OPEN CANNING KITCHEN HERE

CHAMBER OF COMMERCE WILL
OPERATE KITCHEN FOR
BENEFIT OF THE
PUBLIC

Workmen are busy remodeling the
R. H. Holland building on south
Main street which is to be converted
into a community canning kitchen,
according to C. E. Whippo, presi-
dent of the Chamber of Commerce.

Sewer connection will be made and
water and gas piped into the build-
ing. Canning equipment includ-
ing pressure cookers, gas plates, can
sealers, and the like have been or-
dered and it is thought that the
building will be ready by the time
they are received.

The interior of the building is be-
ing scrubbed and cleaned and will
be repainted and the necessary ta-
bles and benches will be supplied.

The Chamber of Commerce, which
organization has promoted the can-
ning kitchen, will take care of the
rent and necessary expense of the
kitchen and will open it to the pub-
lic. It will be operated under the
direction of Guy R. Sheets, county
agent.

No charge will be made for use
of the kitchen, according to Mr.
Whippo, and when put into oper-
ation, the public will be invited to
use it freely. Other sources are
assisting in furnishing equipment
and labor in preparing the building.

Is Farm Loan Agent
E. P. Rogers Appointed County Rep-
resentative on Farm Loan
Refinancing

It is reported that the first loan
from the \$200,000,000 fund ap-
propriated by Congress to re-finance
farm mortgage indebtedness and to
aid the farmers to redeem their
foreclosed farms, was made in
Texas this week. The loan was for
the amount of \$3,000.00, and was
made to a farmer and stockman of
Brazoria county, who has resided
in that section for a number of
years.

Loan Commissioner, Houston, Texas,
reports that although they have
been somewhat hampered by a large
volume of correspondence addressed
to his office, the Texas division is
now organized and in position to
handle its coming business with dis-
patch. F. P. Rogers has been re-
quested to act as his local corre-
spondent for Ochiltree county and all
eligible farmers entitled to assis-
tance through this division may call
on him, and he will gladly render
such assistance as he can.

TO ORGANIZE PANHAN- DLE HIGHWAY BOOSTERS

N. S. Griggs, president of the
highway division of the Amarillo
Chamber of Commerce, has called
a meeting of citizens from over
the entire Panhandle to meet
at Amarillo Saturday, June 10; at
2:00 p. m. for the purpose of or-
ganizing the Panhandle Highway
Association. There is a vital
need for such a body at this time.
Texas has been designated to re-
ceive \$25,000,000 in Federal aid to
be used on highways. This money
is to be expended by a special
commission that has been appoint-
ed by the Governor. The state
highway commission will have
little or no voice in where it is
expended. The chief purpose of
the Panhandle organization will
be to make a united effort to see
that the Panhandle gets its just
share of this great program. W.

WAR VETERANS ELIGIBLE FOR REFORESTING ARMY

Commander J. R. Thomas of the
Pierce Johnson Post of the Ameri-
can Legion has full infor-
mation now relative to enroll-
ment of War Veterans in the
emergency conservation work.
Ochiltree county is attached to the
regional office of the Veter-
an's Administration at Dallas
with a recruiting station at Ama-
rillo. Texas has been assigned a
quota of 1175 veterans. Quota
for counties will be based on popu-
lation, approximately one for
each 5,000. If such is the case,
the Ochiltree county quota will
only be one veteran. Applicants
must be unemployed and physi-
cally able to perform ordinary
manual labor. Applicants must
pay own expense to recruiting
station.

Hours of work will be five eight
hour days, including travel to and
from work and lunch hour.
Clothing will be furnished, also
meals, medical and hospital at-
tention. Enrollment period is
six months with pay at rate of
\$30.00 per month. At end of six
months period, veterans will be
returned home at government ex-
pense. Commander Thomas has
written for application blanks.
Any veteran desiring informa-
tion concerning these camps
should get in touch with Mr.
Thomas at once.

