If you have never attended the Fort Griffin Fandangle, you have missed a truly great performance which is relatively close to home. There are not that many attractions within only 50 miles of our community which will have a lasting affect on your memory.

This year's performances are sure to be extra special due to the 50th anniversary of the Fort Griffin Fandangle. Tickets are currently on sale for the six performances on June 16-18 and June 23-25 at the Prairie Theater, located just northwest of the Albany city limits.

Once you arrive at the Prairie Theater the parking lot is huge, but don't despair. A shuttle will soon come by and wheel you up the hill to the entrance. All this time you will be serenaded by the famous calliope.

The atmosphere of the outside theater alone is breath-taking and transfers you back in time to the "Old West." Herds of buffaloes and longhorns, Indian villages, covered wagons, pioneers, cowboys and their horses, gun slingers, and saloon girls fill the theater, as over 300 Albany residents participate in the celebration to bring their rich heritage back to life.

Songs, dances, and various scenes tell the story of Fort Griffin and the coming of Albany as a city.

This type of production will entertain a wide variety of tastes ranging from horseback riding, handling teams through acting and singing.

The opening of the production traditionally salutes the cowboy by demonstrating superb riding skills as the horsemen perform a cross pattern while making a full run down the slopes of the outdoor theater with perfect coordination. However, I do remember one year when two horses and men collided. It would be very difficult to avoid such mishaps when you are dealing with such a large cast and animals.

If you like good music and dancing, this is the place to go. For months the dancers and singers practice for this attraction. The quality and quantity of performers for a town the size of Albany is overwhelming. They literally shine with enthusiasm at every performance. The dedication to have a large production annually is very demanding. I have always been impressed by their spirit.

The changing of the scenery with tractors or horses is also of interest. All this is done in the dark. Only the sounds of the tractors and moving wheels can be heard.

The Fort Griffin Fandangle Parade is a highlight set for Thursday, June 23, beginning at 6 p.m. Replicas of the Butterfield Overland Stage Coach, the Texas Central Train, and the steam power calliope are featured in the parade.

In addition to all this fun, you may visit the Old Jail Art Center every day until 7 p.m. The beautiful Shackelford County Courthouse is also open for tours each day of the Fandangle. The downtown stores will have their windows dressed with antiques and pioneer memorabilia.

A new attraction this season will be arts and crafts booths in the Bank Park in downtown Albany.

Every night of the Fandangle, visitors will be able to enjoy a barbecue meal with all the trimmings, prepared by Joe Allen's Bar-B-Q of Abilene. Adult plates are \$5.50 and \$3.50 for children under 10 years old. Allen caters this fantastic Old West meal from an authentic cowboy campfire and chuck wagon setting. Plan to eat before the performance and take a look at the historic town.

Over the years I have seen many performances of the Fandangle, and I have loved every one. When you leave this unique experience, you go away happy and for weeks you will sing or hum various original tunes from the production. Believe me, you will be thoroughly entertained, so don't miss it!

Cross Plains Reported 11 Inches

The downpour which occurred last Tuesday plus two more showers left Cross Plains and surrounding communities with varying degrees of rainfall. As much as 11 inches have been reported in some areas, while as little as 2 inches in others.

It was all appreciated, as a drought situation had already developed, and for some farmers and ranchers still exists.

The first storm that moved through Cross Plains brought heavy rain, a small amount of hail, and an abundance of thunder and lightning. Many residents commented on the length of the storm and severity as one of the longest thunderstorms they had ever witnessed.

It was reported that Main Street looked like a river as the runoff from the northern side of town rushed to the lower south side. The amount of gravel and mud accumulated around the next morning was evidence of the washing. City employees, along with the Missouri Construction Company crews were busy.

Some businesses received minor flooding and many residents experienced leaks from the steady downfall.

Thursday's showers were enough to cancel PeeWee and Little League baseball games, for the second time.

