Local Vocational Agriculture Boys Become Screwworm Vigilantes

Vocational agriculture students attending Loraine High School have recently become "screwworm vigilantes" according to their teacher, Raymond Holt. The students are cooperating with the Southwest Screwworm Eradication Program by conducting a weekly survey of livestock in the area to determine how many, if any, screwworm infestations the stockmen have found.

Carrying on in the best tradition of the vigilantes of the Old West who prevented outbreaks of lawlessness through constant surveillance, the local Future Farmers of America are aiding in the attempt to prevent outbreaks of the screwworm, which costs the livestock industry many millions of dollars each year. Program officials indicated that the eradication effort is entering a critical stage with the approach of warmer weather, and reporting of this type can literally determine its success or failure.

Holt said he has 11 students contacting 35 livestockmen each week. The students record the number of screwworm cases each producer discovered during the previous week and the number of samples that were sent in for identification by the Mission, Texas, laboratory. The individual student reports are tabulated by the teacher and a single report is mailed to screwworm eradication

program officials. The information is considered by officials in planning release of sexually sterile screwworm flies now being reared in a plant near Mission at the rate of over 75 million per week.

Livestockmen are encouraged to check their animals often and treat any wounds or scratches. About 10 maggots taken from deep in the wound should be sent to Mission for positive identification and the wound should then be properly treated with an approved insecticide. Kill any screwworms that drop out on the ground.

The recent cold weather has lowered the native screwworm population considerably, Holt said, and program officials feel now is the time when great strides toward eradication can be made. However, if infested animals are not found and treated, screwworms may once again spread across the state and undo all that has been gained. A single screwworm case left untreated develops into hundreds of cases within a few weeks, the vocational agriculture teacher stated.

Any farmer or rancher in the area not being contacted by one of the students, who finds screwworms in his livestock, should tell the vocational agriculture teacher or county agent immediately, Holt said.

Carriker To Know What People Think

Max D. Carriker, Representative from the 80th District mailed out his questionnaire to the voters this week. This is the fourth such questionnaire that Mr. Carriker has sent out since coming to the Legislature in 1959. The 80th District includes Fisher, Nolan, Mitchell, Dickens, King, and Stonewall Counties.

The purpose of Carriker's questionnaire is to get grass-roots feeling on the issues. "Austin is full of experts", he says, "but I want to get the opinion of the private citizen back home." Since 1959 Mr. Carriker has polled every fourth constituent each session. The persons who receive the questionnaire are chosen at random by going down the poll tax lists and picking every fourth name.

Out of the 48 topics that have appeared on previous questionnaires 44 have subsequently become major issues in the Legislature. "This is remarkable foresight in the selection of key issues in advance," said a fellow legislator. It is interesting to note that Mr. Carriker has never found it necessary to vote contrary to the findings of the poll on a single issue.

Some of the issues included in the present questionnaire are the replacement of the poll tax with a registration law and the screw-worm bill. The answers have always been strictly confidential with Mr. Carriker. "These questionnaires have helped me a great deal in finding out what is in the best interests of the people," he says. "They are completely confidential. I have always kept the individual answers private to make sure that people are frank with me."

Mr. Carriker expressed the hope that the response to the questionnaire will be as good this year as it has been in the past.

One year the response was over 40% which is an amazing figure for this type of mail out. "It shows that the people of the District, not only care what goes on in Austin, but they also keep up with the issues," said Mr. Carriker.

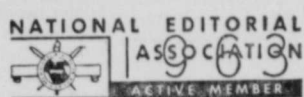

County tax offices have special cards for ordering copies of the map.

Within the free maps depicting Texas delights in vivid full-color photographs will find their way to glove compartments all over the United States and the world.

Keyed to the swelling Texas tourist industry—up 14 per cent in visitor volume last year—the new travel map urges users to "Discover Texas—Today's Fun-der." The map and its "fun-der" theme are linked in a promotional package of publications and other materials aimed at enhancing the image of Texas as a vacation paradise.

Purpose of the map is to stimulate travel in Texas by both Texans and visitors, and to make it easier for motorists to get from place to place. Scenic and cultural diversification of Texas is captured in a message by Governor John Connally urging prospective visitors to "visit our historical sites, vacation playgrounds, inland lakes and Gulf Coast beaches—our mountains, plains and piney woods—our cities and towns. The Texas Highway Department will be happy to provide you with any information you may need for your visit."

Eighteen full-color photographs illustrate the Governor's description of "Texas' varied vacation lands." Depicting activities ranging from big-league baseball to bass fishing, the photographic cross section and easy-to-read map comprise a useful showpiece of the many splendorous charms of Texas.

The 28 x 36-inch map shows that highways have been growing with Texas and contributing to the growth of its tourist industry. Multi-lane-divided highway miles now completed and indicated on the new map total 2,808 miles.

