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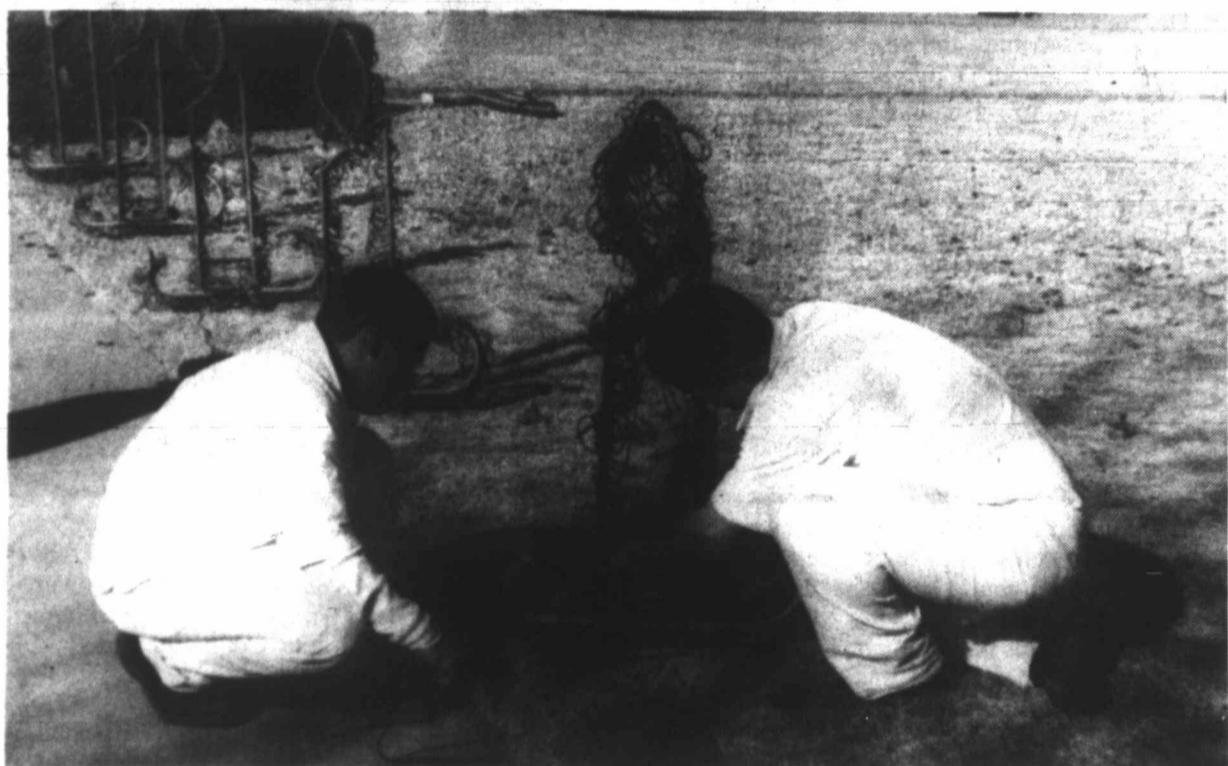

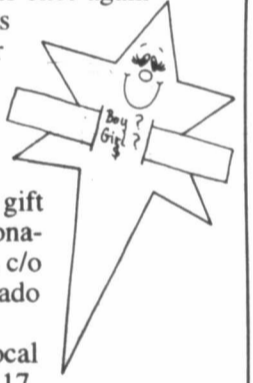
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Once again...Wish trees help make dreams come true