Perryton was selected as the 1934
meeting place for the Great Plains
Highway Association at the annual
convention held at McCook, Ne-
braska, Tuesday, June 6. The Per-
ryton delegation composed of R. T.
Shindler, W. B. LaMaster, and
Judge Geo. M. Perry returned from
the annual convence Wednesday.

They report a most successful meet-
ing with a large attendance, almost
a hundred delegates being regis-
tered. The attendance at the 1934
convention to be held here should be
much larger owing to the fact that
Perryton is located just about mid-
way between the Canadian line and
the Mexico border.

R. T. Shindler, who has served
as vice-president of the association
for the past year, was reelected. W.
B. LaMaster was elected as vice-
president representing Texas. J. V.
Romigh, North Platte, Nebr. was
returned to the president's office.
Perryton won the next convention
by the narrow margin of two votes,
Valentine, Nebr. being the other
contestant.

TEX LA IS MOV- ING HIGH LINE

SETTING BACK POWER LINE TO
BOOKER WILL REQUIRE 30
DAYS; \$2,000.00 TO LO-
CAL LABORERS

C. E. Whippo, division manager
of the Texas-Louisiana Power Co.,
states that they now have a big force
of men employed moving their high
power tension line back for the new
Highway No. 117 from Perryton to
Booker.

Mr. Whippo states that the re-
building of this line will give em-
ployment to many local people. It
will require thirty days time and an
expenditure of approximately \$2,000-
00, every cent of which will be paid
to local men.

Building of highways usually mean
an added burden of expense of pow-
er companies for almost invariably
the lines have to be rebuilt to con-
form with the new routes, increased
widths, etc. The high line from
Spearman to Perryton had to be
changed just a few months after
it was first constructed.

The community was saddened by
the news of the tragic death of Ez-

H. Feiler, which occurred at McPher-
son, Kansas, last Friday evening.

The fatal event happened in some
way while Ezra was boarding a train
to return from college to his home
at Perryton, the body being severed

to Quinter, the childhood home of
the deceased, where funeral services

tended the funeral.

Ezra Herman was the only son of

month, thirteen days. He was born
at Dorrence, Kansas. Since his
father is a minister, and has served
at different places as pastor, Ez-
ra had his home at several differ-
ent places. He united with the
Brethren Church at the age of sev-
en years.

Two years ago his parents moved
to Perryton where Ezra finished his
high school, graduating with the
class of 1932. He entered college
at McPherson in September, 1932,
where he has been in attendance un-
till the accident which caused his
death.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF TEXAS

S. J. E. No. 3

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IX of the Constitution of Texas be amended by adding thereto a section to be Section 3, which shall read: "Section 3. (1) Holding the belief that the highest degree of local self government which is consistent with the efficient conduct of the affairs by necessity lodged in the Nation and the State will prove most responsive to the will of the people, and result to reward their diligence and intelligence by greater economy and efficiency in their local governmental affairs, it hereby is ordained:

"(2) Any county having a population of sixty-two thousand (62,000) or more according to the then last Federal Census may adopt a County Home Rule Charter, to embrace those powers appropriate hereto, within the specific limitations hereinafter provided. It further is provided that the Legislature, by a favorable vote of two-thirds of the total membership of both the Senate and the House of Representatives, may authorize any county having a population less than that above specified, to proceed hereafter for the adoption of a Charter; however, as a condition for such authorization, it is required that notice of the intent to seek Legislative authority hereunder must be published in one or more newspapers, to give general circulation in the county affected, not less than once per week for four (4) consecutive weeks, and the first of such publications shall appear not less than thirty (30) days next prior to the time an Act making proposal hereunder may be introduced in the Legislature. No County Home Rule Charter may be adopted by any county save upon a favorable vote of the resident qualified electors of the affected county. In elections submitting to the voters a proposal to adopt a Charter (unless otherwise provided by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each House of the Legislature) the votes cast by the qualified electors residing within the limits of all the incorporated cities and towns of the county shall be separately counted and separately counted, and unless there be a favorable majority of the votes cast within a favorable majority of the votes cast without such collective cities and towns, the Charter shall not be adopted. It is expressly forbidden that any such Charter may in any manner affect the operation of the General Laws of the State relating to the judicial, tax, fiscal, educational, police, highway and health systems, or any other department of the State's superior government. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the adoption of a Charter provision inimical to or inconsistent with the sovereignty and established public

