Search For Ancient Ruins Has Begun at Rockwall, Near Dallas

DALLAS, May 22 — (U.P.) — Search for the ruins of an ancient civilization has begun in Rockwall, a little town 25 miles north of Dallas, which was named because of an old wall buried six feet under ground near the city.

If the theory of R. F. Canup, Rockwell business man, is correct, an ancient buried city will be uncovered. Undismayed by reports from a few geologists that the old wall is the work of nature, Canup declared he would continue his excavations until he finds the bottom of the wall—or the city. Excavation of the wall has been under way for the past few months and has resulted in uncovering a structure to a depth of about eight feet for a distance of 120 feet.

PERPLEXED BY TECHNICAL DIFFICULTIES

WASHINGTON, May 22 — (U.P.) — The house old age pension committee perplexed by technical difficulties of punishing Dr. Francis Townsend for his defiance of the inquiry, today held up its proposed contempt action pending further study.

A plan to bring immediate contempt action against Townsend in the house as soon as it met today was dropped. Study was being given another proposal to certify a contempt action to the District of Columbia Supreme Court. Certification of the case to the district court probably would postpone any action in the matter until next fall.

The delay developed in spite of a statement by speaker of the house Joseph W. Burns that Townsend was "in patent contempt" of the house when he walked out on the old age inquiry yesterday.

The committee appeared to be in a state of some confusion today. It had planned originally to meet at 9:30 a. m. vote an immediate recommendation to the house for a contempt citation and take up the matter on the house floor at 11 a. m. Over night however, members appeared to have changed their attitude toward the 70-year-old physician whose dramatic exit from the committee room precipitated the crisis yesterday afternoon.

Fight Impends Over Nominee of Socialists

CLEVELAND, May 22 — (U.P.) — The nation's first big political show of 1936—the Socialist party convention—will open here tomorrow with the "old guard" and the "left-wingers" locked in intra-party strife.

The struggle is likely to be dominated by the strong New York delegation, which will send two sets of delegates.

One set of Empire State delegates is representative of the "old guard," or democratic Socialists. The other is the militant group—the "left-wingers" or "loyalists" who are now in control of the socialist party.

The immediate fight will be between those two delegations. The group that is seated undoubtedly will hold the balance of power, with enough strength to swing the convention votes either to the militants or the old guard.

Other Delegates United
Of all the states, New York is the only one that will send two sets of delegates, 11 in each set. It is the result of a situation peculiar to New York, a split within the state party. The other states will have delegations composed of both militants and the democratic socialists.

But, nationally, too, there is a split, although not as distinct as in the case of the New York delegates. The two factions have been waiting each other strenuously since the declaration of principles, strongly militant, was voted at a convention in Detroit in 1934.

The difference between the two factions is shown by their names. The militants favor more aggressive tactics and, for example, urge mass resistance against war, but while the old guard is just as intense in the fight against war, its opposition is milder and does not include the loyalist declaration of "mass resistance."

Thomas Backed by Militants
Norman Thomas, who was the socialist candidate for president in 1932, is in high favor among the militants but, on the surface, at least, no outstanding candidate has appeared among the democratic socialists. One of their most powerful leaders, however, is James O'Neal, editor and member of the national executive committee.

Some of the estimated 250 delegates have arrived in Cleveland, while members of the committee have been here for several days.

The pre-conventional conference begins two days in advance of the regular session. Cleveland trade unionists will give a labor reception to the delegates tonight.

ROOSEVELT WILL VISIT CENTENNIAL

WASHINGTON, May 22 — (U.P.) — President Roosevelt today announced tentative plans to attend the Texas Centennial June 12. He also expects to visit Fort Worth.

If congress adjourns by the 6th or does not adjourn, but takes a three days recess, the president said he would leave Washington June 8. A tentative schedule calls for visit to Arkansas June 10 and arrival in Texas June 11. President will go to Dallas for Centennial on the 12 and to Fort Worth that night to visit his son, Elliott.

Two Ranger boys were charged with throwing rocks at Pullman windows on the T. & P. tracks and were fined \$10 and costs. One boy paid his fine and the other was sent to Eastland jail.

On May 2, J. P. Laird charged C. C. Threet with damaging his car and brought suit for \$50.50. The case was tried by a jury Thursday, and a verdict for the amount was rendered for the plaintiff, Judge Wilson reported. E. L. Rust was counsel for the defendant and Victor B. Gilbert, attorney for Mr. Laird.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., May 22 — (U.P.) — Climaxing an international incident, Alexander Mackey of Glasgow, Scotland, and Joseph Kristy, Cleveland, Ohio, were hanged on the San Quentin gallows today for kidnapping members of the California prison board in a break from prison here in January, 1935.

ORGANIZED TO PUNISH ALL UNAMERICAN

DETROIT, May 22 — (U.P.) — Working of a secret society known as "The Black Legion" which wreaked vengeance upon those considered un-American or guilty of misbehavior, were revealed today by police, who announced arrest of sixteen members and confession of six to slaying of an alleged member.