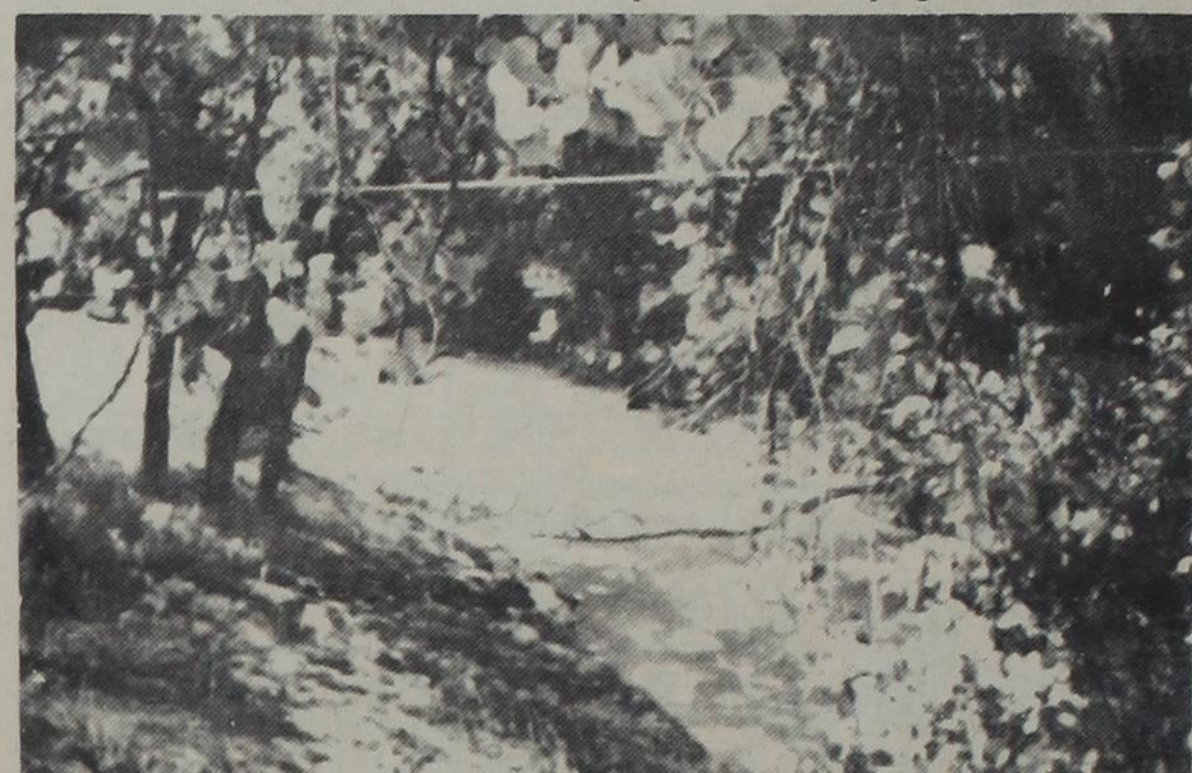
Another huge black cloud appeared Friday afternoon and brought more moisture. It was a mass of fast moving clouds with characteristics usually sited in tornado clouds.

The Old Turkey Creek Bridge washed away once again. A lot of water passed through the creek when nine inches of rain fell in a matter of hours. Some of the county roads received washing damage. County employees

were busy repairing roads and ditches.

Turkey Creek was running out of its banks as it raced through Treadway Park. The Cross Plains Roping Club Arena was completely underwater.

Fortunately, no one was harmed during these storms and losses to property were minimal. The weather stations proved helpful by informing the public of developing conditions.