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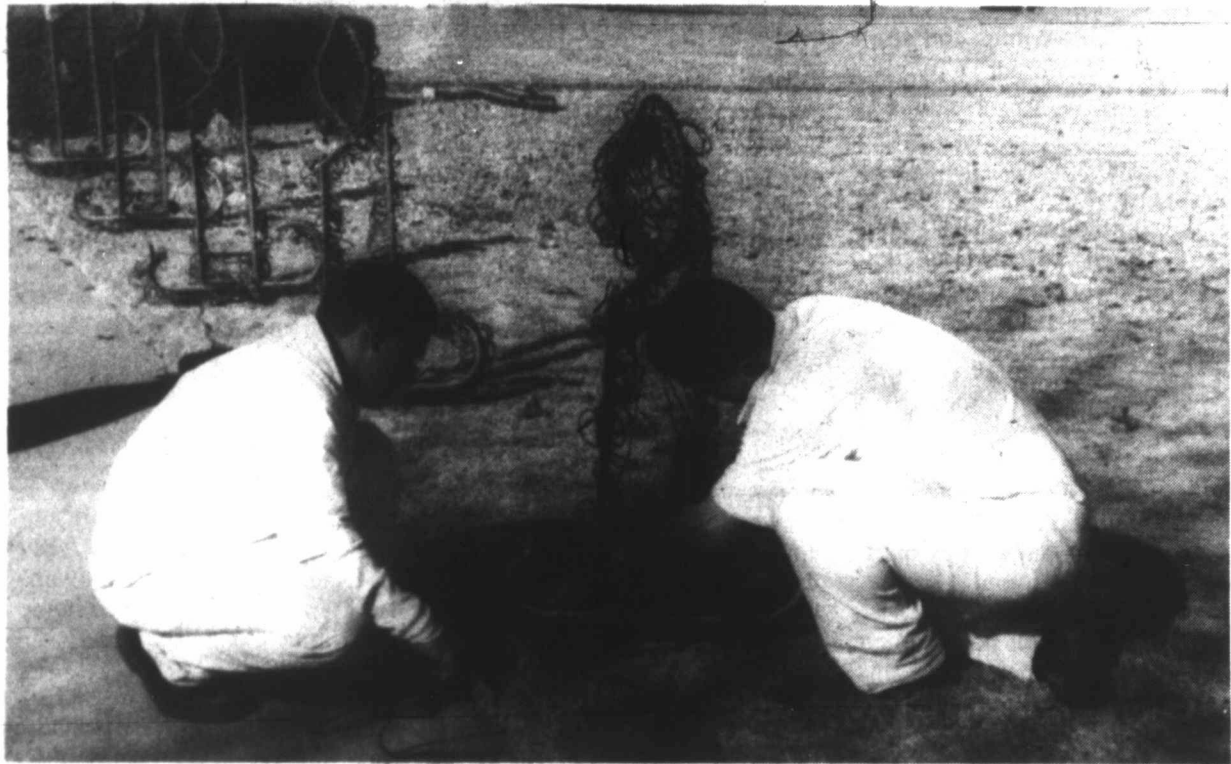
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Parade

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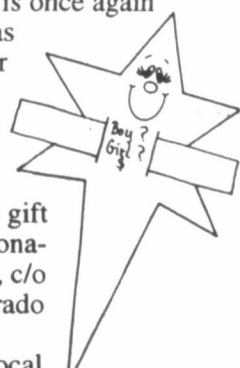

Local chapter of ACS services 24 patients

The Mitchell Unit of the American Cancer Society reports that services totaling \$10,651 were provided to Mitchell County residents during fiscal year 1995-96, while contributions for the same period totaled \$8,159.

During its regular monthly meeting Thursday, November 14, the unit learned from staff member Leslie Latuda that there were 24 patients served during the year for a dollar value of \$7,397. Ms. Latuda explained that service and rehabilitation programs ease the impact of cancer by providing practical help, information and emotional support to the public, patients and their

families.

In addition, education programs providing information about cancer prevention, early detection and risk reduction to young people, adults and health professionals were provided. The dollar value of those services totaled \$3,254.

Ray Mayo, president of the local unit, said that the American Cancer Society is the only voluntary cancer control organization that fights cancer locally, statewide and nationally. Research, education and patient service programs are funded entirely by public contributions with 36 percent of the money raised going toward research programs.

COOK'S CORNER



Pat Whitzel

When Pat Whitzel was eight years old, she took on the responsibility of cooking lunch every day for her parents and two brothers. Her mother helped her dad in the field, which provided an excellent opportunity for Pat to learn to cook. Pat jokingly said that all they had to eat that whole summer was pinto beans, red potatoes and cornbread.

Because she started cooking at such a young age, her flops in the kitchen also happened early on. At the age of 13 or 14, Pat put two cups of Karo syrup into a fudge recipe that called for two table-

spoons. The candy never set, but it must have tasted good. Pat's brothers ate it with a spoon right out of the pan.

Pat's favorite food is anything chicken. Although she still loves to cook, she admits that it was more fun before her kids grew up because she likes to have someone to cook for.

As an active member of the First Assembly of God Church, Pat has cooked for many people. She helps out when the church caters meals.

In the past, Pat owned the Villa Restaurant and managed the local Dairy Queen. So it's only natural that she and one of her friends, Connie Johnston, are starting a cooking business experiment of their own. They will prepare an evening meal for anyone who puts in their order before 1:00 p.m. They will also deliver that meal at a pre-chosen time.

