Post commemorative coins minted for Post Chamber of Commerce, Post Chamber of Commerce's annual Fourth of July celebration, and junior and senior high school essay contest on Americanism sponsored by the Women's Division of the Post Chamber of Commerce. Mrs. Marks told The Dispatch she hopes to arrange a fitting ceremony for Post's recognition as a bicentennial community in the near future.

First parade in 35 years

Borden County doesn't have parades very often, so when one is scheduled it's usually a humdinger. The last parade at Gail was in 1941 when the 50th anniversary of the founding of Borden County was celebrated. The next parade is scheduled for 10 a. m. Saturday, May 29 to officially open Borden County's two-day Bicentennial Celebration.

Two hundred dollars in three cash prizes — \$100, \$50 and \$40 — will be offered for the three best floats depicting some part of this nation's 200-year history. Jim Miller of Rapid City, S. D., who was born and raised in Borden County and who has announced the Scurry County Rodeo in Snyder for the last nine years, will narrate the parade from the courthouse lawn.

The parade line of march will include: Stage coach arriving from west with gamblers and pretty women aboard to view celebration. Raising of flag at the courthouse square with playing of national anthem and a three-gun salute with muzzle loaded guns.

17-cent tax hike seen for \$1,725,207 school budget

State pays 'mini share'

Post school trustees Monday night tentatively adopted a 1976-77 school budget of \$1,725,207.50, up \$104,914.41 from the current budget, which will require a 17 cent tax boost to \$1.47 per \$100 valuation.

The currently estimated tax roll at 75 percent of true value is \$94,000,000. Each penny of the tax rate will raise approximately \$10,000 in school district taxes.

Whereas in former years, state aid amounted to over 50 percent of the school district budget, the state will pay only 22 percent of next year's budget, Supt. Bill Shiver told trustees. School district taxpayers will have to pay \$1,309,592 of the total budget.

The reduction in the state's share of the school district budget accounts for \$57,649 of the district's increased tax need, or almost 6 cents of the rate increase, Shiver said.

Principal budget increases in the \$104,914.41 boost for next year will include \$36,250 in state pay salary increases, \$10,000 for the addition of another girls coach, a Title IX requirement, \$10,000 for an additional bus purchase, \$15,901 for physical education lockers, \$4,454 for band equipment, \$2,263 for choir equipment, \$13,000 for athletic equipment to replace worn out football equipment purchased to reestablish junior high football three years ago, \$9,386 for estimated higher utility costs, \$2,100 for additional bus repair, \$1,500 for additional gasoline costs, \$5,500 for additional subsidy for the school lunchroom program, and \$3,000 for the Teentown building.

The school district's board of equalization will meet at 9 a. m. this morning to hear property valuation complaints. The budget was needed prior to the board of equalization hearing, especially if representatives of oil companies give the school operation here "a hard look."

The school district's general fund budget for next year is \$1,645,857.50 up \$106,483.69 from the \$1,539,373.81 current general fund budget.

The district's interest and sinking fund budget for next year is \$79,350, down \$1,564.28 from this year's \$80,914.28.

The lunchroom budget calls for \$62,179.63 next year, and increase of \$3,027.40 from the current \$59,152.23, while the athletic budget will jump \$24,882.92 from \$109,996.76 to \$134,879.68 because of the requirement to add a new coach and to replace wornout junior high equipment.

## A look at our hospital

The Crosbyton Review wrote a National Hospital Week (May 9-15) salute to the Crosbyton Hospital last week entitled, "You've come a long way, baby."

That certainly can be said for most small hospitals which have survived the test of time — and very high operating costs.

Garza Memorial Hospital is one of these. We well remember the last time the hospital really got lots of front page coverage in The Dispatch. That was back in those years of our "doctor shortage" — before Dr. William C. Wilson came home to establish his practice — when it was nip and tuck to keep the hospital here operating because of a lack of patients.

It was a supreme struggle and the town's best citizens jumped right into the front line trenches of that battle. The hospital "weathered its storm."

Since then, The Dispatch has neglected the hospital in its news coverage. In fact we were just as startled as everybody else when the personnel turnover began "at the top" last month.