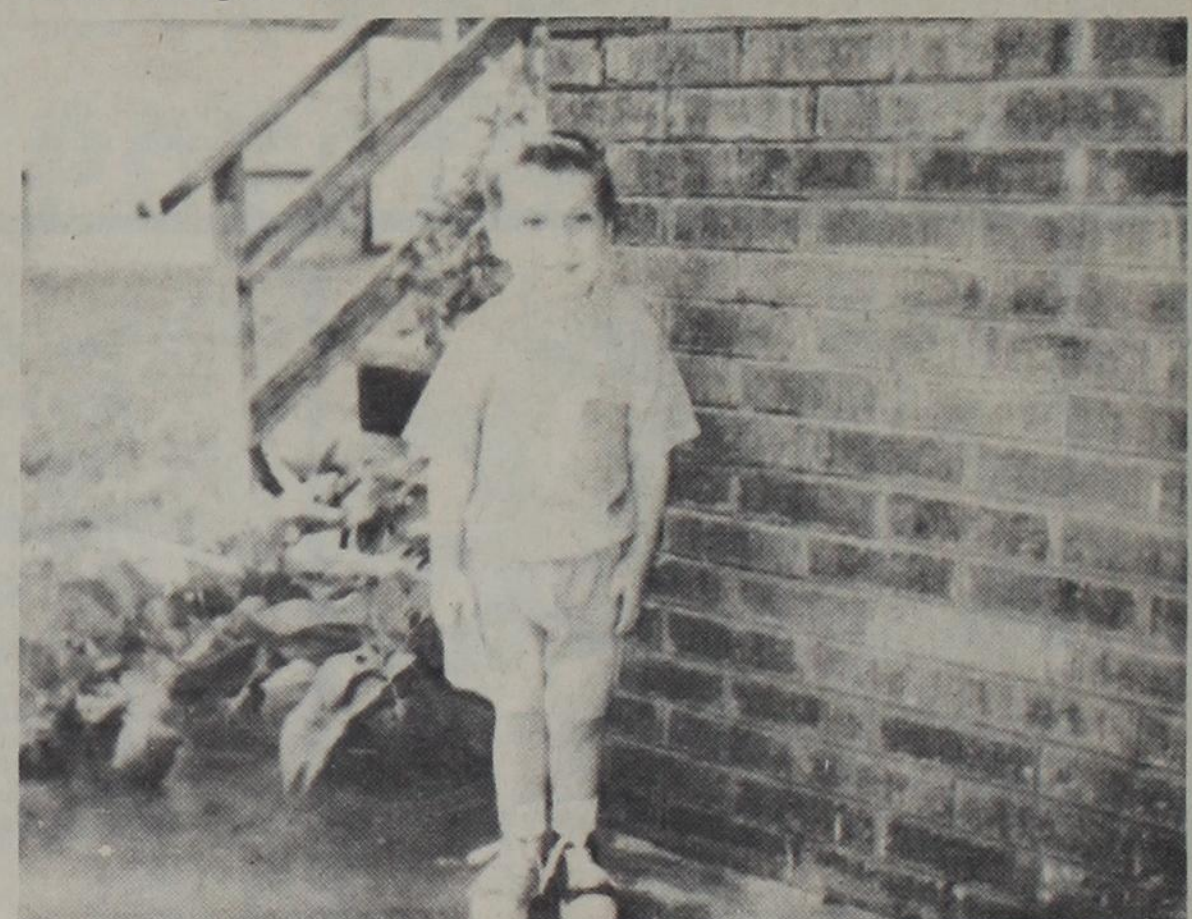
Shane received notice of winning around his birthday and thought it was a wonderful gift. He is very excited

Town And Country Robbed Early Thursday

Last Thursday, June 2, at 3 a.m., the Town and Country Convenient Store was robbed. A white male demanded money from the cash register after the clerk entered his purchase. Brandishing a revolver, he also demanded that she jerk the telephone receiver from the wall and hand it to him.

The man instructed the clerk to lie down on the floor, face down, and count to 300 as he walked out of the store. The clerk complied to all the orders and was not harmed in the incident.

There is no vehicle description of the get-away car.

Similar crimes have been committed at the Allsup Store in Bangs on the same morning at 1 a.m. and the Town and Country Store at Cisco was robbed Sunday night.

Five Young Men Apprehended By County Lawmen

On Friday, June 3, at 12:10 a.m., Justice of the Peace Rolan Jones was awakened by fierce barks from his dogs near his barn. Upon investigating, Jones found two adult males and two juvenile males had moved a front-end loader belonging to Missouri Construction Company out to the county road.

When the young men saw Jones, they jumped into their vehicle and drove off at a high rate of speed. Jones radioed Wayne Knowles, Special Investigator, and also a road block was set up.

Knowles overtook the pickup about 2 miles south of Cisco. The chase involved speeds exceeding 100 miles per hour.

The group was brought to the Justice of the Peace office where they were charged with felony theft. The two adults were transferred to the Callahan County Jail where they remained overnight and were released on bond Saturday morning.

The two juveniles were released to their parents. A third juvenile was also implicated in the incident, who had left the scene earlier.