Pat was born in Colorado City, but grew up in Lea County, New Mexico. She has been back here for eight years. She and her husband, Ken, have two children, Valerie Clark of Colorado City and Keith Whitzel of Plains. They also have four grandchildren and one on the way.

Pat has submitted her recipe for her favorite Chicken Tenders and a couple of others. We hope you like them.

In a four quart glass or plastic bowl, dissolve granulated garlic and salt in 1/2 cup hot water. Add 5 cups cold water and 1 cup crushed ice. Add chicken tenderloins. Cover and refrigerate 24 hours. In a heavy pan, heat 4 inches of cooking oil to 350°. While oil is heating, mix chicken bouillon and cold water in 2 quart bowl. In another bowl, put flour. Drain chicken. Scoop under and pick up 8-10 pieces of chicken. Drop into flour, pick up and let fall through fingers back into flour. Pick up again and gently shake excess flour off. Drop into bouillon water. Pick up and gently shake. Drop back into flour and pick up and let fall through fingers again. Pick up chicken pieces one at a time and lay singly on a flat tray. When oil has reached 350°, take tenders one at a time and lay across the oil, turning loose just as the tender begins to lay flat. Cook only 8-10 tenders at a time. Cook until golden brown. Drain well. Serve with favorite gravy or sauce. Serves 8-10.

MAMA'S CRUNCHY CORNBREAD

- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1 cup cornmeal
- 1 cup flour
- 4 teaspoons baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/4 cups milk
- 2 eggs

Heat oven to 400°. Spray a 10" iron skillet with cooking oil spray. Melt 1/2 cup shortening in skillet. In a bowl, mix cornmeal, flour, baking powder, salt, milk and eggs. Add excess melted shortening. Pour into skillet. Bake until brown on top. Turn skillet upside down on a large plate. Cut and serve with lots of butter. Serves 8.

PEANUT PATTIES

- 2 1/2 cups sugar
- 1 cup milk
- 2/3 cup Karo syrup
- Few drops red food coloring
- 3 cups raw peanuts
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 tablespoon margarine

In a heavy pan, mix sugar, milk, syrup and food coloring. Add raw peanuts. Put on medium heat. Stir often. Cook to firm ball stage. Remove from heat. Add vanilla and margarine. Beat until mixture drops. Pour into buttered dish.

- 2 cups cold water
- 4 cups flour
- 6 cups cooking oil

CHIEF LONE WOLF

Now, why in the world would our city council be concerned with such things as steamboats, swords and traveling salesmen? To put the question in perspective, we're talking about the early 1880s, long before Colorado, Texas had a zip code.

A town council was elected in 1882 and the first order of business was the passing of local ordinances, or laws. Periodically those decrees needed to be updated or new ones written.

That's why on June 24, 1885, the aldermen, as they were called back then, became concerned about citizens being forced to work on the Sabbath. The council took a firm stand against any person being compelled to labor on Sundays. Of course, like most laws, there were exceptions to the city's mandate.

For example, the no-Sunday-work ordinance did not apply to household duties (sorry, ladies), charitable work or necessary chores on farms or plantations. (Plantations? In Mitchell County?)

Further, the council was not willing to interfere with the duties of those persons responsible for running steamboats and wagon trains. (The Colorado River must have been wider and deeper than we realized!)

At any rate, anyone found guilty of making another person work in Colorado (City) on Sundays was subject to a fine of "not less than \$10 nor more than \$50."

The council also took a rather dim view of trains which might come barreling through our town. "Trains shall not run greater than 5 miles per hour," read the ordinance. And anyone "causing" the engine to run without a bell could also be found guilty of a misdemeanor.

During those days in the 1880s, drummers, or salesmen, had a habit of making pests of themselves as trains pulled into the local station. So, to protect disembarking passengers, an ordinance was passed prohibiting "runners or drummers" from getting within 10 feet of the train as it pulled up to the platform.

And heaven forbid if one of these poor souls made a misrepresentation in an effort to "induce passengers to go to any house in town."

Then there was the problem Colorado City had with those who had too many (alcoholic beverages) to drink. The ordinance approved August 1, 1883 was rather pointed.

"Any persons who shall get drunk...shall be fined not more than \$50," the council ordered.

There was also a problem with men indulging in fisticuffs. The

council's solution was, "if any two or more persons shall fight together," they were subject to a fine not to exceed \$100.