lic policies of this State, and no provision having such effect shall have validity as against the State. No Charter provision may operate to impair the exemption of homesteads as established by this Constitution and the Statutes relating thereto.

"(3) A Charter hereunder may provide for the continuance of a County Commission Court, as now constituted, to serve as the governing body of a county to operate hereunder, or may provide for a governing body to exercise the powers, which shall be elective, and service therein shall be upon such qualifications, for such terms, under such plan of representation, and upon such conditions of tenure and compensation as may be fixed by any such Charter. The terms for service in such governing body may exceed two (2) years, but shall not exceed six (6) years. In any event, in addition to the powers and duties provided by any such Charter, such governing body shall exercise all powers and discharge all duties which in the absence of the provisions hereof, would devolve by law on County Commissioners and County Commissioners Courts. Further, any such Charter may provide for the organization, reorganization, establishment and administration of the government of the county, including the control and regulation of the performance of and the compensation for all duties required in the conduct of the county affairs, subject to the limitations herein provided.

"b. A Charter hereunder may provide that Judges of County Courts (including that County Court designated in this Constitution), and Justices of the Peace be compensated upon a salary basis in lieu of fees. The jurisdiction of the County Court shall be defined by the Constitution, and the duties of the Justices thereof may be confined to that general jurisdiction of a probate court, which shall be defined in this Constitution. The office of Justice of the Peace may be made either elective or appointive. Other than as herein provided, no such Charter shall provide for altering the jurisdiction or procedure of any Court. The duties of District Attorneys and County Clerks shall be confined to those prescribed by the State in civil cases to which the State is a party and to enforcement of the State's Penal Code, and the compensation of said attorneys may be fixed on a salary basis in lieu of fees.

"c. Save as hereinabove provided, and hereafter otherwise provided, such Charter as herein provided, shall be established for any county electing to operate hereunder, and the duties of county officers and the compensation of said officers shall be fixed by the Charter, whether created by other provisions of the Constitution or by statute; and the duties of county officers and the compensation of said officers shall be fixed by the Charter, whether created by other provisions of the Constitution or by statute; and the duties of county officers and the compensation of said officers shall be fixed by the Charter, whether created by other provisions of the Constitution or by statute.

"e. In addition to the powers herein provided, and in addition to powers included in County Home Rule Charters, any county may, by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said county, amend its Charter to include other powers, functions, duties and rights which may be included in the Charter of the State, and the statutes of the State for counties.

"f. Any county operating hereunder shall have the power to borrow money for all purposes lawful under its Charter, to include the refunding of a lawful debt, in a manner conforming to the General Laws of the State, and may issue therefor its obligations. Such obligations, other than those to refund a lawful debt, shall not be valid unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by those resident qualified voters of the area affected by the taxes required to retire such obligations, who may vote thereon. In case of county obligations, maturing after a period of five (5) years, the same shall be issued in serially, fixing the first maturity of principal at a time not to exceed two (2) years next after the date of the issuance of such obligations, and the balance thereof shall be paid in full at the end of the term of the obligations; but in no event shall the aggregate obligations so issued in principal amount outstanding at any one time exceed the then existing Constitutional limits for such obligations and its support, as determined by Sections 4 and 5 of Article XI of this Constitution, or any Amendment thereof. No obligation issued hereunder shall be valid unless prior to the time of its issuance there is levied a tax sufficient to retire the same as it matures, which tax shall not exceed the then existing Constitutional limits for such obligations.

