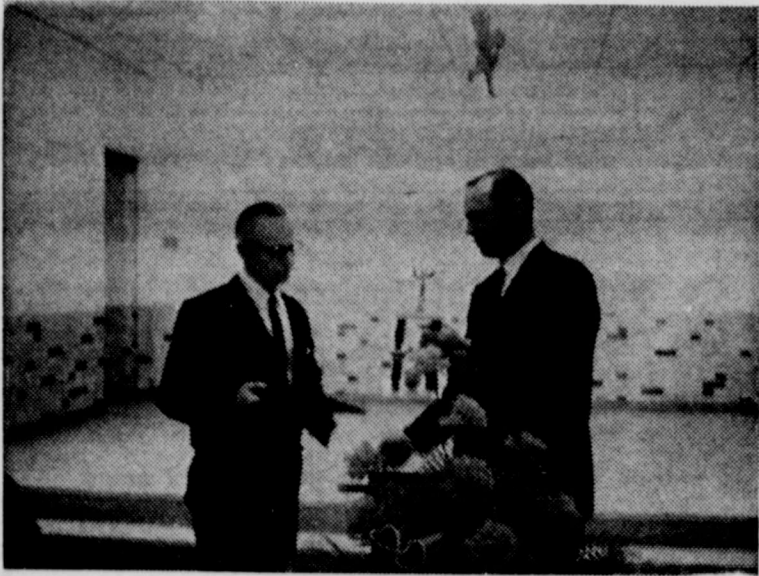

The Third Annual Young Farmer-Young Homemaker Banquet was held Saturday night, February 13, with approximately 150 area residents present. The meal was served by the school lunch room staff and immediately following it, Master of Ceremonies Delton Stone, also Young Farmer President, introduced the entertainment for the evening.

A comedy style show was presented by members of the Young Homemakers and was narrated by Mrs. Edith Almond, YH Advisor. Two of the most delightful of the creations were a dress modeled by Mrs. Jerry Slemmons and one modeled by Mrs. Jerry Phillips. Mrs. Slemmons modeled a black dress trimmed in yellow tissue paper. Mrs. Phillips wore a print ensemble with a skirt made from newspaper and a waistcoat made from the Sunday comics over a sporty blouse.

Mr. Jerry Oswald then made a formal welcome to everyone present at the banquet and Mr. Curtis Davenport gave the response for those who were not members of the Young Farmers or Young Homemakers. Two new honorary members, Leland Phillips and Glen Hammond, were presented plaques for their service to the Chapter. A surprise award was presented to Mr. Jerry Adams, YF Advisor, by Mr. Jerry Oswald.

Mr. Delton Stone received two other awards at the banquet. Terry Barton, President of the local FFA, presented Stone with a block and gavel as a token of appreciation for the help received from the Young Farmers in FFA activities. Mr. Keith Streety, Area I President of the Young Farmers, presented Mr. Stone with a trophy and plaque to the Chapter for its accomplishment as the Outstanding Young Farmer Chapter in Area I.

The speaker for the evening was Dr. J. Wayland Bennett, the Associate Dean, School of Agriculture, Texas Technological College. The full text of Dr. Bennett's address is as follows:

FACTS ABOUT THE FARMER YOUR PARTNER IN PROGRESS

The Agricultural Industry of Texas involves more than farming and ranching. It is the sum total of all operations involved in the manufacture and distribution of farm supplies to farmers; production operations on farms and ranches; and the processing and distribution of farm commodities to consumers.

In the Agricultural Industry

then reaching to Briscoe and Motley on the east, is one of the most fabulous agricultural areas in the world. Using the latest data available, I would like to point out a few pertinent factors about farmers in this area:

The area has 17,873 farmers
Average size farm of 940 acres
Gross farm sales over \$500,000,000

Average total cash farm income of \$28,000

Hale's average gross farm income since 1959 has ranged from about \$35,000 to \$50,000.

Lubbock's average gross farm income since 1959 has averaged about \$35,000.

On the average, in Texas, each dollar of new wealth from agriculture means between \$2 and \$3 of new business on Main Street.

This means that agriculture in this immediate area adds not \$500,000,000 dollars to the economy—but to the total local and state agricultural industry, a whopping \$1 to \$1.5 billion! The agricultural industry is big business. Cash farm sales in Texas have averaged about \$2.4 billion in the last three years—This means the total income for the total agricultural industry is about \$6.3 billion.

Total wages paid in the 23 counties (1962 data) is about \$240,000,000.

Value added by manufacture is about \$80,000,000.

Value of all minerals produced is about \$346,000,000.

Estimated income from all sources is about \$857,000,000, with about 40% of the 23-county income concentrated in Lubbock County. In the South High Plains Trade territory, agriculture is by far the biggest industry, since so much of the oil income actually leaves the area, going to companies and investors living elsewhere.

Modern agriculture is no longer a way of life, but a rapidly changing, highly-capitalized, complex business enterprise. The tremendous infusion of science and technology into agriculture has caused the number of farms and farm workers to steadily decrease, but farmers' total expenditures continue to increase.

Some average annual purchases by farmers include:

\$2 to \$3 billion for new tractors, motor vehicles, machinery and equipment.