Our 1883 town fathers were also concerned about the use of weapons within the city limits. Any person who "on or about his person, saddle or in his saddle bags," carried any pistol, dagger, slingshot, sword, spear, brass knuckles, Bowie knife or other kind of knife" was subject to a fine of not more than \$100.

The council also didn't look favorably upon citizens not being gainfully employed in Colorado City. Vagrants (any person with no visible means of support) "or any person who strolls idly about the streets with no local habitation and no honest business," was considered undesirable.

So was any person who "strolls about to exhibit tricks not licensed by law."

In 1897 Colorado City abandoned its charter due to financial difficulties. By 1907 a movement was started to re-incorporate the town, estimated to have 2,500 inhabitants. That resulted in an election, and by a vote of 140-69, it was decided to once again become a legally incorporated town. That brought about an avalanche of new ordinances. Such as, no spitting "upon any sidewalk

or upon the floor or walls of the post office, court house, railroad depot or any church or school building or any public building in this city." (It wasn't that our earliest residents had been uncouth, but by the 1900s we had just become more cultured in Colorado City.) Anyway, the fine for expectorating as previously described was not to exceed \$25.

Also in 1907, it was unlawful to hitch "any horse, or any other beast of burden attached to a vehicle, to any awning post in front of any business." Convictions could mean a fine of \$10.

It was also illegal for any person to attract a crowd in Colorado City by using "loud talking or singing or by any unusual acts or exhibitions."

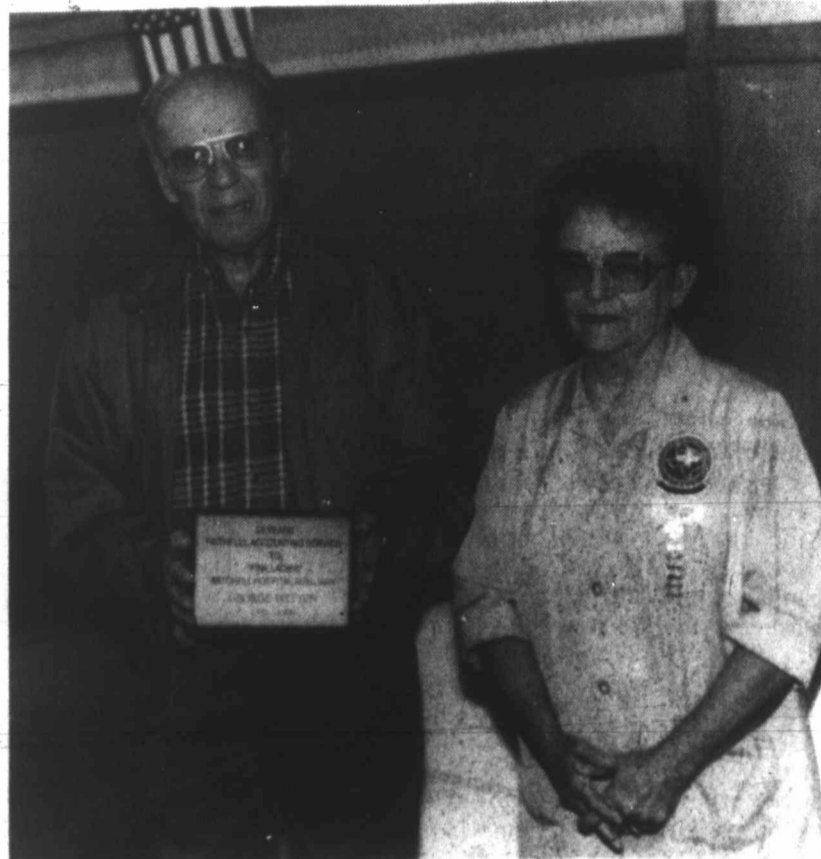
Finally, our town leaders were dogmatic on the subject of loose dogs. In 1907 the council said it was unlawful to let dogs run loose without a permit. (Apparently the pooches could trot about town if they had a license.)

The annual animal tax (for dogs) was \$1 for males, 50 cents for females. Dog owners had 24 hours to claim their "said animals" and if they were not "redeemed within said time, they shall be killed."

Our early day town fathers seemed to have controlled most of their biggest problems, things like steamboats, traveling salesmen and spitting. But we're still fighting the dog problem, as well as a few new ones.

Pecan Show and Bake-Off set December 4th

will be at 3 p.m. that afternoon. Prior to the day of the show, pecans may be left at the County Extension office. Entries must be marked with the owner's name, address and variety of pecan. Anyone is welcome to help process the pecans on show day.