"g. Such Charter may authorize the governing body of a county operating hereunder to prescribe the schedule of fees to be charged by the officers of the county for specified service, to be in lieu of the schedule for such fees prescribed by the General Laws of the State, and to appropriate such fees to such funds as the Charter may prescribe; provided, however, no fee for a specified service shall exceed in amount the fee fixed by General Law for that same service. Such Charters as to all judicial officers, other than district judges, may prescribe the qualifications for service, provided the standards therefor be not lower than those fixed by the General Laws of the State.

"h. Subject to the express limitations upon the exercise of the powers by this subdivision, to be authorized, such Charters may provide (or omit to provide) that the governmental and/or proprietary functions of any city, town, district or other defined political subdivision (which is a governmental agency and embraced within the boundaries of the county) be transferred, either as to some or all of the functions thereof, and yielded to the control of the administrative body of the county. No such transfer or yielding of functions may be effected unless the proposal is submitted to a vote of the people, and, unless otherwise provided by a two-thirds vote of the total membership of each House of the Legislature, such a proposal shall be submitted as a separate issue, and the vote within and without any city, town, district, or other defined governmental entity, shall be separately cast and counted, and unless two-thirds of the qualified voters cast within the yielding defined governmental entity, and a majority of the qualified voters cast in the remainder of the county, favor the proposed merger, it shall not be effected. In case of the mergers hereby authorized, without express Charter provision therefor, in so far as may be required to make effective the object of the proposed merger, the county shall succeed to all the appropriate lawful powers, duties, rights, procedures, restrictions and limitations which prior to the merger were reposed in, or imposed upon, the yielding governmental agency. Particularly, it is provided that the power to create funded indebtedness and to levy taxes in support thereof may be exercised only by such procedures, and within such limits, as now are or hereafter may be, provided by law to control such

appropriate other governmental agencies were they to be independently administered. Such mergers may be effected under proposed contracts between the county and any such yielding governmental agency, to be approved at an election, in order to increase governmental efficiency and effect economy in the county may contract with the principal city of the county to perform any or more of its functions provided such contracts shall not be valid for more than two (2) years.

"i. In cases of the partial or complete merger of the government of a city or town elects to merge its governmental functions with those of the county, such Charter may provide for defining or redefining the boundaries of such cities and towns, provided, however, that the boundaries may be extended only to include those areas contiguous to such cities as are urban in character; and as to such cities and towns, such Charter may provide for the benefit thereof the county, in addition to the primary city and county tax herein authorized and levied and collect taxes upon the property taxable within such city or town as defined or redefined within the limits authorized by Sections 4 and 5 of Article XI of this Constitution, (or any Amendment thereof) for incorporated cities according to the population, provided that no tax greater than that existing at the time of such merger or for any added purpose shall be imposed upon any such city or town unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by the resident qualified voters of such city or town.

"j. Areas urban in character though not incorporated, under appropriate Charter provision may be defined as such by the governing body of the county, provided, however, that no portion of the county shall be defined as an urban area unless it has sufficient population to entitle it to incorporate under the then existing laws of the State; and no such urban area, when created, shall be vested with any taxing or bonding power which it would not possess if it were operating as a separate incorporated unit under the then existing Constitutional and Statutory provisions of this State; and provided further that the governing body of the county for the government of such areas shall have and exercise all powers and authority granted by law to the governing bodies of similar areas when separately incorporated as a city or town, and such areas shall be subject to additional taxation within the same Constitutional limits as control taxation for a city or town of like population. Likewise such Charter may provide for the governing board of the county subject

to existing Constitutional and statutory provisions to define, create and administer districts, and have and exercise the powers and authority granted by the Constitution and laws relative to the same.