We promised then we would put the hospital board back on our list of meetings to cover and have been to four of them since and are going to our fifth tonight.

What we want to emphasize to our readers in our editorial is that front page coverage again of hospital affairs, as you'll find again today in The Dispatch, may startle you. But this is just because you haven't been reading it regularly.

We have it "on good authority" from all hospital directors that they have had a whole table full of problems to consider just about every time they meet. And now The Dispatch is virtually "sitting the public in the middle of it

again" after a very long absence.

The hospital has been in good operational hands. For the last few years it has been a real financial success. Not only does it have one of the smallest hospital district taxes in the state, but it has been able to stockpile some \$73,000 because day to day patient billings have almost paid the hospital's way.

That's a great track record.

But that doesn't mean there haven't been all kinds of problems — and real expensive ones too. Personnel of course is always one.

The hospital building itself is now beginning to grow old and demand repairs. It has been re-equipped with new boilers, a new roof, new ceilings and new air-conditioning.

Some of the rooms need painting, but the big job still to do is to replace the hospital's plumbing system, which of all places is located "upstairs" between the ceiling and the roof. It's probably the next big job which is on the schedule.

Buying new equipment is costly, but essential.

Operating a hospital is a high powered, expensive business, but the board of five are working hard to try to do it in as efficient a manner as possible.

New Hospital Administrator Perry Hunsaker has his hands full with many problems. But new as he is to the job, he is making headway.

Garza Memorial Hospital is one of this community's essential businesses, like the schools. It deserves our concern and support.

This National Hospital Week, we can truly say, "You've Come a Long Way, Baby."

And we can also add: "We're going to see that you make it a whole lot further too."



AUSTIN — A hot Railroad Commission runoff campaign between Jerry Sadler, 68, and State Rep. Jon Newton, 34, is under way.

Sadler, a pre-World War II Railroad Commissioner and former Land Commissioner, led the big May 1 Democratic primary field of candidates for the oil and gas regulatory agency.

Newton, a state lawmaker from Beeville, came in second and is rounding up endorsements from most of the other Democratic candidates.

Sadler, of Grapeland in East Texas, is zeroing in on Newton's campaign financing from oilmen. He says he will accept no oil money "above the filling station level."

Newton, who barely mentioned Sadler in the first primary campaign, is citing the former commissioner's record which includes a reprimand by the House of Representatives in 1969 and refusal to open some of his land office records to the press.

Another statewide runoff on the June ballot is for the Court of Criminal Appeals. Carl Dally of Houston and W.T. Phillips of Waco are the candidates for the judicial place.

Don Yarbrough of Houston was a surprise winner of the May 1 State Supreme Court race over veteran Court of Civil Appeals Judge Charles Barrow of San Antonio. Some lawyers talked about chances of an independent candidate or write-in candidate against Yarbrough, but it's too late for an independent to get on the ballot.

### Recession Ending

Texas worst recession since the 1930's seems to be coming to an end, according to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research.

The rate of inflation has been reduced substantially, and business activity for the first quarter of 1976 was 14 per cent above the first quarter of the previous year and seven per cent above February level, the bureau reported.

About the same time, Secretary of State Mark White reported Texas led the Central U.S. in new businesses formed in January — with 1,709 new business corporations formed.

### Liquor Sales O.K.

Texas Alcoholic Beverage Commission offered guidelines as to how out-of-state-owned firms can continue to sell alcoholic beverages and stay within the law specifying ownership by Texans.

ABC set off a flurry of concern with an announcement it would enforce the in-state ownership law.

New guidelines tell how such chain operations as grocery stores and hotels can sell beer, wine or liquor at their premises by setting up a separate Texas firm to obtain the required state permit. The Texas entity would then lease space from the parent corporation. Joint cash registers could be used, with separate coding for the alcoholic beverage sales.

Gov. Briscoe told the Texas Criminal Justice Conference reducing crime is the biggest challenge of the generation.

Texas' public school breakfast program in 1,044 schools is the second largest in the nation. It has grown 59 per cent annually and will provide 28 million meals to pupils during 1976-77.