Inspector John Navarre announced the arrest followed exhaustive police investigation into the slaying of Carroll Poole, 32, former east Saint Louis, Illinois resident, whose bullet riddled body was found in a ditch at Hillsborn township on May 13th.

From the alleged confession of the six Navarre said he learned of the intention of the Black Legion to punish Poole for beating his wife, an expectant mother. Punishment ended in death for the former WPA worker when four bullets were fired into his body.

Poole, who had violated one of the society's cardinal rules was not a member of the "Black Legion" police official said.

Under arrest and admittedly participants in midnight murder, according to police, were Harvey Davis, 38, Dayton, Dean, 36, Arthur Lea, 30, Urban Lips, 32, Lowell Rushing, 24, and Hershel Gill, 21, all of this city. The six will be arraigned in court tomorrow on charges of first degree murder.

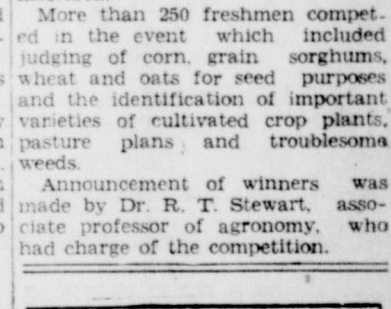
NOTIFIED ALL OFFICERS SUBPOENED NOT TO TESTIFY

COLLEGE STATION, May 22 — R. L. Thurman, Cisco, was one of five winners of medals in the annual freshmen crops contest for the current year recently completed at Texas A&M College. 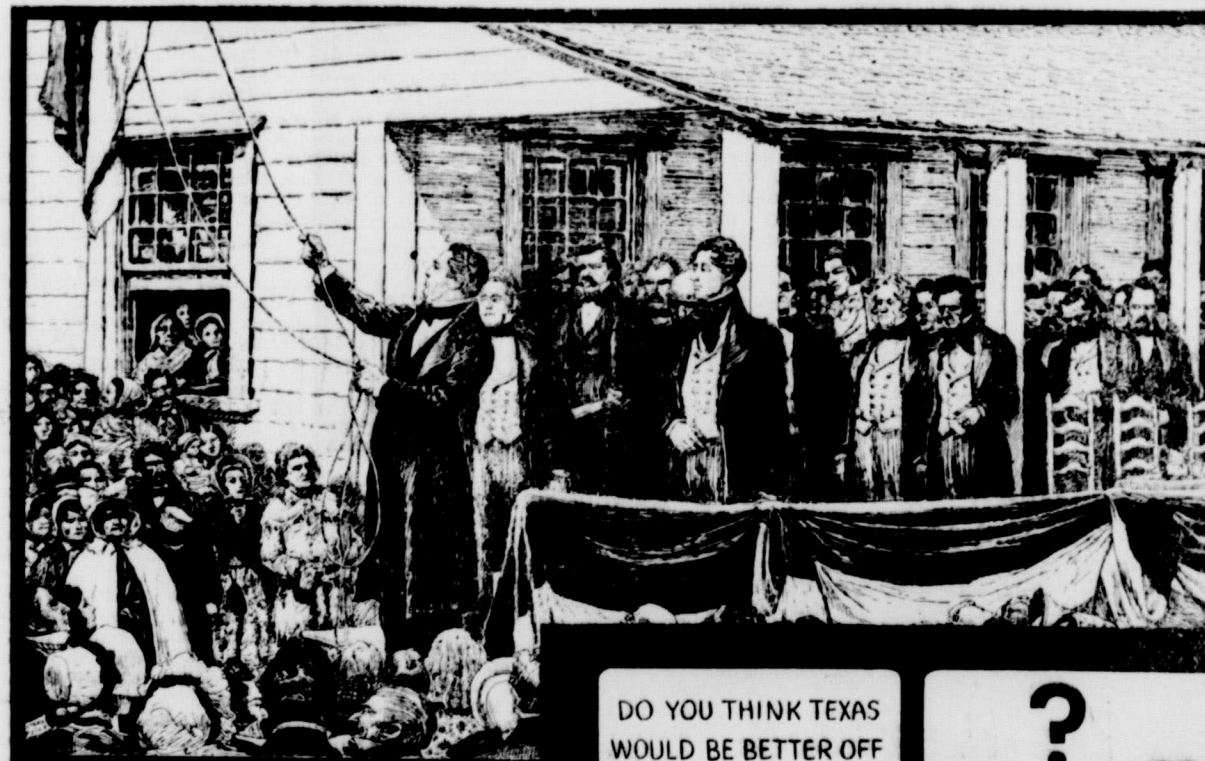
Winners Chosen In Texas History Test

plate refreshing hours of sleep in
the morning's blissful aftermath in
the "old swimmin' hole," cool moon-
light rays, and general good will
to all my acquaintances. My wander-
ing mind is brought back to re-
ality, and, incidentally, English class,
as the teacher makes the assign-
ment for the next lesson. Write
an essay surey he can't request
such a thing on the first day of
spring. However, my own good hu-
mor permeates my whole soul and
being, and I resolve to do the task