Knowles stated, "The investigation of Judge Jones enhanced the capture of the suspects."

Barbara Swinney Ends Interesting Career At C.P.I.S.D

Barbara Swinney returned to her hometown in 1981 to teach with the Comanche Special Services Co-op through the Cross Plains School. She also served Rising Star, Sidney, and Gustine schools as a speech therapist each week.

This year she decided to put her career as a speech therapist on hold, as she said, "I have taught in so many capacities that I may find something else to do."

Her very impressive career began in 1954 in Coleman. Her late husband, Jess Swinney, was stationed in Korea at that time. She and the Coleman School system staff developed the first class for mentally retarded children in their school system.

Following her husband's career, Barbara moved to Beeville in 1955 where Jess was employed by Gulf Oil. The school system did not offer speech therapy, but had a unit for the mentally retarded and she taught a class of 16 students. Nine of these children did not speak English. This had to be a special challenge indeed.

In 1956 they were transferred to Lubbock where she was the speech therapist for the Cerebral Palsy Treatment Center, and later became a therapist in the Lubbock Public Schools. This was the same school where Nat Williams was superintendent. He had served as superintendent at Cross Plains in Barbara's early

years.

From there they traveled to Amarillo where she did speech therapy and taught classes for the pre-school deaf at the Amarillo Speech and Hearing Center. "When they organized a play school program for deaf children 18 months to 3 years of age, I taught it," she remarked.

The next transfer took them to Tulsa, Oklahoma. In Jenks, Oklahoma, with the help of the local Association for Retarded Children, she organized a private school for the multi-handicapped, ages 9-21 and taught daily living and job related skills. "This was the greatest challenge of my career, as I taught classes all morning and raised money to support the program in the afternoon and evenings," Barbara stated, proudly.

Their own teenage children helped in this venture, as they organized a local teen group to assist in the Special Olympics and fund raising programs. In the school's fourth year, the state approved their program and it became a part of the Jenks Public School System. This kind of progress would certainly make one's career well worthwhile.

In Houston at the Cypress Fairbank I.S.D., she taught a class for the multi-handicapped.

While they lived in San Antonio, she taught a class for the emotional disturbed, mentally retarded teenagers where she persuaded her supervisors to let her incorporate the workshop and daily living skills into the curriculum. The combination worked well, and the school district is still using it today.

Barbara has had an illustrious career that was also very fulfilling. I know her expertise will be missed, but I know she has been appreciated locally. She has been very helpful concerning speech and early childhood development with two of my children.

She can look back on a career filled with many accomplishments and know that the future holds more good things in store. Barbara said that her philosophy of light might be, "To be useful wherever you are — or bloom where you're planted!"