Cigarette tax revenue increased \$563,256 — to \$21.5 million — last month over April 1975.

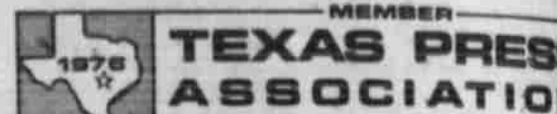
The Lynn County News reported that under cover agents, made numerous buys of marijuana and pictures of others making buys have been made.

## State pays less and less

The school district taxpayer needs to keep a fearful eye on Austin this coming winter. The next session of the state legislature may well lower the boom on all available tax funds, and then some.

You don't have to look back too many years to when the state was paying over half the total cost of the operation of the Post school system.

School trustees were told Monday night at their budget session that for the 1976-77 school year the state will pay only 22 percent of the school district's operating costs here.

What makes this so dangerous to the taxpayer is that while the state pays less and less of the school tax bill it is not relinquishing any of its vast power over Texas schools.

For example, the legislature not many years ago passed a bill giving teachers a wage increase every year for 10 years in a row. When the state is paying that bill, it is one thing. When the school districts have to pay the bill it is an entirely different thing. It is too

easy for a politician to vote for something for which he does not have to be held accountable. In this case, we are talking about the Texas school system.

The next legislature can change the basis for figuring the school district's share of fund assignment merely by requiring that it be figured on current tax rolls rather than on 1974 rolls.

One school man thinks if the legislature goes as far as it might, next winter it could boost school district taxes by 100 percent. Does that get the attention of our readers?

A considerable part of the upcoming school tax boost here will be due simply to the district paying an ever bigger share of the total tax bill with the state paying less.

Keep your eyes on Austin this winter and remember when Governor Dolph Briscoe promises not to increase taxes he is talking about your state taxes, and in doing this he may well be boosting your school district taxes by a heck of a lot.

## Small business help on way

Small business help may be on the way. The small business man will continue its fight at the session of the Texas Legislature to put a six percent cap on all business profits.

There were just two of the eye-openers, Joe Kelley of Lubbock, district representative for the National Federation of Independent Businessmen, and Post Rotarians at their Tuesday luncheon.

Kelley said a bill has passed the house of congress and is expected to be approved by the senate to require a heavy financial penalties. This gives small business a chance to get their response to a question on the floor, Kelley said.

medical staff by a unanimous vote after reviewing Dr. Chana's application for staff membership.

(3) Voted to purchase a flame photometer for the hospital laboratory at a cost of approximately \$3,275.

(4) Decided to meet again at 6:30 p.m. tonight in a special meeting to consider other immediate hospital problems and take final action on purchase of a fetal monitor machine for the hospital which will cost in the \$8,000 to \$10,000 range.

Purchase of the two pieces of equipment has been under discussion by the board for some months and the board has advertised for bids on both pieces of equipment through the dispatch.

The flame photometer for the laboratory will be used to measure sodium and potassium levels in the blood to help physicians monitor the treatment of patients. Now such measurements are having to be made by taking blood samples to Lubbock for flame photometer examination there.

The fetal monitoring machine would record the unborn baby's heartbeat on a graph from the moment the mother begins her period of labor.

In most cases, childbirth goes smoothly, but if the fetal heartbeat shows a pattern of faltering or irregular rhythm, attendants can swing into action and tests made to determine if the fetus is getting enough oxygen. If the fetus isn't, delivery by Cesarean section can be under way in less than five minutes.

Speed at this point is essential since many types of congenital brain damage and neurological

problems such as cerebral palsy, are now known to be due to oxygen deprivation in the fetus.

The hospital had a fetal monitoring machine here for demonstration purposes for two weeks and board members said it twice alerted physicians to problems.

Dr. Perry Hunsaker, new hospital administrator, reported to directors that the new Tahoka physician has called him to inquire about applying for a medical staff position at Garza Hospital with the possibility of performing some operations here.

Hunsaker, who began his new duties Monday, told the board that \$25,000 of the hospital's certificates of deposit had to be cashed his first day on the job to cover \$9,000 in bank overdrafts and \$8,000 in other hospital checks outstanding and to provide immediate operation funds.