\$3.5 billion for fuel, lubricants and motor repairs—including more petroleum than any other industry uses.

\$1.5 billion for fertilizer and lime.

Enough electricity to supply all the cities and towns, farms, and industrial plants in the 6 New England States.

Farmers are efficient: Output per man-hour of the American farm worker in the last 15 years has increased over an average of 5 per cent annually, while output per man-hour in non-farm industry has increased by only 2.2 per cent a year.

One hour of farm labor produces more than four times as much food and fiber as it did 40 years ago.

One farm worker supplies food, fiber and other products for 30 people; in 1920 he supplied 4; in 1920 he supplied 8; in 1950 he supplied 15.

The American consumer reaps the benefits of agriculture—productive efficiency. Some say we have surpluses—A better word is abundance!

Food is a bargain—Any way you look at it. Prices don't tell the full story.

Food has risen less than most other things in the past 15 years. Retail food prices are up only 13%.

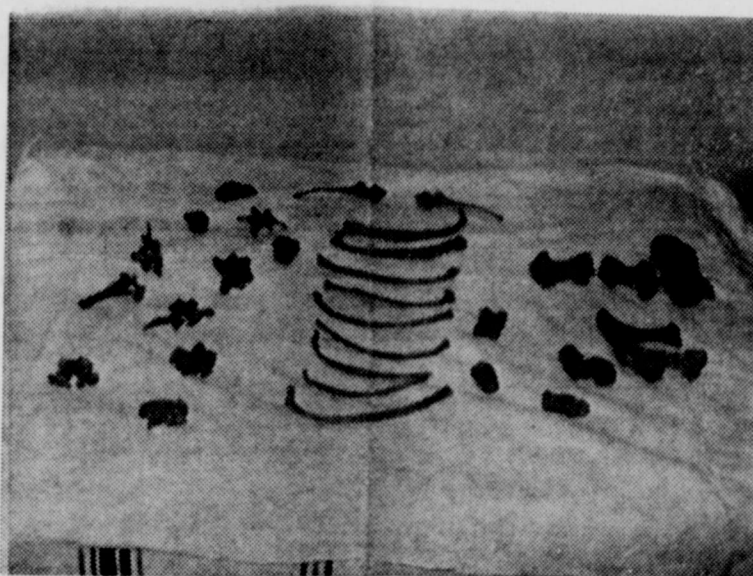
Non-food living expenses are up 31%.

Fifteen years ago it took 60 hours' work to buy the month's farm food supply—Today it takes only 37-38 hours of work.

In the U. S. we spend only 19% of our take-home pay for food, and if it was processed the same way as it was in 1940, it would take only 14% of our income to purchase. Britishers spend 30 per cent—Russians about 60 per cent. And it takes only 8 per cent of our population, compared to over 40 per cent of Russia's, to produce its agricultural output.

Despite the problems that our agricultural abundance seems to create, increased efficiency in agricultural production has made some very significant contributions to the general economy. The consumer is prone to associate the higher cost of living with farm subsidies rather than to associate increased agricultural efficiency with improvements in his level of living.

For example, recently while shopping at a Lubbock supermarket, the woman ahead of me at the checker's stand commented on how expensive food is—



HUMAN BONES? ANIMAL BONES?—At press time, officials were trying to determine whether the collection of bones shown above are from a human skeleton or that of an animal. M. E. (Dude) Smith of Smith Brothers & Wolf Drilling Co. of Abernathy and men working with him found the bones late last week while cleaning out an abandoned irrigation well about ten miles north and six miles east of Abernathy. The well is on the place where Mr. and Mrs. Jimmy Ray recently moved after he resigned as an aide to Congressman George H. Mahon.

Smith said the well is about 150 feet deep, with casing in the bottom part only. Top of the well at ground surface is about 20 inches in diameter. The bones, Smith said, were at about the 140-foot level in the well. The well had not been in production for several years.

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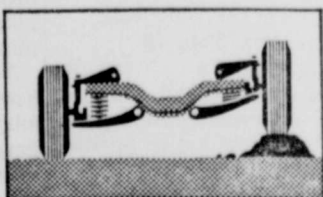


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PROGRESSIVE BUSINESS AND CIVIC - MINDED PEOPLE OF PLAINVIEW AND VICINITY

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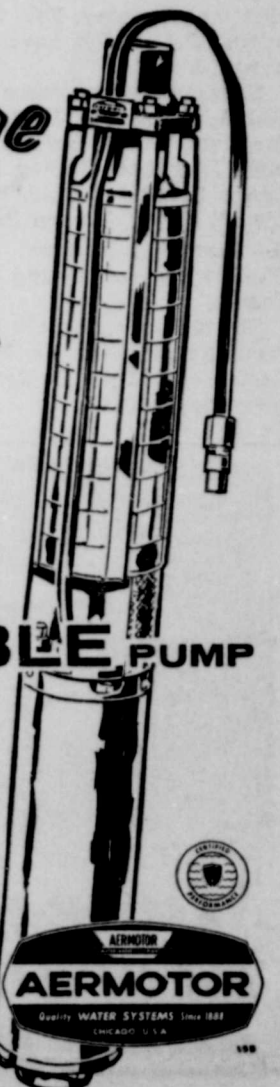