Each entry must have 43 nuts. The nuts will be judged on size, color, appearance, shell thickness, cracking quality, kernel quality and attractiveness.

All pecans entered must have been grown in 1996. Nuts must have been grown by the person showing them. Growers are limited to one entry of each named variety they grow. The grower may enter as many seedlings, known hybrids or natives as he or she wishes.

The Mitchell County Pecan Bake-Off will held in conjunction with the Pecan Show. Entries will be accepted at the C.C. Thompson Room between 5 and 5:30 p.m. Anyone from Mitchell County can participate.

The food exhibited must be prepared by the exhibitor. If a boxed mix is used it must be an ingredient called for in a recipe. Mixes cannot be used by themselves. Pecans must be included in the recipe as an ingredient, not just a decoration. Pecans used for the food

items do not have to be grown by the exhibitor; however, it is strongly urged that Mitchell County pecans be used in all recipes.



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New equine regulations will affect local shows

New health regulations for horses and other equine are likely to affect local team ropings, rodeos and 4-H shows next year.

Effective January 1, 1997, equine must have had a negative equine infectious anemia (EIA) test within the past 12 months before they undergo any change of ownership or participate in any events where equine are gathered, the Texas Animal Health Commission announced recently.

Each year nearly 400 Texas horses are diagnosed with equine infectious anemia, sometimes called "swamp fever" or "Coggins". The disease is incurable and there is no vaccine for it.

Equine includes horses, asses, mules, donkeys and zebras.

Equine in any trail rides, shows, fairs, competitions or other events where equine are gathered must have had a negative EIA test within the past 12 months, according to the new regulations.

"Proof of testing is often required when taking horses out of state," said Ken Graham with the TAHC area office. "Now it will be required when they are being moved to different functions, even within the county."

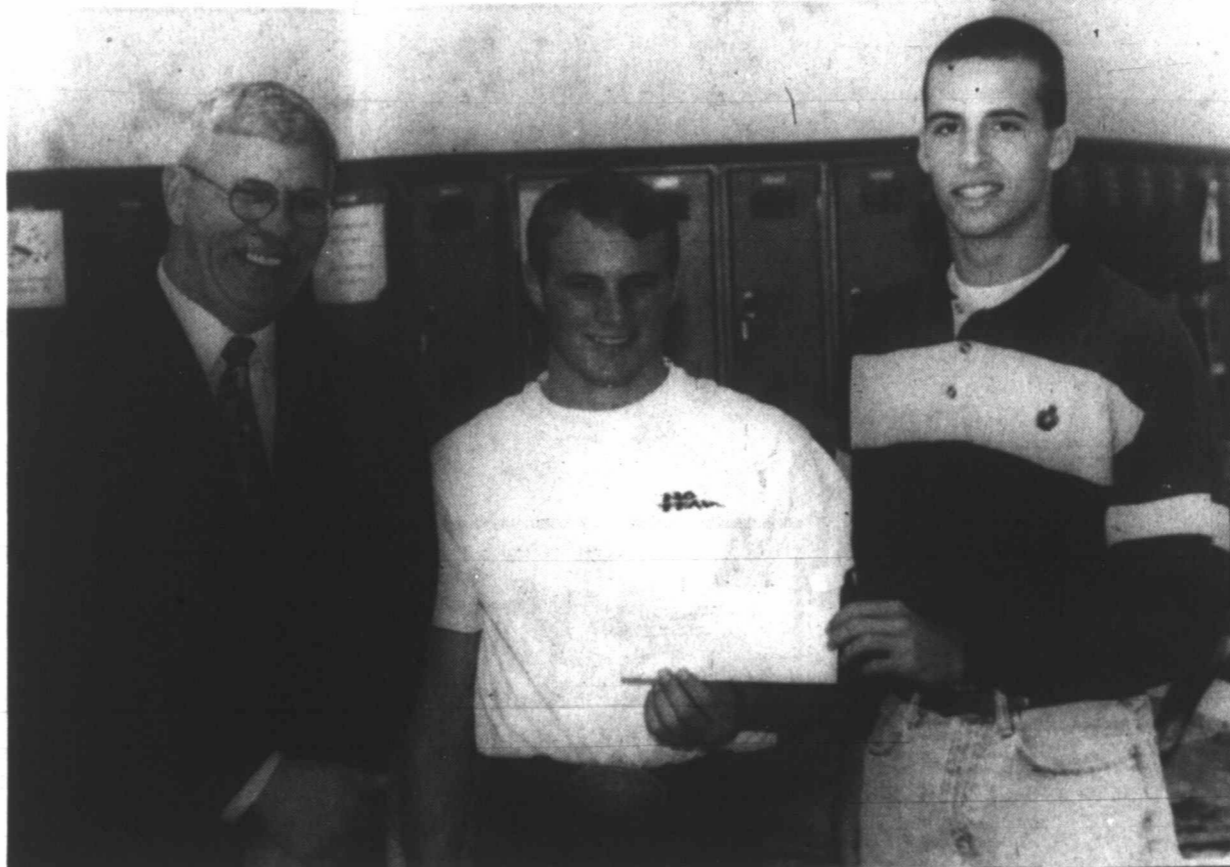
The project is a joint Colorado City, Mitchell County, Texas Department of Criminal Justice and Christmas In April project.

