporations will be eligible for the SBA disaster loans.

Farmers who can obtain credit for other sources will still be eligible for an SBA physical disaster loan. However, farmers who can obtain credit from other sources are not eligible for an FmHA loan, noted Marion.

Mitchell County producers are not yet eligible for SBA loans, Stewart stressed, but the possibility of being declared a drought disaster county seems promising.

However, until notification is received from Briscoe regarding the designation, Mitchell County producers must wait.

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PUBLIC ANNOUNCEMENT CONCERNING FREE OR REDUCED PRICE MEAL

The Colorado Independent School District, in participation with the National School Lunch Program, is announcing a revised free or reduced price meal policy statement of the 1978-79 School Year.

Local School Officials have adopted the following family size and income scale to assist them in determining eligibility.

Children from families whose income is at or below levels shown on the above scale are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. The reduced price for lunch is 20 cents and for breakfast 10 cents. If your income is greater than those shown, but you have unusually high medical bills, shelter costs in excess of 30 percent of your income, special education expenses due to the mental or physical condition of a child, or disaster or casualty losses, your children may still be eligible.

The school children of parents or guardians who become unemployed are eligible for free or reduced-price meals during the period of unemployment, provided that the loss of income causes the family income during the period of unemployment to be at or below the levels shown on the scale.

To apply at any time during the year for free meals or reduced-price meals for your children, complete an application and return it to the school. Within ten days of receiving your application, the school will let you know whether or not your children are eligible. If you do not agree with the school's decision, you have a right to a fair hearing. This can be done by calling or writing your child's principal.

In certain cases, foster children are also eligible for these benefits. If you have foster children living with you and wish to apply for such meals for them, please notify us or indicate in on the application. All children are treated the same regardless of ability to pay. In the operation of child feeding programs, no child will be discriminated against because of race, sex, color, or national origin.

A complete copy of the policy is on file in each school and in the CISD Administration Office, where it may be reviewed by interested persons.

Fertilize For Quality Fall Hay

High quality hay can be produced in the fall with good moisture and plenty of fertilizer, says a forage specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

Apply nitrogen fertilizer at the rate of at least 50 pounds of actual nitrogen per acre (150 pounds of ammonium nitrate).

Levels of production, protein and digestibility of fall-produced pasture and hay can be near spring levels if sufficient fertilizer is applied and timely rains fall.

Physicals for the volleyball players are due Thursday, noted Coach Dakan, and all girls involved in the sport must have a physical form completed by a doctor.

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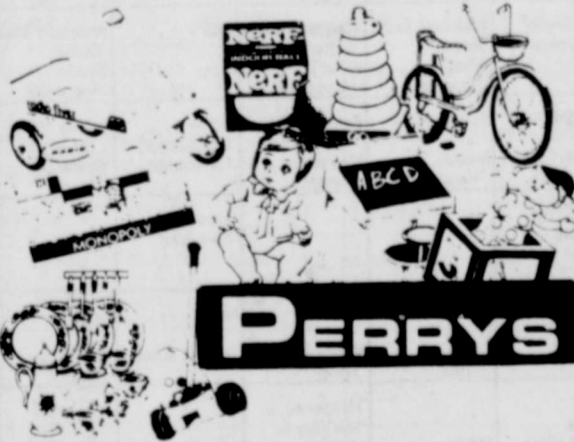
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Champion Cowboy Contest Set

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Trip To China Dispels Myths & Misinformation

Editor's Note: Colorado City's George Womack recently travelled to China as part of a tour group. The following article is an account of his journey.

"Forget everything you have ever been told about China." These words proved to be the most accurate advice which could be given to an American about to enter the long-closed doors to the "Bamboo Curtain."

They were given to a group of 36 photographers, Chinese scholars, educators and assorted interested parties in Karachi, Pakistan, at a briefing prior to our flight to Peking.

Among assorted useless misinformation, such as "The postage stamps do not have adhesive on them, and you will have to obtain mucilage to put them on postcards." (They do have adhesive) and, "The Chinese love to have their pictures taken." (It depends on what city you are in, and how the individual feels about having pictures made).

We were advised about

behaviour and what we would be permitted to do. The reality which we found had nothing to do with what we had been told—both by people who were reputed to be knowledgeable about China and the general information which we have long been given since the Communist revolution of the late 40's.

One of the most apprehensive and chilling moments of my life occurred upon landing at the airport in Peking. It was in the early hours of the morning and the airport was all but deserted. The plane came to a stop at the terminal building and, as is common, the passengers began to collect their hand baggage for departure.

An announcement was made over the public address system, "Please return to your seats—we have not received permission to disembark and until such permission is obtained, all passengers must remain seated."

I looked out the window, and a portable stairway was being rolled up to the

plane, escorted by several Chinese soldiers, armed with sub-machine guns. In the background was the terminal building, crowned with large neon-outlined characters in red with the building itself dominated by a monumental color portrait of Chairman Mao-Tse-Tung.

At this point after the most grueling flight I had ever taken before, which took 62 actual hours since first boarding the plane in Midland, I was almost ready to forget the whole thing and return to Texas.

My misgivings were completely without basis, however. Never on any trip to any country I have ever visited, have I seen such warmth and friendliness exhibited by the people as that encountered in the Peoples' Republic of China.