"k. No provision of this Constitution inconsistent with the provisions of this Section 3, of Article IX, shall be held to control the provisions of a Charter adopted hereunder, and conforming herewith. Charters adopted hereunder shall make appropriate provision for the abandonment, revocation, and amendment thereof, subject only to the requirements that there must be a favorable majority of the vote cast upon such a proposal by the qualified resident electors of the county; and no Charter may forbid amendments thereof for a time greater than two (2) years. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing, subject only to the duty of the Legislature to pass all laws (consistent herewith) which may be necessary to carry out the intent and purpose hereof. Further, the Legislature shall prescribe a procedure for submitting to decision, by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon, proposed alternate and elective Charter provisions."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1934, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the Amendment to Article

IX of the Constitution of adding Section 3, providing authority for the adoption of a Rule Charter by the voters of a county having a population of two thousand (2,000) or more, to effect more efficient and economical government within such county, and to authorize separate governmental units within such counties as may be authorized by the people thereof.

Each voter shall scratch on the above listed clause or clauses, leaving unscratched the particular clause which he desires to vote for, and the result of the election shall be determined by the Secretary of State, who shall have the duty of publishing as required by the constitution and laws of this State.

It is expressly forbidden that any such Charter may in any manner affect the operation of the General Laws of the State relating to the judicial, tax, fiscal, educational, police, highway and health systems or any other department of the State's superior government. Nothing herein contained shall be deemed to authorize the adoption of a Charter provision in violation of or inconsistent with the sovereignty and established pub-

lic policies of this State, and no provision having such vice shall have validity as against the State. No Charter provision may operate to impair the exemption of homesteads as established by this Constitution and the Statutes relating thereto.

(3) A Charter hereunder may provide for the continuance of a County Commissioners' Court, as now constituted, to serve as the governing body of a county to operate hereunder, or may provide for a governing body otherwise constituted, which shall be elective, and service therein shall be upon such qualifications, for such terms, under such plan of representation, and upon such conditions of tenure and compensation as may be fixed by any such Charter. The terms for service in such governing body may exceed two (2) years, but shall not exceed six (6) years. In any event, in addition to the powers and duties hereunder, such governing body shall exercise all powers and discharge all duties which, in the absence of the provisions hereof, would devolve by law on County Commissioners and Commissioners' Courts. Further, any such Charter may provide for the organization, reorganization, establishment and administration of the government of the county, in accordance with the provisions of the performance of and the compensation for all duties required in the conduct of the county affairs, subject to the limitations herein provided.

(4) Any county operating hereunder shall have the power to borrow money for all purposes lawful under its Charter, to include the refunding of a lawful debt, in a manner conforming to the General Laws of the State, and may issue therefor its obligations. Such obligations, other than those to refund a lawful debt, shall not be valid unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by those resident qualified voters of the area affected by the taxes required to retire such obligations, who may vote thereon. In case of county obligations, maturing after a period of five (5) years, the same shall be issued to mature serially, fixing the first maturity of principal at a time not to exceed two (2) years next after the date of the issuance of such obligations. Such obligations shall be levied on the faith and credit of the county; but in no event shall the aggregate obligations so issued, in principal amount outstanding at any time, exceed the then existing Constitutional limits for such obligations and such indebtedness and its supporting tax shall constitute a first and superior lien on the property taxable in such county. No obligation issued hereunder shall be valid unless prior to the time of the issuance thereof a majority of the qualified voters of the county, as defined in this Constitution, shall have voted in favor of the same as a separate issue, and the vote within and without any city, town, district, or other defined governmental entity, shall be separately cast and counted, and unless two-thirds of the qualified voters cast within the yielding defined governmental entity, and a majority of the qualified voters cast in the remainder of the county, favor the proposed merger, it shall not be effective. In case of a vote of the people, authorized, without express Charter provision therefor, in so far as may be required to make effective the object of the proposed merger, the county shall succeed to all the appropriate lawful powers, duties, rights, procedures, restrictions and limitations which prior to the merger were reposed in, or imposed upon, the yielding governmental agency. Particularly, it is provided that the power to create funded indebtedness and to levy taxes in support thereof may be exercised only by such procedures, and within such limits, as now are, or hereafter may be, provided by law to control such

this Constitution to control counties, and the annual assessment upon property, both real, personal and mixed, shall be a first superior and prior lien thereon.