Roundtop preservation takes turn

The Kiwanians believe they may have found a way to preserve the Round Top at a price that's affordable.

Jan Lemons, co-chairman, reported to the Kiwanian members during Thursday's luncheon that the majority of the work could be done with inmate labor and lumber can be salvaged from condemned houses.

The organization has adopted the Save The Round Top project and set up a fund to preserve the building that many local residents remember fondly.

The Round Top Cafe closed in the late '60s or early '70s and is now stored behind the city barn. The Round Top is

deteriorating fast, Lemons reported to the members. Once, the interior included a round counter with stools all the way around it. Now, one entire side is missing. "The boards are rotted out and it's not safe," said Lemons.

It's not clear whether the steel center pole or the round top are still usable or would need to be replaced, she said.

Lumber to replace the thirteen panels of the structure can be taken from houses that are currently being torn down in the joint city, county, TDCJ, and Christmas In April program.

Lemons said she had discussed the project with Sgt.

Moore and Lt. Bass, TDCJ Wallace Unit officers supervising the inmate field crews who have done many construction and other projects throughout the county.

They determined that the majority of the work could be done with inmate labor.

While the work crews from the prison can supply the labor, an architect would be needed to draw up the plans and heavy equipment would be required to lift up the round top.

Nails, window panes, and doors could come from material donated to the Christmas In April project.

"One good piece of news was that the electrical movement equipment that would have turned the top has gotten cheaper than what it was back when it was built," said Lemons.

If there are no unexpected expenses the repair expenses should not be more than the \$1,000 earmarked for the project, she said.

The Kiwanians unanimously voted to "proceed slowly" with the program.

The stolen items include equipment associated with the pulling unit, such as tubing tongs, rod tongs, tubing elevators, and six sets of rod elevators.

The Mitchell County Sheriff's Office, the Scurry County Sheriff's Office and the Texas Rangers are investigating the theft.

Two males in a blue pickup with white top were reportedly seen in the area, according to Sheriff Patrick Toombs.

Tool Branding Service of Hobbs, N.M. and the Mitchell County Sheriff's office are offering the reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person or persons responsible, according to Chief Deputy Mike Redwine.

Tax rebates dropped some last month

Statewide sales tax rebate payments for November 1996 are 2.1 percent lower than payments made this time last year, according to State Comptroller John Sharp.

Colorado City's rebate, in keeping with the statewide decrease, dropped over 16 percent. The payment received this period totaled \$35,984.93, compared to the \$43,190.18 received last year at this time. Payments made to Colorado City to date in 1996 totaled \$354,922.35.

Lorraine fared better than other towns in Mitchell County with an increase of 38 percent for this pay period. Last year at this time Lorraine was paid \$745.91 in sales tax rebates. The November 1996 payment equalled \$1,029.29. Lorraine has received \$7,092.65 to date.

The town of Westbrook experienced a rebate decrease, as did Colorado City. The community received \$463.50, a decrease of 25 percent from last year's payment of \$619.38. There has been \$8,691.31 paid to Westbrook to date.

Mitchell County received \$12,806.08 this month. Compared to last year's payment of \$14,826.30, this is a 14 percent drop. The county's rebate payments to date add up to \$320,086.46.

Internet access soon to be available

Internet will be available to the public in 1997 through the Mitchell County Library.

Cybertex, the local provider, has donated Internet access service to the library free of charge, Mitchell County Librarian Nancy Mayo told the commissioners during Tuesday's commissioners' court meeting.

Monahans trips Wolves in bi-district clash

The Colorado City Wolves' football season came to an end Friday night in Midland when they lost to Monahans 23-13 in the bi-district round of the Class 3A playoffs.