He said the remainder of the hospital's \$90,000 in certificates of deposit were placed in savings accounts at slightly less interest so they would be available without interest loss if needed.

The Dispatch understands that the hospital has been having to use only about \$7,000 a year of its tax money for operating expenses with hospital income supporting the remainder of the hospital's operation.

The balance of funds had been placed in six month CDs for eventual use in major repairs or expansion of the hospital, for new equipment purchase, or as a financial cushion in times when the hospital operations might slip into the red.

meter. The sample is burned in a graphite furnace and a spectral light beam analyzes the sample.

Finally, the coal sample is given a sieve analysis to check the size of the coal and to make sure it is not too large for the crusher equipment at the power plant. On the other hand, if the coal is too fine, it will be hard to control and create dust problems. This test also checks the performance of the coal pulverizer at the plant.

The introduction of coal as a boiler fuel marks a milestone in the energy picture for the 45,000 square miles served by Southwestern Public Service Company. No more power plants will be built by SPS that use natural gas as the primary fuel. However, gas will play an important role for some time to come. But the future belongs to coal and ultimately to uranium and nuclear power.

## Legal Notice

Ordinance No. 311  
AN ORDINANCE ESTABLISHING A MAXIMUM SPEED LIMIT OF 50 MILES PER HOUR FOR RAILROAD TRAIN, CARS AND LOCOMOTIVE, MAKING IT UNLAWFUL FOR ANY PERSON IN CHARGE OF SUCH TO RUN SUCH AT A GREATER SPEED; PROVIDING FOR SEVERALTY; REPEALING CONFLICTING ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR PUBLICATION; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, it is to the benefit of the Citizens of Post, Texas, to limit railroad conveyances, and

WHEREAS, 50 miles per hour is found to be the maximum reasonable speed near crossings to avoid endangering the citizens of said City, NOW THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF POST:

SECTION I. It shall be unlawful for any engineer, conductor or other person in charge of a locomotive, railroad train or railroad car, to run the engine thereof when approaching within fifty (50) feet of and through any crossing with a public street or roadway within the corporate limits of the City of Post at a speed greater than 50 miles per hour.

SECTION II. Any person who shall violate the terms of Section I of this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in any sum not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars.

SECTION III. If any section, subsection, clause, phrase or word of this ordinance for any reason is held to be unconstitutional or invalid, such portion shall be deemed a separate, distinct and independent provision and such holding shall not affect the validity of the remaining portions.

SECTION IV. This ordinance repeals any existing ordinance in conflict with its terms.

SECTION V. This ordinance shall be published in full in the manner provided by law.

SECTION VI. The terms of this ordinance shall become effective 30 days from the date of its final passage.

# Crosbyton to get pilot 'solar electric plant' in 1977

CROSBYTON — As of May 1, this small town looms big on the national energy map.

It was that Saturday that a federal \$2,387,000 research grant by the Energy Research and Development Administration was announced for Texas Tech University for one of the world's first pilot projects to attempt to capture and convert rays from the sun into productive energy.

The actual physical testing will be conducted on property owned by the City of Crosbyton, two miles south of town.

E-Systems, Inc., a major Dallas-based electronics and high-technology company, has participated in the conception and pursuit of the Crosbyton solar project.

Congressman George Mahon, who has landed many federal plums for his district, announced the grant April 29, Saturday to news media.

"This solar energy development could mean something really big for our area," Congressman Mahon told Crosbyton city officials and The Crosbyton Review during a Sunday phone conversation from Washington.

The way the project is planned, \$885,000 in federal funds will be used for the first nine months study of the project by skilled Tech personnel. ERDA then will take "a hard look" at the progress and feasibility outlook at that point before loaning the additional \$1,682,000 for actual construction and operation of the proposed "dish" and plant at Crosbyton to convert the sun's rays into electricity.

## Two new locations in Garza County

Two new drilling locations in Garza County, one a wildcat, were announced this week.

The wildcat is the C. B. Moncrief No. 1-54 Beggs Trust 15 miles east of Post which will be drilled to 8,500 feet.