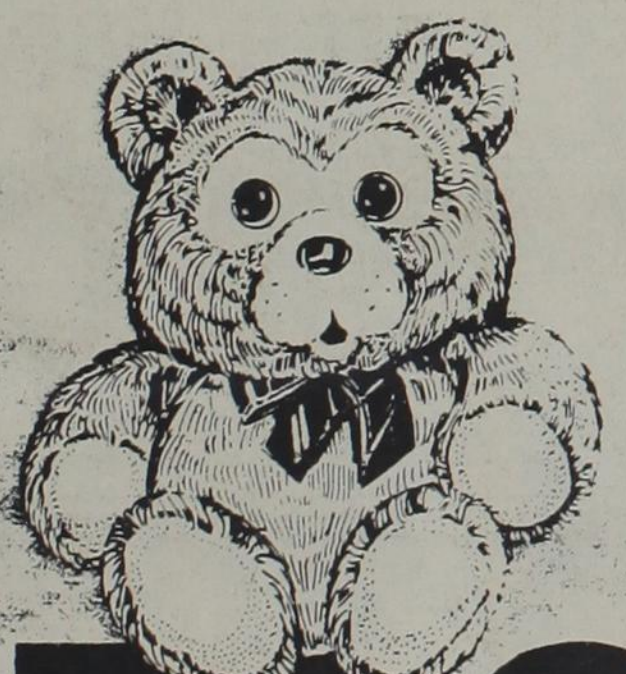

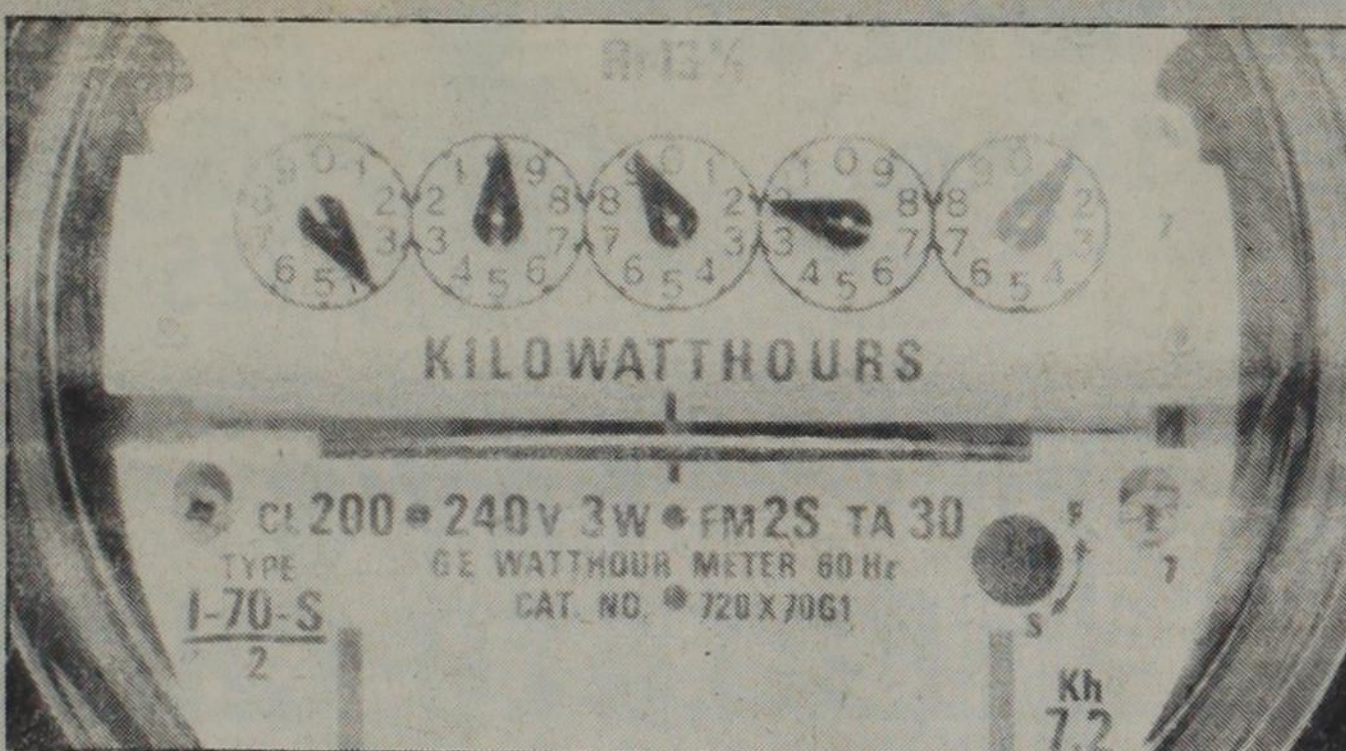

HOW FAR TO THE FINISH LINE? — The wheelbarrow races took a little more skill keeping everything rolling and not dumping their partner.

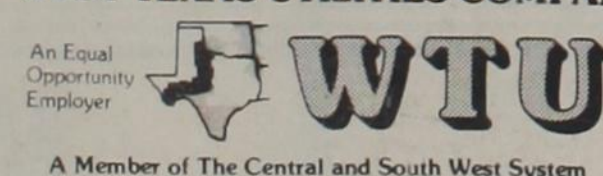

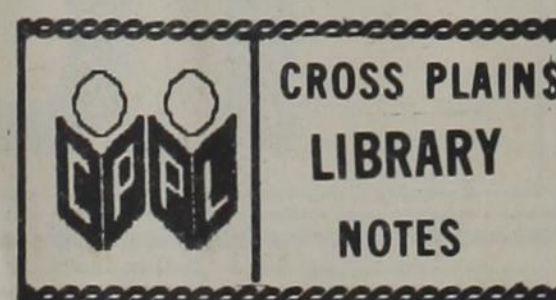

But six or seven years from now when you're still trying to keep that same truck running and still making \$3.50 an hour, it won't look so hot.