The loss ended another terrific season for the Wolves, who finished with an 8-3 record and their second consecutive playoff appearance. Monahans, 10-0, advances to the next round to take on Denver City.

"Monahans is a great football team, especially on defense," said Wolves Head Coach Bill Grissom. "But I think we responded very well. It was a tremendous effort by our kids."

The Wolves needed to open the game with a fast start, but it was the Lobos who charged out of the gate. With a gusty wind at their backs, Monahans opened the scoring on their first possession, as Lobos' running back Tyler Lee ran into the end zone from five yards out. The extra point was good, and Monahans was out to a 7-0 lead with 6:40 to play in the first quarter.

Monahans' defense and the strong wind helped stall the Wolves' offense in the first quarter, with Colorado City gaining only eight yards on their first two possessions. Monahans received terrific position after the Wolves' second punt and connected on a 27-yard field goal with 2:15 left in the first period, putting the Lobos up 10-0.

The Wolves' offense got on track on their next drive, as quarterback Lance Dockrey found running back Tony Walthall for an 18-yard reception, followed by an 18-yard run by running back Arian Emerson.

The ball was placed at or past the first down marker, but one of the officials decided the spot was wrong and moved the ball back a few inches, nullifying the first down and giving the ball back to Monahans. This would not be the last questionable call made by the officials on this night, and each call seemed to be against the Wolves.

Colorado City had a second opportunity early in the second quarter, reaching the Lobos' 21 yard line. Wolves' kicker Chris Ramirez' 38-yard field goal attempt fell short, however, and the Lobos maintained their 10-point lead with 5:39 to play in the first half.

The Wolves needed a big play and looked to their defense. Wolves' defensive tackle Jeff Anzaldua responded, recovering a fumble on Monahans' next play from scrimmage. This time, the Wolves would take advantage, as Dockrey found Walthall again for a 12-yard pass to the Lobos' five yard line.

After Emerson took the ball to the one, Dockrey plowed into the end zone to put the Wolves on the board. Ramirez kicked the extra point, and the

Wolves trailed 10-7 with 4:33 in the half.

Monahans began to have trouble moving the ball, as Wolves' defensive tackle Zack Love and linebacker Joe Ross Jameson shut down the running game, and forced them to punt.

The Wolves' attempt to score again before half time failed, as Dockrey was intercepted at the Monahans 37 yard line. The Lobos ran out the clock to end the first half with a three-point lead.

The wind picked up even more in the second half, wreaking havoc on the strategies of both teams. "The wind was a major factor, especially with the passing and kicking games," said Coach Grissom. "It had an effect on what decisions were made."

After forcing the Wolves to punt early in the third quarter, the Lobos embarked on the best drive of the night. On the 18th play of a 71-yard drive that took over eight minutes off the clock, Lee scored from a yard out with 1:51 left in the third quarter. The extra point was no good, leaving the Lobos with a 16-7 lead.

Colorado City stormed right back, thanks to two terrific runs by Emerson. Dockrey scored soon after on a one-yard touchdown run, but Ramirez missed the extra point try. The Wolves seemed to have turned the tide of the game and trailed 16-13 with 11:45 to go in the game.

Monahans had another good drive, but Joe Ross Jameson and the rest of the Wolves' defense made a big fourth down stand at the Wolves' 25-yard line, and started their next drive with 7:57 to play.

With the wind gusting in their faces, the Wolves gave the ball to Emerson on the next three plays. The Lobos read it all the way, however, and the Wolves went three and out quickly.

With 5:53 remaining, Monahans took over at the Wolves 36-yard line and let the running game take over. Lobos' quarterback Brandon Stephens hustled 17 yards, and Lee did most of the rest, getting down to the Wolves' two yard line. Stephens hit wide receiver Zack Stevenson for the touchdown on the next play with 3:01 left in the game, making it 23-13 Lobos.

The Wolves had one last gasp at a quick score after a terrific kickoff return by Walthall. But throwing in to the wind proved to be futile, and after a fourth down incomplete pass, the Wolves' season was over.

Arian Emerson ran for 86 yards for the Wolves, giving him 1,848 for the year. Lance Dockrey threw for 53 yards, all of it to Tony Walthall. The Wolves' defense was led by Zack Love, Joe Ross Jameson and Jeff Anzaldua.

Although the ending was disappointing, the Wolves and their fans enjoyed the ride while it lasted.