The other is Hobson & Barfield's No. 1 F. L. Calvert in the Post field, 14 miles northeast of Post which will be drilled only to a 2,800 foot depth.

But that's not all. If the theory of converting energy in light into energy in electricity through the dish formula appears feasible after the first 24 months, then ERDA would be requested to fund an additional \$18,000,000 to complete the study over another three-year period.

The "Crosbyton plan" as the pilot project has been aimed by some solar experts would be the first experimentation involving the "dish concept" in the United States.

Dean John R. Bradford of Texas Tech University's college of engineering said that, while the concept involved is more than a century old, the project has unique features which

promise highly practical results.

The first phase will be devoted to research leading to cost estimates for mass production of units similar to the installation planned for Crosbyton.

"We are hoping," he said, "that eventually farmers could invest as little as \$50 to \$100 per acre to bring their irrigation fuel costs back down to a level comparable to that invested in fuel three or four years ago."

In addition, he said, the prototype at Crosbyton will be

an operable system which could serve as a model for other towns of a similar size, helping them to produce electrical energy at pre-crisis levels.

A critical factor in the research problem will be study of the interface between the solar and fossil fuel systems in order that electrical frequencies, energy loads and all other elements can be matched to make the two systems work in harmony.

The initial research for which ERDS funds have been designated will be theoretical, Brad-

ford said, and will determine probable limits of the system. Phase II will involve actual construction of a complete solar energy power production system.