And, who knows, you might want to get married and raise a family in the meantime. You're sure off to a fast start on that, aren't you.

And, another thing. When you quit school, you're setting up a pattern—of quitting. So, when things get a little tough on down the line, in your job, in your marriage, in your life, it's always easier to do something you've practiced.

There is also a certain aesthetic value to an education. (If you don't know what the word "aesthetic" means, that's just another reason for staying in school.) Wouldn't it be nice to not have to stand around with your mouth open when somebody uses a word with more than two syllables in it.

Also, you might, just might, have a chance at a job someday where you would have to, of all things, read. Wouldn't it be nice to be able to.

You say you can always go back and get your GED. Yes, you can, but most don't. Remember, you're out there in the real world and have to make a living. It's not the easiest thing in the world to do to go to class at night after you've worked all day.

I have a friend who got his GED. He came in not too long ago and told me about it with tears in his eyes. He is 51 years old.

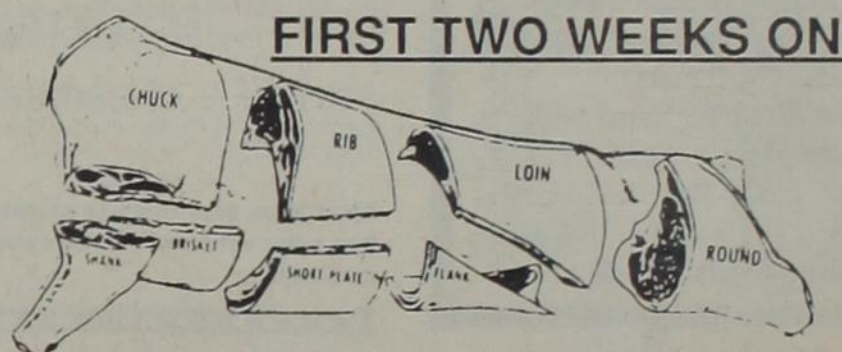

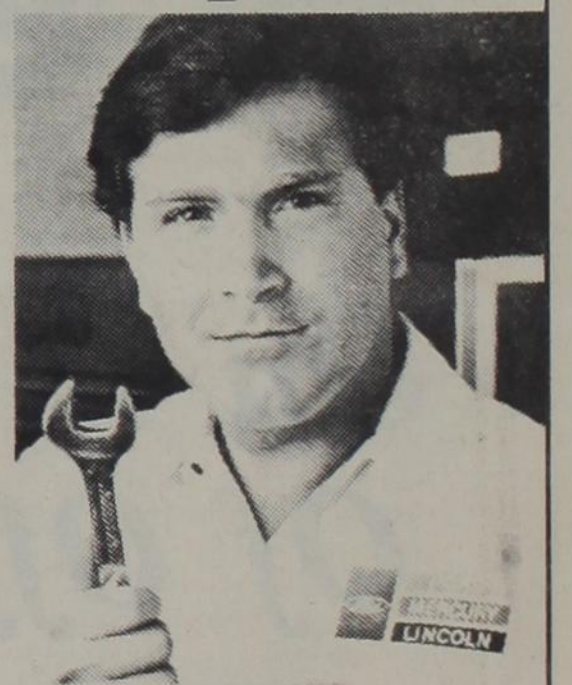

It's Cooling Time Again

Hot summer temperatures are just around the corner and it's time to get ready for the cooling season ahead. "Before you turn on your refrigerated air-conditioning system for the first time," says Nancy Sawtelle of the Texas Energy Extension Service, "have a professional heating and cooling service person check to be sure the system is working properly. Before the service person arrives, you should clear away any leaves, sticks, twigs, or other objects near the outdoor unit that might restrict air flow through the coil."

The service person's check should consist of the following:
—Oil the condensing unit fan motor.
—Clean the condensing coil fins and condenser fan.