4. Request to go on the ballot: Any person who has the qualification and desires to have his name placed upon the Official Ballot as a candidate for Mayor or Councilman of the City of Loraine, Texas, shall be filed with the City Secretary of Loraine, Texas, not later than the 15th day of March 1963.

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Farm Facts

In all, there are some 30 separate steps in research to bring a pesticide chemical to market. As many as 8,000 compounds may be screened before a single promising one is found.

Up to six years and 100,000 man-hours of research and testing may go into making sure everything possible is known about the chemical.

The chemical is tested in the greenhouse, in the laboratory, and in test fields. Small quantities then are sent to field stations. Once through these tests, the material will be taken to state agricultural stations and the U. S. Department of Agriculture for extensive testing under field conditions.

All the while it is being tested for possible hazards. Laboratory animals are used to find out effects, if any, when the material is swallowed, if it touches the skin, or if it is inhaled.

submitted to USDA scientists for review. If it is to be used on food crops, and there is any evidence it will leave any residue, it must be reviewed by the Food and Drug Administration.

SOIL DISTRICT OFFICIALS DISCUSS TERRACE CLOSURES

A meeting was held in the Soil Conservation Service office Monday night with the local terracing contractors, some members of the SCS staff, and Mr. Curtis Lattimer, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service committee to discuss terracing and other related problems. Others attending the meeting were terracing contractors: Travis Turner, Loyd Barr, Ben Sparks, Bob and Roy Nobles, and Alvin Clemmer; and Allen Sheppard and Alvin Jackson of the Soil Conservation Service staff. Various problems that arise in the construction of a terrace system and the responsibilities of all parties concerned were discussed.

Proper construction and maintenance of terrace closures (or blocks) was also discussed. Mr. Sheppard pointed out to the group, the necessity of terrace end closures to retain water on the land and prevent terrace channel erosion, but that over blocking was a hazard to the terrace system. He explained that a block cuts down the area through which surplus water may escape. He pointed out that a block is only 2 1/2 the height of the terrace where it joins the terrace and the top of the block built level to the uphill end leaves a much larger area through which surplus water may flow. This increased area may mean the difference in surplus water escaping safely or breaking the terrace. It was also pointed out that the maintenance of proper blocks in terraces is just as important as maintaining the terraces.

Stress was also placed upon proper disposal of surplus water after it flows over the blocks.

Turnovers should be maintained as emergency outlets to lead the surplus water from the field, rather than let it re-enter the terrace system by flowing in behind the block of terraces further down the slope. Discussion of this emergency outlet brought out the necessity of a thorough understanding being had between the landowner and the contractor as to the shaping of this outlet before the terracing job is started.

The duties and responsibilities of each party involved in establishing a terrace system on the land was discussed and the following facts pointed out:

1. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service County Committee issues tentative approval and furnishes the government's assistance with Agricultural Conservation Program cost-share.
2. The Soil Conservation Service readers technical assistance in running the terrace lines, staking the blocks and giving the landowner guidance in the proper disposal of excess water leaving the system over the blocks; then checking the system to see if specifications have been met after the job is completed.
3. The contractor has the responsibility of building the terraces, blocks and any other item he and the landowner have agreed upon before the job was started.
4. It is the landowner's responsibility to furnish SCS with terrace measurements and accept or reject the job after the SCS representative, with the farmer's and contractor's help, has checked the system and determined that it meets specifications for cost-share. No SCS representative can accept a job for the landowner that the specifications

have been met and the job will qualify for cost-share. It is then the landowner's responsibility to accept or reject the job.

Mr. Lattimer, Chairman of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service Committee, pointed out that the ASCS, Soil Conservation Service, terracing contractor, and the landowner must cooperate as a team, each performing his duty and assuming his share of the responsibility to get the best terrace system possible on the land with the funds available.

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS

Q. Has there been a recent change in the priorities for VA hospitalization?

A. Yes. Under a new law, the peacetime veteran with noncompensable service-connected disability now has the same eligibility for VA medical care as the wartime veterans with noncompensable service-connected disability.

Q. I have been getting drugs from my local pharmacy under the VA hometown pharmacy program. Will I be affected by changes I hear are being made in this program?

A. No. The changes involve billing procedures under which VA pays the pharmacies. Veterans will continue to go to their local pharmacies for services under the program.

Q. What new hospitals does the Veterans Administration have under construction, and when will they be completed?

A. New, replacement hospitals being built by the VA and their schedule of completion are: Cleveland, Ohio, fall of 1963; Martinez, California, spring of 1963; Nashville, Tennessee, early 1963; Washington, D. C., fall of 1963; Wood, Wisconsin, early 1963.