The excitement and feeling that this was not to be an ordinary tour really began in Harbin, the first city which we visited after a brief stay in Peking to recover from the exhausting flight. Harbin is a major city in northern Manchuria near the Russian border. Here we first encountered the crowds of people who would accompany us on any excursion, no matter how spontaneous, from our hotel.

Upon leaving the hotel, a crowd of people would immediately gather and soon number anywhere from 75 to 250 and immediately break into applause. As one would start down the street to look for photos, the crowd would follow along, just as curious about us as we were about them. There was no intimidation felt by their presence, only friendliness and good will.

The only negative thing about this was that, when we would open our camera bags to change lenses or film, the light would literally be shut out by so many heads which would be bent over us in curiosity as to what was in the bags. Here, I probably should comment on the fact that there is less crime in China than any other country in the world which had been visited by the members of our tour. One's personal belongings and valuables were safe at any time in a hotel room, guest house; or, incredibly, completely unattended on the street.

We had numerous occasions where this was proven; and, to illustrate, it even was difficult to throw anything away. Someone would come rushing up to you after you had disposed of something in a waste bin and try to return it.

The cities which we were permitted to visit, other than Peking, were Harbin, Changchun, Shenyang and Dalian. The smallest of these cities was 2 million population. We visited factories, communes, state farms, hospitals, day care centers, a movie studio, textile mills and various craft factories.

At each of these, we were given a briefing with ceremonial cups of tea and cigarettes prior to our tours of the facility. We

visited primary, secondary and college level schools and visited directly with the students of the English classes in the schools.

The area we visited, Northern Manchuria, has not been visited by many Americans and our presence there made as great an impact on the people as we were impressed by them.

The English-speaking students were very curious about our dress, attitudes and behaviour. Since their knowledge of our way of life came from textbooks and contact with other English speaking tourists, they were anxious for information about the United States. Each school had prepared a program of singing and dancing for us and, on one occasion, we were asked to reciprocate and entertain them after the program which they presented to us.

We devised an impromptu sing-song and the students liked the American songs so much, I was requested to make a tape recording of American songs so that they might learn them from the tape. The other tour members decided that it would be funny in the future when American tourists would be entertained by American songs done with a Texas accent!

The wage scale in China is very low, according to our standards. Almost everyone in the country earns approximately the same wage, whether they are engaged in the professions or common labor. The wages range from 80 Yuan per month for professors, medical doctors, factory managers, etc. to approximately 60 Yuan per month for laborers, street sweepers and the like. This would be equivalent to \$37.50 per month down to \$35.00 per month. Prices are such that this provides an adequate living standard in the country.

Almost all the people live in apartments which are owned by the state, and the rent is based on the income of the family, usually three to five per cent of the monthly wage.

Friendly Crowds Followed The Tour

There is complete equality of the sexes in China, with women being seen as factory managers, hospital superintendents and doctors, as well as digging ditches and performing manual labor on the communes and state farms.

We were fortunate to see traditional Chinese medicine performed, including acupuncture and suction cups. This is used in conjunction with Western Medicine and is used throughout China.

We were taken to a number of cultural events in the evening, ranging from movies (in Chinese) through concerts and musical recitals to a classical Chinese Opera, after which, some in our party met the actors backstage.

Although I hesitate to generalize about any country after a brief visit, I feel that some general comments can be made about present-day China.

First, although I have no first-hand knowledge of conditions prior to the revolution, the standard of living is superior to the other areas of Asia in which I have traveled. There is no unemployment, the people have sufficient food for their own consumption and are exporting some food; and, while there are few automobiles (and those are

owned by the State) most of the Chinese have bicycles for transportation. They appear to be very happy and almost completely enthusiastic about their political system. It apparently works for them.

Next, as in the other Communist countries, religion has been almost abandoned. Religion is not prohibited and China is not officially atheist as is the case with Russia. However, only a few old people still practice religious worship and almost all the churches have been turned into warehouses. All of the people to whom I talked profess no religion.

To be realistic, though, from the fervent following of the teachings of Marx/Lenin/Mao exhibited, I suspect that the Party is the religion of China, with the spirit of Mao at its head.

The Chinese, both officially and individually, are very candid about the fact that they want the United States as an ally against the Soviet Union. We were constantly bombarded with anti-Soviet propaganda and the Chinese, particularly in Harbin, are constructing air-raid shelters and miles of elaborate underground tunnels in anticipation of an invasion of Manchuria by Russia.

Taiwan (Formosa) is still a very sore spot with the Chinese. They list the island as a province of the country which is still to be liberated and will not allow any foreigners entry into Mainland China if a Taiwan stamp is in the passport.

One curious aspect of the trip which I noticed was the fact that when one exchanged money, the transaction was calculated on an electronic machine, then verified with an abacus. This was, for me, a perfect symbol of the Chinese today; a people who have entered the atomic age, but still retain many aspects of the ox-cart technology which, until recently, was the dominant factor of their culture.

There are many varied and interesting episodes and happenings which occurred on the trip which I shall carry with me as long as I live. I feel particularly fortunate to have had the chance to have made this trip at this particular time in history, for I have the feeling that it will never be the same again. It was a totally unique experience and I shall always be richer because of it.

I have walked on the Great Wall, visited the Imperial Palaces, but was more impressed with the few among the 900 million Chinese whom I met and became friends with.

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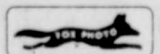

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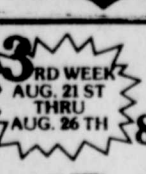