"We had tremendous fan support throughout the whole year," said Coach Grissom. "The coaches and players appreciated the support," he said.

The Wolves should have the talent to make another playoff run next season, despite the losses of seniors Zack Love, Lance Dockrey and Joe Ross

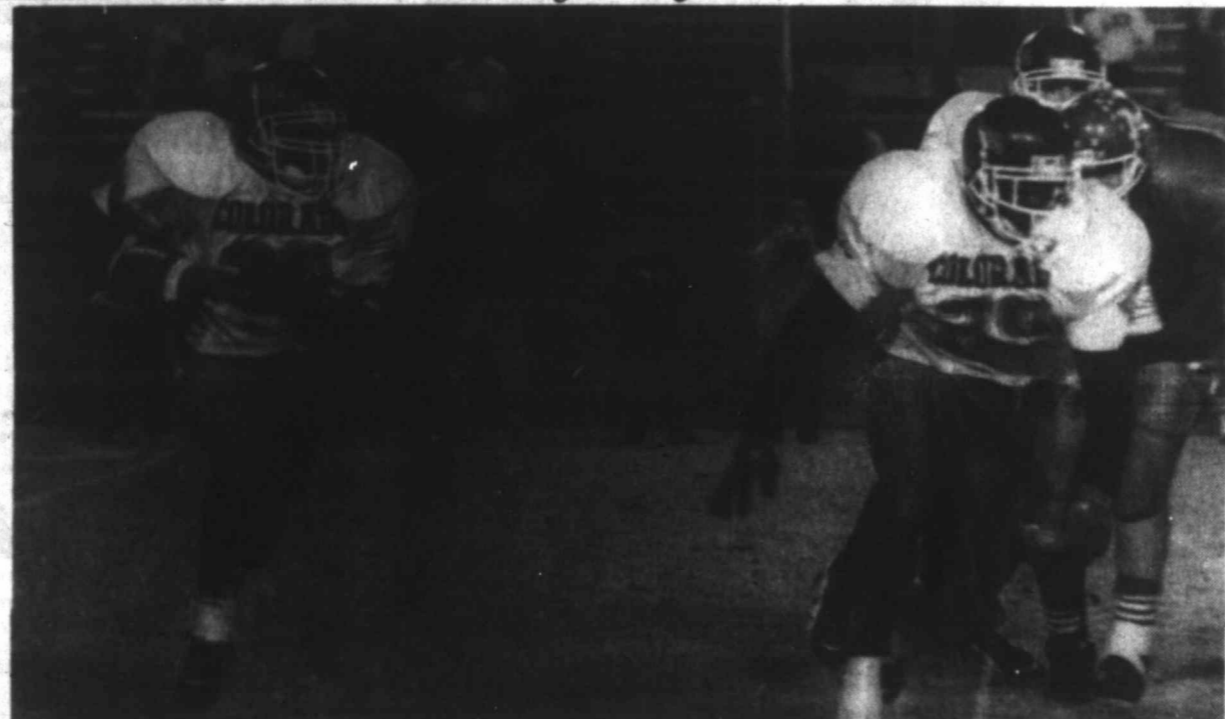

McKinney selected as semifinalist in program

Ann. art. 1446e, § 5.08 (1996) Lone Star Gas Company and Lone Star Pipeline Company, Divisions of ENSERCH Corporation, and ENSAT Pipeline Company (collectively referred to as "Applicant") hereby give notice of intent to change the city gate rate of Lone Star Gas Company established by Order of the Railroad Commission of Texas in Gas Utilities Division Docket No. 3543.

Applicant proposes a Monthly City Gate Rate Calculation (MCGRC) to replace the rate approved in GUD 3543. The MCGRC recovers the costs of purchasing, storing, and transporting gas to the city gates, including an adjustment provision to recover the carrying cost of working gas in storage. Applicant also proposes transportation and storage rates for city gate deliveries with tracking clauses to recover fuel and lost and unaccounted for gas.

The proposed effective date of the change is November 29, 1996. The change is a major change, and will result in an increase in annual revenues of approximately \$24.2 million or 4.8 percent (4.8%). The customers affected are the 1.3 million residential and commercial customers in Texas served by Lone Star Gas Company under the rates established by the local regulatory authorities in the municipalities and the Railroad Commission in the environs areas.

A statement of Intent to make such change has been filed with the Railroad Commission of Texas in GUD 8664 and is available for inspection at the Commission's office in Austin, Texas and at the offices of the Applicant in Dallas, Texas.