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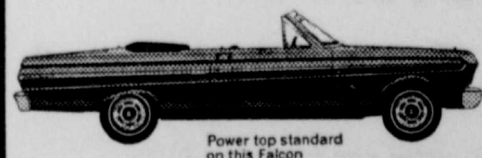

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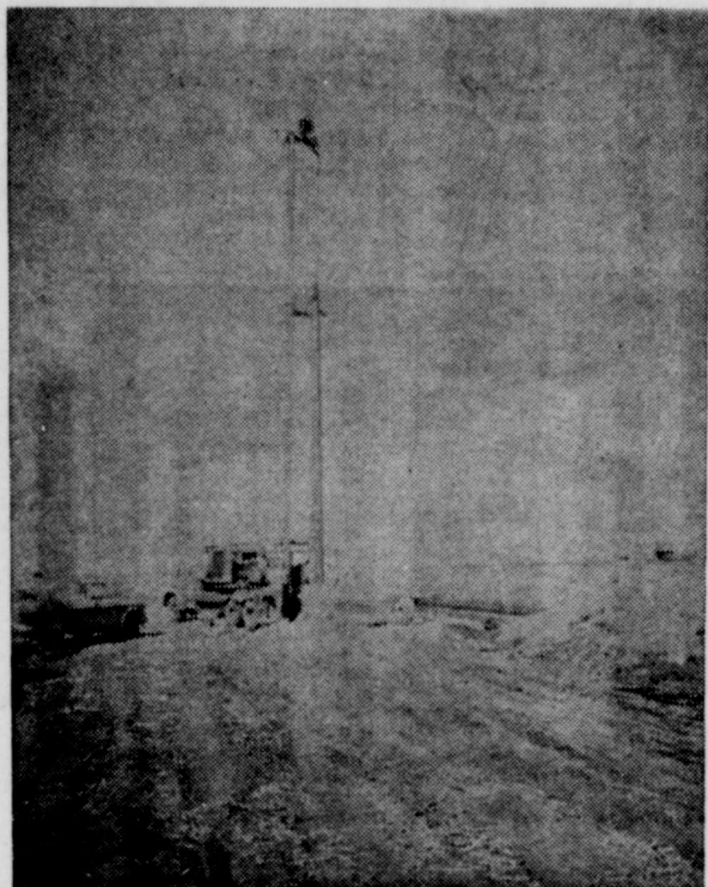

History Of County Line Firm

(By O. F. Rea)

In 1929, J. C. Terrell bought out the grocery business of J. C. Turner and moved the stock of goods to the present site some time later. The Terrell brothers, Sam and Lacy both worked in the grocery store at that time, and Sam still operates the store, in a new building.

Now, there was nothing wrong about running a grocery store, but Lacy was a man with a talent for making things work properly. He could repair most anything, and better still if he could not fix what you brought him he probably would make you one that might work better and last longer than the original. People of the community were not long in learning this and pretty soon Lacy was doing more repair service than he was selling groceries.

He decided to build a shop and give it full time. For quite some time he did automobile repair work along with his shop work but has given this up in recent years and confined his work more to welding and farm type repair work.

He is an excellent blacksmith, and being familiar with the properties of different metals he makes a number of tools of excellent quality. Being able to temper metal successfully he hand makes several types of chisels that are of excellent quality which he sells to a number of shops in this area.

He makes a garden hoe that will stay sharp about ten times as long as the average hoe, due to the kind and quality of metal which he makes the blade of. Of the two types of hoes he makes one is of such shape that it is ideal for weeding extra close to plants that lie flat.

He carries a stock of handles and will re-handle and re-condition your hoes, rakes, sharpshooters, spades, shovels, scoops, post hole diggers, spading forks, pitch forks, seed forks, and what have you. In most cases the tool will be better than the original when he gets through with it.

He never junks anything that is useful and so has a large stock of nuts, washers of all types, bolts, screws, rivets, brass fittings and many other things that enables him to repair most anything within reason without making trips to town for parts. Most of this material is in clean glass jars where it is easily seen and available.

Lacy says he built the shop to give full time to and he does just this. There is little wasted time here. If he is not working on something for someone else, he is building or re-building any of the large number of items which he hand makes in the shop. One is a cold handle tortilla cooker that is popular with Mexicans.

He has an interesting little gadget, without a name, which is very unusual, made of two small sticks about 12 or 15 inches long with hand carved windmill wheel on the end of one stick. By rubbing one stick across the other the little 3 inch windmill wheel rotates rapidly and for no apparent reason, stops and rotates in the opposite direction for a time then reverses again and again as long as the two sticks are rubbed together.

The Terrells came from Arkansas and so do most all wood-handles in this part of the country, and this is where Lacy gets his handles. He makes a trip back occasionally and not only gets his handles but his high grade metal for hoe blades and many other uses he makes of this metal.

Lacy Terrell enjoys life immensely and although well along in years is as hard as nails. He is a very keen observer and notices far more than the average person sees.