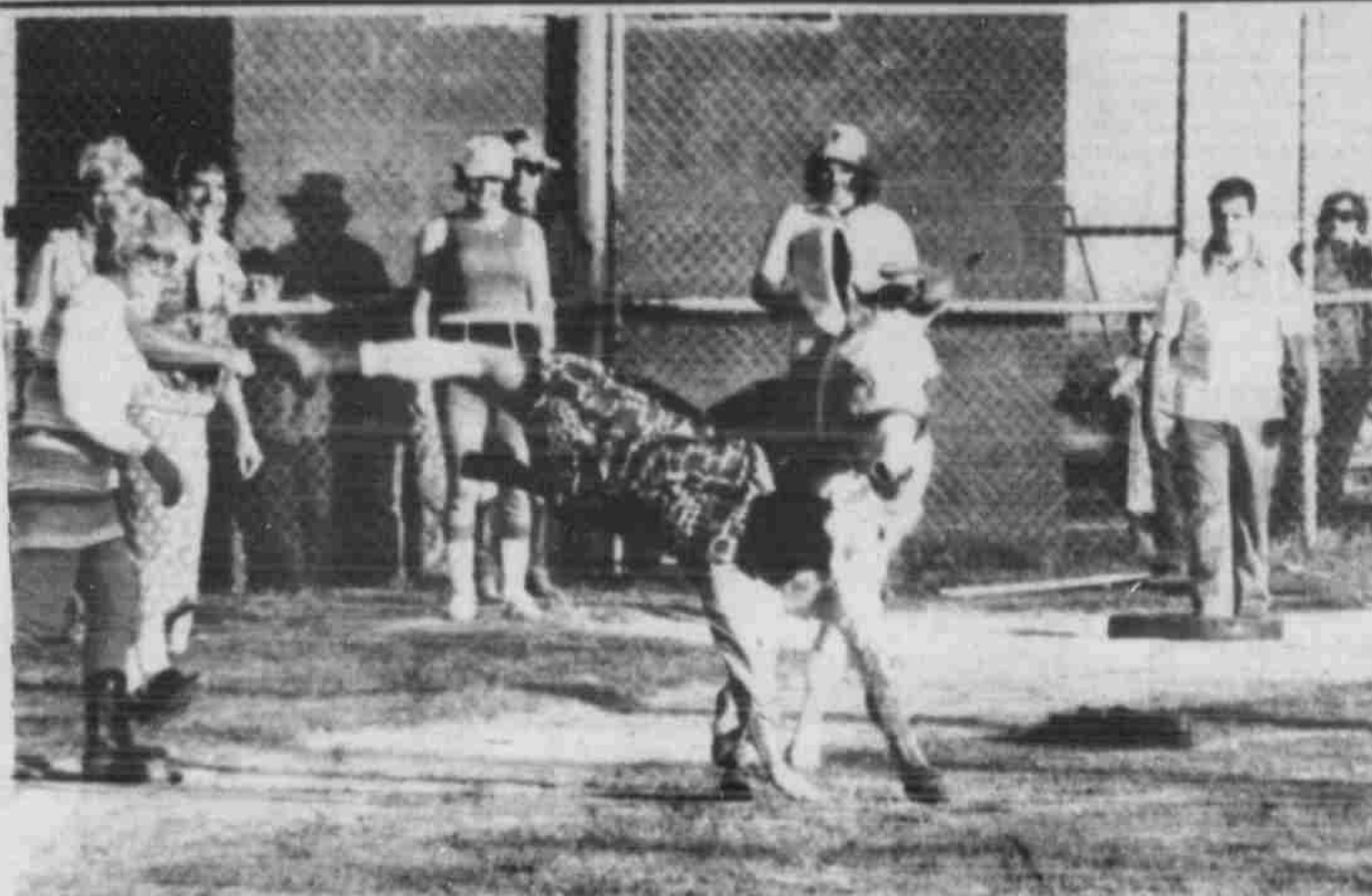

## Interest rate is reduced

## Trout fishing available now for Texas

LUBBOCK — Fishing for trout in clear, cold water reminds oldtimers of the Rocky Mountains or places in the north country but, Texas now has both lake and stream trout fisheries available to anglers.

Two of the best known trout streams in Texas include the Brazos river below Possum Kingdom reservoir and the Guadalupe River below Canyon Lake.

The Brazos fishery in Palo Pinto county is open throughout the year to rainbow trout fishing. Wade fishing extends three miles downstream with one mile of public shoreline with a parking area open below the dam. Public entrance is also available at the state highway 16 bridge.

The Guadalupe fishery in Comal County is stocked with rainbow and brown trout in the eight mile river section. Public access to the river is provided on public property immediately below Canyon dam and at several highway crossings.

For maximum enjoyment and more assurance his or her effort will be rewarded, a trout angler should use light tackle.

Trout normally can be found in a variety of habitats, but most can be caught by fishing in the edge of riffles, below large boulders, the upstream margins of deep pools, and along steep banks. A cool water temperature and abundant oxygen are readily available in these streams and lakes such as Rita Blanca near Dalhart in

northwest Texas. Both stream and lake anglers use light line with just enough weight to allow the bait to move downstream or settle near the bottom.

The creel limit is five trout per day and possession limit 10 trout. There is no size limit on trout in Texas.

Texas regulations require same fishing license for trout fishermen as the bass or other freshwater angler purchases one of the many license vendors across the state for \$4.25.

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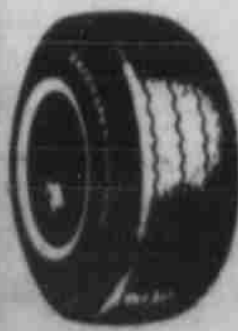

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## Homes sought for foster family home program

Foster homes are needed in Lubbock and surrounding South Plains counties to provide care for aged, blind, or other disabled adults who can no longer continue living in their own homes, but who are not medically eligible for nursing home care, according to Orand Carroll, Texas State Department of Public Welfare.

The foster family home program is one of the adult programs provided by the department as an alternative to institutional care.

"We are seeking warm, loving people who have room in their homes for one to three disabled people who are related to them," Carroll said. "The foster family must be willing to help provide

opportunities for social, recreational and religious activities as appropriate. They would not need to provide health related services."

Upon notification, the social worker will interview prospective foster care providers and check to see that the home meets health and safety standards. They will also give ongoing consultation to approved providers on any problems that may arise, Carroll said.

"We would help the persons seeking foster care and those wishing to give it to get acquainted before further arrangements are made," Carroll stated. "This is, really, a family-sharing program where all concerned need to be congenial. We expect it to enrich the lives of all concerned."