—Check the condensing unit for refrigerant leaks.
—Visually inspect the compressor start and run capacitors for leaks.
—Clean the air supply fan motor housing and oil the motor at least once a year.
—Check the fan control switch.
The cost of an annual maintenance check is usually between \$25 and \$50. If you have any questions about saving your cooling bill, call the Texas Energy Extension Service's Energy Hotline at 1-800-643-SAVE. In addition to answering specific questions, the Energy Extension Service provides free publications on Air Conditioning, Natural Cooling, Fans, and other energy-related topics.

VAMC Offers Respite Care

The Veterans Administration Medical Center, Big Spring, Texas, now offers a Respite Care Program for veterans, according to Conrad Alexander, Medical Center Director. This program is established to provide a period of rest for families and caregivers who have been caring for chronically ill, terminally ill, or disabled veterans at home.

To participate in this program, the veteran must have received treatment at the Big Spring VAMC within the last year, need only basic nursing care, be medically stable, and have been cared for at home for at least 30 consecutive days.

To offer this service to the largest number of veterans, respite care visits are limited to 7-14 days at a time. The total number of days per year veterans may utilize this service is 28 days.

Applications will be made to a screening committee which will negotiate with the caregiver to establish appropriate admission and discharge dates. Admission and discharge will be planned to occur Monday through Friday, according to Alexander.

Initially, there will be two beds reserved for the program. Additional beds will be considered as the program progresses.

The caregiver will be responsible for arranging the veteran's transportation to and from the medical center, but will not be responsible for any of the veteran's care during the period of respite stay. As it is a period of rest for the caregiver, limited visitation is encouraged during respite stay.

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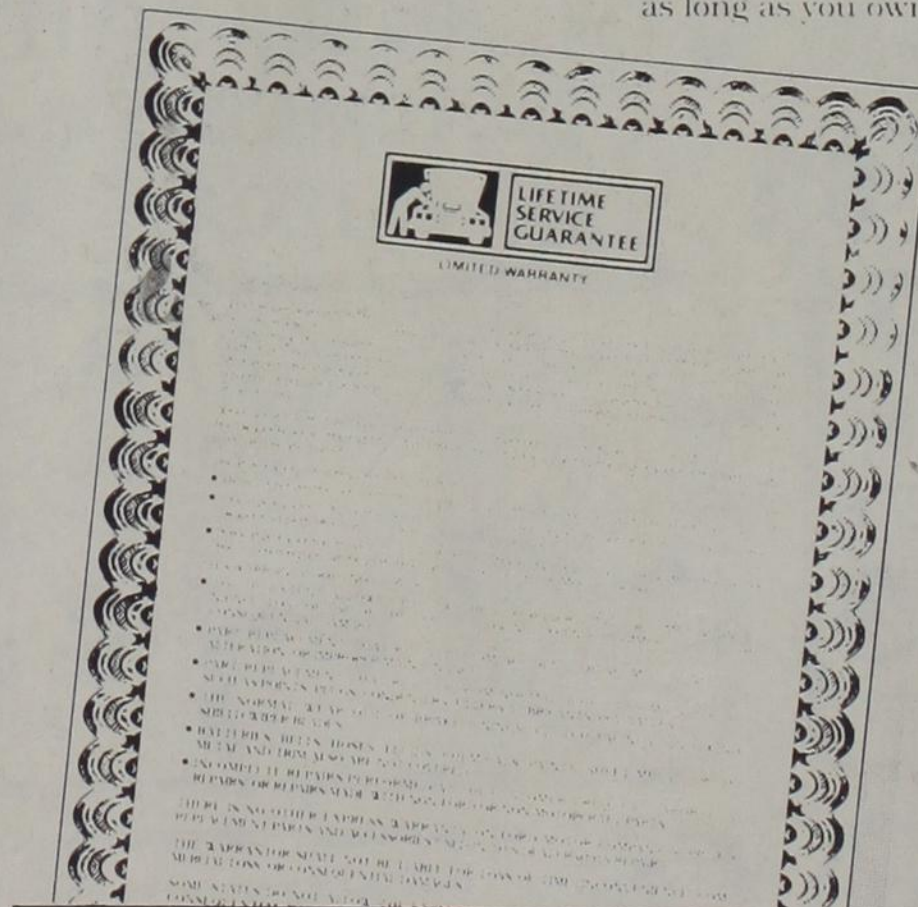
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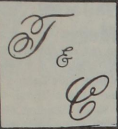