(5) In addition to the powers herein provided, and in addition to powers included in County Home Rule Charters, any county may, by a majority vote of the qualified electors of said county, amend its Charter to include other powers, functions, duties and rights which now or hereafter may be provided by law, Constitution and the statutes of the State for counties.

(6) Any county operating hereunder shall have the power to borrow money for all purposes lawful under its Charter, to include the refunding of a lawful debt, in a manner conforming to the General Laws of the State, and may issue therefor its obligations. Such obligations, other than those to refund a lawful debt, shall not be valid unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by those resident qualified voters of the area affected by the taxes required to retire such obligations, who may vote thereon. In case of county obligations, maturing after a period of five (5) years, the same shall be issued to mature serially, fixing the first maturity of principal at a time not to exceed two (2) years next after the date of the issuance of such obligations. 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appropriate other governmental agencies were they to be independently administered. Such mergers may be effected under proposed contracts between the county and any such yielding governmental agency, to be approved at an election, in order to increase governmental efficiency and effect economy the county may contract with the yielding city or town to perform one or more of its functions, provided such contracts shall not be valid for more than two (2) years. In cases of the partial or complete merger of the government of a city operating under a Home Rule Charter, with the government of a county operating hereunder, the city Charter provisions affected thereby shall cease to control, and the county Charter provisions shall control.

(11) When any embraced incorporated city or town elects to merge its governmental functions with those of the county under the provisions hereof, such Charter may provide for defining or redefining the boundaries of such cities and towns, provided, however, that in defining or redefining such boundaries of cities and towns, such boundaries may be extended only to include those areas contiguous to such cities as are urban in character; and as to such cities or towns, and in addition to the primary city and county tax herein authorized and any other lawful district tax, may levy and collect taxes upon the property taxable within such city or town as defined or redefined, within the limits authorized by Sections 4 and 5 of Article XI of this Constitution, (or any Amendment thereof) for incorporated cities according to the population, provided that no tax greater than that existing at the time of such merger or for any added purpose shall be imposed upon any such city or town unless authorized by a majority of all votes cast by the resident qualified voters of such city or town.

(15) No provision of this Constitution inconsistent with the provisions of this Section 3, of Article IX, shall be held to control the provisions of a Charter adopted hereunder, and conforming herewith, shall make appropriate provision for the abandonment, revocation, and amendment thereof, subject only to the requirements that there must be a favorable majority of the vote cast upon such a proposal, by the qualified resident electors of the county; and, no Charter may forbid amendments thereof, for a time greater than two (2) years. The provisions hereof shall be self-executing, subject only to the duty of the Legislature to pass all laws (consistent herewith) which may be necessary to carry out the intent and purpose hereof. Further, the Legislature shall prescribe a procedure for submitting to decision, by a majority vote of the electors voting thereon, proposed alternate and elective Charter provisions."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the qualified electors of the State at an election to be held throughout the State on the fourth Saturday in August, 1933, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following:

"For the Amendment to Article

IX of the Constitution of Texas, adding Section 3, providing for the adoption of a Charter by the voters of counties having a population of two thousand (2,000) or more, to effect more efficient and economical government within such counties as may be authorized by the people thereof."

Section 3. The Governor of the State is hereby directed to cause an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment to the Constitution of the State shall be published as required by the constitution and laws of the State.

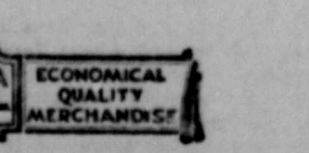