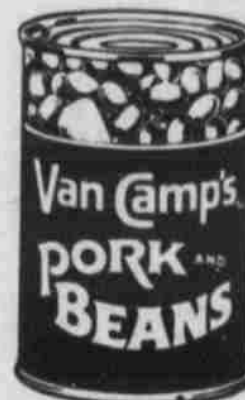

## County budgets \$84,000 in '76 revenue sharing

The Garza County Commissioners Court Monday adopted an \$84,012 federal revenue sharing budget for 1976 which provided for a variety of programs and left \$18,484.98 in a general category for projects to come.

Included in the budget was: \$12,326.42 for operation of the community center; \$8,250 for each of the four county commissioner precincts; \$10,000 for law enforcement and ambulance service; \$4,200 for the county treasurer's commission as required by statute;

\$3,000 for city-county park operation; \$1,750 for the summer recreation program; \$500 for the special state school; \$750 to complete the county's share of the library budget the rest of which is provided in the county's regular budget.

The court decided that Garza County should remain with South Plains Community Action of Levelland in participation in the manpower program rather than participation in a manpower consortium through SPAG.

The court passed a resolution to continue as a participant in SPAG's regional law enforcement network program.

The court accepted financial responsibility for the mini-bus operation here in order to continue providing services to Garza residents. The court had received a letter from the South Plains Regional Office on aging that federal funds have expired on the mini bus project.

pickup process to the council in the library which adjoins the council chamber.

Mrs. Maxine Marks and five other members of the community center committee, Doris Giddens, Inez Hartel, Marie Neff, Ruby Kirkpatrick and Patty Kirkpatrick, appeared at the start of the budget "work session" to request consideration of phase 2 construction in the new building.

Phase two would provide for new entrance, lobby, office, and restrooms at northeast corner of building at what is now the parking lot and would complete the exterior work on the building.

Part of the original phase 2 was included in phase 1 due to the low bid received.

Dwayne McQueen of Lubbock, representing the architects, said if the city advertised for bids now while Contractor Lee Lewis is still on the job on phase 1, Post possibly could save up to \$10,000 on the new construction.

Mrs. Marks asked the council not to give the community an "unfinished building."

Councilman Jim Jackson told the center committee he wanted to clear up one point. He said he was for the community center, and was not against it as some had said, but he wanted to see the money was available before spending it.

A group of explorer scouts

stopped in at the council session as it started to express their interest in the community center.

They included Randy Baker, Brad Davis, Dana Giddens, Peggy Jackson, Karen Perkins, Ken Forbes, Nancy McCowen, Christy Workman, Donna Josey, Jenny Thomas, Leanna Davis and Bruce Waldrup.

Mrs. Marks cited community interest in the project by the fact that all equipment ordered for the center — \$5,000 worth — has been paid for through donations by clubs, individuals and business firms and that a new piano also is being donated.

In other actions, the council passed on second reading the 50 mile an hour speed limit for trains through Post and adopted on first reading a change in Post's livestock ordinance.

The livestock ordinance change provides exceptions to the ordinance in permitting livestock grazing on open pasture land within 300 feet of a residence providing that the pasture land extends unfenced for more than 200 yards beyond the city limits, and permits livestock grazing on fenced tracts of land within or extending beyond the city limits of not less than one acre so long as concentrations of livestock do not exceed 10 per acre.

The council approved a \$21,900 draw by Contractor Lewis on the community center project and \$420 in architectural fees to Whitaker and Hall.

At the suggestion of Harvey Morton, attorney for the city, the council approved the appointment of an independent appraiser to determine if the property along several blocks the city and county propose to strip pave jointly will be enhanced by the paving.

Morton said in a letter if the property is not enhanced the city and county could legally carry out the paving in the community's interest, but if the property was enhanced the property enhanced should be charged for the amount of the enhancement.

As for the new city budget, the council actually considered two budgets. The first from July 1 through Sept. 30, a three months budget, and the second from Oct. 1, 1976 to Sept. 30 1977. The change in budget dates is made to make the municipal budget period conform to the federal budget year.

This makes things, especially income for the three months period, a bit more difficult.

Several councilmen asked that the city auditor figure if the note on the Parrish building for approximately \$8,000 can be paid off in the new budget. The thinking here is to get phase one paid for completely before starting on phase two.
